## Thousands Turn Out For Breakfast On The Farm

People came in droves to the Golden E Dairy Farm in Farmington on Saturday, setting a new record for the number of people attending the Washington County Breakfast on the Farm.

In all, 5,327 breakfasts were served at the 30th annual event, shattering the 1994 record of 5,200, according to Mike Strupp, co-chair for event.

"Everything went very, very well," Strupp said.

"As a family, we were very pleased with how everything went. The weather was perfect and it was a good crowd," said Chris Elbe, who owns the first-generation family farm.

Bruce Prueger, who volunteered his time to cook for the breakfast, agreed that the weather was perfect.

"Although it could be a little cooler for us," Prueger said as he turned the meat over on a hot grill.

In all, 750 pounds of

sausage were cooked to feed the thousands of hungry attendees.

The crowd went through 680.5 pints of milk, 500 pounds of cheese curds, four half barrels of root beer, 159 gallons of ice cream and 273 pounds of strawberries, Strupp said.

For Lara and Jason Hartman, the sausage was the best part of the breakfast.

"It was all really good," Lara said.

It would not have been possible without the work of a lot of volunteers.

"It all went very well, and we are grateful for the work that all the volunteers did," Strupp said.

As they waited in the 90-minute line, attendees watched the cooks work hot grills.

Volunteers worked to cook and serve all the food at the event.

A team of four volunteer chefs worked together over an enormous outdoor griddle, cooking 22 dozen eggs at a time.

By the end of the morning, the group had it down

to a science.

First, they heated three sticks of butter.

## Washington County Sheriff's Office Prepared For U.S. Open

For the first time in history, the U.S. Open Championship is being held in Wisconsin, and the Washington County Sheriff's Office is heading up security for the event.

"For the most part, from our perspective, things are going well right now," Sheriff Dale Schmidt said while at Erin Hills on Monday.

The Sheriff's Office started planning for the event two years ago.

"We started meeting to establish an understanding of the event, and the kinds of things they were looking for from public safety," Schmidt said.

Planning meetings determined that the Wisconsin State Patrol would take the lead on traffic issues and the Hartford Fire and Rescue would head up fire and EMS services for the event.

While the U.S. Open is going on, the Sheriff's Office is still covering its

normal duties.

"Our office still has deputies working and dispatchers working the normal duty that we have, patrol and the 911 center," Schmidt said.

To make sure there is enough coverage, deputies from the Waukesha County Sheriff's Office and the Dodge County Sheriff's Office are supplementing Washington County's forces as Erin Hills.

## New Inflatable Slides And Equipment Installed At Kiwanis Park Swim Pond

The Inflatable Slides and Climbing Equipment were installed last Wednesday, June 7, at the Kiwanis Park Swim Pond in Kewaskum.

The inflatable amenities proved to be strong, as they remained inflated on Tuesday, after a storm with 70 mph winds blew through Kewaskum Monday night.

Unfortunately, in the storm, the new equipment

moved from their anchored locations. Crews will re-anchor the pieces, and then they will be available for use by the public. It was unknown when that would be as of press time on Tuesday.

There is no additional cost to use the new amenities.

The new additions came as a result of a year's worth of meetings by a pool committee. The Village Board formed the

committee last year in an effort to find a way of increasing attendance at the swim pond.

Kewaskum resident Lloyd Spaeth brought the idea of inflatable amenities to the pool committee. The Village of Winneconne has similar amenities. There, the village saw a three-fold increase in pond attendance after inflatables were installed.

## Music In The Park Set To Begin On Tuesday

Music in the Park will kick off at Riverhill Park in Kewaskum with a performance by the Whiskeybelles on Tuesday, June 20.

The Whiskeybelles are an all-female trio who have experienced a lot of success in the Milwaukee music scene. They play traditional country and Americana with a guitar, a fiddle and a bass. Formed in May of 2011 they have released two albums of original music, a live CD and are working on their fourth while playing more than 65 performances a year. They performed for Music in the Park in 2016 and drew a huge crowd.

Spaeth also spearheaded a drive to obtain donations for life jackets for people who use the new amenities at Kiwanis Park. The life jackets will be required to use the inflatable equipment.

