Referendum Open House To Be Held Wednesday, Oct. 5

District residents are encouraged to learn more about the needs, solutions and cost associated with the November 8 referendum question by attending an Open House in the Kewaskum Middle School cafeteria on Wednesday, Oct. 5, at 6:30 p.m.

The Kewaskum School District, with unanimous approval by the Board of Education, will place a \$28,420,000 referendum question on the November 8 ballot. Many of the middle school and high school building systems have exceeded their useful life and are in need of significant repair and/or replacement, according to school district officials. Learning spaces, originally

designed in the late 1950s through the early 1970s, no longer meet the needs of today's learning and teaching.

If approved, the referendum will allow the district to update inefficient HVAC, plumbing, electrical and lighting systems. It will also allow for renovation of wiring for technology, roofs, floors and walls. Thin, acoustically challenging walls would be replaced with permanent structures to enhance the learning environment.

New construction would connect the middle and high schools to help "right-size" the middle school. This addition would include science labs that

allow all students to participate in labs and a gym that allows both physical education teachers to have the appropriate amount of space to effectively deliver their curriculum for their individual classes.

In addition to the October 5 Open House presentation, the district will hold presentations on October 17 at Kewaskum High School at 6:30 p.m. and October 26 at Farmington Elementary and i4Learning Community School at 6:30 p.m. For more information, including frequently asked questions, visit the district website at www.kewaskumschools.org/referendum.

Learning By Fire

– Area Firefighters Use Live Burn To Practice

An orange glow lit up the night sky Monday as an old farmhouse on Highway 144 became engulfed in flames.

The fire looked fierce, but it was completely under control. It was all part of a training burn. Property owner Rich McKee of McKee Builders had donated the house to be utilized and then burned down by local fire

departments.

"We really appreciate the opportunity to have a place to train. It is not something that happens very often," said Jeff Buechel, 2nd Capt. of the Kewaskum Fire Department.

This week's practice was a rare opportunity for the firefighters to use a live burn that wasn't in a training tower. Area crews normally go to Campbellsport, which has

a concrete tower to practice fighting fires.

About 50 firefighters from the Boltonville, Fillmore, Kewaskum, Beechwood and Batavia fire departments practiced on the fire Monday night. Volunteer firefighters from Milwaukee and Greenfield helped oversee the operation, located at 8679 Highway 144, Kewaskum.

a time, to practice various scenarios.

The two-story farmhouse had been added on several times over the years, and it contained different types of construction. That allowed the firefighters to practice battling fires in the different elements, including wood, brick and vinyl siding.

The metal roof, which is infamous for trapping heat inside a building during a fire, presented the firefighters with one of their biggest challenges, Ramthun said. Yet it was a welcome learning opportunity, he said, since many buildings now have metal roofs.

Once the fire took hold of the entire house, Kewaskum's ladder truck sprayed a water curtain to prevent kept the trees that bordered the lot from catching fire.

Fire trucks called tenders shuttled water to portable tanks set up at the site.

The water was mixed with compressed air foam to extinguish the fire. The foam reduces the amount of water needed to extinguish a fire, Ramthun said.

As the house burned, the smoke told the fire's story.

"The color of the smoke tells what's burning, to a point," Buechel said. "A really white smoke is a

really fast-burning fire, when it starts getting going."

Dark smoke can signal that petroleum or plastic is burning, Buechel said.

Wisconsin Voter Photo ID Rules

County Clerk Brenda Jaszewski urges voters to plan now to make sure they have the acceptable photo ID to vote at the November 8 General Election. Most voters already have one of the types of photo ID required to vote.

On Election Day, voters must provide one of the following photo IDs before they can cast a ballot. The following IDs are still valid if they expired since November 4, 2014: Wisconsin Driver's License, Wisconsin State ID Card, Military ID Card, U.S. Passport Book or Card.

The following forms of photo ID are also acceptable: A Certificate of Naturalization, within 2 years of issuance, Driver's License Receipt issued by the WI DOT, within 45 days of issuance, ID issued by a federally recognized Wisconsin Indian Tribe (Can still be used if expired), Veterans Affairs ID Card (must be unex-

pired or have no expiration), A photo ID issued by a Wisconsin accredited university or college, or technical college along with an enrollment verification document. The card must show the voter's name, signature, photo, the date the card was issued, and the date the card expires. The issued date cannot be more than two years from the expiration date. The card may still be used to vote even if it is expired.

