Girls Become Strong Through Jazzercise

– Program Offered Free Of Charge For Girls Ages 16-21

Every day of the week, exercise enthusiasts can be found dancing their way into shape at the Jazzercise center located at Hon-E-Kor Country Club in Kewaskum.

Set to Top 40 music, participants step in time, all moving in synch, burning off calories as they go.

Jazzercise has been around for some 47 years, but this year it is opening up to a whole new generation, as the worldwide program is offered free of charge to girls ages 16 to 21.

Dubbed GirlForce, the program aims to empower young women by giving them a place to get fit, learn healthy habits, and find a place they belong in their communities.

"Last June at the State of Women Summit hosted

by the White House, so many amazing speakers talked about the importance of helping girls as they grow up and a light bulb went off for me," says CEO and Founder Judi Sheppard Missett.

Launched in January 2017, participating Jazzercise locations encourage teens and college-aged women to join the movement and learn to "dance their own path," Missett said.

"As a mom of two girls, I know that young women confront unique challenges," added Jazzercise, Inc. President Shanna Missett Nelson. "We know what physical activity does for us. We hope that offering girls a safe place for them to get fit can help."

Kiwanis Park Swim Pond To Get New Amenities

It looks like there will be more activities offered for all ages at the Kiwanis Park swim pond in Kewaskum this summer.

Plans are in the works for the village to purchase a 10-foot tall water slide to be placed in the deep end of the swim pond. In addition, the village plans to add an obstacle course in the pond's medium depth

area near the pier, which would be composed of individual slides and pieces that swimmers can crawl over and around.

For younger children, plans are to include a floating raft that features a splash area for the pond's shallow end.

Representatives from Commercial Recreation Specialists (CRS), a company that offers water recreation products, met

with the Kewaskum Park and Recreation committee on Friday, March 24, to demonstrate available amenities. Village employees, along with community

and pool committee members were also present at the two-hour meeting.

Local Organizations Learn About Drug Abuse And Prevention

Just eight years ago, there was no heroin problem in Kewaskum.

Since then, however, the drug has made its way into the area.

There currently are not a lot of dealers in the area, but there is a usage problem in the area.

Such was the message that Washington County Sheriff Dale Schmidt and Detective Mark Sette gave to members of the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club

and the American Legion Post 384 Monday night.

"Opiates don't care how old you are, how much money you make or how pretty you are," Sette told the group.

Anyone can become addicted. Some develop an addiction after being prescribed with a pain medication. Others start out using marijuana as a recreational drug and progress into heroin usage.

Former Badger Player Josh Gasser Coming To Kewaskum

This Saturday, April 1, there will be a basketball competition taking place at Kewaskum High School. The event will feature former Wisconsin Badger Basketball player, Josh Gasser. The proceeds raised throughout this event will be given to the Trapp Family, who lost all their belongings in a house fire.

Registration for the event begins at 8:30 a.m. in the high school field house. All athletes will need an adult partner to compete with them. There is no cost for the event, but monetary donations are greatly encouraged. Josh Gasser will be speaking to those in attendance at 9 a.m.

"The focus of the talk will definitely be on intangible parts of basketball and life. Having a strong mentality where you are tough, hard working, disciplined, and always have a positive attitude can help you and the people around you in so many ways," Gasser said.

Following Gasser's talk, the free throw competition will begin at 9:30 a.m. and

continue until a winner is determined.

Each team participant will shoot five free throws; the teams are placed in a bracket to determine the winner. Various prizes will be awarded to age division winners along with a chance to shoot against Josh Gasser. A raffle will also be taking place with various items including a signed Green Bay Packers Donald Driver jersey. Only basketball participants and their partner are allowed to compete, but community members may attend the speech and participate in raffles.

The Kewaskum Youth Basketball board, along with the help of coaches, worked to put the event together.

"I became involved with this event through a few members of the Kewaskum Basketball Club reaching out to me. It is awesome working with kids and I tried to make it fit in my schedule so I could come and help out," Gasser said.

"The idea was brought up by Kory Dogs, the KYB

president, as he wanted to incorporate a fun basketball day event instead of the formal banquet that KYB has done in the past," said the Kewaskum girls varsity coach Russell Thull. "The hope is to bring the community together for friendly competition and to celebrate a successful season."

The event is expected to be well attended.

