## Cut Out To Be Celebrities

-Kewaskum Graduates

Appear On "The Ellen DeGeneres Show"

Last Wednesday, Kewaskum High School graduates Maddie Kreis and Becca Strigenz got the surprise of their lives when someone knocked on their apartment door in Madison.

The two University of Wisconsin-Madison sophomores, along with their four other roommates, couldn't believe their eyes when they opened the door. There stood Jeannie Klisiewicz from "The Ellen DeGeneres Show," along with a camera crew.

The six roommates immediately started screaming and jumping around, completely overjoyed.

"We were so shocked. I still don't have words for how shocked we were," Maddie said.

"We are still in shock about it," Becca added.

### The Letter

When the college roommates moved into their Madison apartment this past summer, they wanted to decorate their apartment.

The students already

had some stylish decor: various signs, an American flag and plenty of accessories bearing a UW motif.

But their new home was lacking something. It needed a piece that would remind them of their favorite TV personality. It was clear that they needed a large cardboard cutout of Ellen DeGeneres.

So the roommates decided to write a letter to Ellen.

Maddie composed the letter on her computer. She told Ellen how the roommates all schedule their classes around "The Ellen DeGeneres Show," and she invited Ellen to come out to Madison on a game day.

Ellen did not make it to Madison for a game day. As time went on, the roommates had given up hope for getting the ideal furnishing for their home.

### The Show

Although she gets thousands of letters a day, Ellen had not forgotten about the UW students and their request.

Jeannie and a four-per-

son camera crew flew from California to Wisconsin to bring the students their gift.

## County Invests In Kewaskum School District Referendum

- Collaborative Effort Deemed "Win-Win" For All Involved

Washington County is excited to announce a collaborative partnership with the Kewaskum School District in which the County will purchase \$8,900,000 worth of bond anticipation notes from the district to help finance its recent referendum.

According to the district, proceeds of the county's notes will be used to provide interim financing for a portion of the cost of site improvements, new construction, renovation and modernization of Kewaskum Middle School and Kewaskum High School and acquiring furnishings, fixtures, and equipment related to the

same. On November 8, voters in the Kewaskum School District voted to support the issuance of general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$28,420,000.

"We are thrilled to have the opportunity to work with Washington County on the first phase of the District's referendum financing. This is such a great example of intergovernmental cooperation and more positive news for our community after their support for the referendum. Our hope is to continue to foster these relationships that will build on our community's success," said Kewaskum School District

Superintendent James Smasal.

"This partnership is an absolute win-win for the citizens of Kewaskum and Washington County," added County Administrator Joshua Schoemann.

According to Washington County Finance Director Margaret Hamers, the interest rate associated with the deal is 1.15 percent, meaning that Washington County will receive more than its initial investment when the notes have matured.

The county has projected that it will receive an increase of \$50,000 in revenue in 2017 from the partnership.

### House Fire

On Monday, Dec. 12, at approximately 7:26 p.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a house on fire located at 131 Kohler Drive in the Township of Farmington. Deputies and firefighters from the Fillmore Fire Department were subsequently dispatched to the scene. Assistance was also requested from Boltonville, Newburg, Kewaskum, Jackson, Waubeka, Silver Creek, and Fredonia Fire Departments.

Upon their arrival, deputies and Fillmore firefighters observed smoke and flames coming from the garage. Firefighters were able to bring the fire under control, but the garage sustained extensive damage, and the living quarters sustained smoke damage. The two vehicles that were parked in the garage were a total loss. The homeowners were able to evacuate themselves and the two children from the residence with no reported injuries. It is estimated that the home sustained \$100,000 in damage.

Kohler Drive was closed for approximately two hours to facilitate firefighting operations. The matter remains under investigation by Sheriff's Office fire investigators; however, the cause of the fire does not appear to be suspicious.

### Emergency Medical Dispatching

On December 6, the Washington County Sheriff's Office began using Emergency Medical Dispatch (EMD) protocols within its Communications Center. Emergency Medical Dispatch is the practice of utilizing trained and certified personnel to receive and manage requests for emergency medical responses. It is an enhancement to what is already being done by

communications officers to assist in determining the nature and priority of the call, dispatch the appropriate response and then provide the caller with appropriate instruction to assist the patient until responding EMS units arrive. The program is meant to formalize and standardize the existing process.

