Building Project Affects Kewaskum School Calendar

-School Day To Begin Five Minutes Earlier At Middle And High Schools

In an effort to maximize the time available for the construction team to renovate the Kewaskum High School during the summer of 2018, the Kewaskum Board of Education approved a calendar change for the 2017-18 school year at the board meeting on Monday, July 17.

The revised last day of school will be Friday, May 25, 2018.

"This will give the construction team an additional week to start the renovation work at the high school," Superintendent James Smasal said. "Our goal is to have as much work done as possible on the capital project prior to the start of the 2018-19 school year."

With this change, the length of the school day

for middle and high school students will increase by five minutes. The start time for middle school and high school students for the 2017-18 school year will be 7:35 a.m.

There will be no change to the bus route schedule. And, the end of the school day will remain at 2:50 p.m.

Elementary school day start and end time will not be affected. The elementary school day will remain from 8:50 a.m. - 3:40 p.m.

The first day of school for students will be Tuesday, Sept. 5.

Parents have received notification of the updated calendar via electronic messaging. The updated calendar is also available on the district website at www.kewaskumschools.org.

Area DJ Charged With Felony Sexual Assault

Dylan Moore, a 23-year-old West Bend man known as DJ Dylan, has been charged with repeated sexual assault of the same child.

According to the criminal complaint, the assaults occurred in June and July 2015, when the alleged victim was 15 years old. The alleged victim, a male who worked for Moore at the time, slept at Moore's apartment when the alleged assaults occurred,

according to the complaint.

Moore, who has worked as a DJ for school dances in the Kewaskum area, admitted the contact happened and that he was aware that the alleged victim was in high school and around 15 years old at the time of the incidences, according to the criminal complaint.

The charge is a Class C felony, which carries a fine not to exceed \$100,000 or imprisonment not to exceed 40 years, or both.

Moore is out on \$3,500 cash bail and has been ordered to have no unsupervised contact with anyone under the age of 18. Moore waived his right to a preliminary hearing and is scheduled for arraignment on Aug. 23.

Moore was scheduled to perform at the Washington County Fair from 9 to 11 p.m. on Thursday, Friday and Saturday this week. All three "Dance Party With DJ Dylan" performances have been canceled.

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Jeanne And The Lily Stalk

– Lily Growing To Record Height

When Jeanne Goeden planted a lily outside her Kewaskum home about four or five years ago, she hoped it would grow.

Since then, the flower has grown, and in the

process, has surpassed Goeden's wildest expectations. For the past two years, the lily has soared to the roof line of Goeden's home on Whisper Lane.

Last year the flower grew to be about 7 feet tall. This year it has even more pink

blooms and is looking like it will surpass last year's record mark.

On Monday, the flower measured about 81 inches tall. New buds continue to sprout.

Goeden said she has not fertilized the flower.

So what is her secret?

"It's the sunlight, the rain and God's hand," Goeden said.

The faithful gardener does not remember where she bought the magic bulb.

"I bought three bulbs," Goeden remembers.

"I planted two by the sidewalk. Those two bulbs came up one day and then they were gone. I think the grubs got them," she said.

But the bulb that Goeden planted on the west side of her house continued to thrive. It has been growing so tall that Goeden started using shoestrings to tie it to a stake.

"I want to make sure it doesn't topple over," she explained, admitting that she has never had to use a stake for a lily before.

Even the blooms on the lily are gigantic, measuring about 9 inches from tip to tip.

And the fragrant scent that the blooms are emitting can be detected from neighboring yards.

Wanting to share her astonishment at the lily's incredible growth, Goeden

sent pictures of the flower to friends.

"Some of them have Facebook, so then [the news about the lily] went on there," said Goeden, who suddenly found herself in the limelight.

Before long, Goeden received a text from her daughter that said, "You are on Twitter, Mom."

When Goeden's daughter-in-law Kelly Goeden saw the posts going viral, she called Goeden and said, "You're famous!"

And when Kelly Goeden saw the flower in person, she could see why.

"I have never seen a lily that big," she said in amazement.

Gov. Walker Announces Over \$132 Million In Payments To Local Governments

Gov. Scott Walker announced that earlier this month local governments received quarterly payments totaling \$132,782,070 for general transportation aids, connecting highway aids and expressway policing aids from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT).

Payments to Wisconsin's 1,925 local units of government include: \$129,510,221 in general transportation aids; \$3,015,874 to municipalities entitled to receive connecting highway aids; and \$255,975 to Milwaukee County for expressway policing aids.

