## Town Of Kewaskum Receives County Report

Washington County Administrator Joshua Schoemann delivered his annual State of the County address at a County Board meeting in June, and has been attending city, town and village board meetings to share the information with people throughout the county.

On Monday, Aug. 15, Schoemann gave his presentation at the Town of Kewaskum Board meeting.

Daniel Stoffel, who is treasurer for the Town of Kewaskum and was a longtime Washington County supervisor, was at the meeting, and was the subject of one of the county's highlights.

"We had a room in our Samaritan campus named after Supervisor Stoffel. After over 30 years of service, a room was named after him for his

meritorious work," Schoemann said.

In addition to Stoffel retiring from his supervisor position this year, Herbert Tennes retired this spring after serving as a county supervisor for 50 years. In his honor, the Government Center was renamed to the Herb Tennes Government Center in March.

A main achievement for the county this year is having the lowest tax rate the county has seen in 50 years.

"Fiscal responsibility has been a strong point of the county for many years, certainly dating back over the last 30 or 50 years," Schoemann said. "We are at the lowest levy that we have had in 12 years and the lowest tax rate in half a century."

The day that Tennes walked into the courthouse to begin his 50-year tenure as county supervi-

sor in 1966, the tax rate was higher than the day he walked out this past April, Schoemann said.

"We had a lot of growth in our county over those years, and a lot of good management by a lot of good supervisors in our department," Schoemann said.

Today, Washington County has the lowest debt level that it has had in 25 years and is currently using just 1 percent of allowable debt. The tax levy has been reduced by more than 10 percent, or \$4 million since 2010, according to Schoemann's figures.

"We have really done a nice job, especially in the last 10 years of keeping that debt rate very low, and that has helped us get our levy reduced every year as well," Schoemann said.

## Massage For A Horse, Of Course

– Local Student Starts Equine Massage Therapy Business

Kayla Oelhafen has been around horses her whole life.

Through her many years of raising, riding and showing horses, the 20-year-old Allenton native understands the strains that are placed on the animals' bodies.

To help alleviate the physical pain of the four-legged creatures, Oelhafen recently became a certified equine massage therapist and started a new business, Healthy Gait Equine Massage Therapy.

"It's up and coming right now," Oelhafen said of the horse massage business. "It's like humans, if you think about it, when you are out of whack and out of shape, you can't move correctly. It's the same with horses. We are climbing on their backs and trying to yank them around. They are probably more out of shape than we are."

Massage therapy can be used as regular maintenance for performance

horses, or to treat animals who suffer from an injury.

"If there is a problem in the hind end, it can affect a horse all the way to their neck or in their head. It's all connected," Oelhafen said.

A Kewaskum High School graduate, Oelhafen is currently a junior at the University of Wisconsin-River Falls majoring in animal science with an equine management emphasis. Her goal is to eventually become a horse chiropractor.

Becoming an equine massage therapist has helped her decide that is the career she would like to pursue.

"It is good. I'm having a lot of fun with it and am really enjoying it," Oelhafen said.

### The Course

Oelhafen attended a Certified Equine Massage Education class at a therapeutic riding stable in Delavan June 2-5.

The class, which was held for 10 hours a day, included a written exam

and a practicum. Oelhafen learned about the anatomy of a horse, and memorized the various muscles and bones in a horse's body.

"I couldn't believe how much I came out of there with after four days. Holy cow, I learned so much," Oelhafen said.

In the class, Oelhafen was able to massage a wide variety of horses, including Thoroughbreds and Quarter Horses, as well as an oversized

Clydesdale and Percheron and a small pony.

"That was the horses' first weekend off since March, so they were pretty out of whack, pretty sore and really tight," Oelhafen said. "It was really cool to work on them. They have been through a lot, and it was nice to be shown how to work with problem areas, like knots and where they are really tight."

## WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORTS

### OWI Second

On Aug. 16 at 1:09 a.m. the Sheriff's Office received a report of two vehicles south bound on Interstate 41 north of State Highway 28 that were "bumping" into each other and at one point stopped in the middle of Interstate 41. A deputy located one of the suspect vehicles on State Highway 28 west of County Highway W in the Town of Wayne and identified the operator as a 17-year-old Fond du Lac male.

