## Jury Trial Held For Reckless Homicide Case

– Kewaskum Man Charged In Overdose Death

Anthony Kudek, a 28-year-old Kewaskum man, appeared in a Washington County courtroom this week for a jury trial in a first-degree reckless homicide case.

Kudek is charged with first-degree reckless homicide for allegedly delivering illegal drugs, which caused the death of Kimberly Landon. He also is charged with felony bail jumping.

Kudek has pled not guilty to both charges.

Landon was found dead in her bedroom at her father's house in West Bend on May 17. She was

21 at the time.

An autopsy done by Dr. Zelda Okia, associate medical examiner for Washington County, revealed that she had died from cocaine and heroin.

According to the criminal complaint, Facebook messages indicate that Landon and Kudek intended to meet each other and use drugs on May 16.

### Courtroom Testimony

Assistant District Attorney Sandra Giernoth opened the state's case on Monday by showing the jury a picture of Landon.

For years, the Kewaskum High School baseball team has played ball at Kiwanis Park in Kewaskum.

High School softball players and tennis players have all played at the park.

But the majority of stu-

dents within the school district do not live in the village limits, so the village does not receive any property taxes from those families.

And village finances have gotten tight.

So the village is considering charging the Kewaskum School District for use of its ath-

letic fields and courts.

The school district currently maintains its own baseball and softball diamonds at Kiwanis Park, as well as provides facilities for a wide variety of community groups, according to School Superintendent James Smasal.

## Swim Pond To Gain Shade And Inflatable Amenities

Visitors to the swim pond at Kiwanis Park in Kewaskum should be able to enjoy some new amenities this summer.

The Village Board unanimously approved the additions of four shade structures as well as inflatable climbing and play products at Monday night's meeting. Village Trustee Jim Wright was absent from the meeting.

"I think these two items

will give the pool season a good kickstart this year," Village President Kevin Scheunemann said.

The board agreed to spending \$10,000 on four lean-to shade structures. The permanent structures will measure about 16 by 20 feet. They will be built with treated lumber supporting metal roofs.

The village board approved spending up to \$15,000 on inflatable amenities, such as climbing walls, trampolines,

rafts and obstacle courses. The plan is to have most of the inflatables be located in the shallow end of the swim pond, with some at the middle level. The board also agreed that more could be added in the future.

"The inflatables were a popular item that came out of the pool committee, and I believe the park and recreation committee is fully embracing this," Scheunemann said.

## Camo Quilt Project

The Camo Quilt Project dates back to April 2006. When Wieck's son-in-law, Todd Richter, asked Wieck to make him a quilt to bring with him when he was deployed to do convoy duty in Iraq.

Richter helped Wieck design a quilt that could hang on his backpack. When he arrived at Camp Shelby in Mississippi, the 45-by-72-inch quilt made of military camouflage fabric was a hit.

Another soldier asked Richter where he got the quilt.

"My mother-in-law made it, and if you'd like it, she'll make one for you," Richter replied.

So in the next three months, Wieck made 48 more quilts.

The Plymouth Review ran an article about Wieck and her quilts. A reader asked Wieck if she would run a workshop so others could learn how to make the quilts. That led to more workshops, and soon hundreds of volunteers were making quilts.

People donated money for the fabric and materials. Then, in 2008, Glacier Transit & Storage (GTS) of Plymouth donated a facility for the quilters to use.

To date, Camo Quilts has made more than 25,000 quilts for U.S. troops that are deployed overseas.

Each quilt that goes overseas has a strip of fabric that is filled with crystals. Soldiers can soak the strip in water and then wear it around their neck to keep them cool, Wieck said. The soldiers also receive a card from the volunteers and a pocket blade to take with them when they are deployed.

About three years ago, the organization then began making patriotic lap quilts like the ones brought to Kettle Moraine Gardens. Nearly 900 lap quilts have been made for veterans who are homebound or who are in assisted living facilities, nursing homes or hospice situations.

## Volunteers Stitch Together

Volunteers ranging in age from 15 to 81 work to create the quilts.

The workers divide up the work. Some of the volunteers do nothing but cut fabric. Some just pin while others perform all the sewing.

"It is quite a process. We have been working on it for 10 years. We have gotten to a point where I don't think we could do it much more efficiently," Wieck said.

It starts when the fabric is delivered to the center on large rolls. Volunteers clamp about 40 layers of fabric together so that it is about an inch thick.

Workers then use a fabric saw to cut through the fabric.

"That's how I got men to come. I told them I had power tools," Wieck said.

After the fabric is cut to the correct width, it is brought to another room where it is cut to length.

The quilts are then assembled.

"When they have a good day, the volunteers can pin about 40 quilts in one morning," Wieck said. "All the sewing is done by machine. We do nothing by hand; it would take a lot longer."

The camo quilts that are

sent overseas typically take about three hours to make. The lap quilts, however, can take much longer, depending on the complexity of the pattern and the volunteer's skill level, Wieck said.

The military quilts cost about \$25 for supplies, while the patriotic lap quilts cost about \$50 each.

Wieck's husband, DuWayne Wieck, helps with the process. He cuts

fabric and cleans quilts by hand, approved of the workmanship.

"I love them. They are so pretty," Beisbier said.

DuWayne Wieck, affectionately known as the "Stitch Gestapo," carefully inspects each quilt. If he finds any lumps, bumps or puckers in a quilt, or if there are any loops in the thread, he sends it back to be redone.

