Kewaskum School Board Approves \$8.9 Million Loan For Capital Project

Last Monday night, the Kewaskum School Board approved refinancing \$8.9 million for its capital project to improve the district's high school and middle school facilities.

The district locked in at a 3.35 percent interest rate for the 20-year loan, with total interest amounting to about \$5.5 million. It is the first of three bank-qualified loans that the district plans to take out over the next year to fund the building project.

On November 8, voters in the Kewaskum School District approved the issuance of general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$28.42 million for the capital project.

The money will be used

to finance a portion of the cost of site improvements, new construction, renovation and modernization of Kewaskum Middle School and Kewaskum High School and acquiring furnishings, fixtures, and equipment related to the same.

Currently, the projected mill rate increase from 2017 to 2018 is 18 cents, according to Michele Wiberg, vice president and managing director of Wisconsin Public Finance for PMA Securities, Inc. That is less than the 19 cents that was predicted when voters approved the referendum in November.

Wiberg pointed out that it is important to note that additional financing phases remain. However, she feels confident that the mill rate impact will come

in at or below the 19-cent projected mill rate increase.

In December, the district short-term borrowed the \$8.9 million from Washington County at a rate of 1.15 percent.

From this point forward, the school board plans to take out bank-qualified loans to finance its capital project.

"Bank-qualified loans give you a lower interest rate, normally about half a percentage point," Kewaskum School District Superintendent James Smasal said.

However, bank-qualified loans cannot exceed \$10 million, so the district will have to take out three loans to cover the entire capital project.

When Tim Rohrer suggested in 2006 that an ATV club be formed in the area, he never expected the idea to take off.

After all, there are not too many public trails in the area. And Rohrer didn't even own an ATV at the time.

But Rohrer had taught an ATV safety class for many years, and his idea sparked interest among other ATV safety instructors and conser-

The district plans to take out a second loan of just under \$10 million in March and then borrow the remainder of what it needs for the capital project in 2018. The total amount of all three loans cannot exceed \$28.42 million.

Wiberg presented a historical interest rate comparison for buying bonds over the past 10 years at the January 23 school board meeting.

The 10-year high point

for the index was 6.01 percent on October 16, 2008, Wiberg said.

The low point for the index was 2.8 percent on July 14, 2016. The rate as of January 19, 2017, was 3.83 percent, or an increase of 0.56 percent since the election.

Wiberg does not anticipate that interest rates will drop much over the next year.

"There's a more likelihood that they are going to

inch up, so the sooner we do this, the better," Smasal said.

Wiberg is expected to present updated calculations at next month's meeting so the board will be prepared to approve the next loan in March.

The first interest payment for the \$8.9 million the board approved last week will be due March 1, 2018.

Brad Stern Appointed As New County Attorney

Longtime Assistant County Attorney Brad Stern has been appointed as the new Washington County attorney. Stern has been serving as an assistant county attorney since 2004, with prior experience in private practice in West Bend.

"I am delighted to announce Brad's appointment to this crucial position," said County Administrator Joshua Schoemann.

What started with 18 candidates for the role of County Attorney was narrowed down to three finalists who were interviewed by three different panels on Monday, Jan. 23.

"After a rigorous day of interviews and a number of follow up discussions, it became clear as we went through the process that Brad was the consensus choice, and the best person for the job," Schoemann said.

"It's especially rewarding when we are able to promote one of our own. Brad clearly articulated his desire for the job, his enthusiasm to serve the citizens of our county and his vision to make the necessary changes to

improve the department and the County. I am excited to work with Brad to continue to move the County in a new direction for the best of our citizens." Schoemann added.

county board action; advises the county board with respect to parliamentary procedures; prosecutes mental commitment cases, guardianship, protective placement/services cases, termination of parental rights cases and shoreland, wetland, floodplain and sanitary code violations; attends county committee meetings and other county-related meetings; reviews contracts in which the county is a party; and commences legal proceedings to collect on outstanding accounts due the county.