The subject indicated his 20-year-old brother left their residence in another vehicle intoxicated. The 17-year-old told the deputy he tried to stop his brother by slowing down in front of him causing the initial rear-end collision near Lomira. Both drivers then exited Interstate 41 on State Highway 28, at which point the 17-year-old attempted to pass his brother and force him off the road. The vehicles collided a second time in a side-swipe type crash near Rolling Drive.

The 17-year-old then pulled over to the side of the road due to nearly running out of gas and the deputy made contact with him. A second deputy located the other vehicle being operated by the 20-year-old in the area of State Highway 28 and U.S. 45. The operator of that vehicle did not know that another deputy was already out on a traffic stop with his younger brother, and decided to provide the deputy with his brother's name and date of birth rather than his own.

The 20-year-old driver's license is revoked and he is currently out on bond from cases in Waukesha and Dodge County that mandate he cannot operate a motor vehicle unless he obtains a valid driver's license. The driver showed signs of intoxication but refused all sobriety testing. He was arrested for second offense OWI and a search warrant was obtained for a legal blood sample. He was also arrested for two counts of bail jumping resulting from the above bond restrictions and an obstructing charge for providing a false name to the deputy.

The other brother was cited for unsafe cutting in while passing for the side-swipe accident that occurred on State Highway 28 in Washington County. The initial accident was referred to Dodge County. The younger brother had a cell phone that he could have contacted 911 rather than trying to force his older brother off the road.

### Assist Germantown Police With Pursuit

On Thursday, Aug. 11, at 12:16 a.m. a deputy on routine patrol heard a Germantown Police Officer conduct a traffic stop in the area of Highway 167 and Interstate 41. The officer was requesting a second squad car for assistance.

The deputy was within 0.3 mile of the Germantown officer and responded to the scene to assist.

As the deputy was exiting his squad car, he observed the vehicle accelerate away from the traffic stop at a high rate of speed. The vehicle was pursued for several miles through the northwestern part of the Village of Germantown until the operator's driving became too dangerous to justify continuation of the pursuit. Germantown officers were able to locate the vehicle in the Cabela's parking lot in the Village of Richfield after both agencies initially terminated the pursuit.

The operator had turned off all the lights in an effort to conceal the vehicle. Several of the deputies' squads were in the area, and the vehicle continued to flee around the building once confronted. At one point a Germantown Police officer and a Sheriff's deputy had the vehicle partially blocked in. As the Germantown squad attempted to block the vehicle in, the officer exited his squad and ordered the suspect out. The suspect then backed into the Sheriff's squad, causing minor front end damage and then drove around the Germantown squad, nearly striking the officer.

The vehicle then fled southbound on U.S. 45, at which point Sheriff's Deputies terminated the pursuit again. The registered owner of the vehicle is a 41-year-old New Berlin woman. Contact was made with New Berlin Police Department and the Waukesha County Sheriff's Office to watch for the suspect vehicle at the residence.

Both departments located the suspect at her residence as she was pulling into the driveway. She became resistive with the officers and punched one of the officers in the face. She ended up getting struck with a police baton and Tazer deployment as she continued to resist.

She was arrested for OWI, first offense, and battery to a police officer. The Washington County Sheriff's Office is also requesting reckless endangering safety for her actions at Cabela's, and she will be transferred to the Sheriff's Office from the Waukesha County Jail when available.

Deputies may pursue as expeditiously and safely as possible any person in a vehicle who the officer has reasonable suspicion to believe is eluding apprehension after having committed a traffic ordinance violation or criminal act. Officers are required by department policy as well as state statute to drive with due regard for the safety of all persons and take multiple factors into account in the decision making process whether to continue a pursuit.

In this case, it was determined that the risks to life and property outweighed the benefit derived from the immediate apprehension or continued pursuit of the vehicle. The policy worked exactly as designed and the driver was ultimately arrested without putting the general public, the officers or the suspect at more risk than needed.

### OWI Failure To Yield

On Aug. 9 at 5:24 p.m. the Sheriff's Office received a report of a vehicle traveling northbound on U.S. 45 in the area of Highway 145. The caller indicated the driver was swerving across both lanes of traffic and struck several construction barrels.

