Kewaskum High School Presents "Sherlock Holmes"

The weather was chilly, but the students gathered on the stage at River Hill Park on Monday, May 9, after school to practice the play "Sherlock Holmes."

"We weren't scheduled to have a rehearsal, but with it being the week of the show, we thought we should have practice," said Lauren Vogt, a senior who is in the show.

So Lauren and some other senior students organized the outdoor rehearsal.

"It's pretty cool. I couldn't be there, so they took the initiative to do it on their own. It is real dedication," said Nick Brettingen, who directs the show.

The students wanted to have the extra rehearsal so that they would be extra prepared to produce the play on Friday, May 13, at 7 p.m.; Saturday, May 14, at 7 p.m.; and Sunday, May 15, at 2 p.m.

The extra rehearsal was

not held because the students weren't prepared. The students had already gone through a full dress rehearsal on Thursday, May 5, complete with full costume, full props and full makeup.

"All our rehearsals have gone better than they ever have actually. We were off book earlier than we ever have been. We were in costume earlier than we have ever been. And we actually started character development earlier than we ever have," Lauren said.

But for the students, especially the seniors, it was important for the show to be successful.

"It's our last show, so it is our last hurrah, so this show is really important to us," said senior Brandon Fischer, who plays the lead role of Sherlock Holmes.

So the students have put everything they could into the show.

Committee Looks At Needs Of Village Parks

– Park And Recreation Committee Members Tour Village Parks

It was cold and windy outside, but the Village of Kewaskum's Park and Recreation Committee toured the village parks on Wednesday, May 4.

Committee members David Spenner and Dave Zehren, along with Village Administrator Matt Heiser, Village Clerk Stephanie Justmann and Department of Public Works Working Foreman Dennis Aupperle, walked around Kiwanis Park, Wildlife Community Park and River Hill Park to evaluate park facilities.

Although no formal decisions were made during the outdoor meeting, the goal of the field trip was to provide the background

for committee members to make informed decisions about park planning.

Kiwanis Park

Peeling paint and rotting wood greeted the Park and Recreation Committee members last Wednesday as they examined the rear side of the bathhouse at Kiwanis Park.

Last year, village workers re-sided the front of the building, and plans are to complete the siding on the back this year, which should resolve those issues. In addition, committee members pointed out a cement block on the bathhouse that will need to be patched.

Dr. Paul J. Sanders Named New Principal At Farmington Elementary

When students arrive at Farmington Elementary School for a new school year in the fall, Dr. Paul J. Sanders will greet them as their new principal.

"I'm really looking forward to coming up and working at Farmington. It is just a beautiful setting out there," Sanders said.

Sanders will replace Tom Fischer, who announced in November that he would resign from the position, effective at the end of this school year.

Sanders is not new to being an elementary school principal. He spent 10 years as principal at Westlawn Elementary School in Cedarburg before retiring last June.

This year, he decided to do some substitute teaching, and recently filled in as a substitute teacher for Kristen Kapler, a counselor at Kewaskum High School. Sanders was drawn to the area, and agreed to work as principal at Farmington 22 hours a week.


Education Background

Sanders began his teaching career teaching in Cedarburg. Since then, he has worked as a school

counselor for Arrowhead School District in Merton and a visiting professor at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee

before returning to Cedarburg to work as a principal.

WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORTS

Parking Violation

On Wednesday, May 4, at approximately 1:28 p.m., deputies assigned to the screening station at the Washington County Justice Center observed a subject, who was later identified as a 19-year-old Town of Erin man, pull a vehicle into the temporary loading zone area in front of the Justice Center. The man then exited the car and entered the Justice Center.

Deputies confronted the man about parking in a temporary loading area and leaving the vehicle unattended. There were ample other parking stalls in the lot, and deputies also carefully scrutinized unattended vehicles that appeared out of place. The man immediately returned to his vehicle and pulled the car into a marked disabled parking space. The deputies

noticed the driver rummaging through the glove box for some period of time before he placed a disabled placard on the rear-view mirror.

After the man entered the Justice Center, the deputy approached the car and noticed the placard appeared to be altered. The year of expiration was clearly altered to read "16." The deputy confirmed through Department of Transportation records that the placard was actually expired since 2003. The placard was not renewed due to the death of the rightful owner of the placard in the year 2000.

After the man returned to the vehicle, the deputies made contact with him again. The driver acknowledged the placard was altered to appear to be valid. The driver stated the placard came with the

car when the family bought it. The deputies subsequently confiscated the placard and it will be destroyed. When the operator was advised of that, he stated, "My father is going to be ticked." The driver was then issued a \$264 citation for illegal use of a handicap placard.

The Wisconsin State Legislature enacted significant civil forfeitures for violating these parking restrictions. The Legislature further urges in State Statue 346.505 that every unit of government authorized to enforce the parking restrictions should do so as vigorously as possible. In this case it is the Sheriff's Office responsibility to ensure that people who are physically disabled have clear and reasonable access to public places.

Washington County Sheriff's Office Offers DARE Program

Last December the Sheriff made the difficult decision to suspend the Sheriff's Office DARE instruction program for schools that normally had it scheduled for the spring 2016 semester. The sheriff recently made contact with the school districts we previously provided DARE instruction for, and advised them the Sheriffs' Office will once again offer DARE to all the schools we had been instructing for in the past. This would be available at the beginning of the fall 2016 semester.

The DARE program was suspended last year due to a staffing shortage in

the deputy position and in the number of DARE instructors in the department. The overall staffing situation has improved, and the sheriff believes he can safely commit the necessary resources to provide a healthy program. The Sheriff's Office has now assigned a full-time deputy to the Community Relations / DARE Coordinator position. Additionally, there has been strong support from the County Board to reinstate the program. These are positive signs that the Sheriff's Office can quickly get back to providing a quality prevention program for our area

5th graders.

The Sheriff's Office has been in contact with each of the principals to confirm whether or not they want to continue with DARE in their schools. The Sheriff is also aware that Elevate has offered and is instructing "Too Good for Drugs" in some schools. The office has no interest in this becoming a contest of programs. The decision is up to school boards and administrations to decide what the right program is for the students. The Sheriff's Office is simply making the DARE program available, and would be pleased to provide it if requested.

He is preceded in death by his parents Arthur and Hazel; sister, Donna and brother-in-law Terrance.





KEYS To Award Record \$112,200 In Scholarships On May 18

The Board of Directors for Kewaskum Youth Scholarships, Inc., has announced that it will award 37 scholarships totaling \$112,200 to the Kewaskum High School Class of 2016.

Much progress has been made since 1986 when KEYS awarded just one \$500 scholarship. The \$112,200 in scholarships to be awarded in the spring of 2016 will bring the total dollar amount to \$1,714,750 awarded to 591 graduates of Kewaskum High School by KEYS since the spring of 1986.

New for this year, the Walter Bade Memorial Scholarship for \$2,000 (\$1,000/year) has been recently established by his family. Walter was part of the greatest generation who served in the US Army in the Pacific Theater and received a purple heart during World War II. A UW-Madison graduate, he coached numerous sports and taught science at Kewaskum High School for 39 years. He dedicated his life to education helping thousands of stu-

dents and athletes. He and his wife, Phyllis, raised five children who all graduated from KHS.

In addition, the KHS Class of 2015 College Scholarship for \$1,200 is being offered for a student with a 3.0 GPA and involvement in KHS activities. This scholarship will be awarded this year and next year.

Also new this year, are increases in the size of the following scholarships: the 10th James and Ella Andre Memorial Nursing Scholarship for \$8,000 increases to \$10,000 (\$2,500/year over four years), the \$2,000 KEYS College or Technical College Scholarship increases to \$4,000 (\$1,000/year over four years), the KEYS College or Technical College Scholarship and the KEYS Technical College Scholarship both increase from \$1,000 to \$2,000 (\$1,000/year over two years).

Sanders completed his undergraduate work in elementary education at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, where he later went for his graduate work to become a school counselor. He started his doctoral work at Marquette, and then transferred back to UW-Milwaukee, where he earned his doctorate degree.

He then did some adjunct work for UW-Milwaukee, Concordia and Carroll College in the counseling field before going to Concordia to earn his educational administration certificate.

Making An Impact

Sanders said his favorite part about being an elementary school principal is making a difference in people's lives.

"I think you can touch the lives of the kids, and the staff, and really, truly make a positive impact in their lives," Sanders said. "The reading, writing and arithmetic are crucial skills, but I think that whole soft side of things, the relationship piece, helping to mold kids into good people, is very important."

Because of that, Sanders led a lot of character education at Westlawn Elementary.

That work led to the school receiving three national awards for its character initiatives. Sanders traveled to

Washington, D.C., numerous times to receive those awards, as well as to receive a National Blue Ribbon School Award for Academic Excellence and a National Green School Award for Environmental Education.

To earn the National Green School Award, Sanders led the school in teaching about environmental issues. Sanders helped make parents and students aware of the need to be good stewards of the physical resources and reducing energy consumption.

"We did a very big project in what is called the Westlawn Woods," Sanders said.

Westlawn Woods consists of about six or seven wooded acres adjacent to Westlawn School. The school worked with area organizations to remove buckthorn trees, form walking paths and create learning centers.

Last Saturday, May 7, the school held a dedication of a little area in Westlawn Woods that is now called Sanders Circle, in honor of Sanders.

Sanders Circle depicts a moral compass, which is a cement compass that is situated in the middle of the circle. Each of the character traits that Sanders helped promote are mounted on big steel plates that form arch-

ways to the north, south, east and west.

The memorial embodies the legacy that Sanders hopes to continue at Farmington.

"To touch the lives of kids, and to really promote the need for the parents to be involved with the school is important. Many of the projects I have been a part of have an awful lot to do with embracing the parents as partners in the kinds of things you are doing at school," Sanders said.

Keeping Active

Sanders lives in Menomonee Falls with his wife of 39 years, Cindy, who works as a nurse for Wisconsin Lutheran College and Milwaukee Brewers Health Services, and his dog Walter, a German Wirehaired Pointer. The couple have two grown children, Ben and Jesse.

Sanders also is a volunteer chaplain for the Billy Graham Association. He recently returned from a weeklong trip for Samaritan's Purse to help flood victims in Louisiana.

In his spare time, Sanders enjoys hunting, fishing and bicycling.

In July, Sanders plans to pedal in the Habitat 500, a 500-mile bike ride, to support Habitat for Humanity.

Continued From... Committee Looks At Needs Of Village Parks

Nathan Scheel, president of the Kewaskum Athletic Association, joined the group as they toured the ball fields at Kiwanis Park. Scheel discussed some of the improvements that area residents would like to make to the park.

About a year ago, some parents of students in the high school baseball program recommended some changes to the hardball diamonds in Kiwanis Park. That generated debate among different users of the baseball diamonds, Heiser said, and the Kewaskum Park Stakeholders' Group was formed.

The Stakeholders' Group consists of members of the Kewaskum Youth Soccer Organization, the Kewaskum A's men's baseball program, the Kewaskum Athletic Association, and the Kewaskum School District, as well as representation from the village

staff. The Stakeholders' Group began meeting last September, and has talked about flipping the hardball diamond to the north side of the creek and renovating Diamond 4, the northwest diamond which the varsity high school baseball team and the men's hard-ball league uses.

The various stakeholders have discussed what kinds of changes to the field would need to happen to meet WIAA regulations. The group has discussed putting up some big fences or walls, lighting the diamond and improving the dugouts. In addition, there has been talk about rotating the field so that the sun is not in players' eyes.

There is agreement that the grading on Field 4 needs to be corrected. The entire diamond is somewhat tilted, and the right field is 12 feet higher than the left field, rather than the 3-foot variance

that is recommended for proper drainage, Scheel said.

In addition to talking about field space, the group has discussed the need for additional parking, as well as ideal locations for restrooms and concession stands.

So far, the various athletic groups that use Kiwanis Park have not come to a consensus on what changes should be made to the park. Before making any final decisions, it makes sense to wait and see what will happen with Kiwanis Pool and whether the school district goes to referendum, Scheel said.

"This park could change completely, depending on what is going to happen with the pool," Scheel said.

The village is currently losing about \$50,000 each year by keeping the Kiwanis Park Pool open. So, the village formed a pool committee to look at what changes should be

made to the park, and in March, that committee started the first steps in March toward running a feasibility study to see what should be built at the park.