Beulah Beisbier, a Kettle Moraine Gardens resident who has sewn dozens of

quilts by hand, approved of the workmanship.

"I love them. They are so pretty," Beisbier said.

# School District Moves Forward With Building Project Funding

The Kewaskum School District took out its second of three loans last week to fund its \$28.42 million building project to upgrade the middle school and high school.

The bank-qualified loan, valued at \$9.995 million, is carrying a 2.82 percent.

As of now, with the 3.35 percent interest rate on the first long-term loan of \$8.9 million, taxpayers will see an increase of 17 cents on the district's mill rate beginning in 2018.

However, the exact amount of the increase won't be crystallized until next year when a third and final loan will be taken out to fund the building project. Once again, it will be a bank-qualified loan, which typically carries a lower interest rate than other loans and cannot exceed \$10 million.

For now, the current projected tax rate increase is two cents lower than the 19 cents that was predicted last November when voters passed the referendum.

That means that on a \$300,000 home, property taxes are projected to increase \$51 instead of \$57 a year.

Last year the district's total mill rate was \$9.09, so that amount is now predicted to go up to \$926 rather than \$928.

"This is good news for the district, and it's good news for property owners," Kewaskum Schools Superintendent James Smasal said.

## Building Plans

In November, voters approved a \$28.42 million referendum to update facilities at the middle school and high school.

At last week's School Board meeting, School Board members unanimously agreed to go forward with a revised conceptual drawing that involves razing the current middle school and adding a new 85,000-square-foot, two-story middle school to the current high school.

The building plan remains conceptual as board members, staff, administration and community members continue working with Bray Architects to come up with a final plan.

Teachers and staff went to Madison last Friday to tour schools and get new

ideas for the school buildings here.

The conceptual plan has changed since voters saw drawings in November. At that time, the school was planning on upgrading the existing middle school and making a 120,000-square foot building.

When the Long Range Planning committee started meeting last year, members had wanted to tear down the current middle school and build a new one, but they were told that would be too expensive.

However, in December, advisory committees began meeting and brought up some concerns about the plan. Architects went back to the drawing board and revised the plan to make a smaller footprint for the school, and that brought the cost under \$28.42 million.

Still, the new building will offer more than what the current building has.

Current middle school rooms are around 825 to 850 square feet, and the conceptual drawing has new science rooms with more than 900 square feet. Other classrooms in the conceptual drawing are between 875 and 900 square feet, Smasal said.

In addition, the middle school will hold a new two-court gymnasium and locker rooms. There is a main office with a secure entrance, cafeteria, science labs and classrooms.

The extent of the renovation remains the same at the high school as what voters saw in November.

The conceptual drawing currently boasts a courtyard between the two schools.

"The courtyard area is really done for two reasons- one is for topographical changes between the two buildings. The second piece is to keep natural light in classrooms," said Matt Wolfert, president of Bray Architects.

Students from both schools will be able to gather in the courtyard, which will be used for things such as agricultural lessons and art classes, Smasal said.

The middle school and high school will share space for technology education. The plan still calls for the construction of a greenhouse on the southeast corner of the high school.

Although the building

plan continues to morph until a final decision is reached, the plan must adhere to what voters approved in November and cannot go beyond the approved \$28.42 million.

Tearing down the middle school will create additional green space for the district, which could potentially be used to create a soccer field, Smasal said.

Because the referendum did not address any field space needs, that is not part of the capital project that voters approved in November.

"Outside field space, including potential turf installation at Doc Mitchell Athletic Complex, will need to be addressed at some point in the future, but that is totally separate from the capital improvement project we are working on now," Smasal said.

The district plans to begin construction in the fall.

## Assist Rescue/Drugs

## Death Investigation

A death investigator was requested from the Washington County Sheriff's Office to assist in the investigation. The death appears to be drug related.

# Massage Therapist Charged With Assault

Timothy Hardy has been charged with third degree sexual assault for an incident that allegedly occurred during a massage at his business, Finish Line Massage, which had been located in his home at 122 Elm St. in Kewaskum.

According to the criminal complaint filed on December 9, Hardy is accused of sexually assaulting a woman while giving her a massage on Dec. 22, 2015. The woman was approximately 24 years old at the time.

The woman claims that she was wearing underwear and covered with a sheet when Hardy went under her underwear and assaulted her, according to the complaint.

If convicted, Hardy faces a fine of up to \$25,000 or 10 years in prison, or both.

According to the complaint, the woman went to the Kewaskum Police Department on Dec. 22, 2015, and reported the alleged incident to an officer. She was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital, where a sexual assault examination was conducted.

That same day, the Kewaskum police officer who had talked with the alleged victim told Hardy that a complaint had been filed, according to court

records. Hardy told the officer that the woman had come to his home for a massage and he had gotten too close to her genital area, according to the complaint. He told the officer that he had apologized for accidentally touching her there, the complaint states.

Court records show that Hardy now resides in Campbellsport. He is a certified massage therapist

and is licensed by the State of Wisconsin, according to the Finish Line Massage website.

The case is scheduled for arraignment, but has been assigned out of the county as the Washington County judges are acquainted with the defendant. Hardy's hearing is set for 8:30 a.m. on March 17 at the Waukesha County Courthouse.

