Kewaskum School Board Reviews Nepotism Policies

– School Board Member May Have Conflict Of Interest

Tim Ramthun is a member of the Kewaskum School Board. His son-in-law, Doug Franzen, works as the building and grounds director for the school district.

That family tie could mean that Ramthun will need to abstain from voting or discussing issues dealing with Franzen, such as employee

salaries, benefits or the district's buildings and grounds department.

The issue of nepotism, which is favoritism shown on the basis of a family relationship, came to surface as the policy committee met Monday evening to update the district's policy manual.

Policy does allow relatives of board members to be employed by the school district.

"However, if a board member will benefit financially either directly or indirectly, the board member may not participate in any way in the discussion or vote on any matter relating to said employment," said School Board Member Mary Miller, who chairs the district's Policy Committee.

Village Considers Allowing Second Tattoo Studio

– New Tattoo Business Hopes Open In Kewaskum

A second tattoo studio may soon be allowed to open in the Village of Kewaskum.

At its next meeting on Monday, April 17, the Village Board may decide to change an ordinance so that two tattoo shops can be located in the village. Currently, only one tattoo studio is permitted for every 20,000 people

living in the village.

"That obviously is a large number. The village is only 4,000 people right now. The point in which we will reach 20,000 people is unforeseen in the future," Village Administrator Matt Heiser told the village board last week.

When the ordinance was originally created, the intention was probably to restrict the number of tat-

toos to one in perpetuity, Heiser said.

"The perception of tattoos has changed over the years," Heiser said. "At one point in time, there may have been a stigma attached to them. Not anymore; now they are very common."

Renee Pastorius runs the village's sole tattoo establishment.

Area Prepares For Severe Weather Emergencies

– Tornado Drill Planned For April 30

Tornadoes can hit Wisconsin at any time of the year, but the peak time is in June.

"It's not a matter of if, but when, that next disaster happens," said Tim Halbuch, a warning coordination meteorologist for the National Weather Service Milwaukee. Halbuch recently trained

85 people who live in the area on how to spot severe weather. The course was offered free of charge at the West Bend City Hall.

On Thursday, April 20, Washington County will participate in a statewide tornado drill.

The drill will begin with a "test" tornado watch issued at 1 p.m. and a "test" tornado warning to

be issued at approximately 1:45 p.m. This portion of the drill will conclude at 2 p.m.

Then, there will be a second "test" tornado warning issued at 6:45 p.m. This will allow families to practice their home emergency procedures as well as the second shift of area businesses/agencies.



District policy does not permit board members to engage in or have a financial or other interest either directly or indirectly in any activity that conflicts or raises a reasonable question of conflict with his or her duties and responsibilities in the school system.

"The attorney for the school district pointed out four areas that he would want to be very careful about as a board, as you move forward, as we decide whatever we are going to do with this," Superintendent James Smasal told the School Board Monday night.

First, Ramthun may be excluded from the supervision or discipline of any custodial people or discussions of them since those employees are directly under Franzen's watch, according to attorney Tony Renning, Smasal said.

Second, the board may want to prevent Ramthun from having anything to do with employee benefits.

Third, administrative contracts and evaluations may be a conflict of interest because Franzen is an administrator.

Finally, the board may decide to not allow Ramthun to deal with any building and grounds contracts because Franzen is called into discussing and/or meeting with outside vendors, according to Renning.

Attorney Deborah Strigenz, who serves on the district's Policy Committee, concurred with those recommenda-

tions, Miller said.

"We are going to look at this in the future at our next policy meeting and ask for policies from other school districts," said School Board Member Jay Fisher, who also serves on the Policy Committee.

A similar issue made headlines last month in West Bend when Therese Sizer, whose daughter is a teacher for the West Bend School District, resigned from the West Bend School Board.

Sizer announced on March 20 that she was resigning because the district's nepotism policy prevented her from voting on the majority of items. She indicated that she felt that she would need to recuse herself so much that she would not be able to fulfill her responsibilities as a board member.

The West Bend School District's policy regarding nepotism is similar to Kewaskum's.

To fill the vacancy, the West Bend School District is expected to post the opening in the next week and will accept applications for a two-week period. The West Bend Board will interview and select a candidate to fill the position until the next election.

