## Area Veteran Goes On Honor Flight – Local Students Celebrate Stars And Stripes Flight

Donald Herriges was overwhelmed by the reception he received when he returned to the Milwaukee airport after going on the Stars and Stripes Honor Flight on May 14.

"I bet there were over 2,000 people. Everywhere you looked, there were people standing," Herriges said.

Among those greeting Herriges at Gen. Mitchell International Airport were his family members. They carried the backing of area school students as well.

Herriges' great-grandchildren held a large banner welcoming Herriges home that had been signed by all of the students at the i4Learning Community School in Wayne. The local students had all learned about Herriges' contribution to the Korean War and how he would be going on the Honor Flight.

On Tuesday, May 17, Herriges visited the i4Learning Community School, so the students were able to meet him in person. All of the students watched a video about his Honor Flight.

The national Honor Flight program dates back to 2004 and is run completely by volunteers. Its goal is to honor veterans by flying World War II, Korean War and terminally ill veterans from other conflicts to Washington, D.C., to visit their memorials.

When Herriges and the other veterans returned to the Milwaukee airport, they walked through a long corridor on the way to the main terminal. Soldiers from the various military branches were lined up on both sides of the walkway, all of them standing at attention, saluting the veterans.

As Herriges approached, the military band was playing the Army song.

The minute the band

members saw the cap that Herriges was wearing, they switched to the Marines' Hymn.

"That made you cry," Herriges said.

### Tour of Duty

Herriges, who is now 84 and lives in New Fane, was drafted into the Marine Corps when he was 19.

He went through basic training in California and was then stationed in the Philippine Islands for two years.

He remembers boarding the USS General D. E. Aultman to make the over-sea voyage.

"This might be the last time this ship is going to be on the ocean," Herriges and the other soldiers were told.

"The ship was getting too old," Herriges said.

Once he arrived in the Philippines, Herriges, who was in the 132nd division, worked as a security guard on the base. He was responsible for guarding machine guns and ammunition, jeeps and airplanes, as well as securing the main entrance.

Occasionally, Herriges would go on a small boat to where the Air Force was stationed and guard the ammunition that was stored there.

"They had a big ammunition dump. It had concrete, and they covered it with grass, so nobody knew what was in there," Herriges said.

At times, Herriges and the other men would leave the base to practice maneuvers in the mountains, sometimes a week at a time.

Herriges' favorite duty was working in the kitchen (KP), which he would be assigned for a month at a time.

"I just loved it. You could eat anything you want, and it was good food," Herriges said.

## Local Middle School Student Attends National Meeting

– Student Selected To Meet With President's Council On Fitness, Sports And Nutrition

When Courtney Zarda was informed that she had been selected to go to Washington, D.C., to meet with the Presidential Council on Fitness, Sports and Nutrition, she was told not to tell anyone.

She had to keep her big news confidential for nearly two weeks.

Finally, on Monday, May 9, she was able to tell her eighth-grade teachers at Kewaskum Middle School that she would be leaving for the nation's capital on Sunday and would miss school the following Monday.

Courtney was one of four students from across the United States who had been chosen to attend the conference. She was selected through the Fuel Up To Play 60 program, a school nutrition and exercise program launched by National Dairy Council and NFL in collaboration with the USDA.

When the day of her trip arrived, Courtney was excited.

But she could not leave

first thing in the morning. That was the day that she was being confirmed at her church, Shepherd of the Hills in West Bend. So that evening, Courtney and her father, Rick Zarda, left for an all-expense paid trip to Washington, D.C.

The following day, May 16 was a whirlwind of activity.

Courtney's morning was spent at a meeting in the Hubert H. Humphrey Building with sports sensations such as Michelle Kwan, Dominique Dawes

and Anthony Robles.

The highlight for Courtney was meeting Drew Brees, someone she has idolized. Last year she hung a poster of Brees up on her bedroom door.

## WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORTS

### Fourth OWI

On Sunday, May 29, at 7:13 a.m., a deputy sheriff lieutenant was driving eastbound on Highway 33 in the area of County Trunk WW when he observed a vehicle in front of him driving erratically and partially left of the center line.

The driver, a 59-year-old Iron Ridge man, was stopped for his inability to safely control the vehicle and he subsequently failed field sobriety testing. He was arrested for OWI, 4th offense.

