


Fireworks light up the night sky as a crowd gathers to celebrate Independence Day at River Hill Park in Kewaskum on July 3.

19-Year-Old Kewaskum Resident Dies In Car Crash

Ruben Padilla-Castaneda, a 19-year-old Kewaskum resident, died following a single-vehicle crash that occurred at the intersection of Indian Lore Road and East Newark Drive in the Town of Trenton.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of the crash on Wednesday, July 5, at 5 a.m. The caller reported a single vehicle struck a tree and there was a person on the ground who appeared to be unresponsive.

When the first sheriff's deputy arrived at the scene, he located the vehicle up against a tree about 45 feet south of the paved portion of the roadway. He also located Padilla-Castaneda on the ground.

Padilla-Castaneda was pronounced dead at the scene. There were no other occupants in the vehicle.

Evidence at the scene indicated the vehicle was southbound on Indian Lore Road and failed to negotiate the 90-degree curve where Indian Lore Road turns into Newark

Drive. The driver went off the south shoulder of Newark Drive and struck the tree head-on, ejecting the driver from the vehicle.

Boltonville Fire Department and Kewaskum Rescue responded to the scene, along with deputies from the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

Padilla-Castaneda was a 2016 Kewaskum High School graduate.

Both the crash report and case report remain open, and the investigation is ongoing.

This is Washington County's third traffic fatality of the year.

Legendary Painting

– Mural Pays Tribute To Local Race Car Drivers

Back in the 1980s, Karen Breitzman painted numbers on Willie Goeden's late model race cars.

Earlier this month, the Campbellport artist was once again painting numbers for the 78-year-old Kewaskum racing legend, this time on the side of a building in Beaver Dam. Goeden, who won three modified championships at Beaver Dam (1970, 1973 and 1974), was chosen as one of the subjects to be featured on a large mural that can be seen from Exit 129 on U.S. Route 151.

Goeden and his race car are depicted on the large mural that pays homage to Willie "The Rabbit" Goeden, as well as Miles "The Mouse" Melius and Fuzzy "The Hound" Fassbender. All three were big names in modified racing in the 1950s and 60s.

"I am very honored to have been chosen to have my own mod on the mural. I also feel very honored to be with the likes of Mouse

and Fuzzy," Goeden said.

Walldogs

The mural featuring the vintage race cars was one of 15 murals that were created during Beaver Dam's Walldogs Mural Festival, which was held June 28-July 2.

Each mural paid tribute to a highlight from the city's past.

Breitzman was one of 172 artists from around the world who descended upon Beaver Dam to create the murals. The artists are referred to as "walldogs," painters who create wall advertisements, a practice that dates back to the 1800s.

Walldogs traditionally hold a festival each year at a select city in the United States.

This was not Breitzman's first experience being a walldog. Breitzman, who owns K-B Lettering, located near St. Killian, has also worked on murals in Algoma, Plymouth and Delavan.

Kurt Gaber of Chippewa Falls worked with

Breitzman on a mural in Delavan two years ago. When he was assigned to be in charge of one of the murals this year, Gaber contacted Breitzman to see if she would be willing to work on his crew again.

She was thrilled when she found out the sign would be about car racing.

When Gaber found out that Breitzman had worked with Goeden, he was in awe. He remembered going to the racetrack as a child and watching Goeden race in his hometown, Chippewa Falls.

"I remember seeing him beat my childhood hero, Bob Root," Gaber told Breitzman.

Creating Wall Art

Breitzman and Gaber were among about a dozen artists from across the United States and Canada who worked on the mural that featured the race car drivers.

The mural stretches across the exterior of the Don Cigelske Transmission building. Measuring 16 feet tall by

60 feet long, the painting is by far the largest of the 15 murals created in Beaver Dam.

Music In The Park Planned For July 18

The 2017 program of Music in the Park continues at River Hill Park at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, July 18, with Big Cedar Bluegrass as its third concert.

Big Cedar has been performing locally and at regional festivals since 1992 and consists of five musicians who play banjo, acoustic guitar, mandolin, fiddle and upright bass. The band performs instrumental as well as vocal numbers with three and four part harmony. In addition to their upbeat bluegrass country music their repertoire includes folk, patriotic and even some old-time gospel songs. Over the years they have produced six albums, including ones devoted to Christian music and Christmas.

Kewaskum School District Expected To Receive Less General Aid In 2017-18

The Kewaskum School District will receive \$171,490 less general aid in the 2017-18 school year than it did for the 2016-17 school year, according to estimates released by the Department of Public Instruction on June 30.