"I'm really looking forward to it - and hope others are too. There seems to be a 'buzz' in the schools and community about it, which is great! I love the idea of kids partnering with a parent, grandparent, teacher, coach, aunt/uncle, mentor, etc. and competing as a team. The nice thing with shooting free throws is that pretty much anybody can do it," Kory Dogs said.

Gasser is looking forward to the event as well.

"I am excited for the upcoming event and meeting everyone. I have done stuff like this in the past and it has always been a rewarding experience," Gasser said.



Shoe Drive Underway

Every year, 20 billion shoes are manufactured. 95% of them end up in landfills. 46.5 million people in the United States live in poverty. Of those, 16.1 million are children. The shoes go to areas that have had natural disasters as tornadoes, hurricanes or where basic human needs need to be met. Shoes will be sent to "Soles4Souls" for distribution. Soles4Souls has the mission of wearing out poverty through short term relief and long term solutions. They act as second wave responders providing footwear and clothing to those in need during

times of disaster. According to their tax returns for the year 2016, 96.7% of money taken in by the organization was spent on their program. Their administrative expenses were 1.5%. Less than \$0.02 for every dollar raised was spent on administration. Each member of the board of directors contributes financially to the organization. Soles4Souls holds a Gold Star Rating with GuideStar, the world's largest source of information on nonprofit organizations.

In the United States, Soles4Souls has partnered with the Big Brothers Big Sisters Organization to deliver shoes for needy children. Employees of Soles4Souls have worked directly with children from Big Brothers Big Sisters to size shoes correctly. Since 2006, Soles4Souls has collected and distributed 30 million shoes to those in need in all 50 states of the United States and 127 countries around the world.

Soles4Souls is using the idea of a microenterprise effort to create jobs and prop up economies for nations rather than flooding them with free shoes. Recently, Soles4Souls has expanded into Moldova, a nation wedged between Romania and Ukraine. It is a nation that is so poor that one of its well-known exports is women, who are sold into international sex trade. A wholesaler puts used shoes in thrift stores there. Those stores help fund the nation's foster care system and provide a place where women can work once they are too old for foster care. This helps bring economic change to individuals and families. This is the third year that The Silbernagel Group is supporting Soles4Souls. They currently have 10 pairs of shoes and counting. Can they make it to 300 pairs of shoes? PREVENTING HEARTBURN

Maintain a healthy diet; excess pounds can put pressure on the abdomen, forcing acid up into the esophagus. From The Desk Of The Superintendent

The Kewaskum School District capital project has become a topic of discussion with the upcoming school board elections on April 4th. With a number of opinions being shared, it is prudent to identify the factual information concerning the project.

The referendum question that was passed in November specifically identified the middle and high school buildings as the areas that needed to be addressed. By law, money can only be used for these two buildings and spent to remodel or have new construction.

Bray Architects was approved by the Board of Education, unanimously, to lead the district through the entire process in May of 2015.

CD Smith was approved unanimously by the board, to be the construction manager in August of 2015.

The long range planning committee (LRPC), made up of over 50 community members, board members, and district staff, was established to study the facility needs and make a recommendation on a plan to meet the identified needs of the high school and middle school facilities to the board. The first meeting was held in September of 2016 and all of these meetings were open to the public to attend. The committee continues to meet with the most recent meeting being held this past Tuesday, March 28th.

The board unanimously approved the recommendation made by the LRPC to ask the community for funds, not to exceed \$28,420,000 in borrowing, in August 2016. This was done through a referendum question being put on the ballot, coinciding with the presidential election, in November 2016.

The exact wording of the question was "BE IT RESOLVED by the School Board of the Kewaskum Area School District, Fond du Lac, Sheboygan, and Washington Counties, Wisconsin, that there shall be issued pursuant to Chapter 67, Wisconsin

Statutes, general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$28,420,000 for the public purpose of paying the cost of site improvements, new construction, renovation and modernization of Kewaskum Middle School and Kewaskum High School and acquiring furnishings, fixtures, and equipment related to the same."

If you have ever been involved in a building project, no matter the scope, it entails a great deal of planning and revisions to the design as more information becomes available. In this particular building project, millions of dollars need to be spent on surveying and engineering as well as architecture.

This is only possible after the referendum question is passed. In a perfect world, the conceptual drawings at the beginning of a project would be spot on, but that isn't the reality. Yet, the community needs to have some type of an idea of what the capital project might look like before agreeing to spend a huge amount of money on the project. This is one of the reasons Bray and CD Smith were hired as consultants early on in the project. Throughout the many presentations made by Bray, with literally hundreds of updates/changes, they always emphasized that every design is conceptual until the board approves the final drawing which we hope to have before the board in the upcoming weeks.