The man also had his 14-year-old son in the car at the time of the stop who reportedly did not want his father driving due to his intoxication level. The juvenile was released to his mother, and the father was brought into custody at the Sheriff's Office.

### Reckless Endangerment (Pointing Firearm)

On Monday, May 30, at 11:17 p.m., the Sheriff's Office was dispatched to a residence in the 6000 block of County Trunk D in the Town of Wayne for a disturbance call.

Initial reports were that two males became involved in an altercation which resulted in one man pulling a long gun on another male subject. No shots were fired and the suspect fled the area prior to law enforcement's arrival.

Sheriff's deputies spent 4.5 hours on scene as there was some belief the suspect may have returned on foot. Charges have been requested on the known suspect and the investigation is ongoing.

### Possession of Marijuana

The Sheriff's Office responded to the area of Highway 167 west of Highway 164 on May 30 at 3:45 p.m. for a report of a subject walking along the roadway barefoot.

A deputy located the 27-year-old Oconomowoc man who stated his car had broken down. The man was given a ride back to his vehicle and a tow truck was called for the individual. During the conversation with the owner, the deputy learned there was a jar of marijuana inside the vehicle. The marijuana was recovered and the subject was arrested and brought to the Washington County Jail on charges of possession of marijuana.

### Car Crash

The Sheriff's Office responded to the 4700 block of McKinley Road in the Town of Hartford on May 28 at 4:01 a.m. for a homeowner who reported that a vehicle struck a tree.

The driver, a 22-year-old Rubicon man, did not appear to be injured, but was transported as a precaution. The driver was arrested for OWI first offense.

While deputies were still at the scene, the original caller made contact with investigators and advised that there were two people in the car at the time of the collision.

As the deputy was leaving the scene, he came across another man walking in the area who was identified as a 22-year-old rural Dodge County man.

This man was taken into custody on a probation violation resulting from a charge of delivery of marijuana. He was intoxicated and had both marijuana and paraphernalia in his possession.

### Traffic Complaint

A 29-year-old Chilton man was called in by several vehicles for erratic driving on southbound Interstate 41 near Highway K on May 28 at 4:51 p.m.

A deputy was able to intercept the vehicle near Holy Hill Road after observing poor driving. Upon making contact with the driver, the deputy noticed needle marks on the driver's arms and legs. The subject was arrested for drugged driving (first offense) after failing field sobriety testing. The deputy located heroin in a needle and cooking tins.

The driver was brought to jail on a drug paraphernalia charge. The needle and tins will be sent for testing with additional charges to likely follow.

### Recovered Stolen Car

On May 28 at 12:42 a.m. a deputy located a stolen vehicle being operated southbound on Interstate 41.

The vehicle was reported stolen out of Markham, Ill. The vehicle was apparently taken from Auto Max the previous day. The vehicle was stopped in the area of Interstate 41 and Freistadt Road. The operator, a 21-year-old Country Club Hills, Ill., man, was taken into custody without incident.

He did not want to speak

with investigators as to why he was operating the vehicle. During a search of the vehicle, it was determined he was in possession of important documents/paperwork of a relative. Investigators determined he did not have consent to have that documentation and the items were seized.

The vehicle was towed back to the Sheriff's Office, where arrangements are pending to return the car to Auto Max.

### Suspicious Shooting

The Sheriff's Office responded to St. Joseph's Hospital on May 29 at 3:30 a.m. for a patient with a gunshot wound.

The victim, an 18-year-old City of West Bend man, had what appeared to be wounds from a pellet gun. The victim was not forthcoming with investigators, but a vehicle he was an occupant in was located with a broken rear window from some type of projectile.

Investigators determined that the actual incident occurred in Milwaukee County. The investigation is ongoing.

### Pedestrian Welfare

A citizen reported stopping to assist a woman who was walking on Highway 164 near Highway 175 in the Town of Polk on May 25 at 9:24 p.m.

The woman appeared to be in distress and the Sheriff's Office was contacted by the citizen. When the Sheriff's Office contacted the 25-year-old Chicago woman, she was crying and stated she

woke up in a nearby field and was wearing clothes that she did not recognize. She advised the deputy the last thing she recalled was drinking at a bar in the City of Chicago.

She said she was not a victim of any criminal behavior including any type of sexual assault. She did not want to provide further information and simply wanted to get home to Chicago.

The female initially provided the deputy with a false name. Due to the suspicious circumstances she was escorted to the Washington County Jail to confirm her identity as well as to interview her in more detail.

