## Village Pool Committee Continues Wading Through Options

Kewaskum's Pool Committee will meet again on Tuesday, July 12, to discuss options for replacing the swim pond at Kiwanis Park.

The committee was formed after the Kewaskum Village Board became concerned with dropping attendance at the pool last summer. That, coupled with the \$50,000 the village spends on maintaining the pond each year, made trustees question whether they should make changes to the pond.

Over the last three months, the committee has waded through various options presented by Burbach Aquatics, an architect and engineering firm specializing in aquatic design. At its last meeting on June 14, with three of the nine committee members present, the committee reviewed two splash pad proposals and one pool option.

All of the conceptual drawings had the existing

swim pond still intact, with showers for swimmers to go through to rinse off sand before entering the splash pad or pool areas. All three versions utilize the existing bathhouse.

Committee members requested that Burbach return to next week's meeting with something between the large and small splash pads that the committee looked at last month.

The first plan, and least expensive at about \$291,000, included a 1,317 square-foot spray pad and a 5,792 square-foot deck. The conceptual drawing included two shade structures and several water features that spray water.

Committee members liked many of the water feature ideas.

"The cannons sound fun," Kristy Bishop said.

"Every kid loves those," Nathan Scheel agreed.

The water for the first plan would come from a well and would be discarded after one use. This would cut operating costs,

as there would be no need for the pipes, pumps and chemical treatments necessary for a system that recirculates water, said Joshua Layer of Burbach Aquatics.

A second concept featured a larger spray pad that covered 3,149 square feet. Coming in at \$608,000, the second splash pad option boasts more water spray features than the first and a recirculating water system.

Bishop said that she preferred having the recirculating water system.

The third option that was presented last month costs about \$2 million, and does not have a splash pad. Instead, there is a swimming pool with four 25-yard swim lanes and a 1-meter diving board. The pool has a zero-depth water entry with a splash pool and water features.

For approximately \$200,000 more, a water slide could be added, Layer said.

## Minding Your Own Bees Wax

— Area Beekeeper Visits Summer School Class

MacKenzy Thomas was buzzing about bees as soon as she woke up.

"I get to see the beekeeper today!" she said.

Bernie Hall, a beekeeper from Campbellsport, visited MacKenzy's "From Garden To Plate" class at Kewaskum Elementary School on June 22. The class was offered to stu-

dents in grades one through five as part of Kewaskum's summer school program.

MacKenzy, along with the other students, listened intently as Hall told them about honeybees.

The average honeybee makes about 1.5 teaspoons of honey in a lifetime, Hall said.

"That takes a lot of work," said Hall, who has been

raising bees at his Campbellsport home since 2006.

**Busy As A Bee**

Hall brought some of his bees, along with a hive and some beekeeper tools, to Kewaskum Elementary School for the students to examine.

## Hot Weather Increases Chances For Pavement Buckling

— Be Alert For Potential Pavement Problems, Traffic Slow-Downs, And Move Over For Roadside Workers

With substantially hot and humid weather conditions on the way, the Wisconsin Department of

Transportation (WisDOT) is reminding motorists of the potential for pavement buckling.

The problem tends to be most common during the first few heat waves of the season. Hot temperatures cause pavement to expand, and where there are expansion joints, the slabs of pavement push against each other. If the pressure becomes great enough, the pavement can buckle.

While it's difficult to predict if or where buckling may occur, WisDOT offers the following tips for motorists:

• Slow down, buckle up and eliminate distractions

to focus your full attention on the roadway. Along with pavement issues, other concerns this time of year include deer or debris on the roadway.

• Watch for slowing traffic, and be ready to Move Over for all roadside workers including highway crews as they repair damaged pavement.

• Before your trip, check the 511 Travel Information system ([www.511wi.gov](http://www.511wi.gov)) for the latest on any incidents or delays.

• If necessary, report serious pavement issues by calling 911. Be ready to provide specific location information.

# Washington County Victim Of Wire Transfer Fraud

On June 16, a wire transfer was authorized in the amount of \$87,760 to criminal bank accounts. Upon identifying the error, County finance staff notified the Washington County Sheriff's Department to begin an investigation. In cooperation with the Sheriff's Department, County Administration is taking active steps to mitigate the financial loss for Washington County and educate against e-mail phishing scams.