An acceptable photo ID is not required to include a current address.

If you do not have a valid Wisconsin Driver's License or Wisconsin State ID, you can receive a free Wisconsin State ID from your local DMV if you specifically request a free ID for voting purposes. If you don't have documentation, like a birth certificate, you can still get a free ID for voting after one visit to the DMV using their petition process. Please contact your local DMV or

your municipal clerk for more information.

During in-person absentee voting, voters must present photo ID just like on Election Day. In Washington County, each municipal clerk establishes their own dates and hours for in-person absentee voting. Please contact your city, village, or town municipal clerk for dates and hours for your municipality. The County and the Courthouse do not provide in-person absentee voting and do not accept absentee ballot applications. All absentee voting (in-person and by mail) is conducted by the municipal clerk in the city, village, or town where the voter lives.

When voters request an absentee ballot by mail from their city, village, or town clerk, they must include a photocopy of their photo ID with the request, or the ballot cannot be mailed. You only need to provide your copy of photo ID once to vote by mail. Voters who are

"indefinitely confined" because of age, illness, infirmity or disability, and who select this option when requesting their ballot, do not need to provide a photo ID when voting by mail. Active members of the U.S. Armed Services who are away from home are also exempt from the photo ID requirement when voting by mail. Please contact your municipal clerk's office for more information.

For specific questions on how the new Voter ID law affects you please contact your local municipal clerk's office.

Voters are also encouraged to visit the Wisconsin Elections Commission's Photo ID website www.bringit.wisconsin.gov for information about the new law.

Stroebel Receives Award

The Metropolitan Milwaukee Association of Commerce (MMAC) today announced that state Senator Duey Stroebel (R-Saukville) has received the "Champion of Commerce" award for his service in the 2015-2016 Wisconsin legislative session.

VOTE Voters Urged To Check Their Registration Now For The November General Election

With the election just several weeks away, Washington County Clerk Brenda Jaszewski urges local voters to make sure they are properly registered for the November 8 General Election. "We are expecting a very large turnout on election day and the last thing someone wants to hear after they've waited in line is that they are not on the registration list and need to register before they can receive a ballot. If you take just a few minutes to go online to the state's MyVote.WI.gov website, you can make sure you are registered to vote at your current address, and know where to go on Election Day," said Jaszewski.

"In less than two minutes, you can go to MyVote.WI.gov, find your polling place location and see what will be on your ballot," Jaszewski said. "If you are not registered or you need to update your name or address, you can start the process online."

Clerk Jaszewski wants to remind voters that Wednesday, October 19 is

the deadline to register to vote by mail, including the voter registration form they get when they use MyVote Wisconsin. All mail-in voter registration applications must be postmarked by October 19, and mailed directly to the voter's municipal clerk in the city, village, or township where they reside. Starting on October 20, all voter registrations must be done in person at the municipal clerk's office or at the polling place on Election Day, and cannot be done at the County.

Every voter registration must be accompanied by a document for proof of residence. This can be a Wisconsin driver license or Wisconsin state ID with a current address, a recent utility bill or bank statement, or a lease or property tax bill. 

EXERCISE: HOW MUCH IS ENOUGH?

Any amount of exercise is beneficial and better than none. Experts recommend 150 minutes per week of moderate exercise. A new study that examined the habits of about 600,000 people found that those who didn't exercise at all had the highest risk of early death during the 14-year study period. Those who exercised some but did not meet the recommended goal, lowered their risk by 20%. People who met the suggested amount of 150 minutes per week enjoyed a 31% reduced risk. The biggest benefit came for those who did 3 times the standard or 450 minutes per week; their risk was 39% lower and walking was their preferred exercise.







The Green Bay Packers, coming off a frustrating loss last week at the hands of "The Purple People Eaters", Mike McCarthy's Green and Gold sparked in front of nearly 79,000 fans at Lambeau Field.