One idea is to convert the pool into a splash bed, which would enable additional green space to be added to the park.

"It is probably going to stay the same, but if it is decided to turn it into a splash bed, three-quarters of it could be turned into green space, which would free up space for soccer and baseball. It would save a lot of headaches for you when it comes down to scheduling," Scheel told the village staff.

Another thing that would help create space for the village is if the Kewaskum School District goes to referendum in the fall and creates a new athletic field. The school district is considering installing artificial turf on the football field.

"That would help out the high school because they would be able to use the

high school football fields, for softball practice and soccer," Scheel said.

In addition, the school district's Long Range Planning Committee has discussed the fact that community groups, such as the KYSO, could utilize that space also. That also would alleviate pressure from Kiwanis Park, said Heiser, who serves on the committee.

Historically, there has been a problem of the school district not allowing outside groups to use its facilities, Zehren said.

"I think that has improved a lot since [School Superintendent James] Smasal has been there," Zehren said at the March 28 Park and Recreation Committee meeting. "The new administrator is a little more flexible than the old staff was."

The Stakeholders' Group has not met since December, and currently does not have a meeting scheduled. However the village's Park and Recreation Committee requested at its March 28 meeting to see a rundown of the anticipated costs and who was going to be responsible for covering them, once the group comes to an agreement of what it would like to have done at Kiwanis Park.

Wildlife Park

During a storm last July, a large cottonwood tree in Wildlife Park fell and destroyed the playground equipment there.

The play structure is now gone, and the village received about \$20,000 in insurance funds for the loss.

The playground was not heavily used, so the Park and Recreation Committee is trying to decide the best way to use the insurance funds. At the committee's March meet-

ing, committee members came up with the idea of converting the Wildlife Park into a dog park.

Last week, the Park and Recreation committee looked at the park to see if that idea was viable.

If the 1.3-acre parcel does become a dog park, the committee would like there to be access to the Eisenbahn Trail, something that the county would have to approve, Heiser said.

The committee has not yet made any final decisions on the use of the park.

River Hill Park

At River Hill Park, the village is looking for donations or volunteers to fix the old bandstand located on the east side of the river.

"The band shelter needs a roof and some other renovations. The village does not have funding for that, so we are looking for volunteers for labor and materials," Village Trustee David Spenner said.

If no one steps up to save the shelter, it is destined for demolition.

The bandstand is currently used occasionally for wedding photos, Heiser said. Years ago, the structure was used for the Independence Day celebration and the firemen's picnic, Aupperle said.

In addition to looking at the bandstand, committee members evaluated the condition of the other structures at River Hill Park.

The structure that has the most pressing needs is the large shelter, which is about 40 years old. The shelter's wooden support beams have begun to rot at ground level, so the park committee is looking into the most efficient way of repairing the beams.

Get Up, Get Out Of There; Weishan's Homer Lifts Indians To Third Tourney Win

They have done it again! The girls on the Kewaskum High fast-pitch softball team won their third straight tournament, this one hosted by West Bend West on May 7 where a new hero, Laura Weishan, emerged to help the Indians wipe out a two-run deficit over the host Spartans in the final game.

"We won in dramatic fashion," KHS coach Jeff Gosse said Sunday night, reporting his team was down to its final out with two runners aboard when Weishan, the team's first baseman, cranked a three-run homer to lift KHS to a 9-7 win.

"They (Spartans) are an extremely good hitting team," Gosse said, noting West scored five runs in the first off Bre Trepes, who gave up six hits in a row and seven in the inning, more than she normally gives up in five or six starts total. Three of the hits were home runs, by Krystle Hader, Abigail Kasubaski and Rebecca Dehne.

Gosse brought in Kennedy Lehn to pitch the second through sixth frames, and she gave up two single runs, in the third and the sixth.

When the Indians got their first bats, they cut into the deficit when Trepes drew a walk, and freshman Maddie Geidel hit a home run, the first of her high school career.

KHS got a single run in the third on a Trepes double, a single by Kennedy Lehn and a sacrifice fly by Weishan. In the fifth, after two outs, Lehn homered and Weishan, Maddy Lehmann and Kenzie Lahn all singled for another run.

West scored a single run in the top of the sixth, the final inning because of the time limit, giving the Spartans what looked to be a comfortable 7-5 lead. Kewaskum's comeback kids had other ideas, however, and the rally started

with Emma Debelak doubling off the wall and scoring on Hailey Plachinski's single, making the score 7-6.

Gosse said the next two Indians made outs before Kennedy walked and stole second, putting runners at second and third for Weishan, who had been hitting .270 with just three extra base hits. With one swing, Weishan lifted the Indians to one of their most exciting wins of the season.

"We changed her stance last week. Starting with the Berlin game, she's been hitting the ball hard," Gosse said of Weishan, who picked up four runs batted in (RBIs) in the game.

Kewaskum 12, Cedarburg 1

Four Indians, Brittany Williams, Geidel, Kennedy Lehn and Plachinski, contributed two hits apiece as they rolled over Cedarburg. Geidel had an RBI triple, while Plachinski tripled to lead off the third inning.

"We finished in five innings," Gosse said, reporting Trepes went the distance and "pitched a real nice game," with nine strikeouts and giving up just three hits. The lone Bulldog run came when the Indians went into a "slap defense" for a specific hitter and didn't execute correctly.

"That one's on me," Gosse said, indicating he wanted to give some reserves playing time but forgot to tell the one girl where to cover in a certain situation.

Kewaskum 7, Sussex Hamilton 2

In the Indians' opener against Sussex Hamilton, Kennedy Lehn turned in a 12-strikeout appearance, and her teammates gave her plenty of support toward a 7-2 victory.

The Indians got to the Chargers' Karly Viganì for two runs in the first inning and added four more in

the fourth.

Lehn shut the Chargers out in all but the fourth inning when Morgan Dercola hit a two-run homer to spoil the shutout bid. "She hit one 240 ... 250 or 260 (feet)," Gosse said. "That ball was long gone."

Kewaskum had an even dozen hits, with Kenzie Lehn, Kennedy Lehn and Weishan all stroking a pair of hits. Lehn helped herself with a double. Those with RBIs included Lehn, Trepes, Weishan and Maddy Lehmann.

KHS, currently 14-3, has a game against Kettle Moraine Lutheran this afternoon (May 12) at Kiwanis Park at 4:30 p.m. Then on Saturday, the Indians are scheduled to play in the rugged Waupun Tournament. They will play Grafton at 10 a.m., Laconia at noon and Oakfield at 2 p.m.

Track Teams Record Plenty Of Personal Bests At Deerfield

Rather than compete in the Vander Pan Invitational this spring, the Kewaskum High track teams opted to face some different teams, so they headed southwest on May 6 for the Deerfield Classic.

Omro overwhelmed the boys' field, piling up 139 points, and the Indians, behind two first places and one second, were next with 67 in the 18-team meet. Belleville won the girls' competition with 91 points, with KHS, paced by a trio of seniors, ending up in the seventh spot with 46.4.

"It was a very good night," KHS coach Kris Evens said about the boys' efforts. "We were a little shocked but pleased with second out of 18 teams."

Evens said the boys were in the bus when the final scores were announced. "I got to surprise them on the bus" with the second-place trophy.

Jason Hanson had another excellent outing, winning the high jump by clearing six feet, four inches (6-04), placing fifth in the 800 with a personal best time of two minutes and 2.72 seconds (2:02.72) and anchoring the 4x400 relay along with Derek Brock, Jake Hrica, and Cade Peterson, to an impressive second place with a new season best of 3:34.39.

Junior hurdler Derek Brock continues to drop his times. He skimmed over the 300 hurdles to win the event in 41.49, .01 of a second ahead of Jack Soda of Princeton/Green Lake. In the 110 high, Brock placed third in 16.18. Both times are personal records (PRs).

Tony Leister cleared a PB best 11-6 in the pole

vault for fourth place, and sophomore Riley Donovan tossed the shot a season-long 40-5, which was good for ninth overall.

Sophomore distance runner Justin Reck ran just one event, the 1,600, and turned in a PR of 4:55.16 to finish ninth.

Top-six efforts included: 4x100 relay (Chris Bocher, Evan Devalk, Cameron Dodge, Tony Steger), 46.56; 4x200 relay (Hrica, John May, Kyle Pamperin, Peterson), fourth, 1:35.06; shot put, Ben Watzig, third, 46-05; and discus - Watzig, third, 139-09.

Ellie Debelak, Emily Krier and Krystina Lepp were standouts for the Lady Indians. Debelak had PRs in the 200 and 400 with her times of 27.70 and 1:02.50 good for second and third, respectively. That wasn't all. She placed sixth in the long jump with a leap of 15-0.25.

Krier placed third in the 1,600, cutting off close to one second for a new season-best of 5:31.92, and Lepp placed third in the high jump (4-10), and an eighth in the 300s with a PR of 52.05.

Debelak, Krier, Lepp and Romaela Olla joined forces for a 4:25.98 in the 4x400 relay, which gave them fourth place.

For the second meet in a row, Sarah Kosterman cleared 9-0 in the pole vault, where she tied for second place, while Megan Ackatz contributed a 4-10 (PR) in the high jump for a fifth place.

The freshman Olla turned in a PR 5:46.99 in the 1,600, which was good for eighth, and the foursome of Jill Braatz, Sarah Butschlick, Kosterman and Lepp passed the baton in the 4x200 for a 1:57.90 and a seventh place.

The girls may have only

placed seventh, but "There were still some good performances," Evens said, citing Krier, Lepp and Ackatz.

"We're excited this is a week when we have just one meet," Evens went on, indicating the coaches will use the time to prepare the athletes for the EC Meet. "Conference is right around the corner (May 17 at Ripon)," he said.

KHS Boys Second, Girls Second In Berlin Quad

On May 3, the Indians competed in the Berlin Quad Meet, and the boys finished in second place with 102 points behind the hosts, who amassed 152. On the girls' side, it was Berlin with 142, and Kewaskum next with 107.

The Indian boys had four first places, including Hanson's win in the high jump, with a leap of 6-4 and victories in the 100 by freshman Cameron Dodge (11.88) and in the 200 by Cade Peterson (23.91). The other win came in the 4x400 relay where Brock, Hanson, John May and Peterson combined for a time of 3:41.17.

The best event for the girls was the high jump where Lepp and Megan Ackatz cleared 5-0 and 4-08 respectively for first and second place. Lepp is closing in on her personal best of 5-2.

Another season best time was provided by senior Emily Krier, who won the 1,600 in 5:32.74.

Slowly but surely, Debelak is getting back in form. She won the 200 in 28.29, the 400 in 1:04.08, the long jump with a day's best 15-06 and helped the 4x400 relay to a win in 4:30.04. Others in the event included Courtney Buttslaff, Emily Krier and Lepp.

Since the 2011 season, the Kewaskum High girls' fast-pitch team is 2-10 against powerhouse Waupun, but none of the previous nine losses was as painful as the 4-3 defeat they suffered on May 3 at the Kiwanis Park.

The Indians had the Warriors on the ropes but ended up giving up a run in the top of the eighth inning in another tough defeat.

"It was a heart-breaking loss," KHS coach Jeff Gosse said. "It just seems like they have our number ... or my number."

With the win, Waupun stayed unbeaten at 12-0, 10-0 in the East Central Conference. The Warriors are currently ranked third in the D-2 polls. Kewaskum fell to 6-3 in league play, and all three of those losses came by a single run.

"We had our chances," Gosse went on, but, "We were struggling a little with the bat, and there were a couple errors that hurt us," later noting none of the Warriors' runs were earned.

Sophomore pitcher Megan Van Ruiswyk not only got credit for the win, but she came up hitting a long ball in the eighth — Waupun called it a triple, while Gosse said it was an error on his outfielder — and scored the winning run on an infield single by Alyssa Kreuziger.

KHS got two hits from Brittany Williams and Kennedy Lehn, but the Indians could not get the key hit when they needed it, leaving six runners stranded.

The Indians still might have one more opportunity to beat Waupun this year, if the two face each other in the D-2 tournament. "It could possibly be," Gosse said. Currently Waupun looks to be the top seed in the 13-team Chilton Sectional, and KHS still has a chance at the third or even second spot. For now, Gosse doesn't want his players looking ahead but instead to focus on the Waupun tournament this Saturday and winning the rest of their EC games.

