### New Drawings Depict Middle School And High School Plans

– Kewaskum School District Plans For Upgrading Middle School And High School Facilities

After months of planning, the Kewaskum School District has released its new building plan for the high school and middle school facilities.

“This is what we are going to build,” Superintendent James Smasal said. “Are there going to be tweaks to the plan? Absolutely. There will be necessary changes because as they get into the building project, something might happen here or something might happen there, but to the best of our knowledge, this is what we are going to achieve.”

The drawings show a new two-story, 85,000-

square foot middle school attached to the north side of Kewaskum High School. The high school facilities will be renovated as well.

The new middle school, which will be handicapped accessible, is designed to be somewhat rustic to blend into its surroundings near the Milwaukee River.

“It will have a sidewalk along the front, so it will be much safer for kids,” Smasal said.

On the west side of the schools is a long driveway that will serve as a bus pickup and dropoff area. The driveway will be able to hold all 16 full-length buses that line up at the end of the day.

## Want To Swim? Go To The Library

– Swim Passes Can Be Checked Out At Kewaskum Public Library

People can go to the Kewaskum Public Library and check out more than just books. They also can now check out passes for the Kiwanis Park swim pond in Kewaskum.

The passes will allow more people to be able to use the new inflatable slides and climbing equipment that were recently installed at the swim pond.

Two individual passes

and four family passes are available for three-day checkouts at the library. Each family pass is for two adults and all children 17 and younger in the same household.

“We have been asking and thinking about what people need,” Library Director Emily Goad said. “We understand that not everyone can afford a swim pass.”

The swim passes work much like the internet hotspots that the library has available for checkout. Like the hotspots, the swim passes are available on a first-come, first-serve basis. No holds can be made.

Swim passes, like the hotspots, must be checked out and returned at the library’s front desk only.

The swim passes, which are on brightly colored lanyards, can be checked out for three days only. There is a \$30 daily late fee for the individual passes and a \$50 daily late fee for the family passes.

“We ask that patrons take good care of the passes and not get them wet, because it is expensive to replace them,” Goad said.

The swim passes are a new way that the library is reaching out to area residents.

“I believe in getting out in the community and helping other people to get out in the community,” Goad said.

Butch Buddenhagen, director of the Kewaskum swim program, offered the passes to the library in an attempt to help achieve that goal.

The swim passes are one example of how the Kewaskum Public Library tries to provide a wide array of programming.

“Of course, the library will always offer books, but we have started thinking outside the box to come up with other things to offer the community,” Goad said.

## Wisconsin Assembly Passes Bill On Campus Free Speech

University of Wisconsin students who repeatedly disrupt campus speakers or presentations could be suspended or expelled under a Republican-backed bill the state Assembly passed June 21.

Rep. Jesse Kremer (R-Kewaskum), is chief author of the bill, known as the Campus Free Speech Act.

"This is a great day for Wisconsin. I am proud that the Assembly has passed

the Campus Free Speech Act in a good faith effort to ensure that college students have the same constitutional rights as everyone else in society. It is vitally important that legislators protect the cornerstone of our democracy, the free and open exchange of ideas, especially within the UW system," Kremer said.

The state Assembly approved the bill 61-36, with no Democrats in support.

Democrats, who didn't have the votes to stop the

bill in the Assembly, blasted the bill as an unconstitutional attack on freedom of speech.

"Students who are exercising their first amendment rights should not be threatened with being kicked out of school. Some of the greatest cultural and societal changes in our country originated from peaceful political activism and protest," Rep. Chris Taylor (D-Madison), who represents part of UW-Madison in the Assembly, said.

Conservatives across the country have voiced concerns that right-wing speakers are not given equal treatment as liberal campus presenters.

"Repeatedly, we've seen students shouted down

and silenced by those in disagreement and unconstitutional policies that violate the First Amendment on the books at the UW. The Campus Free Speech Act will end the unconstitutional 'heckler's veto' and create a behavioral shift on campus. Testimony from students during the hearing on AB299 included tales of campus police causing grief for students who were exercising their First Amendment rights, stories about groups with a mob mentality taking over activities and conservative groups being shouted down by their progressive liberal counterparts," Kremer said.

The bill is now headed to the state Senate.