Stern is a graduate of Thomas M. Cooley Law School and the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. Prior to working in Washington County, he operated his own law practice specializing in criminal defense work. He currently lives in Grafton with his wife and six children. WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

Drug And Weapon Charges

The Sheriff's Office took three individuals into custody on a variety of weapon and drug charges as a result of a traffic stop on Interstate 41 on January 27 at 8:37 p.m. The deputy initiated a traffic stop on a vehicle that was operated without tail lights on Interstate 41 near Mequon Road in the Village of Germantown. Upon making contact with the driver, identified as a 29-year-old City of Milwaukee man, and two passengers, both 20-year-old Appleton men, the deputy noted the odor of marijuana from inside the vehicle. The driver was removed from the vehicle, and after attempting to get back into the car the other two passengers were then removed.

A subsequent search located a small amount of marijuana, two guns and body armor inside the vehicle. All three subjects were arrested for charges ranging from an outstanding arrest warrant, possession of marijuana, felon in possession of a weapon and felon in possession of body armor.

Followup continues on the case.

Felony Arrest Warrant

The Washington County Sheriff's Office took a 22-year-old City of Milwaukee man into custody on Monday, Jan. 30, after he was stopped for speeding on Interstate 41 near Highway K in the Town of Addison at 1:49 a.m. A deputy on routine patrol clocked the man, who was operating a dark blue Ford Explorer with temporary Indiana plates, southbound on Interstate 41 at 100 mph.

After making contact with the driver, the deputy determined the driver had an active felony arrest warrant out of the State of Indiana for theft of a motor vehicle. After the man was arrested, it was also determined (by the VIN) that the vehicle was also stolen out of Indiana. The man remains in custody at the Washington County Jail where he is awaiting extradition to Indiana.

Stolen Vehicle

On January 26, the Washington County Sheriff's Office was asked for assistance by Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office

regarding a pursuit that was southbound on Interstate 41 at 3:07 a.m.

The Fond du Lac Sheriff's Office requested for assistance in locating a vehicle that fled from sheriff's deputies in Fond du Lac County.

The reason the vehicle, reportedly occupied by six individuals, was initially the subject of an attempted traffic stop by law enforcement was because the wrong license plates were displayed on the car.

A Washington County sheriff's deputy located the vehicle and attempted to stop it, at which point the driver fled. Sheriff's deputies and Slinger police attempted to stop the vehicle with tire deflation devices to no avail.

The pursuit continued into the Village of Germantown, where the Germantown Police Department was able to successfully deploy the tire deflation spikes. The vehicle slowed down and went into the ditch at the Pilgrim Road off-ramp in the

Village of Menomonee Falls.

Four of the six individuals fled the vehicle on foot and two remained at the scene. A total of five of the six subjects were taken into custody at the scene after a search of the area by the Washington County Sheriff's Office, Germantown Police Department and the Menomonee Falls Police Department. Most of the subjects were juveniles from the City of Milwaukee. Deputies were able to determine the vehicle was stolen from the City of Racine. The investigation continues regarding the operator of the vehicle and any local charges.



The family greeted relatives and friends at the church on Tuesday from 3 p.m. until the time of mass.



GET MOVIN'
 New research suggests that people with type 2 diabetes who sit at a desk for long periods of time may better control their disease. If they get up every 30 minutes for a 3-minute walk or some leg raises or squats. In the study of sedentary, overweight adults with type 2 diabetes, when compared to only sitting, these little exercise breaks helped to significantly lower blood sugar, insulin and C-peptide (a measure of insulin secretion) levels. The resistance exercises also lowered triglycerides. Researchers say more study is needed to see if these short bouts of exercise have long-term effects on diabetes.



Pope Francis Appoints Two Local Priests

Milwaukee native Fr. Jeffrey R. Haines and Burlington native Fr. James T. Schuerman have been appointed by Pope Francis as Auxiliary Bishops for the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. The appointments were announced in Rome on January 25, and the two priests will be ordained bishops by Milwaukee Archbishop Jerome E. Listecky at the

Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist. The ordination date has not been announced, but should be within the next five to eight weeks.

"By choosing two of our own priests as our new auxiliary bishops, the Holy Father has paid a high compliment to all the priests from this archdiocese. In these two humble parish priests, Pope Francis has chosen men


with a pastoral heart who have deep spirituality, and men who have the confidence of the priests and people of the archdiocese," Archbishop Listecky said.

