Farmington Elementary School Ranked In Top 10

Farmington Elementary School was ranked in the top 10 elementary schools in Wisconsin, according to the recent Wisconsin School Report Card that was released by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction.

There are approximately 1,100 elementary schools in the state who received a report card score from the state. Farmington is ranked in the top one percent of those schools.

"We are very proud of the accomplishments of our students and staff. We know that Farmington is an excellent school, and our school report card reflects that," said Dr. P.J. Sanders, Farmington principal.

The Wisconsin Department of Instruction rates elementary schools in four areas: student achievement, student

growth, closing gaps, and on-track and postsecondary readiness. Out of the 100 possible points, Farmington received 94.7, an increase of 13.7 points from its previous report card.

In addition to Farmington scoring in the top 10 schools in the state, i4Learning and Kewaskum Elementary were also in the top 25 percent of elementary schools statewide.

"This shows that our literacy strategic focus and the hard work of the staff is garnering success," Kewaskum Superintendent James Smasal said.

In 2015 Farmington earned the Title I School of Recognition award for maintaining high achievement and student growth while keeping achievement gaps low.

Christmas Comes To Kewaskum High School Students

(Writer's Note: The name of the student in this story is withheld for privacy reasons. "Karen" represents the dozens of Kewaskum High School students who live in poverty.)

As temperatures dropped below the freezing mark earlier this winter, Karen was cold.

There wasn't much heat in her home. And outside, the cold air took hold of her with its icy grip as she braved her way to Kewaskum High School each morning.

Karen's school counselor, Sam Daun, knew about some of Karen's struggles. She knew that Karen's family situation was in flux. And she knew that both of Karen's parents were having trouble making ends meet financially.

Karen was one of the students Daun thought of when the school launched its Christmas gift program

for students in need this winter.

The goal was to provide two gifts for each student: a want and a need.

Daun asked Rebecca what "need" she had for Christmas.

"I need a winter coat," Karen said.

Daun nodded in understanding and then asked for a "want."

"I just need the coat," Karen replied.

Daun had to really push her, because she and the school community really wanted to provide both a want and a need for Karen. But it wasn't easy.

"The truth is that when people are living in poverty, or their family is struggling, for a lot of the kids and parents, it is hard to identify a want," Daun said.

Christmas Gift Program
Kewaskum High School's Staff Culture and Climate Committee wanted to do something to help students in need. Headed up by social studies

teacher Stacy LaRonge, the committee decided to raise funds to help the students at Christmastime.

The committee held a meat raffle during a staff inservice day that was held earlier this year. The entire school staff participated in the raffle to raise funds for Christmas gifts to give to students in need.

In total, the meat raffle raised \$1,178, high school counselor Karla Daane said.

The student body wanted to participate in the project as well. So the student government held a penny war in December, with different classes competing against each other. That raised an additional \$226.94, Daun said.

The high school counselors then contacted families that school personnel thought might be in need this holiday season. They wanted to make sure that parents were OK with the idea of the school providing gifts.

"Some of the families that we contacted initially did say they were in a different position this year, and so they wanted the gift to go to a family that was more deserving. We thought that was really commendable, because then the money went further for the students that were identified who really needed it," Daun said.

In all, the money that was raised provided two gifts for about 30 students at the school. One gift was a "need" that each student had, and the other gift filled a student's "want."

The counselors also purchased gifts for younger siblings. Money raised at the high school provided a "need" for each younger sibling, as well as a "want" for each sibling that attends Kewaskum Middle School. A toy drive was held at the elementary schools this year to provide a "want" for those younger than middle-school age.

Many of the "needs" that high school students had included winter clothing. Students cited the needs for winter coats, pants, sweaters and warmer clothing.

"We did get a few gas cards for some of our students that are traveling because they are not all living right here. A lot of these kids have a situation in flux," Daun said.

The "wants" mirrored the "needs" for many, with clothing topping the list. Other "wants" were things

like gift cards for WalMart or calculator batteries.

The two school counselors and office staff wrapped each of the gifts. Parents were asked to pick up the gifts from the school. But that wasn't always possible.

"Because our students have different challenges so some of them don't have transportation, so we were trying to work around that as well. So parents that were able, we asked to pick up the gifts," Daun said.

The entire procedure of wrapping and distributing gifts was kept private. The only people who knew which students were getting what gifts were the two school counselors.

