Party On The Pavement Scheduled For Tuesday, June 27

School is out for the summer, and that means it is time to get ready to Party On The Pavement.

"We as a chamber are thrilled to be able to offer this event for our community. We would love to have you come, walk around, eat, and enjoy the talented dancers and live music," said Wendi Dreher, who chairs the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce event.

Party On The Pavement, to be held on Tuesday, June 27, is known as the largest street festival held on a Tuesday in the state.

Festivities will run from 10 a.m. to 11 p.m. There is no entry fee. All proceeds benefit the community.

The street festival will take place primarily in the village's downtown parking lot, but will stretch up and down Railroad Street as well.

The day features a wide variety of food, refreshments, vendors, crafts, bouncy house, face painting, games, hands-on activities and live entertainment.

Party on the Pavement dates back to the 1980s when it was called "Crazy Daze." Since its beginning, volunteers have stepped up to man booths and keep things running smoothly.

"We could always use more volunteers and businesses to take part in the event," Dreher said. "This is the perfect opportunity to market your business, or for local teens and youth to acquire service hours."

Kettle Moraine Carriages, which has become a statewide attraction, will offer rides around the village throughout the day.

WTKM 104.9 (the Voice of the Kettle Moraine) will broadcast live from the event's location from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

More entertainment includes dance performances from 12:30 to 3 p.m. Dance groups include the Shining Stars, the Campbellsport Dance Team and "Gotta Dance," a national dance team from Lancaster.

Live music includes Carrie Labiewski, a local talented musician per-

forming on acoustic guitar and vocals from 3 to 4:30 p.m.; Twang Dragons performing country rock from 4:30 to 7:30 p.m.; and Riding Shotgun on stage from 7:30 to 11 p.m., mixing classic country with today's top hits as well as southern and classic rock.

There will be plenty of food to choose from. Kewaskum Frozen Foods will roast a hog and offer pork sandwiches along with their famous brats and seasoned patties. The Kewaskum Women's Club will have a build-your-own hot dog bar, and the Chamber will offer beer, soda and wine coolers.

The American Legion Post will serve Italian sausage patties, cheese fries, and Cousin's Subs will have a wide variety of sandwiches. West Bend Elevator will serve grilled cheese sandwiches and milk in honor of Dairy Month.

The Candy Tree will have cheesecurds, funnel cakes and pretzels, while Julie's Country Confections will be there with fresh kettle corn and its special lemon-lime

drink, "The Bomb."

Shaved ice, ice cream, popcorn, cotton candy, fried eggplant and chocolate dipped bananas also will be offered.

Elbe Family Farm To Host Breakfast On The Farm

— Washington County's 30th Annual Event Comes To Golden "E" Dairy

A Growing Family Business

Chris and Tracey Elbe did not come from families who farm.

But when Chris was 9, he started helping out at a nearby dairy farm. Tracey was a city girl.

The two met while attending Cedarburg High School and became high school sweethearts.

The farmer who Chris was for was having some financial problems, so he paid Chris in heifers.

In 1991, when they were both 21, Chris and Tracey bought a 250-acre farm and got married.

"We moved up here with 90 cows, an old Ford tractor and a golden retriever," Chris said.

That retriever is how the farm got its name: The Golden "E" Dairy Farm.

On Saturday, June 10, the farm, located at 1140 Shalom Drive in West Bend, will host the 30th annual Breakfast on the Farm from 6:30 to 11:30 a.m.

When Chris and Tracey started their farm, it was a time when a lot of people were leaving the farming business.

"People thought we were crazy," Tracey said. "A lot of people said we were never going to make it. That made us try harder."

The couple worked hard and learned as they went.

"I grew up with the image that farmers are like the Beverly Hillbillies," Tracey said. "That's not how it is at all. You have to be business smart, you have to be up on every-

thing." Tracey and Chris have four children and wanted them to learn the work ethic that farming requires. All four children, Ryan (23), Kimberly (21), Matthew (20) and Kyle (14), help out on the farm.

As their children grew, the Elbes decided to expand their farming business.

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Ask the Dentist When Should My Child First See The Dentist?

A good rule of thumb would be "first visit by their first birthday" which is recommended by the American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry. Pediatricians also agree.

The idea of such early dental visits is still surprising to many new parents. However, national studies have shown that preschool-aged children are getting more cavities, sadly more than one in four children in the U.S. has had at least one cavity by the age of four. I've seen some children with cavities as early as two years of age.

To prevent early childhood

cavities, parents have to recognize their child's risk of developing cavities and how to manage their diet, hygiene and fluoride to prevent problems. Other topics discussed at your child's first visit include how to care for your infant's or toddler's mouth, proper use of fluoride, and teething and milestones of development just to name a few.

Just remember, one of the main goals of the first appointment is to get the child comfortable sitting in the chair and for the parents to understand their responsibility in their child's oral health care.

Continued From... Elbe Family Farm To Host Breakfast On The Farm

In 2006, Chris and Tracey purchased two farms in Sheboygan County. A year later, they added a farm in Ozaukee County.

By 2014, the Elbes milked a total of 1,200 cows on their farms.

That is when they decided to expand some more. They began building a new facility on Shalom Drive, just down the road from their original Orchard Valley Road farm.

On January 22, 2015, they moved to the new property and increased their livestock to 2,500 cows.

Over the years, the Washington County Dairy Promotion Committee has watched the Golden "E" Farm succeed. Several times, the committee has approached the Elbes about hosting Breakfast on the Farm.

Every year, the Elbes turned down the offer.

But this year, the Elbes said yes.

"Now with the new facility, and the kids being older, they wanted to do

it," Chris said.

And the Elbes know visitors want to come.

"There are a lot of people who would like to see a facility like ours, and how it all works," Chris said.

It is a perfect opportunity to educate people about the dairy business.

"There is a lot more disconnect between farming than there was 20 years ago, when everybody had an uncle or someone they knew who farmed," Chris said. "There are a lot of people now who think that milk comes from the store."

Breakfast On The Farm

Breakfast On The Farm features all-you-can-eat pancakes with a serving of eggs with ham, apple-sauce, cheese, sausage, milk and cheese. Free ice cream also will be served to those who get breakfast.

There will be more than breakfast offered, though. Attendees will have an opportunity to tour the Elbes' new milking facility.

A veterinarian will be on

hand, and a nutritionist who puts the diet together for the Elbes' cows will be there.

A milking equipment dealer will be at the event to explain how the milking process works.

"At our farm, when the milk comes out of the cow, it goes through a cooling process, and within two minutes it's on a trailer at 35 degrees, ready to go to the dairy," Chris said.

In addition, there will be plenty of activities, especially for kids. There will be food, a band, a scavenger hunt, pedal tractor pulls, antique tractors on display and a petting zoo.

The Elbes are prepared for a large crowd. Record attendance for Washington County is 5,600, and the Elbes would like to top that.

"If the weather is good, we expect about 6,000 people," Chris said.

WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

Motor Home Fire

On June 1, at approximately 11:35 p.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a motor home on fire, on Highway 41 southbound, near Pleasant Hill Road in the Village of Richfield.

A motorist came upon the motor home, which was emitting heavy smoke and was stopped between the center and right lanes of Highway 41. Upon arrival of deputies, the motor home became engulfed in flames, and

the driver had left the scene.

The Richfield Fire department was dispatched to the scene. Due to the position and location of the motor home, south of where Highways 41 and 45 merge, both highways had to be closed at Pioneer Road, southbound traffic, for approximately two hours. The motor home, which had burned significantly, was extinguished by the fire department.

