## New Member Appointed To Library Board

The Kewaskum Village Board unanimously accepted the resignation of Margaret “Mugs” McFadden Monday night and named Juli Hesse as her replacement on the board.

McFadden, who had been serving as the library board president, signed a resignation letter at the request of Village President Kevin Scheunemann on October 3.

Scheunemann also had requested the resignation of Connie Zemlicka, who declined to resign and wanted to present her case to the Village Board. Zemlicka was not on Monday night’s agenda, but is expected to appear on the November 6 Village Board agenda.

Emily Goad, who is the director of the Kewaskum Public Library, does not want Zemlicka removed.

“Connie Zemlicka has been an integral part of the library board since I began. She has provided insight, is very knowledgeable and very respected in terms of the community, and has been invaluable as the treasurer of the board,”

Goad said. “I believe strongly that Connie is an integral member of the Library Board and should retain her position.”

In Wisconsin, a village president can remove anyone from the library board and does not need to give a reason. A village president also has the authority to appoint members to the municipal library board, with approval of the Village Board.

Scheunemann recommended Hesse, who was not at Monday night’s meeting, for the library board.

Hesse helps manage the library at St. Lucas Evangelical Lutheran Church, where Scheunemann attends.

“She has a very big passion for library issues. I am enthusiastically recommending her approval to the library board,” Scheunemann told village trustees.

Before village trustees voted on Hesse’s appointment Monday, Village Administrator Matt Heiser informed trustees that a library board member had contacted him regarding the appointment.

## Reigle Family Park Created –Village Of Kewaskum Gets New Park

The Reigle Family Park was officially created in the Village of Kewaskum on Thursday, Oct. 12.

The James D. Reigle family donated 31 acres of undeveloped land located

off Edgewood Road to the village to serve as the new park. The land is assessed at \$649,000.

“We are extremely grateful for the generous donation by the entire Reigle family. This is a gift that will benefit generations to come,” said Nathan Scheel, president of the Kewaskum Athletic Association (KAA).

The process of gaining a new park began last April after Jim Reigle read about the need for more athletic fields for youth sports. The Reigle family subsequently agreed to donate the land to the village.

Village President Kevin Scheunemann completed the process of accepting the land for the new park

on behalf of the village by signing paperwork last Thursday at the Schloemer Law Firm in West Bend.

Members of the Reigle family were present at the signing, as well as Dr. Charles and Donna Ogi, who had previously owned the land along with Jim and Patty Reigle.

## XYZ Card Club Celebrates 50 Years Of Playing Sheepshead

For the past 50 years, members of the XYZ card club have been getting together on Wednesday mornings and playing Sheepshead in Kewaskum.

“It is a nice group of people,” said 91-year-old Eileen Petri, who has been a member of the card club for 30 years.

The XYZ Club was organized on October 11,

1967, by the Rev. Schowalter, who was pastor of Peace Church at the time. The group started out meeting in the Peace Church basement.

The name XYZ stands for “Extra Years of Zest.”

It is a name that still rings true. Currently, five of the 54 members are in their 90s. Senior members include: Ann Thill (99), Fern Kreif (93), Marvin Marquardt (90), Bernice Yogerst (94) and Eileen

Petri (91).

Regardless of age, all the players remain sharp card players.

Most of the XYZ card players have been playing Sheepshead since they were children.

“It was a game we always had around the house,” explained Gus Muencho, who has been playing Sheepshead since he was about 10.

# Continued From... Reigle Family Park Created

The youth of the community were also represented at the closing through an oversized thank-you card. Hundreds of young athletes who currently participate in youth sports had signed a poster board that was presented to the Reigle family.

Thursday evening, just hours after the land became village property, the village's Plan Commission held a public hearing regarding rezoning the land from residential to be used for park and recreational purposes.

One person, Dan Fischer, who represented the prairie Gardens Condo Association, spoke at the hearing.

"We are certainly in favor of the park and looking forward to having a park on our end of town. We are definitely for it," Fischer said.

The statement echoed what hundreds of people had said about the park during a Townhall meeting that was held on September 6.

The village's Plan Commission unanimously recommended that the land be rezoned park and recreation.

On Monday night, the Village Board unanimously approved rezoning the land.

The plan is for the Kewaskum KAA and Kewaskum Youth Soccer

Organization (KYSO) to develop and maintain the new park.

