Getting Down To Manufacturing Business In The Classroom

– Spiros Industries Donates Robotics Kits To i4L Community School

After being heat treated and properly measured, the tiny metal spring traveled along a conveyor belt until it reached the robot.

Sensing the spring's arrival, the robot twisted and turned to place the newly formed spring into its position on a piece of sticky paper.

There, the new spring looked identical to the hundreds of other springs that were lined in neat rows on sheets of paper, ready to be shipped to a customer.

This is what students from the i4Learning Community School witnessed when they recently toured Spiros Industries in Kohlsville. Through the tour, the students learned about how springs are made from wire and prepared to be shipped to customers.

The tour was part of a new partnership the

school has formed with Spiros Industries, a manufacturer of custom springs and wire forms.

As part of that partnership, Spiros recently donated \$10,365 to purchase robot kits for the i4Learning Community School.

The robots will allow students in grades three through five to explore a variety of robotic components as they build and test mobile robots that may be controlled remotely. Students will be challenged to design, model and test robots to complete various tasks.

"It is pretty cool to see all those springs being manufactured right here in our backyard. We're super excited about creating an ongoing partnership with Spiros. They have been so great to work with over the past few months," Principal Joel Dziedzic said.

Lucky Duck Wins Race

– Boltonville Rain Days Features Fun Event

Gregory Howell, 8, cheered as the plastic ducks floated down Stony Creek on Sunday after-

noon.

He was able to keep a close eye on his duck. After all, he had colored his duck, Number 30, bright green and orange

so that it would be easy to spot amongst the yellow plastic flock.

Sunday was the first time a duck race was ever held as part of Boltonville Rain Days to raise funds for the Boltonville Fire Department. The race was a hit, with many attendees purchasing a \$5 plastic duck for a chance to win \$100.

As Number 30 made its way down the river along with the hundreds of other small plastic ducks, it was one of several dozen ducks that got stuck in the tall grass of a small island. Gregory's poor duck looked uncomfortable, stuck and tipped over in the mud.

"It will be a while before mine gets out," Gregory bemoaned.

Just as the crowd started to call fowl because so many ducks were getting stuck on the course, a good Samaritan stepped forward to help.

The brave soul balanced himself on the edge of the river bank and tried to knock the stuck

duckies free with a long stick.

The spectators watched with bated breath as the ducks' hero clung to a tree and reached as far as he could without falling into the river.

Then, with one quick swipe of the stick, Gregory's duck was finally free.

Although Number 30 did not win the race, Gregory ran along the riverbank to the finish line. There, he was joyfully reunited with his duck.

Last weekend was not the first time the Boltonville Fire Department had rescued poultry. The firefighters still talk about the legendary incident that is now referred to as "The Great Goose Rescue."

That escapade happened about eight years ago, when the fire department received a call about a goose that was trapped in the ice of a frozen pond.

"The lady who called was very concerned about the goose. It was a special goose," an anonymous source said.

Always ready to help, the volunteer firefighters climbed into a fire truck and responded to the call.

Fortunately, the fire department had just recently acquired some wetsuits. The Boltonville emergency workers, who try to be prepared for everything, brought along the wetsuits.

Once they arrived at the site, the firefighters evaluated the situation. They saw the frozen pond. They saw the stuck goose.

"It was a Canadian goose," one of the fire-

fighters reported.

Then, two dedicated volunteer firefighters put on the wetsuits. They carefully went onto – and into – the pond.

When the brave volunteers got within reach of the goose, it flapped its large wings and flew away to freedom.

With that same heroic spirit, firefighters worked to gather all of the yellow plastic ducks as they finished the race on Sunday.

A large crowd gathered at the finish line, cheering on the ducks and watching the firefighters in action.

In the trenches, volunteer firefighter Stephen Schumaker was on duck duty. The onlookers

watched as Schumaker grabbed plastic duckies and tossed them to awaiting firefighters on top of the bridge.

Clad in waders, Schumaker's firefighting training seemed to pay off.

He successfully grabbed the lucky duck that won the race. Then, he was able to quickly snatch plastic ducks from the frigid water, without letting

a single one squeak past him and flow downstream into the DNR-protected water.

