Reigle Family Offers Land To Village For New Park

– Village Board To Hold Town Hall Meeting On September 6

The Village of Kewaskum has the opportunity to receive a new park.

The James D. Reigle family has offered to give the village 31 acres of undeveloped land to serve as a village park. The wooded property, which is located on Edgewood Road in Kewaskum, has an assessed value of \$649,700.

If it accepts the offer, the village would agree that the land would serve as a public park for the next 25 years.

Under the terms the Village Board is currently considering, the cost of developing and maintaining the park would be covered by the Kewaskum Athletic Association (KAA) and Kewaskum Youth Soccer Organization (KYSO).

The village would lease the land to the KAA and KYSO, and the lease agreement would require the two organizations to develop and maintain the

land for the next 25 years. The lease agreement would mandate that the park remain a public park.

The Village Board is considering the offer, but would like to have public input before making a decision.

A "Town Hall" meeting will be held at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, Sept. 6, in the Kewaskum Municipal Annex, located at 1308 Fond du Lac Ave. in Kewaskum. The public is encouraged to attend.

The Story Behind The Gift

James D. Reigle, 91, read the *Kewaskum Statesman* on April 27. The story on the front page about the KAA and KYSO caught his attention.

The two youth sports organizations were in need of new athletic fields. They were considering purchasing 25 acres of farmland just north of the village on Highway S to create a new park.

Currently, the two groups share space at Kiwanis Park. With hundreds of chil-

dren in 4K through eighth grade participating in the youth sports, Kiwanis Park gets crowded.

In fact, the park is so full that while some children play baseball on the ball diamonds, other youngsters play soccer simultaneously in the outfield.

This made Reigle think. His family was trying to sell 31 acres of undeveloped land in the Village of Kewaskum.

The Reigle land is wooded. It contains a two-acre pond and has a creek that runs along the eastern border of the property.

"It is very beautiful; it is a nice piece of property," Reigle said.

The land would make an ideal park, Reigle thought. And it would benefit children in the area.

"There are hundreds of kids being kept off the streets, and there are a lot of volunteers giving their time and energy to keep them off the streets," Reigle said.

Neighboring counties have expressed interest in partnering with Washington County to potentially develop shared service arrangements.

On July 17, County Board Chairman Rick Gundrum and County Administrator Joshua Schoemann wrote a letter to surrounding counties on behalf of the Washington County Board's Executive Committee in hopes of applying to be a part of the Local Government Institute of Wisconsin's

(LGI) Future Regions Initiative.

Washington County leaders would like to develop cooperative partnerships or shared service arrangements with other counties. They are even interested in the possibility of consolidating counties, procedures or referendums.

The letter went to Ozaukee, Waukesha, Dodge and Fond du Lac counties. The deadline for them to respond to the letter was Friday, Aug. 11.

Village Receives Loan

The Board of Commissioners of Public Lands (BCPL) approved a State Trust Fund Loan totaling \$999,479 to the village of Kewaskum to finance road projects.

The Board approved loans totaling \$3,951,174.68 at today's meeting. They include:

- Clover Sanitary District #1, Bayfield County / Finance sanitary system maintenance / \$45,000
- Village of Kewaskum, Washington County / Finance road projects / \$999,479
- Madison Metropolitan School District, Dane

County / Finance tennis court renovation / \$462,950

• Phillips School District, Price County / Construct digital fabrication laboratory / \$237,000

• Phillips School District, Price County / Refinance BCPL loan #2011100 / \$946,973.68

• Town of Plymouth, Sheboygan County / Purchase fire truck / \$150,000

• Village of Withee, Clark County / Finance sewer liner installation /

\$25,000

The BCPL operates entirely on program revenue, without taxpayer money and distributes more than 96 cents of every dollar of interest earned on BCPL State Trust Fund investments to Wisconsin's public schools. The 2017 earnings of \$32.1 million are the sole source of state funding for K-12 public school library materials.

Passport Day To Be Held At The Kewaskum Post Office

Do you plan to take an international trip? Is your current passport about to expire? Or, are you applying for your first passport? Well, look no further than your local Post Office.

