Kewaskum School Board To Convene In July For Retreat, Meeting

According to a survey that residents filled out in May, the community supports improving the high school and middle school facilities, but a price tag of \$32.2 million is too expensive, said Bill Foster of School Perceptions, the organization that conducted the survey.

Based on the survey results, Bray Architects pared down the plans for the areas that had the least support, cutting 33 percent of the project cost, lowering the overall cost to approximately \$28 million.

This would lower the projected tax rate from 77 cents to 48 cents on \$100,000 worth of property value. An article in last week's paper incorrectly stated that this would lower the projected tax

It will be up to the school board to decide whether the community goes to referendum.

The Kewaskum School Board gathers next on July 11 for a retreat, at which the district's administrative team will present this year's strategic plan to board members.

The board will meet again the following week, on July 18, when board members are expected to discuss the Long Range Planning Committee's recommendation to go to referendum to finance a \$28 million project to improve the high school and middle school facilities.

The school board is expected to vote on whether the community will go to referendum at its Aug. 8 meeting.

Former World War II Paratrooper Honored On Flight

— Local World War II Veteran Goes On Honor Flight

As a senior airman in the Air Force Reserves, Noah Murphy has received many honors.

But one of the greatest honors so far has been accompanying his grandfather, Donald Kurer, on an Honor Flight to Washington, D.C. on June 11.

"I'm really glad to be able to go with him," Murphy said after driving to the Kewaskum area from his home in Indiana.

On the Honor Flight, which brings World War II and Korean War veterans to Washington, D.C., the two toured the nation's capital, with stops at the various war memorials and at Arlington Cemetery.

One of the highlights was the flight itself.

"We had mail call on the plane. I got a lot of cards," said Kurer, who is a World War II veteran.

Kurer, 89, was especial-

ly amazed by the reception he received on the trip.

"It was a lot more than I expected, both coming and going," Kurer said.

Becoming A Paratrooper

When Kurer was 18, after graduating from high school, he was drafted to serve in World War II. He was called into the induction center, where he got in line.

"What do you want? Army or Navy?" the sergeant at the desk asked Kurer.

"Navy," Kurer answered. "Congratulations, you are in the Army," the sergeant said to Kurer.

Kurer was sent to Fort Hood, Texas, for the Army's basic infantry training. While there, Kurer volunteered to become a paratrooper. He then went through paratrooper training at Fort Benning, Georgia.

Paratrooper training entailed jumping off a 30-foot-tall wooden tower.

"They had to land a certain way, like landing on their hip and rolling to protect their ankles and legs," said Kurer's son, Cam Kurer.

Once they had mastered that tower, the novice paratroopers graduated to jumping from a 250-foot tower that had four long arms extending from the top of it. Four paratroopers would dangle off that tower, one from each of the arms.

"You are rigged up there, and your chute is open," Kurer said.

A man stood at the top of the tower and directed paratroopers to turn left or right, and they practiced steering their chutes.

Finally, when they were deemed ready, the paratroopers would board an airplane and go on a real jump.

Kurer said the secret to

jumping was to not think too much about what you were doing.

Kewaskum Village Suspends Impact Fee Collection

The Kewaskum Village Board voted on Monday, June 20, to suspend collection of impact fees from July 9 through July 8, 2017.

This will add another year that the village has waived impact fees for building permits for industrial, commercial and residential construction. The village has not collected impact fees for the past several years.

"This has become an annual process by the board. In the past it has been viewed by the board to be an incentive to spur construction," Village Administrator Matt Heiser said.

The village has had some positive results, Heiser said.

New construction is currently going on in the village's three newest subdivisions, Heiser said.

One of the local developers, Donald Weyer, said that if the fees were collected, there would be a negative impact on new construction.

Weyer currently has four houses going up in Nature Haven subdivision, and hopes to have eight by the end of the year.

If impact fees were collected, Weyer said that he would need to make adjustments, such as constructing two-car garages instead of three-car garages.

"And people want to have three-car garages," he said. "With this tough economy, ...every dollar counts when you are building a house."

However, the loss of income from the impact fees is hurting the sewer utility budget.

