## Buddy Bench Fosters Friendship – Local Student Creates Bench To Curb Loneliness

Eight-year-old Peyton Theusch doesn't like to see anyone feeling sad or lonely.

So the third-grader at the i4Learning Community School in Wayne created a "Buddy Bench" for children to sit on during recess when they feel they need a companion. The bench is a signal for the other students to come and be a friend.

It all started two years ago when Peyton was in first grade. Over Christmas vacation, he saw a news story on TV about a boy named Christian who created a "Buddy Bench" for his elementary school in York, Penn.

Peyton wanted to do

that for his school, too.

"He wanted to do it so kids wouldn't be lonely," Peyton's mom, Dana Theusch, said.

So Peyton wrote a letter to the student government.

"The student government met and thought, 'OK, this is a good idea.'" school counselor Jody Mundigler-Hemauer said. "But the problem was we didn't have the supplies to just get a Buddy Bench. And we didn't have hundreds of dollars lying around."

So the student government members made bracelets and sold them at lunchtime. After an entire school year of selling bracelets, the students

## Washington County Fair Releases This Year's Entertainment Lineup

Washington County Fair officials are pleased to announce the 2016 entertainment lineup on the new Silver Lining Amphitheater, sponsored by West Bend Mutual Insurance.

Kicking off the lineup on Thursday, July 28, will be Hunter Hayes, a country singer/songwriter and multi-instrumentalist. Hayes is best known for his first single "Invisible" and most successful single "Wanted." Hayes was nominated in 2012 for Best New Artist at the CMA Awards and in 2013 for single of the year, song of the year and video of the year. He won the best single and music video in 2012 at the American Country Awards for the song "Wanted." He has been a supporting act in tours by Taylor Swift, Carrie Underwood and Lady Antebellum.

Opening act for Hunter

Hayes will be Julia Cole, blues, country and pop artist, attacking every concert with her keyboard, guitar and entrancing vocals and leaving the crowd in awe.

Friday, July 29, will feature classic Southern rock band .38 Special. The group's many gold and platinum album awards stand in testament to the endurance of a legendary powerhouse. Timeless hits that remain a staple include "Hold On Loosely," "Rockin' Into the Night," "Second Chance" and more. As of 2014, the lineup consisted of vocalist Don Barnes; guitarist/vocalist Danny Chauncey; keyboardist Bobby Capps; drummer Gary Moffatt and bassist Barry Dunaway.

Opening for .38 Special will be Shooter Jennings, American singer-songwriter active in the outlaw country music and

Southern rock genre. The only son of country legend Waylon Jennings and Jessi Colter, Shooter started his musical career at the early age of five. Following his father's footsteps, but with his own feisty, scrappy sense of country, Jennings placed himself in a fine position to both explore that legacy and carve out his own. Best known for his singles "Outlaw You" and "The Deed and the Dollar," Shooter Jennings is guaranteed to put on a great opening show.

Taking the stage on Saturday, July 30, will be country recording artist Lee Brice. Brice started his career as a songwriter prior to becoming a recording artist. 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# Washington County Sheriff's Office Reports

## Bail Jumping

A 30-year-old Village of Newburg man accidentally dialed 911 on his cell phone while trying to use Facebook on Saturday, April 9, at 10:20 p.m. The Sheriff's Office protocol is to remain online with the caller if it is an open line call, or try to make re-contact with the caller if it is a hang-up to make sure there is not an issue that needs law enforcement intervention. A communications officer was able to finally make contact with the owner of the phone.

The individual became defensive and did not want to identify himself. Deputies were subsequently dispatched to the area and made contact with the caller, who denied making the call, but also acknowledged the call originated from his phone.

During the contact with the caller, the deputies noted the individual was exhibiting numerous signs of intoxication. Further investigation revealed that the caller was under a deferred prosecution agreement that was reached on July 22, 2015, relating to a battery and disorderly case. One of the conditions of the

agreement is absolute sobriety.

The man was arrested for misdemeanor bail jumping and was brought into custody at the Washington County Jail on \$1,000 cash bond. A breath test confirmed the presence of alcohol in excess of twice the legal limit for driving a motor vehicle.

Successful completion of the deferred prosecution program would have resulted in the dismissal of the criminal charge against the person. This incident will now result in the original case returned to the district attorney or court for prosecution.