The Washington County Highway Department was

called to remove melted metal fragments from the roadway.

The incident remains under investigation into the owner of the motor home. The investigation revealed that the motor home became disabled while it was being driven, and subsequently started on fire. The driver, a 41-year-old man from Milwaukee, was located a short time later, away from the scene, and will be cited for traffic related offenses.

Free Fish Camp Planned For Saturday, June 10

The Long Lake Fishing Club's annual 5 - 95+ Fish Camp will be held Saturday, June 10, down by the old mill pond behind the Hamburger Haus in Dundee.

Camp runs from 9 to 11:30 a.m. Admission is free.

A fish fry, soda and chips will be given to all attendees, compliments of the Long Lake Fishing Club.

Attendees need not be a member to join the camp; they simply need an interest in learning more about fishing and helping the

environment.

The camp is open to everyone ages five to 95 and older. Physically challenged individuals are encouraged to attend.

At the camp, participants will have an opportunity to meet other fishing enthusiasts. There will be an opportunity to ask questions and learn which bait to use for each species of fish, know where to throw a line, learn to read water and much more. This is a one-time power-learning session to prepare you for the fishing season ahead.

The ponds will be stocked with bluegills provided by the Long Lake Fishing Club. Those who have their own fishing pole should bring it to the camp.

For those that do not have a pole, the club will provide one to use that day. Bait will be available, too. If you have a grandparent or parent, bring them as well.

Permanent 9/11 Memorial Site To Be Determined

A sign designating the future location of a new 9/11 memorial may have been put up prematurely in front of the Kewaskum Fire Department.

Before the memorial can be built at that location on Fond du Lac Avenue, it needs to acquire village approval, which has not yet happened.

"There are two more pieces that [the 9/11 committee] needs to finish before that becomes the official location. There needs to be a signed memo of understanding [relating to maintenance issues] between the village and that group, and they need to come before the board one more time for approval," Village Administrator told the village board Monday night.

Members of the 9/11 committee have appeared before the village board in the past year to inform the board of their hope to create a 9/11 memorial in Kewaskum.

The goal is for the memorial to remember the 2,996 people who died in the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001, and to pay special tribute to Kewaskum native Andrea Haberman.

The memorial, which would also serve as an educational resource, is being designed by Dustin Melzark, an architect who

graduated from Kewaskum High School.

The committee overseeing the project budgeted about \$200,000 for developing the memorial and would like to raise an additional \$50,000 for maintenance.

The committee is currently operating under the umbrella of the Kewaskum Arts Council, but is working on paperwork to become a separate 501(c)(3) organization.

Heiser said representatives of the 9/11 group had approached him about serving on the committee. Heiser said he was willing, with board approval, and that he supports the cause.

Although village trustees would like the memorial to be located in Kewaskum, they voiced some concerns with the proposed location in front of the fire station at this week's meeting.

"I totally understand the connection with the fire service. You guys were the first responders at 9/11," Trustee Jim Wright said to Fire Chief Mark Groeschel.

"I'm just really concerned with safety issues. Not only for the people coming to the memorial, but also for you guys having to get out quickly and get to a fire. I think that should be addressed," Wright added.

"I think there may just be

one or two people who stop there and see it. I don't think it's going to be 50 people there every day," Trustee Richard Knoebel said.

However, the plan is for students to go on field trips to the memorial, village resident Bob Kirst pointed out.

"Another concern I have is: Has there been a study done of underground utilities in the area?" Trustee Jim Hovland said. "Also, what is the long-range plan for Highway 45? It could be two lanes going both north and south, 10 to 15 years down the road. I think they need to consider these when they look at it to see what future potential conflicts would be."

Kirst suggested that the committee consider putting the memorial in front of the Village Annex, where parking and restrooms are available.

At Monday's meeting, the village trustees gave unanimous approval for Heiser to serve on the 9/11 committee, with hopes of improving communication.

Village's New Brush Chipping Policy Being Enforced

A couple of homeowners in the Village of Kewaskum are receiving a notice for having too many tree trimmings piled up on the curb in front of their homes.

The village revised its brush chipping policy last month.

Under the new policy, chipping is limited to tree trimmings and prohibits property owners from cutting down entire trees and placing them at the curb for pickup.

To have tree trimmings picked up, place brush and tree trimmings in several small piles.

Place the cut ends of trimmings facing the street. The longer the branch, the better. There is no need to cut branches into small pieces.

Trimmings that are less than 1/2 inch in diameter should be placed in a pail or garbage can, or bundled and tied with string or

twine.

The normal chipping schedule is the first and third Monday of the month starting in April (weather permitting), ending the third Monday in October. When the Monday is a holiday brush chipping will be done Tuesday of that week.

Property owners who wish to cut down a tree should contact the village's Public Works Department to discuss available options.

Wood chips are available to village residents at

no cost and can be picked up in the village yard.

To have wood chips delivered, contact the Public Works Department at 262-626-4310. Residents will be placed on a priority list in the order their call was received.

The policy applies to both developed and undeveloped lots within the village limits.

Anyone receiving a notice of noncompliance has 10 days to conform to the brush chipping policy.

MELATONIN MAY CURB MIGRAINES

Melatonin may help reduce the frequency and severity of migraine headaches, according to a new study. The study involved 178 adults who regularly experienced migraines. The participants followed one of three treatment regimens: standard migraine medication, melatonin or a placebo, each taken before bed for 12 weeks. The melatonin group had a reduction in the frequency, intensity and duration of their headaches comparable to the medication group, but with fewer side effects. 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

Washington Ozaukee Health Department Receives Award

Washington County has been selected with Ozaukee County for a 2017 Salute to Local Government Award in the area of intergovernmental cooperation for the formation of the Washington Ozaukee Public Health Department.

The award recognizes the fact that having already collaborated successfully on numerous joint initiatives, including emergency preparedness, Wisconsin Well Woman

program, and WIC programs, Ozaukee and Washington counties decided to take the next step in 2015 by formally merging their public health departments. The result is a streamlined department that saved taxpayers approximately \$300,000 in the first year through staffing efficiencies and reduced administrative overhead, and that has generated enhanced programming and new initiatives. In addition, the

Washington Ozaukee Public Health Department is now serving as a model of successful consolidation to other local governments, with its example generating an effort to change State law to allow for greater flexibility in determining cost sharing for joint public health departments. The consolidated department also recently received a \$75,000 grant from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation to measure its public health outcomes and potentially allow it to serve as a national model.

The award will be presented on Tuesday, June 20, at the 25th annual Salute to Local Government Awards program.

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

Indians Shut Down Grafton And Whitnall To Earn First-Ever Trip To State In Softball

Thanks to more excellent pitching, clutch hitting and solid defense, Kewaskum's dream season is going to end up at Goodman Park in Madison, the home of the University of Wisconsin women's softball team.

The Indians earned the right to play in the Division 2 state tournament for the first time by shutting out Whitnall, 4-0 in a game played in Waupun on June 1.

"This is unknown territory for me and the girls, too," KHS coach Jess Gosse said about surviving stern tests in the regional and sectional to win both titles and earn its first-ever trip to the WIAA State Softball Tournament. "It's crazy, and there are so many things to do before heading for Madison."