Other firefighters assisted, using a large fishing net and several plastic rakes to gather all the ducks as they completed the course.

For a first-time event, everyone seemed to agree that the race was just ducky.

Woodford Drive Bridge Closed To Traffic

The Woodford Drive bridge over the Eisenbahn State Trail has been closed to all traffic beginning Thursday, May 25. The bridge will remain closed to traffic throughout the duration of the County Trunk Highway D construction project, which is scheduled to be substantially completed by mid-August. The bridge is being closed solely for the purpose of restricting traffic utilizing the one-lane wooden bridge to bypass construction on CTH D and not for structural reasons.

Woodford Drive is not to be used by through traffic attempting to bypass the construction zone. Please follow the posted detour route utilizing USH 45, State Trunk Highway (STH) 33, and STH 144

(Main Street). Non-local traffic traveling through the construction zone and on Woodford Drive may be ticketed. Local residents are asked to use extra care when driving in the construction area and obey all flagmen and construction signs. Alternate routes should be utilized if possible to avoid delays.

The event is open for kids ages 1 to 17.

JAKES Free Fishing Day is sponsored by the Gateway Gobblers, the local branch of the National Wild Turkey

Federation.

The National Wild Turkey Federation started the JAKES (Juniors Acquiring Knowledge, Ethics and Sportsmanship) program to give youth the opportunity to experience fishing, hunting and outdoor activities.

Free Fish Camp Planned For Saturday, June 10

The Long Lake Fishing Club's annual 5 - 95+ Fish Camp will be held Saturday, June 10, down by the old mill pond behind the Hamburger Haus in Dundee.

Camp runs from 9 to 11:30 a.m. Admission is free.

A fish fry, soda and chips will be given to all attendees, compliments of the Long Lake Fishing Club.

Attendees need not be a member to join the camp; they simply need an interest in learning more about fishing and helping the environment.

The camp is open to everyone ages 5 to 95 and older. Physically challenged individuals are encouraged to attend.

At the camp, participants will have an opportunity to meet other fishing enthusiasts. There will be

an opportunity to ask questions and learn which bait to use for each species of fish, know where to throw a line, learn to read water and much more. This is a one-time power-learning session to prepare you for the fishing season ahead.

The ponds will be stocked with bluegills provided by the Long Lake Fishing Club. This is a free activity for kids of all ages.

Those who have their own fishing pole should bring it to the camp. For those that do not have a pole, the club will provide one to use that day. Bait will be available, too. If you have a grandparent or parent, bring them as well.

To raise funds for the camp, the Long Lake Fishing Club held Snow Golf in February, a fish fry and raffle in March and a brat fry in Lomira in May.

The club also sponsors two fishing tournaments each year.

The Long Lake Fishing Club, which has about 150 members, was created to protect, maintain, and improve all the environments necessary to insure, for present and future generations, the enjoyment of successful fishing on Long Lake.

The club stocks the Long Lake with fish each year. In addition, the club received a permit to put a rock reef in Long Lake to help young fish survive. Due to ice conditions this past winter, the project of installing the rock reef has been postponed to next January.

Passport Fair To Be Held



Fireworks Display Kicks Off Boltonville Rain Days With A Bang

About seven years ago, Tony Bamke lit his burning barrel on fire. That was at about 6 a.m.

Later that day, Bamke and his wife, Holly, left their Boltonville home and went to the Call of the Wild (now the Great Outdoors Supper Club) for a fish fry. They were enjoying their dinner when they saw a police car heading east on State Road 28.

"There must be a fire," Holly said nonchalantly.

A short time later, when the couple finished their dinner and went home, Holly was not as calm.

"Oh my God, the fire truck is in our yard!" she said.

Apparently, while the couple was enjoying their dinner, the wind had picked up and blown ashes from the burning barrel onto dry wood that Bamke had stacked beside his shed.

Fortunately, the firefighters were able to extinguish the fire before any major damage occurred.

That was how Bamke was introduced to the Boltonville Fire Department.

The fire department crew learned that Bamke helped run his family's fireworks business, called Fireworks Country, the business is located in Wittenberg.

Fast forward to the year

2015.

The Boltonville Volunteer Fire Department wanted to attract more people to its annual Boltonville Rain Days celebration.