## Car Crash

Washington County Sheriff's deputies responded to a vehicle versus building crash in the Village of Richfield on April 8.

The call was received at 9:09 a.m. and was reported as an unknown injury accident. Upon deputies' arrival, it was confirmed as a property-damage only crash.

The driver of the car that struck the building was an 87-year-old Richfield woman that was about to patronize the Hair

Formations Salon located at 1245 State Highway 175 in Richfield. As she drove into the parking lot, it is believed that the driver either failed to apply the brakes, or instead hit the accelerator by mistake.

No customers inside the salon at the time were injured. The building owner placed an estimate of \$15,000 to make repairs to the store front. The business was temporarily repaired and the Salon continued to provide services and remained open to customers.

## Traffic Stop

The Washington County Sheriff's Office assisted with the safe return of an elderly Amherst couple reported as missing endangered by the Portage County Sheriff's Office early in the morning on April 8.

At 1:42 a.m., a deputy was monitoring traffic on Interstate 45 near County Road PV when he clocked a northbound vehicle at 110 mph. Upon making contact with the driver and passenger, the deputy immediately noticed both individuals were confused and disoriented; alcohol/drugs were not a factor.

The 90-year-old man, and his 88-year-old wife, indicated they were on their way to Georgia to visit family and did not know why the deputy stopped them. The gas gauge was nearly on empty, and their location and direction was not consistent with their intended route of travel.

The deputy learned, though Department of Transportation records,

that the Portage County Sheriff's Office put out a Statewide "Silver Alert" for the couple and their vehicle on April 7 at 10:51 p.m.

In August of 2014, the State of Wisconsin implemented the Silver Alert program to protect senior citizens. The alerts are similar to Amber Alerts but target missing individuals over the age of 60 that are believed to have some type of cognitive impairment that poses a direct threat to the individual's health and safety.

Additionally, there is a reasonable belief the missing person(s) disappearance is due to that cognitive impairment. In this particular case, the couple left their home at 1:30 p.m. on April 7 to get their taxes done and did not return home as planned.

Given the circumstances, enforcement action other than a speeding ticket was taken by the Sheriff's Office. Law enforcement officers have the ability to report at-risk drivers to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation Medical Review Unit. The reports, called a Driver Condition and Behavior Reports, are submitted when law enforcement has contact with a driver who exhibited concerning or dangerous behavior that may have been caused by a medical condition or a lack of driving skills.

It is important to note that age alone is not sufficient cause for the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) to take action on a report. Depending on the medical information received, the driver may have to complete and pass written and practical tests with the DMV to remain licensed. In this case that report was filled with the DMV by the Sheriff's Office. Sheriff deputies stood by with the elderly couple until family members were able to respond. After this incident, the immediate family is also re-evaluating allowing the couple to drive.

Kewaskum High School FFA teams competed at the Fox Valley Tech College Career Development Event on Friday, April 1.

The Agriculture Mechanics Team and the Livestock Evaluation Team qualified for the state contest to be held on April 29 in Madison.

The Agriculture Mechanics team includes: Teagan Herman (placed sixth out of 60 individually), Nic Limberg (placed eighth out of 60 individually), Jonny Fischer and Donny Schmidt. The team placed fourth out of 14 teams.

The Livestock team includes: Seth Bartelt (placed fifth individually out of 125), Justin

Limberg, Cody Oelhafen and Leah Resch. The team placed 10th out of 34 teams.

The other teams of Dairy Cattle Evaluation and Wildlife Management also did well.

The dairy cattle team (all first-time participants) included: Hailey Schiebel, Kristy Peters, Mitchell Weir and Lauren Kirschbaum. The team placed 24th out of 37 teams.

The Wildlife Team of Ben Gonnering, Devon Gallenberg, Matt Limbach and Cooper Schmidt placed 14th out of 34 teams. The team needed to be in the top 10 to move on.

Ben Gonnering placed fifth individually overall out

of 130 participants in the Wildlife Contest.

These contests are like Skillathons. They involve a written test, team problem solving, individual problem solving, quality evaluations and speaking your animal placing "reasons" to a judge.

The students spent time practicing as teams and studying on their own to prepare for the contest.

Speakers and trainers were brought in for the 8 hour training. Dodie Sargent, Administrator of Little Folks believes that the most effective professional development engages teachers to focus on the needs of their children.

