## Election Day Brings Large Voter Turnout

Area voting locations saw a steady stream of voters on Tuesday, April 5, as voters took part in the Wisconsin primary.

Voting remained steady throughout the morning on Tuesday, but things were going smoothly, election worker Marianne Staehler said.

Having to show identification did not seem to be a problem and did not slow down the voting process, Staehler said.

Staehler said the thing that bogged things down the most was waiting for the new machine to “ding” when people cast their votes.

“There is a steady line over there. That happens, I guess,” Staehler said.

In the Village of Kewaskum, on the other

hand, Village Clerk Stephanie Justmann said that showing identification was a hurdle.

“It slows the line down, no doubt about it,” Justmann said as she registered a new voter for the village.

New voting equipment that transmitted results electronically to the county clerk was used across Washington County for the second time this year.

The new equipment enabled people with disabilities to cast votes, as well as detected when ballots were filled out incorrectly. That occurred several times in the Town of Kewaskum, so people simply filled out a new ballot, Staehler said.

Detailed unofficial election results will be published in next week’s paper.

## Remembering Kewaskum Businesses

– Historical Collection Is On Display At The Coffee Corner In Kewaskum

Kewaskum resident Ann Neumann remembers paying 25 cents for a movie and Santa visiting the Kewaskum Theatre.

Lana Kuehl, a Kewaskum native and third generation owner of the Kewaskum Statesman, remembers her mother learning to operate the Linotype machine.

“Once in a while hot lead would squirt at her, it was not her favorite part of the job,” Kuehl said.

Those memories are just some of the many that are displayed on the wall of the Coffee Corner as part of a Kewaskum Historical Society project.

The display includes memories, pictures and memorabilia from nine family-owned businesses that at one time had been in the Village of Kewaskum.

The historical collection will be displayed at the Coffee Corner until the beginning of July.

On Wednesday, May 4, a social will be held at the

Coffee Corner at 6:30 p.m., with a short presentation on the history of the featured businesses beginning at 7 p.m.

### The Process Of Collecting Recollections

Over the years, Aaron Laatsch of the Kewaskum Historical Society has collected old picture frames.

About six months ago, Laatsch began transforming those picture frames into shadow boxes. He then went to the Kewaskum Historical Society Museum to find

items to place in the shadow boxes that would represent each of the featured businesses.

“Some of the memorabilia was recently donated to the historical society, and some we have gathered in the museum over the years,” Laatsch said.

The shadow boxes feature things such as old movie tickets, a hanger, a bank bag and matchbooks from the old venues.

“My favorite part about it is the way you express yourself. You do it your-


self, whether it’s good or bad,” said Carolyn Butz, who is new to painting.

## Washington County Sheriff's Office Reports

### Healthy Delivery

On April 4 at 6:27 p.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office received a cell 911 call from a 30-year-old Random Lake man reporting that his 35-year-old wife had just given birth to a baby girl in the car on their way to the hospital.

The couple was west-bound on County Highway H and had the baby in the 3500 block of County Highway H. Upon receiving the call, the Sheriff's Office paged Kewaskum Rescue to stage at a local business in the area of Interstate 45 and County Highway H, along with a sheriff's deputy. Another deputy intercepted the vehicle in the area of Forestview Road and provided an escort to the staging location.

Upon the couple's arrival at the staging area, the baby was breathing, alert and had her eyes open. Kewaskum Rescue transported mom and daughter to St. Joseph's

Hospital without incident. At last report, mom, daughter and even dad are doing well. The Sheriff's Office would like to wish Hattie Jae a happy birthday.

### Family Trouble/Bail Jumping and Resisting

The Washington County Sheriff's Office was called to a residence in the 100 block of Debby Lane in the Village of Richfield on April 4 at 9:02 p.m. for a family trouble complaint that a 30-year-old woman had become involved in a verbal disagreement with her 63-year-old father.

The investigation revealed that the woman was under bond restrictions of absolute sobriety from several pending criminal cases including a criminal OWI case. Deputies immediately recognized she was under the influence of intoxicants and she acknowledged she knew about the bond restrictions. Deputies advised her that she was

under arrest, and she started to walk away from the deputies.