## Washington/Ozaukee Officials Receive Award For Innovation

On February 2, Washington County Administrator Joshua Schoemann, Ozaukee County Administrator Thomas Meaux, and Department Director/ Health Officer Kirsten Johnson were recognized as recipients of the University of Wisconsin –

Madison Robert M. La Follette School of Public Policy Lloyd D. Gladfelter Award. The award was in recognition of their efforts to combine Health Departments. According to the University, "The Gladfelter award is given to non-elected municipal, county,

state, or federal employees, who through their careers or through a specific innovation, have helped solve a problem for Wisconsin residents and improved public service." Nominations were judged on their creativity, feasibility, and potential impact.

"These projects demonstrate public employees' tremendous commitment and dedication to their communities and state," said La Follette School Director Don Moynihan. "Based on the wide range of nominations, it's clear that high-impact innovations are happening throughout the state."

The combined health department is the first of its size in Wisconsin and is expected to save the two counties \$300,000 by reducing overhead costs and sharing operational expenses. 

## Baseball And Race Are Focus Of UW-WC's March Forum

### - Free Admission And Coffee To Scholar Sip

Baseball, race and post-colonial history are the focus of Washington County's monthly "Scholar Sip" forum on Wednesday, March 8. Levon Hudson, Library Services Assistant at UW-WC, will present his interesting research at 3:30 p.m. in the library lounge.

Hudson's interest in this topic piqued in 2010 after reading a USA Today article about race and baseball. One quote from an African-American player particularly caught his eye, "People see dark faces out there [on the baseball field] and the perception is that they're African-American. They're not us. They're imposters." Hudson notes that "in a time of increasingly concrete racial categories, the concept of a Black Latino person is unfathomable to some, yet precisely such people are becoming the biggest superstars in MLB." Hudson's research focused on locating some of the important historical processes which led to the present state of affairs.

Hudson's talk will include an early history of Cuban baseball, with a particular focus on cultural and racial exchanges taking place during the early 20th century between and among baseball players in the U.S. and Cuba. He notes that when we see

players native to Cuba and the U.S.—of African and of European descent—playing with and against each other in both nations, the distinct Cuban and U.S. systems of racial organization come to the fore. Levon will provide specific examples of players navigating both of these systems. The impact of the 1959 Cuban Revolution on U.S.-Cuban baseball relations will also be discussed as a microcosm of its broader historical impacts. Finally, he'll provide a brief rumination on the present and future of Cuban-U.S. baseball relations.

Those attending will learn that baseball's "Color Line" was blurring well before Jackie Robinson broke it in 1947. Contrary to popular assumption, multiple professional baseball leagues (not MLB) operated quite successfully with racially integrated lineups from the late 19th century into the mid-20th century. Secondly, the micro-lens of baseball can

give us insight into the macro-historical processes at work during this time, namely constructions of racial and national identities, and the African Diaspora which intersects both. Finally, we will understand MLB (Major League Baseball) as a

multinational corporate entity acting exclusively in its self-interest, and that the history discussed in this presentation will posit such characterization as a historical continuity over time, rather than a recent development.

The March "Scholar Sip" monthly community forum offers interesting conversation and great coffee as its two main components. Scheduled on the second Wednesday of each month, the forums feature campus as well as guest scholars who discuss research interests, recent or upcoming publications, pet projects or simply a topic of general interest. No reservations are needed, admission is free and everyone is welcome to the 3:30 p.m. - 4:30 p.m. informal forum, held in the library lounge (on 2nd floor).



# Washington County Awarded Aquatic Invasive Species Education And Prevention Program Grant

Last December, Washington County submitted an application for a three-year Aquatic Invasive Species Education Prevention and Planning grant. The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources posted grant recipients yesterday, and we are pleased to announce that Washington County was awarded our Grant! "Our County staff's hard work and ability to gain public support allowed us to be competitive enough to

receive this grant award," said Paul Sebo, County Conservationist.

To recap, the grant will help fund an Aquatic Invasive Species Coordinator position and a summer intern for 2017 through 2019. The role of the AIS Coordinator and intern will be to prevent or slow the spread of AIS in Washington County and throughout Wisconsin by:

- Maintaining community-focused outreach, education, training, and

social media contact

- Updating the Countywide Strategic Plan

- Conducting 200 hours of Clean Boats, Clean Waters per year

- Working with pet stores and bait shops to prevent the sale of NR40 species

- Conducting lake surveys, looking for AIS and providing information to Lake Groups

- Acting as a point of contact for new AIS and rapid response

efforts

"Getting this grant is huge to prevent the spread of AIS in Southeastern Wisconsin. We will be able to hit the ground running and continue some of the great projects we set up last year," said Brad Steckart, the County AIS Coordinator. "Bringing in an intern will also help educate boaters at boat launches, the places where new invasions are most frequent."

Some Lake Groups

supported the grant with cash, and others with donated labor and equipment. One lake resident stated, "We just wanted to show the DNR that our lake residents value the AIS program and are willing to support the protection of our valuable public waters."

With rare invasive species like starry stonewort and reed manna grass only present in the south eastern part of the State, it is important that residents

are educated on how to identify invasive species and how they spread. Preventing AIS from spreading in our area will keep property values high, tourism strong, and lake weeds from getting out of hand.

## KHS Wrestlers Have Big Days; All Four Earn Trips To State

With its four qualifiers winning 10 of 12 matches, the Kewaskum wrestling team was just short of perfect in the February 18 D-2 sectional hosted by Milwaukee Lutheran.