A final lease agreement between the village and the KAA and KYSO still needs to be developed. Still, on Monday night, the Village Board gave the KAA and KYSO the go-ahead to begin harvesting trees on the land.

KAA and KYSO have not yet decided on a logging company.

Village trustees requested that they could walk the through the park to see how many trees will be cut along the park's borders. Community members are also welcome to walk the property, Scheunemann said.

# Washington County Sheriff's Office Seeks Assistance

As part of an on-going investigation the Washington County Sheriff's Office is seeking public assistance to identify a suspect involved in an armed robbery that occurred in the 1600 block of Friess Lake Road in the Village of Richfield on September 29 at about 1:30 p.m.

The investigation revealed the victim, a 30-year-old City of Fond du Lac man, was driving in the area and approached a man to ask him directions to a local park. According to the victim, the pedestrian pulled out a handgun and demanded money.

The pedestrian was described at a white male,

about 230 pounds, husky build and about 5 feet 10

inches to 5 feet 11 inches, medium skin tone, with a white beard and short white hair slightly sticking out of deep blue baseball style hat. No known tattoos or scars were showing. The subject was wearing a camo-style jacket with half zip.

One of the unique features was that the victim was unsure of eye color and shape because the subject blinked a lot.

# Jackson Fire Department Hosts Emergency Response Fire Training

The Jackson Fire Department, in partnership with the Wisconsin Propane Education & Research Council (WiPERC), is hosting an emergency response, live propane fire training on Monday, Oct. 23 at 6 p.m. Approximately 40-50 fire fighters from the Jackson Fire Department and surrounding areas are expected to attend. At times during the training, area residents may see flames shooting 20 feet or more into the air. Local media are welcome to watch.

The training consists of classroom instruction on the physical properties of propane and a hands-on portion that includes five

fire scenarios including a grill, forklift, bulk tank, and propane terminal piping props. All hands-on training is overseen by Wisconsin certified fire instructors, FIRE LLC and is conducted in accordance with NFPA 1403. The Jackson Fire Department is providing local coordination and the location for the training. The WiPERC estimates the value of this training is \$4,000 to \$5,000 depending on the size of the group trained and the number of trainers required.

Propane will be provided by Boehlke Bottled Gas who is a member of the Wisconsin Propane Gas Association and partici-

pates in the propane industry check-off program, which provides the funding for this training.

The Wisconsin Propane Education & Research Council is the education foundation of the Wisconsin Propane Gas Association (WPGA).

The training will be held at the Jackson Fire Department located at W204 N16722 S. Jackson Drive in the Village of Jackson.

## WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

### Semi-Tanker Trailer Fire

The Allenton Fire Department and the Washington County Sheriff's Office responded to a semi-tanker trailer on fire on October 16 at 5:10 a.m. on Interstate 41 near State Highway 33.

The driver of the semi, a 54-year-old Saginaw, Michigan, man, observed a "bright flash" and then flames coming from the rear trailer tires. The driver pulled over and attempted to extinguish the flames but was unable to do so. Allenton Fire Department arrived and extinguished the fire. It was determined the tanker was filled with wax.

Portions of Interstate 41 were closed for approximately 1.5 hours to facilitate fire department and clean-up operations.

### Theft

The Sheriff's Office is currently investigating the illegal entry into about a dozen cars in the northwestern portion of the Town of Polk that occurred on October 13.

These incidents are directly related to a stolen vehicle from the City of West Allis that was recovered near one of the scenes. Another vehicle, a white 2014 Toyota Rav 4, was then taken from another residence in the Town of Polk and has yet to be recovered.

The Sheriff's Office was notified at 4:20 a.m. of a possible theft in progress on Lakeview Circle in the Town of Polk. Deputies immediately responded to the area along with police officers from the Village of Slinger acting under mutual aid.

Additional resources responded to the area after the stolen car from West Allis was located abandoned and the actors were thought to be on foot. It was later determined the actors fled the area after stealing the Toyota from a nearby residence prior to law enforcement arrival.

During the subsequent investigation numerous other property owners from Lakeview Circle, Keeley Drive, Edgewood Drive and Rolling Hills

Road reported entry to their vehicles. It is believed a majority of the vehicles were unlocked at the time of the thefts.

The Sheriff's Office would like to remind individuals to keep vehicles locked and refrain from keeping valuables inside vehicles to minimize crimes of opportunity.

The Sheriff's Office continues to investigate.