Auxiliary bishops serve the Church by assisting the archbishop in the pastoral and spiritual leadership of the archdiocese. They assist the diocesan bishop in his role as shepherd — teaching, leading,

serving and celebrating the sacraments with the people of God.

"This 'new calling' as an auxiliary bishop brings the grace-filled opportunity to expand the parameters of this joyful service to the whole archdiocese. I am profoundly humbled by this calling and keenly aware of my shortcomings, but I find strength and inspiration in the powerful presence and vitality of the Holy Spirit emerging in the implementation of our recent Archdiocesan Synod. I look forward to assisting Archbishop Listecky in fulfilling the pastoral priorities of this mission. I give praise to God and thanksgiving to His Holiness Pope Francis for the honor of this episcopal appointment," said Bishop-Elect Haines.

Haines, 58, was ordained to the priesthood on May 17, 1985, by Archbishop Rembert G. Weakland, O.S.B., and is currently serving as Rector and Pastor of the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist, Milwaukee. He was three times elected moderator of the Archdiocesan Council of Priests of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, and currently is a member of the College of Consultors. He is respected by fellow clergy and parishioners alike for his pastoral and leadership skills.



After ordination in 1985, Haines was appointed Associate Pastor of St. Nicholas in Milwaukee. In 1987, he was given additional responsibilities as Associate Pastor of Holy Redeemer Church in Milwaukee. In 1991, he was appointed Associate Pastor of St. Eugene Parish, Fox Point. In 1996, he was appointed pastor of St. Frances Cabrini Parish in West

Bend. He was granted temporary leave to study canon law at Catholic University in 2002. However, he returned within the year to become Temporary Administrator of St. Patrick Parish in Whitewater. In 2003, he returned as Pastor of St. Frances Cabrini Parish in West Bend, and was given additional responsibility as assisting priest of Immaculate Conception/St. Mary's, West Bend in 2004. In 2011, he was appointed Rector of the Cathedral.

Born in Milwaukee to his parents, Jim and Maureen ("Mo") Haines, Bishop-Elect Haines was baptized at St. Elizabeth parish, Milwaukee, before the family moved to New Berlin in 1965. There, he attended Holy Apostles Parish and Grade School, New Berlin, and graduated from new Berlin West High School in 1977. He began his college studies at the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh, before transferring and graduating from Marquette University in 1981 with a degree in theology. He attended Saint Francis de Sales Seminary for graduate theological studies from 1981-1985, earning a Masters of Divinity degree.

Schuerman, 58, was ordained to the priesthood on May 17, 1986, by Archbishop Rembert G. Weakland, O.S.B., and is currently serving as Pastor of St. Francis de Sales Parish, Lake Geneva, and as Supervising Priest of Holy Cross Parish, Bristol.

"I am deeply humbled by the Holy Father's invitation to serve the faithful of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee as Auxiliary Bishop," Bishop-Elect Schuerman said. "I ask for prayers as I commit myself to this role

of leadership and service." Schuerman attended Saint Francis de Sales Seminary College from 1976 to 1980, earning a Bachelor's of Arts degree and, after attending Saint Francis de Sales Seminary for his first year of theology from 1980 to 1981, was selected for studies at the University of Innsbruck, Austria, earning his Masters of Theology. His first assignment was Associate Pastor at St. Anthony Parish, Milwaukee from 1986 to 1992. He then was selected for missionary service at the Archdiocesan sister parish, La Sagrada Familia, in the Dominican Republic, where he served from 1992 until 1996.

In August 1996, Schuerman enrolled in a special graduate program at Chicago Theological Union for returning missionaries where he earned a doctorate in ministry with specialization in spirituality. He joined the faculty of Saint Francis de Sales Seminary as spiritual director and faculty member from 1997 to 2009. In 2009, he became administrator of St. Andrew Parish, Delavan, and then Pastor at St. Andrew in 2010. From 2011 to 2012, he also served as Pastor of St. Patrick Parish, Elkhorn. In 2012, he became pastor of St. Francis de Sales Parish, Lake Geneva. He continues his role in priest formation, serving as adjunct spiritual director for Saint Francis de Sales Seminary.