## Pony Express, Move Over...The Spirit Ride Is Coming

Bob's Main Street Auto & Towing will be leading the American Towman Spirit Ride through West Bend on July 6, carrying a colorful, ceremonial casket at the head of a tow truck procession, then relaying the casket to another tower down the line.

The July 6 ride will start at 10 a.m. at West Bend Elevator, 3434 County Road D, and go through West Bend before heading to Oshkosh.

The casket, which pays tribute to tow operators and other first responders killed by passing vehicles while working on the roadside, will relay all across the nation followed by processions of tow trucks and other emergency service vehicles. The casket car-

ries the message: Slow Down, Move Over.

Hundreds of roadside professionals are casualties each year of roadside incidents; about 100 of them are fatalities. Among first responders killed, 60 percent are tow operators.

The ride's co-founder, American Towman Magazine, sees the Spirit Ride drawing a parallel to the legendary Pony Express, created to expedite mail delivery in 1860. There were nearly 200 relief stations from Missouri through to California where those riders either swapped horses or fell back in relaying the mail. Similarly, there are over 200 relay points around the country for the Spirit Ride as it endeavors to expedite public aware-

ness of every state's Move Over law. But unlike the lone Rides of the Pony Express, there will be thousands of tow trucks and other emergency service vehicles accompanying the car carriers that bear the casket around the nation.

The Pony Express was short lived, lasting less than two years. The ride is scheduled through 2018. The Pony Express was a private enterprise that lost money. The Spirit Ride is a nonprofit venture relying on donations from sponsors and transport service contributed by towing companies.

The ceremonial casket carrying the messaging for Slow Down, Move Over is named Spirit and was custom painted by an artist,

Cecil Burrowes, who specializes in painting intricate designs on trucks and wreckers. Depicted on Spirit are a dozen scenarios of first-responders at the scenes of highway incidents. One scene portrays a towman carrying the world on his back while cars whiz by.

The casket was built by a lifelong singer-songwriter, Mike Corbin, who composed the Spirit Ride's anthem, "Booms in the Sky." Corbin performs this song and "Bless the Spirit Riders," honoring first responders at a ceremony that precedes the Ride and its procession of emergency service vehicles. All interested are invited to attend.

## Kewaskum Traffic To Be Directed Following Fireworks On July 3

The Village of Kewaskum will hold its annual fireworks display at Riverhill Park on Monday, July 3, at dusk, approximately 9:30 p.m.

Immediately following the fireworks, cars that are parked east of the river will not be able to drive west on Main Street. Instead, they will be directed only to the east on Main Street. Drivers that want to head west will need to then turn north on County Road S or south on Oak Drive to go around town.

Cars that are parked west of the river will be directed to drive west on Main Street and will not be able to go east until all traffic has cleared.

To avoid bottlenecks at the corner of Main Street and Fond du Lac Avenue, drivers that are headed west on Main Street are encouraged to turn north onto Fond du Lac Avenue. Cars can then turn west on State Road 28 and then south on Edgewood Road.

The rain date for fireworks is July 4.

## WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORT

### Interstate 41 Injury Crash

On June 23, at approximately 8:31 a.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a passenger car that had struck a semi tractor-trailer on Interstate 41 southbound approximately 0.3 mile north of County Highway FD/Pioneer Road in the Town of Polk. Personnel from the Sheriff's Office and Jackson Fire Department responded to the scene. Upon their arrival, first responders observed that a passenger car had rear ended a semi tractor-trailer. The operator and sole occupant of the passenger car

appeared to be seriously injured, and Flight For Life was summoned to the scene.

A preliminary on-scene investigation revealed the following: The southbound semi tractor-trailer, operated by a 42-year-old Salt Lake City, Utah man, was stopped and legally parked on the far right shoulder/emergency lane. The semi tractor-trailer had previously experienced mechanical difficulties and its four-way flashers were activated.

Witnesses indicated that the southbound passenger car, operated by a 22-year-

old Beaver Dam man, had been exceeding the speed limit and driving/passing erratically prior to the crash. Moments before impact, the operator of the passenger car attempted to pass a group of vehicles utilizing the far right shoulder/emergency lane. In the process, the passenger car struck the rear of the legally parked semi-trailer. The driver of the semi was not injured. Rescue personnel extricated the operator of the passenger car, and transported him from the scene (via ambulance) to a nearby parking lot where Flight For Life had landed. The opera-

tor was flown to Froedtert Hospital in Wauwatosa with suspected life threatening injuries.