The deputy attempted to initiate a traffic stop near the County Trunk NN overpass. The vehicle was traveling 35 mph in the left lane. The vehicle sped up to approximately 55 mph and failed to pull over for 2.5 miles, with the deputy following with emergency lights and siren activated.

The driver, identified as a 54-year-old Town of Barton man, indicated he

did not see or hear the squad following close behind him. The deputy noted the driver's window was open during the contact. The driver eventually stopped in the area of Highway 33/W. Washington Street. He was arrested for OWI third offense as well as failure to yield to law enforcement.

### Domestic Dispute

A 43-year-old Town of Barton man was arrested for disorderly conduct while armed and second degree reckless endangerment after an altercation with a relative at a home in the 4800 block of Beaver Dam Road. The incident occurred on Tuesday, Aug. 9, at 8:28 p.m.

The investigation revealed the suspect had threatened to kill himself as well as the relative during a dispute. He was also reported to have pointed a BB or pellet gun at the relative's head during the altercation. Prior to the deputies' arrival that evening, the subject fled the scene on foot. Deputies spent the next four hours actively searching for the suspect to no avail.

The following morning, deputies again responded to the residence and were able to take the subject into custody without incident.

#### OWI Arrest



Daniel J. Marx

Daniel J. "Jocko" Marx, 65, of the town of Kewaskum, passed away on Saturday, August 13, 2016, at the Kathy Hospice, with his family by his side.

Dan was born on March 20, 1951 in Sheboygan, the son of the late Joseph and Gertrude (Theusch) Marx.

On October 24, 1992 he was united in marriage to June Petermann at St. John of God Catholic Church in the town of Farmington.

Dan was a member of Holy Trinity Catholic Church in Kewaskum. He graduated from St. Michaels Catholic School, Kewaskum High School, and then received his Bachelor of Science Degree at UW-Milwaukee. ## Weekly HEALTH TIP

### SAUNA BENEFITS

A 20-year Finnish study involving 2,300 men, ages 42 to 60, discovered those who used a dry sauna frequently had a reduced risk of sudden cardiac death. The risk was reduced further the longer (11 minutes or more) and more often they used the sauna. When men used the sauna 2-3 times a week risk for heart-related death decreased by 22%. After 4-7 saunas a week, risk dropped 63%. Researchers say this study doesn't prove cause-and-effect, just an association. The benefit may be that the sauna is relaxing, reduces stress and increases heart rate similarly to exercising. Check with your doctor regarding what's right for you.

# Cycle Across America Returns To The Kettle Moraine

About 60 cyclists could be seen cruising through the Kettle Moraine and Dundee area on Friday, July 29. Cycle America came through the Kettle Moraine as part of its coast-to-coast ride.

Every two years, cyclists from around the world have the opportunity to participate in a beautiful cycling tour through the northern part of the United States. They start on one coast and bike their way to the other coast.

This year they started in Everett, Washington, which is near Seattle. On the first day, many of the participants who are riding the entire tour do what is called a "wheel dipping."

The rear wheel is dipped in the ocean on the West coast. Then when they arrive in Gloucester, Massachusetts, which is near Boston, they dip the front wheel in the ocean to signify the end of the journey.

The entire trip is broken down into nine smaller trips. Each trip is one week long with the group cycling Monday through Saturday and taking Sunday off. Some of the trips take them through multiple states and some travel a single state in a week.

The sixth trip traveled the state of Wisconsin. They started in Minnesota and then wound their way through the state of Wisconsin, finally ending

in Manitowoc on Saturday, July 30. The group then took the Badger ferry over to Michigan for the next trip.

This group was made up of people from all over the United States and many from other countries.

Two of the coast-to-coast cyclists were a father and son team riding together on a tandem bike. The father, Curtis Taylor, is blind. They are from South Carolina.

"This is the first time we've done any type of bike ride," Curtis said. "I think it's always been on the bucket list for me."

The two admitted they really were not cyclists before this ride. They really started training for it about six months before the start of the trip.

"I think the biking has been easier than we thought," Curtis said. "The worst week was in the flat area. It was so hot. It's steeper here in Wisconsin than we thought it would be."

The two have been having a great time together. They have made some new friends along the way in this tight-knit group of cyclists.