Bishop-elect Schuerman speaks German and is highly fluent in Spanish, which has aided his ministry in the southwestern area of the archdiocese where there is a growing population of Hispanic Catholics. He received the archdiocesan Vatican II Award for Service to the Priesthood in 2012.

Born in Burlington to his parents, Robert and Elizabeth Schuerman, Bishop-elect Schuerman grew up in Lyons, was a member of St. Joseph Parish, and attended St. Joseph's Grade School, Burlington Jr. High School, and Burlington High School.

Kewaskum School District To Offer Open Enrollment

The Kewaskum community schools will make 212 spots available next school year for new students from outside the district.

Kewaskum School Board unanimously approved the annual open-enrollment allocation at its meeting on Monday, Jan. 23. During a brief discussion, Jan Chapman, director of pupil services, stressed that the seats are offered after careful consideration by the administration of where space is available. The open-enrollment students do not result in the hiring of new staff.

Students can apply for consideration for open-enrollment spots between February 6 and April 28. Available spots

are allocated on a grade-by-grade basis. Space for special education students are vetted through a process that takes into consideration individual education program requirements and associated services. Students will be selected "randomly" for each grade level, with additional applicants placed on a wait list.

Chapman said the district bases its open-enrollment allocations on enrollment projections and class size formulas. She said care is taken to ensure that the size of a class is not set at a level where resident students are not able to enroll in required classes, with seats left available for families that move into the district.

When Jordan Carlton heard that he had to come up with a fundraiser to support a charity as part of the leadership class he is taking at Kewaskum High School, he thought of his basketball coach, Don Gruber.

"He is not only a good coach, he is just a good guy overall. He goes out of his way to make people have great experiences," said Jordan, who is on the KHS boys varsity basketball team. "I thought maybe we could contact him to see if he had anything he could help us with."

And that he did. Gruber, who is a holder of season tickets for the Milwaukee Bucks, readily donated four tickets to be raffled off.


The tickets will help Jordan and the four other students he is working with reach their goal of raising \$300 for the charity of their choice.

The students have not decided yet which charity will receive the raffle proceeds.

Because several in the group are avid hunters and love the outdoors, the group decided that whichever group it will go to will promote environmental preservation. The students are required to narrow it down to two organizations.

Representatives from those two charities must come to the high school to give presentations to the students about their organizations. The students will then select one of the charities to receive the funds.

"It's a hard choice to make. If it was up to us, we were going to just bring one group in," KHS student Ryan Prochnow said. "Some of the groups we are looking at are in Fond du Lac. That's a 40-minute drive to come down here. We kind of feel bad going

and contacting all these people and then having some people come down here to donate their time to donate and get money, and then us just telling them no," Jordan explained.

Still, that is part of the class assignment. Each week, the students learn about a different aspect of leadership, such as respect, courage, integrity, trustworthiness. The class focuses on how students can utilize those traits in the future, especially in the workplace.

The class is offered through the Main Street Philanthropy Academy. Dona Miotke of the Silbernagel Group in Kewaskum comes into the class for one hour each week to teach the students how to evaluate organizations' tax forms to see how money is used.

This was the second year the Main Street Philanthropy Academy was offered in Kewaskum.

With a \$5,000 price tag, the Main Street Philanthropy Academy,

which is currently offered nationwide, was available in Kewaskum because of funding from area businesses and organizations.

"I think it is a good class. It really makes you figure out what kind of person you actually are. Because a lot of the questions here are kind of 'what would you do' questions, it makes you realize that making the right decision sometimes is pretty hard. In the end, I think it will benefit a lot of people who take the class," Jordan said.

And the students are exposed to people like Gruber, who they hope to emulate as they grow older.

"He enjoys making people happy," Jordan said of Gruber, who works as vice president and co-owner of

Students in the class were divided into groups, which are running various fundraisers for different charities. For example, one of the groups is making T-shirts while another is selling frozen yogurt.

How To Save Enough For A Down Payment On A House

A home is the most costly thing many people will ever buy. The process of buying a home can be both exciting and nerve-racking. One way to make the process of buying a home go more smoothly is to save enough money to put down a substantial down payment.

Saving for a down payment on a home is similar to saving for other items, only on a far grander scale. Many financial planners and real estate professionals recommend prospective home buyers put down no less than 20 percent of the total cost of the home they're buying.