The Village of Kewaskum spends about \$50,000 a year to maintain the Kiwanis Park swim pond.

The village spent about \$15,000 on the inflatable amenities.

In addition, it has purchased four shade umbrellas for about \$10,000, which will be installed on the beach soon.

The Kiwanis Park Swim Pond will be open Mondays through Saturdays, 11 a.m. to 7 p.m.; and Sundays, 11:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. Cost of a daily pass is: 2 and younger, free; ages 3-17, \$3; and 18 and older, \$5.

Swim season passes

are available at the Kiwanis Park Bath House.

A pass for individual residents in grades seven-12 to enjoy 10 separate swim occasions is available for \$10. This is a one-time purchase per person.

New this year for non-

residents is a 10 for 15 pass, which allows individual non-residents in grades seven-12 to enjoy 10 separate swim experiences for \$15.

Individual season swim pass fees are as follows: resident ages 3-17,

\$29.75; and non-Resident, ages 3-17, \$45.

Family season swim passes cost \$51 for residents and \$70 for non-residents. A family may consist of two adults and all children in the household ages 17 and younger.



# WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORT

## Serious Injury Crash

On Sunday, June 11, at 4 p.m., deputies from the Washington County Sheriff's Office and Hartford Fire/Rescue responded to the 7200 block of Lee Road, in the Township of Hartford, for a single vehicle (motorcycle) crash with injury. Upon the arrival of Hartford Rescue, Flight for Life was summoned to Hartford Hospital for injuries sustained to the operator who was the sole occupant.

Initial investigation shows that the operator was westbound on Lee Road when he lost control for an unknown reason. He veered right and went through the ditch, drove about 200 feet through a grassy area and struck a split rail fence where he was ejected.

The operator was flown to Aurora Medical Center - Summit where he is being treated for his injuries. He sustained a head injury and other internal injuries. He was in serious condition.

The injured operator is an 18-year-old male from Hartford, who was not wearing a helmet at the time of the crash.

## Tractor/Trailer Crash

On June 9, at 12:07 p.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of two tractor/trailers that had collided on Interstate 41 southbound at Mohawk Road in the Town of Wayne. Personnel from the Sheriff's Office, Wisconsin State Patrol, and Kohlsville Fire Department responded to the scene. Upon their arrival, first responders located a damaged tractor/trailer stopped in the right lane and a second damaged tractor/trailer stopped in the far right emergency lane. While both tractors had sustained significant damage, neither operator claimed injury. The Washington County Highway

Department also responded to the scene to assist with cleanup.

An on-scene investigation revealed the following: The lead southbound tractor/trailer, operated by a 60-year-old Green Bay man, had stopped in the right lane due to construction related back-ups. The second southbound tractor/trailer, operated by a 29-year-old Chicago man, was unable to stop in time to avoid striking the lead tractor/trailer. The operator of the second tractor/trailer took evasive action by positioning his vehicle in the far right emergency lane. In the process of trying to rapidly stop in the emergency lane, the second tractor/trailer jackknifed and impacted the first tractor. No other vehicles were involved in the crash.

The matter remains under investigation by the Sheriff's Office, but inattentive driving and driving too fast for conditions appear to be contributing factors. As of this writing, the right lane (in the area of the crash) remains closed to facilitate clean-up operations.

## Single Vehicle Crash

On June 9, at 6:03 a.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a single vehicle, roll-over style crash on Interstate 41 northbound approximately 0.2 miles south of Cedar Creek Road in the Town of Polk. Personnel from the Washington County Sheriff's Office, Slinger Police Department, Slinger Fire Department, and Lifestar Ambulance service responded to the scene. Upon their arrival, rescuers located a severely damaged automobile down a steep embankment on the east side of Interstate 41. It was apparent that the vehicle had rolled several times and came to rest after striking

a tree. The driver of the vehicle, a 50-year-old West Milwaukee woman, required extrication from her vehicle and was flown to Froedtert Hospital in Wauwatosa via Flight For Life. The operator's injuries are believed to be non-life threatening.