Carol Bralich and Paul

Robach from Washington County UW-Extension presented a workshop entitled "Real Colors". This was a fun and interactive workshop that provided the teachers with skills to understand human behavior, skills that are easy to incorporate into everyday life. The outcomes for each individual was the ability to recognize their strengths and the strengths of others to build rapport quickly with clientele and colleagues to understand how others process information and

the ability to modify their communication to connect with others.'

Jeannine Kitzerow, Ozaukee County Health Department and Breastfeeding Coalition presented on becoming a "Breastfeeding Friendly Child Care center". The teachers were taught about the benefits of breastfeeding and trained to provide breastfeeding information and support to help mothers continue to breastfeed when they return to work or school.

The West Bend Youth and Family Project sent Emily Christensen and Elizabeth Greene to train in art therapy and helping children cope with divorce. Teachers were taught how to set goals for these children and art activities that can be used to help them meet those goals.

sented on "Terrific Transitions". A transition is any time a child moves from one activity to another. Tips and tricks were shared on how to make these transitions smooth. **TEA LINKED TO STRONGER BONES**

Drinking three or more cups of black tea each day may help keep bones strong and reduce the risk of fracture, according to a recent study. Researchers followed about 1,200 women in their 70's for 10 years and found that those who drank three cups or more of tea a day had a 30% reduced risk of fracture compared to those women who drank little or no tea. Even one cup of tea a day reduced risk of fracture by 9%. Experts say the compounds in tea called flavonoids, found in plant foods, may be responsible for the benefit. Previous research has linked both black and green tea with higher bone mineral density.

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## Live Christmas Trees Now Allowed In Places Of Assembly Across State

Churches in Wisconsin will be able to continue the longstanding tradition of displaying live-cut Christmas trees indoors.

Gov. Scott Walker signed AB 648 into law on March 30 to become 2015 Wisconsin Act 333, which allows churches to house safe, well-watered and properly lit Christmas trees.

"This new law will clarify for our local fire officials how the fire code is to be enforced. Local fire authorities will still be able to remove unsafe trees after measures to improve safety are not observed; however, the cherished tradition of having a natural cut Christmas tree in a church will no longer be arbitrarily prohibited," Rep. Jesse Kremer said.

In December, Kremer joined Assembly Speaker Robin Vos (R-Rochester)

and Senator Steve Nass (R-Whitewater) in releasing AB 648 to prohibit bans of Christmas trees in churches after several municipal fire departments had warned that the future display of natural cut Christmas trees in churches would be prohibited.

St. Lucas Church in Kewaskum was one of the churches that had received a warning that it would no longer be able to display live Christmas trees, prior to the bill passing.

A 20-foot live-cut Christmas tree stood in the St. Lucas sanctuary in December, but church officials had worried that it was the last time the practice would be permitted.

"We had to get a waiver from the fire chief in order to put the tree up," the Rev. Tim Henning, pastor at St. Lucas, said in December.

In 2008, Wisconsin

adopted the National Fire Protection Association's fire code, NFPA 1, which prohibits combustible vegetation such as a Christmas tree in places of assembly, except as allowed by an "authority having jurisdiction."

Since the 2008 legislation was enacted, many fire chiefs across the state imposed bans on natural cut Christmas trees in places of worship.

Act 333 clarifies that live-cut Christmas trees are allowed in places of assembly across the state, including places of worship and the State Capitol building.

Under the new law, local fire chiefs can still order that a tree be removed from a church if adequate safeguards, such as suitable water supply, safe lighting and proper distance from heat sources, are not observed.

Broker, who is the sausage maker at Kewaskum Frozen Foods, put his mouth-watering thoughts into action, and created the new pork product especially for the Wisconsin Association of Meat Processors held in Madison on March 31 through April 3.

The new recipe was named the Grand Champion for Flavored Bacon at the convention.

“It turned out all right,” Broker said.

Broker received a number of other awards at the 77th annual convention of the Wisconsin Association of Meat Processors. At the Meat Product Show held in conjunction with that meeting, Broker and Kewaskum Frozen Foods received the following product awards:

Bourbon Maple Bacon, Grand Champion for Flavored Bacon; Old Fashioned Wieners, Grand Champion of Natural Casing Wieners; Smoked Brats, Reserve Grand Champion for Smoked Brats; Chicken Enchilada Brat, Reserve Champion for Boneless Poultry; Smoked Polish, Champion for Smoked Polish/Kielbasa; and Ring Liver, Champion for Ring Liver Sausage.