### Speeding Case

On October 8 at 11:55 p.m. a deputy was conducting traffic enforcement on Interstate 41 in the area of County Trunk K when he observed a southbound vehicle proceed by him at 104 mph. The driver, later identified as a 17-year-old City of Milwaukee male juvenile, then increased speed and began to elude. Another deputy was able to lock in the radar at 119 mph south of the initial location. Upon seeing the second squad car, the driver decided to pull over.

The driver was arrested for outstanding warrants and felony eluding. He also received citations for speed and no valid license.

### Bail Jumping Arrest

On October 8 at 2:35 a.m., a 25-year-old Random Lake man accidentally dialed 911 while at a tavern in the Town of Farmington. He was overheard by dispatchers talking on the 911 line with a group of other people stating that he could not "see straight" and was not able to safely drive a car.

Dispatchers also heard him state he was looking for his keys. Deputies were able to identify the establishment at 2:55 a.m. and observed seven people inside the bar after-hours.

Contact was made and the caller was arrested for bail jumping. He is currently out on bond for second offense drunk driving with a condition of absolute sobriety; a preliminary breath yielded a result of 0.22.

Another patron, a 61-year-old City of Milwaukee man, was on parole for a previous cocaine charge and was taken into custody for violating his rules. The bartender, a 33-year-old Fredonia man, was cited for afterhours operation of a licensed premises.





The article explained that the Kewaskum Athletic Association (KAA) and Kewaskum Youth Soccer Organization (KYSO) were considering purchasing property outside the village to build athletic fields to meet the needs of 761 young athletes involved in their programs.

That article inspired Jim Reigle, and as a result, his family donated 31 acres of land to serve as a village park. As we have reported in recent editions, the land is assessed at \$649,000 and is located off Edgewood Road in Kewaskum. About 160 village residents attended a special Townhall meeting hosted by the Village Board on September 6 and voiced their support for the new park.

The Reigle family donation is a huge seed for the youth of the Kewaskum community. It is something

that the KAA and KYSO will be responsible for developing and maintaining. They are now beginning a fundraising campaign where others can sow "seeds" for the new park.

I am so very proud that this paper played a role in the development of this park. It was Anne Trautner's article on April 27 that was the very first "seed" that Mr. Reigle noticed in the process for the land to be donated. The article has made real, tangible, and a positive difference in Kewaskum by helping connect the right people to get a new park. The *Kewaskum Statesman* is a special asset to the Kewaskum community. It is our hope that the *Statesman* will grow and prosper, along with the new park and people of the Kewaskum area.

## Continued From... New Member Appointed To Library Board

"I did have a library board member approach me today to express that they would like the library board to discuss any potential additions or appointments to their body," Heiser said.

"My door has always been open to library director or Library Board members suggesting possible appointments. I have not received any suggestions yet from either source. I would love to hear any recommendations for new members for any appointed governing body at any time," Scheunemann said.

According to Scheunemann, the change in the library board stems from the fact that McFadden and Zemlicka had served on both the library board and the Library Foundation board, posing a potential conflict of interest.

The Kewaskum Public Library Foundation, Inc., was formed in 2013 to raise funds for the library. Since its inception, the foundation has included a minimum of two library board members, until now.

Two library board members are allowed to serve on the Foundation board, but the village attorney recommended having no more than one overlapping position, according to Heiser.

McFadden, who served on the Kewaskum Library Board for 21 years, continues to serve on the Washington County Library Services Board and the Monarch Library System Board.

Zemlicka has been on the Kewaskum Library Board for at least 15 years.

"Connie has been a supporter of the library for so long, not only as a board member, but as a Kewaskum resident. She served as a teacher in Kewaskum for many years, she's vital to the KEYS scholarship fund and is very active in her church. Her husband, Howard, built the beautiful Little Library that is in front of the Kewaskum Public Library," Goad said.

Zemlicka's participation in the Library Foundation has been integral to the Kewaskum Public Library's future, according to Goad.

In 2013, the Library Foundation, Inc., purchased the property just to the east of the library in order to expand the facility. The foundation still owns that land.

"Connie has worked hard as a Foundation member to help the library in getting the land we needed to expand," Goad said.



# Second Half Scoring Spree Lifts KHS Soccer Team

After a scoreless first half, the Kewaskum High soccer team turned up the heat on Campbellsport, getting three goals in a 15-minute span to defeat the Cougars 3-1 in an East Central tournament finale on October 12.