Two of the Indians, 126-pound freshman Braden Maertz and 132-pound sophomore Eric Bauer, won their respective weight classes to earn berths in the WIAA State Wrestling Tournament and byes in the first round.

Two others, junior Adam Bruss and sophomore Alex Deheck, will also be going to Madison as runners-up at 113 and 138 after losing their matches in the championship round.

"Yeah, almost (perfect)," KHS coach Scott Rhoads said after his wrestlers wrapped up their big day. "It was about what I predicted," he said, admitting he thought he might have three champions, but, "Alex lost to that kid (Luke Ottmans of Valders) in the finals at the Belcher Tournament.

Rhoads said he would like to look back in the records to see if there was ever a day when all four sectional qualifiers advanced to state. He knows on thing for sure, "It's better than two years ago when we brought five (to sectionals) and got no body to state."

"We're turning corners here with our team," Rhoads went on, referring to the fact his young wrestlers are so good, they are able to handle older, more experienced athletes.

Bauer, who improved to

36-0, had no trouble in any of his three matches, needing just 44 second to score 16 points in a technical fall over Milwaukee Lutheran soph, Keith Gigger (10-14) and pinning Kyle Anderson of Catholic Memorial (20-18) in a quick 1:14, and then dominating Ripon's Ryan Cody (34-14) by a 9-zip major decision in the finals.

This was the fourth time Bauer and Cody met this year, and Bauer has won all four.

"The finals match is a statement. He handled the heck out of that kid," Rhoads said of Bauer, reporting he has shifted into a higher gear for sectionals. "He means business."

Bauer, the D-2 runner-up at 120 pounds last year, was kind of nonchalant about his day. Was he fired up about facing Cody? "Not really, it was just another match," he said, and when asked his chances of winning a state title this year, he said, "I'll have a kid (from Ellsworth, Sam Stuhl) who is going after his third state title."

Bauer smiled when told about Rhoads' comment that he was more focused and more determined now. "If you want to reach the podium, you have to be at the top of your game," he said.

Maertz (33-3) may be a freshman but when it comes to wrestling he's a seasoned veteran and showed that, defeating Jared Zeimentz (26-13) of Delavan-Darien, 5-2 in the first round, beating Ellis Pfleger (25-11) of Grafton 5-2 and then handling Sheboygan Falls' senior

Kaleb Ison (30-8) 3-2 in the finals in a very defensive match.

Maertz scored a takedown in the first period, escaped early in the second for a 3-0 lead. Ison came back with an escape in the third and was awarded a point for stalling but could not take Maertz down for the win.

"He (Maertz) had a good day," Rhoads said, indicating while the wins weren't by large margins, "That's OK, a win is a win."


Braden is the third Maertz to qualify for state. His brother Rob qualified in 2010 and 2011, and Max went to state in 2014. Neither of them placed.

Deheck (29-9) came within an eyelash of winning his weight class. He was leading Ottmans 2-1 after the first period and chose to start the second in neutral position, which may have backfired just a little because Ottmans was able to score a takedown to take a 3-2 lead. Deheck stood and scored an escape, knotting the score at 3-3 with two minutes remaining.

Now it was Ottman's choice and he chose down and broke free for a 4-3 lead. Now Deheck needed a takedown in the final minute for the win, but nothing was working as time was ticking away.

Thirty seconds, then 20, 10 and finally, Deheck went for a headlock, but he could not secure it and Ottmans (36-9) fell on him for a takedown and a 6-3 win.

"Alex did all the work, and that's what is frustrating," Rhoads said. "He was the one attacking, and the other kid is just hang-

ing on."

To reach the finals, Deheck edged Max Ward of Elkhart Lake/Howards Grove 5-4 on a penalty point for Ward's having three cautions on starts, then posted a very quick pin in 1:03 over Hiqmet Dauti of Whitewater (24-20).

Bruss was solid as a rock in his first two matches, pinning Lucas Nygaard (27-14) of Wisconsin Lutheran with a beautiful cradle in the first round and posting a 14-6 major decision over Colton Harrington of Valders, who ended his year at 40-7.

In the finals, he had a similar opponent, Zachary Beck (41-5) of Ripon, who needed just :24 and :28 to win his first two matches.

Beck had beaten Bruss in a dual meet, in the finals

of the East Central Tournament and in the regional. Bruss didn't have much luck vs. Beck in this match either, as he was pinned in 1:13 but he still got the second place as Nygaard had won the wrestleback.

"Bruss was unbelievable today. He was using moves he's never used before," Rhoads said.

The D-2 tournament gets underway Thursday, February 23 at 7:15 p.m. in the Kohl Center when Bruss and Deheck will be in action. Maertz and Bauer have byes and on Friday morning (11:15 a.m.) face the winners of second-third place matches that will take place on Thursday night.

The semifinals for D-1, D-2 and D-3 will all take place Friday night, begin-

ning at 7 p.m. The finals are held Saturday night, starting at 5 p.m.



## Lady Indians Reach Two Of The Coach's Goals; One More To Go

The “never” tag has been removed from the Kewaskum High girls basketball record book when it comes to beating Kettle Moraine Lutheran.

Hailey Herriges’ back door basket (thanks to a nifty pass from Mikayla Dogs) with 32 seconds remaining gave Kewaskum a 35-33 advantage, and after dodging a couple bullets down the stretch, the Indians notched an exciting 35-34 win in their final regular-season game of the year.

