– Donation Helps Maintain Boltonville Union Cemetery

Norbert Dettmann, 93, has always loved the Boltonville Union Cemetery.

He does not consider the cemetery merely a beautiful park or a place of marble stones.

“A cemetery is made up of memories,” Dettmann said. “To me, it is a century’s record of remembrances of wonderful people.”

For years, Dettmann planted flowers every May on different family lots in the cemetery. As he did so, he would think of those he was honoring.

Now a resident of the Lighthouse Retirement Center in West Bend, Dettmann is still caring for the cemetery.

He donated money to the cemetery board so that flowers would be planted around the gravestones of 28 veterans and their wives. The money also


The annual parade starts up Sunday, May 28, at noon. There will be extra cash prizes for the best ideas on the design of a float.

Kewaskum Memorial Day Parade And Program

A Memorial Day Parade will be held on Monday, May 29, at 9:30 a.m. at Kewaskum High School. The parade route goes east on Third Street, south on Parkview Drive to Main Street. The route heads west on Main Street to Fond du lac Avenue and north to the American Legion Hall at 1538 Fond du Lac Ave.

The Memorial Day program will immediately follow the parade at the American Legion Hall. in case of inclement weather, the service will be held in the Kewaskum high School gymnasium.

The program will include: Master of Ceremonies, Mike Paul; Pledge of Allegiance, Everyone; National Anthem, Kewaskum High School Band; Invocation, the Rev. Edwin Kornath; Remembering Our Heroes, Wayne Rimmel; Gettysburg Address, Miranda Winkler; In Flanders Field, Max Stowers; Introduction of Gold Star Mothers, Mike Paul; Honoring of War Dead, Sgt. At Arms James Korth; Placing of the Wreath, James Korth; Benediction, the Rev. Edwin Kornath; Salute to the Dead, Legion Firing Squad; Taps, Andrew Rics; and Presentation of Poppy Poster Contest Winners, Mike Paul.

The Legion and Auxiliary will hold a brat fry immediately following the ceremony.

Memorial Day Program in Farmington

The annual Memorial Day Program at the Fillmore Turner Hall will be held at 12:30 p.m. on Monday, May 29. The program will feature the U.S. flag, which follows our service men and women to all corners of the earth. The flag of the United States is one of the nation's most widely recognized symbols. Everyone is invited to hear about the history, respect and handling of the flag. The program will include the Presentation of Colors, the Kewaskum High School band playing the National Anthem, a flag folding ceremony, and the traditional fresh flower wreath and placing of fresh flowers on Veteran Graves in the Cemetery.

The program starts at 12:30 p.m. at Turner Hall in Fillmore. Refreshments are available. The event is hosted by the Farmington Historical Society and is open to the public. Admission is free.

West Bend Memorial Day Observances

West Bend's Memorial Day observances will begin with a parade on Monday, May 29. The parade starts at 9:30 a.m. at S. Main and Oak streets, and ends at Washington County Veterans' Plaza, located at 5th and Poplar.

Following the parade, a program will be held at 11 a.m. at Washington County Veterans' Plaza, located

outside the Old Courthouse Museum, at 320 S. Fifth Ave. in West Bend.

Following the program, the Old Courthouse Museum will be open until 3 p.m., and no museum admission will be charged. Included in the free admission is the new traveling exhibit Wisconsin Remembers: A Face for Every Name.

The exhibit features a photo for each of the 1,161 Wisconsin soldiers listed on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. Wisconsin Remembers is a tribute to Wisconsin military that lost their lives in the Vietnam War.

Honoring Their Service & Sacrifice

Memorial Day is a day to remember. We remember those who gave the ultimate sacrifice in the military service for our great country. It is also a time we remember those veterans who served and have passed away. The pages of our Memorial Day pages feature many of the local KIA's, as well as many veterans who are buried locally. This year we added Korean KIA's to our annual section.

Home is a special place

When soldiers are deployed in a combat zone they often talk about going to a special place called "home." I should note that it is proper etiquette to say "Welcome Home" to a Vietnam Veteran the first time you meet them since they did not get a warm welcome home when they returned from deployment. What makes this place called "home" so special to a deployed service member? It is a place they look forward to going to. It is a better place than where they are. It is a place they can get rest and let their guard down. It is safe. It is a place to recharge and relax. Perhaps they think of a happier, simpler time. They can see a new perspective when deployed that makes problems they once thought to be big not seem so big after all.

When I think of home, I think of traditions. I also think of the familiar: people I know including parents, friends I grew up with,

classmates, teachers and neighbors. I think of sights when I go down Main Street. I think of my roots, of the place I grew up, or where I currently live.

Home can happen at a physical place, but it is not a physical thing. A real home has to do with the outpouring of love. I was going to use the word friendships, but that was just not strong enough of a word. Conditions change, people come and go, but a home is not limited by time or by certain individual relationships. It involves many relationships. It is the sum total of these relationships that makes home special. Home is where your heart is. It is a place you can grow and make mistakes and still be accepted. The love from home is a powerful thing. This can be sensed when it is ripped or torn or when someone is missing.


My home is here where my wife Laura and I publish this small weekly newspaper. It is here in Wisconsin in the United States of America. It is a very special place that our service members are willing to die for. Over one million American service members have done this for us. Every one of them is important and we remember them on Memorial Day.

I will never forget the day I was in a caravan of cars escorting my son's flag-draped casket from Mitchell Field to Mayville. As we approached the area from the south on Hwy 67, I vividly remember a large Iron Ridge fire truck along with many Iron Ridge firemen blocking the highway so the motorcade could proceed uninterrupted onto Cty. Hwy. S. It was wonderful to see people from home. Next, we went through Horicon and the streets were packed with people, even John Deere had let workers come out to welcome a soldier home. Hundreds of school children lined the streets. I will never forget what I saw as the motorcade came into Mayville on Hwy. 28. There were two ladder fire trucks, one from Mayville and the other from Horicon, with their ladders raised high with a large American Flag flying between them. To me, this image said "welcome home 1LT Johnson; we love you; the people of the United States of America love you."