While deputies attempted to restrain her she began to fight with both deputies, and at one point attempted to grab one of the deputy's firearms out of his holster. Deputies reacted to the resistance by deploying an electric control device (ECD) commonly referred to as a Taser. The ECD is an electro-muscular disruption device that disrupts the body's ability to communicate messages from the brain to the muscles causing temporary motor skill dysfunction. The tool is designed to control subjects who are resisting or threatening to resist lawful orders.

The woman was subsequently taken into custody with no injury to her or the deputies involved. She was taken to jail on charges of resisting and bail jumping.

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
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## OBITUARIES

Charles Edward Myrhum, age 64, of West Bend, was granted eternal rest on Saturday, April 2, 2016, following a one month struggle with an aggressive cancer.

He was born on Friday, October 19, 1951 to the late Ole and Ruth (nee Weber) Myrhum at St. Joseph's Hospital in West Bend. As a young boy, Chuck helped his father at their furniture store and funeral home and eventually, at the age of 15, began helping his father with their ambulance service. He graduated from West Bend High School in the class of 1970 and continued his education as an accounting major graduating from the University of Wisconsin Milwaukee with a Bachelor of Business Administration in 1975.

Chuck always felt that his real calling was in funeral service so he continued his college education and become a licensed funeral director in 1977. During his career his commitment to serving both his profession and his community were evident. He was an active member and past president of both the Lakeshore Funeral

While he led an accomplished career, Chuck's greatest joy was having the opportunity to work first with his father and later with his son.

Chuck was a care free man who loved life. He enjoyed boating on the lake, hiking, going for bike rides, walking downtown at the farmers market, cooking, and going to plays. He liked traveling and in recent years traveled to many destinations around the world. He loved golfing and always looked forward to his annual golf weekend with the "Hasbeen Hackers". The fourth of July was Chuck's favorite holiday and he spent it driving the Kiwanis go-karts in the local parade in the morning, spending the afternoon boating on Big Cedar Lake where he would later watch the fireworks display, and finally ending the day with his own amazing firework show. He loved spending time with his

daughter touring historic locations around Wisconsin and always looked forward to their special lunches together. He lived for his grandchildren and loved spending as much time playing with them as he could.

Chuck will be remembered as a hard working man who led by example and always did the heavy lifting. He was humble, kind, and generous. Above all, he was a selfless person who would do anything for anyone at any time.



Richard Conn was tragically shot and killed at the age of 26. However, he was a registered organ donor. Although his life was taken too soon, through donations to six people in need, Richard's spirit still lives on.

"It's kind of hard when you're a mother and you have to make that decision," says Lisa. "I said yes to organ donation, because that's what my son wanted and I felt that it was the right thing to do."

Richard donated his heart, kidneys, liver and pancreas, helping six people in need improve the quality of their lives. Since Richard's passing, two of Lisa's other children have also made the decision to become organ and tissue donors. Their family knows first-hand that from tremendous sadness can come the chance to make a positive impact on somebody's life.

"I cry every day, but I know that my son did a good thing," says Lisa. "I know that he gave life to other people."

As home to the Wisconsin Donor Network and the Wisconsin Tissue Bank, BloodCenter of Wisconsin is dedicated to saving and extending the lives of patients while caring for donor families. In 2015, BloodCenter facilitated 224 life-saving organ transplants.

– Historical Collection Is On Display At the Coffee Corner In Kewaskum

"It's all those different things you don't think about," Laatsch said.

An old photograph depicting the storefront of each business is hung on the wall below its featured shadow box. The pictures were selected from the historical society's photo collection.

Laatsch wanted to do more to help visitors experience the sights and sounds of days gone by, so he interviewed area residents about their memories of those businesses.

"People shared their little stories about the businesses," Laatsch said. "There's a lot of good stories on there."

Laatsch interviewed people such as 94-year-old Don Seil, who worked at a couple of businesses in town through the years, and Mary Ellen McElhatton, whose family at one time had owned Miller's Furniture and Funeral Service.

Some people shared small tidbits, while others remembered big events such as the fire at Miller's Furniture Store.

"If I had more space and time, I have more things to share," said Laatsch, who

hopes to expand the collection after it is moved to the Kewaskum Historical Society Museum this summer.