Kewaskum Schools are estimated to receive about \$8.31 million in general aid from the state in 2017-18, compared to the approximate \$8.49 million it received in 2016-17, or a decrease of about 2.02 percent.

Kewaskum joins the majority of Wisconsin public school districts that will receive less general aid in the 2017-18 school year than they did for the 2016-17 school year, according to DPI estimates.

Although the 2017-19 state budget has not been finalized, the current budget proposal maintains the same level of general school aid (\$4.584 billion in 2017-18) as was appropriated in the 2016-17 fiscal year. Of the state's 422 school districts, 55 percent

(231) are estimated to receive less general aid in 2017-18, while 44 percent of districts (187) are expected to receive more aid. The estimate shows four districts will have no change in the aid between the 2016-17 and 2017-18 fiscal years. With school aid being held at the same level as the prior year, other factors that comprise the general equalization aid formula — property valuation, enrollment, and shared costs — impact whether general aid for a district increases or decreases.

Minocqua Joint 1 School District will see the biggest cut, with an estimated 99.54 percent change. Birchwood will have the second largest decrease, with an estimated 38.79 percent cut in general aid.

Yorkville Joint 2 School District will see the largest increase in general aid, with an estimated 68.18 percent increase. Williams Bay ranks second, with an estimated 56.63 percent increase in general aid.

District aid estimates can be found on the department's School Financial Services website, <https://dpi.wi.gov/sfs/aid/general/summary>, both alphabetically and by percent change.

State statute requires the department to compute an estimate of the general school aid each public school district will receive for the coming school year by July 1. School personnel may use the estimate to complete their annual budgets and project changes in property tax levies. On Oct. 15, the department will certify state general aid amounts for 2017-18 based on audited 2016-17 data. Estimated general aid to districts is subject to change.

The department's July 1 aid estimate does not include per pupil categorical aid, which will be based on student membership from the 2017-18, 2016-17, and 2015-16 school years (third Friday in September count). That aid will be paid in March 2018 and is currently funded at \$250 per pupil annually.

Three People Seriously Injured In Highway 45 Crash

Three people were seriously injured in a car accident on Friday, July 7, on Highway 45, north of County Highway F in the Town of Osceola.

The Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office responded at 1:45 p.m. along with the Campbellsport Fire Department, two Campbellsport ambulances, the Eden Fire Department, the Eden First Responders, a City of Fond du Lac ambulance, three medical helicopters (two Flight for Life and the

Theda Star) and the Wisconsin State Patrol.

This was a two vehicle head-on crash with serious injuries to three people. The preliminary investigation indicates that a southbound vehicle on Highway 45, driven by 23-year-old Kevin Knippel of Merrill, crossed the center line, striking a northbound vehicle driven by Douglas Hodorff, 66, of Eden head-on.

According to Sgt. Renee Schuster of the Fond du Lac Sheriff's Department, both drivers and the

female passenger, Amber Wiedmeyer also of Merrill, in the southbound vehicle were seriously injured and transported by medical helicopters. Hodorff was flown to ThedaCare Regional Medical Center. Knippel and Wiedmeyer were both flown to Froedtert Hospital.

Highway 45 was closed to all traffic while the Fond du Lac Sheriff's Crash Team investigated the scene. The crash remains under investigation by the Sheriff's Office.

Funding Increase Boosts High Cost Special Education Aid

The Kewaskum School District received \$23,644 on June 19 from the state for costs it incurred in the 2015-16 school year for high cost special education aid.

Eligible costs are those that are not covered by other state and federal special education funding and are in excess of \$30,000 per student.

Across the state, High Cost Special Education Aid to school districts and other eligible agencies that teach students with significant disability-related needs totaled \$10.7 million for the payment made in June, an increase of just over \$5 million from the previous year.

The aid went to 136 school districts and two County Children with Disabilities Education Boards (CCDEB) to reimburse 70 percent of prior year eligible costs for special education services.

Aid comes from \$8.5 million appropriated in the 2015-17 state budget, an increase of \$5 million from the prior year, and \$2.3 million from Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) funding. This amount represents 10 percent of the state's discretionary grant under Part B of IDEA and is a slight increase from the last year's allocation for High Cost Special Education Aid.

"Every student with a disability is entitled to a free appropriate public education," noted State Superintendent Tony Evers. "This aid program supports districts in providing required services for students with extraordi-

nary needs."

Services reimbursed by the aid program include providing an instructional or transportation aide, attendant care, nursing services, or an educational interpreter. Other types of eligible costs include providing an extended school year, orientation and mobility training, tuition for placements, or specialized programming or equipment that would not otherwise be needed.