The usual cast of characters got standing ovations for Kewaskum. Sophomore Kennedy Lehn pitched a two-hitter, struck out 15 and walked just two. Gosse said Whitnall had plenty of power from its Number Two hitter to Number Five, but Lehn shut all of them down.

Bre Trepes had a pair of singles for the winners, while Brittany Williams socked the base hit that gave KHS a little breathing room.

The Indians got on the board right away in the first inning when Trepes led off with a single. She was erased on a fielder's choice by Maddie Geidel, who moved up a base when Williams drew a walk. Then Lehn helped her own cause with a big hit, driving in Geidel.

In the fifth, KHS added three more runs on a walk

to Leah Theusch, a single by Trepes and a shot by Geidel that went in the "wicket," according to Gosse, who said one run scored on the play. Then Williams delivered a key single for another run, and Geidel scored on a passed ball.

Lehn only allowed one Falcon runner to reach third base, and that occurred in the bottom of the seventh when she got two quick outs, but walked the third batter, and the next one reached on an error.

"We weren't concerned with runs at that point," Gosse said. "We just wanted to get the final out." Lehn got the out, and the celebration began.

KHS, now 25-3, will play Rice Lake (21-7) tomorrow, June 9 at 2:30 p.m. The winner advances to the title game Saturday at 4 p.m. against the winner of the New London (23-5) against Beloit Turner (23-2) game.

Concerning his team's semifinal opponent, Gosse said, "I've heard they're a very good hitting team," with plenty of speed as evidenced by the fact two of their girls each have 20 stolen bases.

"I'm hoping we can hit them though," the KHS coach went on. "We have to be patient at the plate."

Gosse's other concern is bringing the girls down from "cloud nine" before the state opener. "The girls are in a celebratory mood," which Gosse certainly understands but says, "At the same time we've still got a job to be done."

The seeding for the

Division-2 Waupun Sectional was pretty disappointing for the Kewaskum High softball team, but the Lady Indians certainly settled the issue, first by defeating the Number 2 seeded host Waupun 5-2 in the regional final and then knocking off top-seeded Grafton, 2-0, in a sectional semifinal on the Blackhawks' home field on May 30.

"Unbelievable," a stunned but elated KHS coach Jeff Gosse said after watching his girls score two runs in the top of the seventh to win an excellent game between two outstanding programs.

In this game, there were two Lehns who starred. Kennedy Lehn did her usual stellar job on the mound, giving up just one hit while striking out 16, but it was Kenzie Lehn, the team's senior second baseman who delivered the game-winning hit for the Indians.

Grafton pitcher Kirsten Krause retired the first two KHS hitters in the seventh, getting Brittany Williams to pop out to the shortstop and Kennedy Lehn to strike out swinging.

The Indians were down to their last out, and it looked to be a good bet the game would go into extra innings. But wait, Ashley Trapp took two balls, fouled off a pitch, then Trapp held up on two more balls and trotted to first with Kewaskum's first walk of the evening.

Megan Marx kept the Indians' hopes alive by blooming a single to right field, putting runners at the corners. Gosse used Skylar Donath to pinch run for Marx, and she stole second as Kenzie Lehn took a strike on the first pitch to her.

Trapp and Donath scored easily, and the Indians erupted in the dugout as Lehn stood safely on second with her double.

"I was definitely nervous," Kenzie Lehn said, "but I knew I had the two girls on base. I knew I had to get them in. It was the last inning."

When asked whether this was the elder Lehn's biggest hit this year, Gosse said, "Think about it ... career (best), probably. This is the farthest a Kewaskum team has ever gone. We're the first team to win a regional."

When she saw the ball fly, Lehn said she just ran as fast as she could. "I'm not the fastest runner, but I was givin' her," she said.

And was she thrilled to deliver the key hit? "Oh my gosh, yes. This is our time to beat their seniors."

Kennedy Lehn was delighted to have the two-run lead. She finished off the seventh by posting strikeouts, her 15th and 16th of the game, for Grafton's first and third outs, surrounding a walk, and to end the game, Ellie Grisar hit a bunt in front of the plate, which was scooped up by catcher Leah Theusch, who threw to first for the out.

Game over. Grafton is eliminated after beating Kewaskum the past four years. Kewaskum is alive and ready for the sectional finals.

Lehn allowed just one hit, a triple by Danielle Kuziczkowski to start the sixth. Gosse called time out for a meeting on the mound, and Lehn proceeded to strike out Jordyn Case and Ally Parsons and got Amanda Parsons to pop out to Donath.

"We had to get out of that," Kennedy Lehn said. "We really wanted this game."

"After their slap hitter led off with that triple, I thought we were done,"

Gosse said. Lehn and her sister, Kenzie, had other plans, however.

Grafton ended the year

at 21-5. "They played hard," GHS coach Ken Hunt said of his team.

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
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KHS Golfers Take Fourth Place At State

By cutting off 10 strokes in the final 18 holes of play, the Kewaskum High golf team wound up fourth in the WIAA State Golf Tournament in Madison, held June 5-6.

Led by sophomore Jacob Schlosser and junior Jordan Carlton, the Indians shot a 331 to post a 672 for the two days of action at the University Ridge Golf Course. Schlosser came in with an 80 the second day for a 161 total, which put him in 16th place. Carlton finished one shot behind with a 83-79-162 and was tied for 17th.

Brad Buechel was very consistent, shooting 86 both days for a 172 (tied for 28) while Talon Ralph improved from a 91 to an 86 for a final score of 177.

Madison Edgewood ran away with the title, coming in at 623, 22 strokes

ahead of runner-up Lodi, which had a 645. Rice Lake finished third with 670.

The Kewaskum High golf team started out the second day of play tied for fifth place after the first round action of the WIAA Division 2 Golf Championship.

The Indians and Appleton Xavier both finished the first 18 holes with 341 totals. Madison Edgewood and Lodi ended the first day in first and second with 310 and 319, respectively.


Jacob Schlosser was the only Indian in the top 15 in the first day of action. He shot a nine-over par 81 with nine hole scores of 41 and 40. Starting on the back nine, Schlosser was even par for the first three holes, then had two bogeys and a birdie before having difficulty on the par five, 16th hole where he made a triple bogey eight.

On the front nine, Schlosser had one birdie, three bogeys and one double for the 40. He was alone in 15th place.

Jordan Carlton had a rough start, starting with a triple bogey on Number 10 but he battled back for a 44, including a birdie on Number 15. On the front side he parred four of the first five holes, birdied Number 6 and wound up with a 39 for an 83 and is tied with six others for 17th.

Brad Buechel ended the first day with 14-over-par with a 40-46-86 and tied for 29th place. Four-over-par after three holes, Buechel parred the next six holes for a 40, then struggled a bit on the back with a triple bogey on Number 4 toward a 46.

The final counter was Talon Ralph, who posted a 46-45-91 the first day. Jim Banks came in with a 105.

The Indians, suffering from a lack of scoring punch and defensive lapses, lost the game 7-3 to fall below the .500 mark in NS (1-2) action and overall (3-4). Germantown is 3-1 and 6-2.

KHS starter Cole Surprenant gave up five runs in the third inning, and not a single one of them was earned.

Surprenant put the Warhawks down in order in the first inning and got out of the second unscathed, thanks to a double play following Brad Buechel's error on a ground ball to second. The visitors scored their final two runs in the fifth, taking a 7-2 lead on a walk, a single by Szopinski and a double by Bradenburg.

Singles by Heberer and Chesak (RBI) produced the Indians' final run. Jake Elgner came on in relief of Knodl and faced just six Indians in the last two innings, striking out four.