A good example of this is the recent building project at Holy Trinity, where the design changed dramatically over the course of the project, ultimately constructing a beautiful new facility. Credit needs to go to the design team that stayed committed to building an addition that the Parish can be proud of.

Our project is no different, and I applaud the community members, board members, and staff members who have given unselfishly of their time to design a plan that we can all be proud of. Special mention needs to

go to our facilities director, Doug Franzen, who has embraced this project and is determined to make it a great success.

I encourage everyone to contact friends and neighbors who are on the LRPC for more information or please feel free to contact a board member or Mr. Franzen if you have questions. Additionally, many of the CD Smith Construction workers live in our community so please feel free to contact one of them as well.

Every April there are seats on local school boards that come up for re-election. In Kewaskum, we have a seven member board, which means there are minimally two seats that get voted on each year. Every third year (this year), there is an additional seat that is up for election, so we have a total of three seats. You have an opportunity, and constitutional right, to vote for three candidates.

Consequently, this year's board election is very important to the children we serve and the nine communities that make up the Kewaskum School District. I also encourage you to make an informed decision and vote on April 4th. Information can be obtained from our website by looking at the most recent school survey that was conducted and was shared this past June. You can also find the KSD Strategic Plan for this school year as well as events that are happening, accolades the school district has received, and much more.

We recognize Andrew Johnson, owner of the Kewaskum Statesman, for holding a candidate forum as well as including the candidate's biographies in their most recent issue to help you get to know the candidates. The Kewaskum Difference is alive and well because of the support you have shown us and the commitment we all share toward making this a great place for children to learn and people to live or work. Your informed vote will keep us moving forward!



Judo And Its Local History – Topic At UW-WC’s Scholar Sip

– Jon Sanfilippo Will Discuss At April 12 Forum

Judo in West Bend is more than just the physical sport. Much more, according to Jon Sanfilippo, who has served as director, coach and instructor of the successful West Bend judo program for the past 50 years. “Judo lays a foundation for a better community, both within the University setting and in the community at large,” according to Jon. With roots in the West Bend Recreation Department, Jon will share more on how the judo program received its local start, some of the people in the program, along with player highlights – including the first U.S. woman judoka to win a silver medal in the 1988 Olympics - and how it has become woven into the community. The one-hour presentation takes

place on Wednesday, April 12, at 3:30 p.m. in the library at UW-Washington County.

While judo is an Olympic sport, those attending will also learn how it differs from standard sports. According to Sanfilippo, who holds the rank of 8th degree black belt, “Judo involves moral training and has mind-body components incorporated in it. One of the main mottos of judo is ‘mutual welfare and benefit.’ Another motto is ‘maximum efficiency with minimum effort.’” He will explore how these concepts can be useful in life – not just in the sport of judo.

An alumnus of UW-Washington County, Jon then transferred to UW-Milwaukee, where he completed his bachelor’s



Jon Sanfilippo and master’s degrees in education as well as a law degree from Marquette University. For the past ten years, he has served as Clerk of Courts for the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Wisconsin and is planning to retire from that position at the end of April. His retirement marks the end

of a distinguished 40-year career in the law and Courts, including 13 years as Washington County Clerk of Circuit Courts. He and his wife Pam, reside in Slinger. They have three daughters and two grandchildren.


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Wild Poisonous Mushrooms

The next program in the Evening with Nature series at the Kettle Moraine State Forest - Northern Unit will be "Wild Edible and Poisonous Mushrooms." The program will be held on Thursday, April 13, from 7 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. at the Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center. The Ice Age Visitor Center is located off Hwy 67 half mile west of Dundee. The program is free, but donations are always gratefully accepted. Spring, summer, and fall are great times of year to go mushroom hunting,

especially if it has been a wet season. Fungi come in all shapes and colors from the white puff balls to the brilliant sulphur mushrooms and craggy coral fungus. Many people enjoy the beauty of the wide array of fungi, but others enjoy collecting many edible wild mushrooms. Even though mushroom collecting has been called the most dangerous of outdoor sports, foraging for edible fungi in the Wisconsin woods continues to grow in popularity.