The separate funding stream for High Cost Special Education Aid started in the 2003-04 fiscal year with the allocation of \$2 million in federal

IDEA discretionary funds. The 2006-07 fiscal year was the first in which state funds were budgeted to provide aid for students with high-cost special education needs. The department's 2017-19 budget request seeks an additional \$4.2 million in state funds over the biennium and 100 percent reimbursement of prior year costs above the \$30,000 per student high-cost threshold.


A Mass of Christian Burial for Kenny will be held at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, July 13, 2017, at St. Michael's Catholic

BEE STINGS

First aid for a bee sting involves cleansing the site, removing the stinger (if present), and applying cold packs to the affected area. Antihistamines may be taken to relieve burning and itching, and acetaminophen or ibuprofen for pain. A tetanus booster is recommended if it has been longer than 10 years since your last one. Seek emergency care immediately if you experience tightness in your throat or chest, abnormal breathing, large areas of swelling or hives, fainting, dizziness, nausea or vomiting. If you know you are allergic to bee venom, you should carry an epinephrine injector with you at all times.



Continued From... **Legendary Painting** – Mural Pays Tribute To Local Race Car Drivers

Because the mural is on the outskirts of town, part of the mural advertises the other Beaver Dam murals that are located downtown.

The mural also depicts Beaver Dam native Fred MacMurray, the actor who starred in Disney's *The Absent-Minded Professor* and *The Shaggy Dog*, as well as the TV series *My Three Sons*.

The artists had a total of five days to complete their masterpiece. They were scheduled to begin painting on Wednesday, June 28, but because of the forecast for rain, the artists simply mixed paints that day.

It then rained on and off throughout the week, so the walldogs worked whenever there was a clear sky.

To create the mural, the design was projected onto the wall in the evening, and the artists traced the design onto the wall with permanent markers.

Then they used water-color paints to create the vibrant colors. When the process was complete, the walldogs put a sealer over the paint to keep the mural intact for years.

"Nothing could be reached by ground. We were climbing on scaffolding all the time," Breitzman said.

The walldogs didn't mind, though. There was

just one problem:

"In the evenings, the mosquitoes were just horrendous out there," Breitzman explained.

The walldogs put in long hours, working from about 6:30 a.m. to 9 p.m. each day. They developed a camaraderie in the process.

"It's funny how you get people from all over, and you put them on one crew, and everybody just got along so well," Breitzman said. "It's just fun."

Each artist contributed their own specialty.

"I'm not as good at the picture painting. I do more of the lettering and striping, that is my line of business," Breitzman said.

Breitzman was allowed to paint the trademark rabbit on the image of Goeden's former race car.

"The funny thing was back when I painted Willie's race car, I had made up a pattern for that bunny, because year after year it was the same bunny," Breitzman said.

Over the years, Breitzman saved the pattern.

"You just never know when something is going to be redone," she explained.

So Breitzman brought the pattern with her to Beaver Dam.

"It fit perfectly to the size needed for the race car on the wall," she said.

Racing Back In Time

The three racing legends - "The Rabbit" Goeden, "The Mouse" Melius and "The Hound" Fassbender all gathered in Beaver Dam to see the mural and meet the painters on June 28.

As soon as the famed drivers got together, they started reminiscing about their racing days.

"They are in their own little world when they get together. They just have their own way. They reminisce about the cars they used to have," Goeden's wife, Jeanne, said.

Melius, who is now 92, is the leader of the bunch, according to Jeanne Goeden. The Slinger driver often tells stories from

back in the 1940s and 50s when he raced.

Fassbender, 84, of Theresa, and Goeden both eagerly chime in, though.

Actually, their entire families have fond memories of the racing days.

"We liked Beaver Dam. It was a family track. We went there all the time on Tuesday nights, and it seemed to be where you could take children, sit on the blanket and have a picnic before the races

with other families of the racing bunch," Jeanne Goeden said.

The racing families would travel to short tracks in the area six or seven days a week. Both Goeden and Fassbender have sons who currently race cars, so they still have family connections to the sport.

Thanks to the Beaver Dam mural, now families' racing memories are engrained for posterity.

In addition to the vintage

racing car mural, there are murals that commemorate things such as the first pastor who came to Beaver Dam, the Dodge County Fair, Moraine Park Technical College, and the Beaver Dam Library.

"They are all so vivid. The colors and just the way the murals are done is fantastic. If you get a chance to get over to Beaver Dam, it is well worth the visit," Jeanne Goeden said.

Indians Take Four Games To End Regular Season On A High Note

By taking all four games the past week and winning seven of their last nine, the Kewaskum Indians finished the regular season at .500 with a 14-14 record, including a mark of 8-10 in the North Shore Conference.