Surprenant was the lone Indian to get two hits in the game.

The Indians were scheduled to play at New Holstein on June 3 but even delaying the start time by an hour didn't help. The game was called because of rain. No make-up date has been set.

On June 1, Dalton Poole got the call to pitch against host Port Washington (0-3) and recorded the win, giving up just one run and three hits in six innings of action. He struck out four and walked one.

Jacob Loehr came in after two outs in the bottom on the seventh. He walked the first man he faced, then got Nolan Large to hit into a fielder's choice to end the game.

KHS (1-1 and 3-3) scored right away in the first inning, scoring a single run on John May's sacrifice fly bringing home Ryan Prochnow, who walked, stole second and was bunted to third by Brad Buechel.

The Indians scored two runs in the fifth on a walk, two sacrifices and two Pirate errors and took a 4-0 lead scoring a single run in the sixth without a base hit.

Port pitcher, Noah Prom

gave up just two hits, singles by Blake Hornung in the top of the third and Jacob Heberer in the top of the seventh.

In their first North Shore game of the year, Kewaskum (0-1) was handcuffed by Homestead all-conference pitcher Joe Panella for five innings then scored two unearned runs against him in the sixth before he went over the 100-pitch count and had to leave the game. At that point, Homestead held a 5-2 lead, but the Indians roared back with three in the seventh before losing 6-5.

In the sixth, John May reached on an error, moved to second on Jared Chesak's single and scored when Cole Surprenant singled to left field.

With Chesak at second, Panella got Dalton Poole to go down on strikes, then Chesak took third on a wild pitch while Ryan Prochnow was at the plate. After Prochnow struck out, Chesak scored on another wild pitch and the inning ended when Gabe Christenson struck out.

Reliever Kyle Pamperin gave up a run in the top of the seventh on a walk, a pair of ground outs and a single by Sandro Kulutbonis, putting the score at 6-2, then the Indians rallied for three runs in their last at-bat on a walk to Kyle Bath, a single by Jacob Heberer, RBI singles by Chesak and Surprenant and a single by Poole before Prochnow went down swinging.

Surprenant pitched 2 1/3 innings, giving up five hits, four runs, including three earned runs. Jacob Loehr pitched two outs, then Tony Steger came in for two innings, giving up one run on three hits, and Pamperin finished up the game.

Surprenant took the loss.

Seconds By 4x100 Relay, High Jumper Hanson Help KHS Track Team To 12th In Division-2

Using second places from the 4x100-meter relay and the high jump, along with a couple of seventh places, the Kewaskum High boys track team scored 20 points in the 122nd annual Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association State Track and Field Meet on June 2-3, giving the Indians 12th place in the Division 2 portion of the event held in La Crosse.

"They did phenomenally well," KHS co-coach Kris Evans said Sunday. "I was so proud of them. This is a high water mark."

In the finals on Saturday, KHS got its first points from senior Brady Hanson in the high jump where he cleared 6-feet, 5-inches (6-5).

The winner of the event was Brekan Day of Brodhead/Juda, who made 6-6 on his third and final try. Day had single misses at 5-10 and 6-0, then cleared 6-2 on his first try, 6-4 on his third and 6-5 on his second.

Hanson was "clean" through 6-2, then he missed twice at 6-4 before making that height, and the same was true at 6-5. The 6-5 tied his personal best of the year.

Ironically Hanson had a better finish, second to third, than his brother Jason did a year ago, but his height was one inch lower than his older brother,

who is having a great freshman season at UW-Milwaukee.

Evans said he was unable to see a lot of Hanson's jumps because he was getting others ready for their events.

Kewaskum's other runner-up finish came in the 4x100 relay where Tony Steger, Hanson, Kyle Pamperin and Cameron Dodge carried the baton around the UW-La Crosse oval in 42 and .90 (42.90) seconds, .13 of a second behind the victorious Catholic Memorial team's 42.77.

The Indians' time was another school record, bettering the 43.11 they had at the sectional.

"We were behind them (Memorial), the first two runners especially," Evans said about the race. "Then Kyle Pamperin gained ground going around the turn, and Dodge finished up. He was breathing down his (Crusader anchor runner's) neck."

Cade Peterson and Derrek Brock both qualified for races in the finals. Peterson was clocked in Friday's 200 preliminaries in 22.50, putting him fifth overall. In Saturday's finals, Peterson finished seventh overall with a time of 22.68.

The winner of the event, Kenneth Bednarek of Rice Lake, successfully defended his 2016 title, running a sizzling 21.61. He also won the 400 with a time of

46.82, a new state record.

"Cade ran his guts out and he took seventh," Evans said, adding, "There was a lot of talent on that track."

Kewaskum's other points came from senior leader, Brock, whose 40.22 was good for seventh in the 300 hurdles. In the preliminaries, he was 10th with a time of 40.35, so he cut off some time and jumped up three places in his final high school race.

"He (Brock) was disappointed," Evans said, noting Brock was in the 10th lane and missed the "set" call, so he had to come straight out of the blocks which cost him some time.

"It's hard when that happens in the biggest race of the year."

The Indians' foursome of Brock, Jacob Hrica, Hanson and Peterson was expected to make the top six in the event. Unfortunately, they were unable to make the finals as they finished 11th in the preliminary race in 3:29.21, 4.08 seconds slower than their time from the East Troy Sectional.

"Just a bad day. They just felt short of what they were capable of," Evans said of this relay. "I don't know if it was the heat or what."

Junior Riley Donovan got an early wake-up call on June 2 because the discus was the first event up at 9:30 a.m. Donovan was 16 feet short of his season-best effort, but most of the discus throwers did not duplicate their earlier marks, possibly because of nerves, according to co-head coach Jason Last.

Donovan's best in the preliminary tosses was 136-6, putting him in the 11th spot and six inches from making finals. "For being a first-time state guy, he did well," Last said about his top weight man. "He went out and competed, and I was pretty darn proud of him."

Schlosser Shoots Par 72; Indians Capture Sectional Title

Members of this year's Kewaskum High golf team weren't born in 1988, the last time a group of Indian golfers qualified for the WIAA Division 2 State Golf Tournament at Lake Arrowhead.

The '88 team — 1988 was the first year there were two divisions in state golf — was the first from Kewaskum to advance to state, and now this year's Indians have earned a piece of history of their own, winning the school's first sectional title in the sport.

Thanks to a gritty effort by sophomore Jacob Schlosser, especially on the closing holes at Racine County Club, KHS shot a 336 to win the May 30th sectional by four strokes over Brookfield Academy and 10 ahead of Catholic Memorial, ending its long state run.

The Indians were set to play 36-holes at the University Golf Course near Verona on June 5-6.

"Jacob did his best to carry the team," KHS coach Casey Scheel said after guiding the Indians to state in his first year on the job. "Everyone else did their job in what needed to be done to win sectionals as a team."

Schlosser shot a sizzling even par 37-35-72 to capture the medal, and once again, he had some magical holes, according to Scheel, who said, "Jacob's scorecard included four birdies and an eagle. He holed out from 165 yards on Number 14 ... No one saw it go in, and he looked around the green, couldn't find it and looked in the hole, and there was the ball."

Schlosser, whose brother Sam's 2016 team finished one place out of qualifying for state, putted very well again. "He didn't have any three-putts, and got a couple of longer puts to fall," including a 35-footer on Number 3 and some eight to 10 footers, Scheel said.