Continued From... Kiwanis Park Swim Pond To Get New Amenities

On February 20, the village board approved spending \$10,000 on shade structures and \$15,000 for inflatable amenities for the swim pond. The approval came after hearing a recommendation from the village's pool committee, which met monthly over the past year to research ways to increase attendance at the swim pond.

At last week's meeting, CRS representatives demonstrated what the inflatable amenities look like, how they work, the difference in the brands. They discussed warranties as well as how the products are installed.

CRS originally presented a \$25,000 proposal last fall to the pool committee for the swim pond.

However, after last week's meeting, CRS agreed to limit that amount to \$11,000.

That will free up some money to cover additional engineering that will be required for the shade structures, Village Administrator Matt Heiser said.

Once the inflatable products are purchased, village employees will

install the pieces into the swim pond.

The products that will be located in the deep end will be anchored with car tires filled with concrete, Heiser said. Manhole covers will probably be used to anchor the products in the shallow end.

The committee hopes to come up with a process to make sure the pieces don't get overwhelmed or develop long lines, Heiser said.

To ensure safety, community member Lloyd Spaeth is taking up a collection to purchase life vests to be available for anyone who uses the new water features.

The life vests cost approximately \$15 apiece. The Park and Recreation committee estimates that at least \$800 will be needed to provide enough life vests.

Local Organizations Learn About Drug Abuse And Prevention

However it happens, there are things that loved ones can be on the lookout for if they suspect that someone is using drugs, Sette said.

Some of the warning signs that someone is using an opiate include: noticeable change in behavior, lack of interest in favored activities, poor job/school performance, withdrawal from friends and family, secretive behavior, lack of personal hygiene and abnormally aggressive behavior.

Sometimes an addict will leave things lying around that can telltale (have never seen it used this way) signs of drug use. These could be things such as small pieces of aluminum foil or plastic sandwich baggies that have the corners missing, Sette said. Other drug paraphernalia such as needles, cooking devices, cotton balls and tourniquets can also be warning signs.

Sette showed a slide presentation to the group Monday evening. It included pictures of drug users to demonstrate how

appearances can change with drug use.

"I used to have to get these pictures off the internet," Sette said. "Unfortunately, now I can get these from our local jail."

Sette told the group how the drug has permeated through the local community. There have been robberies and car crashes. Court cases have involved local dealers and users.

And there have been deaths.

Sette shared this 911 call transcript with the group.

Dispatcher: 911 What's your emergency?

Parent: Um, I need an ambulance to my home.

Dispatch: OK....

Parent: Um, I went to wake up my daughter and she um, isn't... It doesn't look like she's breathing and she's got fluids coming out of her mouth... Um, she's blue. She's got blue lips.

Dispatch: OK.

Parent: She's blue all over...

Dispatch: Ok. Hold on....

The actual recording of

that call reveals the emotional status of the parent, Sette said.

Emergency personnel now carry Narcan in order to treat heroin overdoses and save lives.

However, the best way to save lives most likely is through prevention and family support.

To help educate the public, the Sheriff's Office gives presentations such as the one it gave Monday night to various organizations and schools.

Everyone can do their part to help prevent drug abuse.

Medications should be locked up, Sette said.

"Maybe your grandchildren aren't using drugs, but they may bring friends over who are," he explained.

Medications that are not being used can be dropped off at collection centers, such as the Kewaskum Police Department.

Girls Become Strong Through Jazzercise

In Kewaskum there are about 17 members currently taking advantage of the GirlForce program, according to Kate Mueller, owner of the Kewaskum Jazzercise located at Hon-E-Kor Country Club. Many of the girls have been exposed to Jazzercise before because the Kewaskum program has been visiting gym classes at area high schools for the last couple of years. The program has also visited the Boys and Girls Club of Kewaskum.

Jazzercise has been attracting all ages in Kewaskum. Currently participants range in age from 12 to 80, Mueller said.

"There are whole generations that come to the classes. We have lots of moms and daughters coming together. And we have a grandma, mom and daughter that come all the time. It is pretty sweet," Mueller said.

Mueller herself started going to Jazzercise with her mother.

In 2012, her friend was getting recertified as a Jazzercise instructor, and Mueller and her mother asked her to do some classes at Hon-Kor.

Classes started up three times a week in the dining room there.

The following year, the friend suggested that Mueller begin teaching as well.