The topic of nepotism came up at the Kewaskum School Board meeting Monday night after Ramthun questioned the district's monthly payroll and bills.

Ramthun asked why the payroll bills were on various dates throughout the month. He also wanted a

more detailed breakdown of who received payroll checks.

"When you present \$1.2 million, and it is just line items of expenditures for Internal Revenue Service and insurance and payroll and things like that, how many people does it cover? And if you can qualify that answer with a number, can you break that down? Is it administrative staff? Is it professional staff? Is it support staff? Is it the board? Is it retirement folks? I don't know what this all covers," Ramthun said at the meeting.

School board policy requires the board to review the payroll monthly, with a listing of all payments, according to the district's Business Manager Julie Thoreson. The monthly business manager's report outlines expenses, Thoreson said.

Last month, after stating the need to see a more comprehensive detailing of expenses, Ramthun voted against approving both the monthly payroll of nearly \$1.2 million and the accounts payable in the amount of about \$428,000.

To help all school board members better understand the budget and the payroll and expense accounts, School Board President Troy Hanson suggested Monday night that a workshop be held during the summer.

Ramthun also asked Monday night about the \$20,000 in this month's expense report that went

toward tuition reimbursement and professional development.

"Do we have something active? How many do we have involved? How many participating? Is it open to everyone?" Ramthun asked.

School Superintendent James Smasal explained that part of the \$20,000 was for a calculus class. Students paid the district for the class, and the district in turn paid the amount to the university.

Another portion of the item in question was the \$3,250 that the district owed in open enrollment fees this year for one student to attend an alternative education program in West Bend called GPS. Several years ago, the school board approved supporting two students in that program each year.

The final portion of the \$20,000 amount that Ramthun questioned was for ALICE Training, which is professional development that Franzen had requested that the district provide. The program consists of online training for staff on a violent intruder response, Smasal said.

Following the discussion about possible conflict of interest, Ramthun abstained from voting on both the payroll and the accounts payable motions Monday night.

The board plans to decide at a future meeting how it will handle votes and discussions in which nepotism may be an issue.

Jerome Harris, 37, will be released from prison on Tuesday, April 18. After his release he will reside at 1725 County Highway NN in the

Township of Jackson. Harris was convicted of one count of Second Degree Sexual Assault of a Child in Washington County in 2012 and one count of Repeated Sexual Assault of a Same Child in Waukesha County in 2011. The offender was known to the victim. Harris will be on probation until April 27, 2024, and will be monitored closely by WI Department of Corrections; Division of Community Corrections agents. Harris will have numerous rules and restrictions to follow; including wearing a live tracking GPS unit. Jerome Harris will be monitored by GPS at all times when leaving the County Highway NN address.

This sex offender has served the prison sentence imposed on him by the courts. He is NOT wanted by law enforcement at this time. This notification is not intended to increase fear, but rather it is our belief that an informed public is a safer public.

Sex offenders have always lived in our communities; but it was not until the Sex Offender Registration and Community Notification Law was enacted that law enforcement was able to

It's not the tears of the moment shed, That tells of hearts that are torn; But the tears that are shed in later years And the grief that is silently borne.



SBA Deadline For Economic Injury Disaster Loans To Private NonProfit Organizations In Wisconsin Is May 9

The U.S. Small Business Administration is reminding Private NonProfit (PNP) organizations in Wisconsin of the May 9 deadline to submit Economic Injury Disaster Loan applications for damages caused by the severe storms and flooding on July 11 - 12, 2016. PNPs that provide non-critical services located in Ashland, Bayfield, Burnett, Douglas, Florence, Iron, Sawyer and Washburn counties in Wisconsin are eligible to apply. Examples of eligible non-critical PNP organizations include, but are not limited to, food kitchens, homeless shelters, museums, libraries, community centers, schools and colleges.

The SBA offers Economic Injury Disaster Loans to help eligible non-critical PNP organizations meet their working capital needs such as ongoing operating expenses. This assistance is available regardless of whether the organization suffered any physical property damage. Loan amounts can be up

to \$2 million with an interest rate of 2.625 percent and terms up to 30 years. The SBA sets loan amounts and terms based on each applicant's financial condition. Applicants may apply online using the Electronic Loan Application (ELA) via SBA's secure website at <https://disasterloan.sba.gov/ela>.