"These people have become our family," Nathan said. "The staff is amazing."

Once the ride is over, both will go back to South Carolina. Then, Nathan will be on his way back to Utah for college.

"This is an accomplish-

ment really," Curtis said.

They both admitted they would not be doing another tour like this anytime soon. Not that they don't want to, but there are other things they need to do first.

"I should probably plan something with my wife next summer," Curtis admitted.

The youngest member of the coast-to-coast group was 19-year-old George Broughton from England. This is his first time in the United States and he thought this would be a great way to see a lot of the country.

"I enjoy my cycling," Broughton said. "I found it (this tour) online. I knew I wanted to go coast to coast with a group."

"I am really enjoying it. It's a really good way to appreciate the country."

He has been a little surprised by the difference in the terrain along this trip. The mountains and the plains gave him some challenges in different ways.

"The trip was a lot of hills and a lot of mountains," Broughton said. "I'm not really used to the heat (in South Dakota it was hot). Fortunately, they had a lot of water stops."

He has been having a great time with the group and learning a lot about the country. Broughton hopes to get back to the United States again and plans to do more bicycle tours.

"I think I will do another, but not to this extent," he said. "This was a trip of a lifetime. This is a great life experience."

The oldest member of the group was 72-year-old Tony Verbruggen of the Netherlands. He has done bicycle tours like this many times. He has done five or six trips throughout the United States.

"I'm going to be 73 during this trip," Verbruggen said. "I said I had to do this one again. In the past, I did these with my wife."

He enjoys these types of trips and getting to know the people and the countryside he is traveling. Verbruggen has also done bicycling trips in Europe too.

Another interesting member of the coast-to-coast group is Fabia Maramotti of Italy. She is a 21-year-old who has a lot of experiences like this one in her resume.

"Every summer I try to find something interesting to do," Maramotti said. "It started when I did the Channel."

To begin her summer adventures, a few years ago she and four other people swam the English Channel. They did this as a relay.

"I'm a swimmer originally," she said. "I also do

triathlons."

Last summer, she went on a sailing excursion. They started in her country and sailed to the top of Ireland.

"This year, no sea - land," Maramotti said with a smile.

In addition to the riding, she also keeps up a daily blog in two different languages while on her trip. During Cycle America, Maramotti is raising money for cancer research.

Her trip across America has been interesting for her so far.

"All the scenery varies so much," she said. "It's been amazing. I'm kind of sad its finishing soon."

As for the cycling, it

wasn't as challenging as she thought it would be at the start of the trip. "It's been okay," Maramotti said. "I've been surprised by the hills. They were easier than I thought."

Greg Walsh is the head of Cycle America. He plans the trips. On the years they don't do the Coast-to-Coast trip, the group hosts National Park tours.

Cycle America started in the late 1980s. Walsh explained that it is a good way to bike, enjoy the scenery and when done like this, it is a little less expensive than doing it yourself.

The group stays in a lot of schools along the way. This gives them a nice place to sleep, with showers and a good base to start and end each day.

The route stays basically the same for every Coast-To-Coast tour. Minor changes are made when Walsh and his organizers feel it is the right thing to do for the

group.

They use the internet, things like Google Earth, to research each route. They want to make it a nice route for the cyclists to ride and enjoy.

"Wisconsin is always a surprise," said Dan Brown, a regular on the tour.

He stated it is a beautiful state. Many of the cyclists have never been here before and do not expect the beauty and hills that we have in this state.

The group travels with about 12 support staff. They have trucks and trailers that ride with and follow the cyclists around the route.

Last week, the group toured Michigan and ending the week in Canada near Niagara Falls. This week, they are traveling upstate New York and the Adirondack Mountains. The final week will take them through New England, ending in Gloucester, MA, which is near Boston.

## LETTER TO THE EDITOR

To the Editor:

The Washington County Historical Society has been a part of the community for over 130 years. Today, the organization operates The Old Courthouse and Jail Museum in addition to the Research Center.

Recently the Society changed its name to the History Center of Washington County. Its mission has always been to preserve, and collect the County's archives, photos and other pertinent historical documents. The collections and archives are used to create informative exhibits and educational programs for children and adults.

