## Kewaskum Fire Department Receives New Thermal Imaging Cameras

The Kewaskum Fire Department has two new thermal imaging cameras, thanks to a donation from the Kewaskum Firefighters Association.

"They are a good tool," to Kewaskum Fire Chief Mark Groeschel said. "When you have a smoke-filled room where you can't see what is in front of your face, and you put this up and you can see through the smoke, it's a good tool. This is the best tool they have to see through smoke."

The cameras cost about \$6,060 apiece, for a total donation of \$12,120, according to Kewaskum Fire Chief Mark Groeschel. Thermal imaging cameras show the temperature of anything in their path, including body temperatures and hotspots within walls.

"A thermal imaging camera helps you see heat. It can see through smoke and cuts down search time. It basically buys you time," Second Capt. Jeff Buechel said.

Since purchasing the cameras in July, the cameras have already been

used to detect hotspots at fires in Campbellsport and West Bend.

The Kewaskum Fire Department previously had one thermal imaging camera that it had purchased in 2001. The department is still using that camera, but the new ones are much smaller, more powerful and more convenient, Groeschel said.

Before selecting the new cameras, the firefighters looked at several cameras that are on the market.

"The reason we chose this one is because of its size. It comes with a lanyard and hooks on a person's coat. If they have to use it, they can pull it out and use it. If they are not using it, they can put it in their pocket. You don't have a big clunky camera to haul around," Groeschel said.

The new cameras are programmable and can be hooked up directly into a computer. In addition to helping fight fires, the cameras can be used in search and rescue operations.

## School Bus Drivers Prepare For New School Year

### – New Eight-Light Warning Law Goes Into Effect

School is starting, and school bus drivers are ready.

"All the routes are done and out," said Lori Heisler, manager of the Johnson Bus Kewaskum terminal,

who completed mailing about 1,200 transportation forms last week.

St. Lucas was starting school on Wednesday, Aug. 24, and the Kewaskum School District and Holy Trinity begin regular instruction on Thursday, Sept. 1.

The summer gave a short reprieve for some of the bus drivers, but the company stayed busy preparing routes for the upcoming school year and transporting students to summer school, among other things.

"We have the summertime sports, and we do trips for weddings, bachelorette parties, bachelor parties, ball games, camp...whatever comes up," Heisler said.

And time was spent fixing up Kewaskum's 30 buses so they would comply with the new eight-light warning law.

#### New Law

Wisconsin's new transportation law, which went into effect on Aug. 16, requires all school buses

built after 2005 to have two red lights and two yellow lights in the front of each bus as well as on the rear of each bus. Most buses in the state used to have eight lights on them, but they all had been red, Heisler said.

"Wisconsin is the last state in the country to go with this eight-light system," Heisler said.

The new law requires school buses to display flashing amber lights before stopping. Drivers will still be required to stop once a school bus's lights flash red and the stop arm comes out, except when on the other side of a divided highway with a median.

Bus drivers will now turn on their amber lights as they approach their intended stop. The flashing yellow lights warn other drivers that they should slow down and begin to stop, much like they should at a yellow traffic light.

"People can go through the yellow lights, but know that something that is

going to be happening," Heisler said.

Once the bus is stopped, the red lights will flash. When this happens, drivers are required to stop at least 20 feet from the bus and remain stopped until the bus resumes motion or the driver turns off the red lights.

The law applies to vehicles driving in the opposite direction, unless they are on a divided highway.

A driver who receives a citation for illegally passing a school bus faces a minimum fine of \$326.50 plus four points on his or her license.

Heisler hopes that other drivers will use caution around school buses.

"People are in such a hurry nowadays," she said. "Be a little more patient around kids."

#### Bus Drivers

Many of Kewaskum's school bus drivers have been driving the big yellow vehicles for a long time.

## WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORTS

### Assist Germantown Police Department With Elusive Suspect

On Saturday, Aug. 20, at 12:45 a.m., a deputy was monitoring Germantown Police radio traffic and heard a call regarding a possible intoxicated driver headed north bound on Interstate 41 in the area of Lannon Road. A Germantown police officer attempted to initiate a traffic stop on the suspect vehicle, at which time the operator, later identified as a 38-year-old City of Milwaukee man, fled.

The suspect turned off his headlights and the deputy joined the pursuit in the area of Pioneer Road. The operator lost control of his vehicle and entered the east ditch of Interstate 41 in the area of Western Avenue. When the operator attempted to drive away again, the deputy assisted Germantown police in removing the suspect from the car and taking him into custody. He remains in custody for fleeing an officer as well as endangering safety by reckless driving.

### Fire Alarm - 4000 Block Pleasant Valley Road

Deputies responded to a residential fire alarm at a large detached garage on Saturday, Aug. 20, at 2:27 a.m. The fire alarm was subsequently determined to be false. While deputies where assisting Slinger Fire Department with a forced entry to the building, West Bend Police were pursuing a vehicle that came directly toward the deputies and stopped within 0.2 mile of the fire call.

### Assist West Bend Police Department

Deputies cleared the above fire scene at 2:52 a.m. and assisted West Bend Police with a pursuit that was south bound on U.S. 45 from the area of Paradise Drive. The chase proceeded west on Pleasant Valley Road and the suspect failed to stop for the stop sign at Mayfield Road. The vehicle ended up stopping in the area of Lily Road after striking two West Bend Police squad cars. One passenger was taken into custody and the suspect was identified as a man from the Fox Valley area. The Sheriff's Office assisted searching for the driver with multiple deputies until about 4:15 a.m. without

success.

### Stolen Vehicle

On Saturday, Aug. 20, at 11:01 a.m., the Sheriff's Office took a report of a stolen vehicle from the 3700 block of Pleasant Valley Rd. A 2004 silver Honda Civic was taken from the driveway. The victim's home is a short distance away from Lilly Road, where the above pursuit was abandoned when the suspect fled on foot into the woods.

The Sheriff's Office requested Fox Valley area police departments to check the area, where it is believed the suspect resides. The vehicle was subsequently located in the Fox Valley area on Sunday, Aug. 21, and is being held at a secure facility until it can be processed for evidence.

### Trespass At 3210 State Highway 167 Momentum Health Club

A 28-year-old City of West Allis man and 29-year-old Greendale man were cited for trespassing after they were running late for a golf outing at Kettle Hills Golf Course when they encountered the road closure in the area of State Highway 167 and State Highway 175. They decided to take a short cut by driving across the baseball diamond's lot and then the mini-golf area.

The subjects then proceeded through a taped off, roped off and finally barred off, lawn of Momentum Health Club. This left substantial ruts in the newly seeded lawn. Investigating deputies were able to secure video from the health club of the 28-year-old driving up to the barrels and letting out

the passenger, who then moved the barrels next to the building. Both suspects were located at the golf course and arrested for trespassing.

### Reckless Use Of A Weapon/ Disorderly Conduct/ Probation Hold

On Aug. 16 at 6:01 a.m., the Sheriff's Office investigated a report of a road rage incident during the morning "rush hour" that culminated in a 31-year-old City of West Bend man shooting at another vehicle with a pellet air pistol.

The preliminary investigation revealed the suspect became agitated with another driver, identified as a 37-year-old Plymouth man, regarding a driving maneuver in the area of U.S. 45 and County Highway PV/Pleasant Valley Road. The suspect allegedly pulled along the passenger side of the victim's vehicle and fired at least three pellets from an air pistol directly at the front passenger side window and window frame. Damage to the victim's vehicle was consistent with the victim's statement.

The suspect vehicle description was promptly passed along to several agencies to the south, and a State Trooper stopped the suspect in the area of Interstate 41 and Main Street in the Village of Menomonee Falls. The suspect adamantly denied being involved in the incident. After deputies responded to the scene and searched the vehicle, a realistic looking air pistol was located within reach of the driver's seat. He was arrested for reckless use of a weapon and disorderly conduct.

# Chief's Corner

School is just around the corner and as I write this article, our Back to School Scavenger Hunt is underway. I've had many children come in and try to convince me to give them an extra clue, some even bribing me with cookies! (Which, for the record, as tempting as home-made cookies can be, I turned them down.) What I love about this scavenger hunt is that it allows our department to interact with the youth in our community and it gets kids outside and into our parks. The person who finds the hidden junior police badge will win a ride to school in our police car and gets to keep the junior police badge they find.

As school begins, drivers need to remember to slow down in school zones and at school crossing guard locations. Our crossing guards assist children who have to cross Fond du Lac Avenue and it is imperative that drivers follow the commands of the crossing guards. It is important for the safety of all our children that they cross the street at locations where we have crossing guards assigned. The Village has crossing guards assigned to three locations in the Village - Fond du Lac Avenue at

Highway H West, Fond du Lac Avenue at Main Street and Fond du Lac Avenue at Second Street.

Crossing guards perform two morning crossings and two afternoon crossings:

Fond du Lac Avenue at Main Street and at Second Street:

6:50 - 7:20 a.m.

8:15 - 8:35 a.m.

2:50 - 3:15 p.m.

3:40 - 4 p.m.

Fond du Lac Avenue at Highway H West:

6:40 - 7:10 a.m.

8:05 - 8:25 a.m.

3:10 - 3:30 p.m.

3:50 - 4:15 p.m.

As parents, please instruct your children as to when and where they should be crossing utilizing the crossing guard corners to get to school safely. It is also important to note that the crossing guards follow the schedule of the Kewaskum Public School District. Therefore, on days when the public schools do not have school, there will not be any crossing guards at those locations to assist children attending our private schools.

Under a new state regulation, school buses are now equipped with both red and amber flashing lights. The flashing amber lights are a signal to drivers that the school

bus is preparing to stop. Drivers need to slow down and proceed with caution past a bus with only amber lights flashing.

As soon as the bus displays the red flashing warning lights, all vehicles must stop for the bus until the red lights are turned off. The lights usually are activated prior to the stop sign being extended. Even if there is no stop sign extending, drivers are expected to stop with the activation of the red flashing lights. The only time a vehicle is not required to stop for a bus when its red flashing lights are on, is when the vehicle is traveling in the opposite direction of the bus on a divided highway that is separated by a median or other physical barrier.

Summer always flies by too fast and another school year is set to begin. I urge everyone to slow down and pay attention when driving so our children can go to and from school each day safely. Together, we will have a safe and successful school year. Go Indians!

## Body Of Kewaskum Man Recovered From Lake Camelot

The body of Paul W. Anderson, a 25-year-old Kewaskum man, was recovered from Lake Camelot in the town of Rome on Sunday, Aug. 21.

According to news reports, Anderson and another man jumped off a dock and into Lake Camelot early in the morning on Saturday, Aug. 20. They were attempting to swim out to a pontoon boat, but Anderson never made it to the boat, the Rome Police Department reported.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources located Anderson's body using underwater remote sonar

and camera equipment.

The Rome Police Department, Adams County Sheriff's Office, Rome Fire Department, Marathon County Sheriff's Office Dive Team and Wisconsin DNR searched for Anderson throughout the weekend.

The Adams County Medical Examiner's Office and Rome Police Department are investigating the cause of death.

Anderson was the son of Dennis and Ardell (Kempfer) Anderson. He attended St. Lucas School, Kewaskum High

School and Moraine Park Technical College. He was currently employed at Delta T Systems.

A funeral service will be held at 3 p.m. on Saturday, Aug. 27, at St. Lucas Evangelical Lutheran Church in Kewaskum. Burial will take place at 1:00 p.m. on Sunday at Lutheran Memorial Park in Kewaskum.