“That’s awesome! That’s a big win for our team,” KHS coach Russ Thull beamed afterward.

Until February 16, the Indians were beaten every time they played the Chargers, according to KHS coach Russ Thull, who said the thrilling victory also marked the first time in his three-year tenure KHS has beaten a top-three team.

About Herriges’ basket, Thull said, “That was huge,” adding, “I was very proud with the way they competed,” especially on the defensive end of the court.

After taking the lead for the final time, Thull called a quick timeout to make sure the girls understood they had just one foul, so they had six to give before putting KML at the line in a bonus situation.

They committed one foul, and then, when Jayme Soderbeck drove the lane, there was another KHS foul but not before Soderbeck got off a shot. Even though she missed, Soderbeck was awarded two free throws. The first

one swished, making the score 35-34, and the second bounced harmlessly off the rim, and Herriges jumped high to grab it and was fouled with 10.9 seconds remaining.

Herriges took aim but her first free throw also hit the rim and bounced away, right to one of the Chargers. There was an immediate foul, and KML coach Jason Walz signaled for a time out to set up a final play for the last 6.1 seconds.

The ball came into No. 20 (Amanda Porth) and Dogs fouled her. No bonus yet for KML, which inbounded the ball again, passed it to Porth who took aim at a 14- to 16-footer from the right baseline. It missed the target and once again, it was Herriges to the rescue, grabbing the ball with two hands and hanging on for dear life. She was fouled but after a conference among the three officials, the game was declared over, and the Indians began their celebration.

“I just really wanted to make sure they wouldn’t get any second chances,” Herriges, one of KHS’ seven seniors, said about her big rebound. “We had worked so hard to get the lead.”

Herriges drew a lot of defensive attention and only got off eight shots toward her seven points. “We knew they were going to come in and pressure us. It was just a matter of handling the pressure,” she said.

That task fell directly on Dogs, the point guard, who brought the ball up the court vs. the press, directed traffic and took the tough shots, scoring a

game-high 21 points.

“Mikayla played a phenomenal game ... I think she is the most underrated players in our conference,” Thull said of Dogs, who made seven of 19 shots, six of seven free throws, grabbed six rebounds, had one steal and two block shots. Her only assist was a game-winner.

We lost by two points the first time (to KML),” Herriges said. “This was an important win for us.”

In addition to the points scored by Dogs and Herriges, Bre Trepes hit one 3-pointer, while post player Rachel Holt chipped in with four points.

Thull doesn’t want the Indians to stop with this win, which gave the team an 11-11 record. “We want a regional win,” he said. Going back 15 years in the records, he couldn’t find a year where the Indians opened with a victory in the tournament. Beating West Bend East on February 21, “That’s our next goal,” the coach said.

There are many things I love about being a massage therapist. I don’t really look at my work as a job but as a passion to help people feel better, and more importantly to help them heal.

Over the past few years I have worked with clients recovering from orthopedic surgery and have seen first hand how surgery can be a major strain on the entire body. Researchers agree that massage therapy is an important component in the post-op healing process. Massage after surgery positively affects and promotes healing, reduces stress, enhances muscle relaxation, improves local circulation, and creates a sense of well-being. The benefits of such therapy can also have a positive impact on your rehabilitation. More and more, people are turning to massage therapy to aid in their postoperative recovery. I’m happy to be one of those therapists.

I work with people who have had orthopedic surgery such as joint replacement, rotator cuff surgery, or meniscus repair, to name a few. After a surgery like this, your doctor will usually write you an order for physical therapy. It is important to follow through with your rehab orders, as failure to do so can impede your recovery process.

Depending on your situation, your physical therapist or orthopedic surgeon may recommend massage therapy. Even if they don’t, it is an important consideration for anyone having orthopedic surgery. I will work with your physical therapist and orthopedic surgeon to ensure that postoperative massage compliments the work you do in physical therapy. We usually start this

after your incisions are completely healed and you have clearance from your surgeon for the bodywork. Two of the major benefits my clients see in a relatively short period of time are pain relief and increased flexibility and mobility.

Pain is the number one concern that my post-op clients have. Although pain can be managed through pharmaceuticals prescribed by your doctor, massage provides natural pain killing effects. Swelling is often a contributing factor to pain, and very natural after surgery. Cupping therapy and lymphatic massage helps move fluid to reduce swelling. Massage brings fresh oxygenated blood to the area to enhance recovery and shorten healing time.

Increasing flexibility and mobility is the second top benefit my clients experience with massage after surgery. Keep in mind that prior to the surgery, most people experience a lot of pain and mobility issues due to injury or decreased joint function, sometimes for long periods of time. Often, this creates different movement patterns that can cause pain and weakness in other areas. Everything is connected, so not only has your surgery site been affected, but so have other muscles and tissues, even including those on the side opposite of the surgery site. Working the surrounding areas with massage can help loosen them up to gain better flexibility and mobility in the surgery area and increase the effects of your physical therapy sessions.

Prevention/reduction of scar tissue and fascial adhesions is another great reason to get postoperative massage, as

fascial restrictions can affect range of motion. Massage prior to surgery can also help strengthen the immune system to help fight potential infections, and reduce stress and anxiety.

Rehabilitation is an important part of the healing process and that includes massage therapy. When considering postoperative massage, choose a therapist who has experience working with post surgical clients and their healthcare teams that include orthopedic surgeons and physical therapists. Before your surgery, decide if you want massage therapy to be a part of your recovery plan and call me to discuss your situation. You’ll want to make sure that you have a therapist selected before your surgery so they can be included in your integrated healthcare team.