Deployed Home Painting

In April of 2016, Laura and I were attending the annual Being There, Reaching Out (BT-RO) organization event in Milwaukee. The organization is for Wisconsin families who have lost a service member for any reason, including in combat, suicide or accidents. There are over 300 families in the organization. Most of them experienced a loss after September 11th. It is a big event with special speakers, meals and even raffle items. One of the raffle items that caught my eye was a print called "Deployed Home." The amazing painting represents our heroes being deployed home as they ascend a staircase to Heaven being greeted by seven of their comrades. There is so much meaning behind this unique creation and the love it extends to Laura and I and our surviving children as a Gold Star family. I got permission to publish a copy of this print with my column so readers could see what I am referring to. The print means the world to me because my son had great faith and felt called to lead his men into battle. It was his life's purpose. He gave his life and he went to his eternal home along with many other who gave so much. I am so proud of him.

I wanted to get a copy of Deployed Home for my office. I quickly discovered that a Chicago organization called Honor America's Valor (www.HonorAmericasValor.org) published the print. The organization was founded and led by Mark Titre, whom I met previously at a BT-RO event right after my son was killed. Mark presented Laura and I with two special

prints at the Beaver Dam Hero's Festival several years ago. One was an original portrait painting of our son (copy of print on this page) and a customized America's Valor canvas print detailed with David's bio at the bottom. Both were made by Mark's niece, Natalie Bihl, who is a local artist in the Chicago area. I was able to meet with Mark at the BT-RO event held last year and he made arrangements for me to get a copy of Deployed Home. Natalie created the print for Honor America's Valor. I want to recognize Mark and his organization for their efforts in honoring fallen military that have given their lives to protect freedoms, as well as first responders that serve to make our communities safe.

What Memorial Day Means To Me

I recognize that I am so lucky to live here in the U.S., and to be free. I have been reminded on several occasions by a friend of mine who served as a captain in Vietnam to be "happy." When I talk to him on the phone, no matter what the circumstance, he always seems to be so happy. So finally, one day, I asked him why he was always so happy. He said simply "because I am alive." He told me earlier that he and only a few of his men survived a violent attack in Vietnam. Most of his men died. It is a perspective that I need to be reminded of when I think I have problems.

To me, Memorial Day is a day I remember not only my son, but all the service members that gave the ultimate gift of their lives so we

can live free. The families of these service members, Gold Star families, also pay a huge price.

I used to think that living a long time was a noble goal. However, I have realized that a noble life is a life well lived no matter how long it is. Many of our young service members who gave up their lives did more in life for our country than many people that just exist and live a long life. Those of us still living have great opportunity to do good with the time we have left. I really like the following words from President John F. Kennedy's 1961 Inaugural Address:

"And so, my fellow Americans: ask not what your country can do for you - ask what you can do for your country.....Finally... ..with a good conscience our only sure reward, with history the final judge of our deeds, let us go forth to lead the land we love, asking His blessing and His help, but knowing that here on earth God's work must truly be our own."

VVMF Faces Project Update

It was in this paper in 2014 that I announced that the Wisconsin Newspaper Association member newspapers would join the Vietnam Veteran Memorial (VVMF) in the effort of finding the missing photos of Wisconsin Vietnam Veterans listed on the WALL in Washington D.C. We made it our goal to find all of the photos by Memorial Day 2015, and it was done. Last year, along with many Wisconsin newspapers, we published all

1,161 of the photos. The effort to search for missing photos by newspapers spread to other state press association across the nation through the National Newspaper Association. In 2014 there were over 24,000 photos missing out of the 58,000 plus names on the WALL. At that time, only one state had found all its photos. Today, there are 21 states that have all their

photos found, and 6,753 are still missing. The VVMF provided a chart (on next page) showing the progress of the Faces project by state in 2016 and now (4/27/17). All of the found photos are available online at VVMF.org. They will also be on display by birthday at the new VVMF Education Center that will be built by the WALL. It is anticipated that groundbreak-

ing will happen in 2019. Congress has approved the plans for the new Center. Fundraising efforts are underway.

It should be noted that there will be a, 18-hour documentary film series about "The Vietnam War" directed by Ken Burns and Lynn Novick that will be aired on PBS in September. It took six years to make this series and features the testimony from nearly 100 witnesses. It is the hope of the VVMF that the attention on war from the film will help in the fundraising effort for the new Vietnam Education Center.

Defense Casualty Analysis System (DCAS) files. As we have done in the past with other wars, we published the complete list of U.S. Military Fatal Casualties of the Korean War for Home-State-of-Record: Wisconsin. This will become a permanent record that will be archived with our newspaper at the State Historical Society at UW-Madison. The records will be word searchable and available for free to the public on the Badger Link System in public and school libraries.

We identified 12 names from Washington County from the list. The records did not have specific cities or towns, but only the county. We believe we found 12 of the photos that match the names. Please call or email the Kewaskum Statesman office with any information about the 12 local Korean KIA's at 262-626-2626 or frontdesk@kstatesman.com so we can add, edit or correct the records.

Korean War KIA's

This year, we are adding the local KIA's from Korea to be included in this annual Memorial Day section. Our source of the records used was from the Korean War Extract Data File, as of April 29, 2008, from the

Memorial Day Perspective

By Gordon Haberman

After mom died, while going through her home, I found tucked away in the attic the old tin picnic basket. One of those that was probably popular in the late 1940s. Which when opened was full of my Dad's (who had passed on years prior) 'important' private papers. Occasionally over the years I remember him going through its contents at the kitchen table; yet I never knew nor understood the importance of the contents to him. I wish he would have shared them with me while he was alive.

Later that evening, back home at my own kitchen table I started examining the contents; including this letter addressed to my grandmother. It begins:

*'January 7, 1945
My Dear Mrs. Haberman:*

I am the Chaplin of the 149th Infantry Regiment. I should like to express my sympathy in the loss of your son Gordon. Having been with him in the engagement that cost his life I might be able to tell you of a few of the circumstances of his death which so far you have not heard.