Her actual name was affirmatively identified, and it was determined she was not wanted by any law enforcement agency. She also acknowledged she had a drug history, but was not currently under the influence of any type of controlled substance. She declined to go into any greater detail about the evening.

Since she was not a danger to herself and was not impaired, the Sheriff's Office subsequently transported her to the Amtrak station in Milwaukee where she wanted to make her own arrangements to get home.

### Suspicious Situation

The Sheriff's Office has identified the person in regard to the suspicious situation at Ackerman's Grove County Park, located at 4875 County Highway Z in the Town of Polk. Acting on a tip from a citizen who was familiar

with this person, a detective made contact with an 86-year old Town of West Bend man. The caller knew this man had offered candy to children in restaurants in the past, matched the physical description provided and drove a similar vehicle.

The man readily admitted that he was in fact the person in the park and had offered children some candy. It is believed that the man had no bad intentions and has been known to do similar acts of kindness in the past. The man now understands that is not a good idea to do that and will stop. The man has no criminal history; there will be no criminal charges in this matter.

The man was located after a report on May 23. On that date, at 7:20 p.m.,

the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a suspicious situation that occurred at approximately 6:30 p.m. at Ackerman's Park.

Two girls, ages 9 and 11, reported that a red or maroon older model mini-van driven by a male in his 60s or 70s stopped by them and held out candy and asked if they wanted any.

The girls refused and quickly left the area. The vehicle was last seen leaving the park. The driver never exited the car. The girls described the man as having grey hair with several days' growth of facial hair and wearing a brown plaid button-down shirt.

Numerous deputies were dispatched to check the area and other parks in the county.

# Father Zukaitis: St. Kilian's World War II Chaplain

Over the course of the past year, I have been trying to compile what was known about Father Anthony Zukaitis. He was the priest at St. Kilian Catholic Church in St. Kilian from 1964 until he died in January 1971. This is not a cliché: all who I have met and interviewed from the towns of Wayne and Ashford admired the individual.

This article is in honor of Fr. Zukaitis's service in World War II. In fact, he will be honored with the other veterans in St. Kilian Cemetery the Sunday before Memorial Day. The following is his story in the eyes of one parishioner, who wished to be unidentified so that the focus of the article would be on "Zuky." Quotes directly attributed to the priest are second hand. Quotes unattributed in the rest of this article are from the source, who recalls Zukaitis's stories vividly.

## Chaplain At War

Born in 1911, Zukaitis was ordained in 1935. By the 1940s, he was in Europe. It was apparent in talking to locals for a future Zukaitis story that many who admired him were not aware of his service during the Second World War. Perhaps it was an indication of the priest's humility or difficulty in discussing the topic. It also appears he avoided mentioning the war because he didn't want to sound as if he was bragging.


There isn't much left of Fr. Zukaitis but for his World War II chaplain scarf, gravestone and the entrance gate dedicated to him at St. Kilian Cemetery in St. Kilian. But there are the stories of his war time service.

The stories were rarely shared to parishioners of St. Kilian, despite the priest's extraverted personality. It appears that what allowed the priest to reminisce, vent, or reflect on his World War II service required a fellow World War II vet to talk with (a parishioner), who also served in Europe. In general, the priest's service apparently followed the Western Front that extended into Europe as Germany was toppled by April of 1945. What also made the memories come back was often a concoction of a late evening with good drinks, which the priest did not shy away from. These conversations provided a story on a different World War II perspective through the eyes of a chaplain.

## Cards, Powder & Paris

While serving with the young men in the Army, Zukaitis was asked to play card games or dice with the fellow soldiers. "The poor guys.... They were desperate and they had nothing, and time. They saw the same thing over and over, so they played a

lot of snake eyes." And when it was cards, the Army men asked the chaplain to play to be the fourth or fifth guy. Zukaitis knew he was going to win because he was raised in a bar around Superior, WI, where he had been a bouncer for his father's tavern. This avowed gambler knew how to play. So of course he played with the soldiers, and they lost their earnings.



The kicker was what the priest should do with the money he won. There was a sense of guilt having taken advantage of some young soldiers who were bored or scared out of their minds in Europe. If he had turned down the men's offer to play he would have been rude. Now that he won the money, he essentially stole it from the servicemen! And Fr. Zukaitis probably hid the details of his gambling past by Lake Superior. Guilt. Theft. Lies. What was the chaplain to do?