Disaster loan information and application forms may also be obtained by calling the SBA's Customer Service Center at 800-659-2955 (800-877-8339 for the deaf and hard-of-hearing) or by sending an email to disastercustomerservice@sba.gov. Applications can also be downloaded from the SBA's website at www.sba.gov/disaster. Completed applications should be mailed to: U.S. Small Business Administration, Processing and Disbursement Center, 14925 Kingsport Road, Fort Worth, TX 76155.

The deadline to return economic injury applications is May 9, 2017.

The main part of the machine was lifted off the tracks and thrown some distance against the depot damaging boards and windows. Evidently Degner's body was also thrown against the depot and glanced off with such momentum that it was carried along the platform and then rolled off onto the siding tracks. The body was taken to Miller's Funeral Home.

Weekly HEALTH TIP

ASTHMA & VITAMIN D

New research suggests that vitamin D supplements may reduce the frequency of asthma attacks. Several trials involving about 1,100 children and adults tested vitamin D against a placebo. Researchers found vitamin D supplements lowered the risk of severe asthma attacks (ones requiring hospitalization or medical attention) from 6% to 3%. Participants taking the vitamin D had continued taking their regular medication at the same time. More trials are needed to see if supplementation with vitamin D has this effect on all asthma sufferers or just those who have low blood levels of the vitamin.

Continued From... Village Considers Allowing Second Tattoo Studio

"I not opposed to having another tattoo studio in the area at all. As a matter of fact, I was taught that competition is healthy. So I have no issues with that," said Pastorius, owner of the Alter-Ego Tattoo Studio.

However, Pastorius is concerned with the possibility of opening up the industry to an indefinite number of businesses.

"I am worried about having it completely opened up, though, because [Kewaskum] is so small. And if we are going to have tons of people suddenly coming in, I'm a little concerned about that because I have four other artists in my studio," Pastorius said at last week's village board meeting.

Jesse Santoro, who owns his own tattoo businesses in West Bend and Port Washington, wants to make sure new shops are closely regulated.

"As a business owner, I like that Kewaskum only allows one shop because of its population and it limits the possibility of people spreading disease," said Santoro, who has been in business for 15 years.

"When a new shop opens, it is a huge liability, in my opinion, that one of my competitors could cause hepatitis, and that is going to be big black thumb on my industry, my livelihood, my business. I have a wife and two kids. I have two businesses and six employees that I try every day to make sure they are busy and they are

able to make a living," Santoro said.

Georgiana Reichard, the person looking to open a new shop in Kewaskum, has been in the tattooing business for three years.

"I am very aware of the health issues," said Reichard, who has passed her boards to become a certified nursing assistant.

Reichard's mother, Donna Abfall, is a registered nurse and a naturopathic physician who plans to help Reichard with the new tattoo studio.

Tattoo studios in Washington County are currently licensed and inspected once a year by the county health department.

The village's ordinance does allow the village's appointed health officer to inspect if there are any concerns, Heiser said.

However, the village currently does not have a health officer, so last week's board meeting sparked conversation among trustees about the need for appointing a village health officer at a future meeting.

Pastorius has served on the state health board, and health inspectors for Dodge County currently use the Kewaskum studio for training, Pastorius said.

"For the health and well-being of my clients, we have absolutely no problem with that," Pastorius said.

In Washington County, health inspectors receive training from the state and

enforce the state's administrative code for tattoo studios, according to Paula Mugan, nursing and environmental health supervisor for Washington County. A facility is given 15 days to correct any violations.

"The tattoo artists are very skilled, particularly in Washington County. They are really good at what they do, and really very knowledgeable, so we are always willing to learn from what they are doing," Mugan said.

If the village board does decide next week to allow two tattoo studios per every 20,000 people, it will likely increase the fees the village charges for tattoo studios. The village currently charges a fee of \$50 to start up a tattoo studio.

The village would like to increase a fee to match West Bend's policy of charging \$150 for an initial application to open a tattoo studio and a \$115 annual conditional use permit fee.

"A higher fee keeps people in the business who are knowledgeable about tattooing and who have both a passion and a feel for it," Trustee David Spenner said.

