The T.R.U.T.H.S. About Drugs

– High School Students Lead New Countywide Drug Prevention Campaign

Washington County has a new drug abuse prevention campaign, led by high school students from across the county.

The new campaign is called T.R.U.T.H.S. and stands for "To Resist Using The Harmful Substances."

"Our mission is to educate teens in regard to the T.R.U.T.H.S. about drugs, in hope of empowering them to resist using the harmful substances," said Charles Zimmel, a student at Slinger High School.

High school students

across the county have been working throughout the school year to develop a theme for an anti-drug campaign that students could relate to.

Their brainstorming efforts culminated with a competition that was held at the West Bend Mutual Prairie Center on April 6.

High school students from Kewaskum, Slinger, West Bend and Germantown all presented ideas for campaigns before a panel of judges, who decided on the winning theme.

Youth Athletics Eye New Park Land

– Groups Hope To Create New Soccer And Baseball Fields In Area

Spring is here and the ballfields at Kiwanis Park in Kewaskum are packed.

The park is so crowded that as young athletes play baseball on the ball diamonds, other youngsters play soccer simulta-

neously in the outfield.

To alleviate the overcrowded situation, members of the Kewaskum Athletic Association (KAA) and the Kewaskum Youth Soccer Organization (KYSO) are banding together with plans to create more field space.

Organizers hope to purchase land this year to create new ball diamonds and soccer fields.

"This is to try to relieve some of the stress that is at Kiwanis Park," said Nathan Scheel, president of the Kewaskum Athletic Association.

Both groups plan to continue using Kiwanis Park.

"By no means is there an abandonment of Kiwanis Park," said Andy Rettler, a director for KAA.



WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

Village of Richfield House Fire

On Wednesday, April 19, at approximately 1:37 p.m., a concerned citizen notified the Washington County Sheriff's Office of smoke coming from the roof vents of a home located at 4050 Woodview Drive in the Village of Richfield. Sheriff's Office deputies and firefighters from the Richfield Fire Department were subsequently dispatched to the scene. Assistance was also requested from Lisbon, Jackson, Slinger and Hartford Fire Departments.

Upon their arrival, deputies and Richfield firefighters observed smoke coming from attic area of the residence. Firefighters were quickly able to bring the fire under control, but the home sustained a minor amount smoke and water damage. No one was home at the time of the incident. It is estimated that the home sustained \$30,000 in damage.

The matter remains under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff's Office; however, the cause of the fire does not appear to be suspicious.

Traffic Stop

On April 19 at 10:49 a.m., a patrol deputy ran a license plate on a vehicle that was southbound on Interstate 41 near State Highway 33 in the Town of Addison. The check revealed the owner of the 2007 Ford Fusion did not have a valid driver's license. The deputy conducted a traffic stop with the driver, who became immediately argumentative, and would not surrender his identification or insurance paperwork upon repeated requests. After the third request, the deputy advised the driver that the registered owner, a 26-year-old City of Milwaukee man, was suspended. At that point, the man acknowledged he was the registered owner and gave the deputy his photo license. He did not have proof of insurance.

The deputy issued citations for operating after suspension and no insur-

ance. When the deputy returned to the driver's vehicle, he asked the driver to exit the vehicle three different times. After the deputy finally told the driver he would not be allowed to drive the vehicle away due to his suspended status, the man abruptly put the car in drive and sped off.

The deputy did not pursue the driver. Officers must quickly balance the necessity of emergency vehicle operation against the probability and severity of damage or injury. Under both State Statute and department policy, pursuits are terminated -

or in this particular case not even initiated - because the offender's identification has been clearly established so that later apprehension may be accomplished. The deputy correctly concluded there was not continuing need for immediate apprehension.

Since the 26-year-old man provided the deputy with his photo driver's license (which is now in evidence), authorities know exactly where to find him for the second series of citations - not to mention the forthcoming criminal arrest warrant for obstructing.

Washington County's Hazardous Waste Collection To Be May 6

The Washington County Full Service Clean Sweep is an opportunity for county residents to properly dispose or recycle unwanted hazardous chemicals, electronic goods, pharmaceutical medication, and used tires. TVs and large household appliances will be accepted again this year.

This is the eighth consecutive year for the Full Service Clean Sweep Program coordinated by the Planning and Parks Department, while partnering with the County's Health Department, Sheriff's Department and the Highway Department. The drive-through collection makes this program simple and efficient for participants.

