## Service Remembers Fallen Law Enforcement Officers

Clarissa Justmann met Trevor Casper when he jump started her car.

The two became fast friends. They were both state troopers and they lived in the same apartment complex. And they found plenty of things to tease each other about.

There were times that they seemed to know instinctively where the

other one was. Take, for example, the night that Justmann was on duty and was attempting to pull over a motorcycle. She and two other squad cars followed the motorcycle with their sirens blaring.

During the incident, Justmann received a text message from Casper.

"Hey, I'm trying to sleep with my window open. If that's you making all that noise could you please

stop. Thanks," Casper texted.

Justmann still laughs thinking about it, because she had been the one responsible for the noise.

On March 24, 2015, Casper called Justmann at 2:45 p.m. His car battery was dead, and he was supposed to begin his first solo shift at 3 p.m.

Justmann helped 21-year-old Casper get his car started, but gave him

some ribbing about the dead battery, just like the time he had given her a hard time when her car needed to be jump started.

Then the two drove off their separate ways to patrol the roads.

It was Justmann's one-year anniversary of working on the road as a state trooper.

## Vietnam War Veterans From Kewaskum Among Those Honored On Memorial Day

On Monday, May 30, Memorial Day will be observed in Kewaskum.

Four of the people who will be remembered are Kewaskum men who died during the Vietnam War.

Two of those men, E. James Fickler and James Manthei, are listed on the Vietnam War Memorial Wall. The other two, Clifford Bales and Charles Dreher, died while serving

during the Vietnam War era, but they were not killed in Vietnam.

An insert in today's paper tells the story of how Andrew Johnson, publisher of the Kewaskum Statesman, led a project to obtain photographs of Wisconsin veterans whose names are on the Vietnam Memorial.

Below are the stories of the four Kewaskum men who sacrificed their lives during the Vietnam War.

### Edwin James Fickler

On Jan. 17, 1969, Edwin James Fickler, a 25-year-old captain in the U.S. Marine Corps, disappeared during a nighttime air mission over A Shau Valley in South Vietnam.

The last radio contact with Fickler's aircraft was made at 9:25 p.m. An investigation suggested that the plane carrying Fickler and 1st Lt. Robert J. Kuhlman may have been shot down by enemy gunfire. However, there were no reports of anti-aircraft artillery fire in the valley at the time of the incident.

The service will include a Missing Man Ceremony, a formal program honoring veterans who are missing in action.



## WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORT

### Minor Personal Injury Accident

On Saturday, May 21, the Sheriff's Office investigated a minor injury accident on County H near Apple Court in the Town of Kewaskum. Both vehicles were east bound on County H to the west of Apple Court just prior to the rear-end collision.

One vehicle, operated by a 55-year-old Village of Kewaskum man, was slowing to make a signaled left hand turn into a private driveway when the second vehicle rear-ended him.

The driver of the second vehicle, a 45-year-old Adell woman, advised she was looking at something adjacent to the roadway and did not see the other vehicle begin to slow down. There was also a 13-year-old female passenger in the second vehicle.

All three individuals received minor injuries and declined transport by Kewaskum Rescue. Both vehicles sustained severe damage. The Adell woman was cited for Inattentive Driving.

### Stolen Vehicle

On Friday, May 20, at 6:43 a.m., the Sheriff's Office responded to a residence in the 500 block of Weis Street in Allenton for a report of a motor vehicle theft.

The victim, a 23-year-old Allenton man, reported his blue 2005 Chev Colbalt taken from his driveway after 8:45 p.m. on Thursday, May 19. The vehicle was later located in Winnebago County on its roof. The Sheriff's Office continues to investigate the incident and it appears to be related to another stolen vehicle that was taken in Oshkosh and abandoned on Interstate 41 near Highway 33 prior to the Allenton theft.

### Threats at Jail

On Friday, May 20, a local municipality arrested a woman for domestic violence. The other person involved, a 31-year-old City of Hartford man, made it well known to the investigating police department that he was not going to bail the

woman out of jail. Shortly after the woman's arrest, the Hartford man contacted the jail by phone and advised jail staff that if anyone came to bail her out of the jail, he would kill them. He further stated he would come to the jail with a firearm to kill the person.

As the jail staff person was speaking to the patrol supervisor about the incident, the Hartford man showed up at the jail lobby. Deputies immediately confronted the subject and confirmed he did not have any firearms on his person or in his vehicle. As a result of the telephone threats, the man was taken into custody for disorderly conduct and brought into the jail.

### Increased Patrols On Interstates 41 And 45

The Washington County Sheriff's Office will increase patrols on interstates 41 and 45 during peak travel times beginning this week and lasting through the summer travel season. The increased patrols will focus on aggressive driving and vehicle driving complaints.

The main detour route for Interstate 41/45 is State Highway 175, which is currently under construction and closed at the south end of Washington County. The patrol deputies will also focus on quickly mitigating traffic crashes on Interstate 41/45 to avoid secondary crashes/ back-ups, especially in the south end of Washington County.

In the past, the Sheriff's Office has given 48 hours to owners of disabled vehicles to remove their vehicles. In an effort to eliminate potential hazards, patrol deputies will be immediately removing any vehicles that become disabled on Interstate 41/45 from County Highway Q to State Highway 60, while State Highway 175 is under construction.

### Injury Accident On Interstate 41

On Sunday, May 22, at 2:40 a.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a single vehicle roll-over style accident located on Interstate

41 southbound approximately a half mile north of County Highway K in the Town of Addison. Sheriff's dispatch also was advised that a male subject was currently lying in the roadway. Deputies and personnel from the Allenton and St. Lawrence Fire Departments were subsequently dispatched to the scene.

Upon arrival of deputies, an un-responsive 23-year-old Allenton man was located lying in the southbound lanes of traffic. He was believed to be the sole operator of the vehicle. Flight for Life was requested to the scene. After being treated by on-scene emergency medical personnel, the man was subsequently flown to the Froedtert Hospital in Milwaukee with unknown injuries.

Interstate 41 was closed in both directions for approximately an hour, and remained closed for southbound traffic for an additional 20 minutes to facilitate the tow and roadway clean up.

A preliminary investigation into the cause of the accident revealed that the man had been driving northbound on Highway 41 when he entered the median, and then entered the south bound lanes of travel, rolling his vehicle onto the roadway. Alcohol is believed to be a contributing factor to the cause of the accident.

### Structure Fire

On May 19 at 5:39 a.m., the Sheriff's Office received a report of a possible garage fire at 7226 Highway 144 (NR Asphalt and Pavement Maintenance) in the town of Barton. The caller was a passerby who reported black smoke coming from the garage.

Approximately three minutes later, a second call was received by a resident who reported a hot kettle machine for hot tar was inside the garage. The West Bend Fire Department was paged and quickly upgraded the fire to a MABAS call. Fire Departments from Allenton, Kewaskum, Kohlsville, Jackson and Newburg were paged, but

were cancelled prior to their arrival.

Two deputies arrived on scene at 5:45 a.m. and observed black smoke coming out of all sides of the garage, but no flames were observed. Deputies on scene closed the roadway to traffic.

West Bend Fire Department entered the garage and vented the structure to remove the smoke. A pickup truck with the attached hot kettle machine was removed from the garage. Further inspection revealed a fire in the attic of the garage which was dealt with by the Fire Department personnel.

It appears there was some mechanical or electrical failure with the hot kettle machine which started a fire on the machine. There was approximately \$25,000 worth of damage to the garage due to the attic fire and approximately \$15,000 worth of damage to the hot kettle machine. The garage was not occupied at the time of the fire and there were no reported injuries to personnel on scene.

### Drug Arrest

On Monday, May 16, a 56-year-old City of West Bend man was charged by the Washington County District Attorney's Office for manufacturing marijuana, maintaining a drug trafficking place, possession of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia. The suspect had been arrested on the night of Friday, May 13, as a search warrant was executed at his residence on Barton Avenue in the City of West Bend.

The search warrant was obtained by the Washington County Multi-Jurisdictional Drug Enforcement Group (Drug Unit). The search warrant was served by the West Bend Police Special Response Team. The Drug Unit was assisted at the scene by Sheriff's Office detectives.

A total of 220 marijuana plants was seized by the drug unit. The plants were in various stages of development from just started to mature. A large quantity of ballasts, lighting equipment, timers and other marijuana growing equipment were also seized. Judge James Pours ordered a \$10,000 cash bond.

Shredding Event Held Was A Success

The shredding event held on May 20, given by The Silbernagel Group was a success. In three hours, 8.8 trees were saved. Confidential documents were securely destroyed protecting your identity and helping the environment.