"The sewer and water are truly being affected by this, yet the positive gain is going to the general fund only," said Ben Propson, lead plant operator for the village's wastewater treatment plant. "One thing that I would like to see if this continues to pursue in future years...is we check into sharing some of that burden with the general fund in future years."

Work To Begin On County Trunk Highway D Bridge Over Kohlsville River

The bridge over the Kohlsville River on County Trunk Highway (CTH) D approximately one quarter mile east of Kohlsville in the Town of Wayne will be reconstructed and is planned to be completely closed to all traffic beginning Tuesday, July 5 through Friday, September 2. Traffic will be detoured

onto CTH WW, State Highway 33, and United States Highway 45.

The project involves fully reconstructing the bridge and roadway approaches. Radtke Contractors Incorporated will do the work under contract with the Washington County Highway Department.

KEWASKUM VILLAGE POLICE DEPT REPORTS

Marijuana Possession

The person who lied to the officer was also on probation; therefore, a probation hold was placed on the offender and he was transported to the Washington County Jail.

WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

Injury Crash

On June 19 at 3:56 p.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a two-vehicle crash, with injuries, on County Highway K at Shamrock Lane in the Town of Erin. Sheriff's deputies and rescue personnel from the Hartford Fire Department were subsequently dispatched to the scene.

An on-scene investigation revealed that a motorcycle operated by a male driver and female passenger, was northbound on County K approaching Shamrock Lane. When the operator of the motorcycle slowed to initiate a righthand turn onto Shamrock Lane, a male driver was northbound in an automobile and struck the slowing motorcycle.

The impact caused both the motorcycle driver and passenger to be ejected from the motorcycle. Both driver and passenger of the motorcycle suffered serious injury.

The male driver was transported from the scene to Froedtert Hospital via Flight for Life. The female passenger

was taken to Summit Hospital via Hartford Rescue Ambulance. The operator of the automobile was not injured.

County Highway K between Donegal Road and 0.5 mile south of Shamrock Lane was closed for approximately four hours to facilitate rescue, investigative and clean-up efforts. The

Washington County Sheriff's Office accident reconstruction team responded to investigate the serious injury crash.

At this time, driver impairment and speed do not appear to be contributing factors. However, the accident remains under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

WAIST SIZE MATTERS

Having excess weight around the middle boosts the risk of premature death even for people who are in the normal weight range. A new study analyzed data on 15,000 adults over 14 years. Researchers found that normal-weight males with excess fat around the middle had an 87% increased risk of death during the study period compared to normal-weight men without excess belly fat. Normal-weight women with more belly fat were 50% more likely to die during the study than their smaller-waisted counterparts. Belly fat has been linked to inflammation, high cholesterol, heart disease, stroke and diabetes.

Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources staff will be on hand to help guide participants and point out wildlife, food chains and ecosystems of the marsh as they venture downstream. The paddle begins at the Green Head Boat Landing and will conclude at the Nebraska St. Landing in Horicon.

DNR staff will help load and unload any vessels and give short presentations regarding wildlife in the marsh at various waypoints along the canoe

Continued From... Former World War II Paratrooper Honored On Flight

"You just got to keep numb. You can't worry about it," Kurer said.

Kurer remembers a man named Kelly who was sitting next to him during a practice night jump. Kelly was feeling anxious about jumping out of the plane.

"I'm not going to jump, are you?" Kelly asked Kurer.

Kurer knew that if he didn't jump one time, then he would have to retake the entire course.

"I never knew if he jumped or not," Kurer said. "But I jumped."

Serving In The Philippines

Kurer was sent to the Philippines to serve with the 11th Airborne Division, the only paratrooper division in the South Pacific during World War II.

He was stationed on the island of Luzon, and spent some time on Corregidor, where Americans had previously been defeated by the Japanese in the Battle of Corregidor.

"Corregidor was just a big mountain rock, there was not much to it. There was a big building at the top, and they had a lot of tunnels built in there," Kurer said.

There were pillboxes, which are concrete guard posts, all over the island. Kurer found a Japanese flag near one of the pillboxes, and has saved it with

other relics from the war.

Kurer's collection also includes part of a parachute that was on the island, as well as a ripcord from a reserve parachute.

Kurer, as well as the other members of his unit, were considered liberators, and they each received a Philippine liberation ribbon.