## Guitarist Found Dead In West Bend Hotel

Guitarist Matt Roberts, 38, was found dead at the Hampton Inn and Suites in West Bend on Saturday, Aug. 20.

Roberts, who was a founding member of the rock band 3 Doors Down, was in West Bend to perform at the Rockin' for Heroes benefit concert at Our Place bar and grill in West Bend on Aug. 20. The concert was a fundraiser for the Stars and Stripes Honor Flight program, which sends World War II and Korean War veterans to Washington, D.C.

The concert still went on, and the performance was dedicated to Roberts, who was from Escatawpa, Miss.

Roberts' father, Darrell Roberts, had traveled to

Wisconsin with his son and addressed the concert's audience.

"Everyone has been amazing," Darrell Roberts said over a microphone on Saturday evening. "This is a hard thing, as you can imagine."

Darrell Roberts often traveled with his son.

"He was my youngest, and I guess I always treated him like he was my youngest all his life," said Darrell Roberts, father of two. "He relied heavily on me through the years."

Saturday's concert was to be the first public appearance Roberts would have made, Darrell Roberts said.

"He just never did do crowds, and was always nervous around any kind of public setting," Darrell Roberts said. "But I'll tell you, he loved our military."

Roberts had rehearsed for the concert early Saturday morning.

Roberts, who had been the lead guitarist for 3 Doors Down, left the band in 2012 for health reasons.

The band, which formed in 1996, released its debut studio album, "The Better Life," in 2000 and sold more than 3 million copies. The band is best known for a single from that album, entitled "Kryptonite," which was nominated for a Grammy Award.

According to several media sources, Roberts suffered from a drug addiction.

An autopsy was scheduled for Sunday, Aug. 20. No cause of death had been announced as of press time.



## Continued From... Kewaskum Fire Department Receives New Thermal Imaging Cameras

"You can take one up in a helicopter and look for someone who is lost, possibly someone with Alzheimer's who wanders away," Assistant Fire Chief Herriges said.

The cameras can see in the dark, but will not work through water or glass.

"As far as light travels, you can see. That's all it reads are the infrared heat waves, not any different than a light wave," Buechel said. "Basically as far as you can see, the camera will see."

The cameras are useful in detecting hazardous materials as well, Buechel said.

"You can actually do a tank level for some haz mat situations. When a product like propane that is in a tank is cooler than the air, it will actually show that temperature differential in shades of dark,"

Buechel explained.

The new, 1.5-pound cameras can show temperatures in color, compared to the old black-and-white 10-pound version. In addition, the batteries for the new cameras last much longer than the old camera.

"Thermal imaging cameras are good tools," Groeschel said. "We are very grateful to get these."

### Kewaskum Firefighters Association

The Kewaskum Firefighters Association is made up of volunteer firefighters for the department.

Back in 2001, the association raised \$19,000 to purchase the Kewaskum Fire Department's first thermal imaging camera.

"That is how our Soup Sampler started," Herriges said. "We invited all the

people that made a substantial donation to come. It was such a great turnout that we continued doing it every year."

To raise funds, the Kewaskum Firefighters Association has held the Soup Sampler and other fundraisers throughout the year. The Soup Sampler has soups donated by members and restaurants. This year, the event featured 39 different soups. Prizes and silent auction items were donated by area businesses, organizations and individuals.

In addition to donating the thermal imaging cameras, the Kewaskum Firefighters Association donated about \$26,000 last year toward the department's new tender, which can haul 2,000 gallons of water.



# Indians Outlast West Bend East In Battle Of High-Powered Offenses

## – Second Half Delayed By Lightning

An impressive seven-play, 70-yard scoring drive midway in the fourth quarter propelled the Kewaskum High football team to a 34-27 victory over West Bend East on Aug. 19 in a high-scoring game featuring the Indians' speed backfield and their power backfield vs. the Suns' aerial attack.

A second aerial show came from the sky. Lightning was spotted just before halftime, and announcement was made for spectators and players to take cover. An hour later, play was resumed with the score deadlocked at 20-20.

KHS junior Tony Steger broke loose for a 23-yard touchdown run with 5:26 remaining and his run on the two-point conversion erased East's 27-26 lead. The Indians defense did the rest stopping the Suns at the 19-yard line when linebacker Patrick Krier stuffed Kyle Yochem's two-yard touchdown run. Logan Cunningham put the Suns in the lead, 7-6.

Remember those names Steger and Krier. They were the stars of the Indians' running game, combining for 223 yards on the night. Steger carried the ball 14 times for 189 yards, while Krier came in on short yardage situations, gaining 34 yards in nine tries and scoring three touchdowns.

"Overall, I thought our offense performed well.

After looking at the film, I thought our line performed well," KHS coach Jason Piittmann said about the win and staying a perfect 13-0 against the Suns since 2002. "Thirty-four points in Game One, and East is a veteran team."

After East went three-and-out on the first series, KHS went to work from its 43-yard line and needed just three plays to score. Lining up in the "Wildcat" offense, Steger took a direct snap from center Jack Felton and sprinted around the right end for a 45-yard scamper to the Suns' nine-yard line. Two plays later, the Indians were on the board with Krier plowing in from the six, but Cade Peterson was wide right with his PAT try, leaving the score at 6-0.

East came back with a long drive, chewing up over seven minutes on the clock, mixing running and passing to get in position for Kyle Yochem's two-yard touchdown run. Logan Cunningham put the Suns in the lead, 7-6.

Steger returned the kickoff 40 yards, looking like last year's star, Brandon Thull, in the process, spinning away from would-be tacklers until he was finally stopped at the KHS 45.

First down runs by Cole Surprenant, Cole Poole and Steger (a 23 yarder) put the ball on the Suns' 10, and three plays later, it

was Krier going over from the one, and the Indians were back on top.

East scored twice in the second quarter, the first coming on a 39-yard Yochem scamper, and then on a 11-yard pass from QB Dillen Rondorf to Karl Lemke, the Suns' best receiver, on a fourth down play.

The second touchdowns was set up when Kewaskum's punter, Peterson, ran on a fourth down from the KHS three-yard line. Peterson took the snap deep in the end zone and took off around the left end but was stopped short of the first down.

"Cade saw the guys coming and bailed out on it," said Piittmann, who added that the play was definitely not a fake punt call.

With just 3:18 left in the first half East tried a pooch kick, giving the Indians the ball on the KHS 38. A fourth down run by Krier kept the drive alive, and after runs of 11 and 15 yards by Surprenant, a 11-yard gallop by Steger and another Surprenant nine-yarder, it was Krier getting his third touchdown on a three-yard run with 0:48 remaining in the half.

Right after the kickoff, the lightning and rain came with fans leaving the metal bleachers in favor of their cars or the school's cafeteria.

When the game

resumed, neither team scored in the third quarter, then the Indians put together their longest drive of the night, an 80-yarder in eight plays, using a steady dose of Steger before going to the air with Poole hitting six-foot, six-inch Brady Hanson for a 36-yard touchdown pass and a 26-20 lead.

Not to be outdone, Rondorf and Tony Bland hooked up for a 90-yard touchdown pass, and Cunningham's PAT gave the Suns their last lead (27-26) when Steger and company showed composure one more time for the drive that won the game.

In addition to Steger's

189 yards, Surprenant rushed for 57 yards in 13 carries. Poole was 5x13 passing for 118 yards, with Hanson catching three balls for 80 of those yards.

He (Steger) had a really big night ... a nice night," Piittmann said, indicating, "We didn't show it (Wildcat) in the scrimmage, but we've been working on it."

Rondorf had an up-and-down performance, completing 15 of 33 passes for 236 yards and two touchdowns. At least a half dozen more times, he had open receivers he overthrew. His favorite target was Lemke, who hauled in seven passes for 83

yards, giving KHS d-back Dan Kreis fits most of the night.

Defensively, the Indians were led by the 5-8, 205-pound Krier, who was credited with seven solos and 12 team tackles. Hanson had four solos, 12 team tackles and blocked an extra point.


The line also did well, according to Piittmann, who said, "Pass rushing is tiring on a big guy." Still, Donovan Riley, Dalton Espitia and Jon Lesiter, who came in after Tommy Strom was injured, kept after Rondorf.



Fred Winn's car spun off turn four on lap 26 while racing for position with Mike

Egan and the first caution flag appeared with Blawat leading Alex Prunty, Dennis Prunty, Loch, and Apel. Blawat chose the outside lane for the restart and the decision proved costly as Alex Prunty drove to the lead as racing resumed from the bottom groove.

Blawat settled into second while Dennis Prunty and Rich Loch battled for third, at one point making contact that sent their cars scattering loose but both drivers as well as those behind them maintained control as Prunty took the position. Rob Braun became collected with Loch's car while Mitch McGrath's car leaped over Braun's side and landed across Loch's hood as the caution appeared once again. ## So It Goes

### Tourism Impact Is \$640 Per Household

This week's edition includes our Fall Visitor publication. This is our local tourism publication available both in print and online. It should be noted that 90 percent of visitors want print.

The publication includes much detailed information on local things to see, do, and participate in. The information is intended for our regular weekly readers as well as those visiting the area in order to know about local up-coming activities.

It is important to remember that visitor or tourism dollars lower our property taxes. According to David Spiegelberg, Wisconsin Department of Tourism, the tourism economy generated \$1.5 billion in state and local revenue in 2015, saving Wisconsin taxpayers \$640 per household. This is certainly welcome news and we will take the tax relief.

I often go around and re-stock our visitor guide in newsstands during the season. I can really tell that more people are coming to this area especially to the Ice Age Visitor Center near Dundee.

We started putting out our Spring Visitor at the end of March. I restocked our main stands weekly during our busiest time. I observed that we went through the most visitor guides this year during the last three weeks of July and the first week of August (600 to 800 per week).

It was exciting for me to see so much real interest in our communities after so many years of trying to be more tourism friendly. It is not only important for tourism, but also for our quality of life. We need to have things to do to keep people living here.

There is even Sunday delivery is some post office districts. It is too expensive for commercial companies to deliver to every address. Weekly newspapers like this one are also very dependent on timely delivery of their products — newspapers. Most newspapers in Wisconsin are weekly newspapers that are mail delivered.

The mail is slower than it used to be. The U.S. Postal Service (USPS) slowed it down by a day, at least, because of financial problems. Many of our out-of-county subscribers are unhappy because too often their papers are arriving late. Some local businesses have had problems with cash flow because of late mail.

If you follow the news, you know that the USPS is in trouble. More and more people are turning to using the internet instead of the mail so first-class mail has been steadily declining for some time. There is not as much mail to deliver but we still expect the mail to come. Postal officials have made many operational changes and have substantially shrunk the number of people working at the USPS while trying to maintain a level of service.

I have been working with the National Newspaper Association (NNA) to represent the interests of delivering newspapers by mail. Mail still makes the most sense in a state like Wisconsin, which is mainly rural, to deliver newspapers. Hometown newspaper is still by far the main local media in Wisconsin as well as across the country.

Beneath the surface, however, we at NNA see seismic, economic-rattling changes ahead unless Congress can pass legislation to lower the postal services cost of doing business. It carries more than \$50 billion of debt (all from prepaid healthcare requirements from the past 10 years) on its balance sheet. A 2006 law imposed a requirement to put advance funding into federal retirement health plans for postal workers. Other agencies don't do advance funding. They are on a pay as you go system.

This requirement began to cripple USPS soon after its passage to the tune of about five billion dollars per year. What the 2006 law didn't do was to

relieve USPS of also contributing to Medicare for the same staff, which many don't use. So the USPS has two different plans for its workers and pays fully for both of them when only one is used for most workers. The USPS pays double.