"We wanted to bring this information to the taxpayer's attention as soon as possible and exhibit complete transparency regarding this breach. As soon as we are able, we will provide full details of the investigation and of our

efforts to ensure those responsible are held accountable," said Joshua Schoemann, Washington County administrator. "It is very unfortunate that we fell victim to this scam."

At present, the Washington County Sheriff's Department is conducting an investigation of the crime. Further details will be available following the investigation.


Helen was preceded in death by her parents, her

**Weekly HEALTH TIP**

**LEAVES OF THREE - LET THEM BE**

To prevent poison ivy reactions, learn to identify these plants and avoid contact with them. They have a compound leaf made up of three leaflets. They can grow low to the ground, or as a shrub, or as a climbing vine. A unique feature of the leaflets is that the center leaflet has a stalk, but the two side leaflets do not, they are attached directly to the stem. The side leaflets can have one smooth edge and one jagged edge that give them a sort of "mitten" shape. The vines also have a fuzzy or hairy appearance. Every part of the plant is poisonous and can cause a reaction.

## Breaking Through Bureaucracy



"A rising tide lifts all  
boats." - John F.  
Kennedy

It seems that for as long as there has been a Washington County, Wisconsin, with an eastern boarder not along Lake Michigan (circa 1853), there has been a sibling-like rivalry between Hartford and West Bend. Additionally, on several occasions over the past few years I have heard citizens from throughout the County refer to Highway 41 in Washington County, as if there is some union/confederate divide amongst us lingering from some grand battle decades ago. While the perception may be that there is some fierce rivalry, aside from the friendly Orioles vs. Suns, Indians vs. Spartans or Warhawks vs. Owls, we cannot and will not allow this perception to be reality.

The fact of the matter is Washington County is one of the most desirable and fastest growing counties in Wisconsin. We have a healthy mix of rural/agricultural, suburban/bedroom and industrial/workforce. Thanks to this healthy mix we also have one of the best collections of people of any county in the state, let alone the country!

To remain one of the best and most desirable, however, we must main-

tain our competitive advantage. We need to keep investing in the priorities which have gotten us to this point. Two of those priorities are having effective mobility and reliable infrastructure, as well as promoting economic growth and vitality. To fuel these specific priorities the county invests \$3 million in the design and construction of the county highway system each year. We also invest over \$1 million annually into our local businesses through our team at Economic Development Washington County.

One thing that I learned from former County Board Chairman and West Bend District 3 Supervisor Herb Tennes is, "What is good for Hartford is good for West Bend." That is to say, investment in any one community in our county benefits the whole county. The more our neighbors prosper from such investments, the more additional investments come into our communities, the better off we all become. But the snowball effect of compounding investment often doesn't happen on its own. And while government most certainly does not create that compounding impact, it most certainly does influence the environment where such compound-

ing investment is possible.

In the coming weeks and months the future of one such investment opportunity will be decided by the County Board. For the third time in nearly three decades the Board will consider the construction of a truck reliever route for State Highway 60, west of Interstate 41. And while this investment opportunity may not have a direct impact on you, such an investment would certainly benefit the whole county as Chairman Tennes taught me.

So, while we can and should debate the best and most appropriate route, and how best to mitigate impacts on properties, let us resolve that if this project is deemed necessary and appropriate to create the environment for compounding investment, then we must make such an investment. After all, such investments are not about any one business, any one person or even any one community. Instead, such investments are about all of us, and making our county the greatest place in the State of Wisconsin to live, work, visit and do business. We are all in this together, the only divide amongst us is the one which we create.

On Saturday, June 25, the Sky Ranch Flyers held their 24th Annual Radio Control (RC) Air Show for the Kewaskum / West Bend area. With the sun shining and a nice breeze hundreds of families showed up to watch radio-controlled airplanes fly, cars race and helicopters hover!

The south winds made for some exciting landings and a few crashes, but also lots of oohs and aahs from the crowd all day. It was estimated that the show had more than 50 pilots, many from other clubs from Wisconsin and Illinois, and well over 100 helicopters, radio-controlled race cars and airplanes.