An on-scene investigation revealed the following: The operator and sole occupant of the crashed vehicle was northbound on Interstate 41 in the left lane, when for an unknown reason(s), her vehicle gradually veered right and entered the east ditch line. The vehicle continued northbound in the ditch line and struck the back side of a metal guardrail. After striking the guardrail, the vehicle rolled several times down a steep embankment and struck a tree. No other vehicles were involved in the crash and the operator was wearing her seatbelt. The operator was transported via ambulance to a nearby off-free-way location where Flight For Life had previously been staged.

The right lane of I41 in the area of the crash was closed for approximately 1.5 hours to facilitate rescue and clean up operations. The exact cause of the crash is unknown at this time and the matter remains under investigation by the Sheriff's Office.

## Overtaken Semi Trailer

On June 8, at 4:26 a.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a semi that had lost control and over-turned on Interstate 41 northbound at State Highway 144 in the Town of Polk. Sheriff's deputies and an officer from the Slinger Police Department responded to the scene. Upon their arrival, officers located a double bottom tractor/trailer stopped in the right emer-

gency lane. The second (rear) trailer was overturned but still attached to the lead trailer. Both lanes of Interstate 41 were obstructed with debris that had fallen out of the overturned trailer. The driver of the semi, a 50-year old Milwaukee man, was uninjured. Officers re-opened the left lane after manually clearing the debris. Both lanes of Interstate 41 were re-opened at approximately 6:26 a.m. after the trailer was moved into the shoulder. The Washington County Highway Department established an official closure of the shoulder to facilitate additional clean-up and removal efforts.

An on-scene investigation revealed the following: The northbound semi was in the right lane when the driver lost control, crossed over the left (fast) lane, and partially entered the grassy median. The rear trailer struck a section of guardrail protecting the State Highway 144 bridge abutments. The semi re-entered the northbound lanes of travel, swerved across both lanes, and entered the east ditch line. The rear trailer then struck a concrete retaining wall/fence, and came to rest on its side partially in the right (slow) lane of travel. No other vehicles were involved in the incident.

The matter remains under investigation by the Sheriff's Office, but inattentive driving appears to be the main contributing factor. Motorists are encouraged to travel the area at reduced speeds as clean-up efforts continue.

# Roads To Be Sealed During Week Of June 19

The Washington County Highway Department will be chip sealing a series of roadways during the week of June 19. Chip sealing involves the application of a layer of oil emulsion (a tarlike substance) followed by a layer of small aggregate and compaction. Loose gravel will be on the roadways until full compaction occurs.

Traffic on project roads will be open to a single lane of travel during application and will be controlled with the use of flaggers. Travelers and property owners along project roads should exercise patience and expect delays. Use of alternate routes is strongly encouraged whenever possible.

Project roadways

◆ State Trunk Highway (STH) 144 from Skyline Road (West Bend city limits) northeasterly to the Sheboygan County line in the Towns of Barton and Farmington;

◆ County Trunk Highway (CTH) DD (Pine Lane segment) in the Town of Farmington;

◆ CTH H from STH 144 easterly to CTH XX in the Town of Farmington;

◆ CTH HH from 600' south of CTH H southerly to the cul-de-sac in the Town of Farmington;

◆ CTH I from River Road easterly to Oak Bend and Town of Trenton;

◆ CTH M from STH 33 southerly to Knollwood Road in the Town of Trenton.

We understand that chip sealing roads can cause an inconvenience. Thank you for your patience and extra caution as we improve and maintain Washington County's roadways.

# Village Board To Make Call On How To Handle Phone Hacking Incident

The Kewaskum Village Board discussed last Monday how to handle extra charges that were incurred when someone hacked into the village's phone system.

On January, 11, the village was notified by Frontier Communications that on January 5 the village's phone lines were hacked by an outside party, Village Administrator Matt Heiser said.

On that day, there were 80 phone calls made via village lines to Jamaica.

Village staff followed Frontier's standard processes for fraudulent calls.

In addition, village staff worked with its information technology provider to shut

off international calling access so that the problem could not happen again, Heiser said.

The entire incident resulted in more than \$7,000 in charges and fees, Heiser said.

Frontier offered to forgive about \$7,000 of that, leaving a total of \$3,669 for the village to cover in charges and late fees.