The crash remains under investigation by the Sheriff's Office. Interstate 41 southbound was closed at State Highway 60 for approximately 1.25 hours to facilitate rescue, investigative, and clean-up operations. The temporary detour utilized State Highway 60 east to southbound U.S. Highway 45. The Wisconsin State Patrol, Slinger Police Department and Jackson Police Department assisted with the Interstate 41 closure/detour.



It is hard to believe that a third of the summer is already passed and the Fourth of July is in a couple of days. There is good reason to celebrate our country's 241st birthday. Citizens living in the original 13 colonies in the late 1700s were often unfairly taxed, represented, and punished. It was not uncommon for Americans to be beaten by British soldiers. The justice system was unfair. News was suppressed. Private property was often destroyed, including entire towns or cities by the British. It was an awful oppression on the American people and something had to be done. Doing something against the most powerful nation on earth at the time was very risky but the majority of Americans were willing to take the risk of obtaining freedom instead of living under oppression.

On July 2, 1776, the United States Continental Congress formally voted to be independent of Britain. Two days later, on July 4, the rest of the Americans and the world found out

about the news when Congress voted to pass and publish the Declaration of Independence. The news was spread by the reading of the Declaration as well as being published in many written forms. John Adams was in the center stage during these events. Adams gave his account of the events of the period in a series of letters he wrote his wife, Abigail. Adams selected Thomas Jefferson to draft the Declaration and single handedly defended the document before Congress.

Most of the delegates signed the Declaration in early August and many others signed it throughout the fall of 1776. It took a tremendous amount of courage for the colonial state legislatures to send their delegates to support the Declaration of Independence from England. It has been reported that several of the delegates thought that signing the document would ultimately lead to their own deaths. The delegates had good reason to worry. They were taking on the most powerful empire in the world at the time. They

signed it anyway. Keeping the United States Independent after this announcement is a totally different story.

Next week this newspaper will be publishing a copy of the Declaration of Independence in celebration of this great historical event which was originally done in the immediate days following July 4, 1776. The original Declaration was read in public places, printed on flyers, and published in newspapers.

It is historically correct and patriotic to fervently celebrate the Fourth of July. We live in a great country and should never take for granted our independence and freedoms. This holiday is a great time to get together with friends, neighbors and family. Everyone will have a chance to join in the fun during activities in Kewaskum on Monday, July 3, in Riverhill Park. There will be fireworks, music, food and refreshments. Kewaskum boasts one of the biggest fireworks displays in the area. Have a safe and happy holiday celebration!

### – Kewaskum School District Plans For Upgrading Middle School And High School Facilities

The new plan creates additional green space from what currently exists. The plan is to move the shotput and discus areas closer to the track, so that athletes will not have to cross the parking lot.

A soccer field will be placed where the current middle school is, and two additional soccer fields can be placed on the property down near the river.

The school district is currently working with the village to improve the

stormwater and drainage area, which will help keep the lower fields stay drier, according to Smasal.

One thing that is not on the drawing is a concession area, which will be in the hallway between the middle school and high school gymnasiums. That concession area will be accessible from both schools.

"We are moving away from talking about where the walls and sinks are going to go to now we are deciding what kind of carpet are we going to put on the floor, what kind of paint are we going to put on the walls and what kinds of lights are we going to put in the light fixtures. It is very exciting and is involving a lot of people," Smasal said.

Site preparation is currently underway, as crews work to remove a portion of the parking lot to the north of the high school and install a temporary road.

In order to build the new middle school, workers will start removing parts of the existing high school on the north side over the next few weeks.

The new permanent parking lot will not be built for another year, after the new middle school is built, according to Mike Froehlich, a civil engineer with Kapur & Associates.

The Kewaskum Village Plan Commission gave preliminary approval for the project demolition and site preparation on Monday, June 26.

Building plans are

scheduled to be finalized by July 11, and the district anticipates going before the Plan Commission on July 25 for final approval.

The district would like to have the new building completed by the end of May, so that the high school can be remodeled during the summer, after the 2017-18 school year ends, according to Smasal.