The dispatcher's response is based upon an approved emergency medical dispatch protocol reference system that runs independently from the computer system used for dispatching emergency medical services. The independent structure eliminates any delay that integrated systems can intrinsically have between the time of the 911 call and the dispatching of emergency medical services. The addition of this protocol is meant as an enhancement to public safety by allowing Emergency Medical Dispatchers to provide systematic guidance to callers as first responders are simultaneously sent to the scene.


communication officers have completed the EMD certification course and will recertify every two years. Part of this certification process involves call assessment using live scenario based training and subsequent evaluation. A quality assurance process is also used to ensure that proper protocols are being followed after the initial call, and confirm that all parties calling in for assistance are offered the same level of service.

The Emergency Medical Dispatcher has been recognized, and proven to be, an essential component of effective EMS systems. Proper and timely training, as well as a sound Medical Protocol, help EMDs deliver quality care to the calling public with emergency medical needs. The Sheriff's Office is pleased to add this component to its Communications Center.

Through the end of November of this year, the Washington County Sheriff's Office Communications Center has answered 20,067 emergency 911 calls.

## Wisconsin Completes Presidential Election Recount

Wisconsin completed its presidential election recount on Monday, with results showing that Republican Donald Trump defeated Democrat Hillary Clinton by 22,748 votes.

After nearly three million votes were recounted in Wisconsin, Trump came away with 131 additional votes.

In Washington County, under the direction of

County Clerk Brenda Jaszewski, county clerk staff and volunteers completed the election recount process in four and a half days. More than 78,000 ballots were hand counted in the county, with Trump gaining 11 votes, Clinton losing three and Green Party candidate Jill Stein losing five votes.

Stein had requested and paid for the Wisconsin

recount. Although she provided no evidence, Stein had argued that voting machines in Wisconsin, Pennsylvania and Michigan were susceptible to hacking.

Stein's requests for statewide recounts in Pennsylvania and Michigan were blocked by the courts.

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

gather at the funeral home from noon until the time of the service.



- 2 cups yogurt
- orange juice
- water

**Directions**

Add all fruit and yogurt to a blender. Add equal amounts of orange juice and water to just cover the fruit. Use less liquid if the fruits are thawed. Blend and serve.

## Wisconsin DOT Enhances Silver And Amber Alert Messaging On Electronic Message Boards

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) recently changed its messaging format for AMBER and Silver Alerts in an effort to provide drivers with pertinent information to help law enforcement and families locate endangered children and missing adults with cognitive impairment.

Drivers now traveling past an electronic message board during an alert will receive a description of the vehicle and its license plate number in-

stead of having to call 511 or tune to a local radio station for more information. However, drivers can still utilize these services to receive more information.

"We are hoping this will alert drivers sooner and help law enforcement find these individuals and return them safely to their families," said Paul Keltner, traffic management supervisor at the State Traffic Operations Center (STOC) in Milwaukee.

WisDOT partners with

the Wisconsin Department of Justice and local law enforcement agencies to broadcast alerts that involve a motor vehicle. In 2015, the STOC messaged 45 Silver Alerts and five AMBER Alerts.

"We look forward to continuing this partnership and continually improving how we message during these types of events," said Keltner.

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# Kremer's Korner

## Hemp

What is the first thing that comes to mind when you hear the word "hemp?" Marijuana? I asked someone who is very involved in the fight to end the drug scourge in Washington County and I was a bit taken aback by his answer. His first words were, "There used to be a large processing plant in Hartford years ago." While I am 110 percent opposed to legalized, recreational marijuana, I have to admit I was ill-educated on the issue of industrial hemp.

Hemp served as a staple crop for the production of clothing and canvas, especially during World War II. Despite the fact that an individual could smoke an entire field of hemp and never become "high," hemp was classified as marijuana in 1970 under the Controlled Substances Act. Under a Republican

led Congress, the 2014 Farm Bill allowed Wisconsin's Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) to conduct research and pilot programs with industrial hemp if it was legalized.

So why the original ban? The paper and cotton lobby had a lot to do with the statutory demise of hemp production. We cannot grow it, but have no problem importing \$0.5 billion dollars of hemp every year! This is complete lunacy. We should be giving our own farmers this resource. Our farm families have been decimated by tanking dairy, grain and cattle prices while a crop exists that is not only perfect for the Wisconsin soil and climate, but is highly sought after. This could also give birth to a non-existent processing industry and thousands of new jobs in our rural

areas. Modern day hemp produces seed oils that provide more Omega 3s than fish oil; have stronger fibers that last longer than cotton; can be manufactured into super capacitors that store energy, like graphene, at a fraction of the cost; is being used to replace Kevlar in bullet proof vests; strengthens plastics making them 10 times stronger than steel and is also used in brake pads and clothing for firefighters.

Wisconsin would not be the first, but we can be the best. Several nearby states are already working on hemp pilot programs and hemp legislation, including Tennessee, Kentucky, Indiana, North Dakota and Minnesota. I propose that Wisconsin take the lead and push to become the national leader in hemp production and processing.