### Partners In History

This is not the first time the Kewaskum Historical Society has had items displayed at the Coffee Corner, which regularly displays work from area artists. Last year, the bistro featured old photographs from the historical society.

"That went over really well. People were really excited about it and liked seeing it," said Jessica Trunkel, owner of the Coffee Corner.

The enthusiasm sparked the idea to have a themed historical display this year.

"It was a cool idea. It is a fun partnership," Trunkel said. "Because the museum has limited hours, this is a great opportunity for people to find out a little more."

For the May 4 presentation, the Coffee Corner will serve hors d'oeuvres and beverages, and people will be able to order food off the menu. More details will be advertised closer to the date, said Trunkel, who

keeps the Coffee Corner facebook page up-to-date.

"I hope it turns into a social thing where older and younger people come and talk about what this building used to be and what that building was, and share old memories," Trunkel said.

The Kewaskum Historical Society has digitally scanned nearly 4,000 photographs from the late 1800s. Still, the society would like to expand its collection, so it encourages anyone who has old photos of buildings in Kewaskum to share their images.

"It's not that we would take ownership of the photos, but we could scan them in and make them part of our collection," Laatsch said.

In addition, the Kewaskum Historical Society is accepting new members. Anyone interested in Kewaskum or history is welcome to come to the organization's regular meetings, which are held at 7 p.m. on the third Tuesday of the month at the Kewaskum annex building.

"I love the community. That's why I got involved," Laatsch said.

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# Prospect Drive Becomes One-Way During Holy Trinity Building Project

Prospect Drive in the Village of Kewaskum is now a one-way street, with traffic heading west only from Parkview Drive to Main Street, and will remain that way until the building project at Holy Trinity is completed.

Holy Trinity Catholic Church, located at 331 Main St. in Kewaskum, is constructing a new parish center.

The new traffic pattern will help keep children safe as they are brought to and from the school during construction, according to Andy Pesch, who spoke on behalf of Holy Trinity parish at the Kewaskum Village Board meeting on Monday, April 4.

Village board members voted unanimously to convert Prospect Drive into a one-way street on April 4.

The next morning, one-way signs were already being installed to direct traffic.

The idea for the Holy Trinity project was planted last year when the parish received an anonymous donation of \$750,000 to build a new gym.

Since then, the parish started a "We Believe" campaign to build a new parish center.

The goal was to provide needed gym space for not only the parish, but for the entire Kewaskum community as well, according to Jim Wessing, one of the project's four campaign chairs.

As of March 22, \$2,875,823 had been pledged toward the project, exceeding the parish's top goal of \$2.5 million.

The money will fund a new gymnasium, locker rooms, cafeteria, meeting rooms, kitchen and parish offices.

To make room for the new parish center and parking, volunteers began clearing trees from in front of the parish school on Friday, April 1.

# Daniel's Landscaping Wins Award On Area Residence

Daniel's Landscaping won a silver award from the Wisconsin Landscape Contractors Association's Excellence in Landscaping Awards on a landscaping project they did at An Artist's Studio in the Kewaskum area. On Friday, March 4, at the Wisconsin Club in Milwaukee, the Campbellsport company received their silver award for the work.

Owner Dan Stukenberg explained his landscaping on this project:

"A preexisting stone farm fence served as inspiration for creating free-standing stone walls to help alleviate the problem. Indigenous stone from the property was used to construct the

majority of the walls. This provided a significant savings to the client. Some additional character rocks were added for a splash of interest. The dry stack walls were kept low so as not to disrupt the view of the beautiful Kettle Moraine countryside. Antique pavers were used for the vehicle approach and walkways to welcome and draw visitors in.

"A free floating blue-stone and brick bordered patio is positioned outside the entrance and offers a quaint setting for the artist and/or clients to relax and enjoy the surrounding views. The mulched bed surrounding it assures ease of mowing/maintenance. The green hues in the stone were chosen to compliment the color of the studio's wood siding.

"Plants were chosen to compliment the wooded setting of the studio. Lambs Ear, Boxwood, Dwarf Alberta Spruce, Clematis and Wisteria Vines and a mix of Hosta,

to name a few, make up the plantscape. The client also added a variety of colorful annuals in distinctly unique pots to bring in accents. The walls included several flat top stones that served as pedestals for the varied garden art pieces.