Zukaitis mailed his profits back to mom. During the war, soldiers figured out they had to be careful when mailing money or war goods, as some of the mail processors stole from soldiers. He went to downtown Paris, and he bought that expensive box of powder, then "opened it up, put the money in, then put the powder back in, sealed it up and mailed it home to his mother." The powder really was just a decoy for the money. Zukaitis's friend still wonders, "How he got that (powder box) closed so perfect."

What did mom do with the money? She waited for her priest to come home and saved the cash for him to make the decision on how to spend it. "The money that he won in World War 2 with the soldiers, he did not spend it himself. What he won, he gave to the poor. That's all I know."

## "American" Vs. Priest

One encounter that stands out was the time Zukaitis was deceived. As they worked their way on the Western front, the U.S. Army and the chaplain found an alleged American soldier tied to a tree. Of course, the natural inclination was to get the soldier untied. Zukaitis "had an

entourage out there, they had to protect him because there were not a lot of priests out there."

Luckily that day his entourage was there. What was on the tree was actually a German soldier dressed as an American who had the intentions of stabbing the chaplain. The U.S. soldiers with Zukaitis were going to untie the man from the tree. In fact, "It was a German that had just killed an American and had taken the American uniform off and put it on himself." The German was knife-ready to get Zukaitis. "He could have had that priest so fast. When that priest told me that he said, 'Now I'll have another martini!'"

## Stump Confessions

Zukaitis had a sense of humor. He supposedly joked with the Army men he served with, "I think all of you are living a rough life, so every one of you needs to go to church." Likewise, the soldiers called him "padre" on the battlefield as an endearing and appreciated term.

Many parishioners have verified the priest's light-hearted nature while he was in St. Kilian in the 1960s. But when it came to war, his stories had a mostly serious, somber tone.

One is left to wonder how many last rights Fr. Zukaitis performed during World War II. "And he heard confessions on the stump, in the woods. You know. One after another... he heard confessions, he said he did that... This is old times, you know..."

One can imagine the problems of the soldier. "Men fooling around with those women over there, it was a crime." Then there were the deaths they witnessed, whether Zukaitis himself or those seen by the American soldier who needed to vent to the chaplain. Then there are the psychological problems of "Dear John" letters when soldiers found out their women back home left them.

It wasn't just what Fr. Zukaitis saw in Europe that brings pause — it's also what he heard.

## On Death

Father Zukaitis said, "I walked amongst the dead." He was serious and shared this at a New Year's Day mass where he gave a sermon focusing on the importance and value of death. Before that sermon, he walked St. Kilian Cemetery after a night of celebrating the New Year and the homily sprung forth.

Zukaitis was serious on the importance of walking St. Kilian Cemetery. He said that if you did not know how to answer a morally troubling question, you should go for a walk. He explicitly told the parishioner the importance of a stroll, especially if you didn't know what to do, because the reflection


would sift through the problem. Zukaitis took a bit of his own advice that New Year's Eve night after a late night party when he was in dire need of a sermon for New Year's Day Mass.

He reflected back and forth as he walked the cemetery grounds of St. Kilian in the midnight hours. When asked why that New Year's Day sermon was so good, he said, "I talked to the dead." The parishioner recalled, because "he walked the cemetery, and it was with the earth. You're born, you're raised, and then you live your life and then death comes. See? That was the interesting thing... He could give you the shivers, that priest."

Death, the parishioner said, was the main focus of the sermon. And years later, the message of Fr. Zukaitis's sermon and his wartime stories hang over the conscience. As Father Zukaitis saw it, you are only here a while, "and if you don't see death as we (World War II veterans) saw it, you don't realize what happened. You go to the soldier and you say, 'I can't help you, but I'll give you the last rights.'"

That is death. Mortality is inevitable. "Yea. It is. You know, death,... it's going to happen to you and to everybody and every living creature in this world. And that's what Father said, 'People do not realize the power of death.' Death has power. That means that you are leaving this world, and you are going to the next. He said, 'And what you did will go with you, and you cannot add to it anymore. It's what you do here... You don't always have to be religious, but you have to be kind and you have to be charitable and know the other person, too.' And he said it was hard to see when 'I went to the trenches, and I gave the last sacraments to the dying.' He said it was hard to see, but that was God. He said you just did it because it was your duty to do it."