While in the Philippines, Kurer prepared to invade Japan. The plan was for Kurer and other U.S. soldiers to go behind enemy lines.

But while Kurer was training, the U.S. dropped two atomic bombs into Japan, and the Japanese surrendered.

Kurer was then placed in the 221st Airborne Medical Company and sent into Japan as part of the occupation.

Kurer never jumped in the Philippines, but he did jump in Japan.

Kurer said he never had a desire to go parachuting or skydiving again after completing his military service.

"I never jumped after. I dreamt about it, but I never did it," he said.

Family

Kurer had four brothers, all of whom served in either World War II or the Korean War.

Four of the Kurer boys were drafted to serve in World War II: Victor was in the Marines; Clarence was

in the Marines; John was in the Army; and Donald was in the Army.

The youngest, Bill, enlisted in the Army during the Korean War.

When Kurer returned to the United States, he used the G.I. bill and attended the University of Wisconsin-Madison, where he earned a degree in agronomy.

Kurer met his wife, Dorothy, while going to college.

"He was friends with my brother," Dorothy said, who vividly remembers meeting Kurer when he came to her house the first time.

That was in 1948, and the couple married two years later, in 1950.

Kurer eventually got a job as a soil scientist with the USDA's Soil Conservation Service. Kurer and his family moved around Wisconsin as he completed soil surveys for about seven years.

Kurer worked his way up to becoming a district conservationist, heading up the soil water program for Washington County.

"I would help the farmers with their land use planning, conservation practices and so forth," Kurer said.

Kurer and his wife had four children (Dave Kurer, Cam Curer, Gary Kurer and Sharon Murphy), 12 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

163 Local Education Agencies To Receive High Cost Special Education Aid

School districts across the state received High Cost Special Education Aid payments on June 20 to reimburse a portion of the costs associated with teaching students with significant disability-related needs.

The Kewaskum School District is receiving \$24,438.

The aid to be paid to 162 school districts and one County Children with Disabilities Education Board (CCDEB) totals \$5,754,103 for 951 students. Eligible costs are 70 percent of an individual student's actual, additional costs above \$30,000 not covered by other state and federal special education funding sources. Claims, based on services to students in the 2014-15 school year, were \$8,850,589, which required prorating aid at 65 percent of eligible costs.

Examples of required services eligible for High Cost Special Education Aid include paraprofessional support, attendant care, or an educational interpreter. Other types of eligible costs include providing an extended school year, orientation and mobility training, specialized transportation, tuition for placements, or specialized programming or equipment that would not

be needed if the student left the district.

"Every child is entitled to a free appropriate public education," said State Superintendent Tony Evers. "High Cost Special Education Aid provides welcome support to districts and allows them to better serve students with extraordinary needs."

High Cost Special Education Aid this year is made up of \$3.5 million in state funding and \$2.25 million in federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) discretionary funds that Evers allocated to this purpose.

The separate funding stream for High Cost Special Education Aid started in the 2003-04 fiscal year with the allocation of \$2 million in federal IDEA discretionary funds. The 2006-07 fiscal year was the first in which state funds were budgeted to provide aid for students with high-cost special education needs. The 2015-17 state budget reduced the portion of a student's costs above \$30,000 that was eligible for reimbursement from 90 percent to 70 percent. The biennial budget also included an additional \$5 million for payments that will be available for claims submitted in the 2016-17 school year.

Kiwanis Park's Tennis Court To Serve As Tennis And Basketball Court

One of the four tennis courts at Kiwanis Park will become a basketball court during the summer months, while remaining a tennis court the remainder of the year.

On Monday, June 20, the Kewaskum Village Board approved bringing portable basketball hoops onto the tennis court during the high school tennis teams' off-seasons.

The board had been considering a proposal to permanently convert the tennis court that is located furthest west into a basketball court. That idea was not well received by tennis enthusiasts.

"If we took a court out, it would be a detriment to not only the JV and varsity tennis leagues, but it would also be a detriment to the community," Village

Trustee Jim Wright said.

The issue originally arose because there is no lit basketball court at Kiwanis Park, which is open until 11 p.m.

"We feel that we should at least have that opportunity to have that basketball court in use [until 11 p.m.], just like the softball diamonds are, just like the tennis courts are, or any other activity that our youth can utilize," village resident Chad Cook said.