General transportation aids help defray the costs of constructing, maintaining, and operating roads and streets under local jurisdiction. Connecting highway aids reimburse municipalities for maintenance and traffic control of certain state highways within municipalities.

For calendar year 2017, local governments will receive an estimated \$433

million from the state transportation fund to build and maintain local roads and bridges, which includes expressway policing aids to the Milwaukee County Sheriff Department for patrol of Milwaukee expressways.

Quarterly payments for cities, towns and villages are sent the first Monday in January, April, July and October. County payments are made in three installments, with 25 percent of the total annual payment on the first Monday in January; 50 percent on the first Monday in July; and 25 percent on the first Monday in October.

Communities also receive state transportation fund revenues for public transit, elderly and disabled transportation, and airport and harbor development. Local communities may also receive state and federal funds for specific highway and bridge construction projects.

Town of Addison will receive \$35,535 in general transportation aids.

Town of Barton will receive \$25,472 in general transportation aids.

Town of Erin will receive \$31,213 in general transportation aids.

Town of Farmington will receive \$35,849 in general transportation aids.

Town of Germantown will receive \$2,455 in general transportation aids.

Town of Hartford will receive \$26,804 in general transportation aids.

Town of Jackson will receive \$32,771 in general transportation aids.

Town of Kewaskum will receive \$20,947 in general transportation aids.

Town of Polk will receive \$31,901 in general transportation aids.

Town of Trenton will receive \$36,559 in general transportation aids.

Town of Wayne will receive \$31,560 in general transportation aids.

Village of Kewaskum will receive \$41,372 in general transportation aids.

Washington County Sheriff's Office Reports

Vehicle Crash

On Saturday, July 22, at 7:10 a.m. the Sheriff's Office responded to the area of Highway 33 and Alpine Drive in the Town of Addison for a report of an SUV that crashed down a steep embankment.

The driver, a 50-year-old Town of Trenton man, was traveling westbound on Highway 33 when he began to experience some type of medical condition. His GMC Sierra with a 6-

by-10 foot utility trailer in tow crossed the centerline and struck the guardrail. The truck then bounced off the guardrail two more times until it struck a guardrail end plate at a farm access point. The truck proceeded down a steep embankment and overturned.

The driver experienced some neck and shoulder pain as a result of the crash, but may have also been in a state of shock.

He was transported to a local medical facility for treatment.

When the vehicle came to rest, three dogs ran from the overturned truck and were taken into "protective custody" until turned over to a family friend.

A local tow company with a heavy duty rotator wrecker was brought to the scene to pick the vehicle up from the awkward resting point.

Highway 45 To Undergo Construction In 2021

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation has plans to mill and repave Highway 45 from County Highway H on the south side of Kewaskum to the north side of Kewaskum where State Road 28 heads west.

The work is currently scheduled for summer

2021.

"They are going to mill the top layer of asphalt and replace it, so they are not replacing any gutters. It will not be like when they did Main Street; they are not doing any excavating," Village Administrator Matt Heiser said.

The state will cover the cost of repaving the traffic lanes, but the village will be responsible for paying

to repave the parking lanes.

"Potentially this is the opportunity for utility work to be done," Heiser said.

At the July 17 Village Board meeting, trustees discussed that plans will need to be made, but when the state comes to do this street project, it may be the time to replace the water main on Fond du Lac Avenue.

Agronomy Field Day – Managing Nitrogen For Maximum Returns

It appears that the frequency of wet springs with excessive rain events in late spring and early summer are requiring farmers to rethink nitrogen (N) applications to corn crops. This is particularly true on fine textured heavy soils found in Eastern Wisconsin, where saturated soils can lead to significant N losses. "The Agronomy Field Day – Managing Nitrogen for Maximum Returns", is planned for Wednesday, August 16 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Fly-By Acres LLC, The Kroepfens, W2781 County Road O, Sheboygan Falls, WI.

Presentation topics and speakers include:

"Reducing the Risk of N Losses by Splitting N Applications in Corn", and "How Late Can We Apply N and Still Get an Economic Return?" will be discussed by: Carrie Laboski, UW-Madison Soil Science Department and Mike Ballweg, Agricultural Agent – Crops and Soils, UW-Extension – Sheboygan County.

"Key Ways to Control Nutrient and Soil Loss from Your Farm" will be discussed by Amber Radatz, UW-Discovery Farms.