A superb performance by Aaron Rodgers throwing four first half touchdowns dominated the Lions defense. Eddie Lacy, with the help of a weak running defense, brought a consistent running game counted for 48 percent of the plays called. The defense played a solid game only allowing 10 points in the first half of play. However, cornerback Damarious Randall continued to struggle this week with Lions receiver Marvin Jones. Last week, Randall struggled with Vikings receiver Stefon Diggs, one of the attributing factors to the Packers' loss. Nick Perry had an enormous game complimented by outstanding plays from Jake Ryan, Jaryone Elliott, Mike

Daniels, Datone Jones and Blake Martinez.

The Packers defense struggled in the second half, allowing 17 points. Seven of those came with just over three minutes left to play when Damarious Randall broke coverage against Marvin Jones, allowing him to score his second and final touchdown of the day. The Packer defense also dropped three potential interceptions that may have resulted in points off the play. Mike McCarthy's conservative offensive play calling attributed to scoring only three points in the entire second half of the game.

Aaron Rodgers finished

the game with a passer rating of 137.5 completing 15/24 completions for 205 yards with four touchdowns. This was the first time in over 14 games Aaron had a passer rating of over 100. Eddie Lacy had 17 carries for 103 yards, his first game with over 100 rushing yards this season. Jordy Nelson came up big with six catches for 101 yards and two touchdowns. For the lions, Matthew Stafford completed 28/41 pass attempts for 385 yards and three touchdowns. Theo Riddick had 10 carries but for only nine yards. Marvin Jones had six catches for 205 yards two touchdowns. Time of possession was controlled by the Lions with 35:07 compared to the Packs' 24:53. The final score: Packers 34, Lions 27.

This weekend the Packers have a Bye going into their next game against the influential NY Giants on Sunday Night under the lights of legendary Lambeau Field.

There's no question that as a sedentary society, exercise just isn't enough anymore to correct the underlying problems caused by bad posture. Unfortunately, the majority of people (myself included at one time) don't perform exercises properly, thus increasing their chances of injuring themselves and promoting more dysfunction to their posture.

Over the weekend I did my first posture workshop and one of the things that some of my participants brought up was that when looking at photos of themselves they noticed that their posture was bad. Take a look at some photos of yourself and see if you notice any posture dysfunction. Is your head tilted to the side or jutting forward, are your shoulders slumped, do you shift your weight to one side, or are you bent forward at the waist? Attending one of my posture workshops will help you identify all of these patterns and create a whole new awareness of your body.

The other common theme in the workshop was that people wanted to learn how to exercise properly so they would stop injuring themselves during workouts. It is not possible to have correct posture while performing exercises if you cannot first achieve correct posture in a sitting, standing or lying position. To achieve optimal dynamic movement while avoiding injuries, one must first have correct static posture (sitting, standing, lying).

So why would someone want to commit 12 weeks to do a posture correction program? To move better, feel better, and look better! Long-term posture correction requires a 360 degree approach to posture improvement, and the 12-Weeks to Better Posture program offers exactly

WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORT

Town Of West Bend House Fire

On Monday, Sept. 26, at approximately 8:18 a.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a house fire located in the 4900 block of Eagle Lane in the Town of West Bend. The caller reported that an 18-year-old family member was trapped in the basement.

Deputies and firefighters from the West Bend Fire Department were subsequently dispatched to the scene. Upon their arrival, first responders observed a moderate amount of smoke emitting from the single family home. Assisting the West Bend Fire Department were the following departments: Allenton, Boltonville, Germantown, Hartford, Jackson, Kewaskum, Kohlsville, Newburg, Saukville, Slinger, and St. Lawrence.

A preliminary investigation revealed the following: At the time of the fire, the single family residence was occupied by five immediate family members ranging in age from 12 to 54. Shortly before 8:18 a.m., a 24-year-old son was awoken to some type of explosion. Upon investigating the source of the explosion, he discovered heavy smoke and fire coming from the basement. He was able to alert and evacuate everyone from the residence, except for his 18-year-old sister (who was believed to be in the basement). He exited the residence and attempted to alert his sister by breaking an exterior basement window.