# Kewaskum Indians Succumb To Campbellsport's 1-2 Punch

The Kewaskum High boys basketball team was able to put the clamps on one of Campbellsport's sharp-shooters, but the 1-2 combination of junior guard Connor Kissinger and senior forward Koy Walsh was too much for the Indians in a game played on the Cougars' home court February 17.

The two combined for 33 of their team's points in the 60-43 decision. With the win, Campbellsport improved to 7-6 in EC play, 14-7 overall.

The Indians, still winless in EC action and 3-18 overall, played good basketball at times, but the little stretches where they didn't play well were costly, according to head coach Don Gruber.

"We did some really good things against their zone," Gruber said about

starting off with several patient possessions that ended in baskets. KHS jumped out to a 10-7 lead and was up 12-11 thanks to a pair of three-point baskets by Jordan Carlton and singles baskets by Jared Chesak and Brady Hanson.

Then the Cougars went on a 7-0 run on a three-pointer and a drive by Kissinger, and a pair of free throws by Walsh to go up 18-12.

During that stretch, KHS missed three shots and was whistled for an offensive foul, and in the final 6:30 of the first half, Campbellsport added slightly to their lead by outscoring the Indians 10-7 for a 28-19 advantage at the break.

"We're struggling with confidence every game," Gruber said, adding, "Every team that has a losing record ... They've got

to pick themselves up by the bootstraps."

Campbellsport started the second half with another little run to go up 40-25, "Then we cut it to 10 (40-30), but we missed some free throws and we had to hit our free throws" to have a chance, Gruber said.

Hanson missed one of two, and then Hanson and Carlton misfired on three-point attempts, and Hanson was called for a questionable offensive foul that wiped out a basket.

Had the Indians made their free throws and a couple of their shots, "We find Uncle Mo," Gruber said, referring to momentum. With it, perhaps the Indians could have made a game of it.

Once again, Campbellsport had several second-chance shots after getting offensive rebounds, and in the final four minutes, Walsh scored seven of his points to hold the Indians at bay.

"He's a very fine player," Gruber said of Walsh. "He's tough to defend."

Hanson led the Indians with 18 points on 1x5 shooting from beyond the arc and 6x16 on two-point tries. Carlton cooled off after his hot start and ended up with 10, while Jared Chesak did his usual yeoman's job on the boards and working inside

for for the tough points. He ended up with eight.

Brent Goeden had one three-point basket and did a good job defensively on guard Sonny Johnson, who had hit four threes in the Cougars' early win over defending state D-2 champion Waupun.

KHS closes out the regular season tonight (Thursday), hosting Berlin. The Indians will be honoring their seniors, including Hanson, Nick Beine, Nick Buchel, Nick Ellenbecker, Ty Schellinger and Keaton Flanders.

Former Kewaskum High athlete, Joey Seitz, finished fifth in the WIAC (Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Association) Conference Wrestling Tournament that took place Feb. 11 at UW-Platteville.

Seitz, a junior at UW-Stevens Point, finished 3-2 in the nine-man bracket at 141 pounds in the event, which was won by UW-LaCrosse. La Crosse piled up 160 points, 52 more than runner-up UW-Whitewater (108) and then came UW-Stevens Point and UW-Platteville, which tied for third place with

97.5 points. UW-Eau Claire placed fifth at 89.0, while UW-Oshkosh was last with 75. UW-Stout and UW-River Falls do not have wrestling teams.

For Seitz, the day started with a bye and then in the quarterfinals he lost to Ryan Costello, a freshman representing UW-Platteville, who is a Campbellsport High graduate. The score in that match was 7-4 and sent Seitz to the loser's bracket.

In his first wrestleback, Seitz defeated Frank Lor, a freshman at Stevens Point — schools are allowed to have two athletes at several weight

classes — by a score of 8-3, then he beat Dellas Vandenberg of UW-Oshkosh by major decision, 12-0, before losing to La Crosse's Hayden Slough, 6-0.

This loss sent Seitz to the match to determine fifth and sixth places, which he won by forfeit over Costello, who was injured in his previous match.

Seitz is currently 10-16 on the year after finishing 5-14 as a sophomore. He and the other Pointers will compete in the NCAA III Regional in Fort Wayne, Indiana the weekend of Feb. 24 and 25.

## Gonring, Four Others Honored At WBCA Banquet

The Wisconsin Baseball Coaches Association has five new members in its Hall of Fame, including Doug Gonring, who has spent the majority of the last two and a half decades as the head coach of the Kewaskum Indians and the West Bend East Suns.

Along with Mike Gregor of Edgerton, Bob Heinkel of Milwaukee Lutheran, West Salem's Chuck Ihle and Bill Urban of Gresham, Columbus and now Pittsville, Gonring was inducted into the Hall on February 11 at a banquet held in conjunction with its annual clinic at the Marriott West in Madison.

This was the group's 35th Hall of Fame induction ceremony, according to Gonring, who was honored to be included in the HOF lineup, which now has 150 members, including high school and collegiate coaches.

Gonring's first year of coaching was 1993 at Kewaskum High, and the next year, there was an opening at East, the school where he played his prep baseball, and he got the job.