Death is complex, tragic, necessary and certain. It can also be beautiful for it is humbling. There is wisdom in death. It reminds us of the limited time we have to do good

Fr. Zukaitis said, "I walked out, and I had that roman collar on the battle field." However, just because he had it on didn't mean it was a shield of protection. The job of chaplain in World War II was dangerous. Two decades later, he even gave a St. Kilian parishioner his World War II chaplain scarf, which has the damage to prove the risks he took. "Father gave me that. That's how they almost killed him, the holes in there; he had that around his neck." Whether it was shrapnel or a bullet that missed him, he was lucky to be alive in St. Kilian during the 1960s.

"He gave me a half-hug," Courtney said.

During the morning meeting, the group talked about how to better include people with disabilities in school fitness and nutrition programs.

The fitness leaders also talked about what they would like to offer for the next generation.

"They are trying to see what they can do with electronics," Courtney said. "They are creating a zero-to-60 program where they are going to have it on devices, where you try to work up to getting 60 minutes of activity each day, with a goal for every year."

The hope is to create something similar to a

Fitbit, only with more in-depth information, Courtney said.

The group wanted input from Courtney and the three other students as they made their plans for the future.

"I liked getting to meet all the celebrities and having them actually appreciate what we had to say. It was great knowing they are actually listening instead of just having us there," Courtney said.

"It was a very proud Dad moment, that is for sure," Rick Zarda said.

During the meeting, the group took physical activity breaks, with everyone getting up and doing exercises. One of the people who led the activities was

President Barack Obama's personal trainer.

After having lunch with the council members, Courtney and the other students went to the Department of Agriculture Building for their afternoon meeting to discuss school lunches.

Courtney met with U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack, who she learned is eighth in line to be president.

Courtney also met with Dr. Katie Wilson, who is USDA deputy under secretary for Food, Nutrition and Consumer Services. Coincidentally, Wilson is familiar with Kewaskum because that is where her husband is from.

"She loves Kewaskum Frozen Foods' sausage," Courtney said.

Courtney also met with Kevin Concannon, USDA under secretary for Food, Nutrition, and Consumer Services.

"We talked about the lunches in school, and what we thought about them, and what their plan is in the future," Courtney said.

Currently, the USDA is looking at a five-year plan to try to find the balance between the proportion, size, nutritional benefits and appeal for children.

"They wanted our opinion on the balance between keeping lunches healthy and what kids will actually eat," Courtney said.

Courtney learned about how the Department of Agriculture is promoting the Farm to School program, where schools receive their products directly from local farms.

Courtney shared information about how in Kewaskum, the Fuel Up To Play 60 program works with Piggly Wiggly to offer a Veggie of the Month program.

Through that program, there are vegetable tastings held monthly. Piggly Wiggly highlights the Vegetable of the Month at the store and offers recipes. The vegetable also gets incorporated into the school lunches.

"It has raised vegetable sales incredibly," said Jennifer Zarda, Courtney's mother.

In fact, some vegetables saw an increase in sales upwards of 900 percent, according to Jeff Grotenhuis, physical education teacher at Kewaskum Middle School.

While in Washington, Courtney also shared how last year her main goal was to get more Kewaskum students to eat breakfast.

"We did a survey and found that not a lot of people were eating it because they didn't have time, were too lazy or didn't have the money," Courtney said. "Now we offer a la cart after first hour and breakfast during the beginning of school so students can come in before school and grab breakfast."

Those efforts have dramatically increased the

number of students eating breakfast, Courtney said.

Courtney did glean one idea that she would like to bring back to Kewaskum schools. She learned that at some schools across the nation, breakfast is served by students.

"I thought that was cool," Courtney said. "The students get to create what they want to serve to the other kids because they know more of what kids like to eat. It makes it more appealing to other students."

Courtney has been involved with the Fuel Up to Play 60 over the past few years at Kewaskum Middle School. She attended national summits

for Fuel Up to Play 60 in Dallas and Chicago and did her own fundraising for those events.

"Courtney leads through her words and her actions. She talks the talk and gets students excited about exercise and healthy eating. She has been involved with planning some neat events at KMS, including our Spooky Run and Ugly Sweater Run last school year," Grotenhuis said. "She has been a remarkable student leader and has a bright future ahead of her."

Since last fall, Courtney has been one of 10 middle and high school students from across the nation that serve on the Presidential

Council for Youth.