### MOM'S LULLABY HELPS PREMIES

When moms sing to premature newborns, it seems to help stabilize the babies' breathing and heart rate, according to a new review. For the analysis, researchers compiled the data from 14 clinical trials including about 1,000 premature infants. They found that music therapy (mostly moms singing to their babies) helped the babies' breathing and heart rate, aided sleep and promoted "quiet alert" time. Premies who were sung to were discharged from the NICU three days sooner. Also, parents' own stress levels declined as a result of singing to their babies - a win-win!



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# Panthers Pull Away From KHS Boys In Second Half

By limiting its turnovers to just four, the Kewaskum High boys' basketball team stayed with highly regarded Plymouth in the first half of their East Central Conference opener on December 6, but after the break it was a case of too many missed shots, turnovers and the Panthers' experience and depth that turned the tide in the visitors' favor, 56-39.

"Our defense was way better today, but we've got to get some shots to fall," KHS coach Don Gruber said afterward. "We have to learn how to win."

Gruber shook up his starting lineup for the game, calling on juniors Jon Heus and Dan Kreis to go in place of Nick Buchel and Ty Schellinger. Both showed a lot of hustle but were unable to provide any scoring punch to help the Indians' lone returning starter, six-foot, six-inch (6-6) Brady Hanson, who wound up scoring a game-high 23 points but, at times, forced shots in an effort to carry his team.

Midway in the first half, KHS was down 11-7, then drew to within a point on Jordan Carlton's three-point shot from the baseline and took its only lead when 5-11 guard Brent Goeden popped in a three from the top of the key with 8:31 left in the period.

The 13-11 advantage didn't last long, however, as Alex Shutter hit a pair of free throws and a long three, 6-7 Brandon Keller scored from inside and Cody Kuhn put in a

rebound basket to surge ahead 20-13. The Indians cooled off, missing eight straight shots from the floor before Hanson made a pair of free throws.

After being down by seven (28-21) at half, the Indians returned to the court determined to make a run for the win. First, Carlton hit a "3" from the baseline and after the Panthers missed a shot, Hanson scored on a short jumper, putting the deficit at just two points, 28-26.

Plymouth countered with a Shutter 14-footer and a layup by 6-7 Brandon Keller for a 32-26 lead, but then Jared Chesak came back with a spin move for a two-point goal, cutting the margin to four points again (32-28) with just under 13 minutes to go.

For the rest of the game, the Indians managed just 11 points, including threes by Hanson and Goeden and a dunk by Hanson within the final minutes.

"The thing we stressed is Plymouth is going to score running the floor," Gruber said, adding, "I bet they had 10 layups."

Once again it was a case of the Indians' inexperience. "It's something the juniors have to learn, that the varsity strategies are a little different than at the JV level," Gruber said, quick to add, "I have to say, I was happy with the effort."

Hanson finished the game with a pair of threes, four two-point goals and nine free throws. He was 2x6 from three-point range, 4x14 on two-point buckets.

Kewaskum had six threes in 15 tries (40 percent), including two each

from Hanson, Goeden and Carlton, who both finished with six points.

Chesak had just one basket on the night but blocked a shot on the Panthers' first trip down the court, came up with several steals and rebounds. Gruber said he plans to add a few twists to the offense to get Chesak more involved.

"We were getting a little tired at the end," Gruber said. "Plymouth brings a certain brand of ball ... hard-nosed and physical."

Plymouth was led by Shutter and Cody Kuhn, who scored 14 and 13 points, respectively.

Senator Tom Tiffany (R-Hazelhurst) and Representative Adam Jarchow (R-Balsam Lake) are calling on Senator Tammy Baldwin (D-Wisconsin) to press her Senate colleagues to allow wolf delisting in

Wisconsin, Michigan, Minnesota, and Wyoming.


It is our understanding that Congress is on the brink of passing the North American Energy Security and Infrastructure Act of 2016, which includes delisting language.

However, we have been informed that Senator Maria Cantwell (D-Washington) is standing in the way of the delisting legislation.

We expect Senator Baldwin to use her new influence as a member of the Senate Democratic leadership team to push her colleagues (including Senator Cantwell) to pass this bill. As Senator Baldwin wrote last week, "...I have called Congressional leadership and my colleagues in the United States Senate to pass legislation to delist the wolf and return management to the state by the end of this year."

We are on the verge of passing this important legislation to put this issue to rest once and for all. We hope Senator Baldwin treats this issue with the urgency it deserves and presses hard right now for delisting.

We believe this is the first of many items on Congress' radar to return power to the State of Wisconsin. The time is now to get this done!