"I thought that was a fairly generous offer, considering it wasn't their issue; it was our technological issue," Heiser told the board last Monday night.

"I don't think half is good at all," Village President Kevin Scheunemann said.

"I am for paying zero. This is the kind of thing phone companies should rectify

when it comes to good customer service."

Village Trustee Richard Laubach also said that he felt that the village should not cover the charges.

"I think we should get rid of our vendor and replace the vendor. If they want to pursue it legally, they can file a lawsuit, because I think our insurance will cover it that way, if it ever comes to that kind of legal blow," Scheunemann said.

The village is expected to discuss the matter in a closed session next week.

## Washington County Sheriff's Office Prepared For U.S. Open

The United States Golf Association (USGA) was responsible for planning parking lots for the tens of thousands of people coming to the event.

When rain thwarted the USGA's original plan for one of the two main parking lots this past spring, the USGA shifted to Plan B, and is using the Washington County Fair Park as a main parking area. Spectators are shuttled from that parking lot, as well as more than a dozen other lots that are scattered in the area.

This is the third USGA national championship to be conducted at Erin Hills, following the 2008 U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links Championship and the 2011 U.S. Amateur Championship.

Practice rounds were scheduled to be held Monday through

Wednesday, while the championship rounds are slated for Thursday through Sunday.

A total of 156 professionals and amateurs are in the field, vying for the \$2.16 million winning prize. The championship is expected to bring more than \$130 million to the community.

Some area residents are seeing some of those profits by renting out their homes. Hidden Serenity Bed and Breakfast in Farmington has rooms rented out to spectators from Illinois and California this week.

More than 35,000 spectators are expected to attend the U.S. Open each day, with authorities anticipating about 45,000 to 50,000 people on Saturday, Schmidt said.

Those staggering numbers are why the Sheriff's

Office wanted to be fully prepared.

"There are things that happen in life at a large event like this," Schmidt said.

For example, on Monday, there were a number of medical calls, due to the heat, Schmidt said.

"The Hartford Fire and Rescue is taking care of those so far," Schmidt said.

Law enforcement is prepared to handle things as they arise this week, Schmidt said.

"We feel things should go pretty well. Being a large event, sometimes there are going to be some problems at different points in time, but we are prepared to address those. And I think we should have a good week," Schmidt said.

### ANOTHER REASON TO EAT FISH

Eating fatty fish may cut the risk for blindness in those with type 2 diabetes. Diabetic retinopathy is a complication of type 2 diabetes that can cause blindness because of reduced blood supply to the retina. A new analysis of data on 3,400 people with type 2 diabetes looked at the correlation between intake of omega 3 fats from seafood and the risk of diabetic retinopathy. The researchers found that those who regularly consumed an average of two servings per week of fatty fish had a 50% reduced risk of developing diabetic retinopathy than those who ate less than that.

"No margarine here- this is a farm so we use butter," volunteer chef Carl Becker pointed out.

Then the crew mixed each batch of 264 eggs with five pounds of ham, two and a half pounds of cheese, chicken bouillon, salt and pepper.

Joey Potter of Allenton had the messiest job of all: mixing the pancakes.

To complete that task, Potter mixed half a bucket of water with three or four scoops of a flour mixed with secret ingredients.

In all, 18,000 pancakes were served.

"That's a lot of flipping," Strupp said.

Strupp, who is treasurer for the Washington County Dairy Promotion Committee, has already started lining up a farm for next year's breakfast.

"We have a lot of nice farms in Washington County," said Strupp, who has been working at the event for the past 20 years.

Besides eating breakfast, people toured the dairy barn. A veterinarian, nutritionist and equipment dealer all explained how things worked on the farm.

Antique and modern tractors were on display. A petting farm was a main attraction for children.

Saturday was the first time, the number of people outnumbered the 2,600 cows on the Golden E Dairy Farm.

People traveled from across Wisconsin to eat at the farm. There also were visitors from Minnesota and some from as far away as Germany.

Even royalty was there. "It's the best breakfast I ever had," said Jennifer Gross, the reigning Wisconsin Honey Queen, adding that next time honey should be served with the pancakes.