SYMPTOMS OF UTI IN OLDER ADULTS

It may be difficult to figure out an elderly person has a urinary tract infection (UTI) because they don't exhibit the classic symptoms. The Sheriff's Office decided that having a deputy stop by Eli's party didn't seem like enough for this special celebration.



Continued From... 9/11 Memorial Moves Closer To Finding Future Home

Haberman is a board member of the Kewaskum Remembers 9/11 memorial project.

The project's goal is for the memorial to remember the 2,996 people who died in the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001, and to pay special tribute to Kewaskum High School graduate Andrea Haberman.

The Kewaskum Remembers 9/11 organization recently became an incorporated entity and has started the process of becoming a 501(c)(3) program.

The Kewaskum Remembers 9/11 board had previously considered building the memorial in front of the Kewaskum Fire Department.

However, at the June 5 Village Board meeting, questions were raised about whether the fire station was the best location.

Village trustees wondered if parking would be an issue. They asked if the

memorial would impede future expansion of the fire department. They questioned whether plans to widen Highway 45 would affect the memorial. And they voiced concerns about safety if firefighters had to respond to an emergency when there was a crowd of tourists at the memorial.

The annex site was suggested as a possible alternative at that meeting. That new proposed site location offers plenty of parking, an indoor shelter and public restrooms for visitors.

Last Monday, Kewaskum Remembers 9/11 board members appeared before the Village Board to get feedback on creating a memorial site in front of the annex.

Village trustees voiced no objections, but did not take a formal vote on the issue last week.

They did give a collective nod to placing the sign

and the steel beam in front of the annex. The beam was moved to the new proposed location on Tuesday, July 25.

Regardless of where the memorial is built, it will remain centered around a steel beam that was recovered from the North Tower of the World Trade Center.

Architect Dustin Melzark, a Kewaskum High School graduate, is designing the memorial.

The plan is for the memorial to be a place to honor not only those who perished, but also all those who responded to the atrocity of 9/11. It will serve as a place to reflect on and educate about the events of September 11, 2001.

The Village Board is expected to vote on the annex location, contingent on a memorandum of understanding, a concept plan and concept plan approval, at its August 7 meeting.

Swim Pond At Kiwanis Park Sees Increase In Attendance

Despite a cool and rainy June, attendance at the Kiwanis Park swim pond in Kewaskum has been up this summer.

"June did have a cold stretch in it, and there were still over 2,300 people who used the pool in June. That is 350 more than in the month of June in 2016, a 19 percent increase. And it is double of how many used the pool in 2015. It went from 1,100 in 2015 to 2,308 this year," Village Administrator Matt Heiser said.

July is typically the busiest month of the summer for the swim pond. For the past two years, over 4,000 people used the swim pond during the month of July. This year the pool reached those numbers just halfway into the month, Heiser said.

Last Wednesday was the busiest day so far this summer, with 327 in attendance, according to pool manager Butch Buddenhagen.

Much of the increase is due to the inflatable amenities that were added this summer, according to village authorities.

Village trustees attribute

that increase to resident Lloyd Spaeth.

Last year the village board made a conscious decision to try to increase attendance at the pool. The board created a pool committee, charging it with reviewing operations of the Kiwanis Park pool.

Even though he was not a member of the committee, Spaeth attended some of the committee meetings. He voluntarily visited other community pools, reviewing their operations, interviewing their staff and reporting his findings and conclusion to the Kewaskum pool committee.

Spaeth did not want the swim pond to close. He wanted area residents and children to be able to enjoy all the facility had to offer.

So Spaeth did whatever he could to help the cause. He voluntarily visited vendors of recreational amenities and arranged to have the vendors present their products to the pool committee.

Because of Spaeth's efforts, the Village Board followed recommendations and approved purchasing inflatable amenities.

Spaeth was concerned

about the safety of swimmers, so he voluntarily ran a fundraising campaign that successfully covered the costs of life vests to accompany the purchase of inflatable features.

It is common for all the life vests to be in use this summer, so people have to wait before they can use the inflatables, according to Buddenhagen.

Spaeth passed away unexpectedly on June 14.

However, the Village Board still wanted to recognize Spaeth's efforts, and issued a proclamation in Spaeth's honor at the July 17 Village Board meeting.

Spaeth's family members were in attendance to receive the proclamation.

In addition to the inflatable amenities, shade umbrellas also were installed this summer as a result of the pool committee's recommendations.

Attendees are reminded that even though life jackets are available, those who cannot swim are not allowed in the deep end of the swim pond. Lifeguards are on duty, Buddenhagen said, but parents should be sure to watch their children to ensure everyone's safety.