A \$30 pre-registration fee is required for the hazardous waste and elec-

tronic goods. The Pharmaceutical Collection does not require anyone to pre-register. At the Used Tire Collection a maximum of 20 tires will be accepted per participant and disposal fees apply at the time of collection.

The 2017 Full Service Clean Sweep event will be held on Saturday, May 6. Collection will be from 8 a.m.-noon at the Washington County Slinger Highway Shop, 314 West Washington St., (Hwy 175) in Slinger.

Highway G Undergoes Construction

Traffic will be detoured off Highway G in Fond du Lac County until construction is completed, which is expected to be in mid-May.

Until then, Highway G will be open to local traffic only, according to Ryan Sommer, a Fond du Lac County highway engineer.

The detour route utilizes

highways 45 and 67 and is posted for through traffic.

The construction project includes safety improvements at two intersections. One is the intersection of Highway G and Youth Camp Road, while the larger safety improvement project is at the intersection of Highway G and County Trunk Highway SS.

"The intersection of G

and SS is being realigned fairly extensively as part of the safety improvement," Sommer said.

The entire stretch of road on Highway G, from Youth Camp Road to State Trunk 67, is being pulverized and paved this year.

The entire project was driven mainly to address deteriorating pavement on Highway G, Sommer said.



EXERCISE MAY REDUCE HOT FLASHES

Two of the most common symptoms of menopause are night sweats and hot flashes. A new study suggests that exercise may help manage these symptoms. Researchers reported that post-menopausal women in the 20-week exercise program experienced improvement in fitness levels and their physical and mental well-being. They also reported some weight loss and a reduction in symptoms. The exercise regimen included three one-hour workout sessions per week, with aerobic exercise and strength training. The women in the test group also received psychological counseling. Benefits were still present after one year.






WESLEY DUNNAGAN



Ideadvance Seed Fund Now Open To Many UW System Alumni

Innovators from across the UW System with a business idea that could contribute to Wisconsin's "knowledge economy" are invited to apply for the Ideadvance program.

New this year: Beginning with the April 28 deadline, Ideadvance will accept applications from graduates of any UW System campus except UW-Madison. The program combines early-stage grant funding with business mentoring for UW System part-time or full-time staff, faculty, students and alumni from all campuses except UW-Madison. Those affiliated with UW-Madison are allowed to contribute as team members on eligible projects, just not as primary clients.

Ideadvance, launched in 2014, has awarded grants to 48 Stage 1 teams, of which 13 teams have been awarded Stage 2 funding. Stage 1, with funding up to \$25,000, focuses on achieving commercialization mile-

stones to reduce risk and determine need in the marketplace to solve a problem. Stage 2, with follow-on funding up to \$50,000, helps a select few to advance their business models to effectively deliver customer solutions and attract investors.

The Ideadvance program promotes learning as well as support for an innovative idea and business model. The grant dollars awarded to teams are only received after they demonstrate key learnings towards their commercialization goals.

"We try to simulate the real world startup environment for these entrepreneurs," Center of Technology Commercialization Associate Director Dave Linz said. "We want them to 'get out of the building' and test their ideas and business models in the marketplace."

Alana Platt, founder of Classmunity, a web-based fund-raising tool for schools, valued not only

the funding to create jobs and drive revenue but also the mentorship of the program.

"We wouldn't be where we are today without Ideadvance," Pruitt said. "You don't learn entrepreneurship in Computer Science."

Awards are determined by an Investment Committee with representatives from UW System, WiSys Technology Foundation, UW-Extension, Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation and an entrepreneur affiliated with an eligible UW campus. The committee selects competitive proposals with a compelling case for a significant solution to a market problem and a dedicated team focused on learning about risks to their business model. The committee also focuses on the skills of the team and how well-prepared they are to tackle this learning.

Although high-tech ideas are welcome, entre-

preneurs do not need to present a biotech or IT technology to receive an Ideadvance grant. The types of eligible businesses are very broad, including ideas in agriculture, manufacturing, music production, textiles, art or business. The only restrictions are that the business cannot be real estate, direct consumer retail or a hospitality business, including restaurants.

Ideadvance is part of WEDC's efforts to expand collaboration with the UW System, business leaders and others throughout the state. Through their special S3 initiative, WEDC is working to remove commercialization barriers entrepreneurs face by providing financial and operational assistance that address business startup and seed-funding challenges.

