## Key Club Serves Thanksgiving Dinner To Area Senior Citizens

About 150 senior citizens enjoyed an early Thanksgiving dinner on Saturday, complete with turkey, dressing, mashed potatoes, vegetables and dessert.

Members of Kewaskum High School's Key Club served the seniors the meal in the high school cafeteria. The Kewaskum Kiwanis Club sponsored the meal.

It is a tradition that started about 20 years ago.

"The crowd has gotten bigger every year. We used to have only about 80 people come for the dinner," Kiwanis member

Larry Ammel said.

When the program started, the students worked with Kiwanis Club members to prepare the dinner, with the Key Club advisor heading up the cooking.

But when Kewaskum High School teach Stacy LaRonge became the Key Club advisor about five years ago, that sounded challenging.

"I had never cooked a Thanksgiving dinner before," LaRonge said.

So she approached the school's kitchen staff, and they agreed to fix the dinner.

The students still bake all the desserts. And they served the dinners, as well

as wash dishes.

Still, having the school kitchen staff doing the bulk of the cooking makes it easier on several counts.

"They know where everything is in the kitchen and how to work all the equipment," Ammel said.

Plus, it is one of the highlights of the year for the kitchen staff.

"I love to cater, so any extra events that we can do outside the lunch line, I really look forward to," said Terri Miller, nutrition services director for the Kewaskum School District.

Area shoppers began their holiday shopping on Sunday at the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce Craft and Vendor Expo held at Kewaskum Elementary School.

With 43 vendors, there was a wide array of merchandise to choose from, ranging from clothing and jewelry to Christmas decorations and pet accessories. There were soaps, lotions, makeup, books, pottery, candles, metal art and food items, to name just a few of the things available.

In addition to the products they sold, each of the vendors had a story of their own of how they had started up their unique businesses.

For example, Clara Marx of Juneau never would have guessed that she would be selling pet products that she created.

Sunday's crowd especially liked Marx's pet beds that resemble small indoor teepees.

Marx, who has been

sewing all her life, actually bought the McCall's pattern for the beds years ago. But she set the pattern aside and never did anything with it.

Then, in 2011, she suffered a brain tumor and was forced to retire from her job as a correctional officer for Fond du Lac County.

"Oh my gosh, what am I going to do with my life now?" Marx wondered to herself.

She dug out the old pattern and began to sew.

As she began making the dog beds, she started altering the pattern so that it could be used for different sized dogs and cats.

She also began making dog coats, bandanas, stockings, caps and just about anything imaginable for a pet.

Sandy Berres of West Bend is another crafter whose creativity was featured at the Kewaskum show this weekend.

Berres displayed the "memory bears" that she had made. Specially created using fabrics from favorite clothing or

belongs, Berres makes the stuffed animals as a way to remember loved ones.

"I try to bring out some of the personality of the loved one," Berres explained.

For example, one bear that Berres created was made in memory of someone's grandmother. The bear's clothing was made from a favorite outfit of the grandmother.

Because the lady had loved cooking, Berres crafted an apron from an old throw pillow that the woman had on her couch for years. A pocket was sewn on the apron, where Berres placed a Kleenex, just as the grandmother always carried in her pocket. In addition, Berres sewed a heart on the bear because her granddaughter loved her.

Berres started making fur bears years ago, but came up with the idea of creating memory bears after going through loved ones' clothing that was saved in closets.

Miller was in the school kitchen at 5:30 a.m. to begin preparing the meal. When she arrived, she put the turkeys in the convection oven and set the temperature to 325 degrees. They were fully cooked at 9 a.m., she said.

Other than the desserts, Miller and one other staff member prepared the entire meal.

In all, they went through 50 pounds of turkey, four large bags of stuffing, five large bags of mashed potatoes, two gallons of turkey gravy, 10 pounds of corn, 10 pounds of green beans, 15 pounds of coleslaw, 12 dozen dinner rolls and 12 cans of cran-

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# Town Of Farmington Approves 2017 Budget

As parents drive their children to Farmington Elementary School this year, the ride is much smoother as they drive down Boltonville Road.

The road is one of three streets in the Town of Farmington that have undergone road repairs over the past year. Jay Road and Indian Lore Road also have been repaired.

The town now owes a total of \$250,000 for those road repairs.

In all, the town has about \$398,000 in long-term debt. In addition to

the road repair loans, the long-term liabilities include about \$57,000 for snow plows and about \$91,000 for a wheel loader.

To help pay off those loans, homeowners in the Town of Farmington will see a 15 cent increase for every \$1,000 of assessed value, under the town's approved 2017 budget.