So Mueller became certified and took over the program. The Jazzercise building was built on at Hon-E-Kor in spring 2014. "And then it kind of erupted," Mueller said. "I started putting girls through workshops and they would go to trainings in Milwaukee and Chicago."

More instructors meant more classes. And more classes meant more customers because they had more options, Mueller said.

The Kewaskum Jazzercise currently offers 29 classes a week. The routines can be done as either high or low impact, Mueller said.

"If you don't want to run it out or jump, you can march. You can take it down with no hop," she said.

The GirlForce is a beneficial addition, Mueller said.

"GirlForce makes a difference in the life of the

teen girls by introducing them to a healthy, fun and fit lifestyle," she said.

For some, Jazzercise was not what they expected.

"I think it's a little better than what they had thought it would be because when you hear Jazzercise, you think of the 1980s and leggings and things like that, so I'm sure they had that image in their mind before they came. After they were here, they were probably blown away with how hard it is and how many calories you can burn," Mueller said.

Regardless of the age, there is a common denominator for Jazzercise enthusiasts.

"If you like to dance, you will love these classes," Mueller said. "There is a variety of music and it's a safe environment. And there is no judging."

To join a class, simply come to any class at any time and talk to an instructor.



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

In the past two seasons, the Kewaskum High fast-pitch team has posted an impressive 41-12 record and made a big move to enter the upper echelon of its conferences. The Indians finished second (at 12-2) in the old Eastern Wisconsin Conference in 2015 and then last year in new East Central League, they took third (10-4) behind the co-champion powerhouses, Waupun and Winneconne, who were both 13-1.

Still, there are a few additions the Indians would like to tack on their resume — winning a conference crown and getting to the sectionals and state, a goal that has been blocked for the past four years in a row by good Grafton teams.

Could this be the year when the Indians add one or both? Coach Jeff Gosse, starting his 17th season as head coach, is confident it can be. "If we stay away from injuries, our chances are good. This is a very good team."

Gosse has seven returning starters and nine returning letter winners, and none are more important than the sophomore-senior pitching duo of Kennedy Lehn and Bre Trepes. The two combined for 19 wins a year ago, with Lehn finishing at 11-6 with most of the losses coming by just a run or two.

Lehn has some wicked pitches that helped her pile up an impressive 226 strikeouts with just 41 walks. When asked how Lehn was looking in the pre-season, Gosse said, "She doesn't pitch in practice. She practices with her pitching coach, so I don't need to have her pitch in practice." He is certain she will have a big year.

Lehn is not only good defensively for the Indians. She's great at the plate as her 2016 stats show. She was the team's No. 2 hitter, going 30x81 for a .432 average, and had the most RBIs (runs batted in) for KHS, with 24.

"The lion's share of it (pitching) will go to Kennedy," Gosse said, but Trepes, one of the four seniors on this year's team and the all-East Central second team utility player last year, will continue to pitch and will take over the starting role at first base.

One of the big changes in the lineup comes at catcher where senior Brittany Williams (second team all-EC) was returning but has moved to left field. "She's a great catcher, but she volunteered to go out there," Gosse said, figuring this is a good move for the team because sophomore Leah Theusch is also a solid catcher. When asked if she has a good arm to gun down would-be stealers, Gosse said, "Yes, she does."

The rest of the infielders

will include senior Kenzie Lehn at second, sophomore Ashley Trapp at short and junior Skylar Donath at third.

This will be Lehn's fourth year at second, according to Gosse, who said, "She played her first game as a freshman there, and she hasn't moved." About the elder Lehn's specific talents, Gosse said, "She's got a great glove. She's a good hitter ... my best bunter by far."

Donath played some at short and some at third in '16, but this year Gosse said, "We're just going to keep her at third."

The newcomer Trapp is ready to start for the Indians, according to Gosse, who said, "She's got a good steady glove and a good arm, and she has a good knowledge of the game." The latter is an attribute many of his players have, Gosse said, explaining, "Their softball IQs are very, very high, and so are their grade points."

Two regulars, sophomore Maddie Geidel (first team all-EC last year) and junior Emma Debelak, return to the outfield but have exchanged positions, with Geidel going to right

and Debelak taking over in center. "This is the best defensive outfield I've ever had, and this team has a chance to be the best defensive team I've ever had," the coach said.

Gosse has senior Sydney Rosenthal returning to back up in the outfield, while junior Megan Marx can play at first base or catch, and junior Sydney Donath will provide depth at several positions.