This also means that you pay extra for this every time you purchase stamps, or get a package delivered to your home (postage paid directly or indirectly). It is not fair and should be corrected. There are bills that have been introduced in the House by Jason Chaffetz, R-UT and Elijah Cummings, D-MD, as well as other House members and by Sens. Tom Harper, D-DE, Claire McCaskill, D-MO, Mark Warner, D-VA, Roy Blunt, R-MO, Jerry Moran, R-KS, and Susan Collins, R-ME, (known as Chaffetz-Cummings and Carper bills) that would fix this problem. Without a fix, automatic postal service cuts will occur and this will affect us right here at home.

This is not a bailout. This is stopping your postage money from being unfairly collected and relieving a financial burden USPS did not deserve if Medicare was used instead.

Mail is important especially in rural locations like Wisconsin. But it has to be reliable and on time or it is of no value. Unless this legislation gets through, mail will get slower and eventually we won't be able to take it for granted. If you get a chance, e-mail a note to your members of Congress asking them to consider these bills so we can give our Post Offices the tools they need to deliver our mail and packages on time at a reasonable cost. Better yet, send a letter by mail.

I normally don't comment on supporting bills in my columns, however, the information in this column was published by other community newspapers and a few members of Congress noticed and it actually caused some interest in the movement of this bill through Congress.

I am not sure if running this column will make a difference but if the right person may see it, it may help. I know one thing for sure, if we do nothing, nothing will happen and the USPS will be in trouble and we won't enjoy the level of service we are accustomed to.

### Everyone Counts On The Mail

Lately, it occurs to me how completely I take for granted that I will get my mail tomorrow. I will get a couple of bills. A greeting card. Some catalogs. A newspaper or two. One package that my wife or kids grab right away.

With the impact of e-commerce, the mail has become even more important than ever for delivering packages for Amazon, FedEx, as well as many other package delivery companies. The post office, especially in rural areas, is the end delivery vehicle for e-commerce.

I recall talking with the postal officials near the end of last year and learned that there were up to 2,000 e-commerce packages per day delivered by the Campbellsport and Kewaskum Post Offices during the holiday season. I also met with Amazon officials in January and they told me they send trucks daily directly to most Wisconsin post offices.

# The Kettle Moraine: A Great Area To Visit

The Kettle Moraine area is a great place to visit. It boasts some of the best physical features in the state and some of the most friendly neighboring villages.

This time of the year is an especially nice time to visit the Kettle Moraine State Forest. As the temperatures start to drop, the colors in the forest become beautiful. It is a great time to take a walk down one of the trails and just look at the scenery.

Then, as the snow starts to fall, the fun continues. There are so many winter activities that you can do in the Kettle Moraine that you will need a lot of time to get it all done. You can snowshoe through the forest, cross country and down-hill ski, ice fish, snowmobile and just have fun in the snow.

Known as the Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit, this area can thank the glaciers for the unique characteristics. The northern unit of the forest is only a portion of what is sometimes called the Kettle Range.

This range was created when the Green Bay Lobe of the glacier on the west, collided with the Lake Michigan Lobe of the glacier on the east, depositing sediment. The western glacier formed the Bay of Green Bay, Lake Winnebago and the Horicon Marsh while the eastern one formed Lake Michigan.

This area contains very hilly terrain and glacial landforms, such as kettles, kames and eskers. The forest is divided into two large and three small units, which are spread across a hundred miles.

The Kettle Moraine

State Forest-Northern Unit consists of an area covering the western part of Sheboygan County, the southeastern part of Fond du Lac County and the northern portion of Washington County. It includes more than 29,000 acres. The forest itself was established in 1936 to help preserve this unique area and its features.

The forest is managed for multiple uses, including recreation management, sustainable forest products, water quality and soil protection, terrestrial and aquatic wildlife, native biological diversity, and aesthetics.

The forest headquarters is located near Campbellsport. Features of the Northern Unit are the Greenbush Recreation Area, with a group camping area and hiking trails; the Parnell Observation Tower; the Long Lake Recreation Area, with a campground, a beach and boat launch; the Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center; and the Mauthe Lake Recreation Area, with a campground, a beach and boat launch.

About 145 miles of trails can be found in the northern unit. These trails are used for biking, hiking, horseback riding, cross country skiing and snowmobiling. (See a color map on page 2 for the different trails in the forest)

Other facilities in the area include 336 family campsites with modern facilities, nine group campsites, six backpack shelters, a horse riders campground, three swimming beaches, five boat launches and an observation tower.

It is estimated that approximately one million people visit the forest every year. Annual camper nights equal

more than 91,000.

You will definitely be able to find something fun to do in the Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit. There is something for everyone.

The forest headquarters are located at N1765 Highway G, south of Dundee. It is open Monday-Friday from 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m.

The Mauthe Lake recreation area entrance station hours will vary during the off-season (which is after Labor Day). Call (262) 626-4305 for more informa-

tion.

The Long Lake Recreation area entrance station hours also vary during the off-season. Call (920) 533-8612 for more information.

The Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center is open seven days-a-week April through October. Winter hours go into effect

November through March, call ahead to check on the specific hours the center is open. The center is one-half mile west of Dundee on State Highway 67 and offers forest information, interpretative displays, and a 20-minute Ice Age film. Call (920) 533-8322 for more information.

#### Area Villages

Don't forget to visit the

area villages and towns that surround the Kettle Moraine Forest. They are all welcoming and helpful.

Campbellsport is on the west side of the forest. You can get to Campbellsport by taking Highway 67.

Kewaskum is on the southwestern side of the forest. You can get to Kewaskum by taking Highway 45 or Highway 28.

Dundee is within the forest on the western side. It is located along Highway 67. The Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center is just outside of Dundee on Highway 67.

New Prospect is a small town located within the forest. You can get there by traveling along Highway 55. The

horseriders camp is located in New Prospect.

Greenbush is near the northern portion of the forest. You can get to Greenbush by taking County Highway A.

Glenbeulah is also on the northern corner of the forest. It can be found by taking County Highway A or County Highway P.

Plymouth is a short drive to the east of the forest. You can take Highway 67 to get to Plymouth.

Cascade is also a short drive to the east of the forest. You can get to Cascade by taking Highway 28.

West Bend is a short drive south of the forest. You can get to West Bend by taking Highway 45.

# Ice Age Center Is A Great Resource

The Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center is a great resource for anyone visiting the Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit. It is located just outside of Dundee on Highway 67.

Its purpose is to introduce and orient visitors to the forest about the area and the special features of the area. The glaciers that covered this area about 10,000 years ago left some unique terrain and features in this area.

The Kettle Moraine was created when the Green Bay Lobe of the glacier, on the west, collided with the Lake Michigan Lobe of the glacier, on the east, depositing sediment. The western glacier formed the Bay of Green Bay, Lake Winnebago and the Horicon Marsh while the eastern one formed Lake Michigan.

As the glaciers melted and moved, they left behind many different features like moraines, kames, eskers, drumlins, and kettles. The Ice Age Visitor Center explains these features, how they were formed and gives examples of these features in the area.

"You can get a good idea of how the glaciers affected this area and the treasures it left," said Jackie Scharfenberg, DNR naturalist at the Ice Age Center. "A lot of groups come here as a jumping off point."

After visiting the center, you can then go out into the forest to see these different formations. Many trails can be found in the forest to get

you to these features. A short trail is also accessible from the Ice Age Visitor Center.

Another feature of the center is the information you can receive about the forest activities. The center has maps of all the trails in the forest, campgrounds, information about Mauthe and Long Lakes and the campgrounds in the forest.

"We can provide information about the forest and its multitude of things to do," Scharfenberg said.

The Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center was opened in January of 1981 and dedicated in May of 1981. It was named after a Wisconsin congressman. The Zillmer Trail was also named after a Wisconsin congressman.

"They got some of the initial money passed (for the center and trails)," Scharfenberg said.

The center is open year-round. From April through October, it is open Monday-Friday from 8:30 a.m.-4 p.m. and on weekends from 9:30 a.m.-5 p.m. During the months from November through March, the hours will vary, so please call ahead at (920) 533-8322. About 25,000-30,000 people stop at the Ice Age Visitor Center every year.

Every week educational programs are held at the center. These programs teach young and old about the forest wildlife, vegetation and other fun nature-related things. Programs are generally free to the public, with some excep-

tions. A calendar of these educational programs can be found on pages 18, 19 and 20.

## Things To Do At The Ice Age Visitor Center

Throughout the year, the forest naturalists present a wide array of fun-filled educational programs. The programs are held at the Ice Age Visitor Center, Mauthe Lake Recreation Area, Long Lake Recreation Area or at other spots within the forest. There are programs for all interests and age levels.

View exhibits to learn about the frozen history of Wisconsin and the gifts of the glacier. There is a great view of the landscape from the nature center and a naturalist is available to answer your questions.

Become a Wisconsin Explorer and discover the natural world. Pick up a booklet at the nature center. The booklets are full of hands-on, exciting and educational activities for days on the beach, rainy days at home or starry nights. Complete at least half of activities and return it to any state park, forest or recreation area. Receive a patch and certificate for completing the activities.

The Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center is a great place to start your visit to the Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit. It will help educate you about the forest and give you information about more opportunities in the forest.



# Winter Activities Abound In The Kettle Moraine

The Kettle Moraine State Forest is a beautiful place to visit and the fall and winter seasons are no exception. It has so many activities for everyone.

You can start out in the fall months with a hike through the many trails in the forest. As the temperatures start to go down, the colors in the forest really come out. A hike through the trails will be beautiful with all the yellows, oranges and reds you will see in the trees and the shrubs. Don't forget to climb Parnell Tower to get a beautiful look at most of the forest.

The winter months may be cold with lots of snow, but there are still many outdoor activities for you and your family in the Kettle Moraine Forest and surrounding areas. You can go ice fishing, snowmobiling, snowshoeing, skiing and golfing in the snow.

## Snowmobiling

One of the many fun activities in the winter is snowmobiling. Lots of trails for snowmobiles can be found around the forest and in the forest.

The state forest has a 60-mile network of

snowmobile trails which join to county and private trails connecting to adjoining towns and villages. Trails are groomed by four local snowmobile clubs under contract with the state forest. These snowmobile clubs are Northern Kettle Moraine Crooked Trails, Greenbush Trail Blazers, Kewaskum Sno-Chiefs, and New Fane Kettle Riders.

Trails around the forest are kept nicely during the winter months and provide lots of opportunities for snowmobiling in the area. Trails around the forest are groomed by the following clubs: Campbellsport Snow-Cougars, Dotyville Drifters, Eden Sno Birds, New Fane Kettle Riders, Northern Kettle Moraine Crooked Trails, Kewaskum Sno-Chiefs, Kettle Moraine Snowmobile Club, Plymouth Snow Rangers, Cascade Apollo Riders, Greenbush Kettle Moraine Trailblazers, and Beechwood Night Fliers.

See the current conditions page at the Kettle Moraine State Forest Unit's portion of the DNR website and/or call (920) 892-7455 to check trail conditions and to

make sure trails are open.

Note: Any person who is born on or after January 1, 1985, and who has reached the age of 12, must have completed and received a snowmobile safety certificate in order to operate a snowmobile in Wisconsin. The certificate must be carried while operating the snowmobile, and displayed to a law enforcement officer upon demand. A parent, guardian, or person 18 years old or older must accompany any child under age 12 on the same snowmobile when operating on public areas.

Many snowmobile organizations have trails that they maintain outside of the forest. Fond du Lac County has hundreds of miles of trails in the area. You can check the Fond du Lac County Snowmobile Association's website at <http://fdlsnowmobileassn.com> for more information on the county trails and conditions.