"Everything is kept secret," Daun said. "Parents don't leave the school with a handful of presents. We put them all in bags so no one can see them. The confidentiality of our families is really

important to us." The result was that Christmas was a little brighter for families.

"Families were very appreciative," Daane said. "They were very happy that we were able to come up with some of those things that they normally wouldn't receive."

Still, Daane and Daun were adamant that the focus of the program should remain on the students, and not the school. They are not seeking recognition.

"We don't mind when we don't see the parents come in, because honestly it's not about them having gratitude toward us. It's about them getting the presents they need so their kids can have a nice Christmas. It's not about anything crediting the district with anything; it's really just about helping families," Daun said.

Kewaskum Public Library Becomes Part Of Larger System

The Kewaskum Public Library is open for business, with more items available than ever.

Effective January 1, the library is part of the new Monarch Library System, made up of 33 libraries across the region.

Until now, Kewaskum had belonged to the Mid-Wisconsin Federated Library System, which was comprised of 18 libraries in Washington and Dodge counties. After about a year of planning, the system is now merging with the Eastern Shores Library System to create the Monarch Library System.

"The main thing that is wonderful about this is there are so many more libraries to choose from. We encourage people to go onto the catalog and take a look at it because they have access to so many more items now," Library Director Emily Goad said.

Over the past month, library staff have focused on preparing the library for the merger. The library was closed for two days, on December 15 and 16, as staff checked in materials. And for about a week, the library was open, but was offline. During that time, people were not able to place holds or renew

materials online.

"We are totally up and running," Goad said. "People should be able to get into the catalog online now."

Still, the library will work with patrons as they overcome any problems that may have occurred during the transition.

"We want people to know that we are going to be very forgiving because we realize it has been a bumpy road. Patrons weren't able to access the catalog from our website initially. We are really understanding about it and they shouldn't worry, and we can back date and we will waive fines if they were unable to access their materials to renew them," Goad said.

Last week, Goad was working to get automated calls working once again to alert people when materials that they had placed on hold were available.

"We are working together with the other libraries in Eastern Shores to make sure the automated phone system gets up and running. Until then, we are making personal calls to people when their holds come in," Goad said.

The new catalog system is similar to the old program, but there are a couple minor differences.

For example, a pass-

word is still required to log into accounts. If a patron had a pin that was a word, it is now case sensitive. The word must now be entered in all capital letters, Goad said.

Pins that are numbers should remain unchanged. Those pins are typically the last four digits of a patron's telephone number, Goad said.

"Always feel free to call us or come in if you have any issues. If anyone has any questions, we are here and we are happy to assist you with anything," Assistant Library Director Kim Kluge said.

Overall, feedback from patrons has been positive, Goad said. Patrons have reported that the new system has alerted them via email when due dates approach.

There was no programming at the library over the past two weeks because of the Christmas holiday and because staff members were learning the new system.

The library will be closed December 30 through January 2. Story time will begin again on January 11.

Police Find No Wrongdoing In Election

A Kewaskum Police Department investigation revealed that no one voted twice in the recent election in the Village of Kewaskum or the Town of Farmington.

Cal Bowe Jr. voted only once in the November 8 election and did nothing wrong, Kewaskum Police Chief Thomas Bishop said.

The investigation was launched when the Kewaskum village clerk and Farmington town clerk issued a report that the same voter had cast votes in both municipalities on Tuesday, Nov. 8.

The report claimed that Cal Joseph Bowe Jr., 24, had showed his photo identification, signed the poll book and voted at Kewaskum Village Hall. In addition, the report said that Bowe is registered to vote in the Town of Farmington, where he was residing, and cast a vote there.

However, no election "fraud" took place, Bishop said.

Cal Joseph Bowe Jr. voted only one time in the

Town of Farmington, where he resided. He did not cast a vote in the Village of Kewaskum on Nov. 8, Bishop said.

The confusion occurred when Bowe's father, Cal Joseph Bowe Sr., voted in the Village of Kewaskum.

"Cal Bowe Sr. no longer lives in the Village of Kewaskum. However, he came to the Village of Kewaskum to vote in 2016 and essentially he voted under his son's registration," Bishop said.

Cal Bowe Sr. now lives in the Town of Auburn, in Fond du Lac County, and that is where he should have voted. However, he did not register to vote there and cast no votes there, Bishop said.

Both Cal Bowe Jr. and Sr. previously lived at the same address on Main Street in the Village of Kewaskum.

Cal Bowe Jr. registered to vote and voted in Kewaskum in 2012, Bishop said.