Broker is now in the process of creating more of the Bourbon Maple Bacon so that it will be available for purchase.

All of the rest of Broker’s award-winning products are available at Kewaskum Frozen Foods, 118 Forest Ave. in Kewaskum.

This was not the first time Broker has received awards for his meat products.

Most recently, his cheesewurst was named the grand champion bratwurst at last year’s Wisconsin State Fair. In 2014, the American Association of Meat Processors named the cheesewurst the best in the nation.

The Wisconsin Meat Product Competition that was held earlier this month is the largest of its kind in the United States. Meat processing plants and meat markets from throughout the state this year entered 944 individual products into 36 product categories, including summer sausage, bratwurst, ham, bacon, smoked poultry and a variety of other types of meat products.

More than 40 judges, including food scientists, out-of-state meat processors and other food industry professionals, were required to effectively evaluate the many products during the product evaluation session on Saturday, April 2. Individual products are scored for external appearance and eye-appeal, internal appearance, aroma and taste, using a scale of 1,000 points.

Broker hopes his products will be recognized at this year’s state fair.

“That is always the goal,” he said.

# Dance Off To Benefit Kewaskum Fire Department

MeriLou Chambers is representing West Bend Mutual Insurance Company as a Citizen Advocate Celebrity Dance Team participant at the 2016 Gala at the Chandelier Ballroom in Hartford Friday, May 13. MeriLou’s votes will also benefit the Kewaskum Firefighters Association, a nonprofit which raises funds that purchase equipment for the Kewaskum Fire Department.

Kewaskum Firefighters Association vice president, Jim Warnkey, announced that the organization is helping get votes in order to raise funds for a new thermal imaging camera. According to Warnkey, “The current camera is over 15 years old, weighs about 10 lbs. and is the size of a lunch box. A new camera will be about a third of the size.” Warnkey, added, “It’s much more

dynamic. The technology is much greater today.”

Thermal imaging cameras allow firefighters in a smoke-filled environment to “see”. They are able to identify people so that search and rescue is much faster. A second feature of the newer cameras is the ability to “see” fires within a wall or ceiling. This limits the damages as the firefighters don’t have to dig through the walls to find hidden hot spots.

Warnkey noted that the KFA works as a nonprofit to buy equipment for the fire department to keep the budget down for Kewaskum and surrounding areas which are served by the KFD.

The “Dancing for a Difference” event is the primary fundraiser for Citizen Advocates of Washington County. CA works to make a positive difference in the lives of

people with disabilities.

Dancers raise funds by soliciting “votes”. Each vote costs \$10. Chambers encourages Kewaskum residents to support the fire department by voting for her at least once. More would be better. 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# Daniel's Landscaping Wins State Gold Award

"The clients wished to maximize the outdoor living area by utilizing more of the lower yard. They were very pleased with the suggestion of breaking the space into two rooms extending the length of the house and further into the backyard, joining the areas together with a comfortable two tiered step system.

"Due to the narrowness

of the lot and limited access through the top portion of the yard only, the lower patio had to be built first. Next the spoils from the lower patio construction were reallocated to build retaining walls surrounding the upper patio.

"Limestone steps were then set to connect the two living areas. Once they were in, machinery could no longer be brought to the lower portion of the yard. The upper patio was then installed.


"Clients wanted an informal private/cozy setting without creating a style clash with the formal red brick colonial house. Cut blue stone served as a good material contrast to the house while a red brick border was chosen to match the brick on the house. A snap-cut limestone step system added some interest while breaking up the bluestone and delineating the two separate patio rooms. Character granite and limestone boulders were placed for table and seat rocks. These are practical as well as providing garden accents.

"Privacy from the large two-story house next door was achieved with border plants such as Norway

Spruce, Birch Trees, and Flowering Crabs. A variety of traditional dwarf evergreens including Blue, Alberta and Norway Spruce, Bluestar Juniper, and Jap Garden juniper were all chosen. Peegee, Annabelle, and Endless Summer varieties of Hydrangeas along with a mixed variety of perennials and potted annuals were used to add color throughout the growing season. Low voltage outdoor lighting allows for evening ambiance and safety when navigating between the patios.