"Visitors are now easily guided to the front door of the studio through the free-standing stone walls along the antique paver path while admiring the gorgeous view stretched out in front of them. The existing old stone fence is reflected in the indigenous stone of the new free-standing walls and along with the antique pavers they lend the landscape a sense of dignified timelessness."

Daniel's Landscaping is based in Campbellsport and has won many awards over the past couple years for owner Dan Stukenberg's landscape designs.

# Indians Set To Challenge For The EC Fast-Pitch Title – KHS Battery To Lead Veteran Team

The 2016 Kewaskum High fast-pitch season can't start soon enough for veteran coach Jeff Gosse.

With eight letter winners, including four all-conference players, returning, led by 17-game winner, Breana Trepes, the Indians could be even better than last year when they compiled their first 20-win season to finish second in the old Eastern Wisconsin Conference.

It will be a much trimmer Gosse — in his first year of retirement, he has lost some weight — in the third base coaching box, and he is confident there will be a lot of green and black clad Lady Indians steam-rolling past that base on their way home to pile up runs for KHS.

"We're going to be young, but we're going to be very good," Gosse said. "We've got a lot of potential, a LOT of potential!"

The fast-pitch game today starts with a good pitcher and catcher, and Gosse has both - with the junior Trepes zipping the ball in to the sophomore catcher, Brittany Williams. Both were on the all-conference team last spring, with Trepes batting a glossey .506 overall, and Williams, a southpaw, hitting .504 in conference and .458 overall.

Defensively, Williams is also solid. "A lot of people don't like to run on her," Gosse said. "She's got a good arm."

Looking at the infield, there are two players returning, Laura Weishan at first base and Kenzie Lehn, an all-EWC pick, at second.

Gosse said Weishan is "a senior leader, who is very vocal, has a good bat and plays good defense."

Lehn was nothing short of spectacular a year ago. "She started every game at second since she was a freshman, and last year she didn't have a single error," Gosse said, indicat-

ing the shortstop position will be shared by a couple of freshmen, Kennedy Lehn and Maddie Geidel. When Lehn is pitching, Geidel will take over at short, and otherwise she will be in centerfield.

Lehn comes in with good skills as a pitcher, giving Gosse a good 1-2 punch for tournaments. "We will have excellent pitching this season," he said.

Sophomore Skylar Donath will get the nod at third base after seeing a little action at short and winning a letter a year ago.

As far as the outfield is concerned, a "platoon" plan will be used, according to Gosse. Sophomore Emma Debelak returns to her usual spot in right field. Debelak batted .393 and drew enough attention to earn honorable mention in the all-EWC balloting in 2015.

When the younger Lehn is pitching and Geidel is at short, Debelak will take over in center field, according to Gosse, who said others in the mix will be junior letter winner Hailey Plachinski, senior letter winner Maddy Lehmann, sophomore Amanda Schaller and junior Sam Brown. Brown, an outfielder and pitcher, is coming off an injury that limited her play a year ago.

Three others on the varsity are juniors Sydney Rosenthal, Mikaela Leitheiser and Missy Schneider.

Gosse said the team will definitely miss four-year starter, Makenzie Rosenthal, along with outfielder Lindsay Winkler and Melanie Juech. "We lost a lot of leadership, three 400 hitters and four great defensive players," Gosse said, referring to the fact outfielder Abby Weinert moved to Slinger after last season after playing a pivotal role in the Indians' success story.

There are 24 girls out for the sport this spring,

according to Gosse, who said that number is down a little, but, "That's fine. It is what it is, and you get over it," he said, reporting he is planning to have three freshmen, Ashley Trapp, Leach Theusch and Kaitlyn Miller, rotate between the JV and varsity teams.

Two questions posed to Gosse concerned which teams are expected to be good in the new East Central Conference and if his team can finish in the top three again this spring. Gosse said once again Waupun, the final Eastern Wisconsin champion at 14-0, will be good. "They lost seven seniors, but their two top pitchers return," he said, adding, "Winneconne returns everybody, and they were very good last year." Kettle Moraine Lutheran also has a good nucleus but its pitchers may be new, according to Gosse.

As far as the question of a top-three finish, Gosse said, "Yes, I do. I'm very impressed with all the kids, their work ethics and their knowledge of the game. This is a very good group. This group has a ton of potential."