With the help of 70 core volunteers and full-time staff of four museum professionals the History Center has grown into a vital community organization. Operations of the County Courthouse and Jail buildings were taken over by the Society when it was determined they were too antiquated for County operations. Former Washington County Board of Supervisors Rueben Schmahl, Ken Miller, Herb Tennes, and multitudes of others, realized our past is important to preserve for future generations.

The Society, in collaboration with the County, spearheaded fundraising efforts to restore both the

Old Courthouse and Jail to the grandeur of the day it was built in 1889. This grass roots effort resulted in the community donating over \$1,500,000 to support the renovations and formation of a County Historical Museum. As these donors expected, the History Center has added to the quality of life for Washington County residents and visitors from all over the world. The Old Courthouse is easily one of the most photographed buildings in the County.

Recently Washington County has implemented a priority based budgeting process to determine what items to cut from the county budget. Priority based budgeting gives higher rankings to State mandated programs and lower ranking to the non-mandated programs. This type of prioritization moves all of the "quality of life" items, like parks and museums, to the bottom of the priority list.

The Daily News article by Ralph Chapoco on July 20, 2016 talked about cuts to the parks system. These cuts are real. County "quality of life" assets do not come for free. Parks, fair grounds, social services, and museums come with a cost. As stewards of public dollars, the Historical Society's Board of Directors, staff and volunteers takes this responsibility seriously and work hard to run an

efficient operation. The lease agreement between the Society and County has always included operating support with the expectation that the Society would raise at least 50 percent of its budget. The Society has leveraged continued cuts in support by cutting expenses, improving revenue, and prioritizing the needs of the community without forfeiting its responsibilities to run a professional museum.

What the Washington County Historical Society performs is a unique activity that does not have a parallel in any other local government body. Can we afford to lose our local history? Preserved memories and exhibits or the ability to find historical information about our ancestors? Homes? Community? What other County agency can take on this responsibility?

Show your concern and support by contacting your representative on the County Board and tell them just how much you appreciate the Society and its positive impact on Washington County and its quality of life.

## Continued From... Massage For A Horse, Of Course

There are some tools that can be used to massage the horses. One of the handheld plastic gizmos helps reach specific pressure points, while another covers more surface area. Oelhafen has an additional tool to help her reach higher on a horse's body.

But she usually uses her hands for massaging the horses.

"I massage basically every part of the body. I massage along the outside of the body, inside their legs and under their belly" Oelhafen said.

It can be a lot of work. "It is pretty strenuous. Your full body is into it because if you just use your arms and your hands, you can get real tired and sore," Oelhafen said.

Oelhafen knows firsthand how massage and chiropractic services can help. She has had work done on her back, shoulders and hips.

"For a while, my hips were kind of out of line, my pelvis was shifted from riding horses and getting up with the same foot in the stirrup for 15 years," Oelhafen said.

To correct the problem, she did stretches and went to a chiropractor.

"I haven't had problems with it since then because I usually keep on getting adjusted," Oelhafen said.

To work on horses, Oelhafen begins by percussing a horse's neck and getting the blood flowing through the horse's body. She massages the animal, as well as stretches its muscles.

She spends time working on both sides of a horse's body.

"Even if there is an injury on say the left side, if I massage only the left side, they are going to be all uneven. Especially if there is an injury in this leg, then that leg is compensating for it. That leg is probably going to be more tight because it is doing double the amount of work," Oelhafen said.

As she works with a horse, she pays close attention to its body language.

"Horses can't talk, but they have to let you know somehow if they hurt," Oelhafen said. "You just kind of listen to them."

You don't have to be a horse whisperer in order to do that, she said.

"I've lived around horses my whole life. You definitely learn when they are mad, when they love it, when they are uneasy,"

said Oelhafen, who has become accustomed to different horses' temperaments and attitudes.

To monitor how a horse is feeling, Oelhafen keeps an eye on a horse's face as she performs a massage.

"If the horse looks at me a certain way, I know maybe it's not the right spot," she said.

A horse's ears also give clues. If the ears are pointed back, that is a clue that a horse is angry. When they are pointed forward, the horse is feeling content.

And when a horse yawns when Oelhafen gives it a massage, she knows the horse feels good.

"They love it," Oelhafen said.