In the NS finale on July 6, Kewaskum notched a 14-7 victory over Whitefish Bay in a game played on the Blue Dukes' beautiful artificial-surfaced field.

The Indians scored 10 runs in the first three innings but still needed a rally in the top of the sixth to feel secure about getting the victory.

The third was a big inning for KHS which sent 11 batters to the plate and scored six runs on four hits and three walks. Tony Steger cleared the bases with a triple for the first runs, then John May's double brought in Steger.

Later, after a run was walked in, Brent Goeden provided two runs with his bases-loaded single to right, putting the Indians ahead 10-2.

Bay cut the lead to 10-5 with two runs in the third and another in the fourth, but the Indians answered with four more runs in the sixth. Back-to-back doubles by Jared Chesak and Cole Surprenant highlighted the rally. Dalton Poole and Brad Buechel were the igniters with consecutive singles.

Surprenant earned the win. He gave up five runs and eight hits in the four innings he pitched, walking two and striking out none. Poole pitched the last three innings, giving up two runs on three hits, including a home run by Carson Kimple in the sixth. He struck out three batters.

The win gave the Indians a season sweep over Whitefish Bay. They also beat Grafton twice.

"We're playing better," KHS coach Doug Gonring said. "The way the season started, I didn't think it would end as well as it did."

"Pitching really helped us a lot," the KHS coach went on, and "We got the easy outs."

Kewaskum was scheduled to open tournament play on July 11, hosting Grafton. A win puts the Indians on the road against Germantown (which got a bye in Round 1) on July 12.

"I think we got what we deserved," Gonring said about being seeded seventh out of the 13 schools, and he is optimistic about moving past the first game. "If we play good, we can beat anybody ... I like my chances with 'Soupy' and see how it goes."

Scoring runs in all six innings, the Indians defeated Cedarburg 10-2 on July 3 in a game played in Kiwanis Park.

Dalton Poole struggled through a 27-pitch first inning when he gave up two runs on a pair of walks, a single and a hit batsman, allowing the Bulldogs to take a 2-0 lead. It was short-lived, however, as Brent Goeden smashed a one-out double to left field, and Jared Chesak followed with a two-run home run over the fence in left field in the first inning.

Before the end of the first, KHS was up 3-2 on a single, some daring base running by Cole Surprenant, who scored on Poole's sacrifice fly.

Poole allowed three total hits the next three frames before exiting the game and getting the win. He struck out two, walked two and gave up four hits.

The Indians added two runs in the second on an RBI single by Tony Steger after Brad Buechel walked and was bunted to second by Jacob Heberer. Steger scored on a wild pitch.

Buechel's sacrifice fly with the bases loaded scored Surprenant in the third, and he also brought home Kyle Bath (walk and single by Kyle Pamperin) with a fly out in the sixth when the Indians added two more runs, the latter on a sacrifice fly by Chesak.

Goeden scored run number seven in the fourth when the shortstop committed an error on Bath's ground ball.

Pamperin pitched the fifth and sixth, giving up a pair of singles, striking out four and walking none. Jacob Loehr finished up the game, giving up one base hit before striking out one and getting a pair of fly balls to right.

Cedarburg used four different pitchers. Starter Nathan Hucko took the loss.

Chesak's homer was the third of the year for KHS, and his first "ever" after getting robbed by Kyle Yochem in the recent game against West Bend East.

"I was kind of bummed out about that one being caught at the wall," Chesak said. "It was good to get this one. Once I hit it ... It felt good coming off the bat. I knew it was out of here."

In non-conference games played last week, the Indians romped over Sheboygan Falls 11-2 on July 5 and New Berlin West, 9-1.

In the night game vs. the host Falls team, Kewaskum scored seven

runs in the first inning, all after two outs and all unearned. In that barrage, which saw KHS 12 batters go to the plate, Cole Surprenant, Kyle Bath (1 RBI), Kyle Pamperin (1 RBI), Dalton Poole (2RBIs), Brad Buechel, J.J. Heberer (1 RBI) and Tony Steger (2RBIs) all had hits off starter and loser, Seth Aschenbach.

Bath, the designated hitter, wound up going 4x5 with four singles and four RBIs.

Cole Surprenant and Pamperin both chipped in with two hits.

Pamperin started and got the win, going three full innings, giving up three hits and no runs. He struck out one, walked on and hit two batters.

Lucas Christensen pitched the next three innings and gave up two runs, both unearned, on two hits. He struck out one, walked one and hit one batter.

Jacob Loehr finished up the game, giving up one hit while striking out two.