The Kewaskum Post Office will host a Passport Day event on Saturday, August 19 from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. "This is a great opportunity for Kewaskum residents planning to travel outside the United States to apply for a passport without making a reservation," said Kewaskum Postmaster Hope Lewitzke.

In addition to the familiar passport book, travelers can also apply for a passport card, which may be used for land and sea travel only between the United States and Canada, Mexico, Bermuda or the Caribbean region. The wallet-size passport card is a less expensive alternative for those who travel to these destinations, but it is not available for international travel by air.

To apply for a passport book or passport card for the first time, applicants need proof of U.S. citizenship in the form of their

birth certificate issued by the city, county or state, or a certificate of citizenship or a naturalization certificate. Applicants will also need a valid form of photo identification, and they must submit a photocopy of that identification, such as a current valid driver's license, government ID or military photo ID. There will be passport photo service available at the Kewaskum Post Office.

For first time applicants, the fee for a passport book is \$110.00 to the Department of State with an acceptance fee of \$25 to the Postal Service. The fee for an adult passport card is \$30.00. An expedited process is also available for an additional fee. Passport applications for both the book and the card require a 2 x 2 photograph in color, which can be taken at the Passport Day event for \$15.00. The fee for minors under the age of 16 is \$80 for a Passport Book and \$15 for a Passport Card. Parents applying for Passport Books/Cards for children under the age of 16 must both be present along with the child.

"We're here to help our customers as they prepare to travel the world," added Lewitzke. "We make getting a passport easy and convenient with a one-stop shop solution," she explained.

U.S. citizens may also obtain passport information by phone, in English and Spanish, by calling the National Passport Information Center toll-free at 1-877-487-2778. Ralph W. Liepert, 91, of West Bend, passed away on Thursday, August 10, 2017, at his home with his family at his side.

He was born on July 5, 1926, at home in the town of Farmington and was the fourth of eight children to Walter and Martha (Quaas) Liepert.

Ralph attended Washington one room school for eight years, attended Kewaskum High School for 4 years, and belonged to the class of 1944. He worked the farm with his dad until 1951.

5 Years Ago
August 16, 2012

When Jim Smasal became Superintendent of Kewaskum School District, he started looking for ways to help the district's schools succeed. Smasal has created four pillars of success he feels are needed for the district.

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Continued From... Reigle Family Offers Land To Village For New Park – Village Board To Hold Town Hall Meeting On September 6

The Reigle property is located within the village, another important factor.

"They were talking about doing something outside the village. Everyone would have to drive the kids to everything. To me, that is bad news for a park. Kids should be able to walk to a park, they should be able to ride their bikes to it, and they should be able to get themselves to and from it," Reigle said.

So Reigle called Nathan Scheel, president of the KAA.

"It was probably the best phone call that soccer or baseball has ever received," said Chad Cook, KAA vice president.

Park Plans

Representatives of the KAA and KYSO looked at the Reigle land and agreed it would be perfect.

A conceptual plan that includes a baseball field, two softball fields and nine soccer fields of varying sizes was drawn up. The plan also includes trees that will remain around the perimeter of the property and throughout the park.

The conceptual plan is similar to what was created for the Highway S property, except this new plan includes walking trails that meander through the woods and around a pond.

"We want to create a nice balance. This is a unique piece of property. It's very wooded, it has a pond on it, so there are some land features that we want to preserve as much as possible," Cook said. "One of our big goals is to preserve a nice wooded border that kind of creates a buffer between the park and adjacent properties."

The plan also includes a playground area, concession stand and batting cages.

"We want it to be a family-friendly sort of environment, to provide not only some of the field spaces,

but some of the secondary attractions as well, with the trail and the playground and typical things that you would find in any community park," Cook said.

The KAA and KYSO would continue utilizing fields at Kiwanis Park, even after new athletic fields have been created.

"We have no plans to abandon Kiwanis Park," Scheel said.

The youth sports groups hope that work can begin on the new park this fall, and that some new athletic fields will be available for use by spring 2019.