Chief Kenny Ramthun remembered Bamke and the fact that Bamke ran a fireworks business. So he gave Bamke a call.

"Fireworks will draw people," Bamke affirmed and agreed to donate half and run the fireworks show.

The display was a hit.

So last Friday night, Bamke returned with his business, Fireworks Country, as the Boltonville Rain Days celebrated the 100th anniversary of the Boltonville Fire Department.

The three-day festival began Friday.

When dusk arrived, Dick Kapinos stood on a picnic table with his saxophone. The crowd stood quietly as Kapinos' saxophone rendition of the National Anthem filled the air. As the solo ended, the fireworks display started with a bang.

The show began and ended with a fire bomb, which is Fireworks Country's signature series.

The 21-minute show drew plenty of oohs, ahhs and applause from the crowd. And a compliment from the fire chief.

"I'm glad you nearly

burned your shed down, because I got a chance to meet you," Ramthun told Bamke.

Bamke's parents started the Fireworks Country business in 2002.

The business started out slowly with some backyard shows.

Soon, requests came in to provide fireworks for events such as the Washington County Fair and the Ozaukee County Fair. The family business now offers a variety of shows, with some of the fireworks choreographed to music.

Because the fireworks season is short, Bamke also has a cheese curd wagon and drives a mail truck in the winter.

The next big event for Fireworks Country will be its annual Fireworks Extravaganza

on Saturday, June 17, at the company's home base at W18862 State Highway 29 in Wittenberg. The day features entertainment, concessions, bands, hot air balloon rides and, of course, fireworks.

Even with big shows like the one planned in June, Bamke enjoys working at community events like the Boltonville Rain Days.

"I do these shows more as a hobby and to help out the community, because I'm a big believer in supporting your community," Bamke said.

Little Walter Theusch, Jr., aged seven, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Theusch, Sr. of Kewaskum, became Washington County's 11th traffic victim of this year when his life was instantly snuffed out at 9:30 a.m. last Sunday morning, May 24, after leaving St. Bridget's Catholic Church in the Town of Wayne following services. The lad ran into the road directly in the path of a milk truck which struck and injured him fatally. The boy was rushed to a physicians office in this village but was pronounced dead upon arrival. The truck

was traveling at a slow pace at the time of the accident. Walter had just left the church after attending mass as one of the flower boys for seven children who received their first Holy Communion. 

According to new research, which looked at more than 12,000 people, consuming more fruits and vegetables may make you happier. Manufacturing Lessons

Over the last few months, students in grades three through five at the i4Learning Community school have been working on a manufacturing unit.

Touring Spiros allowed the students to see first-hand how a manufacturing plant operates.

Spiros, which employs about 50 people, makes a variety of different springs, including torsion, compression, extension, magazine, micro and rings.

In all, the company is currently making about 1,000 different specific products. Among those are springs that are used for lawnmower engines, springs for house locks, springs for hair clippers and springs for fuel tanks in cars.

"There are so many devices that have springs," said Dennis Backhaus, one of the company's two owners.

For example, there are springs that are used as safety valves in a fuel tank. In higher temperatures, gasoline expands, and the valves prevent the fuel from expanding and spilling out of the gas tank.

"Also there are valves in there that shut the fuel off to lessen the probability of fire in case you flip your car over, which you are not supposed to do," Backhaus explained to the young students.

At Spiros, springs are created mainly through an automated process.

In fact, at night, workers turn off the lights when they leave the facility, but

the machines are still running, creating product.

"When they come back in the morning, they check the springs, and if they are still good, we've made good product while we weren't here," Backhaus said.

In fact, human workers are needed to make sure the machines are running as they should throughout the day and to ensure that the product is meeting certain specifications.

The i4L students learned how Spiros recycles products that are not up to par and sells them as scrap metal.

In addition to learning about the manufacturing process, the i4L students toured the warehouse area.

"You will notice this ceiling is a little bit taller in the warehouse, and the product is stacked up all the way to the ceiling. This way, when a customer calls, we can put it on a truck and ship it out right away," Backhaus explained to the students.

Spiros is an international business, so some of the products are shipped to places as far away as Malaysia.

The students had plenty of questions for Backhaus.