Voters approved the \$28.42 million building project last November. At the time, the community had seen a drawing that looked quite different than the revised drawing. That conceptual plan consisted of a long corridor that connected the high school to the existing middle school, with a new gymnasium, locker rooms and middle

school science classrooms.

The new plan still addresses the same needs in both buildings: HVAC, plumbing, electrical, lighting, roofs, floorings, walls, security and learning spaces.

The Kewaskum School Board reviewed the latest building plan in June and unanimously gave positive feedback.

The district began formally looking at upgrading the middle school and high school in 2015, when it formed a Long Range Planning Committee to study the district's facility needs.

"It's a journey, not a destination, to try to improve our facilities at the middle school and high school level," Smasal said.

# KHS Coaches Favor Move Adding 35-Second Shot Clock

Kewaskum High's two head basketball coaches, Russ Thull and Don Gruber, are in favor of a new rule that will take place beginning with the 2019-2020 season — the implementation of a 35-second shot clock for basketball games in Wisconsin.

The move was approved recently by the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA) Board of Control after considerable discussion. For now, it will only be used in varsity games.

"I am in favor of this change. I think it will speed the game up a bit, which means more possessions for each team," Thull, the girls' coach, said. "I think there will be an adjustment

period how to play as the shot clock winds down, but I think this will make it more fun to watch."

"I'm good with it," Gruber, the boys' coach, said. "I kind of go along with it."

What Thull likes is the shot clock "also changes a team's strategy at the end of games. Instead of teams fouling for final two to four minutes of a game, teams may decide to play for a defensive stop instead of fouling, which is far more exciting than watching teams shoot free throws."

"My first thought is maybe I play more zone (defense)," Gruber said, explaining a zone clogs up the middle of the court and "might force an outside shot (by opponents) a little quicker."

If there is one thing Thull is surprised about, it's that the WIAA settled on 35 seconds. He said, "I thought if it was going to ever happen it would be at least 45 seconds, but truthfully, I would be curious to know percent of possessions that last longer than 35 seconds. My guess would be very low."

Gruber thinks 35 seconds was the way to go. "I think 30 would have been a little bit short," he said.

While the shot clock will be new for high school players, Thull has already had experience with it. "Being that I coached six years at UWWC (UW-Washington County), I am not new to the shot clock, and it's an element to the game I actually miss ... So again (I am) totally for the

change," he said.

Concerning changes he will have to make when the shot clock comes, Thull said, "I don't think there is a lot besides managing the game a little different down the stretch and making sure we are prepared to get a good shot off when the clock winds down and making sure the girls know what's a good shot in the early, mid and late shot clock situations."

"It will mean a little more freelancing (by the players)," Gruber said. "The kids will have to read a little more ... know the game a little more."

The new rule will also have an effect on how coaches approach the game offensively. "It will force a little more creativity on the side of the coach-

es," he said.

"I think time will tell if the clock should be at all levels or just varsity. I am fine with just starting out with just varsity," Thull said.

"Maybe JV a little bit later," was Gruber's response about starting first with just varsity games. He also pointed out there will be added costs associated with the move. "There's more equipment that has to be bought," he said, referring to a new clock that will be kept at the scorer's table to determine if a team takes a shot before the 35 seconds is up.

"There will also be another person at the end of the (scorer's) table," Gruber went on about for the need for a person to run the 35-second clock. "It's an expense."

In other basketball-related action, the WIAA agreed to let coaches qualifying for the State Tournament determine the seeds for the four qualifying teams in each of the five divisions with a Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association representative breaking any ties that may occur beginning in 2017-18.

## Three Named To All-State Team; Seven Indians Are Among EC's Top Players

Post-season accolades are rolling in for the Kewaskum High softball team, which made plenty of history this year, winning its first regional and sectional tournaments to earn a trip to the WIAA Division 2 State Softball Tournament, along with posting a best-ever season record of 25-4.

Three Lady Indians, Kennedy Lehn, Maddie Geidel and Breana Trepes were named to the Wisconsin Fast-pitch Softball Coaches Association's all state team, while seven earned spots on the East Central All Conference squad, and Lehn and Trepes were tabbed as Co-Players of the Year in the conference.