The Cost

If the village agrees to add the new park, the KAA and KYSO would need to have the land surveyed before any construction could begin.

Trees would need to be removed and the land would need to be graded. A sanitary sewer main already cuts through the property. However, a water main would need to be added.

There is no plan to add lighting, but electricity would need to be installed for the concession stand. And, of course, athletic fields would need to be constructed.

The KAA and KYSO currently have about \$50,000 to put toward the new park, and they are prepared to begin a fundraising campaign.

The groups have already received some offers.

"We've had corporations, businesses, organizations and individuals that have reached out as to labor, equipment and financial," Scheel said.

The Reigle Connection To Kewaskum

Although the proposed park would benefit the KAA and KYSO, it is important to Reigle that the park would belong to the Village of Kewaskum.

"The Village of Kewaskum has been very good to us for 50-some years, and our company has had a good relationship with the village," Reigle said.

Reigle grew up in Ohio and served in the U.S. Army Air Corps in Germany. He moved with his wife, Patty, to Wisconsin in 1949 to work for his father, J.O. Reigle, who was one of the owners of the Kewaskum Utensil Company. The company became Regal Ware, Inc., in 1951.

In 1965, Reigle became president of Regal Ware. He currently serves as chairman of the company's board.

A couple years after coming to Wisconsin, Reigle and his wife moved to a home on Edgewood Road. The couple had three children, who all grew up in the home and graduated from Kewaskum High School.

Reigle has been involved with the Kewaskum community for decades. He served on the Village Board for over 10 years and was village president from 1955 to 1963. He also served one term on the Kewaskum School Board.

Reigle was a member of the Kiwanis Club for more than 50 years. He still is a member of the American Legion, which he joined about 67 years ago.

For years, the 31 acres that is now being offered to the village, had been owned by Reigle and his neighbor, Dr. Charles Ogi. When they first purchased the land, it was not wooded.

Reigle recalls planting tiny sapling decades ago.

"It took three years for them to get out of the weeds so you could see that they were there," Reigle said.

The Reigle and Ogi families also stocked the spring-fed pond with fish and would canoe on the

water.

"It was like a park for us," Reigle said.

They put the land on the market a couple years ago, and last fall Reigle bought Ogi out. The estate now belongs to Reigle's three children and eight grandchildren.

The Village Perspective

For the last several years, the Kewaskum Village Board has heard about the shortage of athletic field space at Kiwanis Park.

A couple years ago, a Stakeholders Group was formed to try to find a solution, but was unsuccessful.

Village President Kevin Scheunemann thinks this offer is the answer.

"I think it's a great win for the community. This is an immensely generous gift from the Jim Reigle family," he said.

However, village trustees do not want to move forward with the plan unless it is something that residents want.

They are concerned about lost tax revenue from the property. For 2016, the property was taxed a total of \$11,377.86, according to tax records.

Still, there is an argument that if the land becomes a park, the village could benefit financially.

According to the American Planning Association, parks are a good financial investment for a community. They enhance property values, increase municipal revenue, bring in homebuyers and workers, and attract retirees, according to American Planning Association research.

"It is a 100 percent fact that quality parks and schools enhance property values and make people want to live in your community. Without those things, people will find someplace else that has

those amenities.," said Cook, who also works as park superintendent for Washington County.

Scheunemann agrees that green space can increase property values. And he thinks it is something families are looking for.

"The issue of baseball and soccer is huge among youth these days. There is a lot more participation in youth sports than there had been in the past, and we need to embrace that reality. That's why this issue would be huge in terms of amenities for the Village of Kewaskum," Scheunemann said.

The KAA baseball program has 329 participants in 4K through eighth grade. The KYSO, with members from kindergarten through eighth grade, has 230 young athletes involved in the fall league and 260 in the spring. KAA's 81 flag football players are also looking for additional field space.

The Reigle property is currently zoned single family residential. To build anything else on the land would require a change in zoning, which would warrant approval from the plan commission and the village board.