This past weekend, young Braden won the WWF (Wisconsin Wrestling Federation) Greco-Roman and Freestyle titles at the 120 pound weight class. Of Milk and Men: Ashford's Farmers

This is the second half of the article on Ashford's Cheese Factory which ran in last week's paper. The first half covered the farms of Herman Weiland, William Howard and Gregor Beisbier. The story continues below with other farmers who were very loyal to John Babler's cheese factory which ran


Jake Stoffel And Paul Koch
John Babler was very close to Jake Stoffel. Despite the problem of quality that cheese factories took in, some Ashford farmers like Jake figured out the requirements of quality cheesemaking. Jack Babler continued explaining his dad's rela-

tionship with farmers: "Some do, it depends how you're rubbing shoulders with them. Like with Jake Stoffel. Jake was concerned, and my dad explained to him" how a cheese factory didn't want milk that did not smell right when you open the can. "You want a glass of milk of that?" Jack asked as if his dad was asking. "No."

Paul Koch, who left Germany in the late 1920s, eventually married Jake Stoffel's daughter, Mary, and continued to be a loyal customer for Babler's cheese factory. Paul and Mary's son, Joe, owns the farmstead today. Jack Babler described Jake Stoffel as "one of the best" and a man "who had just good common sense." "You know what dad referred to him [Jake] as? 'He's just too decent.'"

So why did the Kochs have good milk? Paul Koch's daughter, Rita Babler, explained the storage at the Koch farm was not a spring house. It was a place that stored milk that was slightly different, albeit it did have water.

There was a windmill there and freshwater was "always pumped into it. It was a great big concrete tank," said Rita. This building for the milk was enclosed too. Then milk cans were occasionally opened and milk was stirred to cool it faster.



This Ashford township map dates from around 1935, but this image published by the W.W. Hixson & Co. of Rockford, IL, cannot be dated with certainty and may extend back to the 1920s. The farmers mentioned in this story are identified: Herman Weiland (Section 28), William Howard and his springs (Section 15/16), Joseph Beisbier Jr. and his springs (Section 29), and Jake Stoffel (Section 16). In addition, Section 20's northern portion in the hamlet of Ashford credits "W.J." (Wenzel Janous, the father of Joe) with 10 acres south of Highway 67.

Joseph Wenzeslaus Beisbier (1877-1972) married Theresa Butschlick (d.1951) at St. Martin's Catholic Church in 1903. Joe and Theresa had six girls and three boys, but two of the boys did not make it to adulthood and were buried in St. Martin's Cemetery with the family. Gregor Joseph Beisbier was the only son to live to adulthood and took over the farm.

Joseph W. was the son Joseph, who "conducted a grocery store" in St. Kilian then farmed in Ashford. Whether the older Joe worked at the grocery store that became Strachota's (today Swede's) is unclear because the 1880 census still had him on the Wayne side of St. Kilian, and at the turn of the century there was an establishment on the Wayne side of St. Kilian (the parking lot for Swede's today).

Joseph W. Beisbier worked the farm in Ashford as John Babler took over the cheese factory by the 1920s. Joseph W. lived in his house until the end, having almost lived a century. Louise Beisbier Bonlander recalls her failing grandpa, whose sister "Emma Serwe [1887-1979] would help mom, and they'd take care of him."

Louise's husband Joe Bonlander said, "Grandpa always [Joe Beisbier] took care of the pee viner for years." He did this many years during the middle of the century. It was always stationed right on the corner of Pleasant Hill Drive and Memorial Drive, just uphill from the Beisbier barn. He was paid by Baker Canning to watch the machine that split peas from the vines. The waste went on a big stack, then farmers got a percentage of the stacked vines or waste according to their acreage. He had to change the boxes when they were filled with peas, then stacked them and kept them covered. As the years went by, "He was limping around quite a bit, but he got that done," said Joe Bonlander who also described Joseph W. Beisbier and his 95 years: "That's good clean living." Sprinkled in between were seasons for "stenglewein," grandpa's term for the potent wine he made from dandelion blossoms.

Paul and Mary Koch in a picture dated August 1973. They were on vacation, probably in Oregon. Paul was a German tradesman who came to America with his blacksmith abilities. He settled in Ashford around 1930, marrying Mary Stoffel, who was the third generation on the Stoffel farm (Nick had Jake, and Jake had Mary). Today the farm is owned by Mary's son Joe and his wife Ella.

Jake and Elizabeth Stoffel in a late 1940s/early 1950s picture likely taken in their house in Campbellsport. By then, Jake left his farmstead to his daughter and son in law, as his worked moved on to Leo Gremminger's butcher shop, which was on the north side of main street, located directly across the Kampeau Theater (what became the village hall/community center). Rita Babler said, "They butchered a couple days a week, and everything was fresh on the counter."

In regard to the cheese factory in Ashford, the butcher shop in Campbellsport had a unique payback. John Babler depended heavily on Jake Stoffel's milk in the 1930s. The friendship bore good meat in the late 1940s. As Jack Babler said, "My dad had his buddy system, and when he wanted the good meat he'd go by Jake" at Gremminger's. "He was more or less full time," recalls granddaughter Rita, who thinks Jake still helped on the farm in the summer months when his son-in-law Paul Koch was busy. "Hey, once a farmer always a farmer," Jack added.

This mid 1930s picture contains a very young Joe and Rita Koch with their father Paul and their mutt Shep, as it was hard to get pure bred dogs back then. In the right of the picture stands Grandpa Jake Stoffel with a white horse looking straight into the camera. The big building in back of Old Paul, and young Rita & Joe was a horse barn no longer standing. The building behind Jake Stoffel is a corncrib and shop-like building where they just stored odds and ends and small machinery.

The horse was called a "schimmel" because the horse was white but not pure. This German slang was similarly verified by Dietrich Otto, who grew up in Germany in the 1930s and 40s. When the term schimmel had to do with horses, it referred to a variation of color usually from the main white. Unrelated to horses, schimmel would mean mold. As slang, Dietrich explained it meant a white horse with flecks. "And mold usually does not form in one area—kind of spotty. And that's how the horse would look that has that kind of a coat. Basically a white coat, but it has those spots on them."

By the time this picture was taken, Paul Koch finally was settled. (For the record, this was when people pronounced Koch like "cawh-k" — the Germanic way — rather than the Americanized "cook"). Paul married Jake Stoffel's daughter, but between leaving his homeland and an Ashford marriage was quite a tale. Paul's history was centered on hard work in Germany, where "pa apprenticed for blacksmith," said son Joe. Paul had to "shoe the horses down in the coal mines... near Dortmund and Dusseldorf. It's all mining there. He said the horses never got up above ground... They died down there. They left them down there..." The apprenticeship made Paul a tradesman. Joe explained his dad's ability: "He could take a piece of iron like that and make a horse [shoe] out of it," as he motioned with his hand as if there was a piece of iron 12 to 18 inches. Having a trade was important in Germany, as it was common for young men to have a skill one could make a life out of.

Joe recalls that there were hard times when Paul left Germany in 1928 because "there was no work out there," and "When they [immigrants] came over to the United States, they had to have a sponsor, so the Schraufnagel's from Leroy sponsored my uncle and Paul (pa). They had to work a whole year to pay off their fair to come over here, and then they could be on their own... So what happened is first Bill came (my uncle) and he had his year up and got pa [Paul] over here, for his year. And then when pa was done there... that was in 1930."

Paul worked in the blacksmith shop at Knowles and shod all the horses at night so others could build the roads in the area the next day. At the time, Paul did not own the blacksmith shop but rather worked there as he was getting accustomed to America. While Paul worked in Knowles, his brother Bill was working by Jaeger's in the town of Ashford, which brought Paul to Ashford. Joe said, "and naturally Bill and Paul always got together, and then he met my mom [Mary Stoffel] and they got married."

Paul's trade skill saved him time and money later in life. Outside and north east of the hamlet of Ashford, Paul Koch didn't need to visit Joe Janous' Blacksmith Shop. "When he started farming that was it," Joe recalled as his dad quit blacksmithing as a career but did his own work for the horses on the farm. "When he bought the farm, he was a good farmer. I learned a lot from him. I learned how to fix things." Paul died in 1979 just shy of 80.

Jack Babler recalled that Paul Koch "fascinated my dad [John Babler] too, because he brought the German thing back to Ashford. My dad liked to relive that... They were the best of buddies."

It is buildings galore on the Gregor and Marcella Beisbier Farm in the late 1940s in an image which reminds us of what mid-20th century dairy farms used to look like.

The smoke house is the white building (partially cut off) on the left side of the picture near the paper clip shaped drive way. Louise Beisbier Bonlender recalled that her dad's driveway was significant, as by the 1950s the milkman could first use the northeast entrance of the driveway and drop off the whey to the pigs. Between the smoke house and the road would have been the spring house, which is hidden by the trees. There was a path from the barn that worked its way to the spring house over the road (Memorial Drive). As he pulled around past the smoke house, the milk hauler worked to the south entrance of the driveway, where the spring was holding the milk cans. The milkman never had to back up, and having completed a half circle he could go right back out on the road.

Continuing to look at the picture in clockwise motion from the smokehouse and hidden spring house, one sees the herd across the road. In terms of cows, Gregor's son Kenny remembered 36 stanchions, and at the time of this photo there were probably 35 cows. Louise affirmed: "Oh yea, Pa always milked in the thirties. That I can remember. Lyla [sister] and I milked by hand when he did thrashing."

The lone silo was in its infancy. Louise recalled, "I never forget when dad came in and he had the bull check in his hand. That bull brought enough money to pay for that silo that time. But I can remember that so vividly. You know, I was one of the older ones [children]." It was the early 1940s, and Louis was about 10. How much Gregor was paid for the bull is unclear, but it certainly exceeded dad's expectations. "I don't know how much that cost, but that bull covered it." In addition, on the west side of the road (the upper portion of the photo) the granary runs parallel to the road.

The house is one of the few structures still standing today. It housed not only Gregor and Marcella Beisbier and family, but also Gregor's dad Joe and mom Theresa (who was a Butschlick).

Behind the house is the woodshed, where the family got wood and chopped it up during the winter during the Great Depression and war years. Kenny Beisbier also added, "That's where we got taken when we misbehaved."

Then the outhouse (white) is along the woodshed. "That was a pretty fancy one. That was the fanciest one in the area. Yea...", said Louise. The comment was not sarcasm. "I'm serious. That had a toilet seat on like a wooden toilet seat that you could put up and down." Although they had hot water heat, hot water and a bathtub, there was no working toilet in the house until the 1960's. Some of this may have had to do with the concerns on the feasibility of plumbing in the spring area so close to the house.

There are a dozen pigs in the picture, but the building they were housed and farrowed is left of (and off) the photo, the slender rectangular building partially cut off on the left bottom corner of the picture is a corn crib. The pigs did have a whey barrel by them, as the milkman would fill it regularly. There was also a heifer barn left off this picture and another corn crib.

A man is barely visible in the south central portion of the picture. It is likely Joe Beisbier, who at the time was "grandpa," and would be next to his machine shed. North of grandpa Joe's machine shed is a darker patch (Marcella's raspberries). It is shaded by the left wing of the airplane holding the photographer. However, that raspberry patch wasn't the only one on the property, as Grandma Theresa had a patch behind the smokehouse.

Continued From...Of Milk and Men: Ashford's Farmers

Water did not need to be emptied from the building, as there was an overflow pipe and water ran down the big steep hill. It wasn't that it was an artesian well, but rather that the wind power worked so well to give plenty of water to cool the milk.

In winter, it was helpful to keep the water running to avoid freezing in that storage area. That being said, on cold days a farmer might see his milk freeze on the way to the factory in the horse and buggy days. Rita recalled about 30 cows on the Stoffel-Koch farm in the 1940s, and yes, she milked the cows too.

Joe Janous

There are the suppliers who were big. Then there were those who were small. For example, Joe Janous's major source of income was the blacksmith shop in Ashford, which ran until the late

1940s.

His son Andy said, "We had three milking cows, and 11 acres of land. That was enough for us and a little bit went over to the cheese factory."