The group participates in conference phone calls once or twice a month. Each of the students is given assignments to do surveys and research to improve nutrition and fitness programs in schools.

Of that group of students, four were chosen to go on the recent trip to Washington, D.C. The other three students were from New Jersey, New Hampshire and Colorado.

"I am extremely grateful for the honor of going," Courtney said. "I was excited to share all the hard work we have been doing at our school."

# Continued From... Area Veteran Goes On Honor Flight

Herriges remembers throwing potatoes in a bucket for a machine to peel.

"The machine took more than the skin off, it took off a lot of the meat. I didn't like that too much," Herriges said.

Still, the potato machine was better than the alternative.

"If you didn't behave yourself, then you had to peel the potatoes by hand. I never had to do that," Herriges said gratefully.

At Christmastime, the soldiers held a contest to see who had the best holiday decorations. Prizes were an extra night off base or maybe a couple beers, he said.

"We built a fireplace, had a nice wreath over the fireplace. There were candles and a Christmas tree," Herriges said.

He and his bunkmates won second place in the contest.

When Herriges and his fellow soldiers completed their two-year tour in the Philippines, they were excited to board a transport ship back to the United States. But when they saw the ship, they stopped in their tracks.

It was the USS General D. E. Aultman, the same ship that they were told was ending its career two years before.

"Holy cow, I hope we make it," Herriges said.

### Honor Flight

"The Honor Flight was absolutely marvelous," said Lynelle Morse, Herriges' daughter who accompanied him on the trip. "They do such a great job of putting all this together."

With a police escort, the veterans toured Washington, D.C. Highlights were the Lincoln Memorial, the Korean War Memorial, the World War II Memorial, the Franklin Delano Roosevelt Memorial and Arlington Cemetery.

For the most part, the weather was good, until the group arrived at the Marine Corps War Memorial of Iwo Jima. There, the skies opened up, and it started pouring. Herriges was the only veteran who got out of the bus at that stop.

Herriges held an umbrella as he sat in a wheelchair in front of the memorial.

"I had a poncho on, and it went down past my knees. The rest of the water ran into my shoes," Herriges said.

Herriges had been to Washington, D.C., once before, about 61 years ago.

"It has changed a heck of a lot since then," he said.

Herriges was not the only veteran from the

Kewaskum area on the Honor Flight. Dr. Charles Ogi, a retired veterinarian who served in World War II, also went on the trip. The two Kewaskum veterans, who have known each other for decades, sat near each other throughout the tour.

"It was a trip that you will never forget," Herriges said.

### Family Life

Herriges grew up on the property where St. Michael's is now located, just east of Kewaskum.

Herriges had nine brothers and four sisters. Herriges, along with five of his brothers, all served during the Korean War. Herriges was the only one to serve in the Marines.

Jerome, Clemence and Gerald were drafted into the Army, while Francis and Ray served in the Navy.

Before serving in the military, Herriges worked at the West Bend Company. He returned to work there for a couple more years after serving in the Philippines.

Over the next 47 years, Herriges worked in the heating and air conditioning business. For the first 27 years, he worked for Marvin Johann Plumbing and Heating, and then went into business for himself for the next two decades.

Herriges and his wife Joyce have been married for 61 years. They had five children: Jim, Gayla, Lynelle, Tom and Jeanine. They have two grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

# Great Efforts In Sectional = Trips To State

– Hanson, Debelak, Brock, Watzig, Lepp Make Elite Field

Seniors Ellie Debelak, Jason Hanson, Ben Watzig and Krystina Lepp will all be making return trips to the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA) State Track and Field Meet this weekend, and junior Derreck Brock punched his first ticket for the prime time Division 2 show with a personal record during the powerhouse sectional hosted by East Troy on May 26.

Debelak had qualified for the sectional in four events, and finished among the top four —only the top four finishers automatically advance to La Crosse from the four D-2 sectionals — in the open 400. She turned in a time of 59 and .12 seconds (59.12), which was good for second place behind Davis Collison of University School of Milwaukee, who hit the tape in a very fast 58.44.

"She had a phenomenal night," KHS coach Kris Evans said. "It doesn't surprise me" because of how hard she worked, especially after she missed the first five weeks of the season with an injury.

Debelak turned in a 1:01 in the regional, so she cut two seconds off that time in just a couple days, and that comes on an afternoon when the talented season started off with the long jump, then ran the 200 qualifying, the open 400, then the 200 finals and finally the 4x400 relay.