The rezoning would not occur until after the land would be legally transferred to the village.

That will not happen unless the board hears it is what the community wants.

"It is a priority of the board that the community embrace this effort," Village Administrator Matt Heiser said.

So the board will hold a special meeting on Wednesday, Sept. 6, inside the Annex building at 7 p.m.

The meeting will serve as a listening session, Scheunemann explained.

"This is a listening session for the board to hear

what the community has to say about the idea, the concept. We want to hear from the community if they want a park and whether they like the concept plan," Scheunemann said.

The public is encouraged to attend the meeting to find out details about the proposed park and to voice questions, concerns and opinions.

At the meeting, attendees will be required to state their name and their address. Each person will be allowed to speak for two minutes.

Written comments can also be submitted ahead of time or at the meeting itself. Any comments should include the person's name and their address. Comments can be dropped off at the Village Hall prior to the September 6 meeting.

The Village Board will make no formal decisions on September 6.

"We are not deciding anything that night, but the board will get its marching orders from the Townhall meeting," Scheunemann said.

CYCLING LOWERS HEALTH RISKS

Cycling is a good form of exercise and appears to reduce the risk of certain health issues. In a recent study, adults ages 50 to 65 who cycled 30 to 60 minutes a week had fewer heart attacks than non-cyclists during the 20-year study period. In other research on 24,000 people, average age 43, those who cycled to work had a lower risk of obesity, hypertension, prediabetes and high-triglycerides than non-cyclists. Another study of those who cycled 20 minutes a day showed that cycling lowered their risk of heart disease by 50%. Cycling also improves balance, builds muscle and is easy on the joints.

New Traffic Pattern And Parking Planned For High School And Middle School

The capital project involving the Kewaskum High School and Kewaskum Middle School will impact traffic flow and parking at both the middle and high schools during the 2017-18 school year as follows.

High School and Middle School Bus Drop-off

Johnson Bus will drop off high school students at KHS Door 2 (near the tennis courts) and then proceed to KMS Door 2 (east door) to drop off middle school students.

High School and Middle School Bus Pick-up

Johnson Bus will pick up all middle and high school students, at the end of the school day, along the bus lane located on the east side of the campus (between the middle and high schools).

Parent Traffic

Drop-off and pick-up at the middle school will be routed around a temporary parking lot outside of the middle school. Similar to previous years, parent traffic will be stopped by a staff member when the buses are ready to move. Drop-off and pick-up will be on the south side of the

temporary parking lot. Students will then utilize the crosswalk to enter/exit the middle school.

Drop-off and pick-up for high school students will remain the same as previous years, which is in front of the main high school entrance.

Student Parking

On-site student parking will be reduced during the 2017-18 school year. However, Regal Ware has graciously allowed the district to lease 100 spaces in its lot this year. These spaces will be marked and part of the KHS student purchased parking passes.

Parking in unauthorized spaces and other private lots may result in tickets issued by the Kewaskum Police Department, and owners of the lots do have the right to tow unauthorized vehicles.

Parking passes will be available on a first come/first serve basis for juniors and seniors beginning Monday, Aug. 21. A completed parking permit application and payment need to be turned in to the KHS office to obtain parking passes. Passes will become available to all remaining students beginning Monday, Aug. 28.

Off-site student parking

will be available on Reigle Drive and Wildlife Drive for student parking. Drivers should pay attention to where the curb is yellow - do not park in these areas. Students are encouraged to pull forward as they park to reduce the need for parallel parking and/or lost space.

In addition, free parking is available in the municipal parking lot.

Families are encouraged to plan ahead and to utilize the bus service as often as possible and/or share rides with friends/neighbors to reduce the number of vehicles needing to park in the area.

Progress Continues On Kewaskum School District Building Project

Kewaskum High School's "700 wing" which was located along the north side of the school, is now gone.

Construction workers recently finished removing that wing as part of the Kewaskum School District's capital project. The space where the wing was once located will become incorporated into a courtyard which will be situated between the high school and a brand new middle school.