"The end results exceeded the client's expectations. The main patio is spacious with plenty of room for entertaining and hobby gardening. It is a comfortable area offering beautiful views from all angles. There is a graceful descent onto the lower patio, which provides an inviting seating area adjacent to the open lawn."

With all of the starters back from 2015, the Kewaskum High golf team appears to be poised for a very successful season.

"We didn't have any seniors last year so we have everybody back, and we have six new freshman," KHS coach Glenn Eichstedt, starting his 18th season, said.

The returning lettermen include Sam Schlosser and Sean Murray, who played number one and two all last year, and Andrew Otto, who had improved a great deal and will be pushing the other two for the top spot.

Schlosser and Murray averaged right around 41 strokes per nine-hole round and dipped into the high 39s several times. Neither are long hitters but are good at keeping the ball in play and good on the greens.

Then there is Otto, who worked very hard on his game last summer and carded a one-under-par 69 in the semifinals of the Hon-E-Kor Men's Club Championships against a very good golfer before losing in the finals. "The point is he is capable," Eichstedt said.

Also lettering last spring was Trent Griesemer, who had some good rounds but was a bit inconsistent, and Eichstedt said he lettered Jim Banks, who played mostly in JV competitions but did see some varsity action.

Schlosser, Murray, Otto and Griesemer pretty much have locks on varsity spots, but there will be plenty of competition for the number five spot between Banks, junior Scott Hiltunen, sophomore Jordan Carlton, and freshman Jacob Schlosser, who, Eichstedt said, is "a little bigger kid than Sam, and he looks pretty good."

Kewaskum finished fifth in the old Eastern Wisconsin Conference, which had been dominated by Sheboygan Falls for the past three years and Plymouth before that.

Eichstedt said this will be a bit of a learning year because "It's going to be a different conference with different schools and different courses." Looking at the four new teams in the East Central, the coach figures Berlin and Kettle Moraine Lutheran will be pretty formidable.

"We have high expecta-

tions. We would like to finish high in the conference, in the regional and the sectional, if possible," he said.

The Indians were supposed to play in a 36-hole tournament in Wisconsin Dells over the weekend. That was shortened to 18 holes on Saturday, and Kewaskum finished fourth out of 17 teams in the smaller school division. Fort Atkinson won the meet with a 327 total in the best four of five scoring. Next came Mt. Horeb at 337, Reedsburg at 339, and then the Indians at 348.

Otto finished in a tie for sixth place, carding a very consistent 40-40-80. The medalist was Fort's Derek Vaillencourt, who shot a 39-38-77.

Kewaskum's other counters were Sam

Schlosser, 41-42-83, Griesemer, 41-44-85 and Banks, 53-47-100.

Eichstedt reported sometime in February Murray had a problem with a collapsed lung. It eventually required surgery several weeks ago, but Eichstedt said he may be ready to play soon.

## Lack Of Depth Could Keep KHS Girls From An Upper Division Finish

The Kewaskum High girls track team does have experienced, talented athletes, but the trouble is there probably aren't enough of them to challenge for top spots in the new East Central Conference.

Three seniors girls, Ellie Debelak, Emily Krier and Krystina Lapp, are expected to carry the load for the Lady Indians. They will compete in multiple events and are capable of scoring big points in those events, according to new head coach Kris Evans.

Debelak, starting her fourth year on the varsity, had been a sprinter and relay runner until last year when she tried the open 400 and did so well, she broke the 60-second barrier and advanced to the WIAA D-2 State Track and Field Meet where she finished sixth with a clocking of 58 and .75 (58.75) seconds.

When asked if she can reach that figure in the 400 again this spring, Evans said, "That depends on getting her healthy," referring to a knee problem which kept her out of the recent Oshkosh Indoor Invitational. Evans is hoping she can. "I imagine her getting stronger," he said.

Debelak should help the sprint relays be successful but as far as her competing in the long jump again — she went 16 feet, two

inches (16-2) in the 2015 sectionals — Evans says, "I'm unclear on that right now."

Krier is going to be one busy young lady this spring, running track and playing soccer. Evans said most days he will let her go to soccer practice. "She'll be getting in her distance running there," he said. She is expected to compete in the 1,600 and one other event.