With a mill rate of about \$1.29, the new budget means for ever \$100,000 of assessed property, homeowners will pay about \$15.09 more than they did last year.

Property owners with a house valued at \$200,000 will see an increase of

\$30.18 in this year's taxes for the town.

The average home value in the Town of Farmington is \$199,939.55. Last year, a home with that value paid \$227.67 in town taxes. This year, that same home will pay \$257.84.

That \$257.84 makes up about 7 percent of the entire property tax, Town Board Chairman Chris Elbe said. The remainder of the tax bill goes to the school district, county and Moraine Park Technical College.

The town board unanimously approved the budget on November 10.

### Welfare Check

### Single Vehicle Crash

## Four Tips For Helping Your Child Disconnect From The Electronic World

Ever since Nintendo made the Pokemon Go video-game app available, young people have been exploring their communities with their eyes firmly fixed on their smartphones rather than on the wonders of the world.

If endless hours spent capturing imaginary creatures seems like an electronic addiction, it very well may be, but that's nothing new. Many children have been plugged into electronic devices for a long time now, rarely looking up as they help virtual animals save the day, keep race cars on track and watch endless loops of videos on YouTube.

And that can be a concern, says Elaine Fogel Schneider, Ph.D., a therapist and author of "Seven Strategies for Raising Calm, Inspired & Successful Children" ([www.askdreline.com](http://www.askdreline.com)).

"They are so attached to technology at such an early age and it's changing their brain circuitry," Schneider says. "They begin to lose the back and forth communication with their parents, and/or siblings, and the whole notion

of empathy. For really young children, these devices have become the babysitter. I fully understand that parents need a break (as do grandparents), but there have to be limits."

Schneider has tips for parents who worry about how they can control their child's electronic pastime.

•Set rules. Limit the amount of time your child can spend on an electronic device and be consistent in enforcing those rules. This way your child knows that when you say he or she only has two minutes left, then there really is only two minutes left, not three or four hours.

•Use a timer. A timer does not "lie" and can take the blame away from you when you're limiting your child's time on the device. Use the timer that measures down the time your child is spending on the tablet, smartphone, and/or technological game, so that your child knows the end for using that device is approaching, and it won't be a surprise when time is up. You can even have your child select a tone on the smartphone that he or she likes.

•Be ready with another activity. Plan an alternative way of engaging your child so when the device is

turned off, some other interest can be provided and take his or her mind off the electronic device. "Describe what you're going to do so the child's interest is piqued into doing something else that he or she enjoys," Schneider says.

•Use these tips in your home at first. As with everything, at first there's a learning curve, so there may be tantrums, tears, melt downs and even depression. That's why Schneider recommends following these tips at home first.

"I wouldn't think of trying this out in public right away since I don't think you want to endure the wrath or glances of diners or shoppers as they hear your child scream," Schneider says. In time, though, the child will know what is expected, she says, and will be able to disconnect from a smartphone, tablet, or other electronic device without major meltdowns.

"In the long run, you're doing a service for your child by limiting the amount of time spent on an electronic device," Schneider says. "I can remember hearing my own mother's words, 'I'm doing this for your own good!' And that's really true."

## "Smoking Gun" Stories

Over the past few years I have noticed a ramp-up of attention to "smoking gun" stories in all forms of media. I would define "smoking gun" stories as super sensational true or even sometimes not true stories that capture media headlines.

The purpose of these types of stories is to grab attention of the public which indirectly gets attention to the media outlet it is coming from. I suspect this is done in an attempt to make quick money. There has been a huge following of these types of stories.

Many media outlets have changed their news headlines and top stories to smoking gun stories to get short term ratings, hits on websites, or newsstand sales. The stories usually don't last long.

In reality, there are few true smoking gun stories in the coverage area of this paper. We don't make up headlines and place police blotters on our front page just to get attention. Our front pages and headlines reflect what is really going on here at home recently or what is known in the future.

Sure, sometimes we do have a big breaking story to report, such as the recent school referendum. Depending on when it breaks, we will put a brief-

ing on our website and then give depth and details to the story in our paper (available in print and online — both are paid editions).

The real danger of smoking gun stories is that editors put these types of stories as top stories to generate attention as opposed to publishing top stories that are the real top things going on that affect readers. Local media outlets that focus on smoking gun stories won't last long or won't be respected as a trusted source.

Personally, I like living in an area where the top true headlines are about what kids are doing in school, features on local people, or what community groups or government entities are doing.