Three freshmen, Abbey Baumann, Sydney Kertscher and Kaitlyn Leitheiser, will rotate between the varsity and JV teams. Baumann is an outfielder; Kertscher is an infielder, and Leitheiser can play eight different positions, according to Gosse, who said, "What they have in common, they are all fast. They are going to come up and be our greyhounds."

When it comes to top contenders in the EC Conference, Gosse points to Waupun and feels Winneconne might be good again, too. He has his own team contending, noting, "The first time we got on the field we were game ready. This is a really good group of girls. It should be

a pretty exciting season."

Ken Franke will serve as Gosse's volunteer assistant coach, while Jenny Kopf, who has previously coached youth softball groups, takes the reins of the JV program.

The Indians were scheduled to open the season against long-time arch rival Campbellsport on March 28 at Campbellsport and have a date with the Lady Wolves of Winneconne this afternoon (March 30). KHS opens its home season on April 4 vs. Ripon. All three are East Central contests.

KHS plays its home games at Kewaskum Kiwanis Park. Start time is 4:45 p.m.

KIWC Members Bring Home A Pair Of Fourths

Members of the Kewaskum Indians Wrestling Club came home with a pair of fourth places from the annual WWF Kids Folkstyle Championships held at the Alliant Center in Madison March 24-25.

Kannon Muckerheide finished fourth at 175 pounds in the competition for boys born in 2002-'03, and rookie Easton Derge also earned a fourth at 120 pounds for wrestlers born in 2009-'10.

"It was pretty good," KIWC coach Scott Rhoads said after the long two days of competition, pointing out some KIWC wrestlers were competing in tough weight classes, and they all gained valuable experience.

Muckerheide, who will be a freshman at Kewaskum High next fall, started off with back-to-back pins over Hunter Underwood (1:11) of Fort Atkinson Youth and Liam Herrick (2:53) of Whithall before losing a tough match in the semis vs. Carter Grewe of Abby/Colby.

Muckerheide led the match 2-0, but with about 40 seconds remaining, Grewe took him down and pinned him in 3:52. "He (Muckerheide) had an underhook and it looked like he could finish off the match," Rhoads said about the match, reporting he got his head off to the wrong side and the one mistake was costly. "He

got pinned out of exhaustion," the coach said.

That sent the KIWC representative to the wrestling back where he defeated Parkview's Nathan Moynihan 4-2 in overtime before losing his final match to Milan Monchilovich of Cumberland by major decision 12-3.

"Technically I think he could have taken second (place)." Rhoads said about Muckerheide, whose cousin, Alaric Muckerheide won the 150-pound title in the 2004-'05 deivision while wrestling for the Sheboygan Falls club. Their dads, Chad and Todd Muckerheide, their grandpa George Muckerheide and their uncle Chuck Muckerheide, all had successful careers at KHS.

Derge started his tournament with a bye, then lost a 7-2 decision to Mitchell Boeder of Kewaunee, sending him to the consolation bracket where he received another bye and then posted consecutive pins over Garrett Dagestad (:36) of St. Croix Falls and Caleb Vanderlangenber (:38) of Antigo.

In the battle for third place, Derge was pinned by Jackson Meyer of NGL in 2:43.

"He's a strong little kid," Rhoads said of Derge, adding, "For a first-year kid, he's shown great position."

Xane Kleinke (120 pounds, 2008-'09) did not place but finished 2-2. His

two wins came via a 6-0 decision over Will Clements of the West Salem Badgers and a 36-second pin over Landon Schulz of Oregon.

Rhoads envisions Kleinke and Derge battling it out in practices when the two get to high school.

Eli Ogi (80 pounds, 2008-'09) finished 1-2 in the meet, pinning Cael Koenig of Prairie du Chien in 1:00 for his only win, while Jadon Rhoads (135 pounds at 2002-'03) eighth grader had a tough night Friday, losing both of his matches by pin.

Ogi "showed some great heart," Rhoads said, adding his son was in a tough weight class and was hampered by the injuries he sustained during the season.

Brent Krecjarek (63 pounds in the 2006-'07), who belongs to KIWC but wrestles for Askren Academy went 1-2. His only win was a 5-2 decision over Myke Terry of Rising Stars.

Braeden Scoles, who lives in Kewaskum but trains with X-Factor in Manitowoc, claimed the 100-pound championship for boys born in 2004-'05, winning his first three matches by major decision, including an 11-0 win over Tristan Drier of Cross Trained which earned him a spot in the finals.