Down payments short of 20 percent will require private mortgage insurance, or PMI. The cost of PMI depends on a host of variables, but is generally between 0.3 and 1.5 percent of the original loan amount. While plenty of homeowners pay PMI, buyers who can afford to put down 20 percent can save themselves a considerable amount of money by doing so.

Down payments on a home tend to be substantial, but the following are a few strategies prospective home buyers can employ to grow their savings with an eye toward making a down payment on their next home.

•Decide when you want to buy. The first step to

buying a home begins when buyers save their first dollar for a down payment. Deciding when to buy can help buyers develop a saving strategy.

If buyers decide they want to buy in five years away, they will have more time to build their savings. If buyers want to buy within a year, they will need to save more each month, and those whose existing savings fall far short of the 20 percent threshold may have to accept paying PMI.

•Prequalify for a mortgage. Before buyers even look for their new homes, they should first sit down with a mortgage lender to determine how much a mortgage they will qualify for. Prequalifying for a mortgage can make the home buying process a lot easier, and it also can give first-time buyers an idea of how much they can spend.

Once lenders prequalify prospective buyers, the buyers can then do the simple math to determine how much they will need to put down. For example, preapproval for a \$300,000 loan means buyers will have to put down \$60,000 to meet the 20 percent down payment threshold. In that example, buyers can put down less than \$60,000, but they will then have to pay PMI.

It's important for buyers to understand that a down payment is not the only

costs they will have to come up with when buying a home. Closing costs and other fees will also need to be paid by the buyers.

• Examine monthly expenses. Once buyers learn how much mortgage they will qualify for, they will then see how close they are to buying a home. But prospective buyers of all means can save more each month by examining their monthly expenses and looking for ways to save.

Buyers can begin by looking over their recent spending habits and then seeing where they can spend less. Cutting back on luxuries and other unnecessary spending can help buyers get closer to buying their next home.

• Avoid risky investments. Some times it's great to take risks when investing, but risk should be avoided when saving for a down payment on a home. Traditional vehicles like certificates of deposit, or CDs, and savings accounts can ensure the money buyers are saving for their homes is protected and not subject to market fluctuations.

Saving enough to make a down payment on a home can be accomplished if buyers stay disciplined with regard to saving and make sound financial decisions.





Three members of the KHS girls team, Breanna Mielke, Allison Thill and Mikayla Bigelow, qualified for the sectional singles competition, which was scheduled to be held at Ledgeview in Fond du Lac on January 30.

In the regional, which was held at the Circle B, Mielke had a total of 1,025 pins in the six games she bowled, with her high game a 208.

Bigelow was next at 1,012, with a high game of 191, while Thill's total was 966 with a high game of 186.

In the sectional, "They have to finish in the top three," coach Pat Janesch said about qualifying for the state meet.

Indians Win A Thriller Over West On Last-Second Shot By Carlton

Young high school basketball teams have been known to get flustered in the final minute of very close games. Coach Don Gruber's Kewaskum Indians, with four junior starters, did not in their non-conference battle at West Bend West on January 28, resulting in a 53-52 win.

Down 52-51 with less than 15 seconds to play, KHS junior Jared Chesak just missed on his layup try but turned and dove to the floor to tie up one of the Spartans, and the possession arrow was in the Indians' favor with :4.4 remaining.

Kewaskum took its last time out to call a final play.

The ball came into Jordan Carlton, who, despite being closely guarded, got off an unbelievable shot from the baseline and behind the backboard that found nothing but net with under one second left on the clock.

Kewaskum players were starting to celebrate, but the officials put time back on the clock, giving West 1.2 second to score. A pass went to Kyle Wilde near half court, and his shot was off the mark. But wait, West Coach Todd Pyszora had called time as Wilde touched the ball, giving the Spartans another try with .7 on the clock.

Cam Flowers, West's leading scorer, was a likely candidate to take the shot, and after shoving his defender, he took the inbound pass, turned and put up a shot that did not come near the target.

Kewaskum, with just one prior victory this season, had defeated the 7-8 Spartans.

"(It was) About as good a high school basketball game as you're going to get," Gruber said about the game and Carlton's clutch shot, which was the culmination of a 24-point, personal-high effort for the six-foot (6-0) junior.