I suspect that the people who live here also like it this way. Living in such a special community is a gift that should be recognized

as something special. This is a community where family, patriotism, and values are important. Although there may be times we have to bring you difficult stories, most of the time our focus will be on goodness of the people who work, live, and play at a place we call home.

# Kewaskum School District Earns Four Stars On State Report Cards

Kewaskum School District earned four out of five stars on state report cards from the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, issued for the 2015-16 school year. Based on the star rating, the Kewaskum School District exceeds expectations for educating students.

The report cards have two ratings, the star rating (from 1 to 5) and a 0-100 point scale that corresponds to the star rating.

On the 2015-16 report card, the district scored

80.0. The "exceeds expectations" rating (four stars) had a range of 73 to 82.9.

The 2015-16 score of 80 is an increase of 4.8 points over 2013-14, when the district received a 75.2 score.

Report cards are issued based on four priority areas: student achievement in English language arts and mathematics, student growth, closing gaps between student populations, and measures of readiness for graduation and post-

secondary success. While school and district report cards provide information to the community, they do not represent a full picture of the work happening at a school.

Over the past five years, students in grades three through eight have improved compared to the state average by over 15 percent in literacy and 10 percent in math. Also, ACT scores improved in all subject areas from the previous year.

"Our district report card

is another indicator that the work teachers are doing is impacting the learning of students. It encourages me that we are on the right track," Curriculum Director Mark Bazata said.

The 2015-16 report cards underwent major changes that were part of Wisconsin Act 55, the 2015-17 state budget. Those changes include variable weighting to address the impacts of poverty on student achievement, a new model for measuring stu-

dent growth based on value-added methodology developed by the University of Wisconsin-Madison, and the legislative requirement to change from the Badger Exam offered through the Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium to the Forward Exam.

Report cards rely on multiple years of data, the 2015-16 report cards are based on one year each of Badger and Forward exams for grades three through eight and the ACT Plus Writing as well

as Dynamic Learning Maps assessments in grades three through eight and grade 11. The third year of data came from the Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Exam and Wisconsin Alternate Assessment for Students with Disabilities. Using data from three different assessments in calculations, along with other legislated changes, makes comparisons of school and district performance to prior report card ratings inaccurate and inadvisable.

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



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# Making Clean Water

There are no Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles fighting criminals and alien invaders in the sewers of the Village of Kewaskum.

Instead, below the village streets are pipes in which sewage flows.

The wastewater is transported either by gravity or via one of the villages five lift stations that pump it to Kewaskum's wastewater treatment plant, located at 1000 Fond du Lac Ave.

With a total income of about \$1.3 million projected for 2017, the sewer utility is funded through fees rather than taxes.

## How The Treatment Plant Works

The wastewater treatment plant cleans approximately 300,000 gallons of sewage daily.

The village uses a natural process to clean water, so that good bacteria eats bad bacteria.

"Wastewater is basically treated with bugs. The bugs eat the wastewater up. We've got to keep them happy and fed and everything works out really well," Ben Propson, lead plant operator, said.

To survive, the bugs need oxygen, so the wastewater goes through aeration bays to make sure the bugs are productive.

Next, the water is separated from the solids. Gravity causes the water to flow from one plant chamber to the next.

On the solid side of the plant, inorganic material is filtered out and removed from the sludge. About

one million gallons of sludge is brought from the treatment plant to farm fields each year.

A state-of-the-art computer system monitors the entire process, Propson said.

Once the water is cleaned, it flows through a pipe underneath Hon-E-Kor Golf Course and into the river.

## Plant Costs

If rainwater is added to the mixture, the total volume increases, and the water flows more quickly through each chamber. When that happens, the water isn't cleaned as thoroughly.

That is what happened about a decade ago when the plant was cited for having some violations.

It was discovered that when it rained, too much water entered the plant, causing the wastewater to flow too quickly through the gravity-based system.

To correct the problem, in 2008, the Village of Kewaskum upgraded the wastewater treatment plant for a cost of \$6.3 million.

"They got one heck of a plant here, but they still needed to take care of the source of the problem, which is that excess water entering the treatment plant," Ben Propson, lead plant operator, said.

This summer, corrective action was taken on some of the culprits, houses on Meadow Lane that were putting rainwater into the village sewer. Many of the homes were built in the 1940s or 1950s, when it was standard to connect

drain tiles on the houses directly to the sanitary lateral. Sanitary laterals are located on individual parcels and transport water from a house or building into the village's sewer system.

Each sewer lateral is owned in its entirety by the property owner, from the house, extending under the sidewalk and all the way to the main located under the street. Therefore, it is up to each property owner to foot the bill to correct the problem.