Gonring was at East from 1994 to 2003 and during that time led the Suns to a pair of WIAA summer baseball titles, in 1999 and 2002. "We had one other appearance with East at state," Gonring said recently while reminiscing about his career at the two schools.

"Nothing here at Kewaskum, but we've been real close," Gonring said about getting teams to state. "I've had some really good teams up here that have been snake bitten. We've been always one play, one out ... one suicide squeeze away from going."

Gonring left East after the 2003 season and did some work with Little League and Pony League baseball before directing the JV team at Kewaskum for a couple years while Dave Donath was the head coach.

"I think I took over for Dave in 2008," Gonring said. He has been Kewaskum's coach since then, spending eight years directing the Indians in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference and last year in the North Shore league. Gonring led the Suns to six conference titles and KHS to five.

Concerning a favorite season, Gonring said it was probably 1999, the year he directed his first state championship at East, ending the year with a 23-game win streak.

"That was a special team," with Ryan Rohlinger and Mike Mueller, both drafted by professional baseball teams. Other key figures on that team included Adam Rohlinger, Dave Haim, Erik Kramer and Zac Walter.

In the final two games of

the state tournament that year, the Suns outscored Park Falls and Marquette 26-5, ending with a 15-4 victory over the Hilltoppers in the finals. Mueller smashed three homers in the one day and four in the tournament.

Single games that stand out in Gonring's mind include one that ended in a win and two in losses. A game vs. Nicolet played at Regner Park in 1999 is memorable. Mike Mueller was pitching for the Suns, and the score was 1-1 in the top of the ninth with a runner at third base and two outs, when the Knights' coach had his No. 9 hole hitter lay down a suicide squeeze bunt.

"We couldn't get the out at first. They scored and won the game," Gonring said, indicating he never figured an opponent would attempt a squeeze in that situation.

"We lost the next night," Gonring said, but then started to roll. "We were 33-4 that year."

Another of Gonring's picks was the state finals in the 2002 season. It had a much happier ending. "In the ninth, Josh Boyer hit a home run in the fog in Stevens Point to win the game," Gonring said, indicating Boyer had never even hit a home run in practice before that.

"I remember the headline ... It said 'Boy, Oh Boy, Oh Boyer,'" Gonring said. Boyer, a junior pitcher/infielder, was batting .211 during the regular season and had only batted once in the tournament before being called on to hit in the ninth inning.

One of the best pitching gems came July 14, 2009 when Kewaskum's Cody Nuernberg had 18 strikeouts and wound up losing the game in eight innings to New Holstein. Both Nuernberg and Parker Schrage went to the end, according to Gonring, who saw his team lose the contest 1-0 with the winning run coming on a single and stolen base by Schrage, followed by two wild pitches by Nuernberg.

In the bottom of the eighth, the Indians loaded the bases, but Schrage got Cody Seibel to strike out and Mike Backhaus to line to short.

Gonring's reached another milestone last summer, getting his 400th win. Currently he is 402-174 and counting.

Gonring said he was caught off guard when Jack Friess of Cedarburg told him about being selected to the Hall. "I thought I wasn't old enough for that stuff," but reported a recent trip to a Milwaukee Brewer Fantasy Camp with Dave Donath, he discovered, "I'm really, really old."

Aching muscles and all, Gonring said, the camp was "hilarious," and the coaches were "a joy to be around."

Especially rewarding was the face Bill Schroeder, the TV announcer for Brewer games, runs the camps to help finance Honor Flights for veterans.

When asked about his success, Gonring said, "We've been blessed with some good ball players, good families" at both schools.

## Continued From... Village And School District Seek Common Playing Field

To see if they can find any common ground on the issue, two board members of the Kewaskum Village Board and two members of the Kewaskum School District, along with Smasal and Village Administrator Matt Heiser, will hold an informal meeting.

The representatives will bring back any ideas to their respective boards to try to come up with an agreement.

At the Village Board meeting Monday night, Village Trustees Dave Zehren and Jim Hovland agreed to represent the village at the informal

meeting.

Kewaskum is not the only place in the state that has grappled with this issue.

For example, In Walworth County, Big Foot High School maintains the baseball field it uses at a park that belongs to Village of Walworth during the high school baseball season rather than paying any fees.

But the issue of coming up with money to maintain parks hits closer to home as well.

Washington County currently does not charge for the use of its soccer fields, but that may change in the

future.

The county park system recently released a Financial Substantiality Action Plan.

"We have been talking about a three- to five-year plan to increase revenue for Washington County parks, mostly in the name of various needs for amenities and improving amenities in the parks," said Jamie Ludovic, central services director for Washington County.

According to survey results, people in the county would like to have more amenities such as dog parks, beaches and disc golf courses.

To come up with funding, user fees have become part of the discussion, Ludovic said.

Other counties, such as Waukesha and Dane counties, already charge user fees for athletic fields.

There currently are private soccer clubs that use Washington County parks, and they could start seeing a user fee beginning as early as next year.

"We are trying to create a win-win approach for everybody that isn't very dramatic and considers all the various stakeholders," Ludovic said.

## Continued From... Kewaskum Swim Pond To Gain Shade And Inflatable Amenities

The vote came about a year after a pool committee was formed to identify ways that the swim pond could be improved.

The Village Board had been concerned with dropping attendance at the pool. That, coupled with the \$50,000 the village spends on maintaining the pond each year, made trustees question whether they should make changes to the pond.