"The event she really shines in is the 400," Evans said, looking at the fact Debelak was not able to advance in the long jump (13th with a jump of 15-0), 200 (fifth in 26.44) and 4x400 (11th in 4:19.72) but still was very good in all of them.

Debelak, who will run in the second heat of the event in Friday's prelims, has the fifth best time from the sectional.

For Hanson, this will be trip number three to La Crosse and the state competition, and he will be going in the high jump and also the 800. Hanson cleared 6-6 to win the high jump where he is unbeaten on the year. He had cleared 6-08 and 6-07 earlier this season.

"He stepped up in the 800," Evans said, reporting

Hanson had been running between 2:02 and 2:05, and "then he busts out with a 1:59.3 for third place. I was so happy to be able to tell him at the finish line he had a new school record." The old mark was 1:59.44.

Hanson also anchored the 4x400, but that unit (Brock, Jake Hrica and Cade Peterson) had to settle for sixth in 3:31.93. "We're running a 3:30 and some teams are running 3:23 and 3:24," Evans said. "That event was very competitive."

It looks as if the battle for the state high jump crown will come down to Hanson or Ben Gucinski of Fox Valley Lutheran, who has cleared 6-08 several times this season, including the Little Chute Sectional. "I look forward to seeing what he (Hanson) can do at state," Evans said.

Watzig was "a little off" in the discus, according to Evans, who said his 143-06 was good for seventh place. "He ended up pulling it off in shot put," however, with a personal best 50-02, good for third place.

Brock's emotions at the meet went from low to high in a big way. After placing ninth in the 110 high hurdles (16.32) and not making the finals, he regrouped and ran a sizzling 39.96 in the 300 lows, good for third place and a trip to state.

Evans said the 39.96 is another school record, and since he is a junior, Brock still has another year of

competition to better that mark. "I'm very excited he'll be back next year," the coach said.

Lepp is an extra qualifier in the high jump. She cleared five feet, two inches (5-02), her best this year, but had to settle for fifth place, based on misses among the three girls who made that height. Lepp's disappointment of not being in the top four turned into joy when she learned her effort was among the top eight.

"That was kind of a surprise for us," Evans said, one he is happy about.

There were also disappointments, like senior Emily Krier missing advancing by .01 of a second in the 1,600. "That just broke my heart," Evans said, reporting he was at the finish line and couldn't tell who crossed the line first for the fourth and final spot. It was awarded to Grafton's Julia Wille, 5:26.53 to 5:26.54.

# Indians Open North Shore Play With 7-0 Victory

– Prochnow's Homer Seals The Deal

Multi-talented Michael Prochnow did everything he could to make Kewaskum High's debut in the North Shore Conference a memorable one.

Prochnow allowed just one hit in the five innings he pitched, and offensively he hit a single, double and two-run home run in leading the Indians to an impressive 7-0 shutout over the host Cedarburg Bulldogs.

"He (Prochnow) played a good game. He pitched a good game ... only had 50 pitches in five innings," veteran KHS coach Doug Gonring said afterward, adding the majority were strikes, and "That's the name of the game, throwing strikes" and getting ahead in the count. "It makes it so much easier on the defense."

Prochnow faced just 10 batters in the first three innings. The only hit he gave up with a single to right fielder Kyle Murphy.

In the meantime, the Indians used four hits and a Bulldog error to score five big runs in the top of the second. CHS starter Kyle Jansen got the first batter, Cole Surprenant, to strike out and it looked like he had strikeout number two when Noah Bentz missed on a third strike swing. The catcher had trouble finding the ball, however, and by the time he did, Bentz was safely at first. He didn't stay there long as Devyn Zillmer blasted the first pitch he saw for a double to left-center, putting runners at second and third.

The first RBI of the game went to Jared Chesak, who singled in a run, and then Ryan

Prochnow's grounder to the pitcher was mishandled, loading the bases.

After Dalton Poole hit an infield fly for the second out, Zach Heberer came through in a big way with a two-run double, and Prochnow followed with an RBI single.

Two innings later, Prochnow gave the Indians a couple insurance runs when he homered over the left field fence, scoring his younger brother who reached on an error.

Kewaskum did not have a single home run last season. "No one," Gonring said, happy the Indians have broke the ice with one in their first three games.