At most, the Janous's may have had a can and a half of milk a day. Two cans at the most. And "Once in a while they weren't even full," Jack Babler said recalling the days of his father's cheese factory.

How did the Janous's deliver their milk? Jack said that the Janous family had a sled, but it was hard to steer. Andy remembers the transportation was only "a miniature sleigh," and its runners were just solid. However, from neighbor to neighbor in Ashford that milk hauler did not have to be flexible to get from the Janous's to the Babler's.

Joe Koch, too, reminisced about the Janous

herd of "three cows." Koch provided some context, as the Janous's not only owned the blacksmith that was on the north side of the road (today Highway 67), but behind the blacksmith's shop was their old log barn.

Indeed, Janous' "didn't own much land on that side" of the blacksmith shop, rather they owned more acreage behind Mrs. Bodden. (Today, this house would be where Flying Eagle Cycle is on the south side of 67. Mrs. Bodden was the mother of Agnes Bodden Janous, Joe Janous's wife.) "So the cows always had to go across the road," Joe said laughing. Cows crossed north on 67, and a bobsled of milk skipped west to Babler's factory.

Could you imagine cows crossing Highway 67 down east from Shirley Urban's grocery store in 2016? That was the norm

in the 1940s.

On A Different Era

There was a lot more than milk, horses or Herman Weiland's Chevy truck that crossed paths on the way to Ashford's Cheese factory.

Ashford was a special place to those who were blessed to grow up there. Compiling this story, it was clear the appreciation by many of their local upbringing.

To this day, Andy can remember two distinct things about John Babler. First, Andy can still see John Babler walking up the hill by then-Raffenstein's woods, around the area where the St. Martin's Hilltop Mass is held today. Secondly, John would come to the Janous's to get water regularly.

In contrast to the stress John endured with the job and his stomach, he was

actually quite hilarious. The cheese maker asked (paraphrased) young Andy: 'Who was the biggest BS'r?' Andy would be expected to reply, "You are!"

"He'd laugh like hell," said Andy. Then "He'd take off with his bucket of water."

Jack Babler said how surprising it was that when it came to the cheese factory, so much was tied locally. Like right next to the cheese factory was Corny Schill's farm, across from the grocery store owned by Brath's in the 1930s (and later on by Thelen's). Then you had the milk-on-a-sled courtesy of the Janous family.

Lizzy Weiland laughed at the convenience of the cheese factory being next to Erickson's tavern. If her dad stopped in Ashford for cheese or to deliver milk, it meant he was going to get a beer too. Or three. "You

went over by John Babler, and the trouble is you went by John Erickson."

In their heyday, the Beisbier farm had those three dozen stanchions full of milking cows. But by the 1960s, Gregor's herd shrunk. One can tell the nostalgia of looking back as Gregor's son Kenny remembered the herd dwindling to what could be counted on one hand: "I remember Pickles and Dane were the last two."

Joe Koch's admiration for his father's blacksmithing ability and his struggle to get to America to be a self-sustaining dairy farmer speaks for itself. Likewise, his sister Rita Babler is so thankful for her rural upbringing on the Stoffel-Koch farm in the center of the town of Ashford.

"I think it's a good life," Babler said. "I'm so glad I grew up on a farm. I really am."





"I think that since it is our last show, we've worked harder than we ever have before. We really have immersed ourselves in our characters. We have cared more than we have ever cared about our show before because it's our last. We want everyone to remember us as being amazing," Brandon said.

Some of the students have been involved in the theater for years. This is the first time drama the students have worked on, though.

"It is definitely different than shows we are used to doing. We did 'The Time Machine' last year, and that was more futuristic, and we have been doing comedies for most of our high school careers. So this is really different, but it is a lot of fun to do something more serious," Lauren said.

"It really stretches people's boundaries of what they are used to, so it's really cool seeing that," said Brandi Harrington, one of the play's co-directors.

The play's story line is the traditional Sherlock Holmes tale, with a modern twist. For example, the characters have cell phones and modern technology and clothing.

The play is about how the detective Sherlock Holmes faces his arch nemesis, Professor Moriarty, as the town suffers from a number of jewelry thefts. The topic of women's rights is woven throughout the story, and mystery, romance, action, danger and laughter are scattered throughout the drama.

"It is really exciting, and definitely very suspenseful, too. There are some different plot twists," Harrington said.

One of the challenges for the cast has been learning to speak with an English accent.

Brandon learned how to speak with an English accent last year while working on "The Time Machine."

"I kind of pulled out my inner Fiby from last year," said Brandon, referring to

the character he played last year.

Many of the actors worked on their accents by watching British people on TV. Lauren, for example, focused on watching Sherlock and Harry Potter. Mostly, though, they got tips from working with each other.

"We all help each other a lot because we all really love each other. We are all a big theater family," said Brandon, who has been involved with the theater since fourth grade.

The directors have seen improvements in the actors since the first rehearsal in March.

"The quiet kids have definitely opened up. I know a lot of the kids here did not really talk to the other students that were in theater beforehand, and now they all get along great. Their character development is amazing," Harrington said.

This show is the first time Harrington has done any directing in years.

"It's been really exciting. I really like helping to choose the cast and learning how the director has to be prepared for everything," Harrington said.

The biggest challenge has been designing the set and figuring out how the action would flow between scenes, she said.

"Otherwise, they are such a great cast, it makes it really very easy," Harrington said.

Harrington, who graduated from Kewaskum High School in 2014, was happy to return to the school's theater program.

"I absolutely love coming back here and helping everybody, and seeing all

the actors with their amazing talent," Harrington said.

Harrington can also relate to the feeling that the seniors have about their last show at the

school.

"It's going to be very sad; there will be so many tears. It's going to be very hard," Brandon said.

"We are all a little sad

that is going to be our last show," Lauren agreed. "We are going out with a bang this year. The show is going to be really good."







Kettle Moraine Great Area To Visit

The Kettle Moraine area is a great place to visit. It boasts some of the best physical features in the state and some of the most friendly neighboring villages.

Known as the Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit, this area can thank the glaciers for the unique characteristics. The northern unit of the forest is only a portion of what is sometimes called the Kettle Range.

This range was created when the Green Bay Lobe of the glacier on the west, collided with the Lake Michigan Lobe of the glacier on the east, depositing sediment. The western glacier formed the Bay of Green Bay, Lake Winnebago and the Horicon Marsh while the eastern one formed Lake Michigan.

This area contains very hilly terrain and glacial landforms, such as kettles, kames and eskers. The forest is divided into two large and three small units, which are spread across a hundred miles.

The Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern

Unit consists of an area covering the western part of Sheboygan County, the southeastern part of Fond du Lac County and the northern portion of Washington County. It includes more than 29,000 acres. The forest itself was established in 1936 to help preserve this unique area and its features.

The forest is managed for multiple uses, including recreation management, sustainable forest products, water quality and soil protection, terrestrial and aquatic wildlife, native biological diversity, and aesthetics.

The forest headquarters is located near Campbellsport. Features of the Northern Unit are the Greenbush Recreation Area, with a group camping area and hiking trails; Parnell Observation Tower; the Long Lake Recreation Area, with a campground, a beach and boat launch; Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center; and the Mauthe Lake Recreation Area, with a campground, a beach and boat launch.

About 145 miles of trails can be found in the northern unit. These

trails are used for biking, hiking, horseback riding, cross country skiing and snowmobiling. (See color map on page 2 for the different trails in the forest)

Other facilities in the area include 336 family campsites with modern facilities, nine group campsites, six backpack shelters, a horse riders campground, three swimming beaches, five boat launches and an observation tower.

It is estimated that approximately 800,000 people visit the forest every year. Annual camper nights equal about 91,599.

You will definitely be able to find something fun to do in the Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit. There is something for everyone.

The forest is open from 6 a.m.-11 p.m. daily. The forest headquarters is located on Highway G and is open

8 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Monday-Friday.

The Mauthe Lake recreation area entrance station is open from 10 a.m.-7 p.m. Saturdays-Thursdays and 10 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. on Fridays from Memorial Day through Labor Day. These hours will vary during the off-season. Call (262) 626-4305 for more information.

The Long Lake Recreation area entrance station is open from 10 a.m.-7 p.m. Saturdays-Thursdays and 10 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. on Fridays from Memorial Day through Labor Day. The hours vary during the off-season. Call (920) 533-8612 for more information.

The Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center is open seven days-a-week April through October from 8:30 a.m.-4 p.m. Mondays-Fridays and 9:30 a.m.-5 p.m. weekends. Winter hours go into effect November through March. The

center is one-half mile west of Dundee on State Highway 67 and offers forest information, interpretative displays, and a 20-minute Ice Age film.

Area Villages

Don't forget to visit the area villages and towns that surround the Kettle Moraine Forest. They are all welcoming and helpful.

Campbellsport is on the west side of the forest. You can get to Campbellsport by taking Highway 67.

Kewaskum is on the southwestern side of the forest. You can get to Kewaskum by taking Highway 45 or Highway 28.

Dundee is within the forest on the western side. It is located along Highway 67. The Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center is just outside of Dundee on Highway 67.

New Prospect is a small town located within the forest. You

can get there by traveling along Highway SS. The horseriders camp is located in New Prospect.

Greenbush is near the northern portion of the forest. You can get to Greenbush by taking County Highway A.

Glenbeulah is also on the northern corner of the forest. It can be found by taking County Highway A or County Highway P.

Plymouth is a short drive to the east of the forest. You can take Highway 67 to get to Plymouth.

Cascade is also a short drive to the east of the forest. You can get to Cascade by taking Highway 28.

Fond du Lac is a short drive to the northwest. You can get to Fond du Lac by taking Highway 45 north.

West Bend is a short drive south of the forest. You can get to West Bend by taking Highway 45 south.

SoLu Estates Winery Opens

A new winery in the Kettle Moraine State Forest is a must-see stop when you are visiting the Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit. The SoLu Estates Winery has opened on the grounds of The Highlands Sportsmens Club near Cascade.

"We started planting grapes in 2004," said TJ Sommer, owner and proprietor of The Highlands. "Because we are a cold climate, we had to plant French hybrids. We knew we'd be a winery one day, but we didn't know when. We started building in 2014."

In the 12 years since they planted the first grape vines, SoLu has increased to 11 different varieties of grapes. These grapes now produce six different types of red wine and six types of white wine.

"Our flagship is going to be mead, which are honey based," Sommer said. "We believe that our grapes, especially red, are better in a mead rather than stand-alone. It's a different taste than you are used to."

Frederick Niffenegger is the wine maker. Wine making is a family

legacy for Niffenegger.

"It's something I've been doing for a long time," he said. "My mother brought it from Germany when she immigrated. It's something I love."

He had lived in California for a while, but moved back to Wisconsin to raise his children. He and his wife purchased a cattle ranch in the Sheboygan area with the idea of converting it into a winery. His plans changed after meeting Sommers.

"I was contacted by the vineyard association," Niffenegger said. "I originally came in as a consultant. We found it was a good fit."

Niffenegger and Sommers realized that they made a good team, so Niffenegger decided to stay on full-time as the wine maker. About one year ago, March 2015, Niffenegger started and has been crafting wine for SoLu Estate ever since.

The honey they use for their mead base all comes from The Highlands. "The honey is grown on this property," Sommers said. "All the main products for our wines are coming off our property."

Ice Age Center Great Resource

The Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center is a great resource for anyone visiting the Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit. It is located just outside of Dundee on Highway 67.

Its purpose is to introduce and orient visitors to the forest about the area and the special features of the area. The glaciers that covered this area about 10,000 years ago left some unique terrain and features in this area.

The Kettle Moraine was created when the Green Bay Lobe of the glacier, on the west, collided with the Lake Michigan Lobe of the glacier, on the east, depositing sediment. The western glacier formed the Bay of Green Bay, Lake Winnebago and the Horicon Marsh while the eastern one formed Lake Michigan.

As the glaciers melted and moved, they left behind many different features like moraines, kames, eskers, drum-

lins, and kettles. The Ice Age Visitor Center explains these features, how they were formed and gives examples of these features in the area.

"You can get a good idea of how the glaciers affected this area and the treasures it left," said Jackie Scharfenberg, DNR naturalist at the Ice Age Center. "A lot of groups come here as a jumping off point."