### Rewarding Results

The day after Oelhafen finished her class, she had her first client: a horse that belongs to a longtime friend.

"She had me working on a horse that had a back that was so tight. She could barely put on a saddle without him being totally mad and crabby and in pain," Oelhafen said.

So Oelhafen did a lot of work on the horse's back. She figured it would take three to five sessions since he was so tight.

But two days later, Oelhafen's friend reported that she was able to ride the horse and he was doing markedly better.

"It was cool to hear that," Oelhafen said.

Oelhafen has since worked on other horses through her new equine massage business. In addition, she massages her own three horses whenever she can.

Oelhafen's 28-year-old Paint horse, named Jen, is especially appreciative of Oelhafen's new skill.

"Now that I'm doing massage, she is so happy about it because she's old and kind of arthritic and rickety," Oelhafen said. "She absolutely loves when I give her a massage."

# Committee Continues Floating Ideas For Kiwanis Park Pond

Members of the Kewaskum Pool Committee gathered near the swim pond at Kiwanis Park on Tuesday, Aug. 9, to discuss ways that it could increase attendance at the village's swimming spot.

As committee members sat under a picnic shelter on the south side of the pond, they decided that it would be a good location for a splash pad.

"On paper, the splash pad looked good more toward the front of the pond, between it and the parking lot, but sitting here now, I think it would be much better if it were right where we are sitting," committee member Wayne Sargent said.

Joshua Layer of Burbach Aquatics, Inc. said that when he next meets with the committee on Sept. 7, he will bring a new rendering that resituates the splash pad to that location.

The pool committee was formed after the Kewaskum Village Board became concerned with dropping attendance at the pool last summer. That, coupled with the \$50,000 the village spends on maintaining the pond each year, made trustees question whether they should make changes to the pond.

Since March, the committee has met monthly to consider a variety of options, ranging from replacing the pond with a pool to adding a splash pad or simply closing the pond.

The committee has solicited input from residents for the past several months. The feedback has been varied, but the overall consensus is that community members want to keep the existing pond.

"What we are trying to

do is to enhance the facility to bring in more attendance and to keep the maintenance cost down," Sargent said. "My opinion is we bring in other amenities such as a splash pad and umbrellas, and redo the bath house, to bring more people in."

The catch is that a price tag comes along with anything that is added to the pond. The most expensive option the committee has considered has been building a \$3 million pool.

Committee members agree that might not be feasible. Instead, they prefer a more affordable option of constructing a 1,300-square-foot splash pad for about \$291,000. That option would have an annual operating cost of about \$11,000 in addition to the pond maintenance fees. The concept that the committee discussed did not have a water recirculation system, which would be more costly.

When the committee met in July, village resident Lloyd Spaeth presented information about a less expensive option: inflatable amenities that can be added to swim ponds. Committee members plan to meet with a company that manufactures inflatable play sets in the near future to learn more about that option.

The Village of Winneconne added inflatable play structures to its swim pond last year, and has since witnessed higher swim attendance.

"I would say we had a tripling of attendance out there. It was phenomenal to see the amount of people that would go out there after the inflatables were installed," Winneconne Village Administrator Mitchell Foster said.

After installing the inflatable structures, Winneconne, which has a population of about 2,400,

now sees a daily attendance of 100 to 600 people at its swim pond.

The inflatable play sets cost about \$10,500 to install, Foster said. With Winneconne's pond encompassing about four acres, the swim area is about four times the size of the pond in Kewaskum.

To support the addition, Winneconne community members raised funds.

"We worked with the Winneconne Area Foundation, which actually took it upon itself, and with citizens, to really get a fundraising program put together for all the inflatables," Foster said.

The City of West Bend has seen an increase in its swim pond attendance at Regner Park since donors funded the addition of a splash pad in 2010, according to West Bend Parks and Forestry Superintendent Mike Jentsch.

"Kudos to all the people who helped donate money. Without the donations, we probably wouldn't have it. It's really been successful for us," Jentsch said.

However, it may be more than just the splash pad that increased Regner Park's annual attendance by about 10,000.

"At the same time that West Bend added its splash pad, the city also completed almost a \$1 million renovation over a three-year period to Regner Park. Plus, the city increased the number of special events in the park," Jentsch said.

Still, there is something else that has more control over attendance.