Center fielder Jacob J.J. Heberer was a busy man in this game, making seven putouts in center field for the Indians.

The Indians celebrated their annual Senior Day against visiting New Berlin West on July 8 and didn't have a hit until the bottom of the fourth when Cole

Surprenant blasted a grand slam home run over the fence in left field. On base at the time were Brad Buechel (walk), John May (error) and Jared Chesak (hit by a pitch), and the score went quickly from 2-1 to 6-1.


The home run was Kewaskum's fourth of the 2017 season and Surprenant's second in varsity ball.

KHS coach Doug Gonring had senior Jacob Loehr start the game (4 innings, 1 run on five hits, 2 walks, 0 strikeouts) and Kyle Pamperin finish up the final three innings (0 runs, 2 hits, 4 strikeouts and 1 walk). Loehr got the victory.

"I tried to do as much for the seniors as I could do," Gonring said, referring to the fact Dalton Poole and J.J. Heberer were regular starters, and Loehr, Pamperin and Nick Ellenbecker all got to bat, and the two pitchers combined to get the "W."

KHS wound up with seven hits, including the homer and Buechel's double.

For New Berlin West, which lost a close game to unbeaten West Bend West 4-2 on July 7, Nate Egofske and Adam Siegel singled in the second, while Nate Artenian got credit for the RBI with a sacrifice fly.

After last week's marathon round of golf, Stangl has now raised more than \$23,000 for cancer research over the past four years.

The Game Of Golf

Stangl, 34, lives with his wife, Jenn, in De Forest. A graduate of the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, Stangl works for Covace, a drug development company.

But Stangl, a 2001 Kewaskum High School graduate, has ties to the Kewaskum community.

His parents, Bill and Diane Stangl, live here.

And Hon-Kor, the place where Stangl developed a

love for golf, is located in Kewaskum.

Stangl worked at Hon-E-Kor during the summer when he was in middle school. And he golfed at the course from 1997-2001 while on the high school golf team.

So for the past three years, Stangl has returned to his roots and golfed his marathon golf round at Hon-E-Kor to raise money for cancer research.

"Kelly, Kate, Jane and the rest of the Hon-E-Kor staff have been so generous and supportive of this event over the past three years," Stangl said.

This year's golf outing wasn't easy. Stangl started on the course at about 5:30 a.m.

Jenn traveled from Madison in the morning, and got to the course at about 8:30 a.m. She stayed with Stangl throughout the day, cheering him on, until he finished golfing at about 5 p.m.

Temperatures soared in the upper 80s throughout the day.

"It was really hot," Stangl admitted. "But we managed to stay pretty well hydrated."

Most of Stangl's nine-hole scores were in the upper 30s.

"I was pretty happy with

that," he said.

The worst nine-hole score Stangl recorded, 42, happened in the late afternoon.

"I started to get pretty tired close to the end," Stangl explained.

But Stangl's parents, as well as family friends from Manitowoc and Appleton, gathered to watch Stangl golf the last hole.

"It was really nice that they were all able to be there," Stangl said.

The Fight Against Cancer

In 2008, during a routine checkup, the dentist found some white spots on Stangl's tongue. Stangl had a biopsy done, and the cells that were removed were identified as precancerous.

A couple years later, in 2010, the spots resurfaced. Again, the spots were found to be benign.

Then, in May 2013, while on vacation with some friends, Stangl noticed that his tongue did not feel quite right.

He could feel a firm bump beneath the tissue, and he saw some pink on the edge of it. He knew something was terribly wrong.

So Stangl made an appointment with his ear, nose and throat doctor, whom he had been seeing routinely every three to six months for checkups.

Once again, biopsies were taken, and in June 2013 Stangl, at the age of 30, was diagnosed with an aggressive form of Squamous-cell carcinoma of the oral cavity.

Because some of the tumor tissue started to make its way into muscles outside of Stangl's tongue, it was considered Stage 4.

Stangl did not smoke or chew tobacco, and drank only in moderation. Doctors could not find a cause for the cancer.

"The doctor told me I got unlucky," Stangl said.

On July 8, 2013, Stangl underwent surgery at the UW Hospital in Madison. Doctors removed the tumor from Stangl's tongue, and then used tissue from Stangl's forearm to reconstruct the tongue during a 10-hour procedure.

He then underwent six weeks of radiation.

Since completing radiation, Stangl has been receiving good news from doctors.

Looking To The Future

Stangl admits that he was pretty sore after golfing 126 holes last week.

Still, he plans to hold a golf marathon again next year, because that is when he will reach the five-year marker after cancer.