The village board is expected to vote on the ordinance changes at the upcoming board meeting on Monday night.

If the changes are approved for the ordinance, and a third tattoo studio wants to open, the issue could come before the board again at that time.

\$2,734,699 Available For Housing Repairs

The Wisconsin Department of Administration (DOA) Division of Housing awarded \$2,734,699 to the Southern Housing Region for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Housing Program. The Southern Housing Region is represented by the counties of Columbia, Dodge, Jefferson, Kenosha, Ozaukee, Racine, Rock, Sauk, Walworth and Washington. The following entitlement communities are not eligible for the Southern Housing Region: Racine, Beloit, Janesville and Kenosha. These funds provide resources across Wisconsin to address affordable housing and community development. The funds are available for the following types of projects:

- Owner occupied households. These funds will be lent to income eligible households for eligible home repairs. The loan is a 0% interest, deferred payment loan – you do not pay it back until you sell the house, no longer live there or 30 years from the date of the note.
- Homebuyer assistance. These funds will be lent to income eligible tenants for down payment and closing cost assistance. There may also be funds available to make repairs to the home that is purchased. The loan is a 0% interest, deferred payment loan – you do not pay it back until you sell the house, no longer live there or 30 years from the date of the note.
- Landlords. Installment loans are available for landlords who rent to tenants that are low-to-moderate-income. The loan is a 0% interest loan. The funds can be used for handicap accessibility, windows, doors, siding, roofing, electrical, plumbing and heating. Funding for these competitive biannual awards is provided by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. Grants were awarded based upon the age of housing in the area, the low-to-moderate income population, unemployment rate and affordability. Additional information is available at each municipality within the county, at the County Courthouse or by contacting MSA at 1-800-552-6330 and referencing the Southern Housing Region.



Continued From... Area Prepares For Severe Weather

There will be no "test" tornado watch issued prior to the evening test – just the warning at 6:45 p.m.

All four sirens in the Village of Kewaskum will sound at 1:45 and 6:45 p.m.

Last year was the first time that the evening drill was held. It is an important addition, since it is a favorable time for tornadoes in Wisconsin, according to Rob Schmid, emergency management coordinator for Washington County.

The two-hour severe weather spotter training that was held covered aspects of severe weather safety, including high winds/tornadoes, flooding and lightning. The course also included information on how to recognize weather features that are indicators of severe weather potential.

Gov. Scott Walker has proclaimed April 17-21 as Tornado and Severe Weather Awareness Week in Wisconsin. This awareness campaign is launched every year in April to remind people of the dangers associated with tornadoes, thunderstorms, flooding and hail and to encourage citizens to educate themselves regarding protective safety measures.

If A Tornado Hits

In the event of a tornado, it is safest to go to the basement of a building.

If there is no basement,

go to the center of the building and put as many walls between you and the outside of the building, Halbuch said. If possible, get under a table and cover yourself with pillows or blankets. Use your arms to cover your head and neck.

If you are in a car, it is best to drive immediately to a shelter.

If that is not possible, there are two options: stay in your car or get out of your car.

If you stay in your car, lean down and cover your head so you are not hit by flying debris. The danger is that the car may be lofted into the air.

If you choose to get out of the car when a tornado hits, get in ditch or low spot on the ground. You will be less likely to be lofted in the air, but you run the risk of getting hit by debris, Halbuch said.

Do not park a car or wait a tornado out underneath an overpass because you can block traffic and the bridge can act as a wind tunnel.

Tornado Facts

Tornadoes are divided into the following categories according to wind speed:

- EF-0- Up to 85 mph
- EF-1- 86-110 mph
- EF-2- 111-135 mph
- EF-3- 136-165 mph
- EF-4- 166-200 mph
- EF-5- Over 200 mph

Based on 10,000 torna-

does from 2007-2015, 87 percent were EF-0 or 1. Those tornadoes accounted for 3 percent of deaths, Halbuch said.

In the United States, 75 percent of tornado fatalities occur in tornadoes that are rated EF-3, 4 or 5, Halbuch said.

The last EF-3 tornado that hit Wisconsin occurred in Stoutson on August 18, 2005.

The last tornado fatality in Wisconsin occurred on August 19, 2011, when an EF-1 tornado killed a person in a mobile home in Wausaukee, Halbuch said.