Since the village fixed the water main at the same time, the homeowners were able to do the work at a discounted rate. What normally would have cost the homeowners about \$10,000 ended up costing closer to \$4,500, Propson said.

"The prices we got on this were amazing," Propson said.

Under the budget that the village board approved last week, the same problem will be fixed with houses on Roseland Drive in 2017.

## Other Sewage Debts

The sewage utility took on another loan of about \$2.7 million about four years ago when it added a lift station near the dam in Riverhill Park, Propson said.

In addition, the TIF District has added to the utility district's financial woes.

For the past three years, the Village Board has waived impact fees in an effort to encourage development in the village's Tax Incremental Finance (TIF) District.

Normally, the village charges impact fees are charged when a new house or business is built to cover the cost of sewage, water and parks. For a single family home in the TIF District, impact fees would typically require a builder to pay an extra \$7,000 to \$8,000, Village Administrator Matt Heiser said.

On the bright side, though, village officials expect that the shortfall will correct itself once development begins.

"If a commercial property that has a high water usage moves into the TIF

District, then the budget will be back on track," Propson said.

The plant is ready for the development. It is designed to handle 750,000 gallons of water a day, and currently processes only about 300,000 gallons daily.

## Money Saving Programs

The sewage utility has started several cost-saving measures to reduce its \$175,000 annual shortfall.

About a year ago, the treatment plant began accepting sewage from outside the village limits. That earned about \$56,000 in additional revenue.

The other big savings this year was that the treatment plant had a 44 percent reduction in its electric bill.

"A lot of the electrical power that is used at the wastewater plant is for the blowers that generate air that helps feed the bugs in the plant. We redirected how we use some of that air," Propson said.

By making adjustments on the amount of air that the plant used, the utility has seen a reduction of about \$35,000 in its electric bills in 2016, Propson said.

A couple years ago, the village purchased a used hydro-vacuum truck for about \$95,000, Propson said. That truck was used to jet and vacuum out the village's entire sewer system over the last two years.

"Before, sewer cleaning was contracted out, so we are probably saving \$20,000 a year," Propson said.

The sewage utility has also purchased some televising equipment that can

actually go into pipes to locate where problem areas are. The camera, which is operated by a robot, was used to install the sewage lateral pipes on Meadow Lane this summer.

Without the equipment, the village would have had to pay an outside contractor to provide that service.

Now, not only can the village's sewage utility do those projects themselves, but outside communities are now paying to have Kewaskum service them. The Kewaskum sewage utility contracts with Eden and Campbellsport to cleaning and televise their sewage systems.

## Resident Contributions

Village residents can do their part in keeping water and the environment clean.

One way residents can do that is by reducing the amount of salt that enters the sewer. The village rec-

ommends that if a resident's water softener seems to be using more salt than normal, that it be serviced by a qualified technician.

In addition, medication and drugs should not be disposed of in the sewage system. There is a drop box located in the village's police station where medications can be properly disposed.

Any residents who experience a sewage backup in their home should contact the sewage utility office at (262) 626-2313. There is someone on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and the employee will come to the house at no charge.

If it is determined that the problem is located within the village's sewer lines under the street, the village will repair the line. If the problem is within the homeowner's sewer lateral on their personal property, the village employee will let the homeowners

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

# Lady Indians Chalk Up Win No. 1

Just about everything that could go wrong did go wrong for the Kewaskum High girls basketball team in its opener against Ozaukee, still the Lady Indians showed plenty of mettle and came away with a 58-51 non-conference victory.

"It was a hard fought win. We faced a lot of adversity," KHS coach Russ Thull said, reporting freshman Josie Baker had to leave the game because of a knee injury, while senior forward/guard Hailey Herriges missed seven minutes of the game due to an injury.

Also, senior point guard Mikayla Dogs missed action because of foul trouble.

KHS led the first 10 minutes, but when Dogs went to the bench, the host Warriors went on an 8-0 run to take the lead at intermission.

"Emma Richards was a handful inside. This girl is going to give teams fits ... athletic and dominant inside," Thull said, but, the Indians used a team effort

to defend her and hold her to 11 points, with just two baskets.

"We were able to weather the storm and were only down two at half," Thull said, reporting Herriges was able to return and that helped. "Kewaskum controlled the second half with some timely shots. Bre Trepes, Sydney Rosenthal and Maxine Paulowske all hit threes to lead the surge."

For the game, KHS hit seven three pointers, connecting on 41 percent of their tries from beyond the arc, and the Indians were 13x17 (71 percent) at the free throw line, showing great improvement over last season in both areas.