"It feels pretty good. I think I worked hard to get there," Schlosser said. "It was a season-long goal, and we finally got there."

Schlosser called his last five holes "probably the best stretch of golf I've ever played in my lifetime. It was pretty exciting." After the eagle on Number

14, he birdied Number 15, parred Numbers 16 and 17, then birdied the final hole, a par five.

Concerning goals for the tournament, Schlosser said, "As a team, my goal is to be in the top three. Individually I'd like to place top 10."

Brad Buechel had the second best score for the Indians with his 43-42-85. Buechel, another of the Indian sophs, was 5-over par after the first four holes but battled back to finish par, bogey, birdie on the final three holes of the front nine for a 43, then turned in a 6-over 42 on the back nine for his final total.

Junior Jordan Carlson posted a 44-45-89, with an eight and a seven on the back keeping him from a good round. Talon Ralph's 90 was the final counting score. A birdie two on Number *8* highlighted his round.


"One thing I kept telling the players through the practice round and leading up to match, is don't worry what the other people are doing in the group. Control only the things you can control, and that is their own game," Scheel said. "We knew going into sectionals that we would be playing with Waukesha Catholic Memorial, the defending two state champions. I kept telling the guys to take one shot at a time, one hole at a time, and don't get down if something bad happens."

There will be eight teams in the Division Two tournament, including Brookfield Academy, Madison Edgewood, Lakeland, Lodi, Rice Lake, Xavier and Winneconne, which is in the East Central Conference with Kewaskum.

Getting back to Kewaskum's first state team, the players included Gregg Dean, Eric Pearson, Joel Fleury, Joel Miller and D. J. Schlagenhoup. The Indians were second in the sectional at Mystery Hills near DePere, behind Oconto Falls, shooting a 327.

Dean shot a 74 good for second place, then came Pearson with 83, Fleury, 84, an Schlagenhoup, 86.

Dean was the medalist in the regional at Hon-E-Kor with a 40-36-76, leading the Indians to a winning total of 319.

While Schulteis' high school career might be over, she said, "I'm going to Carroll (University) next year, and I'm playing

there, so it's exciting. The coach has already sent me pre-season stuff."

Luxemburg-Casco, 16-3, was scheduled to play Seymour next in the tournament.

The Indians ended the regular season on a high note, using a pair of goals by Molly Schulteis and two by Hailey Herriges toward a 5-4 victory over non-conference foe St. Mary's Springs.

KHS was scheduled to play Ripon on May 30, but when the Tigers were assigned to compete in a play-in game in its D-3 regional and could not play their final East Central Conference game, the Indians were able to schedule the Ledgers for a game.

The Indians led 2-1 at intermission thanks to Schulteis who scored just 10:14 into the game and Herriges who gave the Indians the two-goal lead when she scored in the 23rd minute. Elisabeth "Lizzy" Bauer assisted on both goals.

No scoring took place in the second half until the 46th minutes when freshman Arianna Krueger scored unassisted. It was the first goal of her varsity career.

Bauer and Herriges teamed up for goal Number 4 at 73:29, then the Ledgers, who finished their season at 5-12-2, scored twice in 2:17 to tie the game at 80:05, but never fear, Schulteis wanted to leave the KHS field in her final game there, and she scored the game-winner unassisted with just 3:36 to play.

Washington County Birds Test Positive For West Nile Virus

The Washington Ozaukee Public Health Department, in Washington County, reports two dead crows found in Washington County on May 12 and May 16 have tested positive for West Nile virus. These are the first birds that tested positive for West Nile virus in Washington County since surveillance for the mosquito-transmitted virus began May 1.

"The positive birds means that residents of Washington County need to be more vigilant in their personal protective measures to prevent mosquito bites," Kirsten Johnson, Health Officer/ Public Health Director said.

West Nile virus is spread to humans through the bite of an infected mosquito. Mosquitoes acquire the virus by feeding on infected birds.

"Washington County residents should be aware of West Nile virus and take some simple steps to protect themselves against mosquito bites," Johnson said. "The West Nile virus seems to be here to stay, so the best way to avoid the disease is to reduce exposure to and eliminate breeding grounds for mosquitoes."

The Washington Ozaukee Public Health Department recommends the following:

- ♦ Limit time spent outside at dawn and dusk, when mosquitoes are most active.
- ♦ Apply insect repellent to clothing as well as exposed skin since mosquitoes may bite through clothing.
- ♦ Make sure window and door screens are in good repair to prevent mosquito entry.
- ♦ Properly dispose of items around your property that hold water, such as tin cans, plastic containers, ceramic pots, or discarded tires.
- ♦ Clean roof gutters and downspouts for proper drainage.
- ♦ Turn over wheelbarrows, wading pools, boats, and canoes when not in

- use.
- ♦ Change the water in bird baths and pet dishes at least every three days.
- ♦ Clean and chlorinate swimming pools, outdoor saunas, and hot tubs; drain water from pool covers.
- ♦ Trim tall grass, weeds, and vines since mosquitoes use these areas to rest during hot daylight hours.
- ♦ Landscape to prevent water from pooling in low-lying areas.

The majority of people (80%) who are infected with West Nile virus do not get sick. Those who do become ill usually experience mild symptoms such as fever, headache, muscle ache, rash, and fatigue. Less than one percent of people infected with the virus get seriously ill with symptoms that include high fever, muscle weakness, stiff neck, disorientation, mental confusion, tremors, confusion, paralysis, and coma. Older adults and those with compromised immune systems are at greater risk of developing central nervous system illness that can be fatal.

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services has monitored the spread of West Nile virus since 2001 among wild birds, horses, mosquitoes, and people. During 2002, the state documented its first human infections and 52 cases were reported that year. During 2016, 13 cases of West Nile virus infection were reported among Wisconsin residents. West Nile virus infections in humans have been reported from June through October; however, most reported becoming ill with West Nile virus in August and September.

The Wisconsin Division of Public Health will continue surveillance for West Nile virus until the end of the mosquito season. To report a sick or dead crow, blue jay, or raven, please call the Dead Bird Reporting Hotline at 1-800-433-1610.

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

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
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

Dream Season Continues For The Lady Indians

The season did not start out all that well for the Kewaskum High softball team, but like a beautiful symphony it is ending with an impressive crescendo.

Early back-to-back losses to Campbellsport and Waupun were certainly not what KHS coach Jeff

Gosse was expecting. What has followed has been impressive ... 23 wins and only one blemish on the schedule — the loss to West Bend West in a tournament on May 6 — including a 5-2 victory over arch rival Waupun in the regional finale played in Waupun.

The keys to all those

wins: the impressive pitching of sophomore Kennedy Lehn, clutch hitting by seniors Breana Trepes and Brittany Williams and sophomore Maddie Geidel, along with solid defensive play and continued improvement by the younger players.

Lehn has been sensational, posting a 21-3 mark

with 276 strikeouts and an earned run average (ERA) of 0.84. Her control has been excellent as shown by her having walked just 41 opponents while giving up 58 hits and 27 runs. The 276 strikeouts is the most by any high school pitcher in Wisconsin, and the 21 wins is third high.

One other statistic stands out. Lehn tossed five no hitters this spring, and weather conditions were not always ideal. Gosse said Lehn has great command of her pitches, and she is a fierce competitor.

When it comes to offense, the top of Kewaskum's order is explosive. Geidel leads the team in hitting with a .584 average. She currently has 52 hits in 89 trips to the plate with a team-high six home runs and 12 doubles. She also has scored 34 runs, driven in 32 runs and has only struck out three times.