After initially meeting with the park and recreation committee about the issue, Cook met with Jason Piittmann, athletic director for Kewaskum Schools. Together, they came up with the idea of creating a convertible tennis/basketball court.

"I think that's a great idea because it allows flexibility," Village Trustee Jim Hovland said.

The plan is now to remove the tennis net from the court once the high school boys tennis season has ended in the spring, and will go back up when the girls tennis team begins practicing in August.

Portable basketball hoops would then be moved onto the court.

Weighing in at 600 pounds each, the portable hoops are built to be used safely for recreational use, Piittmann said.

If the tennis court is needed during the summer because of a competition, the space could be converted back into a tennis court, Cook said.

During the winter months, the Kewaskum Athletic Association has agreed to store the basketball hoops in its new storage space, Cook said.

\$18 Million Awarded To Local Units Of Government To Assist With Recycling Program Operations

Nearly \$18 million in Basic Recycling Grants have been awarded to 1,024 local governments to offset some costs associated with local recycling program operations during calendar year 2016.

A statutory formula determines each grant award amount. Additionally, 193 of these local governments also qualified for 2016 Recycling Consolidation Grants calculated at 26 cents per person.

Area municipalities receiving grants were Town of Ashford-\$1,231.08, Town of Auburn, \$7,336.10, Town of Osceola-\$1,602.45, Town of Scott-\$3,057.29, Town of Barton-\$2,831.52, Town of Farmington-\$5,991.34,

Town of Kewaskum-\$6,406.18, Town of Wayne-\$4,661.35, and Village of Kewaskum-\$9,468.19.

Basic Recycling Grant awards are made to cities, towns, villages, counties, tribes or solid waste management organizations, for residential recycling and yard waste program costs that are necessary for planning and operating an effective recycling program.

Recycling Consolidation Grants provide supplemental assistance to local governments that meet additional criteria.

Recycling grant payment checks were issued on May 27, 2016. Award notification letters informing local governments of the amount of its award

were sent via email on May 27. Local units of government that have not provided an email address will receive their letter via U.S. Postal Service.

Kewaskum Public Library Moves Toward Becoming Part Of Larger Consortium

The Kewaskum Public Library is moving closer to becoming part of a larger library system.

"The good thing about this is our patrons will be able to get far more books just by going to their local library," said Mugs McFadden, library board president.

The library would be part of a new system that is being formed by the merger of the Mid-Wisconsin Federation Library System and the Eastern Shores Library System. The largest library in the conglomeration is in Sheboygan, which will house the reserve library.

Representatives from the two systems started meeting twice a week in January. Their goal is to complete the merger by the end of the year, McFadden said.

The new system will

help the Kewaskum Library financially because it will be able to split the cost of expenses such as a new software program with 15 more libraries in the system.

"That gives us a little extra money to buy materials and also do programs," McFadden said.

Before the merger is completed, it must be approved by the Washington County Library Services Board which will vote on the issue on July 6. It will then go to the Washington County Board for approval.

The Dodge, Ozaukee and Sheboygan county boards also must approve the merger, McFadden said.

Finally, after each of the counties gives a go-ahead to the merger, the state has to approve it before it will be complete.

At that point, each individual library will decide

whether it wants to be part of the new system.

"Kewaskum is going to vote positively because we think it is a good thing," McFadden said.

The two library systems have already agreed to purchase a van to deliver books. Additionally, the library building in Horicon will be sold, which will help cover the remaining balance of a seven-year lease for a library building in Sheboygan, McFadden said.

Because of its central location, Kewaskum may possibly become the head office for the new library system.

"That is a few years down the road because of the huge buyout that they would have in Sheboygan for their lease, but they are looking very much so at Kewaskum as a place where it could be," McFadden said.

Reflecting on Memorial Day and looking forward to Independence Day, we should reflect on the sacrifices made for our freedom. As an airline captain during 9/11 and military veteran, I feel compelled to share a story I read in the *Washington Post* that brought tears to my eyes.