Particles from paper can get into our water supply when rain or other runoff water from the landfills gets into our streams, ponds, rivers and lakes. This can make once fresh water dangerous to drink and harmful to freshwater animals.

## In Their Honor: The Stories Of St. Francis Home Veterans

Since February 2016, St. Francis Home has been capturing and writing the stories of 12 veterans living in their midst - Fond du Lac men and women who experienced a time when the United States was at war on two fronts.



## Continued From... Vietnam War Veterans From Kewaskum Among Those Honored On Memorial Day

Over the next five days and nights, a visual and electronic search was conducted throughout the area, which ranges from dense jungle to mountainous terrain. The search was called off at 4 p.m. on Jan. 24, 1969, after no wreckage could be found.

Fickler and Kuhlman were classified as missing in action.

The North Vietnamese government refused to release the names of prisoners in accordance with the rules of the Geneva Convention, so no one knew if the two were being held as prisoners of war.

Back home in Kewaskum, Fickler's parents, Edwin and Sylvia Fickler, did not know if Fickler was alive or dead. They did what they could to maintain hope.

In 1970, Edwin and Sylvia Fickler met with Ross Perot in Chicago to help with his public opinion campaign against the inhumane treatment of American prisoners in North Vietnam and Viet Cong POW camps.

Sylvia Fickler continued sending letters and packages to Fickler throughout the war, but there was no answer.

When a ceasefire was announced in January 1973, the Ficklers were overjoyed. They waited by their phone to hear if their son's name would be announced as one of the prisoners of war.

Their phone never rang. In 1974, a Marine Corps representative visited the Ficklers and told them their son's name had been placed under "presumptive finding of death."

Because his body was never found, Fickler is still considered Missing In Action. The date that Fickler was presumed dead is Feb. 4, 1974, more than five years after he disappeared.

Fickler was born on May 4, 1943, in West Bend. He graduated in 1961 from Kewaskum High School, where he had played football, basketball and summer softball. He graduated from UW-Stevens Point in 1965 and enlisted in the Marines in February 1965. He went to Vietnam in April 1968.

Wayne Rimmel, who now serves as chaplain for Kewaskum's American Legion Post 384, had been close friends with Fickler when they were growing up in Kewaskum.

"He was a super nice guy. We used to go fishing and hunting together," said Rimmel, who has saved magazines, newspaper clippings and memorabilia

to remember his friend.

On Fickler's page on the Virtual Vietnam Wall of Faces website, numerous visitors also have fond memories of Rimmel.

"Jim and I were roommates going through Navy/Marine flight training. We shared many fun times and Fick was always full of energy and spirit. He also was a terrific cook! I remember well the good times Jim had driving his red Corvette! What a great car - bright red with a 427 engine," wrote Tom Mitchell, a retired captain from the U.S. Navy.

Some mementoes also help keep Fickler's memory alive. Months after Fickler had been listed as missing in action, a package arrived at his parents' home. The package, which Fickler had sent the October before he went missing, contained two models of jet planes he had flown for the Marines.

Among Fickler's belongings that the Marine Corps returned to the Fickler home were three charcoal sketches on silk of life in Vietnam. One depicts a peaceful scene of a peasant with a food basket near a river bank. In the distant background are squadrons of military planes.

The Ficklers also received a letter from President Lyndon Johnson expressing his personal appreciation of "your constancy, patience and devotion to country."

Fickler's mother, Sylvia Fickler, who died in 1996, was quoted in a newspaper article by John Torinus Jr. saying she would like to see an end to the war, but knew that her son believed the war was necessary.

"I can only go by what he felt - ...that the people of South Vietnam had to be defended," she said.

Although Fickler's body was never recovered, a memorial stone rests in memory of Edwin James Fickler at Peace UCC Cemetery in Kewaskum.

His name is etched on the Vietnam War Memorial Wall, on Panel 34W Line 023.

### James Walter Manthei

Warrant Officer James Walter Manthei was killed in action in Vietnam on March 21, 1971. He was 20.

The son of Willard and Anna Manthei, Manthei was born on May 23, 1950. He grew up in Kewaskum and was an Explorer Scout and received the Eagle Award with the bronze and silver leaf. He played varsity football and basketball at Kewaskum High School and was active in the high school band.

Manthei graduated from Kewaskum High School in 1968. He went on to graduate from E.C.P.I. Computer School in Milwaukee in 1969 and was employed at Regal Ware, working in the finish department as a warehandler on the second shift.

He entered the service on Sept. 17, 1969. He completed a helicopter pilot course at the Army Primary Helicopter School in Fort Walters, Texas, following which he underwent advanced flight training at the Army Aviation School, Fort Rucker, Ala., where he graduated as a warrant officer on Nov. 18, 1970, and received his wings and bars. He was transferred to Savannah, Ga., after which he spent a 30-day leave at home before leaving for Vietnam on Feb. 13, 1971.

On March 21, 1971, Manthei was working as a co-pilot for the Army's 1st Aviation Brigade when the tail rotor of the helicopter he was flying was shot by enemy fire while he was supporting ground troops in Laos. Both Manthei and the other pilot, David Lancaster, broke their necks during the crash and died, according to military reports.

Manthei was the first casualty of his flight school class.

On his page at the Virtual Vietnam Wall of Faces website, Bob Malecki wrote, "Jim was one of my classmates in flight school at Fort Wolters, Texas. I remember him as a friendly, easy going, happy-go-lucky guy who was always smiling. Jim had many friends. His good humor often lightened up the stress that we all faced during training. And Jim loved to listen to music. His favorite tune was 'Dream,' by the Everly Brothers. During our few periods of relaxation, his stereo would fill the halls with that song. In fact, he'd play it continually and he sang along. After a while somebody would usually beg him to stop. His laughter was appreciated, but his singing was hard to bear."

Manthei is buried at Peace Church Cemetery on Highway 28, just west of Kewaskum.

Manthei's name is inscribed on the Vietnam War Memorial Wall at 04W-064.

### Clifford John Bales

Clifford John Bales of Kewaskum died at the hands of terrorists on Apr. 2, 1970, while serving as a sergeant in the Air Force in the Philippines.

Bales was born on Jan. 12, 1948, in West Bend to Sylvester Bales and Alice

Bohn Bales.

Bales served as an airman in the 202 Dawg Flight, along with Airman First Class Donald Facklam of Scandia, Kan.

An investigation revealed that Communist-led Huk terrorists, led by their top military commander, were responsible for the killing of both Bales and Facklam, according to a United Press International (UPI) report.

Villagers reported that the Huks, led by Commander Dante, killed the two Americans, Maj. Vicente Eduardo said in a Pacific Stars and Stripes article. The informants refused to sign statements for fear of reprisals, Eduardo said.

Commander Dante was also known as Bernabe Buscayno, and was the leader of the "New People's Army."

The mutilated bodies of Bales, 21, and Facklam, 24, were discovered in a shallow grave in a secluded area 65 miles north of Manila near Bam Bam, Tarlac Province.

An Air Force autopsy showed the two men had crushed heads and chests and Facklam had been shot twice.

Bales is buried in Holy Angels Cemetery in West Bend.

### Charles Frederick Dreher

In 1969, the U.S. Air Force's most expensive aircraft was the "Rivet Amber": a modified, somewhat experimental, RC-135E reconnaissance aircraft that was worth about \$35 million.

The large plane, which was a military version of the Boeing 707, housed a large, state-of-the-art airborne radar built by Hughes Aircraft. The radar has been claimed to be the world's most complex and powerful radar that ever went airborne. The total weight of the radar topped out at 35,413 pounds, making Rivet Amber the heaviest 135 in the entire fleet.

"It could track an object the size of a soccer ball from a range of 300 nautical miles. Can you imagine that? Now it seems realistic because they track satel-

lites, but back then, this is some pretty high tech stuff," Rimmel said.

In 1969, the Rivet Amber was based on Shemya, a small island in Alaska, to keep a close eye on Russia.

On June 5, 1969, the Rivet Amber took off from Shemya on a 1,700-mile trip over the Bering Sea to Eielson Air Force Base in Alaska for routine maintenance.

Tech. Sgt. Charles Frederick Dreher, 31, of Kewaskum, was one of the 19 people aboard the plane. Dreher had been serving in the U.S. Air Force since he enlisted at age 19 in 1957.

About 40 minutes after departing Shemya, a message was transmitted from the Rivet Amber that the plane was experiencing vibration in flight and was not certain of the emergency. It was reported that the flight crew was going on oxygen, and the plane was lowering in flight altitude. Then, a series of microphone keying 'clicks' was heard through the transmission, ending at 10:22 a.m., according to military records.

Radio contact was lost, and the Coast Guard was alerted to assist with a massive search and rescue operation over the Bering Sea.