Dogs led all scorers with 21 points, had seven assists and "played extremely well," according to Thull, who said, "She is a different player this year and one that teams will have to key on."

Herriges also played well, scoring 14 points, hitting seven of eight from the charity stripe, and hauling down 10 rebounds. "I can't say enough about this

girl...works ethic is second to none, understands how to play the game," Thull said. "These two (Herriges and Dogs) will lead us this year!"

Thull cited Rosenthal for her efforts, which included hitting two of three threes and "doing the little things ... setting great screens, executing sets, boxing out, communicating and more."

Also praised was Paulowski, who scored six points in her first varsity game.

Ozaukee was led by Elise Large, who scored 17 points.

## Indians To Rebuild Team Around Lone Returning Starter

Starting his second season as boys basketball coach at Kewaskum High, Don Gruber is certain who one of his starters will be for 2016-07 but the other four spots ... well, it might take the first six or seven games to figure that out.

Six foot, six inch (6-6) senior forward Brady Hanson is back to lead a very inexperienced club, one that includes six other seniors who have little varsity experience and eight juniors who have none.

Hanson was the No. 2 scorer a year ago, pouring in 288 points (12.5 points per game) and hauling down 162 rebounds to help the Indians to a 10-13 record during a season which was hampered by several suspensions at its start.

No other returnee scored more than three points, as Charlie Witek, Sam Schlosser, Michael Prochnow, Jason Hanson and Devyn Zillmer were on the court over 90 percent of the time, and they have all graduated.

Hanson has definitely benefited from playing in a summer league and is ready to go. "He's (Hanson) looking good. He had a great football season. There's no doubt about that," Gruber said, indicating he expects the leadership to come from Hanson and says thus far, "He's taking an active role in keeping the others focused ... I've witnessed maturity the first week."

One area Hanson must improve in is keeping away from foul trouble, which at times limited his minutes a year ago. "In his defense, he always drew the other team's best player (to guard)," Gruber said, but, "I'm expecting him to be more under control on the defensive end (of the court)."

"I've got a couple of seniors who haven't played very much, but the thing is, they do know what we're about," Gruber said, referring to the culture he and his varsity assistant coach, Don Hauser, are trying to create, and, "That's a plus for the seniors."

"I don't really have my starters picked yet," Gruber went on. "There are a couple of seniors who could start," referring to 5-10 guard Ty Schellinger, and two post players, 6-3 Nick Buchel and 6-4 Nick Beine. "They are in consideration. I have to see the next three or four practices."

Pushing the seniors will be eight juniors, and Gruber said, "The juniors will definitely contribute ... Jared Chesak, (Danny) Kreis, Brent (Goeden), Jon Heus and Jordan Carlton will get a lot of playing time. It's going to be up to me to put the puzzle together." Most of these juniors are in the 5-10 to 6-0 range, can handle the ball, shoot and play tough defense.

Kewaskum was slated to open the season on November 22 vs. Cedar

Grove, but that game has been postponed because the Rockets just finished the football state with a trip to the Division 4 finals on November 18. Gruber said he is trying to come up with a makeup day, but nothing has been decided on.

"It looks like our first game will be against Slinger (on November 29)," Gruber said, adding it will be a "tall order" since the Owls return 6-8 junior Derek Sabin and a couple other regulars from last year.

The Indians open the East Central campaign on Tuesday, Dec. 6, hosting Plymouth. "There are three teams that are going to be very difficult (to compete against)," Gruber said, pointing to Waupun the returning D-3 state champion, Ripon and Kettle Moraine Lutheran. The KHS coach also noted Plymouth has two all-conference players back.

While it may take some time for the offense to gel, Gruber said, "The thing that is going to keep us in games is our defense."

## Elusive Buck Finally Caught

For the past three years, hunters in the Kewaskum area have recorded a large buck on their trail cameras.

They have been able to identify the deer because of its nontypical 15-point rack.

The large, unusual buck has been the topic of conversation among area hunters in recent years. The four-legged creature was recorded frequently on the cameras as he roamed the area.

But none of the avid hunters had actually seen the massive creature in person. No one had ever been able to take aim at the buck.

Then, on November 8, Kewaskum resident Peter Herriges, saw the elusive buck while bow hunting.

He watched as several

small bucks roamed around beneath his deer stand, which was situated just south of Kewaskum.

Then, a doe stopped about 60 yards from Herriges' location.

None of the small bucks came near the doe. They must have sensed that the doe's larger mate was nearby.