Tornado Safety

To prepare to survive a tornado, the first thing that families should do to be prepared for a tornado is to create a safety plan.

Family members should discuss how to get to a safe place and plan where to meet up after the event is over, Halbuch said. They should decide how to communicate with each other. It is best to text each other and not call, Halbuch said.

In addition, families should prepare a supply kit. Cell phones should be charged and weather radios should be plugged in. People should also keep shoes or boots by their beds, Halbuch said.

It also is important to stay informed, Halbuch advised.

It is important to have a good source and to watch for updates. The National Weather Service in Milwaukee keeps up-to-date weather conditions at weather.gov/milwaukee.

Track Teams Finish Third, Fifth In Oostburg Track Invite

For the first outdoor meet of the season the Kewaskum High track teams performed well on April 7 at the Oostburg Invitational.

The boys finished third out of eight teams with 112 points, while the Lady Indians, fielding a younger contingent, were fifth with 65. Kiel won the boys title, piling up 142 points while the St. Mary's Springs girls won a tight battle over Kiel for the crown, 153.5 to 152.

When it came to top individual efforts, there were none better than Derrek Brock's sweep in the hurdle events, Brady Hanson's victory in the high jump and the Indians' first place finishes in the 4x100 and 4x400-meter relays.

Brock was challenged by Oostburg's Tadeo Maier in the 110-high but edged him out 15 and .73 seconds (15.72) to 15.75. In the 300 lows, Brock used his longer strides to win by two seconds with his time of 42.53.

The 4x100 relay also came down to KHS and Oostburg with the Indian foursome of Cameron Dodge, Kyle Pamperin, Tony Steger and Hanson winning with a time of 45.39, .43 ahead of the Flying Dutchmen unit.

Brock, Jake Hrica, Cade Peterson and Hanson turned in a good time of 3:35.69 to win the 4x400 by almost four seconds.

Evans was thinking Hanson would contribute

points in the high jump if he would clear six feet (6-0), but the six-foot, six-inch senior had his own goals and made 6-5 to win by seven inches and come within two inches of the KHS school record, which is held by his brother, Jason.

A second-place effort was turned in by Peterson in the 200. He hit the finish line in 23.12, while Tyler Heus placed third in the 400 (54.63) and the quartet of Hrica, Peterson, Alex Sette and Tony Leister garnered a third in the 4x200 (1:42.17).

The 100 was a good event for the Indians, with Pamperin third in 11.74, Steger fifth at 11.88 and Dodge sixth with a time of 11.90.

In the weights, the Indians had a place in each event as Riley Donovan opened the season with a big throw of 140-05, which was good but 46 feet short of the effort by Valders' Christopher Evanson (186-03). Jon Leister's throw of 41-08.75 was good for fourth in the shot.

The girls had just one first place, from junior Maella Olla, who turned in a 12:57.47 in the 3200 to win by nine seconds.

The 200-meter dash was a good event for the Lady Indians, with freshmen Abby Meidl and Madelyn Thull finishing 5th and 6th with respective times of 29.94 and 30.20. KHS had double placing in the 400 with Breana Reis (68.87) and Faith Martzig (1:11.01) third and fifth.

Junior Sarah Butschlick

was clocked in 18.73 in the 100-hurdles for third place, while Grace Marcello and senior newcomer Melissa Schneider placed fourth and fifth in the 1600 with respective times of 6:11.33 and 6:18.32.

Sophomore Kelli Oelke placed fifth in the discus (83-01), and Cassidy Lange placed fourth (13-04.50) in the long jump.

KHS co-head coach Kris Evans was unavailable for comment on the meet.

The Kewaskum teams were scheduled to run in a quad meet at Ripon on April 10. Then they are off until April 18 when Plymouth hosts another East Central quad.

KHS Boys Track Team Should Be Strong; Girls Are A Bit Thin

Numbers are up for the boys and have dipped down for the girls' track teams at Kewaskum High School as coach Kris Evans begins his second year as head coach and his first sharing the position with Jason Last, who moved up from being an assistant, specializing in the weight events, to being a co-head coach.

While the season is still very early, Evans can see it will be a building year for the girls' team, which has just a handful of veteran athletes, while the boys could do well with experience in most areas except the distant runs.