Geidel's 52 hits is seventh-best in the state.

Trepes, a four-year starter who pitched until last season, then switched to third base and this year first base, is an excellent leadoff hitter. She is bat-

ting .505 with 47 hits in 93 at bats and 33 runs scored.

Then there's the lefty Williams, whose statistics include a .389 average (35x90) with five doubles and a pair of triples and 31 runs batted in (RBI).

No doubt, Williams will long remember the regional game against Waupun where the double in the top of the fifth gave the Indians a 2-0 lead and her triple to the right field wall in the sixth drove in another run in the 5-2 victory.

Lehn is another of the good KHS hitters. By going 32x91, she is hitting at a .352 club with two home runs and 20 RBI.

The infield has been solid with Trepes at first and Kenzie Lehn, Ashley Trapp and Skylar Donath playing good ball at second, short and third, while sophomore Leah Theusch has developed into a very good catcher in her first year in that role.

Gosse said this year's seniors were exceptional as their three, 20-game win seasons suggests. "They're really good kids. I will miss them from the standpoint as players and as young ladies ... a fun

group to be around."

The veteran coach said Trepes hit .494 for her career with six homers. Her pitching record was 34-8 with an ERA of 2.47. Williams, a three-year start, hit at .374 for her career, while Kenzie Lehn hit .258 in her four years.

A fourth senior, Sydney Rosenthal has "a career marred by injuries," Gosse said.

Writer's note: The Lady Indians (22-4) won the regional title, the school's first ever, with a 5-2 victory over host Waupun on May 26. Kewaskum then defeated Grafton 2-0 in the sectional semifinal on May 30, thanks to a clutch double by senior Kenzie Lehn in the top of the seventh inning. Lehn's sister, Kennedy, struck out 16 Blackhawks in the shutout effort. If they can win one more game, they will play in the D-2 state tournament.

Long Drought Is Over For The KHS Tennis Team

It was way back in 1988 when Kewaskum High last qualified a player for the WIAA State Tennis Tournament.

Craig Hubbell, now the director for Human Resources/Communication for the Wauwatosa School District, was the first and only Indian to see action in a state meet until this year when Brent Goeden and Jared Chesak had a breakthrough season. They easily beat a team from Waupun 6-1, 6-1 in the recent sub-sectional competition and followed that performance with wins over McFarland (6-1, 6-3) and Big Foot/Williams Bay (6-1, 6-3) in the East Troy sectional for a second place finish at No. 1 doubles and a berth in the D-2 state test in Madison.

Coaches Andrew Dahlberg and Peter Garcia were elated by the efforts of the two juniors, who led an otherwise young team to a fourth place finish in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, a nine-team

conference comprised of teams from the East Central, the Eastern Wisconsin and the Big East conference, the latter headed by Kohler, which is currently seventh in the state rankings at Division 2 and will play in the Team Tennis Tournament on June 9-10.

Chesak and Goeden won first-team all-EWC honors at No. 1 doubles in a recent voting of the coaches, going 7-1 in conference dual meets, losing only to a team from Howards Grove/Elkhart Lake, which is also going to state. Kohler took home all the others gold medals.

Their most impressive win was the 7-5, 7-5 decision over Kohler, which had been unbeaten until that point. Their only losses during a 12-4 season came to two D-1 state teams and two D-2 state teams.

KHS Boys Track Team Peaking At The Right Time

A good mix of juniors and seniors were the main ingredients in Kewaskum's success this spring in boys track and field, and co-head coach Kris Evans hopes he can say the same about the girls' team in a couple of years because they were very young and had little depth in 2017.

Evans and coach Jason Last, along with assistants Jim Brock, T.J. Schlice and Jessica Schlice found a blueprint for success they hope to use again and again — have some solid specialists and build the team around strong sprint relays and individuals who can score points in multiple events.

Seniors Derrek Brock, Jakob Hrica, Kyle Pamperin, Brady Hanson, Tony Leister, along with juniors Cade Peterson and Riley Donovan, and sophomores Cameron Dodge and Tyler Heus, certainly

fit the bill in those categories this season.

Brock was the "iron man" on the team, consistently winning the 110-meter high hurdles, the 300 intermediates and carrying the baton for a lap of the team's very successful 4x400 relay team, along with Hrica, Hanson and Peterson.

He leaves with two trips to La Crosse for the WIAA Division 2 Track and Field Meet, and his name etched with two school records, the 39.59 second time he posted in taking third in the East Troy sectional, and the 3:25.13 he helped to secure.

Hanson, who missed half of his sophomore season and skipped his junior year to play basketball, also was a main contributor with his points from the high jump and the two relays.

Then there's Peterson, and Evans said, "I wish I had five of him because we could win some big

meets." Peterson is going to state in two events, the 4x400 relay and the open 200 where he will get to run against some excellent competition, including defending state champion, Kenneth Bednarik of Rice Lake.

His time in the 200 just kept getting faster and faster, and Evans said he clocked him at under 50 seconds in his leg of the 4x400 at the sectionals, giving the Indians a second place.

"Ten kids (to state)," Evans said at practice, the day after sectionals, not-

ing Pamperin, Hrica, Peterson, Hanson, Dodge, Donovan and Tony Steger are all making their first trips to state.

The third place with 59 points, behind Catholic Memorial (90 points) and East Troy (77.5) was definitely a team highlight. Still, against East Central competition, the Indians still have a ways to go after taking fourth (101 points) in the conference meet.

The meet at La Crosse got underway on June 2nd with preliminary races and specified field events.

Finals were scheduled for Saturday, June 3rd.

Girls Track Team

The girls' team struggled, but there were still highlights, namely the improvements by sophomore Grace Marchello in the 1,600 and home school sophomore Romaela Olla in the 3,200. Both love to run, according to Evans, who said they are both gritty competitors. Marcello cut her time down to 5:42.83 in the sectional meet, while Olla was clocked in a personal record (PR) 12:19.22 in

the May 9 Kewaskum quad.

Breanna Rice also had a good year and got her 400 time down to 64.89 in the sectional.

Last, who handles the weights, also has a freshman, Emily Halterman, in the discus, and she was getting closer to 100 feet at the end of the season with a best toss of 91-03.

Even though many of the athletes did not place in the larger competitions, it didn't go unnoticed by Evans how much improvement they made from March to late May.

Yes, he expected Plymouth, Winneconne, Kettle Moraine Lutheran and Campbellsport would be strong in the EC, but with seniors Molly Schulteis and Elisabeth "Lizzy" Bauer to lead his offense and Hailey Herriges and Mikayla Dogs to anchor the defense, a winning season

was a very good possibility.

Then came the news his returning goal keeper, Courtney Aker, sustained an injury while playing in the off-season, and she was declared out for the season. This was a crushing blow for the Indians, who were confident Aker would be one of the top keepers in the conference.

"Each season has its struggles and challenges. We faced quite a few before the season began. We had a few girls not return that were key pieces to the team in the past. The biggest chal-

lenge going into the year was the loss of Courtney our all-conference goalie from last year," Piwoni said.

It was back to Square No. 1 for Piwoni, who finally decided on junior Taylor Cook to take over the goal keeper spot, and since she was new to the sport so she had a "baptism of fire."

Two other situations factored into the realization the team goal of a winning season might not be met: 1 — the weather was horrendous in April, limiting the team's outdoor practice time and forcing the

postponement of a number of games due; 2 — other injuries which forced Piwoni to go with younger players in key positions.