In the fall of 2001, Heather Penney, a rookie, was the first female F-16 pilot the 121st Fighter Squadron in D.C. ever had. The squadron had just finished two weeks of air combat training and was sitting in the briefing room when

someone announced that a plane had hit the World Trade Center. A few minutes later, the Pentagon was hit and a fourth plane was reported to be on the way. Nothing was prepped and the jets were still equipped with dummy ammo. Weapons or not, somebody had to fly — and now.

It was decided that Penney would fly with Col. Sasseville. As they scrambled to suit up, Sasseville volunteered for the cockpit. Without hesitating, Penney agreed to take the tail. Doing away with the usual half hour of preflight checks and with the crew chief still scrambling to pull the safety pins, she powered up the engines. They took off to the northwest, flew over the Pentagon and scan-

ned the sky.

During the flight, they contemplated the mission. Thoughts of how to ram the jet without allowing it to hit a target were racing through their minds. Penney later reflected that the thought of failure was worse than the thought of a kamikaze mission.

However, thanks to brave passengers willing to give all for their country, they didn't have to take out the airliner. Penney and Col. Sasseville were able to return to their families after learning United Airlines flight 93 crashed in Pennsylvania.

God bless all who have served and are serving to ensure that we continue to live in the greatest country on earth.

Since 1933, ham radio operators across North America have established temporary ham radio stations in public locations during Field Day to showcase the science and skill of Amateur Radio. This event is open to the public and all are encouraged to attend at the address listed above.

For over 100 years, Amateur Radio (sometimes called ham radio) has allowed people from all walks of life to experiment with electronics and communications techniques, as well as provide a free public service to their communities during a disaster, all without need-

ing a cell phone or the internet. Field Day demonstrates ham radio's ability to work reliably under any conditions from almost any location and create an independent communications network. Over 35,000 people from thousands of locations participated in Field Day in 2015.

"It's easy for anyone to pick up a computer or smartphone, connect to the internet and communicate, with no knowledge of how the devices function or connect to each other," said Sean Kutzko of the American Radio Relay League, the national association for Amateur Radio. "But if there's an interruption of service or you're out of range of a cell tower, you have no way to communicate. Ham radio functions completely independent of the internet or cell phone

infrastructure, can interface with tablets or smartphones, and can be set up almost anywhere in minutes. That's the beauty of Amateur Radio during a communications outage."

"Hams can literally throw a wire in a tree for an antenna, connect it to a battery-powered transmitter and communicate halfway around the world," Kutzko added. "In today's electronic do-it-yourself (DIY) environment, ham radio remains one of the best ways for people to learn about electronics, physics, meteorology, and numerous other scientific disciplines, and is a huge asset to any community during disasters if the standard communication infrastructure goes down."

Anyone may become a licensed Amateur Radio operator. There are over 725,000 licensed hams in the United States, as young as five and as old as 100. With clubs like Old Guys ARC, it's easy for anybody to get involved right here in the greater Campbellsport area.

Chief's Corner

With the increased following of 24-hour multi-media news cycles and various police "watchdog" groups, there seems to be a greater wish to make a big deal out of officer-involved shootings where an individual was believed to be unarmed. There exists a notion that someone who is unarmed is not, or could not, be a lethal threat.

We have seen this narrative play out in various locations around the country. An officer locates a suspect matching the description of a recent theft from a gas station. The suspect fails to listen to the officer's commands and engages in a struggle with the officer – the results turn fatal. This sounds a lot like what occurred in Ferguson, Mo., in 2014. That incident sparked riots, debates and a movement called "Hands Up- Don't Shoot." Sadly, the scenario I just described is actually what occurred on May 28, 2016, in Appleton.

The 1 1/2 year veteran of the Appleton Police Department, Officer Stephanie Wiener, located a suspect matching the description of an individual who just stole cigarettes from two convenience stores. Shoplifting is a fairly common crime investigated by law enforcement and generally ends in a citation being issued. This unarmed individual did not listen to the verbal commands that Officer Wiener gave him; instead, he decided to physically fight with the officer. The struggle for her firearm was a violent one and one that the officer could not lose; however, Officer Wiener did lose the struggle and the suspect gained control of her department-issued firearm and shot her. He then shot a citizen who was attempting to aid the officer. He then shot and killed himself.