## Skiing

Skiing is a great winter activity that can not only be fun, but also great for physical fitness. You can either cross country ski in the area or try your luck at downhill skiing.

**Cross Country** — At the Greenbush recreation area a total of 25 miles of machine-groomed cross-country ski trails are provided for diagonal and skate skiers. Pets and hiking are not allowed on ski trails.

The 1.2-mile Brown Loop at Greenbush is lighted for night skiing. The trail lights can be activated by skiers nightly between 4:30 p.m. and 10 p.m. A heated log shelter house, a sledding hill, and nine miles of snowshoe trails also are open to the public at the Greenbush Recreation Area.

Volunteers from the Northern Kettle Moraine Nordic Ski Club (NKMNSC), in cooperation with the state forest, regularly machine groom the ski trail system for diagonal and skate skiing. For more information on trail conditions and the NKMNSC, call the club's trail hotline (920) 467-2099, or visit its web site at [www.greenbushusa.com](http://www.greenbushusa.com).

More than 11 miles of cross-country ski trails are available at the Zillmer Trail Area. Forest staff regularly machine groom the trails for diagonal and skate skiing. For current ski trails conditions in southeastern Wisconsin including Zillmer visit the Friends of Lapham Peak Web site. A total of 7.7 miles of ungroomed cross-country ski trails are available at New Fane.

**Downhill** — A couple of options are available in the area for downhill skiing.

You can go to Sunburst Ski Area in Kewaskum. It is a great hill for skiing and snowtubing. You can go to [www.skisunburst.com](http://www.skisunburst.com) for more information or

call 262-626-8404.

You can also try Little Switzerland in Slinger. For more information on this hill, you can go to [www.littleswitz.com](http://www.littleswitz.com) or call 262-644-5020.

In Plymouth, you could try Nutt Hill. Follow Main Street to the top of the hill. This hill is opened when there is 10-12 inches of natural snow on the ground and has a heated shelter. You can call 920-207-SKII (7544) for current information on this hill.

## Hiking & Snowshoeing

Hikers and snowshoers may explore several miles of trails that are not groomed for skiing. The following trails are recommended for winter hiking and/or snowshoeing: Greenbush and New Fane snowshoe trails; Moraine Nature Trail - .75 miles, easy to intermediate; Tamarack Nature Trail - 2 miles, easy; Parnell Trail - 3.5 miles, intermediate to difficult; Butler Lake Trail - 3.1 miles, easy to intermediate; Ice Age National Scenic Trail - 31 miles, intermediate to difficult.

Pets are prohibited on designated nature trails.

# A Geological History Of The Kettle Moraine

Some 20,000 years ago, two lobes of a great ice sheet met along a line extending northeast from Richmond in Walworth County through the Oconomowoc Lake country to Kewaunee County. One lobe moved down what is now the Green Bay-Lake Winnebago area.

Spreading under tremendous pressure, the two lobes met and in the encounter, large blocks of ice were broken off and buried in the glacial deposit or till. As the ice melted, "kettles" were formed, some only a few yards across, others 100 to 200 feet deep.

The ice moved under great pressure, changing shape rather than sliding across the face of the land. As it changed shape, large amounts of rock, gravel, sand and silt were picked up and carried along by the glacier. When the ice melted, this material was deposited, in some instances, across glacier-formed valleys. Some "kettles" were formed this way.

The Kettle Moraine is an area of varied topography — parallel, steep-sided ridges, conical hills and flat outwash plains, mostly composed of sand and gravel.

Many of the conical hills are conspicuous. Holy Hill reaches an elevation of 1,361 feet above sea level and some 340 feet above the stream valley to the east. Sugar Loaf or Pulford Peak (elevation 1,320 feet) is 320 feet above Pike Lake. Lapham Peak (elevation 1,233 feet), where there is a picnic area and observation tower, is 343 feet above Nagawicka Lake.

Similar detached sand and gravel conical hills, called kames, characterize the moraine throughout much of its extent. Some of these kames are cones formed beneath the glacier by surface streams which fell through holes in the ice. The undulating level-topped, narrow ridges called eskers were probably deposits in open cracks (crevasses) in the ice. In some areas the outwash terraces are pitted due to the melting of buried ice masses.

The Kettle Moraine area rises to 300 or more feet above the lands to the east and west yet is not a continuous divide. Maximum thickness of the drift is not known because few wells reach bedrock. It is possible that the drift reaches a thickness of

500 feet in some places.

Limestone underlies much of the Kettle Moraine. This formation is 450 to 800 feet thick and dips gently eastward. Its western edge or escarpment extends from Washington Island to the Illinois line near Walworth. It lies 20 miles to the west of Kettle Moraine at Greenbush, is completely covered by the moraine in the Waukesha County area and is eight miles east of the moraine at Elkhorn. Because of the cover of drift, there are few outcrops in the moraine.

Lakes, of several origins, add greatly to the attractiveness of the Kettle Moraine. With the exception, of Pewaukee Lake, which lies in a preglacial valley blocked on the west and east by drift, all lakes in the Oconomowoc area occupy kettles. Long Lake, Big Cedar Lake and Elkhart Lake occupy preglacial valleys between morainic ridges. These valleys were probably occupied by ice blocks and escaped being filled by glacial drift.

### State Forest History

After the period of glaciation, most of the highland surface became forested with fine

hardwood timber and the swampy or low areas with softwoods.

Before the 17th century, small bands of roving Indians inhabited the area. With exploration and development of the area during the 18th and 19th centuries by the white settlers, a great change took place.

Fifty percent or more of the land in the northern Kettle Moraine was cleared and turned into

farms. Sixty to 70 percent of the land in the southern Kettle Moraine was farmed. A substantial proportion of the cleared land was submarginal.

Over the years plantings of conifers, such as white and red pine and spruce, have been made in all units of the forest. The pine and spruce will convert to northern hardwood species of maples,


cherry, ash and basswood.

With the increase in Wisconsin's population, particularly in the southeastern 16 counties, the need for a large acreage devoted to public outdoor recreation and forestry became evident as early as 1920. In its 1937 session, the Wisconsin Legislature authorized the development of this forest and recreational area.

## Trails In The Kettle Moraine

One of the great things about the Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit is the many trails that are available within the forest. You can walk, bike, picnic, ride horses, cross country ski, snow shoe and have a lot of fun on these trails.

The Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit has more than 132 miles of trails, varying in difficulty, length, and permitted uses. Steep climbs or descents are common. Pets on designated trails must be on a leash (no longer than eight feet long). Parking lots are provided throughout the forest. A state trail pass is required for bikers and horseback riders, 16 years of age and older.

To see a full forest map with all of the trails highlighted, turn to page 2.

**Butler Lake Loop:** On Butler Lake Road, 1.5 miles east of the Long Lake Recreation Area, the Butler Lake Trail winds more than three miles through the 158-acre Butler Lake and Flynn's Spring State Natural Area.

A portion of the loop trail is shared with the Ice Age Trail. Interpretive displays are set at the base of the esker and overlook Butler Lake. A picnic table, grill and drinking water are at the trailhead.

**Greenbush Loop System:** On Kettle Moraine Drive, 2.5 miles north of State Highway 67, the Greenbush Trail recreation area has two trail systems: four loops of challenging mountain bike trails totaling nine miles, interwoven with five loops of hiking trails totaling 13.5 miles.

Hikers and off-road mountain bikers share this multiple-use trail system in season. For safety reasons, these trails are use-specific: hiking is not allowed on the bike trails, and biking is not allowed on the hiking trails.

In winter, the trails are groomed for cross-country skiing. Pets and hiking are not allowed on ski trails. The 1.2-mile Brown loop at Greenbush is lighted for night skiing. The bike trails are excellent for winter hik-

ing and snowshoeing. A heated picnic shelter, picnic tables, grill, drinking water and vault toilets are near the trail head. There is also access to the Ice Age Trail.

**New Fane Loop System:** On County Line Road, 1.5 miles east of Kettle Moraine Drive, the New Fane area has two trail systems: four loops of moderately-challenging mountain bike trails totaling 5.5 miles, interwoven with four loops of hiking trails totaling 7.7 miles. A short connector trail allows hikers access to the Ice Age Trail (bikes are not allowed on the connector trail).

Hikers and off-road mountain bikers share this multiple-use trail system in season. For safety reasons, these trails are use-specific: hiking is not allowed on the bike trails, and biking is not allowed on the hiking trails.

An open-air reservable shelter is located near the trail head, and drinking water and vault toilets are available year-round.

In winter, the hiking

trails serve as un-groomed cross-country ski trails, and the bike trails are open to winter hiking and snowshoeing.

**Parnell Loop:** On County Highway U, one-quarter mile west of County Highway A, the Parnell Tower Trail begins its 3.5-mile loop with a series of steps leading to the highest point of elevation in the forest. There a 60-foot observation tower rises above the treetops for a birds-eye view of the glacial landscape.

The trail follows the Ice Age Trail near a rustic backpack shelter reservable for camping.

Picnic tables, grills, drinking water and vault toilets are adjacent to the trailhead.

**Tamarack Loop:** This trail can be accessed near the Forest Headquarters off County G, or from the Mauthe Lake recreation area off County GGG. This two-mile nature trail is entirely within the Mauthe Lake Refuge and loops around the lake.

This area is closed to hunting, and pets are prohibited on the trail. Flush toilets are available year-round on the headquarter's side.

**Spruce Lake Bog**

**Trail:** This 0.25-mile, easy boardwalk trail takes visitors through a unique open-lake bog community to Spruce Lake. This site was designated as a National Natural Landmark by the National Park Service, and one can expect to see sundews, pitcher plants, and other rare plant species.

Visitors are requested to stay on the boardwalk, due to the fragile nature of the habitat and the presence of poison sumac.

**Summit Trail:** Accessed from the Long Lake Campgrounds (upper 900s loop), the Summit trail is a one-mile nature trail loop which scales Dundee Mountain.

Glacial geology interpretive signs mark this challenging trail to the top of the highest kame in the forest, with panoramic views of the Campbellsport drumlins and other ice age topography. Pets are not allowed on this trail.

**Zillmer Loop System:** On County Highway SS, one-quarter mile west of County Highway G, the Zillmer Trail Area consists of four loop trails for a total of 11 miles. The south trail head has a heated shelter, vault toilets, picnic tables, grills and drinking water.

Visitors can also access the trail from the Ice Age Visitor Center. A rustic backpack shelter is reservable for camping along the trail.

In winter forest staff regularly machine groom the trails for diagonal and skate skiing. Hiking and pets are prohibited when snow is present. The area is closed to hunting with firearms, except during deer gun and spring turkey seasons.

**Moraine Nature Trail:**

This 3/4-mile, easy nature-trail loop begins at the Ice Age Visitor Center. A self-guided booklet links to the numbered posts along the trail and identifies the common trees of the Kettle Moraine.

Picnic tables are available at the trail head. Pets are not allowed on this trail.

**Lake to Lake Bike Trail:**

This 6.5-mile limestone surfaced trail connects the Mauthe and Long Lake recreation areas and passes by the village of Dundee.

This gentle trail winds through hardwood forests, prairies, conifer plantations, and lowland swamps.

**Off-Road Bike Trails:**

Off-road biking is only permitted on the Greenbush (nine miles) and New Fane (5.5 miles) loop trails. Normally these trails are opened in late April through November, depending on trail conditions.

It is highly recommended that you not ride while it is raining or within four to six hours after rain has stopped.