After visiting the center, you can then go out into the forest to see these different formations. Many trails can be found in the forest to get you to these features. A short trail is also accessible from the Ice Age Visitor Center.

Another feature of the center is the information you can receive about the forest activities. The center has maps of all the trails in the forest, campgrounds, information about Mauthe and Long Lakes and the campgrounds in the forest.

"We can provide information about the forest and its multitude of

things to do," Scharfenberg said.

The Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center was opened in January of 1981 and dedicated in May of 1981. It was named after a Wisconsin congressman. The Zillmer Trail was also named after a Wisconsin congressman.

"They got some of the initial money passed (for the center and trails)," Scharfenberg said.

The center is open year-round. From April through October, it is open Monday-Friday from 8:30 a.m.-4 p.m. and on weekends from 9:30 a.m.-5 p.m. During the months from November through March, the hours will vary, so please call ahead at (920) 533-8322. About 25,000-30,000 people stop at the Ice Age Visitor Center every year.

Every week educational programs are held at the center. These programs teach young and old about the forest wildlife, vegetation and other fun nature-related things. Programs are generally free to the

Local Parks

Kettle Moraine State Forest- Northern Unit

This 29,000-acre forest is a glacial panorama of rolling, wooded hills dotted with serene lakes. Year-round camping, nature programs and recreation for all seasons. Ice Age Visitor Center open daily (920) 533-8322. Forest Headquarters, N1765 City Hwy G, Campbellsport, (262)626-2116.

Campbellsport Firemen's Park

In 1939, the Campbellsport Fire Department purchased the first parcel of land that would become Campbellsport's first park.

The grounds include a baseball diamond, a nice playground for the children, a concession stand, shelter area and picnic area. Newly remodeled bathrooms can also be found in the park.

Every year, the park is home to the village's Fourth of July picnic. Festivities include music, games, food, waterfights and many other fun filled activities for all

ages. The money raised during this event maintain the park and the fire and ambulance services in the area.

Campbellsport Columbus Parc

This newer edition to Campbellsport was developed in 1991. The park was built on the site that used to house the Columbus School. This helped make up part of the name. The letters in the word parc stand for pleasure, activities, recreation and community.

Thus Columbus Parc was named. A concession stand and shelter area was built in 1993. The Parc has three baseball diamonds, volleyball courts, basketball courts, and a children's area. Whispering Trails winds along the Milwaukee River and gives you some wonderful scenery to look at while you get some exercise.

Dundee Sportsmen's Club Park

The Dundee Sportsmen's Club was formed in April of 1973. It con-

sists of the club house, pavilion, bathrooms, brat stand, baseball diamond, volleyball court, playground equipment, and a mud pit for the annual hog wrestling.

The brat stand may be used by area clubs for fundraisers. The club house and pavilion can be rented for weddings and family activities. The club house can accommodate up to 200 people.

Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park

Kiwanis Park is a thirty-four acre public park located at 1599 Brooklane Drive, Kewaskum.

monds, tennis courts and party shelter.

West Bend Regner Park

Regner Community Park is a mecca for outdoor recreation. The natural landscape is interwoven with activity. Playgrounds, nature trails, open play area, swimming, tennis, soccer, softball, and base-

ball serve the many recreational interests within the community.

The Carl M. Kuss Memorial baseball field, grandstand, and concession facility is home to adult leagues and tournaments. Spectators are given the opportunity to spend an evening in the park, while enjoying the all-American game.

In summer, the beach, pond, and bathhouse bustle with activity. In winter, the area is transformed into a winter wonderland with ice-skating, hockey, and warming house.

Among woodlands, ponds, open grasslands, and scenic Silver Creek are the camp lodge,

Centennial shelter, and pavilion, concessions, bandstand area, as well as numerous picnic groves. As rental facilities they cater to special events, family gatherings, and other group activities. Park entrances are located on North Main Street and Park Avenue.

Activities include, swimming, baseball diamond, two softball diamonds, three lighted tennis courts, five horseshoe courts, one soccer field, two play structures, fishing pond, nature trails, ice skating, six picnic groves and half basketball court. Located at 800 N Main St., West Bend.

Lakes Of The Kettle Moraine

The Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit has more than a dozen lakes and ponds — mostly kettles, but also two impoundments of the Milwaukee River.

The Mauthe Lake and Long Lake recreation area entrance stations, when open, lend fishing equipment free of charge. Several private vendors within the forest sell bait and other fishing supplies.

The eight lakes listed below range in size from 427 acres (Long Lake) to less than seven acres, accounting for a total of 786 acres.

The primary fish species in these lakes include largemouth bass, bluegill, crappies, and northern pike.

Auburn Lake (Lake Fifteen) — A medium-sized kettle lake, Auburn Lake provides a diverse fishery. A paved boat launch and trailer parking area are across from the Forest Headquarters entrance road. Access to launch is a narrow gravel road not suitable for large boat trailers. A local wake ordinance, posted at the landing, is in effect. State park vehicle admission sticker required.

Expect to catch bluegills-most small, some larger; crappies-present, but generally not quality size; northern Pike-often found near outlet stream mouth and on north end across

from boat landing; and yellow bass-fish are stunted, but abundant.

Butler Lake — Butler Lake is the smallest of the easily-accessible Kettle Moraine Lakes. It is a kettle lake with an emergent wetland fringe around most of the lake. The Ice Age Trail meanders through the Butler Lake area and there is a loop hiking trail system near the lake. Butler Lake is spring-fed and the water remains fairly cold and oxygenated.

There is a paved parking lot and gravel launch area for canoes or small rowboats. Gas motors are not allowed. A water pump is available near the parking lot. State park vehicle admission sticker required.

Expect to catch bluegills-small, but abundant; and yellow perch-small, but abundant.

Crooked Lake — This medium-sized kettle lake has relatively clear water and a diverse aquatic plant community. Gravel access road and parking area are off of County Highway SS. Launch, suitable for canoes and small boats, is shallow and weedy.

Expect to catch bluegills-some nice size, many smaller; yellow perch-numerous small perch; crappies-population fluctuates widely with very good fishing

some years; northern pike-fair population, but not abundant; and largemouth bass-a small population of nice-sized fish. Catch and release is recommended.

Forest Lake — Forest Lake is a small kettle lake with a mostly-developed shoreline. A marked and fairly steep walk-in public access is off of County Highway GGG. The lake is only suitable for canoes, small rowboats or paddleboats. No motors are allowed.

Game fish, such as northern pike, walleyes, and bass, are catch and release only.

Expect to catch bluegills-good numbers of smaller bluegills; sunfish-good numbers of smaller sunfish; crappies-some, smaller; northern pike-larger, catch and release only; walleye-some, catch and release only; and largemouth bass-good population, catch and release only.

Kettle Moraine Lake (Round Lake) — The second-largest lake in the Kettle Moraine area, Kettle Moraine Lake has relatively clear water. Many parts of the lake are weedy and shallow. There is no state forest access, but the public can launch at Nan Sea's Tiki Bar and Grill on the east side. Obey the local wake ordinance posted at landing.

Expect to catch bluegills-although not large fish, bluegills are abundant; yellow perch-some present, generally small; crappies, not abundant, but average size; northern pike-large population for a lake this size, commonly found in the 17-inch to 21-inch size range, no minimum size limit; largemouth bass-common, and of quality size; and bullheads-bullhead fishing is the highlight of Kettle Moraine Lake in summer.

Lake Seven — This small, mostly undeveloped kettle lake has clear water and a diverse aquatic plant community. It is historically known as a tremendous bluegill lake.

No gas motors allowed. Fairly shallow gravel boat launch for canoes and small rowboats.

Expect to catch bluegills-predation has decreased the population, but fish up to 12 inches reported; crap-

pies-a few present; and largemouth bass-very abundant, but small average size.

Long Lake — Long Lake is a three-mile long impoundment of the East Branch of the Milwaukee River. The lake has relatively clear water and is stocked by DNR and the Long Lake Fishing Club. Heavy recreational use in the summer may make fishing difficult.

An accessible fishing pier and shoreline fishing opportunities are in the Long Lake Recreation Area.

It has a developed boat launch and parking for more than 20 vehicles and trailers. The boat launch fills on summer weekends. Obey the local wake ordinance posted at landing. State park vehicle admission sticker required.

Expect to catch bluegills-six- to seven-inches common in summer, best fishing along mid-depth weedlines and in deeper water on

vegetated mid-depth flats; crappies-seldom active at mid-day, best time to fish is an hour after dark; walleyes-not common, those present are larger; northern pike-a good population with larger pike found near vegetated drops, no minimum size limit; largemouth bass-common in summer, the lake has a very good population with a nice size structure of fish available, anglers are encouraged to catch and release bass; and bullheads-one of the most popular summer fish to catch, especially near boat launch area.

Mauthe Lake — Mauthe Lake is a 78-acre impoundment of the East Branch of the Milwaukee River and is entirely within the state forest boundaries. Motors allowed; electric trolling motors are allowed.

Expect to catch bluegills-many smaller fish, some larger; crappies-occasionally the highlight of the fishery; largemouth bass-Mauthe Lake is a very good

bass lake; northern pike-although not a large lake, some pike in the 30-inch range are caught every season; and walleyes-occasionally caught.

Mauthe Lake and Long Lake Recreation Areas have fishing piers that are accessible to people who are mobility-impaired.

Free fishing equipment is available for loan at Mauthe Lake and Long Lake recreation area entrance stations (when open). A fishing li-

cence is required for anyone 16 years or older.

Boating

Public access is provided on these lakes by either a developed boat landing or walk-in access. Boats are available for rent from a private concessionaire under agreement with the state forest. Several private vendors within the forest sell fishing licenses, bait, and other fishing supplies.

Lake Seven, Mauthe, Forest and Butler Lakes

prohibit the use of gas-powered motors.

Other boating restrictions may apply. Check at landings for posted information regarding wake/no wake rules and whether or not a state park vehicle admission sticker is required.

All watercraft must be equipped with a wearable Coast Guard approved personal flotation device for each person on board. Consult the Wisconsin fishing and boating regulations before going fishing.

or for boat regulations and registration forms, visit one of the forest offices.

Swimming

The state forest has three swimming beaches, one at Mauthe Lake and two at Long Lake. Swimming areas are designated by marker buoys. Life-guards are **not** provided.

Pets, soaps, food and beverages are prohibited in marked swim areas.

Mauthe Lake and Long

Lake Recreation Areas are open from 6 a.m. to 11 p.m. year round. Picnic tables, grills and toilets are available near the beaches. A carry-in, carry-out policy applies at these day-use areas.

Mauthe Lake's beach area and Long Lake's south beach include playground equipment suitable for young children and a reservable picnic shelter.

Water quality is tested regularly from Memorial Day to Labor Day and any advisories will be posted at the beaches.

Friends Of The Kettle Moraine

The Friends of the Kettle Moraine is a non-profit organization dedicated to promoting a greater appreciation and enhancement of the Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit.

The group was created in the mid 1980s to inform and educate the public. The general goal was to develop a greater appreciation and environmental awareness of Wisconsin natural resources. Specific goals were to enlist public involvement in the activities and future direction of the Forest and to provide financial assistance directly to the Kettle Moraine State Forest – Northern Unit for new programs and activities.

The first meeting of the Friends group, held in July 1984 at the Ice Age Center, was hosted by William Moorman of the DNR Bureau of Parks and Recreation. Local press releases re-

sulted in a large turnout of local citizens who were very receptive. The group elected Gus Christ, Byron Gessner, Jerry Ninnemann, William Stoffel, Irene O’Laughlin, Jerry Schanen, and John Zillmer as board members.

The Northern Unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest is located 45 minutes north of Milwaukee. The group’s mission is to aid in the understanding of the human and natural history of the forest, so that visitors can enjoy and appreciate the heritage of the Kettle Moraine area.

The Friends of the Kettle Moraine has more than 100 individual members and around 10 business members. They are always welcoming new memberships.

The group holds three or four meetings a year and a large year-end informational meeting that

includes a meal. Representatives from the DNR are also in attendance at the year-end meeting. The group, along with the DNR, discuss any upcoming projects for the next year.

The Friends have volunteers called trail watchers, who also walk the many trails and relate any concerns or trouble spots back to the DNR. These trail watchers are a valuable resource for the DNR.