Your son was killed at the Buri Airstrip, Leyte, Philippine Islands, on December 9, 1944, at approximately 13:30. He was killed by machine gun fire.'

Decoration Day (the precursor to Memorial Day) was not a holiday when I was growing up. Nor do I consider Memorial Day a holiday in the traditional sense of the word. It was and is a day, rightly set aside, for reflection. It is a day when hopefully all of us pause, interrupt our daily activities, and remember the ultimate sacrifice made throughout this country's history by members of our Armed Forces. It is a day set to honor those who fought and died in defense of our country, our freedoms, and our way of life. So many of those killed died in lands far away from their families and loved ones.

'He was buried in a United States Armed Forces Cemetery at Buri #1, Leyte, P.I. in grave number 40, on December 11th, 1944. I conducted his funeral service in the presence of the officers and men of his company. Our prayers were for you as well

as for Gordon in that service. We asked God to bring you some peace of mind and balm of heart in the great agony we knew would be yours in hearing of his death.'

I of course knew of my namesake's death when I was young and remember when the War Memorial in Milwaukee was dedicated in 1957 as well as attending services at the Wood Memorial Cemetery. So many Flags; so many graves. My grandmother died several years later. I remember my mom telling me that she was never the same after Gordon's death.

'Your son faced death very bravely that the rest of us might eventually enjoy a life of peace. May we prove worthy of his sacrifice. The officers and enlisted men of this Regiment join me in saying: Would that you might have been spared this sorrow'

*Sincerely, Harold P.
O'Gara, Chaplin'*

And how could my grandmother be the same? What the Chaplin could not know was that at the time Gordon was killed, my father, George, was in the jungles of Burma with the Army Air Corp and my Uncle Don, in the Navy, was on a ship in the South Pacific. It was months before they knew their brother was killed.

Not until many years later could I fathom the agony of a parent's loss. Yet, I can only imagine the helpless anguish my grandparents felt, losing one son and not knowing the welfare of their remaining sons stationed so far from home. Another Uncle was with Patton's Army in the Battle of the Bulge in Europe, having landed at Normandy. My future father-in-law was in the Seabees building airstrips on recaptured islands while we were still fighting for control of those islands. Amazing young men; all.

My father while talking rarely of the war had a saying about it: 'the only constant in life is War, and it is war that brings about change.' All these years later, I think about that statement and realize how true it is and how almost every generation alive today has been affected in some fashion by War. Since World War II; Korea, Vietnam, the Gulf War, 9/11, and a multitude of conflicts in between have placed our brave soldiers in peril. During each of these times, America has responded to aggression by placing in harm's way sons, daughters, fathers, mothers, husbands and wives. Where do we get such men and

women? A simple thank seems hardly adequate yet it is all we have to offer. That and our respect and gratitude as we honor the fallen this Memorial Day.

I am humbled by, and grateful to those who voluntarily risk their lives in defense of what the rest of us take for granted. As we attend parades and proudly wave the flag this Memorial Day, please pause to remember that the freedoms we enjoy have come at a cost which is incalculable. Behind every name of a fallen soldier, there is a family who loved, had hopes, dreams, and lives, and plans for the future – just as we do. My thoughts reach out to all of you who have been so adversely affected by War.

As I further went through the picnic box many other important documents chronicling Gordon's death surfaced as well as his Purple Heart, photographs of him and the cemetery in the Philippines (which my grandfather visited the year before his death) and an American Flag sent by the War Department, flown during the ceremony in the Philippines.

The picnic box is where all will remain until my grandson, also named Gordon, is ready to understand the history and sacrifice of his namesake. I hope I will be around to explain its contents' significance.

Southwest Pacific Area
February 9, 1945*

*'Dear Mrs. Haberman:
My deepest sympathy goes to you in the death of your son, Private First Class, Gordon A. Haberman.*

Your consolation for his loss may be that he died in the service of his country in a just cause and for the benefit of all.



umn from Gordon G. Haberman, Town of Farmington, since he and his wife are the only direct survivors of the September 11th attacks from Wisconsin. Their daughter, Andrea, a Kewaskum High School graduate, was the only Wisconsin person directly killed on that day. I will never forget the Haberman's sacrifice and neither will our country.

Gordon's column this year is about Decoration Day. Decoration Day preceded Memorial Day. It is a day when the graves of our brave service members are decorated dating back to when it was first started at Arlington National Cemetery on May

30, 1868. From Gordon's perspective, Memorial Day has only been recently celebrated as a holiday. It became a holiday in 1971. In this year's column, Gordon wrote about his uncle whom he was named after. Gordon provided me the photo of his uncle's grave in the Lette cemetery in the Philippines. In preparing this article, I found that cemetery was only a temporary cemetery and his uncle's remains were relocated to the U.S. National Cemetery in Manila. It also should be noted that Gordon's grandson is named Gordon III, after his great uncle who gave the ultimate sacrifice for our country in 1944.







When I was visiting the High Ground Memorial in Neillsville, Wisconsin, a few years ago, I noticed an exceptional piece of art mounted on a huge banner in front of the Learning Center. I took a photo of it and kept it in my files for a future Memorial Day. As I was preparing this year's Memorial Day copy I called the folks at the High Ground to find out where I could get a copy of this banner art known as "On Behalf of a Grateful Nation," created by artist Roland Castanie. I contacted Roland and he quickly returned my call. I learned immediately that he is a kind, generous individual who has a passion for our fallen military as well as Gold Star families. He explained that he drew most of "On Behalf of a Grateful Nation" in one day with a pencil in 2004. It was designed to honor the sacrifice of service members killed since September 11th. He gave away more than 4,000 prints of this piece to current Gold Star families through state chapters of the organization Vietnam Veterans of America. Vietnam Veterans delivered the prints to the families.