"Jordan had a good game," Gruber said. "What a great shot that was!"

Kewaskum used just seven players in the game, with starters Carlton, Chesak, Brady Hanson, Dan Kreis and Brent Goeden, either going all 36 minutes or close to it.

"They really played good team ball. I thought it was five players as one," Gruber said.

Kewaskum led for much of the first half, but in the final 2:13, West took a 26-25 lead on Cooper Holbrook's two free throws, then KHS came back to go up 27-26 after Carlton scored from underneath after a bullet pass from Goeden, then West's Bennett Schmidt answered, putting West ahead 28-27.

The game was tied at 30-all and 33-33 and 36-36 before KHS surged out front by eight, 45-37 on baskets by Carlton (a three), Chesak and Kreis, who had a chance for a 3-point play but missed the free throw. Then it was the Spartans who put together a little run, and they eventually took a 48-47 lead on a power move inside by Jack Thelen.

Carlton answered with a 12-foot jumper, and later, after a West steal, Wilde scored for a 50-49 lead with 3:14 remaining.

Gruber took a timeout to settle his players but after play resumed Chesak got whistled for a travel, and Thelen, who led West with 12 points, scored again with a Wilde assist, giving the hosts a 52-47 lead with a little over two minutes left.

As it turned out, those were the Spartans' last points. KHS got within one when Goeden grabbed an offensive rebound and passed to Chesak for a short bucket, making the score 52-51.

West missed its next shot but Hanson was called for a travel, then Kreis fouled Wilde who

missed the front end of a bonus, setting the stage for the thrilling ending.

When asked about his game-winning shot, Carlton said, "I know the guy defending me was close," but didn't fall for a pump fake, so he thought, "I might as well lean in and get a foul."

Once he made contact, Carlton said he had a good look at the basket and shot. "I thought, wow, this shot might go in." I was shocked. It was the best game I've played in a long time," he said.

Carlton hit 10x12 2-point baskets and one of five from beyond the arc.

"We had more turnovers than I would have liked, but some of those calls were not travels," Gruber insisted.

In addition to Carlton, Chesak and Hanson hit in double figures with 14 and 10, respectively. Only two of Hanson's points came in the second half, while Chesak had four baskets after the break, including critical back-to-back threes.

Hanson was the top rebounder with 10, and Gruber said Kreis had just one turnover while handling the ball much of the night. Kreis and Goeden led the team in assists with five and four, respectively.

Lone KHS Senior Starter Helps Secure Team's First Win

It wasn't quite the euphoria experienced by the Marquette Golden Eagles after upsetting No. 1 Villanova, but the Kewaskum boys basketball players were all smiles after they broke their 11-game losing streak in convincing style on January 23, dominating visiting North Fond du Lac (1-13) 56-38.

"It's just nice to have all that hard work pay off," KHS senior Brady Hanson, who poured in a game-high 28 points and put the clamps on the Orioles' leading scorer, Dawson Wodsedelak, said afterward.

KHS second-year coach Don Gruber felt the same. "It feels good to get a 'W,'" Gruber said. "I thought we played some good basketball. We worked the ball really well."

Behind four Hanson baskets, including a couple of three-balls, and 12-foot jumper by Jordan Carlton, Kewaskum jumped out to a 12-3 lead after the first five and a half minutes and took advantage of North Fondy's misses and

turnovers toward a 31-15 advantage at the break.

Wodsedelak, a six-foot, five inch (6-5) junior guard who has been averaging 20 points per game, was limited to one point in the first half as he missed all four shots he took and got himself in a little foul trouble.

"He was a little frustrated," Hanson said. "Good defense got him frustrated."

"We wanted to stop Wadsedalek, and we wanted to defend the dribble drive," Gruber said.

The Indians started out the second half with a turnover and misses on their first three possessions, allowing the Orioles to cut the deficit to 11 (31-20), then Hanson took over for a stretch, scoring five straight points with four more coming on a little runner by Jared Chesak and Carlton's 10-foot jumper to boost the lead to a more comfortable margin.