Visitors can explore 30,000 acres of rolling hills, lakes, forests, grasslands, and parks. There are many trails open all year round for your enjoyment. A great place to start your outdoor adventure is at the Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center. You may purchase a state park sticker and park merchandise from the center’s gift shop. Your purchase helps support the Friends of the Kettle

Moraine Forest. The forest hosts approximately one million visitors a year.

The Friends of the Kettle Moraine inform people about the Northern Unit by volunteering at the Ice Age Visitor Center. They help publicize the unique recreational and educational opportunities available within the forest.


They assist with recruiting volunteers for special events and give input for the future direction of the forest. The group raises funds to provide financial assistance for educational programs, invasive species control, and special projects.

Some of the projects the Friends group has completed include the heated shelter at the Zillmer Trails, playground equipment at Mauthe Lake, wood sale sheds at both Mauthe and Long Lakes, prairie plantings near Long Lake, and the butterfly garden at the Ice Age Visitor Center. The next big undertaking for the group will be raising the funds for new exhibits at the Ice Age Visitor Cen-

ter. The Friends of the Kettle Moraine provide a variety of events in the Northern Unit. Many of these events are held at the Ice Age Center. They sponsor a yearly Candlelight Ski in January and Earth Week Litter cleanup in April. They also provide a Halloween Hike in November at Long Lake. This is an educational hike for young children.

The Friends are continuing with many improvements in and around the Ice Age Center. They also have a Land Fund set up. This fund will help with the purchase of more private land in the Kettle Moraine Forest when the land becomes available.

Visit The Kettle Moraine Northern Unit

The Kettle Moraine State Forest – Northern Unit owes its unique landscape to glaciers of the Wisconsin Stage of the last Ice Age, which ended approximately 10,000 years ago.

Geological History

Some 20,000 years ago, two lobes of a great ice sheet met along a line extending northeast from Richmond in Walworth County through the Oconomowoc Lake country to Kewaunee County. One lobe moved down what is now the Green Bay-Lake Winnebago area. Spreading under tremendous pressure, the two lobes met and in the encounter, large blocks of ice were broken off and buried in the glacial deposit or till. As the ice melted, “kettles” were formed, some only a few yards across, others 100 to 200 feet deep.

The ice moved under great pressure, changing shape rather than sliding across the face of the land. As it changed shape, large amounts of rock, gravel, sand and silt were picked up and carried along by the gla-

cier. When the ice melted, this material was deposited, in some instances, across glacier-formed valleys. Some “kettles” were formed this way.

The Kettle Moraine is an area of varied topography – parallel, steep-sided ridges, conical hills and flat outwash plains, mostly composed of sand and gravel. Many of the conical hills are conspicuous. Holy Hill reaches an elevation of 1,361 feet above sea level and some 340 feet above the stream valley to the east. Sugar Loaf or Pulford Peak (elevation 1,320 feet) is 320 feet above Pike Lake. Lapham Peak (elevation 1,233 feet), where there is a picnic area and observation tower, is 343 feet above Nagawicka Lake.

Similar detached sand and gravel conical hills, called kames, characterize the moraine throughout much of its extent. Some of these kames are cones formed beneath the glacier by surface streams which fell through holes in the ice. The undulating level-topped, narrow ridges called eskers were prob-

ably deposits in open cracks (crevasses) in the ice. In some areas the outwash terraces are pitted due to the melting of buried ice masses.

The Kettle Moraine area rises to 300 or more feet above the lands to the east and west yet is not a continuous divide. Maximum thickness of the drift is not known because few wells reach bedrock. It is possible that the drift reaches a thickness of 500 feet in some places.

Limestone underlies much of the Kettle Moraine. This formation is 450 to 800 feet thick and dips gently eastward. Its western edge or escarpment extends from Washington Island to the Illinois line near Walworth. It lies 20 miles to the west of Kettle Moraine at Greenbush, is completely covered by the moraine in the Waukesha County area, and is eight miles east of the moraine at Elkhorn. Because of the cover of drift, there are few outcrops in the moraine.

Lakes, of several origins, add greatly to the attractiveness of the Kettle Moraine. With the

exception, of Pewaukee Lake, which lies in a preglacial valley blocked on the west and east by drift, all lakes in the Oconomowoc area occupy kettles. Long Lake, Big Cedar Lake and Elkhart Lake occupy preglacial valleys between morainic ridges. These valleys were probably occupied by ice blocks and escaped being filled by glacial drift.

State Forest History

After the period of glaciation, most of the highland surface became forested with fine hardwood timber and the swampy or low areas with softwoods.

Before the 17th century, small bands of roving Indians inhabited the area. With exploration and development of the area during the 18th and 19th centuries by the white settlers, a great change took place.

Fifty percent or more of the land in the northern Kettle Moraine was cleared and turned into farms. Sixty to 70 percent of the land in the southern Kettle Moraine was farmed. A substantial proportion of the

cleared land was sub-marginal.

Over the years plantings of conifers, such as white and red pine and spruce, have been made in all units of the forest. The pine and spruce will convert to northern hardwood species of maples, cherry, ash and basswood.

With the increase in Wisconsin’s population, particularly in the southeastern 16 counties, the need for a large acreage devoted to public outdoor recreation and forestry became evident as early as 1920.

In the 1920s, there were horrific floods in the city of Milwaukee and the city’s population was rapidly growing. A group of foresighted people thought that if they could protect the headwaters of the Milwaukee River, this would help reduce the flooding in Milwaukee. They also wanted to provide a large tract of public land for Milwaukee’s growing population.

After almost a decade, legislation along with funding became available for the creation of the Kettle Moraine State


Forest. In 1936, the Conservation Congress (predecessor to the Department of Natural Resources) acquired 850 acres around Moon Lake (now Mauthe Lake) from the Milwaukee Chapter of the Izaak Walton League. This marked the start of the Northern Unit. Today, the Northern Unit encompasses nearly 30,000 acres within its 36,000 project boundary.

In the 1950s a lawyer from Milwaukee, Ray Zillmer, began a campaign to bring his dream of a National Park protecting the glacial features of Wisconsin to life. With the help of his friends, Congressman Henry S. Reuss and Senator Gaylord Nelson, his dream came to fruition with the creation of the Ice Age National Scientific Reserve and the Ice Age National Scenic Trail. On a sad note, Ray Zillmer died before he could see the creation of the reserve and the Ice Age Trail.

A 1964 Act of Congress established the Ice Age National Scientific Reserve to "assure protection, preservation, and interpretation of the nationally significant values of Wisconsin continental glaciation... and other reminders of the ice age." The reserve consists of nine units scattered throughout the state and the northern 20,000 of the Northern Unit is one of those reserves. Each reserve site protects a unique glacial feature. The Northern Unit contains some of the finest features of continental glaciation in the state and the world including the interlobate moraine, kame fields, eskers, dry and wet kettles and crevasse fills.

In 1980 the Ice Age Trail was designated as a National Scenic Trail and later as a State Scenic Trail. The trail follows the southern extent of the last glaciers in the state of Wisconsin and is the only National Scenic Trail that is found entirely in only one state. Today about sixty percent of the 1000 mile trail is now complete. The nucleus of the Ice Age National Scenic

Trail was the 30-mile "Glacial Trail" that ran through the Northern Unit from north to south.

The Northern Unit's glacial features set the ground work for wide diversity of biological communities and the geographical position of the forest adds to this diversity. The Northern Unit is situated along the "tension zone" which runs in a diagonal path from near Eau Claire to northern Milwaukee. The tension zone marks where the northern forest meets the southern and eastern forest, and the prairies and oak savannahs of the south and west.

A person traveling through the area will encounter such natural communities as northern red oak forests, eastern hardwoods with beech trees, cedar swamps, flood plain forests, kettle wetlands, remnant prairies and northern bogs. The Northern Unit also supports one of the largest intact forests in southeast Wisconsin. This wide array of communities leads to rich diversity of plant and animal life including many threatened and

endangered species and species of special concern. Twelve areas within the forest have been set aside as State Natural Areas protecting ten biological communities that were not or slightly disturbed by European settlement and two outstanding geological landmarks.

Today, it takes a team of managers and forest staff to manage all the resources found in the Northern Unit from forestry to fisheries, wildlife, endangered resources and water resources. But, the number one management goal is providing outdoor recreational opportunities with minimal conflicts for the nearly 900,000 annual visitors to the forest. People come to the Northern Unit to participate in a plethora of outdoor pursuits including hiking, hunting, camping, picnicking, swimming, horseback riding, snowmobiling, snowshoeing, cross-country skiing, fishing (year-round), canoeing, boating, geocaching, backpacking, wildlife observing, off-road biking, dog training, spirit renewing, and learning.

Backpack Shelters

Five backpack shelters are available year-round for rustic camping along the 31 miles of the Ice Age National Scenic Trail. One backpack shelter is available from April 1 through November at the Zillmer Trail area.

Each site offers a roofed trail shelter, fire ring, and pit toilet. Drinking water is available less than a mile from each site.

These sites are not accessible by vehicle. All camping equipment must be backpacked in and all refuse packed out. A camping permit is required and you must camp at a designated shelter campsite.

One reservation (camping party) is allowed per site per night. Reservations are limited to 10 persons per site and are limited to one night per site. Another site may be reserved for a second night and a third night at a third site.

To reserve a backpack site, call Reserve America at (888) 947-2757, TTY (800) 274-7275. Shelters cannot be reserved online.

If you do not have a reservation, you must stop in at either the Forest Headquarters, Ice Age Visitor Center or Mauthe/Long Lake entrance stations (when open) to obtain a camping permit. Site availability is limited for spring and fall weekends and reservations are recommended. A reservation is required for stays longer than two nights along the trail.

If all the backpack sites are reserved for a weekend night on your hiking trip, consider

staying one night at the Mauthe Lake campground.

New Prospect Horse Riders Campground

The New Prospect Horse Riders Campground has 22 family campsites with 20/30/50 amp electric service and three group sites. Campers must be accompanied by a horse to stay at the campground.

In the family camping area, each site has a picnic table, fire ring and a 30-by-30-foot graveled area with picket posts and/or pipe corrals where horses are to be kept. The camp area has one drinking water source, an open air picnic shelter, vault toilet, covered stable with 24 box stalls and manure pits.

In the group camp area, each site has a drinking water source, fire ring, four picnic tables and a manure pit. Group sites A and C each have nine, 10-by-10-foot metal pipe corrals. Group Site B has two tether post areas and 12 pipe corrals. The group camp has a vault toilet. No more than 20 people may occupy a group site.

The campground opens the first weekend in May and closes the last weekend in October.

For The Horseriders

The Northern Kettle Moraine Horse Trail Association (NKMHTA) was established in 2003 to provide area equestrians an opportunity to make an impact working with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources preserving, improving, and developing equestrian facilities in the Northern Kettle Moraine State Forest.

The Northern Kettle Moraine State Forest is dedicated to serving horseback riders and is known throughout Wisconsin as one of the most beautiful natural areas.

Trails are designated for horseback riders but you may see some hikers. Vehicle passes are required and trail passes are required for all riders 16 years and older. Trails get muddy and slick when wet. Riders are urged to wait four to six hours after rain to ride.

In the family camping area, each site has a picnic table, fire ring and a 30-by-30-foot graveled area with picket posts and/or pipe corrals where horses are to be kept. The campground is centrally located in the state forest and provides easy access to the 33-mile bridge trail which traverses the length of the forest. There also are two loop trails, the 2.5-mile Crooked Lake Loop and the four-mile Forest Lake Loop. All horse riders 16 years and older must have a state trail pass while using the designated bridge trails in the state forest.

The campground opens the first weekend in May and closes the last weekend in October.

Bridle Trails

Equestrians can enjoy 41 miles of bridle trail which are traditionally open late April through mid November depending on trail conditions. The main bridle trail

winds the linear length of the forest for 33 miles. Two loop trails, Crooked and Forest Lake, provide shorter routes totaling more than seven miles.

Trails are rolling with a few steep hills, some

rocky places, well-maintained and generally kept clear of debris.

Volunteers from the Northern Kettle Moraine Horse Trail Association, in cooperation with the state forest, partner working on projects and

special events to enhance the horseback riding experience in the state forest.

Dundee Mill And Park

An interesting site to see while visiting the Kettle Moraine State Forests-Northern Unit is the Dundee Mill & Park. It is located in Dundee, near Highway 67 just down the road from the Ice Age Visitor Center.