Thus far the weather hasn't been very cooperative, with a scrimmage cancelled because of snow and outdoor practices limited. "We've been outside three or four times, not at much as we would like, but we've been able to get done what we needed to," Gosse said.

The Indians were scheduled to open at Ripon on April 5, and this afternoon (Thursday) they are set to play at Waupun.


Kewaskum was 20th with its four points. Undoubtedly, senior Ellie Debelak would have scored points in one or two events, but she did not

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# Go Wild System Implementation Continues

– DNR Issuing Temporary Operating Receipts For Boats, Recreational Vehicles

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources' new Go Wild system is now processing registrations for boats, recreational vehicles and snowmobiles and issuing temporary operating receipts. Customers who submitted payment by mail will be provided temporary operating receipts within the next two weeks.

Decals and registration cards will be mailed to all customers by the end of April, said Mark Rappe, of DNR's bureau of customer and outreach services. Registration decals, once received, must still be affixed to the vehicle and registration cards carried while operating the vehicle.

"With the snow and ice gone from lakes and trails statewide, we understand our customers are excited to get out and take advantage of some nice early season recreational opportunities," Rappe said. "With the March 31 registration expiration for boats and ATVs and as part of the changeover to the new Go Wild system, we had more than 95,000 customers send in their registrations via mail during the transition period. We are now processing those and will be issuing the temporary operating

receipts."

Until the new decals or mailed temporary operating receipts arrive, customers should present their renewal notice as proof of current registration. Going forward, Rappe said customers are being encouraged to use Go Wild to register boats, ATVs/UTVs and snowmobiles because the online system is fast and will provide the temporary operating receipt immediately.

"Since the system launched two weeks ago, we've sold more than 528,000 products including Conservation Patron items and conducted more than 140,000 transactions," Rappe said. "During the height of the turkey tag sales last week, we were processing nearly 7,500 transactions per hour. In the days ahead, we will be pushing through additional system improvements and a software adjustment to improve the use of the touch screen technology."

The Go Wild system is part of a larger DNR campaign to encourage people to head outdoors and enjoy the numerous recreational opportunities made possible by the sound management of Wisconsin's natural resources. Rappe said

GoWild.WI.Gov acts as a portal to help plan adventures with links to information on hunting and fishing opportunities, Wisconsin's unparalleled network of state parks, trails and natural areas and a variety of maps.

The system provides increased convenience for customers who can now purchase products online with mobile devices, through DNR customer service centers and at more than 1,000 vendors statewide. The system has eliminated the use of thermal paper licenses and allows customers in most circumstances to show proof of their licenses with an optional conservation card, a verified Wisconsin driver's license, a paper printout or a pdf displayed on a mobile device.

Customers fishing in boundary waters must use the paper printouts as law enforcement officials in the surrounding states do not have access to the Wisconsin database. Information about how to provide proof of your purchase and handle the required harvest tags for turkey and other species may be found at DNR.WI.Gov by searching "Go Wild."

## Protect Oak Trees, Avoid Oak Wilt By Waiting Until After July To Prune

To protect oak trees and help prevent oak wilt, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources advises people to avoid pruning oaks on their property from April through July.

Oak wilt can cause leaf drop and defoliation. Often leaves with the characteristic brown margins and green center can be found on the ground underneath infected trees. Oaks in the red oak group get the disease most easily while oaks in the white oak group (those with rounded leaf edges) are less susceptible.

Spring and early summer pruning makes oak trees vulnerable to oak wilt, a fatal fungal disease. Any tree damage during this time creates an opening that exposes live tree tissue and provides an opportunity for the oak wilt fungus to invade and establish itself in the tree.

Don Kissinger, a DNR urban forester in Wausau, said beyond concerns about oak wilt, there are other important reasons to avoid pruning deciduous trees in spring.

"Spring is the time when tree buds and leaves are growing, leaving the tree's food reserves low," Kissinger said. In general, the best time to prune

trees is in winter.

The use of tree paint or a wound dressing is not normally recommended on pruning cuts or wounded surfaces on most trees. These products are recommended for damaged oaks from April through July. An immediate light painting of wounds on oak trees during this time helps protect against the spread of oak wilt by beetles.