I was happy with what we got," KHS coach Jeff Gosse said Sunday night. "Our kids got a lot of recognition. It was very nice."

Lehn and Geidel, both very talented sophomores, were second team picks of the coaches' team for Division 1-2 players while Trepes received honorable mention.

Here are some of their season statistics and a capsule of what Gosse had to say about their efforts:

**LEHN** — finished the season with five no-hitters, a 23-4 record, a sparkling earned run average of 0.74, giving up just 18 earned runs, and striking out 316 batters.

"What can I say?" Gosse said. "In this case, stats don't lie. She's one of the top pitchers in the state ... Hopefully the next two years she will be the Player of the Year."

**TREPES** — the team's first baseman, batted an impressive .490 with an on-base average of .536 and a .660 slugging percentage. She had 49 hits, including 34 singles, 12 doubles and two home runs.

"She played a little first base in the past, pitched for two years and played some at third base," according to Gosse, who said, "She was one of our defensive leaders. She made the adjustment to playing first very well."

Still, hitting was Trepes' strong suit, the coach said, "She was one of the top hitters in the conference."

**GEIDEL** — Kewaskum's right fielder and top power hitter with a .550 batting average along with an .840 slugging percentage. She had a team-high 38 runs scored and a team-high 32 runs batted in (RBIs) with 55 hits, including 13 doubles and six home runs. Plus, Geidel only struck out four times.

"She switched from left field to right this year and fell in love with the position," Gosse said, indicating she was perfect for that spot since "she gets a good jump on the ball" and

"has a cannon for an arm."

Geidel is "an unbelievable hitter with so much power," Gosse said, adding, "She's going to get better and better."

All three of these young ladies were first-team picks in the East Central Conference, with Lehn and Geidel unanimous picks. Kewaskum also had three others on the second unit, including sophomore catcher Leah Theusch, sophomore shortstop Ashley Trapp and senior outfielder Brittany Williams.

Williams played catcher until this year when she volunteered to play left field for the good of the team. She batted .375 with 36 hits, including five doubles and a pair of triples. She also contributed 22 RBIs.

"She had the hardest transition of all ... She did a real nice job. She has a powerful arm," Gosse said. "You play catcher for three years, then play the outfield and make second team. That's pretty special!"

Trapp batted .304 in her first year as a varsity starter, with 28 hits, 21 runs scored and 17 RBIs.

"She got good reads on the ball," Gosse said. "Hopefully she will grow into the position."

"Her bat started to come at the end of the season," Gosse said about Theusch. "In my opinion, she was the best defensive catcher in league. No one could steal on her."

Theusch batted .312 with 24 hits, including five doubles. She drove in seven runs and scored nine.

Megan Marx was named as an honorable mention utility player.

## Hits Have Disappeared In Recent Games

Since their recent victories over Whitefish Bay and Grafton, the Kewaskum High baseball team has fallen into a bit of a hitting slump and its win total has remained at seven.

On the road during the past week, the Indians lost a 12-4 decision to Port Washington (June 20) and then were shut out by Germantown (June 22) 4-0 in a game where the Indians managed just four hits.

With the two losses, KHS is 3-9 in the North Shore Conference and 7-12 overall.

In the latter game, Dalton Poole gave up four runs in the first two innings then settled down to give up just two singles the rest of the way.

About the lack of hits, KHS coach Doug Gonring said, "I don't know ... We just didn't get the ball on the ground."

Gonring mixed up a couple spots in the batting order for this contest but that didn't seem to work. He kept junior catcher Jared Chesak in the Number Three spot in the order, however, and he continued his productive streak, getting a single in the first inning after the first two in the order, Brad Buechel and Tony Steger, struck out.

Buechel reached when the Warhawk catcher dropped the ball on the third strike, then airtailed it over the first baseman's head. Cole Surprenant advanced the runners on a fly out to right field, but G-town starter, Justin Knodl, got the final out when Kyle Bath hit a grounder to the pitcher.

Chesak had two of the Indians' four hits, while Bath singled in the fourth, and John May had a 2-out hit in the top of the seventh, but Knodl got pinch hitter Kyle Pamperin to strike out on three pitches

to end the game.

The hosts, currently 11-2 in league play (second place) and 19-4 overall, scored a single run in the first inning via a single by Dan Drinan and a double to center field by Connor Storming.