A trail pass is required for riders 16 years of age and older. See the current conditions page on the DNR website and/or call ahead to check trail conditions and to make

sure trails are open.

**Wade House Access Trail:**

A 1.7-mile linear trail that connects the Old Wade House State Historical site in Greenbush to the Ice Age Trail. The trail travels through hardwood forests, a meadow, and the Kettle Moraine Red Oaks State Natural Area.

Limited parking is available at the Wade House parking lot (no overnight parking). Walk one block east on Washington Street to the trail head.

**Bridle Trails:**

Equestrians enjoy 41 miles of bridle trail which are traditionally open late April through mid-November depending on trail conditions. The main bridle trail winds the linear length of the forest of 33 miles. Two loop trails, Crooked and Forest Lake, provide shorter routes totaling more than seven miles.

Volunteers from the Northern Kettle Moraine Horse Trail Association, in cooperation with the state forest, partner working on projects and special events to enhance the horseback riding experience in the state forest.

A trail pass is required for riders 16 and older. See the current conditions page on the DNR website and/or call

ahead to check trail conditions and to make sure trails are open.

**Ice Age National Scenic Trail:**

About 31 miles of the Ice Age National Scenic Trail travels the length of the forest. The moderate to difficult course follows sinuous eskers and tumbled moraines descending into bogs and deep kettles. Five rustic backpack shelters are reservable for camping along the trail. The Ice Age Trail includes various portions of other forest trails.

The Ice Age Trail is a National Scenic Trail located entirely within Wisconsin. The trail is also one of 42 designated Wisconsin State Trails, and the only one specifically designated as a "State Scenic Trail." From Interstate State Park on the Minnesota border to Potawatomi State Park on Lake Michigan, the Ice Age Trail winds for more than 1,000 miles, following the edge of the last continental glacier in Wisconsin.

One of only eight National Scenic Trails, the Ice Age Trail is intended to be a premier hiking trail and conservation resource for silent sport and outdoor enthusiasts. The trail traverses some of Wisconsin's most scenic landscapes and helps tell the story of the last Ice Age by highlight-

ing Wisconsin's unique glacial features.

The Ice Age Trail travels through 30 counties on state, federal, county and private lands, connecting dozens of communities. There are hundreds of trailheads and access points located along the trail route. More than 600 miles of trail are open. The completed sections of the trail are connected by less-traveled roadways and other temporary routes.

\*Pets allowed on designated trails and must be on a leash (no longer than eight feet long).

**Snowmobile Trails:**



mobile, and displayed to a law enforcement officer upon demand. A parent, guardian, or person 18 years old or older must accompany any child under age 12 on the same snowmobile when operating on public areas.

## Dundee Mill And Park

An interesting site to see while visiting the Kettle Moraine State Forests-Northern Unit is the Dundee Mill & Park. It is located in Dundee, near Highway 67 just down the road from the Ice Age Visitor Center.

The Dundee Mill & Park is owned by the Town of Osceola. Restoration of the old mill began in 1990 when a group of volunteers had the goal of restoring an old mill. Their aim was to preserve a part of Wisconsin's heritage for future generations so they may learn about a time when life was without modern technology.

In 1996 the mill was declared a Town Historical Site and the Partners of the Dundee Mill and Park, Inc. was created by the town as non-profit, non-stock, tax exempt, corporation to maintain, restore, and preserve Dundee Mill and Park.

A group of volunteers had the goal of restoring an old mill, which was declared a Town Historical Site. Their aim was to preserve a part of Wisconsin's heritage for future generations so they may learn about a time when life was without modern technology.

They have restored the turbine that was in the

mill and by using the water in Long Lake (a renewable source) they produce electricity and pump it into the lines for Alliant Energy. This is a clean method of producing electricity as well as a great lesson for groups who tour the Mill.

The inside of the Mill is somewhat of a museum. Old artifacts hang from the beams and adorn the walls. An old "pot belly stove" provides warmth for the building. Those involved with the mill are also able to demonstrate the actual operation of the grain mill.

To date they have done many improvements to the building, including a new roof, gutters, siding, and windows. They have rebuilt the stone wall in the lower level of the Mill and the walls of the tailrace have also been restored. A water wheel and trough have been added.

The park provides two fishing ponds for children and handicap to enjoy the outdoors as well as practice their fishing skills. Fishing seminars are conducted yearly at no charge. The Partners sponsor an Easter egg hunt every Spring and have a Christmas Love Light tree and ceremony every December.

An exciting time for the Partners of the Dundee Mill was in 2006 when the television show Extreme Makeover: Home Edition was in town to make over a home. The television show also took on the Dundee Mill as one of its projects. The family who received the makeover is very involved with the mill, so the television show also wanted to feature the mill.


The restored turbine was installed during taping of the show. They also helped ad display cases and other items to the inside of the mill.

# Snowmobile Trails In The Kettle Moraine Area

The state forest has a 60-mile network of snowmobile trails which join to county and private trails connecting to adjoining towns and villages. Trails are groomed by four local snowmobile clubs under contract with the state forest. These snowmobile clubs are Crooked Trails, Greenbush Trail Blazers, Kewaskum Sno Chiefs, and New Fane Kettle Riders.

See the current conditions page on the Northern Kettle Moraine State Forest's portion of the Department of Natural Resources website to check trail conditions and to make sure trails are open. You can also check any of the websites for the Fond du Lac County, Sheboygan County or Washington County Snowmobile Associations.

Note: Any person who is born on or after January 1, 1985, and who has reached the age of 12, must have completed and received a snowmobile safety certificate in order to oper-

ate a snowmobile in Wisconsin. The certificate must be carried while operating the snowmobile, and displayed to a law enforcement officer upon demand. A parent, guardian, or person 18 years old or older must accompany any child under age 12 on the same snowmobile when operating on public areas.

Fond du Lac County's snowmobile trail system consists of approximately 297.3 miles of groomed snowmobile trails on privately owned land. Of this 297.3 miles approximately 50 miles is located on abandoned railroad corridors. These state-funded trails crisscross Fond du Lac County establishing a network of snowmobile trails for users to enjoy.

The Eisenbahn Trail is a main trail to ride in Washington and Fond du Lac Counties. Rules

for the Eisenbahn Trail include:

- Speed limits for ATV and snowmobiles in the Village of Kewaskum is 10 miles per hour.
- ATVs are limited to 25 miles per hour on other portions of the trail.
- ATVs are limited to and must stay on the straight 16-foot wide groomed trail They must not trespass on any snowmobile trail, farm

access road or road crossing leaving the trail. No entry is allowed other than at Lighthouse Lanes or the Kewaskum BP Station.

- All users must display valid state stickers.
- All state ATV and snowmobile laws apply.
- All town ordinances apply. The Village of Kewaskum excludes ATV use from 2 a.m.-6 a.m.
- All county park rules

apply except for hours of operation.

# Lakes Of The Kettle Moraine

The Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit has more than a dozen lakes and ponds — mostly kettles, but also two impoundments of the Milwaukee River.

The Mauthe Lake and Long Lake recreation area entrance stations, when open, lend fishing equipment free of charge. Several private vendors within the forest sell licenses, bait and other fishing supplies.

The seven lakes listed below range in size from 427 acres (Long Lake) to less than seven acres, accounting for a total of 786 acres.

The primary fish species in these lakes include largemouth bass, bluegill, crappies, and northern pike.

Mauthe Lake and Long Lake recreation areas have fishing piers that are accessible to people who are mobility-impaired.

**Auburn Lake (Lake Fifteen)** — A medium-sized kettle lake, Auburn Lake provides a diverse fishery. A paved boat launch and trailer parking area are across from the Forest Headquarters entrance road. Access to launch is a narrow gravel road not suitable for large boat trailers. A local wake ordinance, posted at the landing, is in effect. State park vehicle admission sticker required.

Expect to catch bluegills—most small, some larger; crappies—present, but generally not quality size; northern Pike—often found near outlet stream mouth and on north end across from boat landing; and yellow bass—fish are stunted, but abundant.

**Butler Lake** — Butler Lake is the smallest of the easily-accessible Kettle Moraine Lakes. It is a kettle lake with an emergent wetland fringe around most of the lake. The Ice Age Trail meanders through the Butler Lake area and there is a loop hiking trail system near the lake. Butler Lake is spring-fed and the water remains fairly cold and oxygenated.

There is a paved parking lot and gravel launch area for canoes or small rowboats. Gas motors are not allowed. A water pump is available near the parking lot. State park vehicle admission sticker required.

Expect to catch bluegills—small, but abundant; and yellow perch—small, but abundant.

**Crooked Lake** — This medium-sized kettle lake has relatively clear water and a diverse aquatic plant community. Gravel access road and parking area are off of County Highway SS. Launch, suitable for canoes and small boats, is shallow and weedy.

Expect to catch bluegills—some nice size, many smaller; yellow perch—numerous small perch; crappies—population fluctuates widely with very good fishing some years; northern pike—fair population, but not abundant; and largemouth bass—a small population of nice-sized fish. Exercise catch and release.

**Forest Lake** — Forest Lake is a small kettle lake with a mostly-developed shoreline. A marked and fairly steep walk-in public access is off of County Highway GGG. The lake is only suitable for canoes, small rowboats or paddleboats. No motors are allowed.

Game fish, such as northern pike, walleyes, and bass, are catch and release only.

Expect to catch bluegills—good numbers of smaller bluegills; sunfish—good numbers of smaller sunfish; crappies—some, smaller; northern pike—larger, catch and release only; walleye—some, catch and release only; and largemouth bass—good population, catch and release only.

**Kettle Moraine Lake (Round Lake)** — The second-largest lake in the Kettle Moraine area, Kettle Moraine Lake has relatively clear water.

Many parts of the lake are weedy and shallow. There is no state forest access, but the public can launch at Frank's Resort on the east side. Obey the local wake ordinance posted at landing.

Expect to catch bluegills—although not large fish, bluegills are abundant; yellow perch—some present, generally small; crappies, not abundant, but average size; northern pike—large population for a lake this size, commonly found in the 17-inch to 21-inch size range, no minimum size limit; largemouth bass—common, and of quality size; and bullheads—bullhead fishing is the highlight of Kettle Moraine Lake.

**Lake Seven** — This small, mostly undeveloped kettle lake has clear water and a diverse aquatic plant community. It is historically known as a tremendous bluegill lake. No gas motors allowed. Fairly shallow gravel boat launch for canoes and small rowboats.

Expect to catch bluegills—predation has

decreased the population, but fish up to 12 inches reported; crappies—a few present; and largemouth bass—very abundant, but small average size.

**Long Lake** — Long Lake is a three-mile long impoundment of the East Branch of the Milwaukee River. The lake has relatively clear water and is stocked by DNR and the Long Lake Fishing Club. Heavy recreational use in the summer may make fishing difficult.

An accessible fishing pier and shoreline fishing opportunities are in the Long Lake Recreation Area.

It has a developed boat launch and parking for more than 20 vehicles and trailers. The boat launch fills on summer weekends. Obey the local wake ordinance posted at landing. State park vehicle admission sticker required.

Expect to catch bluegills—six- to seven-inches common in summer, best fishing along mid-depth weedlines and in deeper water on vegetated mid-depth

flats; crappies—seldom active at mid-day, best time to fish is an hour after dark; walleyes—not common, those present are larger; northern pike—a good population with larger pike found near vegetated drops, no minimum size limit; largemouth bass—common in summer, the lake has a very good population with a nice size structure of fish available, anglers are encouraged to catch and release bass; and bullheads—one of the most popular summer fish to catch, especially near boat launch area.