"Just 15 minutes could be enough time for beetles that are carrying oak wilt spores to land on a fresh wound and infect your tree," said Kyoko Scanlon, DNR statewide forest pathologist.

Property owners with oak trees are encouraged to check with their municipality to find out if there are local oak wilt ordinances.

Oak wilt is found in all Wisconsin counties except

Ashland, Bayfield, Calumet, Door, Douglas, Forest, Iron, Kewaunee, Manitowoc, Price, Sheboygan and Taylor counties.

# Comprehensive Bird Survey Begins Second Year

With this year's El Nino weather and early spring, volunteer sightings of species breeding early are coming in daily for a statewide breeding bird survey.

"Reports are coming in to the Wisconsin Breeding Bird Atlas II detailing early nesting activities. Sandhill cranes and northern cardinals are pairing up, crows and ravens are building nests, and great horned owls and red-tailed hawks are already incubating eggs," says Nick Anich, lead coordinator of the atlas survey and conservation biologist with Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

Anich and other survey organizers are encouraging all Wisconsin birders and wildlife watchers to submit breeding observations to the project to capture these early sightings. They also urge current

and potential participants to join them in a weekend-long symposium taking place April 1-3 near Wausau to kickoff the second year of the survey.

Wisconsin Breeding Bird Atlas II is being led by the Wisconsin Society for Ornithology, the Western Great Lakes Bird and Bat Observatory, the Wisconsin Bird Conservation Initiative and the Wisconsin DNR.

"This statewide effort is critical for conserving the birds of Wisconsin. It is important that anyone with an interest in Wisconsin's birds joins the effort, and the Kickoff is a great way for newcomers to the project to get up to speed, and for veteran atlasers to learn how they can delve deeper into the project this year," says Anich.

The survey is the follow-up to a first Atlas conducted from 1995-2000.

Information collected during that period is still used in species conservation and land management planning today, but changes in habitat and anecdotal shifts in bird populations make it important to get a more current picture of Wisconsin's breeding bird population, says Ryan Brady, science coordinator for the atlas survey and research scientist with DNR.

"We are already seeing indications that some species are expanding their range, while others appear to be contracting," says Brady. "However, it's still early in the project, and we have a lot of locations that need additional coverage."

The benefits of having comprehensive atlas data extends to all Wisconsin birds, the abundance and habits of which are captured in a standardized

form accessible to current and future scientists for understanding and conserving birds.

Changes in land use, expansion of invasive species, and various forms of human development continue to have impacts on our birdlife, other wildlife, and natural resources, says Brady. The atlas will play key role in assessing some of those impacts for more than 200 bird species.

**All Birders Encouraged To Help**

More than 700 volunteers documented over 1.8 million birds of 229 species in the first year of the five-year survey to document breeding bird distribution and abundance. This included eight species not confirmed as breeders during the first bird atlas. This year, Brady and other organizers hope to grow their volunteer base to more than 1,000 participants and increase participation from areas of the state where little to no data was submitted in 2015 and relatively few birders reside.

"Now that we're into the second year of the survey, we really want to focus on the northern and western parts of the state, and some central counties, to continue to fill gaps in coverage," says Kim Kreitinger, president of the Wisconsin Society for Ornithology. "We need to motivate those birders in less-populated areas, and encourage our birders from well-covered areas to take a few road trips to help us out this season."

Survey participants collect data by observing birds, noting the date and location, and entering their sightings online into an eBird database specially developed for the project by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology. The records are then checked by a team of professional and volunteer ornithologists. When the project is completed the data will be published in a hard-copy book and online, and the dataset will be available for use by researchers, land managers, and others working to conserve birds and their habitats.

**Attend The Season 2 Kickoff April 1-3**

The Season 2 Kickoff will take place April 1-3 at the Stoney Creek Hotel & Conference Center in Rothschild. Highlights of the weekend include field trips, specialized training geared to both first-time and returning atlas contributors, tips from the experts, eBird workshops and more.

Advance registration is closed, but walk-in registration is still available the day of the event for \$35.