"Five years is the magic number that they want you to get to, after a situation like this," Stangl explained.

But things are looking good.

"About two weeks ago I had another regular checkup with my doctor, and he gave me the two thumbs up. He actually gave me the option to move to less frequent checkups at this point, which is really comforting to hear," Stangl said.

Fassbender, Buhler, Sorce Jr., Green, Boden Claim PDTR Mid-Season Championship Triumphs

Beautiful summer weather, hot on-track action, extended A-main events and impressive performances from former champions highlighted the 13th annual Plymouth Dirt Track Racing Mid-Season Championship Night of racing at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds in Plymouth on Saturday, July 8.

Four of the five PDTR Mid-Season A-main winners visited victory lane for the first time this season, each of which have a coveted PDTR season championship under their belt, including Lance Fassbender of Burnett (Sprint Car), Tim Buhler of Greenbush (Late Model), Don Sorce Jr. of West Allis (Grand National) and Zach Boden of Cambridge (Micro Sprint).

In the B Mod A-main, point leader Justin Green of Sheboygan Falls kept his strong season going by notching his third main event win of the 2017 season.

The 21-car Sprint Car A-main rolled off with polesitter Nich Melis of Plymouth grabbing the lead at the drop of the green flag. By lap four, Fassbender was starting to show his strength as he moved into second place after starting fourth.

Fassbender then reeled in Melis along the high groove of the third-mile clay oval over the next four laps before pulling off a successful slide job in turn one on lap eight to secure the top spot bringing third starter John Krebsbach of Cascade along with him into second place.

The first of three caution flags appeared on lap 10, which allowed the field to bunch up behind the 2008 PDTR Sprint Car champion. On lap 12, Fassbender got sideways in turn three, but managed to maintain the top spot as the battle for second began to heat up between sixth starter Brandon McMullen of Oshkosh, fifth starter Tim Haddy of Waupun and Plymouth's Justin Miller, who started eighth.

McMullen advanced to

second on lap 13 with Haddy following in third. At the half-way point of the extended 30-lap race, Fassbender held a comfortable full straightaway advantage over McMullen.

On lap 18, the race slowed again for debris. The ensuing restart produced the final caution of the event when Josh Teunissen of Waldo, Anthony Knierim of Franksville, Bill Taylor of Random Lake and Chris Clayton of Waldo collided exiting turn four. Knierim, Taylor and Clayton returned to the race, but Teunissen was done for the night.

On the final restart, 2010 PDTR Sprint Car champion Kurt Davis pulled off a big slide job in turn two to vault past Haddy into third place. At the front of the field, Fassbender ran away and hid over the final 12 laps, working his way through lapped traffic with ease en route to his sixth career PDTR A-main victory and 19th overall Midwest Sprint Car Association main event triumph.

McMullen maintained his PDTR Sprint Car point lead with a solid second-place finish, Davis wound up third, Haddy was fourth and Krebsbach posted a strong five-place finish.

In the 30-lap Mid-Season Championship Late Model A main, former champions Brad Mueller of Random Lake and Tim Buhler dueled side by side on the opening lap before the second starting Buhler surged ahead along the outside groove in turn four.

For nearly the entire race, Mueller hounded the defending PDTR Late Model champion along the preferred high line, pulling alongside Mueller briefly on several occasions. On lap three, 2014 PDTR Late Model champion Mitch McGrath of Waukesha worked his way up from his sixth starting spot to pass Jim Letizia of Milwaukee to seize third.

McGrath tracked down the lead duo with 10 laps to go and dove low on lap 23 to power past Mueller into second on lap 23. Mueller refused to back

down as he held strong along the high groove as McGrath hugged the bottom eventually retaking second on lap 25.

The only caution of the event appeared on lap 26 for the stalled car of Sheboygan's Randy Markwardt in turn four, which set up a four-lap dash to the finish. Buhler could not be denied though as he held off the spirited efforts of McGrath and Mueller to score his 10th career PDTR A main victory.

McGrath regained second at the finish line, Mueller was third, fifth starter Taylor Scheffler of Waukesha took fourth and Justin Schmidt of Cleveland placed fifth after starting seventh.

Polesitter Will Sorce of West Allis led the first four laps before two-time PDTR Grand National champ Don Sorce Jr. charged up from his fifth starting spot to take command along the low groove on lap five of the 30-lap Grand National main event.

Sorce Jr. wasted no time in building up a huge half-lap lead over third starter Jim Rychtik of Port Washington, who was filling in for Brad Weiss.