The title match vs. Aiden Brosinski of DeSoto was a dandy match, with Scoles emerging with a 9-7 victory in overtime.

INFORMATION TO VOTERS

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the voter presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using an electronic ballot marking device ("Automark") to mark an optical scan ballot, the voter shall touch the screen at the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen at "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen at "no" if opposed to the question.

If the voter spoils an optical scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve so the marks do not show. After casting his or her vote, the voter shall leave the booth, insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. If a central count system is used, the voter shall insert the ballot in the ballot box and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

WI's Tornado & Severe Weather Awareness Week April 17-21

Schools, businesses, families, and individuals have two opportunities to test their emergency plans during statewide tornado drills on April 20, 2017. The drills are part of the annual spring severe weather campaign to encourage everyone in Wisconsin to be ready for possible tornadoes and severe weather.

Governor Walker has declared April 17-21, 2017, as Wisconsin's Tornado & Severe Weather Awareness Week. Wisconsin Emergency Management, the National Weather Service (NWS) and the Wisconsin Broadcasters Association (WBA) have once again teamed up to sponsor the statewide tornado drills scheduled for Thursday, April 20.

On April 20th, a mock tornado watch will be issued at 1 p.m. followed by a statewide mock tornado warning at 1:45 p.m. Many radio and TV stations across the state will issue the test tornado warnings.

In addition, mock alerts will be issued on NOAA Weather Radios and many communities will sound their tornado sirens to test their emergency severe weather plans. Later, a mock tornado warning will be issued at 6:45 p.m. to give families and second shift workers a chance to practice their emergency plans.

According to the NWS, Wisconsin averages 23 tor-

nadoes annually. Last year, there were 16 tornado touchdowns in the state. All of the tornadoes were either an EF0 or EF1. However, it's not a question of if we will have a violent storm, it's a matter of when.

The tornado drill will take place even if the sky is cloudy, dark and or rainy. If actual severe storms are expected in the state on Thursday, April 20, the tornado drills will be postponed until Friday, April 21, with the same times. If severe storms are possible Friday, the drills will be cancelled.

2017 Tornado And Severe Weather Awareness Drills Scheduled For Thursday April 20

The 2017 Tornado Drills will consist of a mock tornado watch and a mock tornado warnings issued for all of Wisconsin. This is a great opportunity for your school, business and community to practice your emergency plans.

Drill Schedule

1 p.m. — National Weather Service issues a mock tornado watch for all of Wisconsin (a watch means tornadoes are possible in your area. Remain alert for approaching storms).

1:45 p.m. — National Weather Service issues mock tornado warning for all of Wisconsin (A warning means a tornado has been sighted or indicated on weather radar. Move to a safe place immediately).

2 p.m. — End of 1:45 p.m. mock tornado warning drill

6:45 p.m. — National Weather Service issues a mock tornado warning for all of Wisconsin.

7 p.m. — End of 6:45 p.m. mock tornado warning drill

The tornado drills will take place even if the sky is cloudy, dark and/or rainy. If actual severe storms are expected in the state on Thursday, April 20, the tornado drills will be postponed until Friday, April 21, with the same times. If severe storms are possible Friday, the drills will be cancelled. Any changes will be issued to local media as well as posted on the ReadyWisconsin website at <http://readywisconsin.wi.gov>.

Updates will also be posted on Facebook (www.facebook.com/ReadyWisconsin), Twitter (www.twitter.com/ReadyWisconsin)

and Instagram (www.instagram.com/ReadyWisconsin).

This is a great opportunity for you to practice your tornado emergency plan with family, friends, and co-workers. Schools will also participate in the drill. During storm season, follow this message: Listen, Act and Live. Don't ignore watches and warnings. Listen and take action. Every second counts. Don't wait... go to a safe place right away!

Many local radio, TV and cable stations will be participating in the drills. Television viewers and radio station listeners will hear a message at 1:45 p.m. and 6:45 p.m. indicating that "This is a test." The mock tornado warnings will last about one minute on radio and TV stations across Wisconsin and when the test is finished, stations will return to normal programming.

In addition, alerts for both the mock tornado watch and warnings will be issued over NOAA weather radios. Be sure your weather radio is turned on for this test. If the alarm on your weather radio does not go off for this test, check your weather radio's programming and quality of reception.