Prochnow said he didn't even get to see the ball clear the fence. "I just thought it was a pop out," he said. "Then I heard the crowd cheering, and I knew it was a homer."

When asked about the pitch Jansen threw to him —and it was his last of the game — Prochnow said, "It was just a middle in fast ball." It was also Prochnow's first home run in high school. "The first one since eighth grade," he beamed.

Surprenant finished up the final two innings for the Indians. He gave up two hits in the sixth, but with runners at first and second, got the final out when Jordan Grimm popped out to Brent Goeden in short right field.

In the seventh, Surprenant recorded strikeouts number three and four to preserve the shutout.

Gonring was delighted to get the win, saying he realizes there are questions by some about KHS playing in the North Shore

but is excited about the new challenge. "We put nine guys on the field, and they put nine guys on the field," he said. "This was a great night for us."

The coach was also excited about finally getting home for a game after three road games, but that didn't happen as Whitefish Bay and Kewaskum exchanged sites for Friday's game because Bay has an artificial surface.

### – Indian Golfers Have Their Eyes On A Trip To State

After winning the D-2 golf regional tournament held at the Rolling Meadows Golf Course, the Kewaskum High golf team has given Sheboygan Falls and Waukesha Catholic Memorial teams something to think about.

The Falcons and Crusaders have qualified for the state tournament the past three seasons — Catholic Memorial won the title in 2013 and '14 — and are among the favorites for making a return trip this year, but the Indians have certainly shown they are a power, too.

Kewaskum shot a 318 total at Fond du Lac on May 24 to finish seven shots ahead of

Sheboygan Falls, and consistent scoring was definitely the key.

None of the Indians finished among the top three, but the Indians had Sam Schlosser in the number five spot with his five-over-par 77 (40-37), while Jacob Schlosser and Sean Murray were tied for sixth place at 80 and Andrew Otto was the final counter with a 81.

The Indians only had two sevens on their cards the entire day, with many threes and fours and even a deuce by Jacob Schlosser on number three.

Chris Colla of the host Winnebago Lutheran Academy team captured the medal with a one-under-par 71, which

included a 37 on the front nine and a 34 on the back. Matt Bachmann and Tyler Beeck of Sheboygan Falls were second and third, respectively, with 73 and 76.

Where Sheboygan Falls stumbled was at number four where they had to count a 94.

When the Indians went over to play a practice round on May 26, a lot of the Falls players were there, and, "They weren't as confident they were going to be back at state," KHS coach Glenn Eichstedt said, noting, "Their number four and five are a little shaky."

As far as the Crusaders are concerned, they have not been consistent, according to Eichstedt, who said, Memorial has had a 313 but has also been in the 330s. "I just think they are not as strong as they have been in the past."

Eichstedt is confident in his senior group, saying, "If we just don't make poor

decisions, we feel like we can be in position to compete with anybody."

The stage was now set for a showdown at The Bull at Pinehurst Farms in Sheboygan Falls for the D-2 sectional tournament on May 31. There the top two teams and top three individuals from non-qualifying teams will advance to the state tournament, which will be held at the University Ridge Golf Course on June 6-7.

Kewaskum was slated to be among the last groups to tee off. They will be paired with players from Catholic Memorial and University School of Milwaukee.

# 2016 SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS

**Emily Krier** received Walter Bade Memorial Scholarship for \$2,000 (\$1,000/year). The scholarship was recently established by Walter Bade's family. Bade was part of the greatest generation who served in the US Army in the Pacific Theater and received a purple heart during World War II. A UW-Madison graduate, he coached numerous sports and taught science at Kewaskum High School for 39 years. He dedicated his life to education helping thousands of students and athletes. He and his wife, Phyllis, raised 5 children who all graduated from KHS.

**Max Read** received KHS Class of 2015 for \$1,200. The scholarship was offered for a student with a 3.0 GPA and involvement in KHS activities.

**Laura Weishan** received the Tessar Scholarship, a four-year college scholarship worth \$16,000 (\$4,000/year) was first awarded in 2000. The money for this endowment scholarship was provided by Wayland and Darlene Tessar.

**Meghan Luedtke** received the Oscar C. and Augusta Schlegel Foundation Scholarship worth \$12,000 (\$3,000/year over four years) is provided by the Schlegel Foundation out of West Bend. The first Schlegel Foundation Scholarship for \$4,000 was awarded in 1990.