# Awards Are Presented To KHS Tennis Players

Kewaskum High tennis players celebrated their season accomplishments at the team's annual awards banquet on June 11.

Highlighted by the state appearance of its Number 1 doubles team of Jared Chesak and Brent Goeden and earning all-conference medals at five spots, the Indians were able to look back to what they accomplished this spring and look ahead to what next year can bring.

The Goeden-Chesak duo definitely improved their game in their second year on the varsity. They were 7-1 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, defeating Kohler but losing to Howards Grove, and finished second in the East Troy sectional tournament to become KHS' first doubles team to advance to the Division 2 state tournament in the thirty plus years the school has had tennis.

"They know now what it's going to take to the next level," winning matches at state, assistant coach Peter Garcia said about Chesak and Goeden, who finished with a 14-5 mark this year. He explained doubles teams not only have to be the best two-some on their team but sometimes the best two players, pointing to the fact the Green Bay Notre Dame team they lost to at state was made up of its Number 1 singles player most of the season and one of its regular Number 1 doubles players.

Better serving and dominant play at the net helped the two juniors to earn respect from other schools in southeastern Wisconsin.

"We're looking for big things from these two guys next year," Garcia said.

Kewaskum finished fourth (5-3) in the nine-team Eastern Wisconsin Conference, losing third place by just one match against the senior-dominated Sheboygan Falls

team. Kohler was a perfect 8-0 to win the title and advanced to the WIAA Division 2 State Team Championships in Madison.

Head coach Andrew Dahlberg explained the all-conference voting and announced the Indians brought home two gold medals and five bronze for being honorable mention picks.

Goeden and Chesak won gold, while Kyle Loehr at Number 2 singles, Matthew Krautkramer at Number 3 singles and Bryce Halvorsen at Number 4 singles and Gavin Curtain and Zach Fahrenkrug at Number 2 doubles all received bronze medals. Loehr and Krautkramer are sophomores, while Halvorsen is a freshman; Curtain is a junior and Fahrenkrug is a senior.

Halvorsen finished at 6-2, while Curtain and Fahrenkrug posted a 5-2 record, and Loehr and Krautkramer were 4-4 in league play.

Letter winners included: seniors — Zackary Brogaard, Ty Schellinger and Fahrenkrug; juniors — Devin Schneider, Chesak, Goeden and Curtain; sophomores — Loehr and Krautkramer; and freshman — Halvorsen. JV awards went to Isaiah Cochran, Donald Keaton and Ben Reid.

Dahlberg and Garcia decided the captain awards should go to the seniors, who all helped get out the equipment and fill out lineup charts.

"I thought it was a great year for us," Dahlberg said. "The most important things were getting better and having fun."

Garcia said he is already excited about next season, urging the young men to play during the off season and be ready for more emphasis on footwork and positioning to make another step toward finishing among the top three teams.

# Indians' First Trip To State Ends In Heartbreak

## – 4-0 Lead Disappears In Final Two Innings; Rice Lake Goes On To Win D-2 Title

Rice Lake's Emily Fell and her Warrior teammates broke the hearts of the Kewaskum High softball players last Friday afternoon.

Fell's bases-loaded single with one out in the bottom of the eighth inning drove in two runs, securing a 6-5 victory for the Warriors in the semifinals of the WIAA Division 2 State Softball Championships and ending the Indians' magical run to the Goodman Field on the University of Wisconsin campus.

Down 5-4 with three outs to go, Rice Lake got a leadoff single from pitcher Johanna Hrdlicka. Then after Zoe Stenseth flied out to Megan Marx in center field, the Warriors loaded the bases when Mady Falstad singled and Brooke Scheurer walked, before Fell's hit ended the contest.

"We wished it could have been a storybook ending, and it wasn't," KHS coach Jeff Gosse said as he faced the media after talking with his girls who were obviously disappointed after the heart-breaking loss.

Kewaskum, which has relished at being the away team most of the season, jumped out to a lead again in what was its biggest game of the year.