The Dundee Mill & Park is owned by the Town of Osceola. Restoration of the old mill began in 1990 when a group of volunteers had the goal of restoring an old mill. Their aim was to preserve a part of Wisconsin's heritage for future generations so they may learn about a time when life was without modern technology.

In 1996 the mill was declared a Town Historical Site and the Partners of the Dundee Mill and Park, Inc. was created by the town as non-profit, non-stock, tax exempt, corporation to maintain, restore, and preserve Dundee Mill and Park.

A group of volunteers have the goal of restoring an old mill, which had been declared a Town Historical Site. Their aim is to preserve a part of Wisconsin's heritage for future generations so they may learn about a time when life was without modern

technology.

They have restored the turbine that was in the mill and by using the water in Long Lake (a renewable source) they produce electricity and pump it into the lines for Alliant Energy. This is a clean method of producing electricity as well as a great lesson for groups who tour the Mill.

The inside of the Mill is somewhat of a museum. Old artifacts hang from the beams and adorn the walls. An old "pot belly stove" provides warmth for the building. Those involved with the mill are also able to demonstrate the actual operation of the grain mill.

To date they have done many improvements to the building, including a new roof, gutters, siding, and windows. They have rebuilt the stone wall in the lower level of the Mill and the walls of the tail-race have also been restored. A water wheel and trough have been added.

The park provides two fishing ponds for children and handicap to enjoy the outdoors as well as practice their fishing skills. Fishing seminars are conducted

yearly at no charge. The Partners sponsor an Easter egg hunt every Spring and have a Christmas Love Light tree and ceremony every December.


An exciting time for the Partners of the Dundee Mill was in 2006 when the television show Extreme Makeover: Home Edition was in town to make over a home. The television show also took on the Dundee Mill as one of its projects. The family who received the makeover is very involved with the mill, so the television show also wanted to feature the mill.

The restored turbine was installed during taping of the show. They also helped ad display cases and other items to the inside of the mill.

Many events are held throughout the summer months at the Mill. The main event of the summer will held on Saturday, June 25. This is Mill Market Day.

Mill tours run from 9 a.m.-4 p.m., other activities include a huge bake sale, craft and rummage sales, food and beverages. Live music will entertain everyone from 1 p.m.-4 p.m.



Special Interest Areas In The Kettle Moraine

The Kettle Moraine State Forest has a lot to offer in its almost 30,000 acres. Approximately 800,000 people visit the forest each year.

The forest can thank the glaciers for its unique characteristics. This gives the forest some interesting areas that visitors should try to see while visiting the Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit.

Some of these areas include:

Greenbush Kettle — On Kettle Moraine Drive, one mile north of State Highway 67. This is an outstanding example of a glacial kettle hole. A scenic overlook, viewing deck and interpretive display is just a short walk from the parking lot.

Haskell Noyes Memorial Woods — On County Highway GGG just south of Highway SS. A historical marker greets visitors to this 67-acre State Natural Area. This area is designated as a Wisconsin Wildlife Viewing Area and is included in the national "Watchable Wildlife" program.

Haskell Noyes Memorial Woods is a classic example of southern dry-mesic forest dominated by sugar maple and red oak, with smaller amounts of basswood, white ash, bitternut hickory, and ironwood. The land was purchased in 1947 to prevent imminent logging. Haskell Noyes Memorial Woods is owned by the DNR and was designated a State Natural Area in 1952.

Vista Trail Overlook — At the Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center. A short climb up some stairs and you arrive at a viewing platform overlooking a beautiful vista from which you can see drumlins, eskers and ground moraines.

The Visitor Center offers forest information, interpretive displays, and a 20-minute film explaining how the glaciers shaped most of Wisconsin's landscape. You can buy nature books, clothing, admission stickers, and trail passes there. Public programs are scheduled throughout the year and group programs on request.

Jersey Flats Prairie — On County Highway SS, a quarter-mile west of the village of New Prospect. This restored prairie is a glacial outwash plain. This area is designated as a Wisconsin Wildlife Viewing Area and is included in the national "Watchable Wildlife" program.

Little Mud Lake — On County Highway SS, one-half mile east of County Highway GGG. This site is a State Habitat Preservation Area and is vital for the long-term survival of the red-spotted, blue-spotted, spotted, and tiger salamanders that thrive here. A picnic table and grill are provided at the small parking lot.

Dundee Kame (White Kame) — On County Highway F, a quarter-mile east of Dundee. This conical moulain kame lies within a 468-acre State Natural Area. The kame is known throughout the world by geology students and is often pictured in geology textbooks because of its near perfect form.

Kame Field — Near the intersection of Highway V and Deer Road looking north. The mile-wide view of this spectacular kame field is breathtaking. Visitors can view and experience the rock and rubble and gravel "insides" of a kame up close.

Spruce Lake Bog State Natural Area — North of Dundee on Airport Road, one-half mile west of Vista Drive. This area is designated as a Wisconsin Wildlife Viewing Area and is included in the national "Watchable Wildlife" program. Visitors must stay on the boardwalk trail due to the fragile nature of the bog plants, the presence of poison sumac, and the unstable bog surface.

Spruce Lake Bog features an undisturbed shallow seepage bog lake situated in one of the many kettle holes characteristic of the interlobate glacial deposits scattered throughout the area. The 35-acre lake has moderately hard water with a pH of 7.5 and supports a dense, floating-leaved aquatic flora of water shield and water lilies.

Milwaukee River Tamarack Lowlands — From the intersection of U.S. Highways 45 and State Highway 28 East in Kewaskum, go east on 28 1.9 miles, then south on Oak Drive Road 1.2 miles. The site lies about 0.1 mile west of the road. The Milwaukee River

Floodplain Forest features a bottomland hardwood forest with small upland islands located along the East Branch of the Milwaukee River. The site also contains dry-mesic forest and shrub-carr.

The well-structured floodplain forest is dominated by large silver maple and green ash with other lowland trees including hackberry, black ash, and burr oak. Just east of the river are small upland islands with sugar maple and beech. Several spring runs are also present.

Butler Lake and Flynn's Spring — East of Long Lake on Butler Lake Road, a seven-acre lake surrounded by sedge meadow. Butler Lake and Flynn's Spring features a seven-acre shallow hard-bottom lake surrounded by sedge meadow. Previously, the site contained a tamarack hardwood swamp but a few years of high water levels has killed off most of the trees. Nearby Flynn's Spring is a small, spring brook flowing into the south end of Butler Lake.

Adjacent to the lake is Parnell Esker, a geologic feature known worldwide and used extensively for education. The esker is five to 35 feet in height and runs northeast southwest for about four miles. Of particular interest at this site is the presence of two rare species — the unicorn clubtail dragonfly

(*Arigomphus villosipes*), and the swamp spreadwing (*Lestes vigilax*).

Milwaukee River and Swamp — This area is along the Milwaukee River north of Mauthe Lake and includes a large spring that feeds the river.

Milwaukee River and Swamp features an unusual combination of southern and northern wet-mesic forests situated along 0.75 mile of a slow, meandering warm water stream with accompanying shrubs zones and communities including lowland hardwood forest, conifer swamp, and a small bog lake.

The river bottom is mucky with sand and gravel and there are good populations of northern pike, black crappie, wall-eye, and several smaller forage species. Aquatic plants include water-lilies, water-milfoil, coon's-tail, waterweed, giant duckweed, water nymph, and several pondweeds.

One large spring, 1,000 feet long, feeds the river in the north portion of the site. Bordering the river is a dense shrub zone that changes abruptly to a yellow birch, white birch, American elm, black ash, and basswood lowland forest. East of the small lowland forest is a more dense conifer swamp of mainly white cedar but also tamarack and black spruce.

A small bog lake occurs in the eastern portion of the natural area.



Special Interest Areas In The Kettle Moraine

Spring Lake — Southwest of New Prospect west of County Highway G, this clear, shallow lake has many fish. Various warblers nest in the area.

Spring Lake is a clear, alkaline lake surrounded by fen and northern wet forest with an unusual flora and fauna. Aquatic vegetation is sparse and consists of yellow water-lily, bladderworts, pondweeds, and chara. The shoreline is an undercut bog shelf under which fish find refuge. Northern pike, large mouth bass, perch, bullhead, and green sunfish are found in spite of a maximum water depth of 1.5 feet.

Crooked Lake Wetlands — East of New Prospect on the north side of County Highway SS, this area includes three lakes and various kinds of woods and wetlands. It is home to many kinds of birds.

Crooked Lake Wetlands is a diverse complex of communities including northern wet forest, southern dry-mesic forest, southern sedge meadow, shrub-carr, open bog, and two shallow seepage lakes. The 65-acre Crooked Lake is one of the larger natural lakes in the county and has a maximum depth of 34 feet. The inlet provides a spawning ground for northern pike while the outlet forms a small trib-

utary of the East Branch of the Milwaukee River.

Kettle Hole Woods — Northeast of New Fane on County Highway S, then north on Forest View Road, this area has woods, shrubs, wildflowers, birds, and frogs.

Located in southeastern Wisconsin's glacial kettle topography is Kettle Hole Woods, an isolated hill forested with southern mesic and dry-mesic hardwoods. Ephemeral ponds are scattered throughout the site.

The mature forest features an excellent canopy of very large trees, primarily red oak and sugar maple with associated beech, basswood, white ash, white oak, and bitternut hickory. Most saplings are sugar maple and beech suggesting that the red oaks will eventually be replaced by other more mesophytic species.

Kewaskum Maple-Oak Woods — Southeast of Kewaskum via State Highway 28 and South Mill Road, two parcels with interesting wild plants and birds.

Kewaskum Maple-Oak Woods consists of two parcels separated by old field and pine plantation that contain southern dry-mesic and mesic forest dominated by sugar maple, red oak, white ash, and basswood with some

beech. Located just east of the Milwaukee River, the southern tract is hilly with southern, eastern, and western exposures and contains a very rich herb layer.

The northern tract is flatter and generally lower, containing very large red oak, white oak, sugar maple, and black cherry. Both parcels have kettle depressions that hold water seasonally.

Kettle Moraine Red Oaks — The Ice Age Trail goes through this area southeast of Greenbush. It has more than 100 kinds of trees, shrubs, and other plants.

Kettle Moraine Red Oaks is a mature second-growth southern dry-mesic forest which originated in 1889. Composed of red oak, basswood, sugar maple and white ash, it is one of the richest oak forests in the region and contains over 100 species of trees, shrubs, and herbs.

Other canopy species present include big-tooth aspen, white oak, black cherry, and shagbark hickory while the subcanopy is composed of ironwood, sugar maple, basswood, and ash saplings. The forest is situated on the high interlobate moraine and contains several outstanding dry kettle

holes, which provide some diversity in exposure.

Johnson Hill Kame — South of Highways 67 and U near Woodside and Shamrock roads, a cone-shaped hill formed by water pouring down through a hole in a melting glacier.

Johnson Hill Kame is a "moulin" kame, a conical hill of sand and gravel formed near the edge of the wasting glacial ice sheet by subglacial meltwater streams that poured downward through cylindrical holes in the glacier. The swirling motion of the debris-laden water reminded early French moun-

taineers of a moulin (mill in French).

Hundreds of spectacular glacial features can be found within the Kettle Moraine and the Northern Unit contains one of the best displays of moulin kames in the country. Surrounding the kame is both southern and northern dry-mesic forest. The southern slope is composed of red oak, big-tooth aspen, beech, ironwood, sugar maple, butternut hickory, basswood, white oak, and eastern hop-hornbeam.

The cooler north slope consists of basswood and sugar maple with beech, red oak, and eastern hop-hornbeam.





Trails In The Kettle Moraine

a One of the great things about the Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit is the many trails that are available within the forest. You can walk, bike, picnic, ride horses and have a lot of fun on these trails.

The Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit has more than 132 miles of trails, varying in difficulty, length, and permitted uses. Steep climbs or descents are common. Parking lots are provided throughout the forest. All-terrain vehicles (ATVs) are not allowed at any time.

To see a full forest map with all of the trails highlighted, turn to page 2.

Butler Lake Loop: On Butler Lake Road, 1.5 miles east of the Long Lake Recreation Area, the Butler Lake Trail winds more than three miles through the 158-acre Butler Lake and Flynn's Spring State Natural Area.