The poll book simply said Cal Bowe with the address on Main Street, but did not specify whether it was Jr. or Sr.

Cal Bowe Sr. signed the

village's poll book as the registered voter, Bishop said.

"You can't really hold our clerk's office accountable because the book didn't say Junior. It did say Cal Bowe at the Main Street address, and the election worker would have had no reason to doubt that," Bishop said. "What we have here is nobody voted twice. They each only voted one time."

Voting twice is a Class I felony, which carries a fine up to \$10,000 or imprisonment not to exceed 3.5 years, or both.

No charges are being made against Cal Joseph Bowe Jr. or Cal Joseph Bowe Sr.

"The good thing that comes out of this is that it shows that the system, in essence, does work. He voted in the wrong spot and we figured out pretty quickly that something was not right here," Bishop said. "Our election process, which comes under scrutiny and fire quite a bit for fraudulent elections and fraudulent votes, this shows that it is pretty secure and we can figure this stuff out."

WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

Accident Reports

On Dec. 20, it was a busy day on first shift patrol.

Between the hours of 5 a.m. and 1 p.m., the Sheriff's Office responded to 23 vehicles in the ditch, 8 property damage accidents and 2 minor injury accidents. During this time frame roads were mostly bare until drivers reached an area where the wind carried the snow across the road. One such area was US 45 and Sherman Road.

The Sheriff's Office responded to numerous vehicles in the ditch and minor accidents during a 45 minute time frame.

Three separate cars spun out and struck the overpass or guardrail within 3 minutes of each other with an additional 4 or 5 cars going into the ditch. The highway shop went through several times and placed over a ton of salt on the roadway and the accidents continued. The bad stretch covered no more than 300-400 feet.

Village of Newburg Structure Fire
On Thursday December

22, 2016 at approximately 12:05 p.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a fire at a business located at 434 Division Street in the Village of Newburg. Deputies and firefighters from the Newburg Fire Department were subsequently dispatched to the scene. The first arriving deputy reported heavy smoke and fire emanating from the structure.

The Newburg Fire Department received assistance from the following Fire Departments: Boltonville, Cedarburg, Fillmore, Fredonia, Germantown, Grafton, Jackson, Kewaskum, Port Washington, Saukville, Silver Creek, Slinger,

Waubeka, and West Bend. Also assisting at the scene were the Newburg Police Department and the Washington County Highway Department.

While the incident remains under investigation by the Sheriff's Office, the cause of the fire is not believed to be suspicious. No damage estimate is available at this time, but the building is likely a total loss. There were no civilian or firefighter injuries associated with the fire.

Division Street between STH 33 and Salisbury Street remains closed to through traffic to facilitate overhaul and clean-up operations. It is unknown when the roadway will be reopened.

The village is currently accepting applications to fill the vacancy. The board hopes to have Justmann's replacement to begin working for the village in February.




The Ultimate Packer Fan Picks — Winning IS Everything!

Avoiding Winter Injuries

Winter is here! The beauty and joy of this season has already greeted us with frigid temps and lots of fluffy white stuff! I'm already seeing injured clients and hearing of musculoskeletal complaints related to the snow and cold; slips and falls, and back pain from shoveling are often common complaints. Whether you like to be outside building a snowman, shoveling snow, or hitting the slopes, with proper posture and a few helpful winter tips hopefully you will skate through the season injury free.

Don't be afraid to get out there and enjoy some winter fun. However, recognize that with this fun may also come some risk. According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, in 2015 more than 240,000 people were treated for injuries related to winter sports; snow skiing, snowboarding, ice skating, sledding, snowmobiling and tubing.

Don't be a statistic! Winter sports are cold by nature, so be sure to properly warm up your muscles before hitting the slopes. Stretch large muscle groups and get your circulation going. Wear adequate clothing to keep you warm while allowing you to move comfortably and freely. Keep warm by moving, if not, your muscles can stiffen and have less flexibility and range of motion, making them more prone to injury. Wear appropriate protective gear such as helmets or pads, and in case of an injury seek medical atten-

tion immediately.

According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, in 2015 more than 158,000 people were treated for injuries that happened while shoveling or removing ice and snow manually; most commonly ligament sprains and muscle strains in low back or neck and shoulders.

First, if you have any health related issues check with your doctor to make sure it's okay for you to shovel, particularly with heart related conditions, as shoveling can be strenuous to the cardiovascular system.