"That wasn't a bad thing," Gruber said because, "The other kids had to pick it up," and the five juniors, Chesak, Dan Kreis, Carlton, Brent Goeden and Jon Heus, did just that, breaking the Orioles' full court pressure and overcoming several turnovers to eat up time on the clock and stay comfortably in the lead.

Heus scored back-to-back baskets with power moves inside, putting KHS up 54-32, and with 2:46 left, Gruber cleared his bench and started celebrating the team's first win.


Third-place finisher and winner of two tickets to the

DNR To Look At Recreational Opportunities Statewide

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is kicking off an effort to look at recreational opportunities and needs across Wisconsin. The project, officially called a Recreation Opportunities Analysis, or ROA, aims to identify future recreational needs across the state, and the role of DNR lands in helping to meet those needs.

The ROA will rely on the same eight regions that the Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan — known as SCORP — uses to evaluate outdoor recreation trends and issues. Recommendations resulting from the analysis will then be used to help inform decision-makers about use of DNR lands, including in future master planning efforts.

One element of the effort is to facilitate full implementation of 2013 legislation requiring that roads on department property be designated as

open or closed for motorized use. However, motorized recreation is not the primary purpose of the project. The department is using this opportunity to work with the public to evaluate the full spectrum of recreational opportunities and demands commonly sought on DNR lands.

"Taking a holistic view at the statewide level while engaging stakeholders allows the department to better understand the current opportunities and existing conditions, and position ourselves to make more informed decisions regarding the gaps, demands and where to best place recreational infrastructure to meet statewide needs," said Diane Brusoe, DNR master planning supervisor.

Initial steps of the phased project include gathering data on existing recreational opportunities currently available to the public, and working with key statewide stakeholder

groups in developing the process to engage regional and local user groups. The goal is to create a regional-based recreational opportunity analysis that is inclusive in design and holistic in approach.

Public involvement in this effort will be extremely important. Open house meetings and outreach by the DNR early this year to user groups and others with an interest in the recreational uses of public lands will provide key opportunities for public involvement and ultimately the success of the project.



Jack Paul, a sophomore, was the show's longest running member. He started acting in Missoula Theatre when he was in first grade.

"It's nice because it's just one week versus three months of work, so this is one show that I will always be doing," he said.

Jack plans to continue acting in Missoula productions for as long as he is able.

This was the eighth year that Emily Halterman has been acting in Missoula Theater. It has made a profound difference in her life.

"I definitely suggest it to any younger kid, especially as someone who used to have a stutter and then learned not to do it through theater," she said.

Isaac Wagner, a senior at KHS, requested off from his after-school job at Walmart to make sure he could act in the play.

Isaac hopes that his role as an aspen tree in the show will help him achieve his dream of becoming a professional actor.

"You got to be 'stumped' for a little bit but I know how to 'stick' to the program. If people don't like it, they would 'leave' me be," Isaac said, as he "rooted" around for a laugh and an occasional groan.

Missoula Children's Theatre

The Missoula Children's Theatre company had been coming to Kewaskum for the past decade.

"It all started when the theater was built in 2008," said Larry Ammel, a member of the Kiwanis Club who coordinates the program each year.

One of Kewaskum High School graduates, Michelle Nigh, had hooked up with the national children's theater company based in Missoula, Mont. She got in touch with Ammel and suggested

that Kewaskum host the organization.

Ammel brought the proposal to the Kiwanis Club, and they have sponsored the program ever since.

The Kewaskum Kiwanis Club paid \$3,750 for the group to come this year. People who came to see the show paid admission to help offset the price, but the Kiwanis Club still footed a good portion of the bill.

The money funds two directors to come to

Kewaskum for one week, along with scenery and costumes for local children actors.

This year, the show was directed by Kayleigh Campo, a graduate of the University of West Florida, and Shelby Coleman, a graduate of Morehead State University.

It is worth the investment, Ammel said.

"First of all, the different age groups are getting along," Ammel said. "They listen. And I see excite-

ment. They are excited to be here."

Every year, the show itself teaches some sort of life lesson.

"This play is really good because it shows about breaking promises and lying," said Madison Brzezinski, a KHS freshman who has participated in Missoula Theater since she was in second grade.

"It's a really cool story. It's a great show," added Madison's twin sister, Taylor Brzezinski.