The brother confirmed that the sister was still in the basement and ran to a neighboring residence to call 911. Within approximately eight minutes of their arrival, two West Bend Fire Fighters were able to locate the 18-year-old woman and extricate her from the basement. She was subsequently transported via ambulance to St. Joseph's Hospital in the Town of Polk, and later to St. Mary's Burn Center in Milwaukee for further monitoring.

Thanks to the efforts of these two firefighters, her injuries appear to be minor and non-life threatening. The 24-year-old brother was also transported to St. Joseph's Hospital via ambulance for minor cuts to his hands and arms. No firefighters were injured.

The exact cause of the fire remains under investigation, but it does not appear to be suspicious in nature. Damage to the home and contents was estimated at approximately \$300,000. The Red Cross was requested at the scene to assist the family. Eagle Lane south of Starlite Drive was closed for approximately four-hours to facilitate fire-fighting, overhaul, and investigative functions.

Fraudulent Wire Transfer Investigation Update

The Sheriff's Office continues to investigate the

June 16 fraud investigation which resulted in the transfer of \$87,760 from a Washington County bank account to other criminal bank accounts. Washington County Sheriff's Office investigators worked closely with Washington County's primary commercial banking institution to initiate a fraud recall on a portion of the funds that remained in the illegitimate accounts.

As a result of this effort, \$32,163.76 was returned to Washington County on September 15. The criminal investigation into the matter remains active.

Emergency Plane Landing

On Tuesday, Sept. 20, at approximately 10:17 a.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a plane that had landed on CTH H just west of Lover's Lane in the Town of Farmington. The caller indicated that no crash had occurred and that nobody was injured. Deputies were subsequently dispatched to the scene.

Upon Deputies' arrival, the pilot had already positioned the plane off the roadway and onto a farm access drive. He was uninjured. The pilot, a 77-year-old Jacksonville Florida man, indicated that he recently purchased the aircraft from a subject in Door County, Wisconsin. He departed Ephraim-Gibraltar Airport in Ephraim, Wisconsin this morning at approximately 8:22 a.m., and was enroute to Joliet, Illinois. The pilot was scheduled to stop at the West Bend Airport for re-fueling. The pilot indicated that the plane experienced a mechanical problem that resulted in a loss of power. As a result, the pilot was forced to land the plane on CTH H (westbound).

The plane is described as a Rans S6-ES amphibious/land experimental aircraft. Its wingspan was estimated at approximately 34 feet. The plane received no damage as a result of the landing, and no other vehicles or structures were involved. The FAA was apprised of the situation, and the plane was removed from the scene by a local towing company. The plane will be transported to the West Bend Airport where the pilot can finish any necessary repairs and resume his flight.

Heritage Trails County Park Vehicles Broken Into

The Sheriff's Office responded to Heritage Trails County Park in the Town of Polk on Sunday, Sept. 25, at 3:06 p.m. to investigate a report of a vehicle broken into while the owner was attending her child's soccer game.

Deputies arrived and located a total of six vehicles broken into while the owners were watching the soccer game. All six of the vehicles had the windows broken out and various items taken ranging

from cash to credit cards to electronics.

Germantown Police are also investigating similar incidents in two different locations along STH 145 at youth sport events during that same time frame. The suspects are only described as two black males in a black four-door car. The Sheriff's Office is stepping up patrols in the area of youth sporting events, but citizens are reminded to refrain from leaving valuables visible within their vehicles.

Personal Injury Accident

The Sheriff's Office, along with the Kohlsville and Kewaskum Fire Departments, responded to the area of Ridge Rd. and Highland Dr. in the Town of Barton on Sunday, Sept. 25, at 4:41 a.m. for a report of a motor vehicle accident involving personal injury. The initial report was that a vehicle went over an embankment and came to rest in a creek injuring both occupants.

Dispatch was notified of the accident when the passenger, identified as a 21-year-old Town of Trenton man, called 911 indicating he had a head injury and the driver had fled the scene on foot. Since the extent of the suspected driver's injuries were not known, Sheriff's Deputies and volunteer fire department personnel spent a significant amount of time searching the immediate area without success.

At approximately 11:24 a.m., Sheriff Deputies made contact with the driver, identified as a 20-year-old City of West Bend man, at St. Joseph's Froedtert Hospital. After medical clearance at the hospital, he was transported to the Washington County Jail where he remains in custody on a probation hold.