## Continued From... Minding Your Own Bees Wax

He had different types of honeybees, which varied in colors. There were Carniolan bees, as well as lighter colored bees called Italian bees.

A honeybee flies about 20 miles per hour, Hall estimated.

"Bees are not aerodynamic, especially bumblebees. The fact that a bumblebee can fly is amazing," Hall said.

Hall explained that female worker bees spend their time going from flower to flower to collect nectar, a sweet fluid produced by flowers. The bees also collect pollen, which provides bees with the protein they need in order to make honey. Additionally, the bees pollinate the plants they visit.

"The flower can't pollinate itself a lot of times, so the bees help out. They really do a good job of it," Hall told the students.

If you look closely enough at a bee's legs, you might be able to guess which flowers the bee has visited, Hall said. The pollen collects on the bee's legs, and will reveal the color of the flower. As the bees come into a hive, the pollen falls off the bees' legs and is collected in a pollen trap, Hall said.

Bees tap about 2 million flowers to make a pound of honey.

"These bees are really putting a lot of effort into what they are doing," Hall said.

While some bees gather pollen, others search for water.

"Some bees are collect-

ing water, because if the hive starts turning to sugar, then they have to have water to help dissolve that," Hall said.

Worker bees have a lifespan of about six weeks.

"After that, guess what? The wings are wore out. She is dead, she is doomed," Hall said.

### Battle Of The Bees

Unlike hornets or wasps, a female honeybee, called a worker bee, can sting only once.

"After they sting you, the stinger stays stuck in you, and that bee can fly off, but the venom sack and the stinger are stuck in you together. What you should do is take your fingernail and scratch it out right away. Otherwise that venom sack will still keep pumping venom in your body, even though that bee is gone," Hall said.

Male bees, called drones, cannot sting at all. They don't do any of the work of collecting nectar or pollen. Instead, their main purpose is to mate with the queen.

The queen bee, which can lay up to 2,000 eggs a day, does have a stinger, Hall said. However, queen bees usually will not sting people. Instead, they use their stinger to fight with another queen if they have to, and will battle until death, Hall said.

The students told Hall they had learned about that when their teacher, Stacy LaRonge, had previously read a Magic School Bus book to them.

Hall had seen queens battle it out when he tried to split a hive into two.

In order to divide the hive, Hall had needed to requeen the hive. Before he could do that, he needed to find the queen.

"I looked through everything. I couldn't find the queen anywhere," Hall said.

Hall noticed that the bees had made a couple queen cells, so he figured they were getting ready for a new queen and the old queen had already left.

So he added a new queen, a Carniolan, that was darker than the old Italian queen bee.

A week later, Hall went in to see if the new queen was laying eggs. But instead, he found the old queen.

"They had battled it out," Hall said.

The old queen had won the fight because she was older and stronger, Hall said. And it was possible that the bees in her kingdom had helped her.

"Maybe some of the other workers recognized the new queen as a foreign challenge to their hive. They honored the old queen, and didn't want the new queen around," Hall said.

MacKenzy was still concerned about one of the facts she had heard.

"Why does the queen kill the eggs?" MacKenzy asked.

Hall answered matter of factly, saying that the queen will get rid of the pupa if she is failing or leaving the hive. And if a new queen joins the hive, the first queen will take action.

"She will go to these other queen cells because she knows that will be her competition. She will try to kill them, uncap that queen cell before they have a chance to come out. It's nature's way of survival of the fittest," Hall said.

MacKenzy nodded her head in understanding and wrote a note in her journal.

Then she and the rest of her class inspected Hall's bees up close and received a sweet reward: a taste of honey.

## Middle School Students Attend Junior Police Academy

— Course Offered Through Kewaskum School District's Summer School Program

The Flight For Life helicopter landed on the grass outside of Kewaskum Elementary School on June 22. The paramedics climbed out of the chopper and went to the students.

None of the students were hurt, though. Instead, they learned about the Flight For Life and what it does as part of the Junior Police Academy class they took during the Kewaskum School District's summer school program.

"It's a flying ambulance," Kyle Diedrick, who is going into sixth grade, said about the Flight For Life.

Several of the students had seen Flight For Life in action before. Still, they had not realized everything that the emergency helicopter did.