"Ideadvance is an important resource for turning new ideas coming out of the UW campuses into

businesses," said Aaron Hagar, vice president of entrepreneurship and innovation for WEDC. "Ideadvance helps ensure that not only do the individual businesses receive the support they need at the earliest stages, but that the communities where these businesses are located can start to build stronger networks and a more robust entrepreneurial environment."



Professional Development Provided For Little Folks Staff

On Friday, April 14, the Little Folks School House, located at 1040 Milan Drive in Kewaskum, closed for the day to offer a day of professional development for its staff.

The full day of training took place in West Bend at the Washington County Family Center. Dodie Sargent, administrator of the early learning center lined up presenters for the day beginning with Capt. Tom Thrash from the West Bend Fire Department. Thrash taught about fire prevention, origins and sources of fires, and emergency action plans. He also spoke about statistics, carbon monoxide detectors, smoke detectors and escape ladders. Thrash used a simulated fire and each staff member practiced using a fire extinguisher.

The next presenter was Tamara Struebing, formally of Hometown Pharmacy and presently employed by Froedtert Medical. Struebing trained on medication in childcare. She taught about the most commonly prescribed pediatric medications and how to recognize and respond to adverse effects of medications. The staff was also taught about allergies and anaphylaxis. Many questions were asked and answered regarding proper measurement and administration of medications. Struebing also reviewed the use of Epi-pens, inhalers and nebulizers.

Dan Reidel, a safety expert/trainer from Woller-Anger spoke on safety in the childcare setting. He used picture slides to point

out hidden dangers which could potentially compromise the safety of children. He also taught about social media and the do's and don'ts for childcare providers.

Jennifer Melzark presented on the essentials of early literacy instruction. The Little Folks teachers were placed on four different teams and were sent out to the West Bend Library on a literacy scavenger hunt. Each team had 60 minutes to locate, check out, and return to the Family Center with more than 25 books. The teachers then had to present to their peers how they would use each book in lesson plans and activities for different age groups. Each team was made up of four to five teachers. The team scoring the most points won a \$25 Kohl's gift card (one card for each person on the team).

The final presenter was Rachel Hahn from the Milwaukee County Zoo. Hahn presented on Ocean Animals. The presentation included some background information, class projects, sensory tables, dramatic play and room décor ideas revolving around ocean animals. The staff was taught how to customize and tailor the ocean theme to the different age groups of children.

The day of training wrapped up with door prizes for the Little Folks teachers donated by Educare Shop, 4 Seasons Tanning Salon, Kohn's Citgo, MJ Stevens Restaurant, Drexel, Yummy Bones Restaurant and Riverside Brewery.





"We will continue using Kiwanis Park for what it was built and intended for. The plan is to offload some of these other activities to an alternative location," Rettler added.

The KAA and KYSO are currently eyeing about 25 acres of farmland that is for sale on the corner of E. Moraine Drive and County Highway S, located just north of the Village of Kewaskum.

A conceptual site plan that features one baseball field, two softball fields and nine soccer fields of varying sizes has been created based on that property.

"We have a concept plan, but we aren't locked into that piece of land. There may be other opportunities out there that might be better in terms of price, or in terms of location or configuration possibilities," said Chad Cook, KAA vice president.

The KAA and KYSO currently have about \$50,000 to put toward the new park.

About \$23,000 of that came from money the KAA received after achieving its not-for-profit status. It took the KAA about three years to officially become a nonprofit organization. Once it achieved the nonprofit status, the organization appealed the taxes it had paid during those three years, and recently received that money back.

Both the KAA and KYSO raise money each year through registration fees and fundraisers to purchase uniforms and equipment, as well as to upgrade playing fields.

Over the past six years, the KAA has contributed about \$70,000 toward the Kiwanis Park facilities. Even with new land, the organization plans to con-

tinue to support Kiwanis Park, Scheel said.

The need for more space has existed for years, but it has become more evident as the number of participants in local youth sports has grown.

The KAA baseball program currently has 329 participants in 4K through eighth grade. The KAA youth volleyball program has 56 participants in its spring program and 50 fall participants. There are 81 youth involved with the KAA flag football program.

Meanwhile, the KYSO was formed seven years ago with 35 players. There are now 230 fall soccer players and 260 players in the spring.

All of those athletes currently share space at Kiwanis Park with Kewaskum High School baseball and softball teams, and the adult Kewaskum A's baseball team.

The KAA and KYSO would like the school district and the A's to join their partnership to use the new field space.

"We envision it to be like a community park. We would like it to be multi-level, from little kids all the way up to adults who can play on the fields there," Scheel said.