The pool committee met monthly for almost a year with a representative from Burbach Aquatics, an architect and engineering firm specializing in aquatic design.

The committee considered a variety of options, ranging from adding a \$3 million pool to getting rid of the swim pond altogether.

The main issue the pool committee pinpointed was the lack of shade at the swim pond.

On November 28, the pool committee gave its final recommendation to the board.

For a total price tag of about \$403,000, the pool committee recommended renovating the bathhouse, installing a 1,300 square-foot splash pad, putting up 15-foot umbrellas and adding inflatable amenities.

The village board decided in November to break down the entire project into a three-step bid process: shade structures and inflatable amenities; the bathhouse/concession stand; and a splash pad.

The park and recreation committee at that time was charged with further investigating the shade structures and inflatable amenities.

The park and recreation committee met twice about the issue and Monday night recommended going forward with the lean-to structures and inflatable products.

At Monday night's meeting, Wayne Sargent, who served on the pool committee, offered to write bidding documents for the village to add shade structures, inflatables and a splash pad, and to renovate the bathhouse/con-

cessions stand. The board agreed to put the item on the agenda for the next board meeting.

To fund the swim pond additions, the village has an insurance claim for about \$20,000 from when a tree fell on the playground equipment at Wildlife Park.

However, the village board has also discussed

repairing the large shelter at Riverhill Park. Estimates for that range from about \$20,000 to \$80,000.

If the \$20,000 insurance claim goes to fund repairs on that shelter, the village does have money in reserves for the pool additions, Village Administrator Matt Heiser said.

## Continued From... Jury Trial Held For Reckless Homicide Case

In her opening statement, Giernoth said that Kudek picked Landon up in his car to buy crack cocaine for her.

Defense Attorney Deborah Ann Strigenz responded in her opening statement by saying that both Kudek and Landon had been addicted to drugs and were "co-actors" who went together to get drugs.

The first witness to testify was Caroline Schraufnagel, a court specialist for Washington County. Schraufnagel testified that court records show that Kudek was out on bond during the time leading up to Landon's death. The conditions of the bond were to maintain complete sobriety and to not commit any crimes.

Jessica McConkey, Landon's mother, was the next to take the stand on Monday.

Through a tearful testimony, McConkey said that her daughter was known to everyone as Kimmy. She said that Kimmy used Facebook as her main means of communication with others, but identified herself with a different spelling, Kimmie, on Facebook.

McConkey said that her daughter had moved to Florida on March 9 in an effort to stay clean from drugs. She moved back to West Bend on May 14.

During cross examination, McConkey was unable to clarify the date that she contacted police after finding potential drug paraphernalia in Landon's room.

"I'm sorry, since my daughter died, my life has been quite horrible with dates," McConkey said.

Landon's uncle, Thomas Landon, testified that he was living with Kimberly and her father, Timothy Landon in May.

Thomas Landon let Kimberly use his phone on May 16 and then he said

he understood that someone picked her up that evening.

Thomas Landon testified that he heard Kimberly use the bathroom on May 17 between 3 and 4 a.m. He also saw her lying on her bed before he left for work before 7 a.m.

That testimony was different than what Thomas Landon had reported to police in May, according to the criminal complaint.

The complaint states that Thomas Landon said on May 17 that he awoke for work at about 5 a.m. that day and saw Kimberly inside the residence, alive, appearing to get ready for bed. According to the complaint, at approximately 6 a.m., he observed Kimberly go into her bedroom and close the door.

Thomas Landon testified on Monday that he left work early at 3 a.m. because he had a bad feeling in his stomach about Kimberly.

He said that when he returned home, he looked at Kimberly again from her bedroom doorway. Kimberly was still lying on the bed and Thomas Landon saw some stuff on her face, he testified.

Thomas Landon then called Kimberly's name loudly and there was no response, according to his testimony.

Thomas Landon then went downstairs and brought his dog to the veterinarian. He returned home at about 4 p.m. and checked on Kimberly again, and she still had not moved, Thomas Landon testified.

Thomas Landon then heard his brother, Timothy Landon, who is Kimberly's father, come home. Thomas told Timothy to check on Kimberly.

Timothy went upstairs and Thomas heard his brother yell that Kimberly was not moving, according to testimony.

Thomas went to the bedroom to help and called 911, he said.

Washington County Deputy Medical Examiner Craig Garbisch declared Landon dead at the scene.

Timothy Landon, Kimberly's father, also testified on Monday.

He told the court that he had peered into Kimberly's bedroom at about 5:45 a.m. before he left for work on May 17, and it appeared that she was sleeping.

"I didn't want to walk all the way up on her, it's not like she was a baby, you know," Timothy Landon testified.

He told the court that Kimberly was lying flat on her bed, with her head cocked up on a pillow, and thought he saw a little bit of food on the left side of her mouth.

"I actually smiled because I thought she ate something and had it left on her face," Timothy Landon testified.

### Court Proceedings

Washington County Circuit Court Judge Todd Martens is presiding over the case.

All testimony was held before a 12-person jury that was selected on Monday. A 13th person will serve as an alternate.

Kudek's case was scheduled to run through Friday of this week. The jury expected to hear expert testimony detailing toxicology reports throughout the course of the trial.

Kudek faces up to 40 years and a fine of \$100,000 on the reckless homicide charge. He is charged as a repeat offender, which could add another six years, if convicted. Felony bail jumping carries an additional six years in prison and up to \$10,000, if found guilty.