Tornado Safety At Home, Work, Or At Play Listen, Act, And Live
• In a home or building, avoid windows. Move to a

basement, and get under a sturdy table or the stairs. If a basement is not available, move to a small interior room or hallway on the lowest floor and cover yourself with towels, blankets or pillows. If possible, get under a sturdy table, desk or counter. Put as many walls as possible between you and the storm. Wearing a bike helmet will help protect your head.

• If outdoors, seek shelter in a sturdy building. If you cannot get to shelter, stay in your vehicle with the seatbelt on and place your head below the windows. Do not seek shelter under an overpass.

• Mobile homes, even if tied down, offer little protection from tornadoes. You should leave a mobile home and go to the designated storm shelter or the lowest floor of a sturdy nearby building.

• At school, go to the interior hall or room. Crouch low, head down, and protect the back of your head with your arms. Stay away from windows and large open rooms like gyms and auditoriums.

Tornado Safety Before the Storm

• Develop a plan for you and your family for home, work, school and outdoors. Know the safest shelter areas in multiple locations.

• Have frequent drills.

• Keep a disaster supply kit in your home including water, food that won't spoil and

needs no heat to serve, first-aid kit, NOAA weather radio (also known as an emergency weather radio), a flashlight and special items for children, pets and elderly family members.

• Be sure your weather radio is working properly. Spring is a great time to install fresh batteries.

Tornado Watch — Severe thunderstorms with tornadoes are possible in your area. Remain alert for approaching storms. Be prepared to move to safety if a warning is issued. Know what counties are in the watch area by listening to NOAA Weather Radio All Hazards of local radio or television stations.

Severe Thunderstorm Watch — Thunderstorms with large hail and damaging winds are possible. Be prepared to move to safety if a warning is issued.

Tornado Warning — A tornado has been sighted or indicated by weather radar. Move to a place of safety now!

Severe Thunderstorm Warning — A thunderstorm with large hail and damaging winds has been reported or indicated by weather radar.

• Warnings indicate imminent danger to life and property to those in the path of the storm

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Daniel's Landscaping Wins Award On Area Residence

Daniel's Landscaping won a bronze award from the Wisconsin Landscape Contractors Association's Excellence in Landscaping Awards on a landscaping project they did at the Holt residence in the West Bend area. On Friday, March 3, at the Wisconsin Club in Milwaukee, the Campbelsport company received their bronze award for the work.

Owner Dan Stukenberg explained his landscaping on this project:

"The house was newly constructed on a steep sloping property that abutted an overgrown wooded edge. Our landscape focus was the backyard. We began by cleaning out the edge of the lot, which was full of hazardous trees and overgrown brush.

"A step system was needed for access to the backyard from the south side of the house. Chilton limestone steps were installed and complementing colored boulders were used to line and maintain steep slopes. A series of plantings were used to further stabilize the soils in these beds. We adjusted

the grade leading to the back from the north side of the house to be more gentle, allowing mower and future vehicle access such as tractors for maintenance.

"A growing family and changing needs led to a larger addition above the existing concrete patio. Footings were brought further out necessitating an expanded patio. As a carry through of materials, Chilton limestone was used for that expansion as well as the pathways which exited into other parts of the lawn.

"Due to the sloped terrain, we created a level area of lawn adjacent to the patios and then dropped down to a lower plane to build an additional area on the edge of the yard for a fire pit. In the process of creating this lower area, retaining walls were needed due to steep banks. An additional Chilton limestone step system provides comfortable access to the fire pit.

"Rotten granite was used for the fire pit area to maintain a natural look and for cost effectiveness. A split rail fence serves the

purpose of defining the borders of this outdoor living area. Careful attention was needed around the mature, massive Shagbark Hickory tree over four feet in diameter that bordered the area so as not to damage it during the construction process.

"Several varieties of Big Leaf Hosta, ferns and Coral Bells were planted to contrast with the fine textured woodland area beyond. Several different evergreens such as Norway Spruce, Yews and Boxwoods were planted along the borders of the lawn which also offer winter interest and wildlife cover.

"A steep, dangerous sloping yard was made more accessible and easier to maintain with the combination of step and wall systems. We succeeded in providing the client with a more attractive yard as well as expanded and useful outdoor living spaces."

Daniel's Landscaping is based in Campbelsport and has won many awards over the years for owner Dan Stukenberg's landscape designs.