A portion of the loop trail is shared with the Ice Age Trail. Interpretive displays are set at the base of the esker and overlook Butler

Lake. A picnic table, grill and drinking water are at the trail head.

Greenbush Loop System: On Kettle Moraine Drive, 2.5 miles north of State Highway 67, the Greenbush Trail is a combination of four loop trails totaling nine miles. Hiking is not allowed on the mountain bike trails which are also located in this area for safety reasons.

In winter, the trails are groomed for cross-country skiing. Hiking is prohibited when snow is present. A heated picnic shelter, picnic tables, grill, drinking water and vault toilets are near the trailhead.

New Fane Loop System: On County Line Road, 1.5 miles east of Kettle Moraine Drive, the New Fane Trail is a series four loops of moderately-challenging mountain bike trails totaling 5.5 miles, interwoven with four loops of hiking trails totaling 7.7 miles. A short connector trail allows access to the Ice Age Trail.

Hiking is not allowed on the bike trails, and

biking is not allowed on the hiking trails. An open-air reservable shelter is located near the trail head, and drinking water and vault toilets are available year-round. Cross-country skiing arrives with snow. Hiking is prohibited when snow is present.

Parnell Tower Loop: On County Highway U, one-quarter mile west of County Highway A, the Parnell Tower Trail begins its 3.5-mile loop with a series of steps leading to the highest point of elevation in the forest. There a 60-foot observation tower rises above the treetops for a birds-eye view of the glacial landscape.

The trail follows the Ice Age Trail near a rustic backpack shelter. Picnic tables, grills, drinking water and vault toilets are adjacent to the trailhead.

Tamarack Loop: This trail is near the Forest Headquarters off of Highway County G, this two mile trail loops around Mauthe Lake. Pets are not allowed on this trail. Flush toilets are

available year-round on the headquarter's side.


Zillmer Loop System: On County Highway SS, one-quarter mile west of County Highway G, the Zillmer Trail Area consists of four loop trails for a total of 11 miles. The south trail head has picnic tables, grills and drinking water.

Visitors can also access the trail from the Ice Age Visitor Center. A rustic backpack shelter is along the trail.

In winter it is a groomed cross-country ski trail. Hiking is prohibited when snow is present. Closed to hunting with firearms, except during deer gun and spring turkey seasons.

Lake to Lake Bike Trail: This 6.5-mile limestone surfaced trail connects the Mauthe and Long Lake recreation areas and passes by the village of Dundee.

This gentle trail winds through hardwood forests, prairies, conifer plantations, and lowland swamps. The trail includes a boardwalk over low areas east of Dundee Mountain.

Trails In The Kettle Moraine

Off-Road Bike Trails:

Off-road biking is only permitted on the Greenbush (nine miles) and New Fane (5.5 miles) loop trails. Normally these trails are opened in late April through November, depending on trail conditions.

It is highly recommended that you not ride while it is raining or within four to six hours after rain has stopped.

A trail pass is required for riders 16 years of age and older. See the current conditions page on the DNR website and/or call ahead to check trail conditions and to make sure trails are open.

Bridle Trails: Equestrians enjoy 41 miles of bridle trail which are traditionally open late April through mid November depending on trail conditions. The main bridle trail winds the linear length of the forest of 33 miles. Two loop trails, Crooked and Forest Lake, provide shorter routes totaling seven miles.

A trail pass is required for riders 16 and older. See the current conditions page on the DNR website and/or call ahead to check trail conditions and to make sure

trails are open.

Ice Age Trail: About 31 miles of the Ice Age National Scenic Trail travels the length of the forest. The moderate to difficult course follows sinuous eskers and tumbled moraines descending into bogs and deep kettles.

The Ice Age Trail is a National Scenic Trail located entirely within Wisconsin. The trail is also one of 42 designated Wisconsin State Trails, and the only one specifically designated as a "State Scenic Trail." From Interstate State Park on the Minnesota border to Potawatomi State Park on Lake Michigan, the Ice Age Trail winds for more than 1,000 miles, following the edge of the last continental glacier in Wisconsin.

One of only eight National Scenic Trails, the Ice Age Trail is intended to be a premier hiking trail and conservation resource for silent sport and outdoor enthusiasts. The trail traverses some of Wisconsin's most scenic landscapes and helps tell the story of the last Ice Age by highlighting Wisconsin's unique

glacial features.

The Ice Age Trail travels through 30 counties on state, federal, county and private lands, connecting dozens of communities. There are hundreds of trailheads and access points located along the trail route. More than 600 miles of trail are open. The completed sections of the trail are connected by less-traveled roadways and other temporary routes.

Moraine Nature Trail:

This 0.75 mile, easy nature-trail loop begins at the Ice Age Visitor Center. A self-guided booklet links to the numbered posts along the trail and identifies the common trees of the Kettle Moraine. Picnic tables are available at the trail head. Pets are not allowed on this trail.

Summit Trail:

Accessed from the Long Lake Campgrounds (upper 900s loop), the Summit trail is a one-mile nature trail loop which scales Dundee Mountain. Glacial geology interpretive signs mark this challenging trail to the top of the highest kame in the forest, with

panoramic views of the Campbellsport drumlins and other ice age topography. Pets are not allowed on this trail.

Eisenbahn Trail: The Eisenbahn Trail, which opened in 2006, runs from West Bend, in

Washington County, to the Fond du Lac County line in Eden. The trail is on an old railroad track. It is paved through West Bend and unpaved the rest of the way.

The trail has kiosks placed along the way. These serve as markers

for information on the area. Trail users can also rest on benches placed by various service organizations.

*Pets allowed on designated trails and must be on a leash (no longer than eight feet long).



Management Of Emerald Ash Borer

The Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) has killed tens of millions of ash trees throughout the Midwest and eastern United States since 2002 when it was first discovered in the Detroit, MI, area. In 2008, the critter was discovered in Newburg, a small community in southeastern Wisconsin, northeast of West Bend. Since then, the beetle has been found in an increasing number of areas, including the Mauthe and Long Lake Recreational Areas.

The beetle does not move far on its own. An adult EAB will fly less than one mile in its life cycle during warm days from late May into late June looking for a female. People cause the greatest threat of movement of this critter by transporting infested nursery stock, firewood, and logs into uninfested areas.

Approximately eight

percent of trees in Wisconsin are ash; however, in the state forest the ash component is approximately 40 percent. At the Mauthe and Long Lake Campgrounds, ash is the dominant species, reaching nearly 70 percent in some areas of Long Lake.

Once the critter infests an ash tree, dieback usually begins starting at the top of the tree. Most of the canopy will be dead within two to three years. If these trees are located in public use areas, such as campgrounds and picnic areas, they create a hazard if they are not removed.

Note — if you are bringing firewood to a state property, it must be all of the following: 1) from within Wisconsin; 2) from within 10 miles of the state property and 3) from outside of a quarantined area, unless the property is also within a quarantine.

While the borer has been identified in numerous locations, the

plan is to still try to slow the spread by not moving firewood. The main reason is that the workload and cost to remove the sheer number of ash is large.

Many municipalities have realized that it's not if, but when they'll have to deal with the burden of removal. If detection of the borer occurs far sooner than they anticipate, it creates a bigger burden because the timeline in which removal needs to occur is accelerated.

Since we know we've got the beetle on property, it has created enormous budget and workload consequences along with social impacts. Our management is to remove any ash that is located in a designated use area. These areas are picnic areas, campgrounds and trails, to name just three. If the tree were to fall and hit someone, cross a trail, or damage property, we've marked it for removal.

We're doing this now, rather than wait until the

tree is dead and risk injury or property damage. To offset the loss of ash, we've recently planted some new trees at both Mauthe Lake and Long Lake. Last year, we planted 100, including

three-year-old hard maples, red and white oak, and a variety of scrubs. We focused on the pet picnic area at Mauthe Lake where nearly every tree was an ash.

We held an event ask-

ing for help from volunteers to help plant these trees. Call the forest headquarters or view our web page for future tree planting events as they will be an annual event.



Area's History Comes Alive At Local Museum In Kewaskum

A little piece of local history sits right next to the scenic Milwaukee River on Parkview Drive in Kewaskum, just waiting to be seen.

Actually, it's closer to a gazillion pieces, not many are aware of the breadth of the collection the Kewaskum Historical Society has built up.

The society's museum has the only milk can washer in the state and an authentic log house next door that takes you back to life in the 1840s.

The museum features a blacksmith shop, carpenter shop and an old printing press. A second floor houses a miniature farm, a cheese factory, a doll house based on a house in Beechwood, trains and steam engines, a school room from an old country school, a parlor, doctor's/dentist's office and a general store.

"It's a lot of everything," Dan Schmidt, founder of the Historical Society and vice president.

"I think it's something we need to save. Otherwise our children and grandchildren aren't going to know how things were," he said. "If you want to know where you're going in the future, you have to know where you went in the past," stated Schmidt.

Schmidt said items come from society members, people in the surrounding area and from across the country. Someone in California

may have grandparents who pass away who had ties to Kewaskum, and will send photos or other remnants of past generations.

Sometimes, modern technology and the kindness of local businesses pitch in. The milk can washing machine came from the Beechwood Cheese Factory after it was ordered to stop using cans and go to bulk. The factory sold the washer for scrap and then found out the Historical Society was interested. The Heise family promptly bought it back from the scrap dealer and donated it.

The museum opened in 1976, year of the country's bicentennial, and quickly received a unique honor. The society became affiliated with the Wisconsin Historical Society and received a certificate of commendations the same year the museum opened. Normally, affiliation for three years is the standard before commendations are given.

The log house opened in 1982, the culmination of a three-year project. It was donated by the Reysen family, which planned on tearing it down before building a new home on the family farm. Marshal Reysen and his son, Randy, are active society members and have both served as president.

The society hosts a couple of events to take people back to a simpler

time. In late May, Pioneer Days invites 175+ area fourth-graders to experience life as their great grandparents lived it. They play a game of old baseball called field ball, shell corn, braid jump rope, make hand-dipped candles over an open fire outside and make corn bread over an open fire in a Dutch oven.

The society's signature event marks the closing of the museum and log cabin for winter. Each year on the Sunday after Labor Day, Early Farm Days packs in 60-80 exhibitors showing off old equipment and machinery along the Milwaukee River. Antique steam engines, gas engines, cars, trucks, threshers, sawed lumber and processed grain can be taken in firsthand. In addition, the event includes refreshments and horse-drawn wagon rides and a small farm animals to pet.

Early farm was originally held in conjunction with the formation of the society before the museum was opened.

While you are visiting the Kettle Moraine Forest, take a drive to Kewaskum to check out the museum. Before you leave, also stop at the Coffee Corner to check out the historical society's display. They have pictures and recollections hung up on the wall through the beginning of July.

They ferment the honey to get the mead base. "We do it very slowly," Niffenegger said. "Then we have to figure out where we are going to go with this mead. We have the finest mead making facility in the state."

Then, Niffenegger adds the grapes or other ingredients that they will use in each type of wine. The winery officially opened on April 9th. Since then, Sommers and Niffenegger have been getting great reviews for their wine.

"People are saying it is magical," Niffenegger said. "People are responding to it."

As the new winery gets established, they plan to add a lot to it. A patio area overlooking the vineyard and pond is under construction and should be completed

soon. On the patio, they will have seating, a small bar area to purchase glasses of wine and a stage.

"We'll have bands every Saturday and Sunday," Sommers said. "Wine tastings are always available. This is going to be a very big venue in the summer. Our intention is to not only be a destination, but a place for special events."

They are hoping people will start using The Highlands and SoLu Estate Winery as a place for weddings, corporate functions, parties, fundraisers and much more.

The Highlands Sportsmen's Club has been an established private club for many years. Much of their appeal has been by hunters for private hunts on the land. They also

offer dog training.

In the fall and winter months, The Highlands will still be utilized as a private hunt club.

"We can do everything from fly-fishing to clays to the vineyard," Sommers said.

SoLu Estate Winery is a way for The Highlands to open up to the public and share their beautiful area with people during the summer months.

It is easy to find as it is on the corner of Highways F and A, outside of Cascade and Dundee. The Highlands is along one of the Scenic Trail roads in the Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit.