"It's a smaller team this year," Evans said about the girls' team, with 24 candidates, including five seniors but only one, Hannah Preder, has much varsity experience.

Evans knows he can count on junior Maella Olla, a home school who is with the team and is an excellent two miler. He is also excited to see how freshman Abby Meidl, juniors Star Below-Kopf and Sarah Butschlick and freshman Maddie Thull will do. All show promise according to the coach, who said, "In practice, Meidl has already pole vaulted nine feet (9-0), while Thull "busted out a 1:09 (one minute and nine second) quarter in her first meet" in the Oshkosh Indoor Invitational, adding, "We are lining her up for hurdles."

Evans also cited Below-Kopf for knocking five seconds off her best 800 meter time at Oshkosh and said Butschlick, who participates in the 100 and 300-meter hurdles, "is a junior captain for us. She made huge strides last year, and we're excited to see what she can do this year."

Evans also noted freshman Emily Halterman has the potential to become a good shot putter and discus thrower.

Obviously, it's going to be difficult for the Lady Indians to compete without Ellie Debelak, who placed ninth in the D-2 state track and field meet a year ago in the open 400. "That hurts when you lose 59-second (400) runner, but that's the nature of high school sprints," Evans said, also indicating Emily Krier will be missed in the 1,600 along with Kristina Lepp, who competed in the high jump in the state meet.

"Our hope is the people

who are with us this year will be with us next year and the year after that," Evans said.

Switching to the boys, there is more optimism because of the veterans who are returning in the sprints, relays, pole vault and the hurdles, where state qualifier Derrek Brock returns.

"He was a rock star in the 300 hurdles last year," Evans said, adding, "Already he had improved in the 110s." Brock might also be in the 4x400 relay because, according to Evans, colleges look at 400 times in their recruitment, and Brock might like to compete at the college level.

Brock ran a nice 400 (fourth in 53.62) in the Oshkosh indoor meet and had qualified for the finals of the 60-high hurdles, but because the finals came right after the 400, Evans pulled him out of the hurdle event.

Also encouraging is the fact senior Brady Hanson returns to the program after playing on an AAU basketball league last spring.

"I lost a Hanson and gained a Hanson," Evans said, referring to the fact Jason Hanson, who placed third (6-6) in the state high jump has graduated and moved on to UW-Milwaukee where he is making a good transition to collegiate track competition.

As far as what events Brady Hanson will compete in, Evans said, "That's a question mark ... probably the 4x400 relay" and high jumping. "He wants a shot at the 4x100," Evans said, indicating he looks at the numbers (times) and will decide on this sprint four-some based on their times.

"We have a ton of returning talent in the sprints and relays," Evans went on, pointing to senior Jakob Hrica, and juniors Cade Peterson and Tony Steger.

The team lost two good weightmen in Ben Watzig and Eric Doll, but Evans said, "We've still got Riley Donovan who is throwing the shot 43-feet," and Jon Leister has some poten-

tial.

Leister's older brother, Tony, is the team's top pole vaulter, and Evans said, "He's aiming for state this year" after clearing 12-6 a year ago.

Looking at the distance field, Evans said, "We're hurting a little bit" as Justin Reck did not return, and, "He will be missed." Kyle Toth will be looked at to pick up points in the 400 and 800 while senior Zachary Hutchins and Derrick Schraufnagel will run either the 1,600 or 3,200.

And just who does Evans think about the race for the EC titles this year? "Oh Berlin, absolutely," he answered quickly, adding, "Our conference is very competitive."

Winneconne and Plymouth will also be strong, according to Evans, who said he would love to have Plymouth's numbers.

About KHS, Evans says, "I don't know. My view is we're going to put out people in their best events and see how it plays off."

Assisting Evans and Last will be Jim Brock, who will work in the jumps and hurdles, Jessica Schlice in the sprints, T.J. Schlice, pole vault; and Kaitlyn Nikodem in relays. "Nikodem is a teacher at the middle school," Evans said.

The Indians have several home meets this spring, including the annual Indian Invitational, which will be held on Friday, April 21st.

In the East Central Conference opener on April 4 at Winneconne, the Lady Wolves were dominant, scoring three goals in the first half and another four in the second.