They were surprised to learn that blood was kept in the helicopter, and how small of a space there was to keep the patient alive.

The lesson was just one of many that the students in the Junior Police

Academy learned over the four-week course, held June 9 through July 1.

Over the course of the class, each of the students was "booked" at the police department by having their photos and fingerprints taken. They learned about all the different equipment police officers wear and carry in the squads. They also got to see how a taser works, although not on an actual person.

The class included lessons about radio communications, traffic stop procedures, OWI enforcement, defense and arrest tactics, handcuffing techniques and crime scene investigations.

In addition to having Flight for Life come, guests from the Kewaskum Fire Department visited the students. Also, the Washington County Sheriff's Department SWAT Team showed the students their equipment.

"I think their favorite piece of equipment was definitely the robot," Kewaskum Police Chief

Thomas Bishop said.

One of the most important things the students learned, though, is how to perform CPR on a patient.

"That is a big thing I really wanted them to get out of this, the ability to save lives. We trained them, and if they are in a situation, they know what to do. That's pretty cool," Bishop said.

Other lessons were learned through field trips to the county jail and the county courthouse to learn about the judicial process.

This was the first year that the Junior Police Academy was held. A total of 13 middle school students were enrolled in the class.

Both Bishop and Officer Kevin Kohn enjoyed teaching the class.

"Our students this year were our 'test subjects' and they were great," Bishop said. "I didn't know what to expect in preparing for this class - I can say with certainty that we will definitely be doing it again next year."

# Continued From... Village Pool Committee Continues Wading Through Options

Measuring in with a total surface area of 3,857 square feet, the pool is just a fraction of the size of the existing pond, which Burbach estimates to cover 41,857 square feet. The pool committee is considering getting rid of the pond altogether if it puts in a pool. The pool that was proposed at the June meeting would accommodate 229 patrons.

At last month's meeting, Layer said that the \$2 million pool option would likely cost the village about \$25,000 to \$35,000 a year, compared to the \$50,000 the village currently pays to maintain the swim pond.

In all three drawings, the new water feature is located between the existing parking lot and the existing

swim pond.

Scheel suggested that if the village does end up replacing the existing swim pond with a new pool or splash pad, that the new construction be situated where the existing pond is to create more parking space.

### Current Swim Pond Usage

During the month of June, a total of 1,958 swimmers used the swim pond.

The pond's highest usage for the month of June was in 2005, when there were 5,589 swimmers. In 2014, the number reached an all-time low of 633 people.

"The weather dictates how many days we are open and how many peo-

ple use the pool," Butch Buddenhagen, swim program director, said.

This past June, there were 25 potential days that the swim pond could be opened.

Of those, there were five days that the pond closed due to inclement weather, according to Buddenhagen. The pond closed early 10 days due to inclement weather or poor attendance, he said.

So far this year, 81 family passes and 15 individual have been sold. Those numbers are similar to past years, Buddenhagen said.

So far, 68 people are signed up for swim lessons, which begin next week.

# Grafton's Seventh Inning Rally Erases Indians' 1-0 Lead

First, it was a slugfest between the Grafton and Kewaskum baseball teams, and then fans watching the second game, held at Kiwanis Park on June 28, were treated to one of the best pitching duels of the season in the North Shore Conference.

Both KHS lefty Andrew Neu and Adam Lucas of Grafton, threw well enough to get the victory, which appeared at first would go to the Indians after they scored one run on their only hit of the night in the bottom of the sixth.

The Blackhawks would not go away quietly, however, using a walk, a hit and a key error for three runs in the top of the seventh for a 3-1 victory. With the win, Grafton improved to 10-6 in the NS and 14-7 overall while the Indians dropped to 8-7 and 12-8.

Kewaskum coach Doug Gonring felt part of the reason Grafton was able to win was what he called a "change in the strike zone" in the last inning for the Blackhawks, who used extra pitches to their advantage. "You could see the reaction of the catcher and the fans behind the plate," Gonring went on about two called balls that looked to be strikes and would have been outs and ended the inning without any scoring.

Lucas was sharp in the

first five innings, putting the Indians down in order in the first and third and facing just four batters in the second, fourth and fifth.