**Mauthe Lake** — Mauthe Lake is a 78-acre impoundment of the East Branch of the Milwaukee River and is entirely within the state forest boundaries.

Accessible fishing pier, trail to dam, and shoreline fishing opportunities are within the recreation area. Paved launch for canoes and small boats. No gas motors allowed; electric trolling motors are allowed.

State park vehicle admission sticker required.

No off-road vehicles (snowmobiles, atv's) allowed on the ice or at any time.

Expect to catch bluegills—many smaller fish, some larger; crappies—occasionally the highlight of the fishery; largemouth bass—Mauthe Lake is a very good bass lake; northern pike—although not a large lake, some pike in the 30-inch range are caught; and walleyes—occasionally caught.

**Long Lake Fishing Club's Fisheree** — The Long Lake Fishing Club holds a winter Fisheree in February. It is always held on a Saturday, check their website at [www.longlakefishingclub.com](http://www.longlakefishingclub.com) to find out the specific February 2017 date.

Registration for the Long Lake Fisheree will be from 6 a.m.-4 p.m. A huge winter raffle drawing is also held in conjunction with the fisheree.

# Visit The Kettle Moraine Northern Unit

The Kettle Moraine State Forest – Northern Unit owes its unique landscape to glaciers of the Wisconsin Stage of the last Ice Age, which ended approximately 10,000 years ago.

During the Wisconsin Stage, several lobes of glacial ice moved into what is present day Wisconsin. The two largest lobes were in eastern Wisconsin, one coming down Green Bay and the other following the Lake Michigan basin. These two lobes side-swiped and collided with each other, and debris was deposited between them.

When the glaciers melted back, a jumbled ridge of hills was left behind, an interlobate moraine. This is known today as the hills of the Kettle Moraine, which runs for about 120 miles from Manitowoc County down into Walworth County. (This interlobate moraine is one of the few land features that can be seen from space.) In addition to the interlobate moraine, the

glaciers also left behind various other landforms including kames, eskers, crevasse fills, kettles and erratics.

In the 1920's there were horrific floods in the city of Milwaukee and the city's population was rapidly growing. A group of foresighted people thought that if they could protect the headwaters of the Milwaukee River, this would help reduce the flooding in Milwaukee. They also wanted to provide a large tract of public land for Milwaukee's growing population.

After almost a decade, legislation along with funding became available for the creation of the Kettle Moraine State Forest. In 1936, the Conservation Congress (predecessor to the Department of Natural Resources) acquired 850 acres around Moon Lake (now Mauthe Lake) from the Milwaukee Chapter of the Izaak Walton League. This marked the start of the Northern Unit. Today, the Northern Unit encompasses near-

ly 30,000 acres within its 36,000 project boundary.

In the 1950s a lawyer from Milwaukee, Ray Zillmer, began a campaign to bring his dream of a National Park protecting the glacial features of Wisconsin to life. With the help of his friends, Congressman Henry S. Reuss and Senator Gaylord Nelson, his dream came to fruition with the creation of the Ice Age National Scientific Reserve and the Ice Age National Scenic Trail. On a sad note, Ray Zillmer died before he could see the creation of the reserve and the Ice Age Trail.

A 1964 Act of Congress established the Ice Age National Scientific Reserve to "assure protection, preservation, and interpretation of the nationally significant values of Wisconsin continental glaciation... and other reminders of the ice age." The reserve consists of nine units scattered throughout the state and the northern 20,000 of the Northern Unit is one of those re-

serves. Each reserve site protects a unique glacial feature. The Northern Unit contains some of the finest features of continental glaciation in the state and the world including the interlobate moraine, kame fields, eskers, dry and wet kettles and crevasse fills.

In 1980 the Ice Age Trail was designated as a National Scenic Trail and later as a State Scenic Trail. The trail follows the southern extent of the last glaciers in the state of Wisconsin and is the only National Scenic Trail that is found entirely in only one state. Today about sixty percent of the 1000 mile trail is now complete. The nucleus of the Ice Age National Scenic Trail was the 30-mile "Glacial Trail" that ran through the Northern Unit from north to south.

The Northern Unit's glacial features set the ground work for wide diversity of biological communities and the geographical position of

the forest adds to this diversity. The Northern Unit is situated along the "tension zone" which runs in a diagonal path from near Eau Claire to northern Milwaukee. The tension zone marks where the northern forest meets the southern and eastern forest, and the prairies and oak savannahs of the south and west.

A person traveling through the area will encounter such natural communities as northern red oak forests, eastern hardwoods with beech trees, cedar swamps, flood plain forests, kettle wetlands, remnant prairies and northern bogs. The Northern Unit also supports one of the largest intact forests in southeast Wisconsin. This wide array of communities leads to rich diversity of plant and animal life including many threatened and endangered species and species of special concern. Twelve areas within the forest have been set aside as State

Natural Areas protecting ten biological communities that were not or slightly disturbed by European settlement and two outstanding geological landmarks.

Today, it takes a team of managers and forest staff to manage all the resources found in the Northern Unit from forestry to fisheries, wildlife, endangered resources and water resources. But, the number one management goal is providing outdoor recreational opportunities with minimal conflicts for the nearly one million annual visitors to the forest. People come to the Northern Unit to participate in a plethora of outdoor pursuits including hiking, hunting, camping, picnicking, swimming, horseback riding, snowmobiling, snowshoeing, fishing (year-round), canoeing, boating, geocaching, backpacking, wildlife observing, off-road biking, dog training, spirit renewing, and learning.



## Area's History Comes Alive At Local Museum In Kewaskum

A little piece of local history sits right next to the scenic Milwaukee River on Parkview Drive in Kewaskum, just waiting to be seen.

Actually, it's closer to a gazillion pieces, not many are aware of the breadth of the collection the Kewaskum Historical Society has built up.

The society's museum has the only milk can washer in the state and an authentic log house next door that takes you back to life in the 1840s.

The museum features a blacksmith shop, carpenter shop and an old printing press. A second floor houses a miniature farm, a cheese factory, a doll house based on a house in Beechwood, trains and steam engines, a school room from an old country school, a parlor, doctor's/dentist's office and a general store.

"It's a lot of everything," Dan Schmidt, founder of the Historical Society and vice president.

"I think it's something we need to save. Otherwise our children and grandchildren aren't going to know how things were," he said. "If you want to know where you're going in the future, you have to know where you went in the past," stated Schmidt.

Schmidt said items come from society members, people in the sur-

rounding area and from across the country. Someone in California may have grandparents who pass away who had ties to Kewaskum, and will send photos or other remnants of past generations.

Sometimes, modern technology and the kindness of local businesses pitch in. The milk can washing machine came from the Beechwood Cheese Factory after it was ordered to stop using cans and go to bulk. The factory sold the washer for scrap and then found out the Historical Society was interested. The Heise family promptly bought it back from the scrap dealer and donated it.

The museum opened in 1976, year of the country's bicentennial, and quickly received a unique honor. The society became affiliated with the Wisconsin Historical Society and received a certificate of commendations the same year the museum opened. Normally, affiliation for three years is the standard before commendations are given.

The log house opened in 1982, the culmination of a three-year project. It was donated by the Reysen family, which planned on tearing it down before building a new home on the family farm. Marshal Reysen and his son, Randy, are

active society members and have both served as president.

The society hosts a couple of events to take people back to a simpler time. In late May, Pioneer Days invites 175+ area fourth-graders to experience life as their great grandparents lived it. They play a game of old baseball called field ball, shell corn, braid jump rope, make hand-dipped candles over an open fire outside and make corn bread over an open fire in a Dutch oven.

The society's signature event marks the closing of the museum and log cabin for winter. Each year on the Sunday after Labor Day, Early Farm Days packs in 60-80 exhibitors showing off old equipment and machinery along the Milwaukee River. Antique steam engines, gas engines, cars, trucks, threshers, sawed lumber and processed grain can be taken in firsthand. In addition, the event includes refreshments and horse-drawn wagon rides and a small farm animals to pet.

Early farm was originally held in conjunction with the formation of the society before the museum was opened.

While you are visiting the Kettle Moraine Forest, take a drive to Kewaskum to check out the museum.

Children can come out to the Mill and look throughout the park for hidden eggs.




## Friends Of The Kettle Moraine

The Friends of the Kettle Moraine is a non-profit organization committed to promoting conservation, recreation, and education within the Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit.

The group was created in the mid 1980s to inform and educate the public. The general goal was to develop a greater appreciation and environmental awareness of Wisconsin natural resources. Specific goals were to enlist public involvement in the activities and future direction of the Forest and to provide financial assistance directly to the Kettle Moraine State Forest – Northern Unit for new programs and activities.

The first meeting of the Friends group, held in July 1984 at the Ice Age Center, was hosted by William Moorman of the DNR Bureau of Parks and Recreation. Local press releases resulted in a large turnout of local citizens who were very receptive to

the idea of starting a Friends group. The group elected Gus Christ, Byron Gessner, Jerry Ninnemann, William Stoffel, Irene O’Laughlin, Jerry Schanen, and John Zillmer as board members.

The Northern Unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest is located 45 minutes north of Milwaukee. The group’s mission is to aid in the understanding of the human and natural history of the forest, so that visitors can enjoy and appreciate the heritage of the Kettle Moraine area.

The specific goals of the organization today include:

- To publicize the unique recreational and educational experiences that are available in the Northern Unit.
- To develop a public appreciation for the Northern Unit and its resources.
- To recruit public involvement in the activities and future direction of the Northern Unit.
- To provide financial

assistance for educational educational programs and other forest projects.

The Friends of the Kettle Moraine has more than 100 individual members and around 10 business members. They are always welcoming new memberships.

The group holds three or four meetings a year and a large year-end informational meeting that includes a meal. Representatives from the DNR are also in attendance at the year-end meeting. The group, along with the DNR, discuss any upcoming projects for the next year.

The Friends have volunteers called trail watchers, who walk the many trails and relate any concerns or trouble spots back to the DNR. These trail watchers are a valuable resource for the DNR.

The Friends of the Kettle Moraine hold an Invasive Species Day each year in cooperation with the DNR to eradi-

cate invasive plants within the state forest.

Visitors can explore 30,000 acres of rolling hills, lakes, forests, grasslands, and parks. There are many trails open all year round for your enjoyment. A great place to start your outdoor adventure is at the Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center. You may purchase a state park sticker and park merchandise from the center’s gift shop. Your purchase helps support the Friends of the Kettle Moraine Forest. The forest hosts approximately one million visitors a year.

Some of the accomplishments that the Friends are very proud of include the signs at Mauthe Lake State Park, a shelter near the Greenbush Trail, a shelter in the New Fane Loop system and playground equipment at the Mauthe Lake State

Park.

The Friends of the Kettle Moraine provide a variety of events in the Northern Unit. Many of these events are held at the Ice Age Center. They sponsor a yearly Candlelight Ski in February and Earth Week Litter cleanup in April. They also provide a Halloween Hike in October at Long Lake. This is an educational hike for young children.

The Friends have also funded a number of development efforts in the forest including prairie plantings, playground equipment, invasive species control, construction of trail shelters and maintenance buildings, natural landscaping, interpretive signage, and the purchase of educational equipment, along with a number of others. Some of the more recent additions were the Lake 2 Lake Trail between Mauthe

and Long Lakes and the new shelter at the Zillmer Trail area.

The Friends are continuing with many improvements in and around the Ice Age Center. They also have a Land Fund set up. This fund will help with the purchase of more private land in the Kettle Moraine Forest when the land becomes available.