"How does the robot know how many springs there are?" one student asked.

Answer: A computerized sensor keeps track of how many springs are made.

"Does Spiros make springs for trampolines?" another student wanted to know.

Answer: No, Spiros does not currently have

the capacity to make trampoline springs.

The i4Learning Community School

In addition to touring the Spiros plant, students at i4L tried their own hand in the manufacturing business.

The students created their own products, such as hair barrettes, books, paper airplanes and flavored water.

The two owners of Spiros, Backhaus and Jim Maronde, along with six employees, visited i4L last week when the students held a Manufacturing Market Day. Through that project, students learned about product supply and demand, profit and loss, marketing, research and development, customer service and teamwork.

The i4Learning Community School is Kewaskum School District's only charter school.

The school offers project-based learning in a multi-age learning environment. Students in kindergarten through second grade are in one classroom with two teachers.

A second classroom is made up of the grades three through five cohort, with two teachers.


A 4K class is also offered.

Community partnerships are developed in an effort to provide students with effective learning experiences beyond the brick-and-mortar school.

For the 2017-18 school year, the school is at capacity for the K-2 cohort, but has a few openings in the 3-5 cohort and 4K classroom.

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
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

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Schlosser's 80 Helps Indian Golfers Win Regional Test

First-year Kewaskum High golf coach Casey Scheel didn't mince words about his team's performance in the Division 2 regional tournament at the Kettle Hills Golf Course near Germantown.

"(I am) Very happy to have won the regionals and be moving on to sectional as a team, but we didn't play very well," Scheel said after the event. "We struggled as a team to put together two solid nines, as we were very up and down all day long."

It didn't matter much in the standings, as none of the other nine teams could challenge the Indians, who came in with a 337 from its top four scorers. Chilton finished nine strokes back at 346, and the other teams scheduled to move on to Racine Country Club on May 31st are Sheboygan Falls with a 352 and Campbellsport, which beat Oostburg in a playoff, with 380.

Kewaskum's scores included a 36-44—80 from sophomore Jacob Schlosser, who finished third overall, 85s from Brad Buechel and Talon Ralph and an 87 from Jordan Carlton.

Chilton's Alex Brandt captured the medal with an even par 72, while Kiel's Trace Woepse was second at 78.

"Jacob Schlosser and Brad Buechel carried the team on the front nine," Scheel said, explaining Schlosser had "one of the more interesting front nines you will see. He shot an even par 36 and only parred two holes. His front

nine consisted of four birdies, two bogeys, a double bogey and two pars."

Scheel went on that Buechel shot "a very consistent 40 and played steadily throughout."


The other three struggled, but Scheel was impressed with the way they all battled back on their second nines. Carlton got into a rhythm and got some putts to drop to shoot a 39 after starting with a 48, while Ralph went from 45 to a 40 and James Banks, whose 98 did not count, went from 55 to 43.

"As you can see, all struggled to put a solid 18-hole round together," Scheel said, indicating, "That will be the emphasis all week is that we need to be consistent to compete at sectionals."

The other two regionals feeding into the Racine St. Catherine's sectional are Catholic Memorial and Brookfield Academy. Catholic Memorial won its regional with a sizzling 306, while Brookfield Academy's 328 topped the field at the Wanaki Golf Course near Menomonee Falls.

The top two teams and top three individuals from non-qualifying teams qualify for the WIAA State Golf Tournament, which will be held at University Ridge Golf Course near Verona on June 5-6.

Mission Accomplished; Chesak And Goeden Are Headed For State Tennis

A pair of juniors, Jared Chesak and Brent Goeden, made history on May 24 when they became the first Kewaskum High doubles players to qualify for the WIAA State Division 2 Tennis Tournament.

The two punched their ticket to the tournament by erasing McFarland's Noah Fischer and Carter Johnson, 6-1, 6-3 in the opening round which began shortly before noon after a three-hour rain delay.

"You guys played great. I couldn't be prouder of you," KHS assistant coach Peter Garcia said as his Number 1 double team came off the court, knowing they reached one of their main season goals.

Goeden and Chesak lost the first game in the first set, then reeled off six wins in a row on some beautiful serving and shot placement. Chesak had a pair of aces in his second go-around at the serve, and Goeden served up the

win with three aces in the final game.