# Spring Cleaning Checklist For Home Exteriors

When the topic of "spring cleaning" is discussed, thoughts naturally turn to the inside of your home, such as organizing and discarding no longer used items. The experts at Callen Construction, Inc. in Muskego, a full service and award winning home improvement and remodeling company celebrating its 30th anniversary of serving southeastern Wisconsin homeowners, encourage you to also clean the exterior of your home this spring.

"A Wisconsin winter can cause issues for your home's exterior, so your outdoor chores will likely be comprised of a heavy dose of maintenance as well as the more traditional indoor cleaning and clearing type tasks," said Christopher Wittmann, CR, exterior product specialist for Callen.

To assist in getting your exterior ready for the outdoor season, Wittmann suggests completing the following tasks this spring.

### Clean The Gutters

Gutters do their job best when kept clean. "During winter, snow and any leftover leaves or debris may freeze in the gutter,"

Wittmann said. "Clean out any debris, including in the eaves and roof valleys, to ensure that water can flow freely. Then check for proper drainage away from the home by ensuring that all downspouts are fully secured." Wittmann suggests that, since the weight of the ice and snow in the gutters can compromise the integrity of their fastening to the house, also inspect the connection of the brackets to ensure the gutters aren't pulling away from the fascia.

Wittmann suggests installing a gutter protection system, such as GutterTopper, which Callen has installed on homes throughout southeastern Wisconsin for more than 15 years. "With GutterTopper, water flows smoothly into the gutters even during the heaviest downpour while leaves and other debris stay out," Wittmann said. "Plus, Gutter Topper is equally effective in the winter time since it reduces the amount of ice and snow build-up inside the gutters." Gutter Topper is available in a full array of colors, so you can coordinate with your roof and gutters.

### Inspect Hose Bibs (Outdoor Faucets)

Hose bibs left undrained or unprotected during winter have been known to freeze and crack, creating a leak inside the wall. If this occurs, it is necessary to repair the pipe and install an inside shutoff valve for drainage.

"Before winter temperatures set in, it is best to turn off the inside valve (if equipped) and open the outside spigot to allow water to drain out and not freeze during the colder months," Wittmann said. "When you secure your garden hose to the hose bib and turn on the water, pay special attention to the connecting points and inspect for any water leaks in the event that those connections were compromised."

### Window Screens

When spring arrives, people want fresh air in their homes, so naturally they open the windows. Before that is done, clean the screens, as properly maintained screens create maximum airflow into the home.

To clean, first try spraying the screens in a tub to eliminate the dust and debris

that clings to the mesh. If the debris doesn't come off, lay the screens on a flat surface and use mild soap and water with a soft brush to gently remove dirt and grime.

Clean both sides of the screen and the interior and exterior of the frame. Allow the screen to dry fully before reinstalling.

### Deck Maintenance

Most decks require regular upkeep, so it is important to evaluate its condition and make needed repairs.

"Examine the structure carefully to ensure it is safe, fixing cracked railings, splintered planks, and loose nails," Wittmann said. "Use a spray nozzle attached to a garden hose to clean the deck to remove dirt and mildew. If the dirt and grime doesn't come off, the use of a pressure washer or a brush and mild cleaning detergent may be needed."

Reseal the deck if necessary. If the deck area includes lighting, remove debris, clean the fixtures, survey that the bulbs are securely screwed in, and check that all fixtures are working appropriately.

### Clean The Garage

For some homeowners, the garage is purgatory for their belongings, where surplus materials take up residence. Cleaning out the garage will provide additional space for warm weather equipment like bikes, outdoor games, and gardening equipment.

"Discarding no longer used items and organizing the materials that you decide to keep will allow you to more easily locate what you need, when you need it," Wittmann said. "Eliminating clutter in the garage and storing flammables such as oil, gasoline, paint, propane and varnish in a shed or at least in a metal cabinet in the garage will prevent garage fires."

### Fence Inspection

Rot is the biggest thing to look for in a wooden fence, along with loose rails and any kind of wobbly parts. "Inspect the posts where they meet the ground," Wittmann said. "If it appears that the wood is weak, it can cause the whole fence to come down."

### Wash The House

Spring is usually a good time to wash off the dirt and

grime that accumulated on the exterior of the house.

"To reduce streaking, be sure to start at the bottom and work your way up, being especially cautious around the electrical service entrance, the lines and conduit feeding the power meter," Wittmann said. "Avoid spraying upward and angle the spray away from doors, windows, and vents, especially soffit vents."