In the second, designated hitter Blake Kuhns led off with a triple to deep center field and scored when Surprenant's throw from right field, following a fly out by Jayden Schaefer, sailed high over Chesak's head and hit the fence. Leadoff hitter Jon Wizner followed with a 2-run homer over the right field fence.

"If we throw that ball better, we get a double play, but we still lose 1-0," Gonring said.

One unusual statistic from this game was the fact there were 16 outs made by the two outfields, including nine catches by KHS outfielders. Both Tony Steger in left and Jacob Heberer in center came up with very good catches.

"We played better catch

today," Gonring said, indicating nothing could have been worse than the 10-error game against Port Washington two nights before. That game was scheduled to be played in Kewaskum, but the field was muddy so it was moved to Port, and the host Pirates had one of their better games of the year, stroking eight hits and riding the efforts of pitcher, Zach Uselding, who left after four innings with a 10-0 lead.

Kewaskum rallied for four runs on four hits against Noah Prom in the bottom of the fifth. After Steger led off with a walk and moved to second on a passed ball, Chesak singled to drive him home, then Buechel and Heberer singled to load the bases with one out.

Ryan Prochnow made out Number Two when he hit an infield pop up, but second baseman Brent Goeden came through, hitting a double to the right field line, bringing in all three of his teammates.

Goeden moved to third

on a fly out, but Prom got Gabe Christenson to pop up to short for the final out.

KHS had six hits in the contest, including two by Heberer and two by Buechel.

Sophomore Lucas Christenson lasted three innings on the mound, giving up just one hit for three runs, all which were unearned. He took the loss.

Pamperin gave up four runs (one earned) on three hits and Steger finished up the game, giving up four runs (one earned) on four hits.

The Indians had five games scheduled from June 26 to July 1, including home games June 29 and 30 against West Bend East and West and an away game against Milwaukee Marquette at MATC South in Milwaukee on July 1.

Gonring still feels the team can turn the season around. "We've got too much talent to be playing like this," he said.

## Learning About Kewaskum's History

– Students Explore The History Of Kewaskum In A Summer School Class Entitled “Explore Your Hometown”

Hannah Galasinski needed a paper plate to create a model building. So she paid Mackenzie Steiner the going price: one shoe.

Student Dylan Kabitzke wanted to continue wearing both his shoes, so he successfully negotiated the price and paid three markers for one paper plate.

The trades were part of a lesson about how early settlers in Kewaskum sometimes conducted business. Students in grades three through eight learned about the businesses and the history of the Village of Kewaskum in a summer school class entitled “Explore Your Hometown.”

It was the first time the class has been offered through the Kewaskum School District's summer school program. Taught by Aaron Laatsch and Kierra Kuehl, students in the three-week class learned about the early settlers, businesses and stories about living in Kewaskum from the 1800s through

the 1940s through walking field trips and hands-on activities.

Each student chose an actual Kewaskum pioneer to research. For the duration of the class, the students centered their projects around that particular individual. They learned about the businesses these early entrepreneurs started in Kewaskum.

“The kids really got excited when they tried to place these pioneer business locations in relationship to places of business today like the Coffee Corner, The Barbershop, LK Heating, B&B Productions, JO's and more,” Laatsch said.

Each student created a model of chosen business, prompting the lesson in trading resources.

To discover where each business had been located, one day the class went on a scavenger hunt around the village.

Riddles were used to find each location.

For example, the clue “I used to freeze the moment in time, now heat is used for my business” referred to J.O.'s

Restaurant, located on Main street, which at one time had been a portrait studio and apothecary.

The clue “This location used to provide a cold sip and a place to sleep, now I only provide a warm slip” identified the Coffee Corner, which was formerly the American House, a boarding house and hotel that had a saloon on the first floor.

A total of 25 students took the class that focused on Kewaskum's history.

For some, the thing that stood out the most about the class was reading about events that had occurred here over the years.

“In 1919, the third airplane was sighted flying over Kewaskum,” Kierstan Dahm said.

The “Explore Your Hometown” was just one of more than 40 classes offered. Topics ranged from sports to engineering, from making video games to cooking.

More than 500 students were enrolled in the classes, which were offered Mondays through Fridays, June 8 through June 30.