Plans are to equip the new courtyard with lighting and electrical utilities, as well as seating. It will feature a theater-in-the-round, which can be used for instruction, as well as outdoor concerts. There also will be green space in the approximate 10,000-square foot courtyard that agriculture students can use to plant gardens.

"We are very much hoping to make it a very useful learning environment. It's not just going to be a courtyard that sits with a lawnmower in it and somebody mows the grass once a week. No, we are going to try to utilize that the best that we can,"

Superintendent James Smasal said.

Although the new two-story middle school will be attached to the high school, it will be a completely separate school. Students at both schools will be able to share music and technical education spaces, but each school will maintain its own identity.

Color schemes inside the two buildings will help differentiate between the two. The color palette will include varying shades of green, gray, beige and white. Colors inside the two schools will complement each other, yet be distinct.

The same paint colors were used on some classroom walls at the i4Learning Community School when some repairs were done this summer.

Last fall, voters approved a \$28.42 million building project for site improvements, new construction, renovation and modernization of Kewaskum Middle School and Kewaskum High School.

Drawings of the new middle school buildings were released in June, and the district has been

receiving positive feedback about the renderings, Smasal said.

Between now and the end of September, the interior aspects of the plan will continue to be tweaked. However, the footprint of the outside building design is pretty much final, Smasal said.

The district is currently in the process of applying for permits, and new construction cannot begin until approval has been received from the village, state and the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

Once the permits have been granted, the district can start the bidding process, and then new construction on the new middle school building can begin.

The first day of school will be Tuesday, Sept. 5, with students attending the current middle school and high school, just as they did last year. There will be enough classroom space to accommodate all the students, even with the 700 wing gone.

The plan is to construct the new middle school during the school year.

In order to allow enough time to finish the project by fall 2018, the district reconstructed this year's school calendar so that students will be released on Friday, May 25 before Memorial Day. Instruction at both the high school and the middle school will

begin at 7:35 a.m., which is five minutes earlier than last year.

The entire high school will be closed during the summer as the HVAC system, electrical, wiring and all the utilities are updated.

The Board of Education would like to enhance the exterior of the school as well. If funds are available through the district's regular budget or donated funds, the board has said that it would like to replace the metal siding on the west and sides of the school with brick to match the rest of the building. In addition, school board members would like to redo the front entrance of the high school to make it more inviting, possibly enhancing it with a canopy.

Those are both items that the district's Long Range Planning Committee had identified as needs while studying the school facilities last year.

The entire process thus far has been going smoothly, Smasal said. He attributes that largely to the people working on the project.

"We are really fortunate to have the people in place the way they are. C.D. Smith and Bray have been great partners," Smasal said about the construction company and architect that are working on the project.

"I don't know where we'd be without Doug Franzen, our buildings and grounds director. He used to work for C.D. Smith, so he understands this process, where nobody else in the district does. He's been invaluable," Smasal added.

There are different ways that we deal with snoring. There are several appliances that we use to combat that sleep depriving problem. Most reposition the lower jaw forward by attaching to the upper and lower teeth and have elastic straps that pull the lower jaw forward with the tongue along for the ride.

With the tongue out of the way, the airway is not blocked. This extra room in the airway usually pre-

vents the snoring and makes sleeping quieter and more restful. Another device attaches to the tongue and pulls it forward with suction. No attachment to the teeth at all.

Sleep apnea is another problem altogether. CPAP machines are the usual remedy for that and sometimes used in conjunction with dental appliances. A visit to your dentist will help determine which way to turn for help.

Indians Reload With Steger Securing The Quarterback Position

Competition was expected at quarterback in Kewaskum High's pre-season football camp this year, but fans may be surprised who will start at that position for the opener at Milwaukee Lutheran this Friday night (August 18).

Senior Tony Steger, one of the fastest and more elusive veterans, showed in last week's scrimmage with New Berlin Eisenhower, Sheboygan Falls and host Nicolet he is a natural at the position. Although he never played there — last year he was a standout wingback — Steger directed the Indians' offensive attack against the three schools with poise and confidence.