The hope is that the entire community comes together to utilize space, whether it be school grounds, facilities or park land. The local parishes, such as St. Lucas and Holy Trinity, work together to accommodate for both field space and gym space. We hope to work in that same spirit," Cook said.

The organizations will look for help as they

develop the new park.

Some have stepped up already. Kevin Parish, who works as a project engineer for Quam Engineering, created the conceptual drawing for the park. Parish, who has children in both KAA and KYSO, also helped engineer and design one of the ball fields at Kiwanis Park.

Unlike Kiwanis Park, the new park will be a daytime facility only. No lights are planned for the park.

"We are looking to add green space to install playing surfaces, for primarily soccer and baseball, but there is no discussion or desire to light up these fields," Cook said.

The space could be used for things such as flag football as well.

For now, the groups are making do with what they have.

Kiwanis Park has a total of four baseball fields. There are six soccer fields at Kiwanis Park. KYSO uses all of those fields, as well as the high school field, located on Fond du Lac Avenue next to Aurora Clinic.

The new park project will most likely be completed in phases. This year, the groups hope to get started by acquiring land.

"With a whole new space, you won't have to shoehorn anything anywhere. There will be plenty of space to put things wherever they belong. You will not be playing flag football and soccer in the outfield. There will be a spot for it," Rettler said.

The Public Works Committee reviewed the first draft of a Fiscal Sustainability Plan for Washington County Parks at its April 22 meeting.



Dry mouth, or xerostomia, is a common complaint amongst patients, especially in those with Sjögren disease or who are receiving radiation therapy for head and neck cancer.

Reduced salivary flow can cause difficulties in tasting, chewing, swallowing, and speaking; it can also increase the chance of developing dental decay and oral infections. Causes of dry mouth can include adverse effects of medications, toxicity from chemotherapy, head and neck radiotherapy, autoimmune diseases, or

other conditions like uncontrolled diabetes.

The goals of treating xerostomia include identifying the possible cause(s), relieving discomfort, and preventing complications such as periodontal infections and cavities. Xerostomia may be alleviated by use of saliva substitutes like Biotene, chewing sugar-free gum, and brushing teeth gently at least twice a day with fluoridated toothpaste.





KHS Teams Post Six First Places But Port Teams Claim Championships

Newcomers to the meet, the Port Washington Pirates took home a lot of loot — gold, silver and bronze — from the annual Indian Track Invitational held on April 21, while the host KHS boys turned in another solid performance in taking runner-up honors.

The Port boys sailed through the meet, scoring 136 points, 21 more than the Indians (125), while the Lady Pirates beat North Fond du Lac for the winners' plaque, 127 to 99. The KHS girls were fifth out of the 10 teams, scoring 72.33 points.

"I was proud of both teams," KHS co-coach Kris Evans said. "It was a more competitive meet this year."

Kewaskum had five first places, including two in the sprint relays. In the 4x100, Tony Steger, Kyle Pamperin, Trevor Degnitz and Cameron Dodge, carried the baton once around the track in 45 and .35 seconds (45.35) and the quartet of Derrick Brock, Jake Hrica, Tyler Heus and Cade Peterson won by nearly two and a half seconds with their time of 3:33.71.

This finished off Brock's night in grand style. Earlier he won the 300 hurdles in 41.71 and took second in the 110 hurdles, losing by .03 to Oostburg junior, Tadeo Maier, 15.90 to 15.93.

"It was good to have some competition. If you don't have competition, it's hard to push yourself," Brock said, realizing Maier had a slight lead going over the second last hurdle in the 300 race, and then, "He (Maier) just stumbled. He was done after that."

In the highs, Brock said, "It just didn't feel right. I was gaining on him, but it was too late."

The Indians' fourth win was provided by Peterson, who led from start to finish in the 200, posting a good

time of 23.10. Peterson also placed third in the discus with a toss of 127 feet, 10 inches (127-10).

Junior Riley Donovan won the discus, tossing the metal platter 143-05. Weight coach Jason Last is pleased with Donovan's progress in the event, which was dominated by Ben Watzig a year ago. Watzig got most of the accolades last year, but, "He (Donovan) won the Washington County last year," Last said.

Other top-four finishes included: 200—Steger, 4th, (24.10); high jump—Steger, 3rd (6-0, personal record), Isaiah Cochran, 4th, 6-0, PR; pole vault—Tony Leister, 11-6.

Senior Brady Hanson did not compete in this meet. "Sore knee ... I'll be back on Tuesday (for the Washington County Outdoor)," Hanson said while helping with the high jump, an event he had hoped to win.