Although passing was at a premium throughout most of the Grand Nationals headline race, 2011 PDTR Grand National champion Mark Fieber of Cascade, who started second, and 2006 PDTR Late model champ Dan Sorce of West Allis, who started fourth, mounted a spirited side-by-side duel for third place in the final five laps.

Sorce Jr. cruised over the final 10 laps to notch his ninth career PDTR Grand National A-main victory in the non-stop event. Rychtik was second, Fieber finished third, Dan Sorce placed fourth and Justin Erickson of Plymouth ended up fifth, after starting ninth.

Polesitter Tim Thrun of Horicon led the opening three circuits of the extended 30-lap B Mod A main, despite heavy pressure from outside front row starter J.J. Walvoord.

On lap three, defending PDTR B Mod champion Brandon Berth of Plymouth, who started third, advanced to briefly make it a three-wide battle for the top spot just before the first of five caution flags came out on lap three for dislodged infield tires on the track surface.

Berth used the high groove to sweep into the top spot on lap four before another caution appeared on lap six when Glen Blanke of Sheboygan Falls spun in turn two.

Justin Green, who started seventh, became a serious player on the restart passing Thrun for second on lap seven and tracking down the high-riding Berth quickly along the low groove.

Green, who came into the night as the PDTR B Mod point leader, was poised to take the lead from Berth on lap 10, but a caution flag for a spin involving Craig Gessner in turn four erased the pass.

Not to be denied, Green bolted into the lead along the low line on lap 13. Eight laps later, Green had built up a full straightaway cushion over Berth. After two more caution flags, 11th starter Chad Vetting of Valders passed Berth to gain the runner-up spot on lap 26.

Green held on to become the first PDTR driver in any division to earn three A-main victories this season. Vetting took second, Berth was third, Gary Glander of Sheboygan Falls placed fourth from the fifth starting spot and Spencer Long of Sheboygan Falls charged from the 18th starting spot to finish fifth.

Outside front row starter Zach Boden post a flag-to-flag victory in the caution-free 15-lap Micro Sprint A main.

It was Boden's division-leading fourth career PDTR Micro Sprint A-main victory. Chad Bogar of Sun Prairie was second, followed by Tory Strauss of Waterloo (third), Jack Vanderboom of Dousman (fourth) and Preston Ruh of Elkhart Lake (fifth).

Dick Hed of Plymouth won the Grand National B

main.

This Friday, July 14, will mark the first-ever appearance of the United States Modified Touring Series (USMTS) and Cow Bell Street Stock Tour for the inaugural Cheese Capital Checkered Chase at the Plymouth Dirt Track. PDTR Grand Nationals will also be on the card for a non-points race. Hot laps are scheduled to start at 6:30 p.m. with racing at 7 p.m.

The following night,

Saturday, July 15, will be PDTR's Fan Appreciation Night, including Grand National driver introductions. The trophy sponsor will be A-1 Appliance. Racing will begin at 6 p.m.

Tow Industry Calls On State For Greater Protection

One week after the American Towman Spirit Ride passed through West Bend led by Bob's Main Street Auto & Towing promoting public awareness of the Slow Down, Move Over law, Spirit Ride President Steve Calitri is calling for states to mandate protection of towers and other first responders working on the highways.

"State Highway Patrol will stop to safeguard the work scene when they can," said Calitri, "but the times they are not there can have fatal consequences. They understand as much as anyone how dangerous it is out there. Sometimes a state trooper

is struck by a passing vehicle. They may need more resources to be there consistently. The people who can give them those resources need to consider the critical work tow operators do and the dangers surrounding them."

The Spirit Ride is relaying a ceremonial casket from car carrier to car carrier across the nation paying tribute to fallen first responders while carrying the message, Slow Down, Move Over. Hundreds are casualties of errant passing vehicles each year. About 100 are fatalities and 60% of them are tow operators. The Ride will

pass through 2,000 municipalities and involve 4,000 tow companies now through 2018.

Calitri said that more motorists need to learn to slow down and move over one lane when passing emergency vehicles with flashing lights on the roadside. Calitri went on to say that American highways would shut down if tow truck operators were not there to keep the roads cleared after accidents and breakdowns. "Let first responders work safely," he says. "Let them make it home at night."

SBA Offers Working Capital Loans To Wisconsin Small Businesses

The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) announced that federal Economic Injury Disaster Loans are available to small businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small businesses engaged in aquaculture and most private nonprofit organizations located in Wisconsin as a result of the winterkill and freeze from January 1 through May 26, 2017.

This disaster declaration includes the following counties Brown, Calumet, Dodge, Door, Fond du Lac, Jackson, Juneau, Kewaunee, La Crosse, Manitowoc, Milwaukee, Monroe, Oconto, Outagamie, Ozaukee, Shawano, Sheboygan, Trempealeau, Vernon, Washington, Waukesha, Waupaca and Winnebago in Wisconsin.