This victory was especially important because it was the Indians' seventh of the year, a milestone for the program.

"They just tied the record for the most wins recorded ever," KHS coach John Kenworthy said about the Indian's 7-12-3 mark.

"Because we lost our top scorer (to a suspension), we had to have every single guy (attacker) get at least five shots," Kenworthy said about an unwritten rule where 10 shots usually equate to at least one goal.

"It's pretty ironic, the first guy to get five shots (tonight) was Matthew (Krautkramer), and he got the first goal," Kenworthy stated. "The second guy to get five shots was Isaiah (Cochran), and he got the second goal ... It worked out pretty well."

Those two goals came at 67:02 and 77:02, giving

the Indians a comfortable 2-0 advantage, and they stretched it to three when Krautkramer came up with an acrobatic header for the third at 82:19.

"Yes, I headed it. I got a cross from Hunter Schmitt," Krautkramer said. "I was coming through toward the goal ... I had plenty of momentum."

"I've never had two goals in a game. This is a first," the junior midfielder went on, and the timing couldn't have been better since Campbellsport is one of Kewaskum's biggest rivals.

"I can't take Matt out (of the game). He plays 90 minutes. I know some times he's very tired, but he still gets after it," Kenworthy said.

Cochran, perhaps the fastest man on the field, put a lot of pressure on the Cougars with that speed and got his goal with the assist also coming from Schmitt. On the first goal, it was Will Jens assisting.

Campbellsport may have had more offensive chances in the first half, thanks to the efforts of Peyton Feucht (Number 4), Hunter Jandre (Number 7) and Mason Manninen (Number 23),

but with KHS defenders Tanner Jacak and Gavin Curtain steadying the ship, the Cougars were unable to score.

"We played the first half like we have been playing in first halves," Kenworthy said. "We struggled to get our pace."

All that changed after the break. Kewaskum began to go on the attack. "We had better looks. We had better touches. We had more chances to score," the coach said.

Kewaskum had 21 shots on goal, about twice the amount the Cougars had. KHS keeper Brenden Rice came up with two spectacular, leaping saves late in the game when he used every inch of his six-foot-three-inch frame to jump and tap the ball over the net.

Seconds later, at 88:21, Dylan Hundertmark's shot (assist to Hunter Jandre) beat Rice to break up his shutout bid.

"I just have to react to the ball and do the best I can," Rice said. "I was hoping for the shutout, but

I'm still happy with the outcome, and I'm looking forward to next season."

While the regular season is finished, the Number 16 seeded Indians started the Division-2 tournament with a lead-in game against Number 17 Martin Luther on October 17. "It's a chance for redemption," Kenworthy said, referring to the fact the Indians lost to Martin Luther back on August 28. If the Indians win, they play defending state champion Delavan-Darien this afternoon (October 19).

On October 10, the Indians lost a hard-fought 1-0 decision to Winneconne after losing to the Wolves 4-3 early in the year.

"The Winneconne game was real interesting," Kenworthy said, reporting Wolves' scoring ace Tomas Pazos scored in the first minute and 89 minutes later, the score was still 1-0.

"We played a super game," he went on, but the Indians couldn't come up with that tying goal.



# A Perfect Way To Finish Off The Season

This plot was determined practically before the story began.

The Kewaskum High football team exploded for 22 points in the first quarter and another 22 in the second en route to a 58-14 whipping of Waupun, giving the Indians a perfect 7-0 mark in the East Central Conference and a 9-0 in the regular season.

"We got rolling early and just kept rolling," KHS coach Jason Piittmann said about the game and winning the EC crown outright. A year ago, the race ended in a three-way tie for first, including the Indians, Berlin and Plymouth.

Quite simply, the Indians had way too much firepower for the Warriors, who had a new coach and a lot of injuries this fall.

"They had lost a couple more kids," Piittmann said, reporting two starters were out because of recent concussions, another because of an injury and one who was ejected from the Campbellsport game and by rule had to sit out a game.

The usual cast of characters, Tony Steger, Patrick Krier, and Cole Surprenant took scoring bows for Kewaskum. Steger, the senior quarterback/running back scored three times, rushing for 119 yards in 13 carries and completing eight of 14 passes for 204 yards and one touchdown.

"Tony had another solid night," Piittmann said.

The only thing Steger didn't do in this game was catch a pass, and that may have been because tight end/passing quarterback Gabe Christenson did not play in this game.