While KHS did not get any points in the distance events, Evans praised two-miler, Zach Hutchins, for knocking 20 seconds off his best previous time to an 11:46.56.

The young Lady Indians had five, top five finishes. Their only win came in the pole vault where freshman Abby Meidl cleared 8-06, her season best. "We know she's capable of more," Evans said.

KHS did well in the distance races, with Maela Olla taking second in the 3,200 (12:40.33) and Grace Marcello finishing as the runner-up in the 1,500 (5:47.09, PR).

"She started out the year at 6:20. Now she's down to 5:47, unbelievable!" Evans said, adding, "She's a really hard worker."

Breanna Rice, one of only a few upperclassmen on the team, was clocked in 1:07.37 in the 300 for second place, while senior

Hannah Proeder took fourth in the long jump (13-11.75, a PR).

After the tough Washington County test, the Indians will be at the annual Alzheimer Invitational in Pewaukee on Friday, April 28.

They made it look easy. The Kewaskum High softball players stomped host Port Washington 27-0 and finished the day with an 8-3 victory over Random Lake in the Port Washington Tournament held on April 22.

With the two wins, the Indians are 4-2 on the season and look to be hitting their mid-season stride a few weeks early.

"They're playing well right now," KHS coach Jess Gosse said following the tournament. "They found their groove."

Gosse, who lives in Port Washington, was expecting the Pirates (5-2) to provide his team with a challenge. That did not happen as the Indians scored 10 runs in the first inning and six more in the second, leaving little doubt who would win the contest.

"Port didn't put up as much of a fight as we thought," Gosse said, reporting the Pirates started their No. 1 pitcher, Katie Snook, but, "We hit her and hit her hard," to the tune of 16 runs in the two innings she pitched. It didn't help Snook and her reliever that there were 11 Pirate innings in the five innings before the game ended via the 10-run "mercy" rule.

Once again, the big hitters were Breana Trepes, Maddie Geidel and Brittnay Williams. Geidel with 4x5, with a double and four runs batted in (RBI), while Trepes went 2x4 with four RBI and Williams had four hits in her six trips to the plate and drove in three runs.

After two East Central games this week, the Indians head to the Weyauwega-Fremont Tournament on April 29. "That tournament is loaded with good teams," Gosse said, and looming right around the corner is a home date vs. arch rival, Waupun, on Tuesday May 2.


"We told our elected officials how important federal, state and local partnerships are when resources







Rewarding Work: DHS Releases Governor Walker's Plan To Reform Health Care Benefit For Childless Adults

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) has released a draft of the application to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) requesting an amendment to certain provisions of its Section 1115 Demonstration Waiver, known as the BadgerCare Reform Demonstration Waiver. The policy amendments, included in 2015 Wisconsin Act 55, are aimed at bolstering Governor Walker's efforts to move people from government dependence to true independence.

The 1115 Demonstration Waiver allows Wisconsin to offer the BadgerCare Plus (Medicaid) standard benefit plan to adults without dependent children, ages 19-64, also known as the

"childless adult" population. In 2014, under Governor Scott Walker, for the first time in Wisconsin history, all childless adults at or below 100 percent of the federal poverty level (FPL) were eligible for coverage under the BadgerCare Plus (Medicaid) standard benefit plan.

"These are common sense reforms directed at helping people move from government dependence to true independence through the dignity that is born of work," Governor Walker said. "We believe public assistance should be a trampoline, not a hammock. And so, our message is clear. We are asking able-bodied adults without children, who are on government assistance, to pass a drug test and enroll in job training. If they fail the test, we'll help them get healthy

so they can get the job skills they need to get back in the game."

The waiver amendment includes the following changes to coverage for childless adults covered by BadgerCare Plus (Medicaid):

- Implements drug screening: Requires members to be screened for drugs and submitted to a drug test, if necessary. Those who test positive will be offered treatment so they can get healthy and get back into the workforce.

- Launches work requirement, time-limited benefits: Benefits are limited to 48 months. Months in which an able-bodied adult, age 19-49, are working or participating in a worker training program are not counted toward the 48-month time limit.

- Establishes monthly premiums of 0 to \$10 per house-

hold, based on income. This increases the sustainability and value of health care in the state.