"The number one controlling factor for attendance at our splash pad and our swim pond is Mother Nature, the temperature," Jentsch said.

In 2012, when the average daily temperature was up, Regner Park had about 25,000 attendees at the swim pond and splash pad. The following year, that number decreased by about 9,000 because of lower temperatures, according to Jentsch.

Attendance has been fairly good this summer at Kiwanis Park, according to Butch Buddenhagen, swim program director. On a recent Saturday, with a temperature of about 90 degrees, 150 people attended the swim pond, Buddenhagen said. About 65 people took swim lessons at the pond this summer, he said.

During the month of June, a total of 1,958 swimmers used Kewaskum's swim pond, Buddenhagen reported.

## Continued From... **Town Of Kewaskum Receives County Report**

Over the past year, the county has focused on working with other departments to share services.

"One highlight of those shared services last year was because of intergovernmental work with Ozaukee County, we have a shared public health department between the two counties now. It is the first shared public health department of its kind in the state of Wisconsin," Schoemann said.

The merger is saving the county \$300,000 in

2016, he said.

Schoemann said that reducing the County Board from 30 to 26 supervisors this year, as well as changing committee structures has helped provide efficiencies within Washington County.

Stoffel echoed that sentiment.

"I have a lot of faith as to how that is going to come out, I think it will serve everybody well," Stoffel said.

Other highlights from the past year that

Schoemann listed were the county's strategic planning and priority-based budgeting, as well as the construction of Washington County Fair Park's Silver Lining Amphitheater.

Schoemann's goals for the next four years include reducing the annual budget deficit, replenishing the health insurance fund, creating the capacity for pay plan study/implementation and holding or reducing the tax levy and/or mill rate.

# Golf Team Coaches Step Down After Long Reigns

After an 18-year run as Kewaskum High boys golf coach, recent health issues have prompted Glenn Eichstedt to step down from the post.

"Over the course of the past couple of years, I've had some knee issues," Eichstedt said August 15, a week after his resignation, and that of assistant coach Scott Rohlinger, were accepted by the Kewaskum School Board.

The veteran coach, a 1972 graduate of Kewaskum High, who later taught social studies at the school until his retirement several years ago, said he has consulted specialists about the knee. "They said I need knee replacement surgery" because there is little cartilage left on the knees. Eichstedt has scheduled the first procedure for late October.

This spring, Eichstedt had the best season he has had at the school. It included a championship run in the first season of the new Eastern Wisconsin Conference.

After placing fifth in the final year of the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, the Indians won the East Central Tournament by an impressive 27 strokes, shooting a score of 316, with Sam Schlosser winning the medal in the event and earning a spot on the all-conference first team along with Andrew Otto.

This was Eichstedt's only conference title at KHS. "We also won three regional titles and had four third places in the sectionals," he said, just missing state trips as a team those years because only the top two teams advance.

Two KHS players, Ethan Geidel in 2008 and Otto in 2016, played in the WIAA State Tournament as individuals.

Three of this year's golfers, Schlosser, Otto and Sean Murray plan to try out for the golf teams at the colleges they are going to. Schlosser and Murray are enrolled at Concordia University while Otto is going to attend Lakeland College.

As far as Rohlinger's reason for stepping down,

Eichstedt said, "It's been really tough for him" the past few seasons, getting home in time for practices and meets after his route sales job with a Milwaukee bread company. Rohlinger also coached for 18 years.

Eichstedt said he thinks this is a good time to step down since there are some upperclassmen who have potential who are returning, led by sophomore-to-be, Jacob Schlosser, who worked his way onto the varsity team after the first couple of matches and became a solid contributor to the championship run. Sophomore Jordan Carlton and Scott Hiltunen also gained varsity experience this spring, and the freshman had some success.

Eichstedt said there is also a good chance a teacher in the school is interested in applying for the position.

Eichstedt was just the second coach in the sport, which officially started on a full time basis in 1966 in the old Scenic Moraine Conference.

# Indians Hope To Stay Perfect Against Suns In Season Opener

Thanks mainly to the gifted-legs of all-time leading rusher Brandon Thull, the accurate throwing arm of Michael Prochnow and a strong offensive line, the Kewaskum High football team piled up 4,500 yards of offense during its 2015 season, a season that produced the first-ever East Central Conference championship and an 11-1 record.