"Gabe has got a turf toe thing going on ... not a big deal," Piittmann said, indicating he will be ready for the first playoff game.

With his 119 yards rushing, Steger surpassed the 1,000-yard mark for the season. He has 1,098 yards for the season rushing, another 855 passing and 277 more in receiving yards for a total of 2,230. Throw in another 20 on four punt returns and 30 on one kickoff return, and he is at 2,280.

The sure-handed Surprenant got the Indians' second touchdown on a 58-yard bomb, while Krier, who had limited carries, gave the Indians a 29-0 lead just 2:09 into the second quarter on a three-yard burst.

Making his scoring debut was sophomore J.J. Thull — you remember his older brother, Brandon, currently on the South Dakota team — who opened the scoring in the first quarter with a 49-yard scamper and finished off the night with a 29-yard touchdown run with 2:50 left into the contest.

The defense also got in the scoring act. Senior Jerod Otto picked off a Reece Homan pass in the second quarter and turned it into a "pick six" going 29 yards for his first varsity touchdown.

"Our d-backs did a nice

job," especially considering how the Warriors like to throw the ball, Piittmann said, adding, "Waupun got very little going with the run game."

The leading KHS tacklers were Eli Bartelt with seven and one forced fumble and Krier with six.

The start of the second half was run with a continuous clock as the Indians were up 44-0 at intermission. "In the second half, we played a lot of our backups, but when they got it under 35 (points), we went back to the regulars," Piittmann said.

The Warriors got a pair of touchdowns in the third quarter, the first on a 55-yard pass from Homan to Benet Veleke and the other on a 47-yarder to Blakely Wiesman.

The two kickers had perfect nights, with Cade Peterson going 6x6 in point after touchdowns (PATs) to end the regular season with a mark of 31x32 (97 percent). The Warriors' Carson Bresser was 2x2.

Kewaskum begins its 13th straight playoff season this Friday night (October 21), hosting New London. See separate story.

Level 2 has the Kewaskum-New London winner facing the winner of Green Bay Notre Dame against Luxemburg-Casco on October 27.




## "Prey" For The "Saints"



## Reck Is King Of The Hill In EC Cross Country

Although Kewaskum High was far back in the final team standings, its standout, Justin Reck, turned in an amazing performance to win top individual honors in the East Central Conference Cross Country Meet held on October 14 at the Fond du Lac County Park.

After finishing 13th a year ago, Reck was determined his senior season would be better, and it has been. He toured the wet and somewhat slippery 5,000 meter course in a time of 17 minutes and 21.97 seconds (17:21.97), beating Waupun's Bailey Bille (17:31.96) by a full 10 seconds.

"I'm real happy for him. He ran a very smart race," KHS coach Kris Evans said about Reck's efforts, which may have made history at the school as unofficially no other KHS runner has ever finished first.

"It was a rainy day. He made the best of the situation," Evans went on, reporting Reck "ran with the pack for the first mile, and then he took off ... The fact he put up the time he did is just great."

Previously, Reck had won three races this sea-

son. With this one under his belt, he has plenty of momentum going into the Division-2 sectional, which will be held Saturday at Winneconne.

"I really want that kid to get in the 18s," Evans said of Toth.

The Lady Indians placed sixth as a team, scoring

142 points. Plymouth led the field with 46 points, while Winneconne was next at 65.

Once again, junior Maela Olla led the KHS runners, finishing in fifth place with a time of 21:03.95. All season long Olla's goal has been to dip under 21 minutes and had the weather been better Saturday, she may have reached that goal.

"I think Maela's still got more in her," Evans said about his Number 1 runner, who made first-team all conference.

Evans was also pleased with Number 2 Alyssa Butz as she placed 10th in 21:30.79, good enough for second-team honors. "I think she's got a future on this team," Evans said. "She loves to run."

The other KHS counters were Emma Penfield, who finished 36th with a personal best time of

23:30.03; Courtney Zarda, 40th with a 23:57.68; and Erika Bolek, 51st in 25:56.84

Both Indian teams will be the Lake Breeze Golf Club in Winneconne on Saturday, Oct. 21 for a Division-2 sectional. The top two teams and top five individuals not from those teams advance to the WIAA State Cross Country Meet in Wisconsin Rapids on November 4.

It was a pretty good bet the Kettle Moraine Lutheran Charger volleyball players would win Saturday's East Central Tournament and the EC crown, and they did, topping Ripon (2-0), Winneconne (3-0) and Plymouth (3-0) for a perfect 10-0 mark for the season.