Then Herriges saw the buck.

He didn't realize it was the legendary deer when he spotted it from his deer stand. He just knew it was big.

The enormous buck crossed the creek that was near the deer stand. Herriges took aim and shot.

He knew right away that he had hit the buck.

But he waited three hours before coming down from his stand, in case the shot had not been fatal.

The only person he contacted from his tree stand was his wife, Erika, to let her know he had just shot a big one.

That afternoon, Herriges told his cousin about the hunt, and the two found the buck about 80 yards from the stand.

The field-dressed buck weighed 220 pounds and had a green score of 180.75, Herriges said.

So far this year, the buck measures in as one of the top 10 nontypical bucks shot with a bow in Washington County.

Word spread across the region very quickly that Herriges had shot the easily recognizable buck.

"I started getting phone calls and emails about it," Herriges said. "A lot of people had seen that buck roaming around the area. I never imagined I would ever get such a large one."

## Perkins' Returns Help Bison To A 28-21 Victory

After missing several games, Kewaskum's Eric Perkins returned to the North Dakota State lineup for its game against South Dakota on November 19 and helped the Bison post a 28-21 victory over the Coyotes.

The victory helped North Dakota State clinch its sixth straight Missouri Valley Football Conference championship and sends the Bisons into the 24-team NCAA 1 Football Championship (FCS) playoffs with a bye in the first round.

Perkins, who has primarily been a kickoff and punt return specialist the past two seasons, returned three kickoffs — the longest went for 32 yards — for 68 yards in the victory. Near the end of the second quarter, Perkins' 19-yard return started a seven-play, 81-yard scoring drive for NDSU, giving the Bison a 21-14 lead.

Perkins, a senior, also ran the ball once for a 29 yard gain for the winners. With the win, North Dakota State ended the regular season with a 10-1 record.

The Bison will play the winner of San Diego/Cal Poly game on December 3 at 2:30 p.m. The game will be televised on ESPN 3.

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
## The Ultimate Packer Fan Picks Stop "Cutting The Cheese!"

The group practices on Saturday mornings. They perform at the girls and boys varsity basketball games in both Campbellsport and Kewaskum.

This was something very close to Bilgo's heart, which is why she pushed so hard for it last year. She had a brother with cerebral palsy, so she has always had a special place in her heart for people with disabilities.

"It's always been on my mind to do this," Bilgo said. "It seemed like the right time. I think without Becky being the head coach, I wouldn't have had the time."

Bilgo has not had a problem finding people to help her with this project. The dance team members have been very helpful and not shy to volunteer for a lot of Saturday mornings to work with the dancers.

"It warmed my heart," Bilgo said.

The participants will learn a dance and perform it for the crowd.

"They will dance at the games as well as the dance showcase at the end of the year," Bilgo said. "If there is anyone else who would like to join, give us a call. It really does not matter what the disability is. We will make it work."

## DNR To Adopt Wildlife Area In Southern Wisconsin

A local chapter of the Pheasants Forever conservation organization is teaming up with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources to help manage a major state wildlife area through the Adopt A Wildlife Area program.

The Ozaukee/Washington County Chapter of Pheasants Forever has teamed up to manage Jackson Marsh Wildlife Areas in Washington County.

State wildlife officials says the Adopt a Wildlife Area program provides a positive impact to the environment while giving people of all ages and interests an opportunity to participate in hands-on conservation work.

"If we can show the public that we partner with our state and federal agencies to help preserve what we have got, and help people have a place to recreate and hunt and even just enjoy it, that's part of what we are about," said Jeff Stolen, vice president of the Ozaukee/Washington County Chapter.

Jackson Marsh Wildlife Area is a 2,312 acre property located in eastern

Washington County. The property is comprised mostly of forested wetland surrounded by grasslands, croplands, scattered ponds and wetlands, feeder streams, and small woodlots. It is a popular area for waterfowl and deer hunting as well as bird watching and other recreation.

At the first work day, chapter members learned more about chainsaw safety and took part in cutting to aid in habitat work and invasive species control. Moving forward, they will work to improve the landscape for all types of users — including the wildlife that call Jackson Marsh home.

"Several years ago I had a conversation with a colleague about an idea very similar to AWA, so I am happy to see this concept become a reality," said DNR wildlife technician Angie Rusch. "I am very excited to work with the Ozaukee/Washington Chapter of PF and make a difference on the landscape at Jackson marsh."