Anyone can become a member. Your help with all of their special activities in the forest such as cross-country ski outings, hikes, seminars and many other activities is very important to the forest and to the Friends.

# Protect The Trees Where You Live, Work And Play!

### The Threat

Your campfire wood could be hiding insects or diseases that can kill Wisconsin's trees. Gypsy moth, emerald ash borer, oak wilt and others spread easily when hidden in firewood.

### Your Role

"Campers value the places where they camp, so it makes sense that more and more, they are doing the right thing. Instead of bringing their own firewood from home, they are getting it at or near their camping destination, or buying certified firewood," said Andrea Diss-Torrance, forest pest expert with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. "That is good, healthy news for Wisconsin's forests."

Nurseries, loggers, mills and other industries are doing their part — they are strictly regulated when forests are threatened. Firewood is more difficult to keep track of, so it is the last easy ride for invasive

hitch-hikers — unless you do your part too. It is safest and easiest to leave firewood at home, purchase wood at your destination, or purchase only wood certified by the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, which has been specially treated to kill hitchhiking tree pests and diseases.

### Firewood Basics

Firewood movement onto all DNR-managed lands is restricted. Soon, all firewood for sale at the property will either be Wisconsin certified or from the property itself. All non-Wisconsin certified firewood brought into a Wisconsin state park or forest must be:

- 1) cut within 25 miles of the state park or forest campground, AND
- 2) cut within the boundaries of the State of Wisconsin, AND
- 3) NOT cut or stored in a pest quarantined area (unless the property is also in the same or a connected quarantined area). Visit [dnr.wi.gov](http://dnr.wi.gov)

and search the keyword "firewood" for details

In Wisconsin, you may not move firewood from a quarantined area to a non-quarantined area unless it is Wisconsin certified. Enforcement can include fines and jail time. Quarantine maps are online at: <http://emeraldashborer.wi.gov> and <http://gypsymoth.wi.gov>.

### What You Can Do

In Wisconsin, campers can take simple steps to help protect the state's healthy forests. These tips and more helpful information are online at [dnr.wi.gov](http://dnr.wi.gov). Search "firewood":

- Leave firewood at home. Purchase firewood certified by the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture or within 25 miles of your campsite. Also, many properties offer firewood for sale, or private sellers have it available near the park.
- Burn your firewood at your campsite; do not take it with you to another destination.

•Cook over gas or charcoal. Instead of a campfire, explore new night-time activities like star-gazing.

•Stay updated and follow firewood rules and restrictions.

Campfires are an important part of the outdoor experience in Wisconsin, but we must all take a few precautions to keep our

forested areas and campgrounds — and our city parks and yards — safe from invasive insects and diseases.

Campers will find reasonably-priced firewood within or nearby all state parks and forests. Wood from unapproved sources may be confiscated and destroyed.

"We are counting on campers," said Jerry

Leiterman, forest superintendent, "to help us protect the quality of our forest by complying with the rules. Firewood is available at the Mauthe Lake and Long Lake Recreation Areas entrance stations. Ask a ranger or campground host about firewood rules, or visit online at [dnr.wi.gov](http://dnr.wi.gov), keyword "firewood."



# Campgrounds Throughout The Kettle Moraine Area

## Backpack Shelters

Five backpack shelters are available year-round for rustic camping along the 31 miles of the Ice Age National Scenic Trail. One backpack shelter is available from April 1 through November at the Zillmer Trail area.

Each site offers a roofed trail shelter, fire ring, and pit toilet. Drinking water is available less than a mile from each site.

These sites are not accessible by vehicle. All camping equipment must be backpacked in and all refuse packed out. A camping permit is required and you must camp at a designated shelter campsite.

One reservation (camping party) is allowed per site per night. Reservations are limited to 10 persons per site and are limited to one night per site. Another site may be reserved for a second night and a third night at a third site.

To reserve a backpack

site, call Reserve America at (888) 947-2757, TTY (800) 274-7275. Shelters cannot be reserved online.

If you do not have a reservation, you must stop in at either the Forest Headquarters, Ice Age Visitor Center or Mauthe/Long Lake entrance stations (when open) to obtain a camping permit. Site availability is limited for spring and fall weekends and reservations are recommended. A reservation is required for stays longer than two nights along the trail.

If all the backpack sites are reserved for a weekend night on your hiking trip, consider staying one night at the Mauthe Lake campground.

## New Prospect Horse Riders Campground

The New Prospect Horse Riders Campground has 22 family campsites with 20/30/50 amp electric service and three group sites.

Campers must be accompanied by a horse to stay at the campground.

In the family camping area, each site has a picnic table, fire ring and a 30-by-30-foot graveled area with picket posts and/or pipe corrals where horses are to be kept. The camp area has one drinking water source, an open air picnic shelter, vault toilet, covered stable with 24 box stalls and manure pits.

In the group camp area, each site has a drinking water source, fire ring, four picnic tables and a manure pit. Group sites A and C each have nine, 10-by-10-foot metal pipe corrals. Group Site B has two tether post areas and 12 pipe corrals. The group camp has a vault toilet. No more than 20 people may occupy a group site.

Campers are responsible to place all hay and manure in the manure pits which are located throughout the campground; wheel barrows

and forks are provided. Horses are to be kept in designated areas to protect the green space of the campground.

The campground is centrally located in the state forest and provides easy access to the 33-mile bridle trail which traverses the length of the forest. There also are two loop trails, the 2.5-mile Crooked Lake Loop and the four-mile Forest Lake Loop. All horse riders 16 years and older must have a state trail pass while using the designated bridle trails in the state forest.

The campground opens the first weekend in May and closes the last weekend in October.



# Special Interest Areas In The Kettle Moraine

The Kettle Moraine State Forest has a lot to offer in its almost 30,000 acres. It includes a variety of terrain that's home to many plants and animals.

Approximately one million people visit the forest each year.

The forest can thank the glaciers for its unique characteristics. This gives the forest some interesting areas that visitors should try to see while visiting the Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit.

Some of these areas include:

#### Greenbush Kettle —

On Kettle Moraine Drive, one mile north of State Highway 67. This is an outstanding example of a glacial kettle hole. A scenic overlook, viewing deck and interpretive display is just a short walk from the parking lot.

**Haskell Noyes Memorial Woods** — On County Highway GGG just south of Highway SS. A historical marker greets visitors to this 67-acre State Natural Area. This area is designated as a Wisconsin Wildlife Viewing Area and is included in the national "Watchable Wildlife" program.

Haskell Noyes Memorial Woods is a classic example of southern dry-mesic forest dominated by sugar maple and red oak, with smaller amounts of basswood, white ash, bitternut hickory, and ironwood.

The site lies on an interlobate moraine formed between the Green Bay and Lake Michigan lobes of the Wisconsin stage of glaciation with numerous kames, kettles, and ridges. The forest was never clearcut or heavily

harvested during the logging era of the 19th century leaving red oaks that established during the 1860s and 1870s. And unlike other forests, fire has not occurred on these moist soils for the past several hundred years.

The forest understory is open, with few shrubs but a rich spring flora and diversity of ferns. Plants include maiden-hair, fragile, cinnamon and lady ferns, hepaticas, clustered black snakeroot, large flowered trillium, red trillium, may-apple, large-leaved shinleaf, large-leaved bellwort, and wild geranium.

A small area to the north is composed of swamp hardwoods and tamaracks. A high percentage of gravel is found in the soils and steep slopes are thus prone to erosion.

The land was purchased in 1947 to prevent imminent logging. Haskell Noyes Memorial Woods is owned by the DNR and was designated a State Natural Area in 1952.

#### Vista Trail Overlook —

At the Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center. A short climb up some stairs and you arrive at a viewing platform overlooking a beautiful vista from which you can see drumlins, eskers and ground moraines.

The Visitor Center offers forest information, interpretive displays, and a 20-minute film explaining how the glaciers shaped most of Wisconsin's landscape. You can buy nature books, clothing, admission stickers, and trail passes there. Public programs are scheduled throughout the year and group programs on request.



The Haskell Noyes Memorial Woods is one of the beautiful special features of the Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit. When you are visiting the forest, spend some time checking out all of the beautiful features of the area.

#### Jersey Flats Prairie —

On County Highway SS, a quarter-mile west of the village of New Prospect. This restored prairie is a glacial outwash plain. This area is designated as a Wisconsin Wildlife Viewing Area and is included in the national "Watchable Wildlife" program.

#### Little Mud Lake —

On County Highway SS, one-half mile east of County Highway GGG. This site is a State Habitat Preservation Area and is vital for the long-term survival of the red-spotted, blue-spotted, spotted, and tiger salamanders that thrive here. A picnic table and grill are provided at the small parking lot.

#### Dundee Kame (White Kame) —

On County Highway F, a quarter-mile east of Dundee. This conical

moulin kame lies within a 468-acre State Natural Area. The kame is known throughout the world by geology students and is often pictured in geology textbooks because of its near perfect form.

#### Kame Field —

Near the intersection of Highway V and Deer Road looking north. The mile-wide view of this spectacular kame field is breathtaking. Visitors can view and experience the rock and rubble and gravel "insides" of a kame up close.

#### Spruce Lake Bog State Natural Area —

North of Dundee on Airport Road, one-half mile west of Vista Drive. This area is designated as a Wisconsin Wildlife Viewing Area and is included in the national "Watchable Wildlife" program. Visitors must stay on the boardwalk trail due to the fragile nature of the bog plants, the presence of poison sumac, and the unstable bog surface.

Spruce Lake Bog features an undisturbed shallow seepage bog lake situated in one of the many kettle holes characteristic of the interlobate glacial deposits scattered throughout the area. The 35-acre lake has moderately hard water with a pH of 7.5 and supports a dense, floating-leaved aquatic flora of water shield and water lilies.

The site is particularly rich in plants more characteristic of northern Wisconsin sphagnum bogs and greatly resembles them in appearance. Black spruce,

which is common in the swamp forest, is near its southern range limit in Wisconsin.


Distinct vegetation zones encircle the lake with a floating sedge mat of cotton grass, three-fruited sedge, royal fern, pitcher plant, round-leaved sundew, moccasin flower, wintergreen, and small cranberry grading into a bog forest of tamarack and black spruce. An outer zone of swamp hardwoods includes tamarack, black ash, red maple, yellow birch, and white cedar and contains species more commonly associated with northern coniferous forests including three-leaved gold-thread, American starflower, partridgeberry, common winterberry, and yellow blue-bead lily.

The diversity of shrubs on the sedge mat and in the forest is indicative of the area's high quality. Species include speckled alder, black chokeberry, willow, round-leaved and red-osier dogwood, Labrador-tea, bog birch, leather-leaf, bog-rosemary, poison sumac, mountain holly, meadowsweet, huckleberry, cranberry, and blueberry.

Several bird species with northern affinities nest here, including northern waterthrush, Nashville warbler, Canada warbler, and white-throated sparrow. Spruce Lake Bog has been designated a national natural landmark by the US Park Service.

Spruce Lake Bog is owned by the DNR and was designated a State Natural Area in 1968.

# Special Interest Areas In The Kettle Moraine

## Milwaukee River Tamarack Lowlands

From the intersection of U.S. Highways 45 and State Highway 28 East in Kewaskum, go east on 28 1.9 miles, then south on Oak Drive Road 1.2 miles. The site lies about 0.1 mile west of the road.

The Milwaukee River Floodplain Forest features a bottomland hardwood forest with small upland islands located along the East Branch of the Milwaukee River. The site also contains dry-mesic forest and shrub-carr.