Both have graduated, leaving the Indians with returnees who accounted for just 340 yards of offense and players coming off the junior varsity team, leaving coach Jason Piittmann with several big holes to fill. The first two weeks of practice, the veteran coach has been looking for replacements for the departed stars.

After a scrimmage against Sheboygan Falls, New Berlin Eisenhower and host Nicolet, Piittmann is close to settling on his new backfield, which, fortunately will run behind a couple of veteran linemen, junior Riley Donovan (6-1, 285 pounds), who will move from center to guard or tackle, and tackle Dalton Espetia (5-10, 230).

"The scrimmage went OK," Piittmann said. "We did some nice things, but we also found plenty to work on. We aren't necessarily a young team, but we are an inexperienced or 'green team' at this time."

The four teams at the scrimmage didn't have the best conditions to work under, according to Piittmann, who said, "The weather conditions were not good... a light, steady rain throughout most of it. The field was soft and got torn up pretty quickly. It definitely affected the footing of the linemen."

Still Piittmann was able to name players fighting it out for starting spots. "The receiving corps will mainly be made up of Brady Hanson (Sr.), Gabe Christenson (Jr.), Tony Steger (Jr.), Dan Kries (Jr.) and Bennett Seidensticker (Sr.)," the coach said, adding Jack Felten (Sr.) looks to be the center while Mitch Tietz (Sr.), Dylan Romaine (Jr.) are candidates for the guard spots while Jesse Jones (Sr.), Logan Goetti (Jr.), Will Walters (Jr.) and Jon Leister (Soph) seeing playing time at either guard or tackle. Leister is the biggest of the bunch at 265 pounds.

Piittmann is looking at Seth Bartelt (Sr.) and Colten Miller (Soph) at the fullback spot, indicating a pair of juniors, Patrick Krier and Cole Surprenant, will share the duties at running back. Krier carried the ball just once last year for five yards but he is very strong and will be able to pick up

the tough yards in the middle. "Dalton Poole will be the quarterback with Gabe Christenson as his back up," Piittmann said. Poole saw limited action a year ago, completing five of 16 passes for 46 yards with one touchdown. While rushing, he lost 15 yards in seven carries and fumbled four times. Christenson directed the JV team.

Defensively, the line will include Espitia, Donovan, Tommy Strom, Mitchell Smith and Shawn O'Keefe, according to the coach, who said his linebackers include Krier, a starter last season, Faton Elmazi, Jim Banks, Michael Boettcher, Seidensticker and Surprenant.

The secondary should be strong, led by the six-foot, five-inch Hanson, who was a second team all-league pick. Kries is also a returning starter, and Steger saw action.

No question who will handle the kicking chores. Junior Cade Peterson is back after successfully converting 42 of 49 extra point attempts and two of three field goals.

In addition to those already mentioned, top newcomers include: juniors — Cody Oelhafen, OL/DL; Jerod Otto, WR/CB; Brice Matthies, WR/DB; Tyler Degnitz, WR/DB; Dawson Fox, RB/LB; and Adam Bruss, WR/DB.

Concerning his team's strengths, Piittmann points to the overall program success, the kicking game and experience on the offensive and defensive lines.

The Indians lack experience overall, according to Piittmann, who said the team does not have a great deal of depth and lacks overall team speed.

Kewaskum opens its season this Friday night, August 19, hosting West Bend East for the final time in non-conference play as the Suns go to a new conference next season, one that will have a full slate of games.

To say the Indians have dominated this series would be an understatement. KHS is 13-0 vs. the Suns, with last year's contest ending up in a 41-13 rout, with Prochnow throwing three TD passes to Charlie Witek and Thull rushing for two 80-yard touchdowns and 171 yards.

The kickoff for the game is set for 7 p.m. There are a couple new coaches this year, including Bryon Vandlen and Josh O'Brien-Flasch, who are both line coaches. In addition to these two men, the paid staff includes: Jason Last, Nick Kreif, Bobby Bannasch, Gary Mays and Nick Lyons. Volunteer coaches are Jim "Jonesy" Korth, Tim Rohlinger and Dennis Butz.