Burglary At 502 Main St. Allenton

A 40-year-old Town of Addison woman was taken into custody for burglary after a business owner personally found the suspect in the basement of his licensed establishment on September 26, at 12:30 a.m. The bar owner located the suspect in an area of the basement that is restricted for patrons. After the bar owner escorted her from the building, he observed her retrieve two bottles of liquor from behind a dumpster and run into her nearby home.

The Sheriff's Office responded to the suspect's apartment but initially she would only speak to authorities through her closed door. After about half of conversation, the deputy was able to recover the two bottles of missing alcohol and took the female into custody for burglary.

Burglary 2700 Block Of Jackson Dr.

The Sheriff's Office is investigating a burglary to

a home in the 2700 block of Jackson Dr. in the Town of Jackson while the homeowners were in the back yard enjoying a camp fire. The incident occurred on September 24, at 9:21 p.m. and was discovered when one of the homeowners observed two subjects with flashlights running into an adjacent cornfield.

A subsequent inspection of the home revealed several items were taken. Deputies were dispatched to the area and were not able to locate the subjects or any vehicles parked in the area. The investigation is on-going.

Loud Music 1300 Block Of Ponderosa Dr. In The Town Of Jackson

A 33-year-old Town of Jackson man was cited for loud and unnecessary noise as a result of a housewarming party he was hosting on September 24, at 1:35 a.m. The Sheriff's Office was initially contacted by several different complainants around midnight indicating loud music and boisterous behavior could be heard throughout the neighborhood. Deputies arrived and made contact with the homeowner. He was advised that the music needed to be turned down. The homeowner initially complied, and was specifically told if the Sheriff's Office responded again citations would be issued.

The Sheriff's Office again responded to the same address based upon area complaints. Deputies noted the music could be clearly heard several homes away and was louder than the first time the deputies were summoned there. The homeowner is now facing a county ordinance citation for loud and unnecessary noise with a forfeiture amount of \$181.60.

Although this particular incident may not be particularly unique, it is an example of the Sheriff's Office having to escalate law enforcement techniques for a simple infraction. The primary goal of law enforcement is voluntary compliance with laws and ordinances. In this example, when voluntary compliance couldn't be achieved even after receiving a warning, the Sheriff's Office needed to progressively escalate the enforcement action to gain compliance.

Suspicious Vehicle

A 23-year-old Village of Richfield woman was taken into custody for resisting arrest and drug related charges after a suspicious vehicle was reported in the Holy Hill Estates Subdivision on Sept. 21 at 9:22 p.m. A concerned citizen reported a vehicle driving in an undeveloped area of the subdivision for an extended period of time. The deputy was able to locate the vehicle and observed a traffic violation.

The driver was stopped in the area of Hwy 164 and Monches Rd. at which

time she adamantly denied being in the area she was reported to have been. A large amount of heroin paraphernalia was located in the vehicle and she was subsequently arrested. The subject became argumentative about being searched by a male deputy incident to a lawful arrest. Although the procedure of allowing a deputy to search a subject of the opposite gender is completely allowable by policy based upon the individual circumstances, the decision was made to request mutual aid from a female officer from the Slinger Police Department to assist with the search.

After the female officer was dispatched to the scene, but before she arrived, the suspect attempted to run from the deputy. The female, who was already in handcuffs, fell in the roadway as she tried to flee. She became combative and tried to kick the deputy as she was stabilized in the middle of Monches Rd. The female police officer arrived on scene and located a heroin kit in the suspect's undergarments. The suspect is currently in custody facing resisting arrest, possession of heroin and possession of heroin drug paraphernalia charges.

**Kewaskum Man Charged With First-Degree Reckless Homicide**

A Kewaskum man who was charged in the overdose death of a 21-year-old West Bend woman in May waived his right to a preliminary hearing in a Washington County courtroom on Wednesday, Sept. 21.

Anthony Kudek, 28, is scheduled to appear in Washington County Circuit Court for an arraignment hearing on Wednesday, Nov. 2.