"When the Secretary of Agriculture issues a disaster declaration to help farmers recover from damages and losses to crops, the Small Business Administration issues a declaration to eligible enti-

ties affected by the same disaster," said Frank Skaggs, director of SBA's Field Operations Center East in Atlanta.

Under this declaration, the SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loan program is available to eligible farm-related and nonfarm-related entities that suffered financial losses as a direct result of this disaster. With the exception of aquaculture enterprises, SBA cannot provide disaster loans to agricultural producers, farmers, or ranchers.

The loan amount can be up to \$2 million with interest rates of 2.5 percent for private nonprofit organizations and 3.125 percent for small businesses, with terms up to 30 years. The SBA determines eligibility based on the size of the applicant, type of activity and its financial resources. Loan amounts and terms are set by the SBA and are based on each applicant's financial condition. These working capital loans may be used to pay fixed debts, payroll, accounts payable, and other bills that could

have been paid had the disaster not occurred. The loans are not intended to replace lost sales or profits.

Applicants may apply online using the Electronic Loan Application (ELA) via SBA's secure website at <https://disasterloan.sba.gov/ela>.

Disaster loan information and application forms may also be obtained by calling the SBA's Customer Service Center at 800-659-2955 (800-877-8339 for the deaf and hard-of-hearing) or by sending an email to disastercustomerservice@sba.gov. Loan applications can be downloaded from the SBA's website at www.sba.gov/disaster. Completed applications should be mailed to: U.S. Small Business Administration, Processing and Disbursement Center, 14925 Kingsport Road, Fort Worth, TX 76155.

Completed loan applications must be returned to SBA no later than February 28, 2018.

Preserving Pathways: A Neighborhood Conversation Series

At UW Colleges and UW-Extension, we believe that starting conversations is the foundation for making change. Here in Wisconsin, as is the case across the country, we have seen a shift in populations moving from rural areas to urban and suburban settings instead. This trend can bring with it some unfavorable changes to rural communities. This is especially an issue for Wisconsin, where 46 of our 72 counties are categorized as rural.

In areas where the population has seen a decline, schools are facing dropping enrollment, which leads to decreases in funding and fewer classes offered to students. Local businesses struggle with the lack of available workforce as well as consumers, and citizens' access to healthcare becomes restrictive due to shortages in service.

To facilitate a dialogue on these very issues, UW Colleges and UW-Extension partnered with northern Wisconsin communities, organizations and government agencies to host Preserving Pathways: A Neighborhood Conversation Series. The roundtable events provided a conduit to address these critical issues and to start discussing innovative solutions. Over the course of three days, we travelled across northern Wisconsin, visiting a different city each day to highlight these important topics and come together to discuss solutions.

The first event, held in Rice Lake, discussed the unique challenges rural schools face, including declining enrollment, growing poverty, staff shortages, insufficient broadband service, higher transportation costs and an increased number of students born with addiction-related issues. This discussion brought to light many important concerns the community had, but also provided a connection for educators, service providers, and legislators among others, to generate solutions to these concerns as well.

Next, we made our way to Marshfield to discuss the issues associated with healthcare in rural areas. These conversations focused on the importance of quality healthcare and the challenge of having a limited number of physicians in rural areas. Our community discussion allowed attendees to express their needs and have them heard by county and government leaders.

Our final stop was in Marinette, where we discussed the workforce and economy. Demographic trends demonstrate that many people raised in rural areas tend to leave and seek opportunities in urban areas. Panelists discussed the ways small business-

es, local government, and higher education work together to keep people in rural areas, and what opportunities still exist.

One panelist, Representative Romaine Quinn from Wisconsin's 75th Assembly District, noted that it is important to look at not only what rural communities look like today, but what they can look like. "UW Colleges and UW-Extension provide a unique role to rural Wisconsin," said Quinn. "They serve some of the neediest and those that may need extra help with learning. They are a huge support for rural communities across the board, and not just with education, since they also provide leadership opportunities

and other services, including programs for those dealing with poverty, which is critical for many of our areas."

Preserving Pathways helped bring together citizens and leaders to have powerful conversations. Together, we confronted the many concerns challenging rural communities. Wisconsin is full of resilient people, which I saw firsthand. The Neighborhood Conversation Series dialogues were just the first step in making valuable, demonstrable change.

After the students finished the Memorial Day parade and Ashley was going to put her clarinet away, Michlig called her over.

"You might want to check it," Michlig said.