"I think we've got a couple talented distance runners," Evans said, optimistic about the early efforts of sophomore Breanna Rice and Melissa Hutchins. Another distance candidate is Star Below-Kopf. Lepp qualified for state where she cleared four feet, 10 inches (4-10) to finish 16th. "We're trying to get her back up to that" and add a few inches, according to Evans, who said Lepp will also compete in the 200. "Lepp is a pretty good sprinter."

Another returning letter winner is soph Sarah Butschlick, who "will be able to put up some good numbers in the 200" and also earn points in the 300 hurdles and help in the relays.

Evans has the duo of Dinera Beth and Butschlick in the hurdles and says, "We may be getting Lepp back in the 300 hurdles.

Concerning the weights, Leach Wilde-Shank and Allyana Marx should do

well in the shot put, but with the wintery conditions his athletes have faced in the pre-season, Evans said, "The discus is a big question mark right now. If anyone would throw the discus right now, it would bury itself a foot in the ground."

Looking at the three sprint relays (4x100, 4x200 and 4x400), Evans said, "They are going to be constantly rotated with the best runners until we are settled in." He does expect Krier and Lepp to be regulars in the 4x400, and senior Megan Ackatz and Sarah Kosterman are other sprinters who could run the relays. "Beyond that, it's going to be who deserves to be in there ... We have such a young team."

Evans, being new at Kewaskum, is not sure which teams will be the contenders in the top new EC Conference, but after observing the Oshkosh Indoor test, he knows the Berlin Indians will be strong. "They really showed some talent and

depth," he said.

The next meet for Kewaskum will be the EC Relays that will be hosted by Berlin on Tuesday, April 19th.

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

# Extend The Garden Season With Spring Planted Bulbs

Keeping your garden looking its best throughout the growing season and into fall is possible with the help of low maintenance spring planted bulbs. Plant them in spring among other annuals or perennials and watch as these bulbs brighten the garden, adding new life to your late season gardens.

Whether your gardens and containers are in full sun or shade you'll enjoy the attractive foliage and pop of color that dahlias, cannas, calla lilies, caladiums and elephant ears will add to the landscape.

These easy care plants reward you with loads of beauty. Just plant, water and enjoy. Quality online retailers like Longfield Gardens ([longfield-gardens.com](http://longfield-gardens.com)) offer the greatest variety of color, shapes and sizes as well as planting and care instructions.

Grow dahlias in sunny areas with at least six hours of sunlight for the best floral display. Simply plant the tuberous roots four to six inches deep with the stem facing up after the danger of frost has passed.

Use dahlias in a cutting garden or as an attractive screen along fences and property lines. Use the shorter more compact border dahlias, like 'Gallery Pablo' in containers on your patio, balcony or deck where you and the hummingbirds will enjoy their blooms.

Wait until the danger of frost has passed to plant cannas in a full sun to partially shaded locations. Plant the canna rhizomes horizontally two to three inches deep with the growing point facing up. Take advantage of their bold foliage and use cannas as a backdrop in the flower border or screen in the

landscape. Use as a vertical accent in a large container or select dwarf varieties for smaller pots.

Calla lilies are another spring planted bulb that thrives in full sun or part shade. The speckled foliage adds color to the garden all season long. Include these one- to two-foot-tall plants in the front or middle of the flower garden or as a vertical accent or filler in a pot. And don't forget to cut a few flowers to enjoy indoors. The black flowers of 'Night Cap' teamed with the white blooms of 'Crystal Clear' create an elegant display.

Like the other bulbs, wait for the danger of frost to pass before planting them outdoors. Plant the knobby rhizomes two to four inches deep with the growing point facing up.

Add some color and plenty of wow factor to shaded areas with the foliage of caladiums and

elephant ears. These tropical beauties thrive when soil and air temperatures are warm. Wait for the danger of frost to pass and the soil to warm, 65 to 70 degrees, before planting them in the garden.

Use caladiums to brighten containers, dress up window boxes or edge a shady pathway. The colorful leaves stand out amongst the greens of shade gardens. Team variegated varieties with complimentary colored begonias, coleus or impatiens.

Include elephant ears in

the garden or containers. Their large heart shaped leaves give a tropical feel to the patio, deck or pool area. Consider planting one, two or more to create an impressive welcome for guests or a bold statement in the landscape. They pair nicely with caladiums, coleus and other shade loving plants.

Make this the best season yet with the help of spring flowering bulbs. You'll enjoy the variety and late season color these easy care plants provide.