The McFarland duo was so frustrated that their coach took 15 points away in the first game of the second set for unbecoming language, and the Indians used the points to win that game fairly easily.

The set was tied at 1-1, 2-2 and finally KHS broke Johnson's serve and stretched their lead to 5-2 before giving up one more game and then breaking Johnson's serve again, using Chesak's perfectly placed shot down the line and Goeden's smash for the victory.

There was still work to be done, however, as the top four places are determined at Nos. 1 singles and doubles for seeding for Madison. In the semis, they took on a pair of seniors from Big Foot/Williams Bay, Logan Gronow and Hamilton Smith, who were 13-4. The Indians won that match 6-1, 6-3.

Once again, the Indian duo was serving well and won several key games after deuce situations in

the first set. During the changeover, the Big Foot head coach came out to give his team some suggestions on how to slow the Kewaskum team but to no avail.

Then on the changeover in the second set, Big Foot's assistant coach talked to Gronow and Smith and when she returned to the bleachers, the head coach remarked he hoped what she told them would work better than his suggestions.

Goeden and Chesak just kept playing their game, using power and finesse when it was called for.

The win put the Indians in the golf medal match vs. Princeton La (who is from Virginia) and Carlos Nunez of St. Lawrence Seminary, a team they beat in the first match of the year. This time it was the Hilltoppers winning, 6-1, 3-6, 6-3.

Garcia had talked to the players about aiming for state next year, but the junior duo had ideas of their own and made them

happen. "I think next year is here," Garcia said, noting Goeden's improvement was definitely "his aggressiveness coming to the net, while for Chesak, "It's the stuff he dives for. Others would let it (the ball) go."

"Both of them have big serves," the coach went on.

Sophomore Matthew Krautkramer, playing at number three singles, went 0-2 at the sectional, losing to the top seed, Nick Bourdo from East Troy, 0-6, 2-6, and then playing some inspired tennis to win the first set vs. Stefan Sorensen of St. Mary's Catholic, 6-1 before losing 3-6, 4-6.

Gavin Curtin and Zachary Fehrenkrug, at number three doubles, also finished 0-2, losing to McFarland's Collin Corcoran and Carter McShane, 5-7, 6-3, 3-6 and to Ben Zartman and Connor Masanz, 5-7, 0-6.

"The day was a complete success irrespective of the final results. Our three flights performed beyond our expectations. To qualify a sophomore, three juniors and a senior with only five years of varsity experience between them was rewarding," Garcia said. "When you indicted that our #1D team was the first to go to state in over 30 years for Kewaskum it really shows what can be accomplished in three short years when athletes with no previous tennis experience, work hard at every practice, learn and then apply the techniques and strategies presented to them. All the credit should go to Brent and Jared."

The individual state tournament begins today, June 1. Chesak and Goeden have drawn Green Bay Notre Dame's Matthew Krzewinski and Nic Lasecki as their first opponents.

With the win, the Indians improved to 4-7 in East Central Conference play and 6-11 overall.

"A week later and a better result," KHS coach Luke Piwoni said. "This was the most exciting game of the season!"

Three different Indians got in the scoring act, including Hailey Herriges, Molly Schulteis and Paige Airaudi, and Piwoni said, "That's perfect. It shows we were moving the ball around."

Herriges gave her team a 1-0 lead just 11: 57 into the game, and it was unassisted.

After the Warrior scored at 17:32, Schulteis answered with a nice goal set up by Lizzy Bauer's assist.

The score stayed at 2-1 until the 66th minute when the Indians were opportunistic with the ball bouncing around in front of the Waupun net after a

"I was especially happy with the intensity and pace for play for 90 minutes," Piwoni said.

The athletic director did pick up a non-conference game with St. Mary's Springs for that day.

KHS Boys Send Two Relays, Others To State Track Meet

For four Kewaskum High boys and members of two relay teams, the track season has been extended another week because they have reached their goals of qualifying for the WIAA Division 2 State Track and Field Meet.

Competing in the East Troy sectional on May 25, several Indians, including the 4x100 relay, Cade Peterson and Derrek Brock, came up with their best efforts to make the state field, and co-head coach Kris Evans couldn't be happier with the results.