It was in the sixth when he looked a little fatigued, throwing 13 balls to eight strikes, and the Indians took advantage. After one out, Michael Prochnow drew a five-pitch walk, and moved to second when the GHS third baseman muffed a ball hit by Neu.

KHS fans were plenty excited when Devyn Zillmer dropped down a nifty sacrifice bunt, moving the runners ahead to second and third, and catcher Jared Chesak wasted little time to bring Prochnow home. After taking the first pitch for a ball, Chesak smashed Lucas' second offering in the hole between short and third for a 1-0 lead.

Lucas got out of further trouble when he got John May to fly out to left field for the third out.

Neu needed just three outs to win the game but he struggled against Jack Pawlak, walking him on four pitches, and Grady Bauer, the number eight hitter in the order, hit a single near the left field line, putting two men on base.

Neu battled back to strike out Evan Agnew on three pitches, but after taking Charlie Potter to 2-2 in the count, he threw a pitch into the dirt Chesak was unable to stop, and the two runners advanced to

second and third. Potter joined them on the base path when he drew a walk.

Ben Mason was up next, and Neu's first two pitches to him were perfect strikes, and Mason fouled off the next one as the count remained 0-2. It was here Mason hit a little "nubber" to the right of Neu, who dove for the ball and couldn't come up with it. Shortstop Dalton Poole finally scooped up with the ball but his throw to first was high and wide of Prochnow, and two runs scored on the play, giving Grafton the lead.

Run number three came when Lucas hit a fly ball to shallow right. Tony Steger dove and caught the ball, and Potter tagged and raced home on the play. The Indians felt he may have left early but the umpire ruled otherwise.

KHS still had its last ups, but Lucas struck out Poole looking and got Cole Surpenant to ground out before walking Zach Heberer. Up next was Steger, who has been wielding a hot bat in recent games, but not this night as Lucas struck him out swinging to end the game.

"Two good pitching efforts," Gonring said. "We just can't finish it out. We have to learn how to win those."



# Indians Post Back-to-back Victories; Gonring Gets Win Number 400

Scoring in every inning but the sixth, the Kewaskum High baseball team rolled to an 11-3 victory over SWCHSA (Southeastern Wisconsin Christian Home School Association) in a non-conference game held at Kiwanis Park on July 1.

It was a milestone for KHS coach Doug Gonring, who coached his 400th victory. He hit the 300 mark in his career during the summer of 2011,

"It just means I've been around a long time," Gonring said kiddingly, adding, "I've had some good players and I've had some knowledgeable parents who taught their kids the fundamentals of the game."

The Indians scored early and often, putting three runs on the board in the first and second innings and another three in the fourth for a 10-0 lead. The Indians had 13 hits and took advantage of five Saints' errors and two walks.

In the bottom of the first after one out, Michael Prochnow reached on an error and then Jerod Chesak and Andrew Neu both drew walks to load the bases, and John May followed with a single to right, scoring the first run, and two more came in when Cole Surprenant doubled to right.

Saint starter Farley Gleason regained his composure to strike out the next two Indians, Brad Buechel and Dalton Poole.

Kewaskum came up with four hits in the second, including singles by Zach Heberer and Prochnow, and doubles by Chesak and May to go up 6-0, and they never looked

back.

Devyn Zillmer started for KHS, going four innings while giving up no runs on one hit, three strikeouts and three walks. Zillmer got the victory.

Junior Kyle Pamperin took over for the fifth through seventh innings, giving up three runs on one hit. He struck out four and walked three.

May, Surprenant and Heberer each had two hits for the winners, who improved to 13-8 on the season.

"The kids started hot, early," Gonring said, indicating everyone saw playing time in this game.

After the win, Gonring was treated to a special 400 win cake and celebrated with the members of his team. This is his 20th season, which started in Kewaskum back in the early 1990s.

### Kewaskum vs. West Bend East

On June 30th, Surprenant pitched another gem, but it wasn't until the seventh inning that the Indians pulled out to a comfortable lead over host West Bend East. The Indians broke the game open with five runs in their last at-bats for a 7-0 victory.