I asked Roland for permission to use his art in this Memorial Day edition and also on other things that I do that honor fallen heroes. He granted me full permission with his blessing to use as I see fit and sent me a print, refusing any money I offered. He also sent me a high resolution file of the art so I could publish it and get banners made.

Roland loves wildlife (he is also a wildlife artist) and loves to hunt. He has never been to Wisconsin but was very interested in the Horicon Marsh and its bird wildlife. At the end of our conversation, he said that he felt he had known me for a long time. This often happens among people with military connections. It is with great honor that our newspaper presents this very special image from a world class artist.

Thank you, Roland, for all your do for veterans and Gold Star families!

A native Texan, Roland Castanie was born and raised on the Gulf Coast. After graduating from Texas City High School he received a Bachelor of Science degree from Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos. His interest in medicine and a realistic and accurate style of art led him to the field of medical illustration at the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston where he held the position of medical illustrator and Supervisor of Medical Art. He received further training and taught in the Master's Degree Program at the University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas. His experience and training at these institutions greatly influenced his art

and graphic design work.

Roland's interest in wildlife and the outdoors began at an early age and have played a significant role in his art. An avid sportsman, the accuracy with which he portrays his subject matter reflects his careful attention to detail. His art is a result of years of observation, training and discipline.

Roland enjoys working with a variety of mediums including pen and ink, colored pencil, acrylic and graphite. Although known for his wildlife work, he is actively involved with western and cowboy subjects as well as sporting dogs. In recent years he has added portraiture to his body of work, enjoying the unique experience of capturing the person as

well as minute details that make his human subjects so fascinating to depict.

A strong supporter of conservation groups for over 40 years, Roland's art has raised tens of thousands of dollars for Ducks Unlimited for which it has awarded him the Gold Foil Award and Conservation Service Award.

He has also produced art that has raised funds for The National Wild Turkey Federation, The Texas Game Warden Association, Coastal Conservation Association, Safari Club International, NRA, and The Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation.

Roland is actively involved with the Vietnam Veterans of America, producing original art and a number of prints to fund

their scholarship programs. This effort has expanded from its local beginnings to the national level.

Roland's print "On Behalf of a Grateful Nation" has been presented to over 4000 Gold Star families across the United States. He has produced several pieces for the 1st Cavalry Division at Ft. Hood, Texas, the 1st Infantry Division at Ft. Riley, Kansas, the 101st Airborne at Ft. Campbell, Kentucky, the 82nd Airborne and 2nd Special Forces Group at Ft. Benning, Georgia, the 36th Infantry Division at Austin, Texas and the USMC Vietnam Tankers Association. Roland's military art can be found at the Vietnam Veteran's

Memorial at Angel Fire, New Mexico, The United States Military Academy at West Point, the 1st Cavalry Museum, the Pentagon in Washington D.C., the Texas A&M Corps of Cadets Museum and scores of VA clinics and VFW halls. Roland has always had a great deal of respect for those who serve in the military and is gratified to be able to focus attention on their courage and sacrifices.

Roland has produced a number of pieces for the City of Texas City, including the Millennium Mural in the Doyle Convention Center and the Texas City Wings of Heritage mural in the Nessler Center. Roland taught art and graphics at Texas City High School for 21 years

and also served as Adjunct Professor of Graphics at College of the Mainland. Roland and his wife, Peggy, have been blessed with two wonderful children, Monique and Roland III. Monique, a SWT graduate, lives in Dripping Springs and has given Roland the gift of two grandsons, Evan and Logan. Roland III (Cass), a Texas A&M graduate, resides in Austin with his wife, Sarah.



I Have Been Told That I Grind My Teeth At Night. Is That A Big Problem?

It can be depending on the damage done and the damage that is certainly going to occur.

Reasons why we grind are mostly due to stress which is pretty hard to overcome. It can also be a bite discrepancy where a new filling or crown is not perfect and needs adjusting. Another reason can be teeth shifting due to not having all your teeth and the remaining teeth shifting into the empty space and hitting each other in an eccentric manner.

If a tooth needs to be adjusted it may be a simple matter to address, however if it is stress related the treatment usually involves the use of a nightguard. This is a rubbery appliance that covers all the upper teeth and when grinding occurs, the stress is taken off the teeth and jaw joints and dissipated in the rubbery appliance.

Grinding can be a very painful experience and shouldn't be ignored as it usually gets worse. Talk to your dentist to find the best treatment for your particular problem.



Continued From... Caring For Beautiful Memories

The cemetery was a place he and other Boltonville residents would visit every Memorial Day.

Dettmann recalls the Memorial Day parade that used to be held in Boltonville.

There is one such parade that stands out in his mind.

"It was when I was in first or second grade. At that time, it was not odd for us to see World War I veterans in formation and giving orders as they were marching," Dettmann said.

But in this particular parade, a Civil War veteran was one of the honored guests.

"He was in the front seat of a Model A Ford, which was a new model at that time," Dettmann said. "I thought that was kind of neat."

It was part of the Memorial Day tradition to have a parade in Boltonville, as well as a program that was held in Boltonville's Woodmen Hall, which no longer exists.

"In my household, my dad made sure there were early spring flowers in a flower box at the front of the stage," Dettmann said.

The program would include a guest speaker, and schoolchildren would recite pieces and sing a song, Dettmann remembers.

Following the program, the crowd would walk to the Boltonville Union Cemetery and place a flag beside the gravestone of each veteran.

Cemetery History

The Boltonville Union Cemetery dates back to Boltonville's earliest settlers.

Some of the original rules set up by the founding families are still in a Tupperware box of records, according to Ellen Kesting, who serves on the cemetery board.

The rules include things such as "No horse will be allowed to pass through the grounds at a rate faster than a walk" and "No horse shall be left be

the driver on the grounds unfastened or fastened to a tree."

The cemetery itself holds many stories.

One is that the area's last surviving Civil War veteran of the Grand Army of the Republic, Elijah A. Duncan, is buried in the cemetery, Kesting said.

Another story involves an ex-slave.