## Healthy Community, Awards Over \$220,000 In Grants To Non-Profits

The Healthy Community Fund has awarded \$222,800 in grants to 10 area non-profit organizations. Representatives of recipient organizations attended an Award Luncheon at Froedtert & the Medical College of Wisconsin St. Joseph's Hospital on Tuesday, Nov. 22, to receive their funding.

The Healthy Community Fund was created in 2008 through St. Joseph's Community Foundation to support community programs and projects throughout Washington County that will positively affect the health and wellness of those living and working within this area. The goal of the fund is to bring together non-profit organizations and resources that will support healthy lifestyle choices as well as provide support for programs committed to the promotion of health and wellness.

The agencies selected to receive funding this year include Albrecht Free Clinic, Boys and Girls Club of Washington County, Casa Guadalupe Education Center, Elevate, Family Promise of Washington County, Friends of Abused Families, Interfaith Caregivers of Washington County, Kettle Moraine YMCA, Senior Citizens Activities, and The Threshold.

Oversight of the Healthy Community Fund is provided by a committee of individuals from local communities as well as St. Joseph's Hospital and Froedtert and the Medical College of Wisconsin Community Physicians. The fund is administered through the St. Joseph's

Hospital Community Engagement Department.

Albrecht Free Clinic, "Healthy Smiles Change Lives" -- \$58,100, good oral hygiene and dental care has been identified by the Albrecht Free Clinic as an emerging community health need. Funds will support emergency care, basic restorative and oral hygiene, and education for the uninsured and underinsured.

Boys & Girls Club of Washington County, "Healthy Choices Initiative" -- \$30,000, with the increasing risk that youth are facing with childhood obesity, the goal of this project is to improve the health and wellness of youth through proper nutrition, education and a positive influence regarding diet and exercise. Funds will provide 20,024 meals for youth in the Hartford, Jackson, Kewaskum and West Bend summer programs.

Casa Guadalupe Education Center, "Healthy Latinos, Healthy Futures" -

\$15,000, funds will support health seminars and programs, outreach initiatives and transportation needs to promote education about health screenings, diabetes prevention, active lifestyles and nutrition for Latinos living in Washington County.

Elevate, Inc. "Too Good for Drugs" -- \$15,000, funds will be used to implement a "Too Good for Drugs," a prevention program at all five elementary schools at the fourth grade level in the West Bend School District. The program will give youth access to information regarding alcohol and drugs in their school setting for safe and healthy decision-making.

Family Promise of Washington County, "Homeless Health Services & Housing" -- \$10,000, the funds will be used to coordinate health services and housing for the homeless, including the first call for help housing hotline, assessment, ongoing case management, and transitional housing.

Friends of Abused Families, "Opening Doors Housing Program" -- \$25,000, for individuals experiencing violence in

their homes or relationships in Washington County, this project supports safe housing, education/job training, childcare and access to 24-hour crisis intervention. These services help individuals escape a violent relationship and gain access to mainstream resources to prevent further victimization for themselves and any children.

Interfaith Caregivers of Washington County, "Senior Transition Program" -- \$20,000, funding will help seniors live and thrive in their homes and community by providing transportation to medical appointments, pharmacies, grocery stores/food pantries and exercise and wellness programs. When transportation barriers for seniors are removed, a senior's access to health care and other vital services such as nutrition and wellness improves.

Kettle Moraine YMCA, "Wellness Programs" -- \$24,700, funds will be used for the Diabetes Prevention Program through classes, screenings and community programs. This 12-week program engages adults with a current or past cancer diagnosis who are over-

weight or pre-diabetic in a group lifestyle intervention to help avoid effects of diabetes. Funds will support LIVESTRONG at the YMCA program through classes, pre- and post-assessments and in supporting survivors.

Senior Citizens Activities, "Healthy Seniors Program" -- \$20,000, the program supports senior health in four of the top six health issues in Washington County (physical activity, nutrition, chronic disease and injury), by providing age-appropriate and evidence-based interventions

through exercise classes/programs and health workshops/screenings to seniors in Washington County.

The Threshold, "Having Fun Getting Fit" -- \$5,000, the Having Fun Getting Fit program will partner with the Kettle Moraine YMCA and offer three series of eight sessions focused on the basics of fitness and wellness for clients with significant physical challenges working at the Lawrence and Vivian Stockhausen Center and those seeking employment in the community.

## Main Street Philanthropy Program Once Again Offered At KHS

This will be the second year, the Main Street Philanthropy Program will be offered at Kewaskum High School. This time it will be part of the Leadership Class, a new elective class offering at the high school. It is part of the course and is worth 15 percent of their total grade for the class. Kewaskum High School and The Silbernagel Group will use philanthropy and giving as tools to instill values and life skills in the students, and inspire the next generation of "philanthropists in training" by helping students enjoy the gift of serving and giving.