"That's awesome," Evans said about the sectional results, which found the KHS boys finishing in third place with 59 points, behind Catholic Memorial (90) and East Troy (77.50). "We were happy to beat Berlin (the East Central Conference champs.) We had more kids at the top of their game (than they did)."

The Lady Indians also turned in good efforts, but they were not enough for top-four finishes which are needed to advance to La Crosse for the state test.

Kewaskum had two first places in the sectional, in the 200-meter dash and the high jump. Junior Cade Peterson led the 200 field with a time of 22 and .60 seconds (22.60), .07 ahead of Shorewood's Julian Rodriguez, and Brady Hanson won the high jump by two inches, clearing 6 feet, 4 inches (6-4).

The 4x100 was about as close a race as is possible. The Indians' foursome of Tony Steger, Hanson, Kyle Pamperin and Cameron Dodge were edged out by Catholic Memorial by .03 of a second, 43.08 to 43.11, which is a school record for KHS.

Another close finish may have been anticipated in the finale of the 4x400 relay, but the Memorial Crusaders have had outstanding times all season long and did again, with a 3:22.28, which was just nearly three seconds faster than Kewaskum's 3:25.13, posted by Derrek Brock, Jakob Hrica, Hanson and Peterson.

Evans said he had Peterson clocked in under 50 seconds for his leg of the 4x400 relay.

Brock also competed in both hurdle races, which may have been some of the strongest fields in this year's boys sectional. He finished third in the 300s with a time of 39.57, so he will have a chance to better last year's eighth place at state after running a 41.03 in the finals, competing with a 102 degree temperature.

"Three school records in one night," Evans said about the two relays and the 300 hurdles.

The young men in the 110 highs were lightning fast, especially Jordan Stidhum of St. Francis, who dipped under 15 seconds to win in

14.83. Brock was sixth with a good time of 15.42 but still fell short by two places.

The KHS field events will have one representative at state, junior Riley Donovan, who finished third in the discus with a good toss of 150-09.

"He was two feet off his PR (personal record)," weight coach Jason Last said about Donovan. "It was clutch. He was seeded fifth and moved up to third place ... He was totally dialed in."

The others who competed, along with their efforts included: Kyle Pamperin, eighth in the 100, in 11.43; Peterson sixth in the discus with a toss of 139-22; Tony Leister, fifth in the pole vault, with a jump of 12-3; Tyler Heus, 11th in the 400, 52.73; and Jon Leister, 13th in the shot

put, 43-01. Dodge did not make finals in the 100.

For the girls, Abby Meidl cleared 9-0 in the pole vault, for fifth place, while Grace Marchello was fifth in the 1,600 with a PR of 5:42.83; Romaela Olla placed sixth in the 3,200 at 12:21.95.

Also, freshman Emily Halterman threw the discus 91-03, good for 11th while Breanna Rice was clocked in 1:04.89 in the 400, good for ninth place.

The state meet will be held this coming weekend, Friday and Saturday, June 2-3 on the UW-La Crosse campus. Preliminaries and some finals will be held on Friday and the rest on Saturday. The Division 2 discus will run Friday morning, starting at 9:30 a.m. and the high jump at 10:30 a.m. on Saturday.

The game was 0-0 after four innings. In the third inning, KHS did get runners to second and third

after Trepes singled and Maddie Geidel doubled to right with one out, but WHS pitcher, Megan VanRuiswyk got Williams on strikes and Kennedy Lehn to ground out to third to end the threat.

Finally, in the fifth, the Indians took a 2-0 lead when Abby Baumann led off with a perfect bunt for a single, Trepes reached on an error and Geidel drew a walk, which included several pitches that were intentionally way outside to keep her from hitting.

Williams followed with her 2-run double, but that was the end of the scoring as Ashley Trapp hit a comebacker to the pitcher and Megan Marx struck out looking.

It looked like Lehn was going to have an easy fifth, getting two quick outs on a ground ball and a strikeout, but the Warriors came back with a single by Danielle Hopp, a walk to Megan Gerber. Pokorski, Glenz, Fieber, Kretschmann, Strauss Nab PDTR Triumphs

With some long overdue pleasant spring weather conditions greeting racers, crews, fans, sponsors and track workers, four cagey veterans and one newcomer grabbed A-main victories in the third Plymouth Dirt Track Racing program of the 2017 season on Saturday, May 27, at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds.