Surprenant went the distance for the Indians, giving up just two hits. Nate Farrington had one of the hits, a two-out single in the first while Jackson Jommen opened the second inning with a single to left. He moved to second on a wild pitch before Surprenant got Dillen Rondorf to fly out to center, Tyler Craighead to pop out to third and Kyle Yocham to strike out swinging.

Surprenant struck out

six and walked just two.

"Cole threw the ball very, very well," Gonring said about his sophomore ace.

While he applauded the pitching performance, Gonring was not pleased with missed scoring opportunities. "We left a few too many on base early," he said. "We just did not come up with the timely hit."

The Indians scored a single run off Dakota Skinandore in the first inning on a leadoff single by Tony Steger, who stole second and came around to score on a single by Prochnow.

The score stayed at 1-0 until the sixth when Chesak singled, Devyn Zillmer reached on a bunt and Neu singled.

Even though he had just a slim lead, "Cole kept his composure," Gonring said.

More fireworks was to come in the seventh as the Indians sent 10 to the plate, piling up five runs against East reliever, Logan Cunningham. Zach Heberer, Steger, Prochnow, Neu and Surprenant all singled, while Chesak doubled home a run, and the final run scored when Dalton Poole hit a sacrifice fly to right field.

With the victory, the Indians improved to 9-7 in league play and 13-9 overall while East fell to 5-12 in North Shore action and 9-16 overall.

After a big game against North Shore champion, West Bend West (16-1), the Indians are home this evening in the NS finale against Nicolet. The Indians also have a non-conference game against Sheboygan Falls at Kiwanis Park on Saturday, July 9.

## Race Ends Early, But Goeden Still Leads 360 Field

PLYMOUTH — For the second time this season, the 360 Sprint Car feature race in the Plymouth Dirt Track Racing League ended before the scheduled 25 laps were completed.

After five cautions and a re-start for one driver jumping the start, officials called the July 2 race with nine laps to go, and Kewaskum's Don Goeden, defending champion and current points leader, had just moved to the top side of the track and ready to take over second place.

The final crash came on lap 16 when Justin Miller (15M) tangled with the wall on the front straightaway, but it looked as if his car could have been removed in five minutes, and there would be enough time to resume racing.

Lomira's Tim Haddy (#21H) was awarded the victory, which came 30 minutes before the curfew at the Sheboygan County Fair Park track, leaving fans, drivers and pit crews a bit puzzled with the call to end the race.

"It was a rough track," Goeden said afterward. "I knew there would be a couple cautions. It was just a matter of trying to finish and keep the car in one piece ... I was trying to finish top five."

By virtue of his win in the feature on June 25, Goeden (who won easily won his heat race earlier in the night) had to start 11th in the feature. He didn't stay there long, powering the #10W car to eighth by the third lap.

The first caution came when Al Schaefer flipped his car off turn one. West Bend policeman Paul Pokorski (#4) had broken free from the pack for a comfortable lead at that point, but during the break his car had a fire and he was forced to drop out before the re-start.

Anthony Knierim took the lead with Brandon McMullen, Haddy and Goeden in hot pursuit, and they were all looking for the right groove to catch him, but after one lap of racing, there was another caution for the green Lance Fassbender car spinning out in turn three and then Kevin Karnitz stalled, leaving 17 cars from the original field of 22.

Haddy took over the point, while Goeden passed McMullen on lap 14 and was setting his sights on Jim Melis (#51M), who had moved into contention.

Then came the final mishap, and the race was called, much to the dismay of those who had waited all night to see the fast 360s take the track. There were comments the race could have been finished with a green, white checkered situation, but that did not happen.

"On the re-start, I think I would have (moved into second). I finally started on the top," Goeden said. "Oh well."

While he was disappointed he didn't get to race the full 25 laps, Goeden was more disappointed for the fans. "I think it's disappointing for the fans not to see a checkered flag," he said. One fan put it well when she said she was disappointed because "I'm always looking forward to that final battle" in the closing laps.

"The car was good. It is hard to set up for the holes," Goeden said. "The motor really pulled (well) ... nothing broke and we finished."

This was the seventh race of the season in PDT racing. Goeden has won three of the seven features and has a second, third and fourth-place finish to lead the field by approximately 40 points.