This case will not be publicized or scrutinized on TV and/or social media outlets to the extent some cases have been in the past, mainly because in this case the officer was shot first. Unfortunately, in the court of public opinion, it seems

that the only way officers are allowed to defend themselves is by being shot first. Had Officer Wiener regained control of her weapon prior to her assailant, then shot and killed the suspect, I entirely believe that the media circus would've begun immediately. The headlines most likely would have read something similar to, "Officer Murders Unarmed Shoplifter." Some of the main stream media and "Monday morning quarterbacks" on the internet also seem to have the belief that someone who commits a non-violent crime is always a non-violent person.

I am also sure discussions would have erupted wondering why the officer didn't use her taser or some other kind of less lethal method to control the subject. Or like they see on TV and in the movies, just shoot him in the leg or shoulder to wound him, but not to kill him. Officers are not taught to shoot to kill or shoot to wound, we are trained to shoot to stop the threat. Basic common sense indicates that being shot anywhere on a person's body has the potential to be fatal.

Here's the bottom line – I have a family that I will try to go home to see at the end of every shift. If someone starts to physically fight with me, especially if they are trying to gain control of my duty weapon, I can, and very well may, have to use deadly force against that person. As far as I am concerned, this person is only fighting with me for one reason, and that is to end my life. I shouldn't have to wait to see if they are going to shoot me first before defending myself. If the subject is attempting to or is actually striking me in the face or head, then deadly force may be my only option to stop the threat. One must understand that even one strike to the face or head can leave a person unable to protect himself or herself.

Unfortunately in the society we currently live in, officers protecting themselves are immediately considered guilty by many, even though those

particular individuals have no idea what truly transpired to get to that point. What all too commonly shows up on a cellphone video is only a brief snapshot of the incident.

Circumstances can change extremely rapidly. What seems like a simple routine encounter can very quickly become life threatening, as Officer Wiener experienced first hand. This can happen anywhere, anytime and even here in Kewaskum. I will often hear from residents "good thing you work here, where that will never happen." The citizen may believe that, but rest assured, as officers, we can't be that confident. We have to always be vigilant that even the simplest of calls can turn serious in an instant.

We have a great community with respectful residents, but that doesn't mean that our officers should completely let their guard down – especially on something such as a traffic stop. Some residents that have experienced this told me they feel like they were treated like a "criminal." I understand what they are saying, but you need to realize that when we stop a car we don't know who is in the car, especially at night. If you try to open the door and get out, you will be ordered back into the car and the officer may not say "please" at that very moment. Please understand that it is all about our safety and yours. We have a dangerous job to do – even here in Kewaskum – and our goal is to go home each and every day.

Thankfully, Officer Wiener and the citizen hero who stopped to assist her are going to recover from their wounds. Sadly for the family of the suspect, he decided to take his own life that day.

The call that started as a "routine" shoplifting complaint ended with a police officer shot in the waist, a citizen shot in the chest and another person dead...and the suspect was unarmed.

Indians Struggle In Game Against NS Powers

Playing in the tough North Shore Conference with just three seniors has not been an easy task for the Kewaskum High baseball team. The Indians stumbled a bit the past week, going 1-3 against some of the top teams in the league, ending with a 16-6 defeat on June 17 at the hands of the host Grafton Blackhawks (12-4), who are currently ranked seventh in the summer baseball power rankings.

Playing in their fourth game in five days, the Indians held a 5-4 lead after three innings, then starter Andrew Neu couldn't get past one out in the fourth. In the next innings, John May gave up four runs, Zach Heberer gave up five runs and the Hawks rolled to the 10-run victory. Five errors also aided the winners.

"The beating we took last night was just education," KHS coach Doug Gonring said. "Sometimes things happen for a reason."

Kewaskum scored single runs in the first and fourth and added two runs in both the second and third frames for a 6-4 advantage, but Grafton lit up the scoreboard with four runs in the fourth and another eight in the fifth to end the contest.

None of the Indians managed more than one hit against starter/winner Conner Neeck and Drew Brandenburg. Neu and Michael Prochnow both had two RBIs while Dalton Poole and May each drove in one run.

Kewaskum 10, Whitefish Bay 3

On June 16, the Indians were clinging to a 3-1 lead in the bottom of the sixth when they exploded for seven runs to gain a season split with the Blue Dukes, who are honorable mention picks in the current rankings.