During the search, a beeping distress signal had been received from the ocean about 250 miles east of Shemya, creating hope that the plane would be found. Unfortunately, the signal was from a search plane testing its own emergency equipment.

The Rivet Amber was equipped with several 20-man life rafts and adequate survival gear. Winds in the area were light, and seas were moderate when the search began, but as time went on, winds kicked up to 25 knots and the ceiling was about 1,500 feet, according to a UPI report.

The intensive search lasted for more than three weeks. Nothing of the aircraft, equipment or the 19 crewmembers was ever found.

"They didn't even find a

hat floating in the water. They couldn't find anything," Rimmel said.

On Aug. 18, 1969, it was declared that no one could have survived. The entire crew, including Dreher, was lost.

"No one knows for sure what happened to the plane. There was a lot of talk at the time that Russia shot it down," Wayne Rimmel said.

However, because of the reported vibration, many believe there may have been some form of mid-air catastrophic air frame or control failure. The plane was never recovered, though, so no final conclusions have been made.

In 1971, Dreher was awarded posthumously the Distinguished Flying Cross for extraordinary achievement while participating in aerial flight on May 22, 1969.

The award cited Dreher for demonstrating "outstanding airmanship and courage while flying this special mission under extremely hazardous conditions. His successful completion of this mission produced information of vital importance to the nation's security. The professional competence, aerial skill and devotion to duty displayed by Sgt. Dreher in the dedication of his service to his country reflect great credit upon himself and the U.S. Air Force."

Dreher was born on Dec. 7, 1937, to Earl Henry Dreher and Minnie A Knowles Dreher. He was married to Charlene Dreher, and the couple had three children.

The name "Rivet Amber" is inscribed on the Wing Headquarters building located on Eielson Air Force Base in Alaska in honor of Dreher and the other crewmembers and personnel that were lost on the flight.

An oil painting that was commissioned by Chuck Dreher II in memory of his father is located in the American Legion building in Kewaskum.

Dreher's memorial stone is located at Lutheran Memorial Park in Kewaskum.

# Memorial Day 2016

Memorial Day is a time to remember and celebrate the lives of the more than one million U.S. military service members who gave their lives so we can be free. The first Decoration Day – now known as Memorial Day – was on May 30, 1868 right after the Civil War ended. President Andrew Johnson (no relation) gave all federal workers time off “for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades.” The graves the president referred to were the Civil War soldiers buried near the Curtis-Lee mansion located in what is now known as Arlington National Cemetery. Today the flowers have been replaced by small American flags that are placed in front of each of Arlington’s more than 260,000 graves on the Thursday before Memorial Day. The official National Memorial Day service is held at 11:00 a.m. at the Memorial Amphitheater in Arlington. The current president, secretary of defense, and the chairman of the joint chiefs usually speak at the event that is broadcast



live on PBS television. My family and I have attended the last three services as well as visited our son’s grave in section 60 in Arlington on Memorial Day. My son, U.S. Army 1LT David Johnson was killed in action during a battle he was leading in Afghanistan on January 25, 2012.

At the local level, many of deceased veterans’ graves are decorated with flags and honored at American Legion and or VFW services held on Memorial Day. Today’s edition includes the names of each deceased veteran buried in our area to give them the honor they so deserve. In Washington

County, the Veterans Service office coordinates the list of buried vets by cemetery. The lists of veterans are then given to various groups including the Kewaskum American Legion. There, groups place flags on the graves of veterans for Memorial Day. I worked with Kurt D. Rusch, Veterans Service Officer for Washington County and his staff to obtain the list. We include it in this special Memorial Day edition and plan to publish it every Memorial Day. We also received a list of the KIAs from the Kewaskum area going all the way back to the Civil War from the Kewaskum Legion. This list

contains several names that are not on the county’s list because many local service members KIA are buried overseas. It is our intention to provide the most accurate list and not miss anyone. We plan to update the list year to year. ## Making the Wisconsin Faces Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund (VVMF) Special Section

Over the past two and half years I have been involved in locating the photos of Vietnam Veterans from Wisconsin with the Wisconsin Newspaper Association (WNA). A representative from Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund (VVMF) verified with me the Friday before last year’s Memorial Day that all 1162 photos of the Wisconsin service members were found. It is only fitting that all of our Wisconsin Vietnam Veteran heroes be displayed and published in this newspaper. Finding the photos is of no value unless they can be shared. Seeing a photo of a person is much different than reading a name. A photo can tell about the service member. It makes their loss more personal. It took me and our staff from the end of December to the beginning of April to prepare the copy/photos for the special section included with this paper. As we prepared the photos we found that a couple of them were placed incorrectly with the wrong name. We did end up making some corrections. Since the photos are submitted in good faith and are not from the military, there is no way for us to verify that the photos are 100% correct other than family members letting us or the VVMF know.

VVMF Faces Tab included with this edition is the first section of its kind in the U.S. I, along with the VVMF and Jessica McBride, gave our copyrights to the section to the WNA membership so it could be published by other Wisconsin newspapers this week. We prepared the copy and photos and gave them to the Wisconsin Newspaper Association at the beginning of April. The section was made available to all member newspapers. Many other papers including one near here are publishing the section and localizing the cover story to their particular areas. The effort to publish this section in Wisconsin newspapers was featured nationally on the May front pages of PubAux, the National Newspaper Association’s monthly newspaper. All of the service members’ photos will be archived at the Wisconsin Historical Society (at UW Madison) because we published them in a WNA newspaper. They will be searchable by name and will be available for generations to come. It is my hope that other states will follow as they find all of their photos.


I thought it was important to personalize each of the VVMF Faces tab published. There are six Vietnam veterans killed from the coverage area of the Campbellsport News and the Kewaskum Statesman that are listed on the WALL and are featured on the front cover of the VVMF Faces section. Four of them are from the Campbellsport area and two of them from Kewaskum. It should be noted that four were killed during the Vietnam War from the Kewaskum area: Edwin J. Fickler, James W. Manthei, Charles Dreher, and Clifford N. Bales. We included stories in the Kewaskum Statesman about all four. Dreher and Clifford are not included in our VVMF Faces tab section because their names are not included on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall in Washington D. C. since they were not killed in action in Vietnam. See Anne’s story for more details.

## The Game Changer



Earlier this year, retired U.S. Army Captain Nathan Smith mailed Laura and me a copy of a print created by the famous military artist James Dietz. Captain Smith was my son’s Captain in Afghanistan when he was killed. Captain Smith as well as several other of the army guys our son David was deployed with said this painting captured what it was really like during battles with the enemy. The battle portrayed in the print was a real battle that occurred in late spring of 2012. I wanted our readers to see a visual representation of what some of the battles looked like in Afghanistan. It took place several months after our son was killed but was near where he was killed. The building in the far right back side of the print is similar to the building where David was killed. Some of the men in the print are a portrayal of the soldiers from the 3rd Stryker Brigade Combat Team including the 40 men from the platoon my son led. My son’s platoon was part of Charlie Company that led the charge in this particular battle. Two other companies joined in the fight in addition to air support. The soldiers in the portrait are taking cover behind a grape row which is a mud wall about three feet thick that is as hard as concrete. I want readers to notice the Arrowhead patches on some of the soldiers’ left arms. It is the same patch my son wore. Although the U.S. Army prevailed in this battle, the cost was high including the death of another Charlie Company lieutenant.

I contacted artist James Dietz in February and asked for his permission to publish a copy of this print for our Memorial Day edition. He e-mailed me the following response: “My answer is simply yes. Please give credit to the unit who sponsored the art and to my publisher. I’m not sure whether you need to add much more about me other than I’m the artist. I’d feel better if the copy was more about your son and others like him.” Dietz’s response certainly tells a lot about him.

## The Loss Of My Son

It is a horrible thing to lose a child for any reason. There is something unnatural about the order of life when a child dies before his or her parents. The pain of losing a child for a parent is the same for military losses as with other losses that resulted from accidents, diseases, drugs, or any other way a child can die. Military losses are certainly not more important than other losses. Every parent grieves differently to such a loss. It is a hurt that changes with time but does not go away. It is a journey that no parent wants but some have to face. It is my experience that people who have not experienced such a loss cannot understand what a grieving parents goes through.

There seems to be an added dimension to the loss of a child killed in the service of his country. The loss is remembered at certain holidays like this coming Memorial Day or Veterans

Day. It is remembered when U.S. flags are displayed or when other military personnel are present. The funeral is very different from an ordinary funeral. Our son being buried in Arlington is also different. Our son David's body lies with some of America's greatest heroes; they are all heroes and I am proud of everyone of them. The loss is more public and not a private family matter. Laura and I are very grateful to all of the people who have supported us as well as the other recent Gold Star families.