Kudek is charged with first-degree reckless homicide/delivering drugs and felony bail jumping. Kudek faces up to 40 years on the reckless homicide charge. He is charged as a repeat offender, which could add another six years, if convicted. Felony bail jumping carries an additional six years in prison, if found guilty.

According to the criminal complaint, Kimberly Landon of West Bend was found dead in her bedroom by a family member on May 17. She was last seen alive at about 6 a.m. by that same family member before he left for work. When the family member returned at about 4 p.m., he found Landon unresponsive in her bedroom.

Paramedics declared Landon dead at the scene. An autopsy revealed that she had died from cocaine and heroin.

Police found evidence of drug use in Landon's room. Phone messages and social media traced Landon to Kudek, her alleged drug source.

In July, Kudek admitted to police that he had picked up Landon in Brookfield the night before she died. According to

Kudek, Landon already had heroin, but he drove her to Milwaukee, where he purchased crack cocaine. The two drove back to Kewaskum and smoked the crack cocaine and returned to Milwaukee to buy more.

Kudek and Landon allegedly then drove to West Bend and smoked more crack cocaine before Kudek dropped Landon at her father's house at about 2:30 a.m., Kudek told police. He said he did not see Landon use heroin that evening.

Less than a week later, on May 23, Kudek was sentenced in Washington County to 20 days in jail for misdemeanor cocaine possession and three years probation for the heroin possession.

In the reckless homicide/delivering drugs and felony bail jumping case, Kudek initially appeared in court on July 27 with attorney Alyssa Armbrust of the state's Public Defender's Office. At that time, bail in the case was set at \$25,000 cash.

Kudek appeared in custody on August 24 with a new attorney, Deborah Strigenz, a criminal defense attorney from Kewaskum.

Strigenz represented Kudek as he appeared in court before Judge Todd Martens on September 21. Assistant District Attorney Sandra Giernoth represented the state.



Jump Start Next Year's Garden This Fall

Now's the time to start that new garden you've always wanted. Cool, usually drier, fall weather makes it easier on the gardener and better on the plants. Plus, the garden to-do list is often a bit shorter this time of year.



Start by locating the placement, size and shape of this new garden. Use a rope or hose to outline the area. Avoid tight corners or creating narrow grass borders that will be difficult to mow or require hand trimming. Once satisfied with the layout, take a soil test and decide how to kill the existing lawn and weeds as needed. A soil test will tell you how much and what type of fertilizer you will

need for the plants you are growing. Testing now means you'll have the information in hand when it is time to fertilize in spring. Next edge the bed. Use a shovel to dig a V shaped trench around the border of the garden. Or rent or borrow a power edger to make larger jobs easier. Once the edging is complete, remove healthy grass with a sod cutter and use it to fill bare spots in the lawn. Or create a planting berm or simply add it to the compost pile. Just place it green side down and wait for it to decompose. Another method for clearing the grass is to cover the area with cardboard topped with several inches of organic mulch and wait for the grass and cardboard to decompose. With this method, you may want to finish the soil preparation and begin planting next spring after the grass and cardboard have broken down completely. For quicker results and control of perennial weeds try a total vegetation killer. These products kill the top and roots of the good and bad plants they touch. Read and follow label directions carefully. Start your soil preparation after the required waiting period has passed. The next step, a very

important one, is soil improvement. It is easier to repair and improve the soil before you plant. Plus, time spent now yields years of good results. Add two to four inches of organic matter like aged manure, peat moss or leaf compost to the top eight to 12 inches of soil. These materials improve the drainage in heavy clay soil and increase the water holding ability in fast draining sandy or rocky soils. Check the labeling on the bag when purchasing these products. Make sure the product you select is USDA and STA certified like Hsu leaf compost (HsuGrowingSupply.com). USDA BioPreferred certified products are derived from plants and other renewal products, providing an alternative to petroleum based goods. Look for United States Composting Council's STA certified compost that is a renewable, consistent, high quality product made from locally available organic material. Once you mix in the organic matter, rake the garden level and smooth. Your garden is ready to plant. Fill it with spring flowering bulbs, perennials, trees and shrubs. Or cover with shredded leaves or other organic mulch to suppress weeds and prevent soil erosion.




Use the winter to plan the garden so you will be ready to plant once spring arrives.