"I was told that a lady who had been a slave and moved North after the Civil War is buried there," Dettmann said.

The woman, who supposedly worked in the Boltonville area as a maid, has a gravestone, but it is difficult to make out her name, Dettmann said.

Another often-told tale is that the cemetery has a potter's field where unknown people are buried, Dettmann said.

"I can't say for sure if someone is buried there, but we leave it open because that is what we have been told," Dettmann said.

Learning about the past

and the people who lived in the area has been one of the benefits Kesting received by serving on the cemetery board.

"People think being on the cemetery board would be pretty boring. No, it's not," Kesting said.

Cemetery Care

"We are a unique cemetery," Kesting said. "There are a lot of little union cemeteries that people don't want to take care of. They turn their little cemeteries over to the state or county or some local government to care for."

In contrast, plot owners have cared for the Boltonville Union Cemetery since 1869, Kesting said.


As the cemetery has needed things, the board has solicited donations from plot owners.

People from as far away from Oklahoma and Texas have responded and supported the cemetery, Kesting said.

Donations have covered the cost of planting crabapple trees, constructing a road through the cemetery and creating a wrought iron sign.

And now with Dettmann's donation, tulips, daffodils and annuals have been planted and the grounds are being maintained.

Dettmann's donation ensures the grounds will continue to be cared for

over the next several years.

Dettmann cannot think of a better legacy.

"It is going to be the most beautiful cemetery in Washington County," he said.

That makes it worth the

investment, and as a former insurance agent, Dettmann understands investments.

"Money is only paper," he said.

"The amount of people who wanted to help out and do what they can is incredible. Ashley is a great person, so it's easy to get behind her," said Brian Vetter, an advisor for the KHS FUTP60 program.

"It is wonderful," said Paula Carlton, who helped organize the run. "In the midst of tragedy, the community has been able to turn it around and turn it into something good. It just makes you smile."

As runners lined up at the starting line, the KHS band played.

Then color filled the air, and the run started.

The best part of the whole thing, though, for student Brooke Buchter may have been the tacos that were served after the run ended.

"I love tacos!" Brooke explained.

The FUTP60 group made sure that there were healthy choices offered with the tacos, such as granola bars, fruits and vegetables.

All of the proceeds from last week's run benefited the Trapp family.

The Trapp family was at a loss of words in response to the community's generosity.

"We are very overwhelmed," Jessica Trapp said.

It is not the first time the community has come together to support the Trapp family as they experienced tragedy.

About four years ago, they lost Travis in a car accident.

Since then, the family raised funds for scholarships to be given in Travis' name.

Then, when the house fire occurred earlier this year, community members began donating money and gift cards to help. The funds were collected at Geidel's Piggly Wiggly, beginning the first night of the fire.

Since that first fundraiser, the community has held various other fundraisers to help the family until insurance

money comes in from the house fire.

Other fundraisers have included a Pampered Chef party, Tupperware party, and Kewaskum Youth Basketball fundraiser.

Another fundraiser, a vendor fair, will be held for the family in the Kewaskum Annex on June 5, from 5 to 8 p.m.

"I would like to thank everyone," Ashley said. "Our family is very grateful for the prayers, cards and donations over the last several years. We will continue to give back to the community to help them as you helped us."

"Once we get back on our feet, we are going to give back," Randy Trapp said.



Brock, Relays Starting To Peak For Regionals And Sectionals

It was feast or famine for the Kewaskum High track teams in the East Central Conference Track and Field Meet held in Winneconne on May 16.

The Indian boys won four individual events and two relays but went scoreless in too many other events to compete with the likes of Plymouth and Berlin, who had strength and depth up and down the line to finish first and second with 147 and 144 points, respectively.

Kewaskum finished in fourth place with 101 points, nine behind Ripon's 110.

Fielding a very young team, the Lady Indians won the 1,600-meter race, the 3,200 and the pole vault, but finished far behind the leaders, Berlin and Winneconne, 1-2 with 182 and 133 points.

Kewaskum placed sixth with 53 points.

"Our conference is strong. Berlin and Plymouth field strong teams," KHS co-coach Jason Last said, indicating fourth was a good finish for KHS. "I was really proud of our kids. They worked hard. They ran hard and had a lot of personal bests," he said, pinch hitting for coach Kris Evans who was ill last week and had to miss the meet.

Senior Derrek Brock had a great day in his final conference competition, winning both hurdle races and helping the 4x400 relay to an impressive victory, with a new personal best (PR) time of 3 minutes, 27.43 seconds (3:27.43), 1.01 seconds ahead of runner-up Ripon.

Others on the victorious relay, which is aiming for a trip to the Division 2 state meet, are Jake Hrica, Brady Hanson and Cade Peterson.

"The 4 by 400 ran incredible. They took two seconds off their best time," Last said, indicating Ripon's quartet helped by pushing the Indians.

When it came to his individual races, Brock was right on his game. After posting the second fastest

time in the preliminaries, Brock flew over the 110 high hurdles in 16.04, an eyelash ahead of Kettle Moraine Lutheran junior Joseph Raasch, who hit the finish line in 16:08. No one else was close as the other six finalists were all freshmen and sophomores.

In the 300s, Brock had a more convincing win, coming in with a time of 40.66, two and a half seconds ahead of Raasch.

Peterson had a good day, winning the 200 in 23.29 with Plymouth junior Derek Novotny next at 23.93, and he placed sixth in the discus with a throw of 129 feet and 2 inches (129-2).

The 4x100 relay also had a big day, winning the event in a sizzling 43.90, ahead of Berlin's 45.42. Members of the winning quartet were Tony Steger, Hanson, Kyle Pamperin and Cameron Dodge.

"Our handoffs were good, but we still have a little room for improvement," Last said of the ace sprinters. "Steger got the team off to a good start, then Brady had the wind at his back, which is good when you are 6-feet, 5, and Pamperin did well going into the wind," according to Last, who said, "Cameron finished it off."