He also suggests using a spray nozzle attached to a garden hose first before using a power washer since "the high water output from a pressure washer can compromise the integrity of the siding by tearing off the wood or strips of the finish from hardboard siding and also allowing water to penetrate into the sheathing underneath causing mold and mildew. If dirt and grime aren't coming off very easily, use a mild detergent and soft brush first to remove or loosen it up before spraying it again."

"Regardless of the size and condition of your home, exterior spring cleaning can make it fresh for the new year," Wittmann said.

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## Village Of Kewaskum Restricts Where Sex Offenders Can Live

The Village of Kewaskum now has an ordinance which restricts where registered child sex offenders can live within the village's boundaries.

Village trustees passed the new ordinance unanimously at the village board meeting on Monday, April 4.

The ordinance prohibits registered sex offenders who were convicted of a crime against a child and who did not previously live in Kewaskum from moving to the village.

Those who had previously lived in the Village of Kewaskum are now

restricted on where they can live. They are not allowed to live within 750 feet of schools, public parks or centers or facilities for children.

Those already living in the village are grandfathered in and are not affected unless they move from their current residence.

"The problem is that Milwaukee is now taking back their offenders and they want to put them out in the outlying communities," Village Board President Kevin Scheunemann said. "We have always resisted this historically, but the problem is the landscape has

changed on it."

Village trustees discussed increasing the restriction to encompassing 1,500 feet from schools and parks, but that would eliminate the majority of the village as a place of residence for offenders.


"We can't exclude everybody, so to speak," Police Chief Thomas Bishop said. "We wanted to make sure there are some places where people could still live."

Under the ordinance, the registered child sex offenders are also prohibited from loitering within 750 feet of schools, parks and children's facilities.

## Vaccinations Provide Health For Pets And FFA Scholarships For Students

A line of dogs and cats stretched from the lobby in the Kewaskum Veterinary Clinic, out the door, through the parking lot and out to Fond du Lac Avenue as pet owners waited patiently to get their animals vaccinated against rabies.

There were all different breeds of dogs and cats, standing in the line, everything from Rottweilers to great Danes and huskies, and teacup poodles to tiny kittens.

In all, more than 200 cats and dogs were vaccinated on Wednesday, March 30.

The shots cost \$25 each, with all proceeds

going toward scholarships for FFA members.

"My dad started the scholarship in 1967," said Dr. Greg Ogi, veterinarian at the Kewaskum Veterinary Clinic. "I remember helping with it when I was in high school. There were long lines even then."

There were only dogs and cats that came to the clinic this year, but Ogi remembers the year that three horses were brought to the clinic for vaccinations.

"We did not let them come walking in," Ogi said.

Instead, the veterinarians went to the parking lot to vaccinate the equine animals.

Because of the vaccinations, two \$1,500 scholarships will be awarded to FFA members this year.

Called the Dr. Ogi Scholarship, the scholarship is offered in honor of Dr. Charles Ogi, who is now 90 years old.

Last week, FFA members worked at the vaccination clinic. Some of the students helped pet owners fill out paperwork while others helped collect the \$25 fee. Some helped bring the animals into the clinic and hold them still while they received their shots.

"We are teaching the kids about giving back," Ogi said. "This is one way to raise funds for charities."

## 2016 Village Of Kewaskum Curb Side Bulk Item Collection

The 2016 curb side collection is scheduled for Thursday, April 21st. Advanced Disposal will follow the normal garbage collection route for the bulk collection.

NO TV, electronic goods or microwaves will be allowed, or collected under the E-Recycle law.

**Advanced Disposal Bulk Waste**

### Collection Rules:

Place items at the curb on Thursday, April 21st for collection.

The following items are identified as bulky waste that will be collected: furniture, rolled carpeting (4ft maximum length), cabinets, countertops, mattresses/bed springs, non metal doors, wood windows, play equipment, (must be able to

handle), appliances that do not contain freon and are not electronic.

Excluded items: uncontainerized or piles of construction material, freon containing appliances, TV's, microwaves, or electronic goods, tires, batteries, used oil (oil can be recycled by picking a slip up at the Municipal Building).