The real battle came for the runner-up spot as Kewaskum, Plymouth and Winneconne all entered the October 14 tournament with 5-2 records. After the dust settled, Plymouth managed second after a marathon battle with Kewaskum, losing the first two sets to the Indians 21-25 and 26-28 before rallying for three straight wins, 25-20, 26-24 and 15-13.

Still, it has been an amazing run for the

Indians this fall. Getting third place — and posting a tournament win over Winneconne, which had beaten them early in the season — was quite an accomplishment after finishing in seventh place a season ago with a 3-11 EC record.

"Plymouth, Winneconne and ourselves came into the day tied for second. Our match against Plymouth came down to two points," KHS coach Laine Leitzke said. "It is something we let get away, and I did not do enough to help our team pull past Plymouth. Their offense did very well and we did not adjust well; combined with some tentative play, we just could not put them away."

Looking at the bracket for the Plymouth Division-2 regional, it's very likely the Indians will play Plymouth again in the sec-

ond round. If Number 4 seed Kewaskum, 24-9 overall, beat Number 13 seed Brown Deer on October 17 and Number 5 seed Plymouth got past Number 12 seed Port Washington, the two teams will meet tonight (October 19) in Kewaskum.

The winner of that match will then play top-seeded Kettle Moraine Lutheran on October 21.

Leitzke went on that, "After the lunch-break, we played Winneconne which was for third and fourth in the conference, and we played very well. As a coach, that is the response you are looking for after a tough loss."

The scores of the match against Winneconne were 25-19, 25-11 and 25-12.

Kewaskum opened the tournament with a 25-12 and 26-24 victory over Waupun.

All the KHS specialists and its all-arounds showed up in the statistics for the day. Amanda Schaller and Morgan Kappler finished 1-2 in kills with 26 and 21, respectively, while Hailey Hasenberg came up with an incredible 48 digs and chipped in with five aces.

Then there was Elizabeth Lightner who had 17 kills and a team-

high eight blocks, while Sarah Butschlick had six aces, 41 assists and 21 digs, and Brellynn Scoles was credited with 19 kills, and a team-high eight aces.

Help came from Carolyn Stockhausen with her four blocks; Morgan Denlinger contributed 29 assists and 14 digs, and Holly Henck had 18 digs.

On October 12, the Indians ended their EC dual meet season on a high note with a 3-0 win over host Waupun behind scores of 25-17, 25-23 and 25-19.

After decades of being top dog in all the conferences they were in, the Warriors have plummeted to the cellar of the EC league.

"We knew it was going to be a tough match, since it was their Parent's Night and Senior Night," KHS coach Laine Leitzke said. "We got off to a good start in the first set and pulled away early. In the second, we fell 0-5 and 5-12 before we started to make a push. We got a late lead 23-19 but had problems closing them out."

Leitzke went on, "They worked a little bit harder on the defensive end than we did. We pushed through and got a big kill

Trappers can help improve the quality of Department of Natural Resources wolf population data by allowing us to collar incidentally captured wolves before they are released," said Nathan Libal, DNR wildlife biologist.

is an important part of the department's work with many stakeholders and partners to monitor the state's wolf population.



# UW System To Restructure UW Colleges And UW-Extension To Expand Access To Higher Education

UW System President Ray Cross announces he will propose merging UW Colleges with four-year UW institutions as part of a broader restructuring of UW Colleges and UW-Extension.

There are currently 13 two-year UW college campuses located statewide. Under his proposal, Cross will propose integrating UW College campuses into UW four-year institutions, effective July 1, 2018.

Cross will also propose assigning divisions within UW-Extension to UW-Madison and UW System Administration. The restructuring proposal will come before the Board of Regents in November seeking approval to proceed with implementation planning.

"Change often produces uncertainty, but we cannot be afraid to pursue needed reforms. We must restructure these two organizations given the state's demographic challenges, budgetary constraints, and the need for closer alignment between research and practice," said President Cross. "We want to leverage the strength of our four-year institutions at a time when overall enrollments at UW Colleges are declining. Our goal is to expand access and provide more educational opportunities for more students, while ensuring our faculty are appropriately organized and supported. We are committed to making the transition as smooth as possible for students, faculty, and staff."