I do take comfort in several things. First of all, I know my son's spiritual life was in order. Before his deployment he visited with our pastor David Koch, who presided over the funeral in Mayville. My son told pastor that he felt that it was his calling in life to lead men into battle. This is what he was supposed to do with his life. He also told the pastor that it was very dangerous where he was going

and that there was a good chance he was not coming back (David did not tell his parents this part). David was right with God and there is no doubt in my mind where he is today. I don't think I could live today without the Christian perspective of hope for tomorrow. Second, I know he gave his life so others could be free, including me. Being free is one of the greatest gifts I have. I know I will never really appreciate it all the way but have some idea of its cost. Third, the men who served with my son are now like my sons, especially Sergeant Aaron Dunlap. Aaron led the flank in the battle where David was killed. He has visited us many times and even asked Laura and me to stand in as his parents at his own wedding last summer. He told me that we are family now. Finally, I have learned that it is not how long we live that really matters. It is what we do with the time we have to make a positive difference in

this world that really counts.

I would like to conclude my Memorial Day comments with words from Janice Ferguson from St. Francis, Wisconsin. She sent Laura and I a card on the fourth anniversary of our son's death last January. Her words:

**"Dear Mr. and Mrs. Johnson:**

**I know no words can take the place of your son. I have great respect for all our troops. Your son gave his life helping people.**

**I am not eloquent. I have a certificate from President (Franklin) Roosevelt to my grandparents when their oldest son was KIA in WWII. It says: 'He stands in the unbroken line of patriots who have dared to die that freedom might live, and grow, and increase its blessings. Freedom lives, and through it, he lives - in a way that humbles the undertakings of most men.'**

**May David rest in peace and may his family find comfort in God's Word."**

## Patriot Guard Riders

A section including Vietnam Veterans would not be complete without mentioning the dedicated service of the Patriot Guard Riders. Many of them are Vietnam Veterans whose mission is to honor current military heroes who gave the ultimate sacrifice. The Patriot Guards were a large part of our son's military funeral. They helped lead the funeral procession when his body was being transported from the time it came to Mitchell Field to Mayville and then until it was at the burial site in Arlington. These guys were not given a welcome when they came home from Vietnam. However, they have changed this for the current soldiers coming home. The Patriot Guards truly love American military service members. Those of you who went to my son's fu-

neral at Mayville High School may remember all of the Patriot Guards holding American flags in front of the high school during the funeral. They have treated me so warmly and it is certainly a big reason why I helped with the VVMF Faces Project. How could I not help the people who loved my son and my family so much even though I personally don't know them? The Patriot Guard Riders are often present when there is a group of Gold Star families getting together. In Wisconsin, there is a group of military survivors called Being There, Reaching Out (BTR). It is an organization providing support to all Wisconsin families who lost someone serving in the military, including KIA, accidents, and suicides. There is an annual retreat once a year and the

Patriot Guard members are present. They usually don't say much. However, this year, James Unruh, Senior Ride Captain SE Wisconsin, who was present at my son David's funeral in Mayville, gave a speech at the opening cere-

mony on Saturday morning, April 9, in Milwaukee. His words were touching and I got permission from him to publish his words to the audience of Gold Star families. Mr. Unruh's words:

**"I am Jim Unruh, senior ride captain for the Patriot Guard Riders in Southeast Wisconsin. Thank you Judith (Judith Singer, founder of BTR) for inviting the Patriot Guard Riders to stand for the Gold Star families. Over 400,000 Patriot Guard Riders (PGR), across the country, stand in awe of you. Because of the sacrifice you and your loved ones have made, the PGR was born. We stand to honor and respect the fallen and their families, and to protect against evil ones. It is because of you and your loved ones that American stands free. You taught them the virtues of honor, respect, integrity, and to always do the right thing.**

**The selfless acts of your children or spouses ensures that oppression will never be tolerated in the world, and that others may enjoy the same basic freedoms that Americans do. We cannot fathom the pain that you are enduring, but be comforted by the fact that your loved ones will never be forgotten.**

**I leave you with a quote from Eleanor Roosevelt: 'Lest I keep my complacent way I must remember somewhere out there a person died for me today. As long as there must be war, I ask and I must answer was I worth dying for?' The Patriot Guard Riders will always be here for you."**

Please note that the American Flags and Gold Star flag posted in front of our newspaper office over the Memorial Day holiday are from the Patriot Guard.

*"We here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vein."*

# Continued From... Service Remembers Fallen Law Enforcement Officers

During the shift, Justmann's police radio announced that there had been a homicide in Marinette County and that one of the banks had been robbed at gunpoint. The suspect was traveling south, and his exact whereabouts were not known.

Both Justmann and Casper responded, trying to spot the suspect. Casper positioned himself on the north side of Fond du Lac County, while Justmann was stationed on the southern end.

Then, Justmann heard Casper's voice come over the radio.

"346 Eden, I've located the vehicle," he said, and Justmann's stomach sank. Justmann intuitively left her position. She heard a voice in her head say, "Go!" and she raced her 2014 Ford Taurus as fast as she could, far exceeding 100 mph.

"I went after my friend because there was no chance I was going to let him face this guy alone," Justmann said.

Justmann pulled into the parking lot of Pick 'N Save in Fond du Lac and watched a man, later identified as Steven Snyder of Michigan, step out of his vehicle with his arms outstretched, holding a gun.

Justmann watched as Casper got out of his squad car, which was still in drive. Casper and Snyder, a serial bank robber responsible for at least nine holdups in three states, circled Casper's moving vehicle.

Justmann watched as Casper drew his firearm and pointed it at Snyder, who was armed with two pistols and more than 140 rounds of ammunition.

During the next 17 seconds, Casper fired 12 times and Snyder shot nine times.

When the shooting stopped, Justmann told herself, "He's going to be fine. Trevor's going to be okay; he's just catching his breath."

But Casper became stiff and fell to the ground. He

had been shot three times. "Trevor! Stay with me!" Justmann pleaded.

Justmann then covered her friend's body and called for help.

She will never forget having to say, "346 is down, 346 is down."

Justmann recalled the horrible incident, in which both Casper and Snyder perished, on Thursday, May 19, during the Washington County Law Enforcement Memorial Service.

The service, which was held at Washington County Fair Park, drew police officers and their families from across the county.

Kewaskum Police Chief Thomas Bishop welcomed the crowd. Music was performed by the Hartford City Band and the Greater Milwaukee Fire and Police Pipes and Drums. Kewaskum High School Choir sang the national anthem, while Capt. Terry Hansen of the Menomonee Falls Police Department played "Taps."

Three memorial wreaths were presented in memory of Robert D. Backes, officer for the Germantown Police Department; John M. Schmitt, deputy for the Washington County Sheriff's Office; and Marshal Leonard George Frederick Scherger of the Hartford Police Department.

Backes, 35, was killed on March 21, 1981, after stopping to help a man with a flat tire on Interstate 45. The man attacked Backes, and the two became engaged in a violent struggle and fell into the roadway. They were

struck and killed by a passing motorist who was unaware of the struggle.

Scherger, 33, responded to a report of suspicious individuals at the train depot in Hartford on May 21, 1904. The three men pulled handguns and fired when confronted by Scherger. Scherger died at the scene from gunshot wounds to the head. The murder was never solved.

On Sept. 7, 1998, Schmitt, 31, was a passenger in a squad car that was answering a call for assistance from another officer. While the car was headed north on Interstate 45 in the Town of Kewaskum, the car was involved in a multi-vehicle rollover crash. Schmitt died from injuries sustained in the crash.

State Rep. Jesse Kremer and Kewaskum Village Administrator Matt Heiser both spoke at last week's service.

Heiser recalled how Schmitt had been a neighbor. From their living room window, Heiser and his family could see Schmitt's squad car at home over the lunch period. The empty driveway remains a painful reminder of the loss.

"We thank the many officers in Washington County who are willing to face these unpredictable, frequent dangers every day so that we can be safe. We thank the endlessly faithful family members who support these officers. And we hope that next year at this time we are still bowing our heads for three names," Heiser said.

# Chief's Corner

As the calendar switches from winter to spring and summer, this month's article is simply a list of spring and summer-time reminders.

First, property maintenance issues continue to be a focus of the Village staff, such as, the grass cutting requirements. Per Village Ordinance 58-78, all properties in the Village shall be kept in a "safe, clean and presentable condition". Grass is not allowed to grow greater than six inches on any improved property, and on vacant lots, the grass must be cut and maintained within 20 feet of the street. Also, our department has been trying to get residents to avoid blowing their grass clippings into the street because excess grass in the street can cause issues with our storm water sewer system.