Goeden complimented the winner, Haddy, saying, "He's a good driver. He's been racing for about 20 years. His dad is in the Hall of Fame. He's here tonight also."

\* In the Cellcom B Mode feature, Brandon Knepprath (of Kewaskum) finished fourth in his feature race. Starting on the pole, Knepprath, who is in his second year of racing competition at Plymouth, used the top half of the track to his advantage and held off a lot of the more experienced competitors in the field.

## Prunty Holds Off Apel For Win Number Four

In a traditional Slinger Speedway battle, Dennis Prunty held off Steve Apel to nail down his fourth super late model feature victory of the season Sunday night in the Interstate Sawing Independence Day 75.

John DeAngelis Jr. raced to the early lead at the drop of the green flag as the field quickly fell under the caution flag on lap two when the second and third place cars of Fred Winn and Rob Braun tangled entering turn one triggering an incident that also collected Rich Loch. DeAngelis returned to the lead on the restart over Nick Wagner and Brad Keith while the outside line began to move forward and Brad Mueller, Dennis Prunty, Gary La Monte, and Steve Apel all took advantage of the high side to grab third through sixth respectively. As they sorted out, Dennis Prunty wasted little time in first moving around Mueller for third and then Nick Wagner for second as DeAngelis continued to set the pace. As Prunty began to track down DeAngelis for the lead, LaMonte pressured Mueller for fourth as right behind them Apel and Casey Johnson gained spots after prevailing in an intense battle with Brad

Keith and Alex Prunty.

Dennis Prunty closed in on DeAngelis for the lead and took some serious looks to the inside of the leader just before the caution waved on lap 23 when Rob Braun's car spun while racing with Mitch McGrath off turn two. DeAngelis chose the inside lane for the restart and Dennis Prunty used the outside lane to stay even with the leader as racing resumed. Prunty eventually ducked back in line as LaMonte and Apel advanced to third and fourth respectively. Prunty eventually worked his way alongside DeAngelis on the inside lane and took the lead after several laps of door-to-door racing as LaMonte closed in on the leaders from third.

LaMonte then maneuvered his way past DeAngelis for second as Apel, Mueller, and Casey Johnson took over the fourth through sixth spots when Nick Wagner's car washed high off turn four. The caution flag waved for the third time on lap 46 when Grant Griesbach's car looped around in turn four with Prunty leading over LaMonte, DeAngelis, Apel, Mueller, and Johnson. Prunty chose the outside for the restart and he remained the leader as LaMonte couldn't formulate a challenge with his car pinned down on the

inside.

Apel used the outer groove to advance his way around DeAngelis for third while Casey Johnson moved into fourth, dispatching Mueller into a battle for fifth with Chris Blawat and Jeff Holtz. While racing side by side, Blawat and Holtz ran up on Mueller exiting turn four and side contact between them sent Blawat's car spinning into the infield as the caution flag waved on lap 55.

Once again, Prunty charged to the lead from the outside as racing resumed while both Apel and Johnson took advantage of LaMonte not being able to keep his car glued to the inside lane to race into second and third respectively. Prunty scooted away to a comfortable lead while Johnson pressured Apel for second. A tandem spin between Grant Griesbach and Bradley Kossow in turn four on lap 70 drew the caution flag and set up a five lap shootout between Prunty, Apel, and Johnson for the victory.

Apel gave a valiant effort in the closing laps but Prunty was too strong from the outside and he drove to his fourth feature victory of the season. John DeAngelis prevailed in an intense battle for third with Casey Johnson while Chris Blawat finished fifth.

Brad Mueller finished sixth followed by Alex Prunty and Gary LaMonte while Nick Wagner and Mitch McGrath rounded out the top ten.

Alex Prunty set fast time for the first time in his super late model career by turning in a lap at 11.299 seconds.

Heather Stark won the 25-lap Slinger Bee feature over Brandon DeLacy and Nick Schmidt. Gerald Lyon and Matt Rose rounded out the top five. Jakob Hassler won the Slinger Bee semi-feature over Paul Reagles and Bill Ostovich Jr. Slinger Bee heat race wins went to Paul Reagles, Matt Rose, and Nick Schmidt and Tom Berens returned from a hard crash a week ago to set fast time.