"He did a very nice job ... getting better every day." KHS coach Jason Piittmann said about Steger, a six-foot, 185-pound senior.

Piittmann said the coaches talked last spring and during the summer contact days about moving Steger. "It will possibly give us our most versatile player at the position," Piittmann said, and, "It allows Gabe (Christenson) to play some on defense too."

Christenson, a six-foot-one-inch, 190-pound senior, also saw action at the quarterback position in the scrimmage and will back up Steger while starting at wide receiver. The team had expected one junior to also be a backup quarterback but he didn't come out for the sport this year.

Back to the scrimmage, Piittmann said, "We got to see some good things. We got to see some not-so-good things," indicating there are areas where improvement is needed.

Kewaskum has a dozen returning letter winners, including Steger, Christenson, and powerful fullback/linebacker Patrick Krier, who carries 205 pounds on his five-foot-eight-inch frame and really packs a punch when he gets a head of steam.

In the line, there are a couple key tackles returning, namely 290-pound senior Riley Donovan and

six-foot-three-inch, 280-pound junior Jon Leister.

While it will be difficult to replace six-foot-five-inch end Brady Hanson, who hauled in 38 passes for 749 yards and eight touchdowns a year ago, Piittmann lists wide receiver as a position where he has a lot of depth, with Cole Surprenant (Sr., six-foot, 190), Dan Kreis (Sr., five-foot-11-inches, 175) and Cade Peterson (Sr., six-foot-1-inch, 180) all expected to play a lot. In the scrimmage, Christenson had several touchdown catches, and the rest showed they can get open, especially when the defenders converged on Steger.

In 2016, Surprenant rushed for 862 yards and Krier added 437 yards in the team's 12 games.

Peterson will start his third season as kicker and punter. A year ago, he made 38 of 41 PATs (point after touchdowns) and was successful on four of four field goal tries.

"That's one nice thing for sure, having our kicker back for another year," Piittmann said. "He's looking real good, too."

Turning to the defense, the Indians have Krier and Faton Elmazi (Sr. six-foot, 215) back as inside linebackers, but have to replace three in the defensive backfield with the graduation of Alex Vogt, Michael Boettcher and Brady.

Kreis is the lone veteran returnee, and the newcomers made some mistakes in the scrimmage, according to Piittmann, who said, "We got out of position too often, but it's fixable."

Steger was a strong return man on punts and kicks for the Indians a year ago, but Piittmann said he'll probably do just one this year. "We'll see how it goes."

Others who were reserves last year, along with other top candidates include: Tyler Degnitz (Sr., five-foot-nine-inch, 150) who returned some kick-offs last season; Shawn O'Keefe (Sr., five-foot-ten-inch, 200) who can play offense or defense in the

line; Brice Matthies (Sr., five-foot-eight-inch, 165), a running back; Jerod Otto (Sr., six-foot, 160), defensive back; Logan Goettl (Sr., five-foot-eight-inch, 170) line; Dylan Romaine (Sr., five-foot-eight-inch, 170), line; Colten Miller (Jr., six-foot-one-inch, 210) line; Dawson Fox (Sr., five-foot-ten-inch, 165) wide receiver/linebacker; William Walters (Sr., five-foot-11-inch, 200), line; and Lucas Christenson (Jr., five-foot-ten-inch, 190).

Concerning his team's strengths, Piittmann lists the same things he said a year ago — overall program success, along with the kicking game and experience at the skilled positions.

About the weaknesses, Piittmann said lack of experience in the line and depth at some positions. With just eight juniors out for the sport, varsity numbers are down slightly.

The same two schools, Berlin and Plymouth are listed as East Central Conference title contenders. "Berlin returns a bunch of talent ... a fast team," the veteran coach, starting his 14th season, said, adding Plymouth "always has good athletes" with plenty of speed.

Moving into the mix are

Winneconne and Ripon, which was a surprise team, especially defensively, a year ago.

About his own KHS team, Piittmann said, "I hope this team finishes in the top two or three in the conference." With a record of 126-33 and some schools with only 38-50 in their programs, freshman to seniors, the Indians are definitely in another title mix.