Secondly, many residents enjoy spending time with family and friends by a recreational fire. Recreational fires are allowed in the village; however, there are some guidelines and restrictions. According to Village Ordinance 38-1(c), residents may have recreational fires as long as an approved fire pit or outdoor fireplace is used. An approved fire pit is a below ground pit, no larger than 36 inches in diameter and it must be lined with a noncombustible material such as metal or stone. The pit must also be at least 4, but no more than 12 inches deep and the outer ring around the pit must be stone, brick or concrete. An outdoor fireplace is defined as a

commercially available appliance designed to contain a wood fire when operated according to manufactures specifications. To operate these types of fireplaces according to ordinance, they must be operated with all lids, screens, and sparking devices in place.

Recreational fires also have restrictions on how close they can be to buildings or dwellings. If you are using a dug in ground fire pit then your pit must be 25 feet away from any dwelling, building structure, shed or garage; whereas if you are using a outdoor fireplace your fire must be at least 10 feet away from any structure, fence or combustible material.

You are also not allowed to burn any leaves, bushes, rubbish, garbage, trash, construction materials or any other material items. Recreational fires within the village shall consist of only natural wood or manufactured fire log material. Fires are only allowed between the hours of 9am until 2am and need to always be attended by someone over the age of 18 until fully extinguished. If you do have a fire, be aware of the speed and directions of the wind. Your enjoyable fire might be a nuisance for your neighbor if their property or house is inundated with smoke from your fire.

Third, the village parks are now open and in full use. Please remember that dogs and other pets are not allowed in Village parks. Vehicles are not allowed to be parked at any of the buildings or diamonds in Kiwanis Park.

A park is an area where children and adults alike should be able to play and have fun without having to be overly concerned with vehicular traffic. You are allowed to drive up to the pavilion, the concession stand or to a diamond to drop off/pick up items or to drop off/pick up a disabled person who is unable to make the long walk. However, you must return your vehicle back to the parking lot immediately thereafter. Too often we find people who drove up for these reasons and then the vehicle remains parked there.

As to one's personal conduct in the parks, remember that the parks are for families, kids, sports and gatherings. Be mindful of your language, alcohol use, littering issues, and if smoking cigarettes, be courteous to those around you who don't smoke.

Lastly, please slow down on residential streets. The speed limit on residential streets unless otherwise posted is 25 mph. Children aren't always looking for cars like we wish they would, so the burden is on us to drive with caution and keep an eye out for children playing. Also, be aware for mopeds and bicyclists who have a right to share the road with vehicular traffic. Hopefully by slowing down and being aware, we may be able to prevent a tragic situation from occurring.

## Bunt Is The Big Hit In Indians' Eight-Inning Victory

JACKSON — A well placed bunt can and was as good as an extra base hit for the Kewaskum High baseball team in the top of the eighth in its game against host Kettle Moraine Lutheran.

The score was all knotted at 4-4 at the end of regulation, then the Indians scored three runs in the top of the eighth and sophomore pitcher Cole Surprenant did the rest, putting the Chargers down in order for a 7-4 extra-inning, non-conference victory.

After Devyn Zillmer flied out to open the eighth, the ninth hitter Zach Heberer came through with a clutch double to start the KHS rally. Tony Steger followed with a single to left, putting runners at the corners, and after Steger stole second, KML coach Darrell Washburn signaled for an intentional walk to John May to load the bases and set up a force out at home.

KHS coach Doug Gonring decided to try to push a run across with a squeeze and Dalton Poole laid down a beauty down the third baseline. KML's pitcher, John Maas, fielded the ball and airmailed the throw to first, allowing Steger and May to score.

Two batters later, Andrew Neu doubled down the right field line, putting runners at second and third but Maas got Cole to

ground out 1-3, and the inning was over.

Surprenant made quick work in the eighth, striking out Corey Hill, getting Andre Mantz to fly out to right and then striking out his counterpart Maas.

"It just happened to be the right position," Gonring said about calling for the squeeze. When it was suggested he was playing (West Bend West coach) Billy Albrecht baseball with the bases-loaded bunt, Gonring chuckled, "I've probably pulled off a few more than he has," again stressing the timing and crediting Dalton Poole with a good bunt.

"We're awful young, but did we execute on some plays!" Gonring went on. "I'm so proud of these kids. It's rewarding after having so few practices. I didn't expect this."

Gonring had special praise for his sophomores. "The sophomores, to be so dominating in this," he said. Surprenant was certainly one, pitching three innings of one-hit ball. Maas got the lone hit when he beat out a bunt to open the sixth. He was bunted to second, but Surprenant got the next two batters to fly out and strike out. He wound up the game with five Ks.

At the plate, Surprenant went 3x5, while Andrew Neu, another sophomore, had three hits, including a double.

Neu, the team's south-

paw pitcher, pitched the third and fourth fames for the Indians, giving up two runs, four hits and two walks. He struck out one.

Noah Bentz chipped in with two hits, including an RBI double to left in the sixth when the Indians scored a pair to tie the game at 4-4, the last run coming via an error by the shortstop.

Two other sophomores teamed up for a key defensive play in the bottom of the fourth. KML had the bases loaded when Corey Leisener smacked a single to center. KHS' center fielder, Tony Steger snagged the ball and threw a perfect strike to catcher Jared Chesk to gun down Danny Hennen, trying to score from second.

KHS used four pitchers, starting with its senior ace, Mike Prochnow, who gave up one run. Poole pitched one inning and needed just seven pitchers to get three outs.

"We made two double plays today. We had a very positive day," Gonring said. "I think everybody learned from this."

## Track Athletes Pass First Test On The Road To State

The Kewaskum High track teams are going to need a bus, a BIG bus, to take their athletes to the D-2 Sectional competition hosted by East Troy this afternoon (May 26).

From Monday's regional competition, the Indian boys qualified 10 individuals in nine events, along with three relay teams, while the girls advance eight in nine events and one relay on the road to what they are hoping will end up in La Crosse for the WIAA State Track and Field Meet.

Kewaskum's boys piled up 142 points, 41 more than runner-up Ripon, to capture the team title. It was the boys' first regional title since 2002. The Lady Indians made the best use of their small squad, to finish second behind Ripon, 112 to 108.

Junior Derrek Brock and senior Jason Hanson won two individual events and were members of the victorious 4x400-meter relay to lead the boys. Brock won the 110 high hurdles in 16 and .09 seconds (16.09) and the 300 intermediates in 40.89.

Hanson was the class of the field in the high jump,

clearing six feet, six inches (6-6) and said "I had two good attempts at 6-9. It looks promising."

In the final relay, athletes and fans were on their feet cheering as Hanson overtook a Ripon runner for first place in a personal best 3:30.48. Others on the winning quartet were Jakob Hrica and Cade Peterson.

One other highlight was the win in the shot put by senior Ben Watzig, who tossed the iron ball 49-11, just one inch less than the 50-foot mark. It was a personal best for him.

Another win came in the 4x200 relay (Kyle Pamperin, Hrica, John May, Peterson), 1:34.59

For the girls, senior Ellie Debelak looked strong on all four of her events, the 200, the 400, the long jump and the 4x400 relay. She won the 400 in a season-best 1:01.55, placed third in the long jump (15-11.25), and second in the 200 (26.97).

In the relay, Debelak turned in an outstanding anchor leg to give KHS a second in 4:19.49. The other girls in the event were Krystina Lepp, Courtney Butzlaff and Emily Krier.



## KHS Golfers Make It Look Easy, Win EC Title By 37 Strokes

All season long, coach Glenn Eichstedt was concerned his Kewaskum High golfers had only one East Central Conference mini-tour win to their credit. Little did he know, the Indians were going to come through when it counted most — in the 18-hole conference tournament.

Playing at Whispering Springs in Fond du Lac, Kewaskum shot a sizzling 316 total to beat Plymouth by 37 ... that's right 37 strokes to bring home the first EC Conference championship, plus the conference medal for the day and all-conference awards for three of its four seniors.

"What a phenomenal day!" Eichstedt said after hosting and winning the tournament. Eichstedt and his assistant, Scott Rohlinger, have been coaching golf for 19 years, and this was their first conference title.

Sam Schlosser led the team with an even par 72, starting out with a 36 on the front and posting the same on the back when several others, who started in the 30s, started to fade on the longer and more challenging back nine.

When asked what was the strength of his game in the tournament, Schlosser said emphatically, "putting. I could just read the line, and I made it simple."

The veteran senior, Kewaskum's first Player of the Year since Ethan Geidel (2006 and 2007) figured he had "27 or 28 putts. It wasn't many," so he had at least eight one-putt greens.