The season went on, and there were good streaks and rough spots, so the Indians had to settle for sixth place and a 4-8 in EC play and a 6-13 record going into Division-3 tournament action. Younger players, like Kaylee Ducharme, Brandi Geldnich, Claire Schlieter and Morgan Denlinger, stepped up and should be good next year.

Schulteis had a good season, scoring seven

goals and coming up with three assists for 17 total points, while Bauer was the assist leader with four, and chipped in with five goals. Herriges, who played in the midfield and on defense, contributed two goals and three assists.

Molly, Lizzy and Hailey are all four-year starters on varsity. It seems like the four years have flown by," Piwoni said. "It is rare to get three players in the same year that have played that much soccer together. They are great teammates and have done so much for the girls soccer program."

The other seniors were defender Mikayla Dogs, who started for two years, and Erika Van Eimeren, who has improved a ton from last season and has been a valuable outside midfielder this season."

Finishing was a problem for the Indians, who would create scoring opportunities but at times could not get the ball in the net.

Cook made strides and had shutouts against Kiel, Berlin, Jefferson and Ripon and gave up 3.06 goals per game. "I cannot say enough about the job Taylor Cook did stepping into this role," Piwoni said, noting Aker stayed with the team as manager and helped the younger goalies.

"We will greatly miss our seniors and the leadership they provided," Piwoni said. "We will be young next season but the experience that many girls gained this year will be valuable moving forward."

Golfers Find Gold At The End Of The Season

It's like trading a Bob Uecker baseball card for a Mickey Mantle rookie card. You wouldn't think more than a couple seconds to swap for the latter. Same is true of the

Kewaskum High golf team, not with baseball cards, but with end-of-the-season tournaments.

The Indians and their new coach Casey Scheel have forgotten about their second place in the East Central Conference now

that they have posted first places in the D-2 regional and next the sectional, earning themselves a birth in the WIAA State Golf Tournament, which took place June 5-6 at University Ridge in Verona outside of Madison.

Playing at Racine Country Club on May 30, the Indians battled the wind and a couple of Milwaukee Metropolitan schools to win the sectional by four strokes with a 336 total. Finishing second, and also advancing to state, is Brookfield Academy with a 340.

"Definitely a great experience," Scheel said of winning the tournament. "They golfed well, especially Jacob (Schlosser) (It was) Definitely a difficult test and a difficult course."

The sophomore Schlosser was the medalist for the day with his

even par 72 on nines of 37 and 35. Kewaskum's other counters were Brad Buechel at 85, Jordan Carlton, 89; and Talon Ralph at 90. Buechel was tied for 10th in the field.

The 99 by James Banks was the throw away score.

The 35 by Schlosser, who has an excellent short game, was one-under par. He was three-over on the back nine after the 13th hole when he knocked the ball in the hole in two shots on No. 14 for an eagle, and he followed that with a birdie on No. 15 to get back to even.

On the final three holes, he went 3-4-4 for the 35 to go with his front nine of 37. Only three other players managed to break 80.

Kewaskum shot a 337 in its regional, held at the Kettle Hills Golf Club, finishing nine strokes ahead of Chilton. Schlosser was third in the event with an

80, while Buechel and Ralph both carded 85s to tie for fifth.

With a senior-dominated team in 2016, this may have looked like a rebuilding year for the Indians, but the three sophomores, Schlosser, Buechel and Ralph, and junior Carlton had others ideas. They won the first East Central Conference mini-tour event at Winneconne, shooting a 159 and battled with Plymouth right to the wire before the Panthers captured the title with a strong showing down the stretch and a second place, behind Waupun, in the 18-hole conference tournament held at Whispering Springs in Fond du Lac.

Only one KHS player, Ralph, won a medal for finishing in the top 10 that day. Carlton lost a tie-breaker for the 10th medal.

Schlosser had a rare bad day at the tournament, shooting an 85, which cost him the conference medal. That honor was shared by Cade Knaus of Plymouth and Kettle Moraine Lutheran's Solomon Zaring, who both ended with 61 points based on points from mini-tour finishes.

Buechel and Carlton were among those receiving honorable mention.

With four veterans and some promising freshmen, the future looks bright for KHS golf.





Dream Season Continues For The Lady Indians

The season did not start out all that well for the Kewaskum High softball team, but like a beautiful symphony it is ending with an impressive crescendo.

Early back-to-back losses to Campbellsport and Waupun were certainly not what KHS coach Jeff

Gosse was expecting. What has followed has been impressive ... 23 wins and only one blemish on the schedule — the loss to West Bend West in a tournament on May 6 — including a 5-2 victory over arch rival Waupun in the regional finale played in Waupun.

The keys to all those

wins: the impressive pitching of sophomore Kennedy Lehn, clutch hitting by seniors Breana Trepes and Brittany Williams and sophomore Maddie Geidel, along with solid defensive play and continued improvement by the younger players.

Lehn has been sensational, posting a 21-3 mark

with 276 strikeouts and an earned run average (ERA) of 0.84. Her control has been excellent as shown by her having walked just 41 opponents while giving up 58 hits and 27 runs. The 276 strikeouts is the most by any high school pitcher in Wisconsin, and the 21 wins is third high.

One other statistic stands out. Lehn tossed five no hitters this spring, and weather conditions were not always ideal. Gosse said Lehn has great command of her pitches, and she is a fierce competitor.

When it comes to offense, the top of Kewaskum's order is explosive. Geidel leads the team in hitting with a .584 average. She currently has 52 hits in 89 trips to the plate with a team-high six home runs and 12 doubles. She also has scored 34 runs, driven in 32 runs and has only struck out three times.

Geidel's 52 hits is seventh-best in the state.

Trepes, a four-year starter who pitched until last season, then switched to third base and this year first base, is an excellent leadoff hitter. She is bat-

ting .505 with 47 hits in 93 at bats and 33 runs scored.

Then there's the lefty Williams, whose statistics include a .389 average (35x90) with five doubles and a pair of triples and 31 runs batted in (RBI).

No doubt, Williams will long remember the regional game against Waupun where the double in the top of the fifth gave the Indians a 2-0 lead and her triple to the right field wall in the sixth drove in another run in the 5-2 victory.

Lehn is another of the good KHS hitters. By going 32x91, she is hitting at a .352 club with two home runs and 20 RBI.

The infield has been solid with Trepes at first and Kenzie Lehn, Ashley Trapp and Skylar Donath playing good ball at second, short and third, while sophomore Leah Theusch has developed into a very good catcher in her first year in that role.

Gosse said this year's seniors were exceptional as their three, 20-game win seasons suggests. "They're really good kids. I will miss them from the standpoint as players and as young ladies ... a fun

group to be around."

The veteran coach said Trepes hit .494 for her career with six homers. Her pitching record was 34-8 with an ERA of 2.47. Williams, a three-year start, hit at .374 for her career, while Kenzie Lehn hit .258 in her four years.

A fourth senior, Sydney Rosenthal has "a career marred by injuries," Gosse said.

Writer's note: The Lady Indians (22-4) won the regional title, the school's first ever, with a 5-2 victory over host Waupun on May 26. Kewaskum then defeated Grafton 2-0 in the sectional semifinal on May 30, thanks to a clutch double by senior Kenzie Lehn in the top of the seventh inning. Lehn's sister, Kennedy, struck out 16 Blackhawks in the shutout effort. If they can win one more game, they will play in the D-2 state tournament.