For the third consecutive week, a large contingent of 109 cars packed the pit area to compete for the A-main trophies sponsored by Pedal Down Promotions. It was also Military Night with a special pre-race ceremony honoring those who have and continue to serve our country to ensure our daily freedom.

In the 25-lap Sprint Car A-main, it was 25-year veteran Paul Pokorski of West Bend recording his first feature victory since August 2015. Newcomer Jesse Glenz of Fall Creek made his first visit to Plymouth count with a flag-to-flag victory in the 25-lap Late Model headliner.

Mark Fieber of Cascade survived a wild Grand National A-main to claim the top prize. Rick Kretschmann of Sheboygan Falls captured the 25-lap B Mod A-main victory, while Tory Strauss of Waterloo rolled to victory in the Micro Sprint A-main.

The green flag fell in the Sprint Car A-main with Kenjay Fiedler of Sheboygan Falls on the pole and Paul Pokorski on the outside of the front row. Pokorski utilized the preferred outside groove to power into the lead in turn two of the opening lap.

By lap three, Pokorski had opened a half straightaway advantage over Fiedler. Pokorski, who was the 2014 Midwest Sprint Car Association Masters Series champion, encountered lapped traffic for the first time on lap six.

Two laps later, the first caution of the event appeared on lap eight for the stalled car of Mike Yurmanovich of Cascade in turn three. A red flag was then displayed when fire crews had to attend to a situation in the pit area.

When the race resumed, ninth starter Brandon McMullen of Appleton charged up to take third place on lap nine. At the front of the field, Pokorski again built up a solid cushion over Fiedler. By lap 15, Pokorski had stretched out a half-lap advantage.

Pokorski, who was involved in an opening night accident which has sidelined his primary 2016 Maxim car, overcame a near spin in turn two in the closing laps to steer his 2011 J&J backup machine to his first A-main victory since August 14, 2015, at the now defunct Manitowoc Expo Speedway.

It was Pokorski's third career PDTR Sprint Car A-

main victory and 10th overall feature triumph of his Sprint Car career. Fiedler held on for second, 2008 PDTR Sprint Car Champion Lance Fassbender of Burnett was third, McMullen finished fourth and 10th starter Tim Haddy of Mayville claimed fifth, after starting 10th.

"It was great to get a victory," Pokorski said. "I had a pretty close call getting sideways there in turn two, but luckily I was able to recover. It was a fast, hammer down track right around the top, which I normally like. Everything worked out well for us tonight."

Jesse Glenz, who is a regular competitor at Cedar Lake Speedway and Red Cedar Speedway in Western Wisconsin, started on the pole of the Late Model A-main next to outside front row starter Justin Schmidt of Cleveland.

Glenz grabbed the lead on the opening lap, as defending PDTR Late Model Champion Tim Buhler of Greenbush moved into second. On lap five, Schmidt jumped up to the high groove to challenge the low riding Buhler for the runner-up spot. The two hard-charging drivers mounted an epic door panel-to-door panel battle for the remainder of the race.

Buhler moved in to briefly challenge Glenz as the leaders moved into slower traffic on lap eight. On lap 12, Schmidt surged past Buhler to take over second. However, two laps later, Buhler regained the spot along the low groove.

Glenz, who was making his PDTR debut, built a half-lap lead by 17 before Charlie Schmidt of Cedar Grove prompted the first yellow flag of the race with a spin in turn three on lap 17.

On the restart, Glenz powered away as Buhler and Schmidt continued their race-long duel. Glenz went on to earn his first career PDTR Late Model A-main victory, followed by Buhler in second. Schmidt settled for third, three-time PDTR Late Model Champion Brad Mueller of Random Lake started and finished fourth and seventh-starter Taylor Scheffler of Waukesha wound up fifth.

"This is our first time here and I really enjoyed it," Glenz said. "It is a great facility with a lot of cars in the pits and strong fan support. The car ran really well and I'm happy to be in victory lane."