Schlosser's round

included five birdies and five bogeys. "The par fives were playing short," he said reporting he was on in two and two-putted for the birdies. Staying away from trouble also helped

Schlosser, who worked his way on the varsity near the end of his freshman year, said he has been playing golf for about nine years. "I started up at Hon-E-Kor with my dad and my grandpa," he said, and he just continued to improve. As a freshman, Schlosser shot 94 in the conference meet, 85 as a sophomore and 82 a year ago. This was a big jump for him, and he hopes he still has more success ahead." We're not finished," he said.

Andrew Otto finished second, six shots behind his teammate. He overcame a pair of double bogeys on the front nine to card a 40-38-78. After double bogeys on Nos. 4 and 5, he bounced back with a birdie 2 on No. 6. "Normally I try to keep my head," he said.

Did he mind finishing second to Schlosser? "Oh no. That was great!" Otto said. "We knew in the beginning of the year it was going to be him or me. We put in a lot of time in the off-season, so we deserve it."

Otto, who plans to attend Lakeland College next fall where he will try out for the golf team, was also pleased with his putting in the tournament. "The ball-striking wasn't the best, but the putting helped."

The Indians' other two counters were Sean Murray and freshman Jacob Schlosser, who came in with 83s. Murray

had nines of 40 and 43, while Schlosser went out with 38 and slipped a little on the back nine with a 45. They tied for eighth place in the tournament.

Senior Trent Griesemer's 44-47-91 did not count.

Sam Schlosser and Otto made the All-ECC first team, while Murray earned second-team honors.

# KHS Track Teams Finish Third And Sixth

## – Hanson Goes 6-8 In The High Jump

As expected, Plymouth was the class of the East Central Conference Track Meet hosted by Ripon on May 17.

The Panthers, who scored 47 points in the two sprint events on a 1-2-4 finish in the 100 meter dash and a 1-2-3 sweep in the 200, piled up 178 points, 56 more than runner-up Berlin's 122.

Kewaskum finished a very respectable third with 99, with the Indians posting a pair of first places. Once again, Jason Hanson won the high jump, and he did it in school record fashion, climbing over the bar at six feet, eight inches (6-8), one inch higher than in the Kewaskum Quad Meet on April 12.

"I was really proud of the teams at conference," KHS coach Kris Evans said about the Indians' efforts. "There were a ton of personal bests. Everybody put up their best performances."

Evans was also thrilled Hanson was able to add another inch to his high jump record. Hanson did make three attempts at 6-9 but said, "at that point, I was pretty worn out."

The Indians' quartet of Derrek Brock, Jake Hricka, Cade Peterson and Hanson turned in a time of three minutes 32.61 (3:32.61) to win the 4x400 relay. This was a season best time for KHS in the event, with Hanson passing a couple runners in the home stretch. "He just blew by everyone. It was amazing," Brock said of his teammate.

Brock placed in both hurdle races, finishing second in the 300 intermediates behind Berlin ace, Connor Nelson, in a very close finish, 40.48 to 40.79.

There were just six hurdlers in the 110 highs, and all but two were under 16 seconds. Again it was Nelson first in 15.22, and Brock was back in the fourth spot at 15.80. Both are personal records PRs.

"For conference this year, especially in the 110s, there's a lot of good competition," Brock said, indicating he has been working on driving to the finish line and trying to go lower over the hurdles. "Right now, those guys (who finished ahead of him) have that down."

In the 300s Brock has trimmed two full seconds off his time from last season. "My steps have been dead on," he said, adding he is pleased with his quick start in the event.

Hanson turned in a fine 2:03.37 in the 800, but that was no match for Berlin's Jacob Caswell, who crossed the finish line in 1:54.35.

The foursome of Christian Bocher, Evan Devalk, Cameron Dodge and Kyle Pamperin contributed a second place in

the 4x100 relay. Their time was 46.36, over two seconds behind the first-place Plymouth team.

Another top-three finish came in the 4x200 where the Indian foursome of Hrica, Eric Doll, John May and Pamperin combined for a 1:34.86, good for third.

In the weights, senior Ben Watzig closed out his conference career with a second place in the discus at 140-03 and a third in the shot where he tossed the 12-pound ball 43-05.25.

Sophomore Riley Donovan took third in the discus with a toss of 134-0.





## Finding The Photos

It was January 2014 when I read about Wisconsin Public Radio and Television's effort to join the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund (VVMF) effort to find the photo of every Wisconsin service member who was killed and listed on the WALL in Washington D.C. The effort is known as the Faces Project. The

photos are displayed by the birth date of the service member on the VVMF website: vvmf.org. The photos will also be projected at a new Education Center that will be built by the WALL in Washington D.C. All permits have been secured for the new Center and construction is anticipated to start in 2019. Fundraising efforts are still underway.

I also learned that Congress does not authorize a war memori-

al on the Mall in D.C. until 10 years after a war has been completed. It means that there will be no national memorial for the current service members who have been killed in the current war on terrorism that began on September 2001. Approximately 8,000 U.S. service members, including my own son, 1LT David Johnson, have given their lives in this war. The folks at the VVMF have offered to have a temporary

national memorial for the current service members in the new Education Center. There will be a place where the photos / faces of these brave man and woman will be displayed.

It did not take me long to realize that the community newspapers in Wisconsin as well as all over the country could significantly contribute to the effort to find the missing photos of killed Vietnam Veterans. The first question that comes to mind is: why are the photos missing? Doesn't the military have them? The answer is that there was a huge fire at a government storage facility in 1973 where over six million military records were destroyed including many of the personnel records from Vietnam. It was an era when there were paper records but no digital back-ups. In May 2013, approximately 450 photos were missing from Wisconsin and 24,000 in the U.S. It is important to recognize that more than half the photos from Wisconsin had been found by this time. Many people deserve recognition for

finding those photos, especially former school teacher Bryce Kelly of Medford who is credited with finding over 500 photos in the initial effort. In my mind, Bryce is a real hero for his dedication and persistence as a caring citizen. Also, many family members of soldiers up-loaded photos directly to the VVMF website.

I have had the good fortune to have been the president of the Wisconsin Newspaper Association (WNA) in 2010 and still remain on the board of directors to this day. The use of local newspapers for such an effort made a lot of sense. Who knows their local communities better than local newspapers? I made a presentation to the board in February 2013 and asked for the support of the WNA and its members to provide assistance to the effort and they gave their full support immediately. I contacted Jeffrey Potter, Marketing Director of Wisconsin Public Radio, and offered the help of the Wisconsin newspapers in finding the photos. We worked with Jeff throughout

the project.

I then went to Washington D.C. in March 2013 with a small group of newspaper publishers representing the National Newspaper Association, and offered the assistance of community newspapers from across the country to help find the photos for the project to a small team of people who run the Vietnam Veterans Memorial led by Lee Allen. At the time we met, only one state had found all of its photos: New Mexico. Lee and his team were excited about the "juice" we put into the effort. I asked Lee Allen to be a featured speaker at the National Newspaper Association Convention in October 2014. He asked newspapers from all over the country for help, and many newspaper publishers stepped forward. Today, ten states have located all photos and four more are close to finishing. Over 10,700 photos have been found since community newspapers from across the country have joined the effort.







### Wisconsin Newspaper Association (WNA) Effort

When the WNA first starting working on this project in the spring of 2014, there were over 450 of the 1161 Wisconsin photos were still missing. I got an accurate list of names from the folks at the VVMF in Washington D.C. The staff at the WNA divided up the list of missing photos by geographic area and then gave the names to newspapers in each geographic area. Many newspapers ran stories and a huge number of photos were found in the first year. It is important to give credit for finding many of the photos be given to many dedicated newspaper staff members who really took an interest in this project. Also, many citizens and family members found photos and up-loaded them directly to the VVMF website. Fast forward to February, 2015. Only 64 Wisconsin photos were still missing. At that time I staffed a booth the WNA annual convention for the VVMF Faces project. The vast majority of the last 64 missing photos of service members were from the Milwaukee metro area. I told newspaper publishers we wanted to find every photo by Memorial Day 2015. Several people doubted we could find them all. However, a UW Milwaukee journalism lecturer, Jessica McBride, came to my booth and talked with me about the project. The next day, Jessica came to my booth again and informed me that she, as well as students in two of her journalism classes were willing to help find the remaining photos. She was just what the effort needed. Jessica is an experienced investigative reporter with a real heart for those who served and were killed in the military. Jessica's help was gladly welcomed. It should

also be noted that UW Milwaukee administration very supportive of this effort. A few of the remaining photos were found by other journalist but the majority of them were found by UW Milwaukee students and Jessica.