Breana Trepes led off with a single to right field and was moved to second when Number 2 hitter Maddy Geidel hit a rocked grounder up the middle into center field. With runners at first and second, Hrdlicka got Brittany Williams to pop out, but Kennedy Lehn came through for her team with the third hit of the inning, a single to right field, which gave the Indians a 1-0 lead.

Hrdlicka got Ashley Trapp to fly out to center,

but moments later, Geidel scored on a passed ball and the Indians were up 2-0.

Lehn faced just four Warriors in the first, striking out two of them and even though she gave up two hits in the second she got out of the jam when she got Stenseth and Falstad on strikes.

KHS added to its lead in the top of the fifth, scoring two more runs after two were out. Geidel started the rally with her second single, then Williams singled, beating the Warrior's first baseman Lexi Hutton to the bag after she and second baseman Falstad both went after the ball.

Lehn delivered again, singling home Geidel, and another passed ball by the Rice Lake catcher allowed Williams to dash home.

A 4-0 lead with just three innings to go, but Rice Lake managed to score one run in its half of the inning on a two-out double by Dana Covey which hit the left field wall after just two bounces. The run was unearned since Scheurer reached on a KHS error, but Lehn was able to get out of any further trouble when she struck out Jacky Robarge.

Hrdlicka faced four Indians in the top of the sixth, while Lehn did her one better, putting the Warriors down in order in the sixth, with a couple pop ups and a grounder to Trapp at short.

Kewaskum's enthusiastic fans were starting to smell victory after Lehn got Falstad to line out to second base for the first out in the seventh. Scheuer quieted them with her double past short, then Lehn struck out Fell for out Number 2.

One out to go, but it didn't come in time. Sam Soley, who was batting .475, hit a sharp single to left, making the score 4-2, then Covey hit a fly ball between Williams and Marx in left-center. Williams had a bead on it but the ball hit her glove and bounced out, putting runners at second and third.

Now it was the Warrior fans to get excited, and their team got a run closer after a wild pitch, and they tied the game up when a ball hit by Robarge could not be corralled by Skylar Donath at third. A great catch by second baseman Kenzie Lehn on a low line drive ended the inning.

"We gave them five outs in the seventh," Gosse said. "You can't give a good hitting team extra outs."

The first extra inning started with a bang when Lehn cracked the first pitch she saw to deep right field for a triple. Gosse wasted no time making the call for a squeeze bunt. Trapp laid down a beauty and Sydney Rosenthal, pinch

running for Lehn, dashed home with the lead run.

Hrdlicka quickly regained her composure and got Marx to strike out and Kenzie Lehn to fly out to left field to end the inning.

Rice Lake was down but not for long as Hrdlicka stroked her third single of the night and moved to third on Falstad's one-out single. Lehn faced the lefty Scheurer next and walked her after a full count, loading the bases for Fell, who took the first pitch she saw for a ball, and then got the hit to win the game.

Lehn gave up 11 hits, walked three and struck out nine. When asked if he saw Lehn having any difficulties, Gosse said, "From my vantage point, about the fifth inning, she started slowing down," but the veteran coach was quick to add, "It's not on her only," noting it was a combination of situations which led to the defeat.

Gosse said evidence of Lehn's competitiveness was displayed when she came back with the triple in the top of the eighth to help the Indians regain the lead. Lehn wound up going 3x4 with two runs batted in (RBI). She was 23-4 with an earned run average under 1.00 and 316 strikeouts.

Another question posed to Gosse involved Geidel's attempt at trying to stretch a double into a triple and being thrown out at third by Falstad. "I was waving her all the way to third... They made a hell of a throw to second."

Geidel, the Indians' leading hitter with a .542 batting average, 32 RNIs and six home runs, had a 3x4 afternoon.

"I had fun," Trepes, one of the team's four-year regulars, said after hugging all of her teammates. "It was a good experience. I'm glad I made it (to state), and glad I made it with these girls."

Other seniors playing in their final high school games were Williams, Kenzie Lehn and Rosenthal. All will be missed, but the Indians' cupboard will still be well stocked for the 2018 season.

The Indians ended the year at 25-4, with a second-place finish in the East Central Conference, several tournament titles, along with regional and sectional crowns. Rice Lake (23-8) went on to win the Division 2 title with a 13-9 victory over Beloit Turner in eight innings. In the eighth, the Warriors scored four times on four hits and one Trojan miscue.