"It's a struggle right now," Piittmann said about numbers out for football in the other conference schools. "Right now, only us and Plymouth have enough for JV1 and JV2 teams," meaning he has to reach out to other schools to find games.

The Indians will open the 2017 campaign August 18 at Milwaukee Lutheran. He lists the following as offensive starters: center — Goettl; guards — juniors Lucas Christenson and Miller; tackles — Leister and Walters; ends/slot backs — Gabe Christenson, Kreis, Surprenant and Peterson; QB — Steger; running back — Krier.

On defense, it will be: line — Hunter Grady (Jr., 6-1, 190), or Miller, O'Keefe, and Leister; linebackers — Krier, Elmazi, Surprenant and either

Lucas Christenson, Eli Bartelt (Soph, 5-8, 160), or Reagan Dricken (Soph., 5-7, 180); defensive backs — Kreis, Gabe Christenson, Degnitz and Otto.

Donovan was not listed as a starter, and Piittmann said, "Riley has got to sit for a while," not elaborating further on the situation.

This year, Piittmann welcomed Jake Wirth and Chris Nesemann to his 10-

man staff. Other regulars returning are Jason Last and Nick Kreif, assistant head coaches; along with volunteer coaches Bryon Vandlen, Josh Towner and Josh O'Brien Flasch. Bobby Bannasch, Tim Rohlinger and Dennis Butz.

Kewaskum's first EC opponent is Campbellsport on September 1 in Kewaskum.

Will Peter Garcia's second year as Kewaskum High's head girls tennis coach be better than the first?

Garcia is confident it will be, and the reason is simple. He has practically the entire varsity team returning, plus he has a couple talented newcomers who factor into the picture.

"(Last year) We got off to a real slow start, winning only one of our first eight matches but came on at the end, winning four of the last five matches to finished tied with Waupun for fifth place in the conference," Garcia said. When practice opened a week ago, an "older squad" appeared, with eight returning letter winners, including five seniors two juniors and one sophomore.

The five senior "K" winners include Sydney Donath, Brandi Geldnich, Ariahna Grossenbacher, Kallie Hoeft and Amanda Krolski. They are joined by veteran juniors Grace Marcello and Hannah Preder and sophomore Megan Krolski.

"We might not have that one 'super star' who has been receiving coaching since they were 10 or 11 years old but we have a group of hard working young ladies that are a coach's dream," Garcia said, adding all of the girls started their tennis careers at KHS but "come to prac-

tice each day, willing to take instruction and to work hard at being the best they can be. They also try to have a lot of fun on their journey."

While it is still early and rain has already interrupted one of the team's practice, Garcia said it looks Preder, Marchello and the two Krolski sisters will battle it out for the varsity singles positions while Grossenbacher and Geldnich seem to have a lock on Number 1 doubles, while Hoeft and Donath are the frontrunners to be at Number 2 doubles.

Racers Shine In PDTR Action

On a night when Plymouth Dirt Track Racing honored the best drivers who have ever strapped into a race car at the venerable Plymouth track, the stars of today treated fans to thrilling finishes and side-by-side racing action as PDTR presented its annual Past Champions Night program Saturday, Aug. 12, at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds.

In the Sprint Car 25-lap headliner Danny Schlafer pulled off a last-lap pass to claim his third A-main triumph of the 2017 season. Likewise, Justin Schmidt of Cleveland executed a final-lap pass of his own to win his first PDTR Late Model A-main event of the year. Former PDTR Grand National champion Mark Fieber of Cascade notched his second main event victory of the season, while J.J. Walvoord of Sheboygan (B Mod) and Preston Ruh of Elkhart Lake (Micro Sprint) each picked up their first career A-main victories in their

respective divisions. Will Gerrits of Waupun jumped out the lead with a low move in turn four of the opening lap. Gerrits held down the top spot while Boltonville's Bill Taylor, who started on the pole, road the high groove to pressure the lead on lap six.