### About this section

This section that displays all of the Wisconsin Vietnam Veterans Faces is the first of its kind in the United States. The cover has photos of service members from this newspaper's coverage area. It will be used as a role model for other states as they find all of their photos. The photos and information about the service members came from the Vietnam Veterans Memorial people in Washington D.C. All of the photos and stories in this section were made available free of charge to all Wisconsin Newspaper Association members for publication near Memorial Day. There are three reasons for publishing all of the photos in Wisconsin newspapers. First is to bring awareness of the great sacrifices Wisconsin service members and their families gave (and many are still giving) in the Vietnam era. Adding photos to the list of names tells more of the story. Second is to bring awareness and need for funds for the new Education Center that will be built near the WALL that will honor killed U.S. service members killed in Vietnam as well as in all U.S. wars. Third, this section will be archived at the Wisconsin Historical Society since it is published in a Wisconsin newspaper. The contents of this section will be available and searchable for free to the public on Wisconsin's BadgerLink system available in Wisconsin public libraries and schools 90 days after publication. It was a huge team effort by many players who made finding all of the photos for the Wisconsin VVMF Faces project possible. I want to give my sincere congratulations to all who worked on the Faces project. However, we must never forget that the photos represent real people who lived and died for our country. They have families (Gold Star families) who still bear the great cost of war. The sacrifices of these service members as well as all U.S. service members killed in the line of duty must always be remembered. The price of freedom is very expensive. It is only fitting that every photo found be published on the first Memorial Day after all of the photo files and information could be assembled for publication. Further, by publishing all of the photos in Wisconsin newspapers, they will be digitally archived at the Wisconsin Historical Society and will from this day forward be available to all for generations to come!

There are currently 58,307 names on VVMF Wall and a total of 13,298 photos missing for faces project.

# Finding The Last 64 Faces

When I first saw Andrew Johnson standing at the Wisconsin Newspaper Association convention in Pewaukee, Wis., with his sign, I was simply curious at first. "Help Find the Last 64," it said. When I stopped and talked to Mr. Johnson, I learned these were more than just 64 names. They were 64 names of 64 young men, many of them from the Milwaukee area, who left our country to fight in a long-ago war and never returned. When Johnson explained that these men were missing photos for a major national project to honor their services, I immediately knew that UW-Milwaukee, where I teach, could help. And when I heard Johnson's story about his son, David, I knew for sure we had to.

My journalism students are trained in necessary skills for a modern media age. They know how to edit audio and create video stories. They understand journalistic use of social media, and so forth. However, they are also trained in time-held reporting principles, such as interviewing, tracking down people, and researching records. When I heard Johnson's story about his son, who had died in Afghanistan, and heard the passion in his voice, I realized this was an important mission. And that it would be a way to teach my students journalism that matters. Journalism shouldn't just be a collection of facts. It must be infused with a sense of story, of humanity, and of meaning. We simply could not allow these young men to be forgotten, especially now, when there are still people alive for whom they were a living memory.

At that time, I had no idea how incredibly moving this project would end up being. In 20 years and then some as a journalist and teaching journalism, I have never been involved in more moving work. As the state's urban university, I felt our students were uniquely positioned to find the supposedly unfindable photos. Their determination and tenaciousness were incredibly impressive, and many of the students have commented that they've never before done such meaningful work. They are winning awards for it too; the class project just

won a regional Society of Professional Journalists' Mark of Excellence Award.

But had these men really vanished without a public trace, other than their names? A photo shows something more dimensional than letters on granite, although those also have their own power. In the words of Ansel Adams, "photography is an austere and blazing poetry of the real." We will find them, I told Johnson. Everyone is findable. At one point, I told him the only way we wouldn't find the photos is if they literally did not exist on this earth. For a time, we feared that was the case with at least one of them. We toyed with the idea of hiring a sketch artist to draw that final man from family memories.

The team of student journalists began investigating. I gave them the semester. They were picking up the final baton in a relay that had involved so many others, people who found many, many photos over many, many years.

We soon realized that others were still investigating too. Student Nicole Beilke told the story of a dedicated Baraboo veteran, Terry Kramer, who was posting so many photographs at the end that he almost seemed like the students' shadow. He would drive many days from Baraboo to Milwaukee, where he would sit in the Milwaukee Public Library poring through records. He found many photos.

Each student in UW Milwaukee's Integrated Reporting classes was assigned to find two soldier photos and instructor Jessica McBride took the remaining seven. The students joined a statewide effort to find all 1161 photos. Students pored over cemetery burial records, checked phone directories and yearbooks, looked through veteran memorial sites and tracked down surviving family and friends in any way they could: phone calls, email messages, US Postal Service and in person. The niece's mother was a half sister to Gerald Kuhnly, and she did have photos that were eventually passed on to the niece. Kuhnly's niece provided a photo of Gerald Kuhnly.

At the beginning of the project, in February, each student was given two names and instructed to find the photos and choose an angle for a story. Archival searches revealed the media did little to humanize most of the men when they died; the students were to write that rough draft of history more than 45 years later in some cases, tracing the relatives and friends of men who died before the advent of the Internet.

The stories were extraordinary. There was the young man in Arkansas who did not have a photo of his father anymore, although he'd seen one years before on a relative's mantle; his father, James Calvin Ward, was 17 when he died in Vietnam, and the military banned combat for juveniles as a result. The young man from Milwaukee had deep roots in the South; when the student and I, after endless calls to relatives, eventually found a photo, it turned out it was the one from the mantle all those years ago. The photo search was working in powerful ways; it was connecting people. Imagine this young man being

able to lay eyes on his father's face once again, after all of this time. One man wrote the student a letter entitled "Do Him Justice" about a Milwaukee area service member, Donald Voltner, whose photo the student was seeking. It turned out that the man had killed the soldier in friendly fire and had been blogging about it in an attempt to come to terms with it ever since. He wrote in part:

*Dear Maggie,*

*I'm happy to help you record Don's story. Do him justice. I am a 67-year-old former CAP Marine looking at the images you sent, a face I haven't seen since Feb of 1969, and I'm crying like a little kid. If you and I took a trip back to that village in Vietnam we would find villagers that would still remember Moose and grieve his loss. I know nothing about you so I am asking that you do not treat this lightly. This isn't another class assignment; this is a man's life, and death.*

I tracked down one 95-year-old father in Delafield, Jack Bohrman, who still had his son Michael's red Corvette under a quilt in his garage. When he tenderly lifted

the blanket off it, it glistened as if it had hardly been touched. I immediately noticed the American flag sticker on the window. Michael had put it there.

In another case, a soldier's sister, who is dying of cancer in Florida, sent a student all of the photos of her brother, Robert Wisch, asking her to preserve them.

It was not lost on me that many of these young men went to war at ages no older than the students are today.

The students' research took them from the Menominee and Stockbridge-Munsee Indian reservations to the Deep South. It took them from California to Arkansas and from Milwaukee's inner city to its western suburbs. The final list was extraordinarily diverse, containing the names of service members who were African-American, Native-American, Latino, and Caucasian. The men on the list ranged in age from the 17-year- to several older service members who had served in several wars dating back to WWII. They included a German and an Italian immigrant. "The camera is much more than a

recording apparatus," said the filmmaker Orson Welles. "It is a medium via which messages reach us from another world."

In just over three months researching, only a single name remained on the list - Willie Bedford of Milwaukee- and it would be left to journalism student Rachel Maidl to tell his story. She continued diligently working on Bedford's picture - all five of his siblings had no picture of Bedford and his parents are deceased - after the semester was over and her grade already in. In the end, Maidl found a photo of Bedford, unearthing it from an old yearbook, where it had been miscoded, meaning that Wisconsin became the 5th state nationally to find all of its photos. The photo search ended up reconnecting Bedford's only child with his sister. They had never met despite living for decades only a few blocks from each other.

The photos for the project were provided to the VVMF Faces project in good faith by various volunteer sources including family members, service members, veterans, teachers, WNA member newspapers and the public.

### Submitting Additional Photos

In an effort to further preserve the legacy of those who sacrificed all in Vietnam, VVMF is committed to finding a photo to go with each of the more than 58,000 names on The Wall. The Wall of Faces allows family and friends to share memories, post pictures and connect with each other. Collected pictures will be used in the Education Center at The Wall and can also be found on The Wall of Faces.

If you have a picture of a loved one or fellow veteran whose name is on The Wall, please help the Memorial Fund honor these individuals by putting a face with a name. Regardless of whether or not the Memorial Fund has a photo of the individual already, we encourage you to submit it anyway. We are trying to collect as many photos of each individual as possible.

# Pvt. Willie Bedford Found: UWM Journalism Student Finds Last Wisconsin Vietnam Photo

For Willie Bedford's five siblings, his face was a distant memory. They lost their brother 45 years ago in Vietnam. In the decades since, one-by-one, their photos of him were also lost, especially after the family matriarch died. It had been about 20 years since any of them had seen his picture.