The 11-session process brings together a group of students, their classroom teacher, Casey Scheel (Kewaskum High School Teacher), a Main Street Philanthropy Ambassador, Dona Miotke (Community Services Director of The Silbernagel Group), generous donors from Kewaskum community and front line charities, all of whom benefit from this remarkable collaboration.

The first thing the student will do in the program is to match their personal passions with compatible charitable causes. Elder care, environment protection, people with physical and mental disabilities and social justice are some of the personal passions the students choose from. Students then are put into

small groups that match their personal passions. They learn about the history of philanthropy. They build on team trust and start creating a team fund-raiser with their own resources. They develop a business plan to execute their fundraiser including having a purpose and mission.

Local non-profit organizations that support the student passions are contacted and evaluated by the students quantitatively. IRS Form 990 and 990-EZ are examined and analyzed for the non-profit organizations that the students chose. They learn how efficient the organizations are at raising funds. Program ratio, management ratio and sustain ability are terms that the students become comfortable with.

Cold calls, visiting the organization leaders and asking questions, volunteering at the organization, and having leadership of the organizations participate in a panel discussion at Kewaskum High School helps the students evaluate the organizations qualitatively.

Students interview mentors, family, and friends asking them questions as the lessons learned from money and what is important to living a fulfilling life. These and other questions give students better insights into what is important in life and the impor-

ance of giving back.

Students then make specific decisions on how to spend the money they have raised for the charities they chose. There is much discussion in the classroom by the students on how to specifically direct the money at the charity. "They donate where their heart is." Visits are made to the charities to deliver these funds.

The generous donors of Kewaskum have given \$4,000 to this year's program. Premier donors include: The Silbernagel Group, Gruber Tool and Die of West Bend, Kettle Moraine Assisted Living and Westbury Bank. Select donors include: Coffee Corner, Cousin's Subs, Dairy Queen, Hon-e-Kor, Kewaskum Veterinary Clinic, Lions' Club of Kewaskum, Mike's Auto, and P & C Bank. 

# Thanksgiving Dinner Costs Less This Year

The cost for a traditional Thanksgiving dinner is at its lowest since 2010 according to Wisconsin Farm Bureau's annual informal survey.

"The survey's total price of \$47.91, when divided by 10, shows preparing a nutritious, home-cooked Thanksgiving meal costs less than \$5 per person," said Amy Eckelberg Wisconsin Farm Bureau's spokesperson. "This year's survey came in \$2.17 lower than last year's price of \$50.08.

The American Farm Federation's national survey of the same items (turkey, cubed stuffing, sweet potatoes, rolls with butter, peas, cranberries, a relish tray of carrots and celery, pumpkin pie with whipped cream and beverages of milk and coffee, all in quantities sufficient to serve 10 people) averaged \$49.87, \$1.96 more than Wisconsin's price.

"From the turkey to potatoes, cranberries and milk, Wisconsin farmers are proud to produce much of the food served at a traditional Thanksgiving celebration," Eckelberg said.

#### Talking Turkey

Wisconsin's average price for a 16-pound turkey was \$23.36 in 2014 and remained at that price in 2015. This year the price of the same turkey is \$21.92, down \$1.44.

"Our survey was conducted in late October and early November," Eckelberg said. "Grocers typically feature turkey in special sales and promotions leading up to Thanksgiving. So shoppers who wait until the days before Thanksgiving to buy their turkey will probably get a bargain."

Turkey production across the U.S. was up about 8 percent this year, rebounding from the 2015 Avian Influenza crisis that occurred throughout the Midwest. Farmers have now fully recovered their flocks.

**About The Survey**  
W i s c o n s i n ' s

Thanksgiving price survey is an informal, annual review of food price trends in relation to changing farm prices, weather and wholesale and retail food marketing. Members of the Wisconsin Farm Bureau collected price samples of 12 Thanksgiving food items in 25 communities in October and November.

"This survey truly shows the stability of our food prices," Eckelberg said. "While this doesn't depict what's on everyone's table on Thanksgiving Day, it allows us to look at food trends as a whole."

Farm Bureau volunteer shoppers are asked to look for the best possible prices, without taking advantage of special promotional coupons or purchase deals. While Farm Bureau does not make any scientific claims about the data, it is an informal gauge of price trends.

The Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation is the state's largest farm organization. Made up of 61 county Farm Bureaus, it represents farms of every size, commodity and management style. CAXCA