The first of five caution flags appeared on lap seven when Tyler Brabant of Waupun spun in turn four. Two more caution periods ensued before another green flag lap was completed. The first came when Taylor and 2008 PDTR Sprint Car champion Lance Fassbender of Burnett collided in turn two, and the second appeared for debris in turn one.

When green flag action resumed, 2010 PDTR Sprint Car champ Kurt Davis of South Milwaukee, who started fifth, used the high line to take second. One lap later, Davis charged around Gerrits to assume the top spot.

Meanwhile, two-time PDTR Sprint Car champion

Danny Schlafer powered up from his 11th starting spot to take third on lap nine. After the fourth caution of the race came out for Jeremy Hunt's spin in turn four, Schlafer flexed his muscle to sweep past Gerrits and Davis to take over the lead on lap 11.

Schlafer and Davis each rode the high groove over the second half of the race with Davis staying within five car lengths as the leaders worked through lapped traffic starting on lap 16.

Just as Schlafer appeared set to cruise to the victory the fifth and final caution flag was displayed on lap 23 when Shane Wenninger of Kewaskum and Waupun's Tim Haddy made contact in turn three.

That set up a mad two lap dash to the finish between the two winningest drivers in the history of the Midwest Sprint Car Association. After a single-file restart, Davis used the high groove in turns one and two to set up a slide job in turns three

and four, which vaulted him past Schlafer into the lead on lap 24.

However, Schlafer was not to be denied as he ducked under Davis in turns one and two and slid in front of Davis in turn four of the final lap to post his third PDTR Sprint Car victory of the season, 19th career A-main PDTR Sprint Car triumph and 48th MSA A-main victory of his career. Davis finished second by just a car length, point leader Brandon McMullen of Oshkosh, who started seventh, finished third, 10th starter Justin Miller of Plymouth placed fourth and Dannon Tessmer of Slinger rounded out the top five after starting eighth.

The next Plymouth Dirt Track racing program on Saturday, Aug. 19 will feature Race Against Cancer Night with a special appearance by Pink Heals of Sheboygan County and the organization's pink fire truck. Racing will begin at 6 p.m.

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Learn About And View Solar Eclipse At UW-WC

Dr. Swapnil Tripathi, Associate Professor of Astronomy and Physics at UW-Washington County is excited about the upcoming total solar eclipse – perhaps the biggest celestial event of the decade. Tripathi invites anyone interested in learning more about the eclipse to attend a free lecture at the campus on Monday, August 21 at 11:30 a.m. in room 305. After the one-hour lecture, Professor Tripathi will set up a telescope to observe the eclipse in the campus courtyard. This will be available until 2pm. Solar eclipse shades will also be available. No reservations are needed and admission is free.

According to Tripathi, “solar eclipses are great opportunities to study the outer layers of the sun, such as the corona.” He noted that Einstein’s theory of relativity was confirmed during a total solar eclipse that happened almost 100 years ago – on May 29,

1919. In addition, he explained that universities across the U.S. will be participating in a large scientific experiment - measuring temperatures just before, during and after the eclipse. These temperatures will be uploaded to the internet in an effort to compile data about temperature changes in the weather on the passing of the eclipse.

On Saturday, August 19, the public is also welcome to attend a talk that Professor Tripathi will be giving to a Cub Scout troop at the Oscar Grady library in Saukville at 10:30 a.m.

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

All of the counties sent a response in writing except for Ozaukee County. The Washington County leaders were scheduled to meet with Ozaukee County officials this Thursday.

"All of the counties have alluded to their interest in partnering, and all of them have also said they don't have the time or money to spend on LGI, and want to keep conversations going outside of that Local Government Institute process," Schoemann said.

Schoemann also is coordinating official meetings with Waukesha

County to keep that dialog going.

Washington County has already merged health departments with Ozaukee County. It also shares a medical examiner with Waukesha and Walworth counties.

"I think especially with Waukesha and Ozaukee, we have great partnerships built there already. Hearing their enthusiasm to continue building upon what already exists, I think is a good thing for everybody. I'm very optimistic," Schoemann said.