## Packed and Loaded for "Bear"!

# Kewaskum Public Library Prepares For Merger

The Kewaskum Public Library will be closed on Thursday, Dec. 15, and Friday, Dec. 16.

When the library reopens on Saturday, a new computer should be in place, and the library will be ready to merge with the Eastern Shores Library System.

Over the past year, the Kewaskum Public Library has been planning for the merger. The Kewaskum library has been part of the Mid-Wisconsin System, and that system will merge with the Eastern Shores System on January 1.

Library Board members are excited about how the new, broader system will benefit patrons.

"I think it is just going to be wonderful for our library," said Mugs McFadden, president of the village's library board.

The merger will allow patrons to access books and materials from larger libraries in municipalities such as Mequon, Cedarburg, Grafton and Sheboygan.

"That is going to be great for our patrons to be able to get their books from those libraries," McFadden said.

In order to merge with the new library system, the software that the library uses is being converted.

The new computer system, called Monarch, will make more than 1.1 million items available to library patrons.

"The catalog is going to look different, but we are all here to help the patrons if they have any questions," said Emily Goad, director of the Kewaskum Public Library.

For the past week, library staff has manually checked items in and out as the library's computer system goes through the transition.

But things should be up and running, hopefully smoothly, by this Saturday, Dec. 17, Goad said.

The growing pains are well worth the reward, she said, because of the larger supply of materials that will be available. The Eastern Shores system has 13 libraries in Ozaukee and Sheboygan counties.

"This merger is wonderful news because we will be able to offer you 13 more libraries' worth of material," Goad said.

Beginning January 1, Kewaskum Library patrons will be able to use their library cards at 33 Monarch member libraries in Dodge, Ozaukee, Sheboygan and Washington counties, including the Ozaukee and Sheboygan County Bookmobile. The various libraries will be able to make interlibrary loan requests.

By having more resources available, waiting lists should be reduced for popular audiobooks, eBooks and other items.

In addition, the Kewaskum Public Library will continue to access statewide resources through Wisconsin's online library, called BadgerLink.

BadgerLink offers various programs, such as a genealogy resource, Consumer Reports, an auto repair reference center and a resource that helps people learn new skills.

## How To Outwit Porch Pirates And Hackers During The Holiday Shopping Season

Americans' love affair with online shopping continues to grow, and retailers predict a seven to 10 percent increase in online sales this holiday season, according to the National Retail Federation.

While that news might make retailers giddy, security experts are reiterating their annual warnings that the convenience of online shopping comes with hazards. You could become the target of hackers out to steal your credit card or bank information, or "porch pirates" who prey on those packages left on your doorstep.

"Consumers need to take proper precautions if they don't want their holiday merriment turning into holiday gloom," says Gary

Miliefsky, CEO of SnoopWall (www.snoop-wall.com), a company that specializes in cyber security.

Changing all your passwords frequently is one way to protect what's yours. Deleting smartphone or tablet apps you don't use is another smart move, Miliefsky says, because many of those apps may be malware that spies on you.

Even porch pirates – generally seen as low-tech thieves who simply cruise neighborhoods looking for packages – can go high tech by infiltrating your smartphone where they can eavesdrop on your orders and deliveries.

"Both porch pirates and hackers count on people

being lax with their defenses," Miliefsky says. "But with a little preparation you can thwart their plans."

He offers a few tips for doing just that:

- Shop online only from websites you trust. If you don't know where the merchant is located, don't shop online there. If they don't have a corporate address or are located in another country, it could be iffy whether you ever see the goods you think you purchased. Also, if their shopping-cart experience is not an HTTPS browser session, then everything you type in – your name, address and credit-card information – is going over the Internet unencrypted, in plain view.
- Pay with credit cards rather than debit cards. If you experience identity theft, credit card laws allow you to keep all of your credit immediately, with no responsibility during an identity theft or fraud investigation. With a debit card, your bank's policy can be to tie up your money in the amount of the fraudulent transactions

for up to 30 days. Some have been known to take up to 60 days to resolve the issue.

- Get permission to ship all your packages to work. That way they aren't left unguarded at your doorstep for hours where anyone walking by could snatch them. If this arrangement works out, be sure to tell all your friends and family also to ship packages to your work address.

- Ask a friend or neighbor to receive your packages for you. You might not be home on work days, but plenty of people are. Trusted friends who are retired or who work at home might be happy to let you have packages delivered to them for safe keeping.

"It's wonderful that you can go online and track down those hard-to-find gifts that aren't available in local shops," Miliefsky says. "Just make sure you're taking measures to help keep you and your personal information safe. The holidays will be a whole lot brighter if you do."