"We had a fabulous game against Whitefish Bay," Gonring said. "The bats came alive."

The Indians had 11 hits in the contest, including two by Devyn Zillmer, Cole Surprenant and Zach

Haberer. Zillmer went 2x3 and drove in two runs, while Surprenant was 2x4 and Heberer 2x3 with an RBI. Catcher Jared Chesak doubled home a run in the bottom of the fourth.

In the sixth, the Indians sent 11 to the plate, using a walk, two hit batsmen, five singles and a passed ball to put seven runs on the board.

Surprenant had another solid mound performance, going six innings, giving up one run (earned) on four hits. He struck out seven and walked four.

Poole pitched the seventh, giving up two runs on one hit.

Cedarburg 6, Kewaskum 1

The Indians won their first meeting against the Bulldogs but couldn't get the sweep on June 14 as Cedarburg capitalized on a four-run, fourth inning to even the series.

Kewaskum had seven hits in the contest, all singles. Starters Prochnow, Neu and Tony Steger had hits, along with reserves Ryan Prochnow, Brent Goeden, Kyle Bath and Brad Buechel. Bath's single drove in the Indians' lone run in the bottom of the seventh.

Johnny Gillette (4-0) got the pitching win for the Bulldogs. He went the distance, striking out two and walking just one.

Prochnow started for the Indians and gave up four runs (just one earned) on nine hits, striking out three and walking two. After Kyle McCarthy doubled and Willer singled to open the fourth, Gonring called on Heberer to come in. He got the first out on a fly out to center, then Kyle Jansen hit into a fielder's choice for out number two, but Heberer couldn't get the third out until four runs had scored. Christian Kadrach singled, then Poole made an error at short and the bases were loaded for Taylor Grimm, who cleared the bases with his double.

West Bend West 6, Kewaskum 2

For four innings, the Indians' southpaw Andrew Neu and West's Anthony

Schlass were involved in a scoreless pitchers' duel, then the Spartans tallied five times in the top of the fifth, and Kewaskum could not recover.

"One bad inning," Gonring said, indicating a reversal of one play and his team might have been able to get out of the inning allowing just one run.

Nate Block opened the Spartans' half of the fifth with a single, then Nick Sterman put down a successful bunt and reached first as Chesak threw to second in an attempt to get the lead runner. That was followed by Justin Schroedel's single that loaded the bases.

Neu walked in the first run, then struck out Schlass before Jack Thelen singled in Sterman, making the score 2-0 with the bases still loaded.

It was here Surprenant replaced Neu, and he hit Brad Burns, giving the Spartans a 3-0 lead. The fourth and fifth runs were scored on an error by Poole.

KHS came back with two runs in the top of the sixth as Poole, Prochnow and Neu had back-to-back-to-back singles to load the bases and Poole and Prochnow scored on fielder's choices.

The Indians still had runners at first and third but Schlass ended the threat when he got Brent Goeden to strike out swinging.

West had six hits in the contest, including two by Koerner, while the Indians came up with the same amount of hits, included a pair by Steger. Schlass struck out four, while Neu, Surprenant and Poole combined for seven strikeouts.

After the four NS game, the Indians are 5-5 in conference play and 9-6. Current standings are as follows: 1. West Bend West, 10-1; 2. (tie) Homestead and Cedarburg, 8-3; 4. Grafton, 8-4; 5. 
those hits together until the bottom of the ninth when a Jason Strobel single and Randy Finger double each drove in a run.

giving up the RBI single to Cho and later an RBI single by Eric Zoeller, giving Homestead a 4-0 lead.

"We're always short missing a play," KHS coach Doug Gonring said, referring to scoring changes and mistakes, adding, "They'll get smarter as they get older."

Gonring said the loss takes away any chance of winning the North Shore Conference, "Now we've got to be a pain in the butt to other teams," and try to play the role of spoilers.

Gonring was pleased with Surprenant's performance, but felt he couldn't let him go past the fourth so he will have some innings left in case he is needed vs. Port Washington or Germantown.

Homestead coach Ernie Millard obviously had his team pumped up for this game. As Gonring put it, "They're only two games behind West. We knock them off, and it's a big deal."