- Rewards healthy behaviors by establishing lower premiums: Healthy behaviors are self-assessed through a health risk assessment. Those working toward improving healthy behaviors will be rewarded with lower premiums. The healthy choices include:

- *Wearing a seatbelt
- *Maintaining a healthy weight
- *Not smoking
- *Not abusing or misusing drugs
- *No excessive use or abuse of alcohol

- Encourages appropriate emergency room use: Increases copayment for emergency room visits to \$8 for the first visit and \$25 for

subsequent visit to align the program with the private health insurance market and encourages receiving care in the most appropriate place.

"These reforms align with our mission of ensuring our most vulnerable populations have access to health care, while also working to promote healthy living, and further enabling the transition to the workforce for those able to work," said Medicaid Director Michael Heifetz.

In addition, the draft waiver amendment includes a proposed benefit change for all BadgerCare Plus and Medicaid members, to allow for full coverage of residential treatment for substance use disorder. Expanding treatment for those battling substance abuse is a critical component of our efforts to combat a statewide drug

abuse epidemic.

The group from Slinger High School won the competition with the winning theme of "T.R.U.T.H.S." With that, they won a traveling plaque that will be used in upcoming years as the students continue developing new ideas to try to prevent drug abuse.

Although Slinger won this year's contest, the judges said they found all of the students' presentations to be motivating.

"I learned something from each of your presentations. The thing I liked the most was everyone was very enthusiastic about what you were doing. I'm proud of you. You inspired me," Attorney John Best, who served as one of the judges, told the students.

The Competition

Mark Sette, a detective for the Washington County Sheriff's Office, and Ali Krueger, coordinator for the Washington County Victim Witness program, brought the idea of starting a new anti-drug abuse campaign in the county after hearing about a similar program that was done in Colorado.

"The purpose of the program is to find creative ways to prevent drug abuse," Sette said.

Kewaskum High School had a group made of nine students that met outside of class time throughout

the school year to come up with ideas for the anti-drug campaign.

The Kewaskum students were inspired by a painting in the school art room of a girl standing under an umbrella with her hand reaching out into the rain. The students decided the painting had a symbolic meaning and created their own poster based on the concept.

"The rain represents everything that can happen in life without drugs, and the umbrella is what is shielding you from it," said Erin Sette, a KHS student. "Being under the umbrella represents when you are under the influence, and so when you are under the influence of drugs, you will lose everything, your education, your family, your friends, your life."

In addition to creating the umbrella theme, KHS students created posters showing the effects of drugs and displayed them up around the school.

They also brainstormed ideas that could help promote the anti-drug abuse theme.

"Next year we would like to do activities that would engage the entire student body, have some presenters come in and talk about the effects of drugs and try to really hit home about how detrimental drugs can be to your life," Mackenzie Wilcox said.

Students from other schools came up with creative ideas as well.

For example, Slinger High School students designed posters and T-shirts that could be used in the future. They also suggested creating Twitter and Instagram pages that feature sad truths warning kids about the dangers of drug abuse, as well as and positive messages to prevent drug abuse.

West Bend students suggested having fun activities for teens, such as lock-ins, Brewers game outings, bowling nights and laser tag events. The West Bend team also suggest having kids make a pledge.

Facts about drug abuse could be written on whiteboards in various classrooms and a video series could be created, McKayla Heuer of West Bend said.

A drug fair could even be held, similar to the college and career fairs that are currently held for high schools, West Bend students suggested. Booths could be set up that show the effects of different drugs.

"You could talk with a cop at a booth and find out how long a sentence would be if you use one of these drugs," McKayla said.

"There are a lot of really good ideas that each of the schools have. We hope that you can work together

in the future as we go forward in this campaign," said Washington County District Attorney Mark Bensen, who served as one of the judges for this year's competition.

Moving Forward

Future competitions will target different harmful substances, all using the T.R.U.T.H.S. logo. Each year, the plaque will be awarded to the school that wins that particular contest.

"The cornerstone of the program is that it is all student-led. All these ideas come directly from the students, so hopefully they speak more to students as opposed to some of the anti-drug campaigns in the past that had been developed by adults," Sette

said. Next year's contest will be aimed at preventing opiate abuse.

Each school will once again come before a panel of judges, this time presenting their anti-opiates project.

The winning team will be awarded the traveling plaque next year, and then a new targeted drug project will be assigned to the 2018-2019 school year, Sette said.

This year's panel of judges included: Washington County District Attorney Mark Bensen, Washington County Sheriff Dale Schmidt, "Aspired" Executive Director Melissa Twitty, Attorney John Best and Eric Essinger of West Bend Mutual Insurance.