Long Drought Is Over For The KHS Tennis Team

It was way back in 1988 when Kewaskum High last qualified a player for the WIAA State Tennis Tournament.

Craig Hubbell, now the director for Human Resources/Communication for the Wauwatosa School District, was the first and only Indian to see action in a state meet until this year when Brent Goeden and Jared Chesak had a breakthrough season. They easily beat a team from Waupun 6-1, 6-1 in the recent sub-sectional competition and followed that performance with wins over McFarland (6-1, 6-3) and Big Foot/Williams Bay (6-1, 6-3) in the East Troy sectional for a second place finish at No. 1 doubles and a berth in the D-2 state test in Madison.

Coaches Andrew Dahlberg and Peter Garcia were elated by the efforts of the two juniors, who led an otherwise young team to a fourth place finish in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, a nine-team

conference comprised of teams from the East Central, the Eastern Wisconsin and the Big East conference, the latter headed by Kohler, which is currently seventh in the state rankings at Division 2 and will play in the Team Tennis Tournament on June 9-10.

Chesak and Goeden won first-team all-EWC honors at No. 1 doubles in a recent voting of the coaches, going 7-1 in conference dual meets, losing only to a team from Howards Grove/Elkhart Lake, which is also going to state. Kohler took home all the others gold medals.

Their most impressive win was the 7-5, 7-5 decision over Kohler, which had been unbeaten until that point. Their only losses during a 12-4 season came to two D-1 state teams and two D-2 state teams.

Chesak and Goeden, were slated to play Green Bay Notre Dame's Matthew Krzewski and Nic Lasecki in the first round of action on Thursday June 1. What is also encourag-

ing for Kewaskum was the fact their Nos. 2, 3 and 4 singles players, Kyle Loehr, Matthew Krautkramer and Bryce Halvorsen all won bronze medals for being honorable mention selections. Halvorsen is only a freshman, while the two others had good sophomore seasons.

The No. 3 doubles team of Gavin Curtin and Zachary Fehrenkrug also received bronze medals, and Curtin will be back next season for a second varsity season. Krautkramer and Curtin/Fehrenkrug took fourth places in the sectional.

Yes, the immediate future is bright for Kewaskum in the sport with the all-conference recipients returning along with Devin Schneider, who did not have a winning season while having to face other No. 1 singles players with impressive resumes.

Seniors Zackary Brogaard and Tyler Schellinger had a successful year, playing together

for the first time at No. 2 doubles, and they will be missed next spring.

Dahlberg was not able to be at the sectional competition, so Garcia was in charge that day and helped all the KHS players with his well-timed pep

talks.

"I am just grateful to be one of the coaches who had the opportunity to help them through this process," he said after the sectional. "I can't wait to see what the next year will bring."

A good mix of juniors and seniors were the main ingredients in Kewaskum's success this spring in boys track and field, and co-head coach Kris Evans hopes he can say the same about the girls' team in a couple of years because they were very young and had little depth in 2017.

Evans and coach Jason Last, along with assistants Jim Brock, T.J. Schlice and Jessica Schlice found a blueprint for success they hope to use again and again — have some solid specialists and build the team around strong sprint relays and individuals who can score points in multiple events.

The third place with 59 points, behind Catholic Memorial (90 points) and East Troy (77.5) was definitely a team highlight. Still, against East Central competition, the Indians still have a ways to go after taking fourth (101 points) in the conference meet.

The meet at La Crosse got underway on June 2nd with preliminary races and specified field events.

Finals were scheduled for Saturday, June 3rd.

The girls' team struggled, but there were still highlights, namely the improvements by sophomore Grace Marchello in the 1,600 and home school sophomore Romaela Olla in the 3,200. Both love to run, according to Evans, who said they are both gritty competitors. Marcello cut her time down to 5:42.83 in the sectional meet, while Olla was clocked in a personal record (PR) 12:19.22 in

the May 9 Kewaskum quad.

Breanna Rice also had a good year and got her 400 time down to 64.89 in the sectional.

Last, who handles the weights, also has a freshman, Emily Halterman, in the discus, and she was getting closer to 100 feet at the end of the season with a best toss of 91-03.

Even though many of the athletes did not place in the larger competitions, it didn't go unnoticed by Evans how much improvement they made from March to late May.

Molly, Lizzy and Hailey are all four-year starters on varsity. It seems like the four years have flown by," Piwoni said. "It is rare to get three players in the same year that have played that much soccer together. They are great teammates and have done so much for the girls soccer program."

The other seniors were defender Mikayla Dogs, who started for two years, and Erika Van Eimeren, who has improved a ton from last season and has been a valuable outside midfielder this season."

Golfers Find Gold At The End Of The Season

It's like trading a Bob Uecker baseball card for a Mickey Mantle rookie card. You wouldn't think more than a couple seconds to swap for the latter. Same is true of the

Kewaskum High golf team, not with baseball cards, but with end-of-the-season tournaments.

The Indians and their new coach Casey Scheel have forgotten about their second place in the East Central Conference now

that they have posted first places in the D-2 regional and next the sectional, earning themselves a birth in the WIAA State Golf Tournament, which took place June 5-6 at University Ridge in Verona outside of Madison.

Playing at Racine Country Club on May 30, the Indians battled the wind and a couple of Milwaukee Metropolitan schools to win the sectional by four strokes with a 336 total. Finishing second, and also advancing to state, is Brookfield Academy with a 340.

"Definitely a great experience," Scheel said of winning the tournament. "They golfed well, especially Jacob (Schlosser) (It was) Definitely a difficult test and a difficult course."

The sophomore Schlosser was the medalist for the day with his

even par 72 on nines of 37 and 35. Kewaskum's other counters were Brad Buechel at 85, Jordan Carlton, 89; and Talon Ralph at 90. Buechel was tied for 10th in the field.

The 99 by James Banks was the throw away score.

The 35 by Schlosser, who has an excellent short game, was one-under par. He was three-over on the back nine after the 13th hole when he knocked the ball in the hole in two shots on No. 14 for an eagle, and he followed that with a birdie on No. 15 to get back to even.

On the final three holes, he went 3-4-4 for the 35 to go with his front nine of 37. Only three other players managed to break 80.

Kewaskum shot a 337 in its regional, held at the Kettle Hills Golf Club, finishing nine strokes ahead of Chilton. Schlosser was third in the event with an

80, while Buechel and Ralph both carded 85s to tie for fifth.

With a senior-dominated team in 2016, this may have looked like a rebuilding year for the Indians, but the three sophomores, Schlosser, Buechel and Ralph, and junior Carlton had others ideas. They won the first East Central Conference mini-tour event at Winneconne, shooting a 159 and battled with Plymouth right to the wire before the Panthers captured the title with a strong showing down the stretch and a second place, behind Waupun, in the 18-hole conference tournament held at Whispering Springs in Fond du Lac.

Only one KHS player, Ralph, won a medal for finishing in the top 10 that day. Carlton lost a tie-breaker for the 10th medal.

Schlosser had a rare bad day at the tournament, shooting an 85, which cost him the conference medal. That honor was shared by Cade Knaus of Plymouth and Kettle Moraine Lutheran's Solomon Zaring, who both ended with 61 points based on points from mini-tour finishes.

Buechel and Carlton were among those receiving honorable mention.

With four veterans and some promising freshmen, the future looks bright for KHS golf.

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