2010 PDTR Grand National Champion Brian Gilles started the Grand National A-main from the pole flanked by 2011 PDTR Grand National Champ Mark Fieber, who started second. Gilles and Fieber raced side-by-side on the opening lap before Fieber gained the advantage in turn two on lap two.

The first of four caution

flags appeared on lap two when 2008 PDTR Grand National Champion Matt Yancey of Sheboygan hit the wall in turn two. On the restart, defending PDTR Grand National Champion Brian Cesar of Sheboygan used the high groove to challenge Gilles for the runner-up spot. After two laps of heated action, Gilles and Cesar made contact in turn two, which caused Gilles to drop back to seventh in the running order.

After the second caution appeared on lap five debris, Cesar challenged fourth-starter Tyler Kulow of Plymouth for second starting on lap seven. Following four laps racing in side-by-side formation, Kulow gained the upper hand on lap 11. The third caution flag came out on lap 13 for a spin involving Justin Erickson of Plymouth.

After the restart, the action continued to be hot and heavy behind Fieber as a host of drivers jostled for position in close proximity. The final caution appeared on lap 17 for Josh Pierce of Random Lake, who spun in turn two to set up an entertaining eight-lap trophy dash between Fieber, Kulow and Cesar.

Kulow attempted to duck under Fieber for the lead in turn two on lap 20, but contact ensued, which caused Kulow to drop back slightly. Meanwhile Cesar charged hard along the high groove to pull even with the bottom-hugging Fieber on lap 22.

Cesar surged into the lead briefly in turn two on lap 23, but Fieber was not to be denied as he turned back under Cesar to regain the lap later in the lap in turn four. Fieber held on to secure his 11th career PDTR A-main victory to move firmly into second place on the all-time PDTR Grand National A-main win list behind Brad Lubach, who has 24.

Cesar was second, Kulow took third, two-time PDTR Grand National Champion Don Sorce Jr. of West Allis place fourth after starting 10th and seventh starter Dan Sorce of West Allis placed fifth.

Polesitter Ken Childre of Milwaukee led the field into turn one on the B Mod A-main before third starter Rick Kretschmann of Sheboygan Falls moved into the top spot in turn three.

The first of four cautions appeared on lap three for a spin involving Craig Gessner of Kewaskum. On the restart seventh starter Cody Eickberg of Plymouth was the driver on the move as he worked the high groove to pass

second starter J.J. Walvoord of Oostburg on lap nine for the runner-up spot.

Justin Green of Sheboygan Falls, who started 11th, also mounted a charge to the front as he assumed third on lap 13. On lap 16, Green used the outside line to pressure Eickberg for second. Green cleared Eickberg for second on lap 17 and quickly set his sights on Kretschmann.

After two more caution periods in the final seven laps, Green had to deal with a hood panel that had flipped up. However, he held on to maintain second at the finish line behind Kretschmann, who notched his second career PDTR B Mod A-main victory, Eickberg was third, followed by ninth starter Glenn Blanke of Sheboygan Falls in fourth and Walvoord in fifth.

In the 20-lap Micro Sprint A-main, Tory Strauss started from the pole and was never seriously challenged throughout. Defending PDTR Micro Sprint Champion Zach Boden of Cambridge worked his way into second on lap 11, after starting fourth.

Boden appeared poised to challenge Strauss for the top spot before Joe Snow spun and later flipped on lap 16 to bring out the second caution of the race. On the restart Boden fell back to fifth, while 11th starter Chad Bogar of Sun Prairie powered up to second place.

Strauss held on over the final four laps to notch his second career PDTR Micro Sprint A-main victory by a half straightaway over Bogar. Matt Perterson, who started second, took third, Dave Collins placed fourth after starting 10th and Boden rounded out the top five.

B-main victories went to Tyler Brabant of Waupun (Sprint Car), Steven Weber of Plymouth (Grand National) and Brandon Knepprath of Kewaskum (B Mod).

PDTR racing action will continue next Saturday, June 3, with racing scheduled to begin at 6 p.m. It will be Police, Fire and EMS Night, as well as Graduates Night. All police, fire and EMS personnel, along with graduates will receive free admission with proper ID. Trophies will be sponsored by Pit Stop Pizza.