Hanson won the high jump after clearing 6-4, four inches ahead of Berlin's Wyatt Arndt, but was not entered in the long jump after hitting a 19-10 in his first try in the event in a recent quad meet.

Riley Donovan placed third in the discus with a toss of 147-02, while Pamperin had the fastest time, an 11.79 in the preliminaries but had to settle for fourth place with a 11.77 in the finals won by Berlin senior Jack Werch, who had an 11.59 clocking.

Other top-six efforts in individual events included: Tony Leister, 4th in the pole vault, 10-06; Isaiah Cochran, 4th in the 300 hurdles with a PR 45.45; John Leister, 5th in the shot put, 44-10.25; Dodge, 6th in the 100, 11.90; and

Pamperin, 6th in the pole vault, 10-0.

The Lady Indian distance runners came through again. Sophomore Grace Marchello won the 1,600 with a PR of 5:45.40. She was over 13 seconds ahead of the runner-up in the race.

Home schooler Romaela Olla led the field of 3,200 runners, circling the eight laps in 12:31.46, over 50 seconds ahead of the second place finisher.

"Gosh, Romaela was 200 ... 300 meters ahead of the next girl," Last said.

Kewaskum's hurdler duo also did well, with freshman Maddy Thull finishing fourth in the 100 hurdles with a time of 17.90 and Sarah Butschlick right behind her in fifth at 18.47. Butschlick had a season low of 18.31 in the prelims.

Freshman pole vaulter, Abby Meidl, also performed well, winning her specialty by clearing 8-6.

Another top-six finish came from Melissa Schneider in the 1,600 where she was sixth with a 6:24.14 clocking.

The KHS athletes were at the Berlin Regional on May 22. Those finishing in the top four will be at the sectional in East Troy this afternoon (May 25).

Those qualifying for the WIAA State Track and Field Championships in La Crosse June 2-3 will include the top four finishers in each event at the sectional, along with individuals and relay teams whose performances in sectional ranks among the top eight best of all sectional performances.

Indians Continue Their Winning Ways On The Diamond

The May 20 Oakfield Invitational was billed as a two-game event for the Kewaskum High softball team, but early in its second game against Random Lake, with the Indians leading 3-0, the rain came, and the coaches felt it would be smart to stop play.

Kewaskum (21-3) did get in Game 1, and it was a dandy, a 3-2 win over Horicon, which is rated among D-4 teams.

"It was a really good game," KHS coach Jeff Gosse said. "We were at full strength so we could use girls for pinch running or pinch hitting."

Kennedy Lehn got the win, but she gave up five hits, which is the most she has given up all year.

"They are the best hitting team we have seen so far," Gosse said. His girls hit okay, too, especially senior Brittany Williams, who drilled a double off the fence to drive in two runs in the top of the fifth, giving KHS a 3-1 lead.

Sydney Donath drew a walk to lead off the inning, and her pinch runner, Abby Baumann, was moved to second with Maddie Geidel coming to the plate. "They were going to intentionally walk her," Gosse said, but the pitcher "grooved one down the middle" and Geidel hit a smash the shortstop was not able to handle. Geidel was safe at first.

Then, with runners at first and third, Williams came through in a big way.

Kewaskum's first run was scored in the second when Ashley Trapp singled, took second on a passed ball, moved to third on a fielder's choice and stole home. Trapp was the only Indian to

have two hits.

Trapp's run tied the game at 1-1 as Horicon scored in the first when its Number 2 hitter, Jaden Justman, homered.

The Marshmen scored another single run in the sixth when Angie Laabs doubled and her sister, Cassie Laabs, singled her home. Horicon wound up loading the bases before Lehn recorded a strikeout for the last out.

"In the seventh, Kennedy put them down 1-2-3," Gosse said.

With commanding 19-0 and 16-0 shutout wins over host Ripon on May 18, the Lady Indians have hit the 20-win mark for the third year in a row.

The host Tigers were powerless against sophomore ace pitcher, Kenney Lehn, who pitched no-hitters in both games that ended after three innings via the 15-run "mercy rule."

We were hitting the ball pretty well that night," KHS coach Jeff Gosse said, reporting Lehn's efforts included a perfect nine strikeouts in each game, bringing her season total to 240.

In Game 1, the Indians batted around and then some, scoring 11 runs in the first inning and the rout was on. KHS had 18 hits, including five doubles, two by Bre Trepes and one each by Brittany Williams, Maddie Geidel and McKenzie Lane. Kennedy Lehn was a perfect 4x4 with three runs batted in (RBI) while Trepes drove in a season-high five runs.

In the nightcap, the Indians pounced on the Ripon pitcher for 16 runs in the first four innings. In this game, Trepes homered, doubled and contributed two RBI, while Leah Theusch and Ashley

Trapp each chipped in with a double. Eight KHS batters got hits.

The next batter hit a deep fly out before Lehn gave up a single and double, putting runners at second and third.

The next Lady Wolf to hit a "comebacker" to the mound, and "We got her (the runner) at home," Gosse said, reporting Lehn got the final out on a strikeout.

Lehn struck out 14 and didn't walk a single batter, while the Indians touched Hunter for two runs on four hits and her reliever, Larissa Russell, for one run on three hits.

Maddie Geidel had another good day at the plate, going 2x4 with two RBI. Her double in the fifth drove in Leah Theusch (singled) and Bre Trepes (double).

Sydney Donath drove in the other run with her pinch hit single in the sixth inning.

Lehn also contributed a pair of hits to the effort.


A third Kewaskum-Waupun game looks like a good possibility, and Waupun would host, with the winner probably facing Grafton on Tuesday, May 30.

Indians Slip In EC Golf Tournament, Finish Second In Final Standings

The Waupun High golfers certainly picked a good time to shoot their best scores of the year.

In the East Central Conference tournament held May 17 at the Whispering Springs Golf Club in Fond du Lac, the Warriors claimed the first three individual places to win the tournament with 320 strokes.