# More Tough Luck For Indians In Game Against West Bend West

This is not the kind of season coach Doug Gonring was expecting of his Kewaskum High team, and it is not where Gonring anticipated his Number 1 pitcher, Cole Surprenant, would be sitting after six games in the North Shore Conference.

It was more hard luck for Surprenant on June 12 against unbeaten West Bend West. The junior right-hander gave up just one earned run and five hits in 5 and 2/3 innings but took the loss in a 3-0 decision to the unbeaten Spartans at Regner Park.

Surprenant is 0-3 against North Shore opponents, and with this latest defeat, KHS is 1-5 in NS play and 5-8 overall.

In a quick interview before the rain pelted West Bend, Gonring said it isn't just

Surprenant having hard luck. "The whole team is," the veteran coach said, perhaps pointing to the loss of left-handed pitcher, Andrew Neu in the third game of the season and other situations. "I had high expectations for this group," perhaps higher than they had for themselves. "It's unfortunate."

Surprenant gave up a single run in the first inning on Jack Thelen's RBI double, then settled down to hold the Spartans at bay for the next four frames before giving up another run in the fifth. West scored that run on a bases-loaded walk to Nate Block.

West's final run, which was unearned, was scored against Tony Steger, who came on in relief with two outs in the bottom of the fifth and finished the contest.

"He (Surprenant) got two outs (in the fifth) and

couldn't get the eight hole hitter," Gonring said about lifting his starter. Steger got the final out when Nate Fleischman grounded out to third. Steger faced five batters in the sixth, giving up the final run via a walk and his own throwing error after a bunt by Nathan Burns.

Two hitters later, Evan Albrecht, who was 3x3, laid down a bunt with Burns on third, but he was called out for contacting the ball while out of the batter's box. Steger then got Anthony Schlass to ground out to third to end the inning.

While Schlass went hitless, he was effective on the mound, holding the Indians to five hits, including one that was aided by a bad hop over the bag at second.

The Indians had two good scoring opportunities, the first in the top of the third inning when Ryan

Prochnow hit a one-out single between short and third and lefty John May followed with a single to right, May wheeled toward second but was gunned down by Nick Sterman's throw from right.

Did May decide on his own to try to stretch his hit? "Yup," was Gonring's reply, and he said that took away an opportunity to perhaps squeeze a run in.

The inning ended when Schlass got Surprenant to go swinging on an 0-and-2 count.

In the fifth, Number 9 hitter Brad Buechel looked at two strikes, then smashed a double to the gap in left-center. Schlass then "plunked" Prochnow to put runners at first and second with no outs. May bunted them to second and third, but the veteran Spartan got Jared Chesak to pop out to the second baseman and

Surprenant to ground out on a very close play at first base.

"When you're not playing well and not getting the breaks, you aren't getting the calls either," Gonring said about Surprenant being called out.

Albrecht relieved Schlass in the seventh and struck out Buechel and May, surrounding a ground out by Prochnow.

Surprenant struck out seven and walked five. When asked what was working for him, Surprenant said, "the curve ball and the fast ball primarily," adding, "I felt pretty good."

Schlass fanned eight and walked one.

Kyle Bath went 2x3 for the Indians.

In games the previous week, Kewaskum topped the SWCHA Saints 12-0, lost to West Bend east 10-0

in five innings, dropped a 6-4 heart-breaker to Nicolet and split in two games in a tournament played in Whitewater. The Indians first game ended in an 8-2 loss to Brookfield East, but they rebounded to defeat Pewaukee 9-6.

Gonring said a highlight in the latter game was a bases-loaded triple in the top of the third by Kyle Pamperin, which gave the Indians a 3-2 lead, and he scored on a passed ball for a 4-2 advantage.

In the next inning, KHS scored four more runs on walks to Prochnow and May, an RBI single by Surprenant, a walk to Pamperin, and a 2-RBI single by Dalton Poole.

KHS has home games vs. Whitefish Bay this evening (June 15) and Grafton (June 16).