The well-structured floodplain forest is dominated by large silver maple and green ash with other lowland trees including hackberry, black ash, and burr oak. Just east of the river are small upland islands with sugar maple and beech. Several spring runs are also present.

## Butler Lake and Flynn's Spring

East of Long Lake on Butler Lake Road, a seven-acre lake surrounded by sedge meadow. Butler Lake and Flynn's Spring features a seven-acre shallow hard-bottom lake surrounded by sedge meadow. Previously, the site contained a tamarack hardwood

swamp but a few years of high water levels has killed off most of the trees. Although the groundlayer has also been flooded, the aquatic vegetation and geologic features are still intact.

Nearby Flynn's Spring is a small, spring brook flowing into the south end of Butler Lake. Chara covers the marl-bottomed Butler Lake while the dominant submerged aquatic species is Illinois pondweed. Emergents include white water-lily, bull-head pond-lily, and hard-stem bulrush. A small zone of sedges and bulrushes on the north end is the only open wetland. Older tamaracks, which formerly surrounded the lake, have died but the species is reproducing well along the northwestern and southern shores.

Adjacent to the lake is Parnell Esker, a geologic feature known worldwide and used extensively for education. The esker is five to 35 feet in height and runs northeast southwest for about four miles. Of particular interest at this site is the presence of two rare species — the unicorn clubtail dragonfly (*Arigomphus villosipes*), and the swamp spread-

wing (*Lestes vigilax*).

Butler Lake and Flynn's Spring is owned by the DNR and was designated in 1992.

## Milwaukee River And Swamp

This area is along the Milwaukee River north of Mauthe Lake and includes a large spring that feeds the river.

Milwaukee River and Swamp features an unusual combination of southern and northern wet-mesic forests situated along 0.75 mile of a

slow, meandering warm water stream with accompanying shrubs zones and communities including lowland hardwood forest, conifer swamp, and a small bog lake.

The river bottom is mucky with sand and gravel and there are good populations of northern pike, black crappie, walleye, and several smaller forage species. Aquatic plants include water-lilies, water-milfoil, coon's-tail, waterweed, giant duck-

weed, water nymph, and several pondweeds.


One large spring, 1,000 feet long, feeds the river in the north portion of the site. Bordering the river is a dense shrub zone that changes abruptly to a yellow birch, white birch, American elm, black ash, and basswood lowland forest. East of the small lowland forest is a more dense conifer swamp of mainly white cedar but also tamarack and black spruce. A good representative understory is

present.

A small bog lake occurs in the eastern portion of the natural area.

The diverse lowland forest types allow unusual bird associations such as the nesting of the northern swamp conifer-loving northern waterthrush and the southern hardwood forest-loving cerulean warbler (*Dendroica cerulea*).

Milwaukee River and Swamp is owned by the DNR and was designated a State Natural Area in 1971.

# Special Interest Areas In The Kettle Moraine

**Milwaukee River Floodplain Forest** — This area is southeast of Kewaskum, on the west side of Oak Drive. It includes some islands in the east branch of the Milwaukee River.

The Milwaukee River Floodplain Forest features a bottomland hardwood forest with small upland islands located along the East Branch of the Milwaukee River. The site also contains dry-mesic forest and shrub-carr.

The well-structured floodplain forest is dominated by large silver maple and green ash with other lowland trees including hackberry, black ash, and bur oak. Just east of the river are small upland islands with sugar maple and beech.

The herbaceous groundlayer dominants include reed canary grass, bedstraw, sensitive fern, water parsnip, and green dragon. Also present is the special concern plant species American gromwell (*Lithospermum latifolium*).

In areas with canopy gaps, the openings are quite brushy and dense with dogwoods, prickly ash, and hawthorn. Several spring runs are also present.

Animal species of concern are the state-threatened longear sunfish (*Lepomis megalotis*), and greater redhorse (*Moxostoma valenciennesi*). Bird life includes blue-gray gnatcatcher, brown creeper, wood thrush, and great-horned owl.

Milwaukee River Floodplain Forest is owned by the DNR and was designated a State Natural Area in 1992.

**Spring Lake** — Southwest of New Prospect west of County Highway G, this clear, shallow lake has many fish. Various warblers nest in the area.

Spring Lake is a clear, alkaline lake surrounded by fen and northern wet forest with an unusual flora and fauna. Aquatic vegetation is sparse and consists of yellow water-lily, bladderworts, pondweeds, and chara. The shoreline is an un-

dercut bog shelf under which fish find refuge. Northern pike, large mouth bass, perch, bullhead, and green sunfish are found in spite of a maximum water depth of 1.5 feet.

An open mat of vegetation dominated by narrow-leaved cat-tails and bulrushes surrounds the lake, and many sedges and forbs characteristic of both acid bogs and calcareous fens occur together. The narrow mat gives way to a tamarack forest on the east; to the south the swamp forest is composed of elm, red maple, yellow birch, and tamarack. Along the northwestern shore is a shrubby region of bog birch, willows, dogwood, and elder. Poison sumac is abundant throughout the site.

Breeding bird surveys have shown an abundance of warbler species including blue-winged, golden-winged, black and white, Nashville, mourning, and yellow.

Spring Lake is owned by the DNR and was designated a State Natural Area in 1971.

**Crooked Lake Wetlands** — East of New Prospect on the north side of County Highway SS, this area includes three lakes and various kinds of woods and wetlands. It is home to many kinds of birds.

Crooked Lake Wetlands is a diverse complex of communities including northern wet forest, southern dry-mesic forest, southern sedge meadow, shrub-carr, open bog, and two shallow seepage lakes. The 65-acre Crooked Lake is one of the larger natural lakes in the county and has a maximum depth of 34 feet. The inlet provides a spawning ground for northern pike while the outlet forms a small tributary of the East Branch of the Milwaukee River.

On the west side of Crooked Lake is a shrub-carr of diverse composition and structure. White meadowsweet and bog birch are dominant with openings of blue-joint grass, tussock sedge, and

long-bracted tussock sedge. Red-osier dogwood and willows dominate some areas while speckled alder, common winterberry, nannyberry, and poison sumac characterize others.

The herbaceous layer is equally diverse with royal fern, marsh fern, meadow-rue and marsh pea. Also present are two shallow, hard water, seepage lakes - Cedar Lake and an unnamed lake. Cedar Lake is surrounded by swamp hardwoods of yellow birch, black ash, and red maple and a mature stand of sugar maple, basswood and red oak.

The unnamed lake has numerous emergent aquatics including wild rice and is surrounded by a boggy shrub forest with tamarack. The unnamed lake has been home to a large colony of breeding black terns (*Chlidonias niger*) and is also a spawning area of northern pike.

Besides black terns this area is home to a diverse community of birds including nesting and migratory waterfowl, swamp sparrow, yellow, golden-winged, and Nashville warblers, veery, gray catbird, American woodcock, and yellow-billed cuckoo.

Crooked Lake Wetlands is owned by the DNR and was designated a SNA in 1992.

**Kettle Hole Woods** — Northeast of New Fane on County Highway S, then north on Forest View Road, this area has woods, shrubs, wildflowers, birds, and frogs.

Located in southeastern Wisconsin's glacial kettle topography is Kettle Hole Woods, an isolated hill forested with southern mesic and dry-mesic hardwoods. Ephemeral ponds are scattered throughout the site.

The mature forest features an excellent canopy of very large trees, primarily red oak and sugar maple with associated beech, basswood, white ash, white oak, and bitternut hickory. Most saplings are sugar maple and beech suggesting that the red

oaks will eventually be replaced by other more mesophytic species.

The shrub layer is variable in density with witch hazel, American hazelnut, viburnums, and gooseberry. Mayapple, Pennsylvania sedge, interrupted fern, lady fern, round-lobed hepatica, and wild geranium characterize portions of the groundlayer while scattered open areas with pockets of gooseberry support maidenhair fern, blue cohosh, bent trillium, and violets.

Two state-threatened species, red-shouldered hawk (*Buteo lineatus*), and Acadian flycatcher (*Empidonax virescens*) nest here. Also present is the uncommon yellow-billed cuckoo (*Coccyzus americanus*), ovenbird, red-eyed vireo, and hairy woodpecker. Many of the ponds are also used by a large number of amphibians.

Kettle Hole Woods is owned by the DNR and was designated a SNA in 1992.


**Kewaskum Maple-Oak Woods** — Southeast of Kewaskum via State Highway 28 and South Mill Road, two parcels with interesting wild plants and birds.

Kewaskum Maple-Oak Woods consists of two parcels separated by old field and pine plantation that contain southern dry-mesic and

lower, containing very large red oak, white oak, sugar maple, and black cherry. Both parcels have kettle depressions that hold water seasonally.

Common nesting birds include the uncommon yellow-billed cuckoo (*Coccyzus americanus*), black-billed cuckoo, great-crested flycatcher, eastern wood pewee, wood thrush, blue-gray gnatcatcher, and scarlet tanager.

Kewaskum Maple-Oak Woods is owned by the DNR and was designated a State Natural Area in 1977.

# Special Interest Areas In The Kettle Moraine

**Kettle Moraine Red Oaks** — The Ice Age Trail goes through this area southeast of Greenbush. It has more than 100 kinds of trees, shrubs, and other

plants. Kettle Moraine Red Oaks is a mature second-growth southern dry-mesic forest which originated in 1889. Composed of red oak,

basswood, sugar maple and white ash, it is one of the richest oak forests in the region and contains over 100 species of trees, shrubs, and herbs.

Other canopy species present include big-tooth aspen, white oak, black cherry, and shagbark hickory while the subcanopy is composed of ironwood, sugar maple, basswood, and ash saplings. The forest is situated on the high interlobate moraine and contains several outstanding dry kettle holes, which provide some diversity in exposure.

The groundlayer contains characteristic dry-mesic species with three species of bedstraw, numerous sedges, downy Solomon's seal, mayapple, maidenhair fern, American squaw-root, large-flowered trillium, sweet cicely, and Canada mayflower.

This large tract provides important habitat for forest interior birds including three state-threatened species: Acadian flycatcher (*Empidonax vireescens*), red-shouldered hawk (*Buteo lineatus*), and cerulean warbler (*Dendroica cerulea*). Other birds in-

clude ovenbird, barred owl, and wood thrush, wood pewee, and scarlet tanager.

Kettle Moraine Red Oaks is part of the most extensive hardwood forest located within the region and forms the core of a larger proposed Habitat Preservation Area. Protection of this site is vital given the harvest pressure and the loss of red oaks across the landscape. As this site ages, it will become a prime candidate for research on old-growth red oak forests. Kettle Moraine Red Oaks is owned by the DNR and was designated a State Natural Area in 1992.

**Johnson Hill Kame** — South of Highways 67 and U near Woodside and Shamrock roads, a cone-shaped hill formed by water pouring down through a hole in a melting glacier. Johnson Hill Kame is a "moulin" kame, a conical hill of sand and gravel formed near the edge of the wasting gla-

cial ice sheet by subglacial meltwater streams that poured downward through cylindrical holes in the glacier. The swirling motion of the debris-laden water reminded early French mountaineers of a moulin (mill in French).

Hundreds of spectacular glacial features can be found within the Kettle Moraine and the Northern Unit contains one of the best displays of moulin kames in the country. Surrounding the kame is both southern and northern dry-mesic forest. The southern slope is composed of red oak, big-tooth aspen, beech, ironwood, sugar maple, butternut hickory, basswood, white oak, and eastern hop-hornbeam.

The cooler north slope consists of basswood and sugar maple with beech, red oak, and eastern hop-hornbeam.

Johnson Hill Kame is owned by the DNR and was designated a State Natural Area in 1992.