Tucker Lemmenes captured the medal for the day with a 4-over-par 76, while teammates Blake Harmsen and Brenden Mock were tied for second place with Winneconne's Bryce Peters and Solomon Zarlino of Kettle Moraine Lutheran at 78.

Plymouth came into the tournament with a four-point lead on Kewaskum based on results from the eight mini-tour events, and by finishing second in the tournament with a 325 total and claimed the 2017 ECC championship by six points.

Defending champion Kewaskum had a bit of an off day, posting a 337 (an 84 average for the four counters) for third place, but still finished second in the final standings. The only Indians to reach the top 10 were sophomore Talon Ralph, who finished ninth with a 40-42-82, and junior Jordan Carlton (40-44) was tied with Plymouth's Johno Aschenbach and Tim DeRuyter of Berlin for 10th place at 84. Aschenbach got the 10th medal using the handicap hole.

There was a one-hour delay due to rain and lightning, according to KHS coach Casey Scheel, who said his golfers struck the ball well but had difficulty getting putts to drop.

"As a team, we were definitely hoping for better scores. Going into the tournament, we knew we needed to shoot a low round and get help from other teams to reach our team goal of winning conference a reality," Scheel said. "The outcome wasn't what we had hoped for, but are still very pleased to finish second in confer-

ence because the team is so young and loses just one senior."

After Ralph and Carlton, came sophomore Jacob Schlosser, who was in the battle for the season medalist but slipped to third in points after shooting a 40-45-85. Brad Buechel was the final counter, shooting a 45-41-86 while James Banks' 90 was thrown out.

Cade Knaus, a junior from Plymouth, and Zarlino led the all-conference team with 61 points based on scores and placements from the regular season and the tournament. Others on the first team were Schlosser with 54 points; Jake Willeford of Plymouth, 48; and Peters, 44.

"Jacob entered the tournament with a one-point lead for Player of the Year," Scheel said. "Unfortunately he didn't have one of his best days. He has played so well all year, but the conference tournament wasn't his day. He struggled to find his putting stroke, and that has carried him all year. I am confident he will get that stroke back."

Waupun had three players on the second unit, including Mock, Lemmenes and Harmsen.

Buechel and Carlton received honorable mention after scoring 25 and 18 points, respectively.

The Indians are hosting a WIAA Division 2 Regional at the Kettle Hills Golf Course in Richfield on Tuesday, May 23. Hon-E-Kor CC is Kewaskum's home course, but, according to Scheel, cannot host a regional because it does not have a range.

Former coach Glenn Eichstedt, who works at Kettle Hills, applied for a regional last year before retiring. He will serve as meet manager, Scheel said.

The top four teams and top four individuals from the non-qualifying teams advance to the Racine St. Catherine Sectional on Wednesday, May 31.

The season isn't going the way the Kewaskum High soccer players hoped it would, but, despite the injuries, inexperience and weather postponements, they keep right on battling.

Playing at Berlin on May 18, the Indians scored two, first-half goals and turned back some late surges by the hosts to come home with a 2-1 victory.

"We made it interesting, that's for sure," KHS coach Luke Piwoni said. KHS was up 2-0 at half, but Berlin was threatening at the end.

The first KHS goal was scored by senior Molly Schulteis, her sixth of the year, at 6:49, with the assist by Hailey Herriges. "It was a nice clean look," Piwoni said, reporting that score "set the tone for the first half."

Just before the end of the half, Lizzy Bauer scored with Schulteis assisting on the play, so KHS had a 2-0 lead, but it was not a real comfortable lead.

Seven minutes into the second half, "We had a hand ball in the box, and

they got a PK (penalty kick)," the coach said. After converting it, "They kept pushing. Luckily we were able to handle it."

"I thought Emma Penfield had a nice game. She did not let the Berlin forwards get the ball past our defenders," Piwoni said, adding, "For the past three or four games, Claire Schlieter has played real well at outside mid. She's been able to win her one-on-one possessions consistently."

With the victory, KHS is 3-7 in East Central Conference action with four conference games left before tournament play.

They helped Kewaskum High School win the East Central Conference golf title a year ago, and this past Sunday, Andrew Otto and Sam Schlosser were crowned as champions of the annual 36-hole Hon-E-Kor Bestball Tournament.

In their first try at the event, the two Concordia University golfers teamed up to shoot an even par 140 on rounds of 69 and 71, defeating Jim Rohlinger and Jay Krueger by a single shot.

"We played real good for the conditions," Otto said afterward, reporting the players only got in nine holes (on the Blue Nine) Saturday before the rains intensified and play was suspended. Sunday, the teams played 27 holes on the Red, Blue and White Nines in that order.

"Today we didn't do too well at the end," Otto went on. "The last three holes, we were 3-over-par so that made it a little closer than we would have wanted."

On the Blue Nine Saturday, Schlosser and Otto had one birdie on the par 4, Number 8 hole, then

they broke loose with six birdies in the final 27 holes, including two on the Red (Number 6 and 8), three on Blue (Number 2, 3 and 8) and one on the White (Number 6).

"He carried us on Saturday," Schlosser said. "I only hit one green in regulation."

"We turned it on a little today. We were able to pick each other up and stay away from big numbers," Schlosser went on. The lone exception came on Number 8 White where, "We both hit the ball in the water and doubled."

"We thought we had lost it because we played so bad on White," Otto said. Schlosser agreed, especially watching Krueger and Rohlinger playing ahead of them.

"I figured a birdie would win, so I went for it on 18. I ended up 30 yards short, then chipped on and ended up just a foot and a half or two feet from the hole, but I missed it ... I pushed it a little on the high side."

Others must have been doing the same since no one came in with a lower score.

who won the title in 2015, came in with a 72-69, while Ethan Geidel and Jason Jahnke combined for a 72-71—143 total for third place.

From there, the scores of the other six teams jumped to 148 and higher.

The winners of the First Flight were Larry Sterr and Dan Gibbon, who teamed up for rounds of 72 and 74 for a 146, one stroke ahead of David Wietor and Ryan Wietor, whose card showed a 72-75—147.

WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORT

Structure Fires

On May 20 at 5:07 a.m. the Sheriff's Office received a report of smoke coming from the residence at 2790 Highway 83 in the town of Hartford. The caller was a passerby and ultimately made contact with the 82-year-old resident and evacuated her from the residence. There was also an off-duty Hartford firefighter who stopped to assist and rescued a cat from inside the residence. The Hartford Fire Department was paged and deputies were dispatched to the residence.

Upon the arrival of the first deputy on scene at 5:16 a.m. the smoke was coming out of the soffits on all sides of the residence. When the second deputy arrived a short time later, he positioned his squad at the intersection of Highway 83 and Whistle Drive for traffic control. Shortly thereafter, this deputy radioed dispatch about heavy smoke coming from a 16-unit garage structure at the Oriole Pond Apartments (400 Whistle Drive - City of Hartford) and after doing so the unit where the smoke was emanating

from became fully engulfed. At this point Hartford Fire Department upgraded the fire to a MABAS call. Fire Departments from Slinger, Richfield, Woodland, St. Lawrence, Allenton, Neosho, Ashippun, Germantown and an ambulance from Lifestar Rescue responded.

The fires were extinguished by approximately 6:11a.m. The garage and contents at the residence suffered severe damage; including a vehicle which is a total loss. The apartment complex is new construction so there are no tenants. The garage structure runs parallel to Highway 83 and is approximately 0.2 mile south of 2790 Highway 83 on the same side of the road.

There were three garage units damaged as a result of the fire. Due to the close geographic nature and timeframe of these fires the Sheriff's Office paged in two detectives; one of which is a fire investigator. Hartford Police Department also contacted one of their detectives who is also a fire investigator. The detectives are working together on these scenes

and will be assisted by the state fire marshal, who was requested to respond. At this time there is no damage estimate available.

Fatal Crash

Nathanial Jackson Miennert, 18, of Richfield was killed in a vehicle crash on May 18 on State Highway 83 south of Lee Road in the Town of Hartford.

On Thursday, May 18, at 5:37 p.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office responded to State Highway 83 approximately 0.2 mile south of Lee Road in the Town of Hartford in reference to a two-vehicle crash with injury. A Hartford police officer was in the area and was the first squad on scene and advised Washington County dispatch that one patient was still trapped in his vehicle and had sustained serious injuries. Hartford Fire and Rescue Department responded for medical triage of both vehicle operators. Hartford Rescue requested Flight for Life for Miennert, who was transported to Aurora Medical Center-Hartford, where he succumbed to his injuries. The second operator had only minor injuries and was transported via ambulance to a local hospital.

Miennert was driving a green Ford Focus station wagon north on State Highway 83 and was the sole occupant in the vehicle. While negotiating a curve in the roadway south of Lee Road, Miennert's vehicle crossed the center line into the southbound lane of travel and struck the southbound vehicle in a head-on manner.

The driver of the southbound vehicle was an 18-year-old male from Erin. He was the sole occupant of a silver Toyota Tacoma truck. He suffered minor injury and was treated and released from Aurora Medical Center in Summit.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office Crash Reconstruction Unit is assisting with the investigation. Weather and road conditions were not a factor in the crash. State Highway 83 was closed to traffic for approximately six hours.

This is Washington County's first traffic fatality in 2017.

Anyone who was a witness to this crash or who has any pertinent information about the manner in which either vehicle were operating prior to the crash is asked to contact the Washington County Sheriff's Office at 262-335-4378.



Weekly HEALTH TIP

FIDGETING MAY HAVE BENEFITS

Fidgeting may help offset the negative effects of prolonged sitting, one of which may be a decrease in blood flow in your legs. In a recent small study of young adults, researchers had participants tap one heel very quickly for one minute and then rest it for 4 minutes, repeatedly for 3 hours. They were instructed to keep the other leg still. Blood flow in the lower part of the leg they moved was significantly improved, while blood flow in the still leg was reduced. More research is needed to see if this holds true for older adults. Fidgeting shouldn't replace exercise, but when that's not possible, it may be better than sitting still.



Draining Livewells Can Stop Invasive Species And Protect Wisconsin's Waters

Water left in livewells, bait buckets, and bilges is a vehicle for the spread of aquatic invasive species between lakes. That is why draining all equipment before leaving a boat launch is required in Wisconsin - a requirement that will be underscored at the upcoming statewide Drain Campaign.

The annual campaign will take place the weekend of June 9-11. Volunteers will be talking with anglers and boaters at landings around the state and, in some cases, handing out free icepacks as a substitute to keeping fish in water.

"Ice is a great alternative to keep your fish fresh on the ride home," says Bob Wakeman, the statewide Aquatic Invasive Species Coordinator for the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, adding that ice is already preferred by many anglers, since it stops bacterial growth and helps to protect the flavor of your catch.

New to the Drain Campaign this year is a coordinated way for anglers to help share its

message. For those who use social media, they can help spread the word about the importance of draining livewells and other equipment by posting photos and messages using the hashtag #JustDrainIt.

Wisconsin law prohibits the transport of invasive species because they have negative impacts on our aquatic ecosystems and our economy. Draining your water and using ice instead is the best way to comply with the law and help keep our lakes and fisheries healthy.

"Anglers are passionate about protecting their lakes and know the right thing to do is to remove invasive species and drain water from their boats," says Wakeman.

The following steps are required by law to prevent aquatic invasive species.

- ◆ INSPECT boats, trailers and equipment.
 - ◆ REMOVE all attached aquatic plants and animals.
 - ◆ DRAIN all water from boats, vehicles, and equipment, including livewells and buckets containing fish.
 - ◆ NEVER MOVE plants or live fish away from a waterbody.
 - ◆ DISPOSE of unwanted bait in the trash
 - ◆ BUY minnows from a Wisconsin bait dealer. Use leftover minnows only when fishing with them on the same body of water or on other waters as long as no lake or river water or other fish have been added to their container.