Many of the students who are involved with the Missoula Theater go on to participate in other area theatrical performances.

"Oh yeah, that kid is a Missoula kid," Ammel finds himself saying as he attends various performances throughout the year.

"So it's continuing thing. It's not that they just come here and then they are done with theater," Ammel said.

Continued From... ATV Club Creates Trail Of Friends

They come from different walks of life, and most did not know each other before joining the club. They hail from all over the area: Washington, Ozaukee, Sheboygan, Dodge and Waukesha counties, to name a few.

Despite their differences, the members all share a common bond.

"We all enjoy riding ATVs," Rohrer said.

Some ride the traditional four-wheeled ATVs (All-Terrain Vehicles), while others ride the newer side-by-side UTVs (Utility Task Vehicles).

All of the members are outdoors enthusiasts.

"You have to enjoy the outdoors. If you enjoy riding in the woods, seeing wildlife, that kind of stuff, it's great," Rohrer said.

The club goes on about one ride per month, many times spending a couple days together in northern Wisconsin.

"A lot of times you do see bear, or deer, or wildlife that is out there," Rohrer said.

The Kettle Moraine ATV Association prides itself on the fact that it may be the first group of its kind to use chatterboxes, which are communication devices that attach to helmets so that the ATV riders can communicate with one another while on a trail.

"Usually the person in

the lead will get on their chatterbox and let everyone behind them know if there are obstacles on the trail. They have been a Godsend," Rohrer said.

The leader alerts other riders of things such as oncoming traffic or a downed tree. Sometimes the message will be something like, "We see four deer on the side of the trail up here."

Most of the members like the opportunity to get away.

"For me individually, I enjoy it because it gives you that break from everyday, if you will, hustle and bustle," said Rohrer, who works as police chief for the Town of Hartford.

Most importantly, the club offers an opportunity to socialize.

"It is interpersonal, you do make those connections, those friendships," said Rohrer, who is grateful for the network of friends. "There are people that we are friends with that without he club, we never would have met."

Once one family member joins the club, other relatives often follow suit.

That is what happened with Rohrer. When he first started going on ATV rides, his wife, Connie, joined him.

Within a year, she was a full-fledged member herself and had an ATV all her

own.

The entire group has become like one big family, Rohrer said, with the older members watching out for the younger ones. There are parents or grandparents that bring children on outings.

"You see the other club members get involved with those kids to the point where either Mom or Dad, or Grandma or Grandpa says, 'I'm staying here, you go ride with them.' It brings that whole family atmosphere together. It's pretty cool," Rohrer said.

When club members are not riding their ATVs, they enjoy one another's company at various events. They go out to eat, bowling, go-karting or just visit with one another.

Club Events

The Kettle Moraine ATV Association typically meets at 7 p.m. the first Thursday of the month at Stocky's Fast Track and Grill in West Bend.

In addition to its regular outings, the club has several special events it holds throughout the year.

At its Christmas party in December, the club collected more than 200 items and 200 pounds of food for the Kewaskum Community Food Pantry.

Every year the group does a charity ride. Over the past nine years, the group has raised a total of \$84,900 for the Chix 4 a Cause, a nonprofit organization in West Bend that helps people who are battling cancer.

The Kettle Moraine ATV

Association has adopted a two-mile segment of Highway 28 just east of Kewaskum that it maintains with regular roadside cleanup.

Last year, the club celebrated its 10-year anniversary with a ride in Upper Michigan.

And once a year, the group holds a Poker Run to raise funds to support its activities throughout the year. The group also saves some of those funds if there is a future opportunity to build trails in the Kewaskum area.

Currently, the only trail that is available in the area is the Eisenbahn trail, which is open to ATVs only when the ground is frozen, typically from December 15 through March 15.

"We would like to get

more trails in this area. We think the economic impact would be phenomenal," Rohrer said.

This year's Poker Run will be held this Saturday, Feb. 4. Registration for the 90-mile round trip to St. Cloud starts at 9 a.m. in the Annex Building, located at 204 First St. in Kewaskum.

The cost is \$5 a hand or \$20 for five hands. Two additional cards can be purchased for each hand for \$2. The ride will be open to ATVs, snowmobiles and cars.