Until Memorial Day weekend, that is.

This is where Andrew Johnson, the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund, and a journalism class at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee come in. Johnson and Bedford's siblings had never met but have a great deal in common. They are both Gold Star families. That means they have both lost an immediate family member in combat.

And each had the same goal: To find a picture of the young Marine from Milwaukee who drowned in a dam in Vietnam in May, 1970, at age 19. His was the last out of 1,161 Wisconsin service members who died in Vietnam whose photos were needed for the Vietnam Veterans Memorial

Fund's Wall of Faces project to match a face with every name on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall (read the students' stories on other service members whose photos they found here.)

Last Friday, a student journalist from UWM, Rachel Maidl, and her instructor, Jessica McBride, brought a photo the student had unearthed from a North Division High School yearbook to three of Bedford's siblings—Carol Shaw and Robert and Eddie Claybrooks of Milwaukee—and messaged it to a fourth—Charles Bedford, in Tulsa, Oklahoma. They all confirmed it was Willie; the photo was labeled "B. Bedford" even though Willie never went by a name starting with B that his family can remember.

Willie Bedford's face had almost been lost to history because of a typo.

"That's him!" Shaw exclaimed emotionally when she saw the photo. "That's him... That's him... That's my brother!" she said emphatically thumping her hand down on the coffee table, breaking down. "That's him."

"That's my brother, Willie," concurred Eddie Claybrooks a short time later, expressing how important it was that Willie's

photo was found, not just for the Wall project but also for his family. There aren't many people in the world who do things for others anymore, he told the student journalist, with deepening emotion. The other siblings commented how much Eddie Claybrooks resembles Willie in the yearbook photo, which none of them had ever seen before.

And with that, photos of Wisconsin's Vietnam fallen had all been found, making Wisconsin only the 5th state to do so and the state with the largest number to find that has completed the task (a 6th state, Iowa, has one more photo to provide).

"In terms of the response over a certain period of time, the Wisconsin effort has been by far the most efficient and the most successful," said George DeCastro, the Faces Never Forgotten Program Coordinator for the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund in Washington D.C. "The high level of coordination and cooperation between all parties involved was astounding. And, of course, (the UWM) students and all of the other volunteers are the ones who actually got it done. It is a huge accomplishment to be able to say that we

have a fifth completed state, towards our goal. Most importantly, it gives a great template for future efforts in other states."

### Three existing photos

On Monday, Memorial Day, Bedford's only child, Tonya Scott, also of Milwaukee, who was just three months old when her father died, and Scott's mother, Loretta, provided two other photos to the UWM journalism class instructor for the Wall education center, rounding out what may very well be the only three photographs of Bedford anywhere. All of the photos have now been sent to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund in Washington D.C. for an education center that will be built in a few years there. Willie's siblings had completely lost contact with his daughter and her mother; they didn't even remember their names and at one point Shaw offered to drive around to see if she could remember the house. But after the Scotts contacted the UWM class, after learning about the search through the media, the instructor connected them with Shaw, who said she had a lengthy, warm conversation with Willie's only child, and they are meeting up soon.

"I have his picture, and now my niece back. This has truly shined a light on my life in a good way," said Shaw.

Loretta Scott met Willie Bedford when both attended North Division High School in the late 1960s. She also knew him through his membership on the NAACP Youth Council, which he'd joined "because he was working for equality," Loretta said, adding that Bedford had joined the military to provide for her and for his soon-to-be-born child, Tonya. The Youth Council's adviser was Father James Groppi, and it helped lead fair housing and other demonstrations.

Tonya, 45, was stoic and silent, expressing repeatedly that the only way she could deal with the loss of her father was to completely wall it out of her mind because it caused her so much pain growing up to not have a living dad. But she broke a brief smile when she revealed a maternal uncle had told

her once she was a lot like her dad because "he said I will give anything to anyone and always try to do things for other people."

To Willie's siblings, he was the pride of a family which had struggled through poverty and discrimination in the Jim Crow South, moving from Illinois to Milwaukee. Eddie Claybrooks recalled how, in Cairo, Illinois, in the late 1950s and early 1960s, the family members had to go in the backdoors of restaurants, couldn't swim in the same pools as whites, and were limited to jobs picking cotton and beans. They came to Milwaukee for jobs, but they fell on hard times here, too, which contributed to the loss of the photos. Two of his brothers said their last memories of Willie were from jail. They were both incarcerated, but he came to see each of them one-by-one, wearing his uniform. "He was the one who was going to go on the right side of life," said Willie's brother, Robert Claybrooks.

The UWM class had become involved in the project in February after learning about a local father's quest to help find the photos, which many volunteers have worked on over the years. That father, Andrew Johnson's son, David Johnson, was killed in 2012 in Afghanistan. Johnson has been an advocate for Gold Star families since the death of his son. For some time, he had been working on a project to collect pictures of every fallen Vietnam Soldier from Wisconsin. Johnson and a team of volunteers have collected hundreds of photos. In February, when the UWM class became involved, 64 photos were missing. Last Thursday as a result of combined efforts of the students and others (like Baraboo vet Terry

Kramer), there was only one picture left to uncover out of the 1,161: Willie Bedford's.

### The disappearing man

In the last 45 years, traces of Willie had been slowly disappearing. It started in 1973 when the National Personnel Records Center in Overland, Missouri burned down. Millions of files and pictures were lost. When Charles moved away from Milwaukee County where he and Willie grew up, boxes were mismanaged. Eddie's photos were thrown out by his landlord while he was incarcerated (he now says he has turned to religion). When their mother died, no one remembered where her photos went. Tonya had a photo that was lost in a fire, and Loretta used to have more but lost some in moves. All of this contributed to the physical memories slowly slipping away. Slowly, the only photos of Willie Bedford's life narrowed down to three—two in a box at Loretta's house and one in a yearbook that no one remembered and was mislabeled "B." (MPS says Bedford attended three high schools and was not pictured in the other two).

The photos collected are posted on the Virtual Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall. Willie's page was relatively blank. It listed his name, his hometown, and when he served and died for his country. The real heartbreaking and personal information was in the remembrance section of his page. It contained a remembrance from a platoon leader who knew him, but that man, when contacted, said he had no photos, either.

The first lead chased was Charles, Willie's brother. Charles posted on the page, "Jr. I never got a chance to let you know how much I loved you. I pray for you every day, I will never forget my brother. Love Charles."

When the student journalist first contacted Charles Bedford, he was living in Tulsa, hundreds of miles away from his hometown. He said that his fami-

ly had lost all of the photos and mementos of Willie. From there, the student called Carol Shaw. Willie's younger sister. She also had not seen any photos of Willie in years. Carol was young when Willie passed. Her memories could not have been clear after a 45-year absence.

They did not know if there were any photos left or where they could be found. Getting a photograph from Willie's family

was not an option. The search moved onto institutions that might have a picture. For a young adult that would mean a yearbook picture.

Over a phone call, Carol Shaw was asked where her much older brother went to high school. She leaned away from the phone and asked someone in the room with her, "Where did Willie go to school? North Division?" It seemed the details of Willie's life were

slowly disappearing too.

When asked the same question, Charles said, "Yes [North Division] or Riverside." A visit to Riverside High School unearthed no photograph of Willie Bedford. Onto North Division High School.

The student went to North Division three times. The first she was flat out turned away. She was told that the yearbooks were kept in the archive person's house and that she needed to come on a different day. The second trip, she was told that the archive person did not have the yearbooks between 1966 and 1970. A helpful security guard told her that he thought there were copies in the library. The third time she was able to look at yearbooks. MPS PR manager Tony Tagliavia, was then contacted, and, offering immediate help, he opened up access and even drove to high schools to pore through yearbooks himself.

The principal had already looked through the North Division yearbook and said there was no W. Bedford listed. The student went back at Tagliavia's offer, and paged through the 1967 yearbook looking for any trace of Willie Bedford. She started by looking through sports teams and clubs in hope

that Willie was part of a group photo. There was no mention of him.

She started poring through the portraits. There was a freshman named B. Bedford. His siblings had already said he never went by Bill or Billy and he should have been a sophomore. She had to ask one of the siblings if that was Willie, even though it was a long shot. She took a photo and emailed it to Charles.

He said immediately that it was Willie. There was no doubt in his mind that it was his brother.

Shown the photo, the siblings' love for Willie shone through in the gratitude in their eyes.

Willie Bedford almost turned into an invisible man. He was a half century old memory to his family and the nation he fought for. He has his name on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall in Washington D.C. His name is remembered, but nothing connects people like pictures. Now his family can see his face and remember their brother who made the ultimate sacrifice. And his daughter and the mother of his child have another photo. The photo search has united the different branches of Bedford's family after 45 years.