"The dramatic demographic declines in this state are undeniable and we have been working hard to ensure the future viability and sustainability of our small campuses. I am optimistic about the potential of this new structure to keep student access and student success at the forefront," said Cathy Sandeen, chancellor for UW colleges and extension. "Our team has been enacting major change and transformation efforts for the past three years so we're well positioned to help lead a smooth transition upon Board approval. Our goal is to ensure the successful future for these campuses because we need more doors open wider to more people in this state than ever before."

#### Restructuring Objectives

- Maintaining and expanding access to higher education by offering more general education and upper-level courses at the integrated branch campuses

- Identify and reduce barriers to transferring credits within the UW System

- Maintain affordability by continuing current tuition levels at the branch campuses post-merger for general education courses

- Further standardize and regionalize administrative operations and services to more efficiently use resources

- Leverage resources and shared talent at our institutions to get more students into and through the educational pipeline, better aligning the university to meet Wisconsin's projected workforce needs

The proposed restructuring will allow the UW System to better address current and projected enrollment and financial challenges at the two-year institutions, while maintaining the important UW presence in local communities. Business and community leaders stressed the important economic and cultural role UW institutions play in their regions when providing feedback for the UW System's 2020FWD strategic framework.

Demographic trends indicate that current enrollment challenges are not likely to significantly improve in coming years.

"By 2040, nearly 95 percent of total population growth in Wisconsin will be age 65 and older, while those of working age 18-64 will increase a mere 0.4 percent. Our labor force growth will be flat, while the demand for an educated labor force is growing exponentially," said Cross. "We must plan for the future now and be increasingly bold in our efforts to get more students through the educational pipeline to help meet Wisconsin's needs. We must do this by improving access to higher education and keeping it affordable for students and families."

This proposal will help avoid closing any UW Colleges' campus while maintaining a university presence in these Wisconsin communities. UW Colleges Online will move to UW System Administration under the Continuing Education, Outreach and E-learning (CEOEL) umbrella.

#### UW-Extension

Under the proposed plan, UW-Extension Cooperative Extension (including Wisconsin 4-H) and the UW-Extension Conference Centers, would be moved to the state's land grant institution, UW-Madison. The integra-

tion of Cooperative Extension and Conference Centers with the state's land-grant institution is consistent with the practice in other states, including Illinois, Michigan, and Pennsylvania. It will also provide more opportunities to connect the important practical work of extension agents with the research enterprise at UW-Madison.

Other divisions of UW-Extension would be integrated within UW System Administration to continue their statewide role:

- Division of Business and Entrepreneurship (DBE)
- Broadcasting and Media Innovations (BAMI) including Wisconsin Public Television and Wisconsin Public Radio
- Continuing Education, Outreach and E-learning (CEOEL) including UW Flexible Option

## Continued From... XYZ Card Club Celebrates 50 Years Of Playing Sheephead

"It's not a game you come into later," agreed Mary Ciocarelli, who started playing when she was about 7.

Ann Thill, who is the group's oldest member, became more interested in the game when she was older, though.

"Once I was married, either you sat in the corner or you learned how to play Sheephead," Thill said.

Leon Schmidt remembers his dad teaching him the game when he was about 9 years old.

"It wasn't as much fun between just him and me, though," Schmidt admitted.

The XYZ Club currently meets on Wednesdays in the Kewaskum Municipal Building Annex.

The official start time is 8:15 a.m. on Wednesdays, but play begins as soon as there are five people at a table, which is usually around 8 a.m.

To prevent any cliques, players draw numbers each week to determine where they will sit.

"Otherwise you always get the same people at the same tables. We don't want that. It keeps everyone honest," said Reiny Follmann, who has served as the group's treasurer for the past 15 years.

When the XYZ Club started out five decades ago, members played with poker chips. Over the years, they graduated to playing with pennies. Now they play with nickels.

Each week, Petri brings a list of winners from each table to be published in the *Kewaskum Statesman*.

Sometimes players win with 25 cents. And sometimes winners rake in as much as \$3. Most don't keep track.

"I have won over \$2. And I have lost \$1.95, too," David Schaub proudly stated.

A bystander overheard that report and quickly joked that she knew that Schaub has lost more than that.

Joking is done as regularly as cards are thrown down. Although everyone

in the room is a card shark and likes to win, the joking keeps things lighthearted.

"My favorite part is nobody gets mad and says: Why did you play that? We don't have any of that," Follmann said.

"They get toned down pretty fast if they get too competitive," Athleen Butzke agreed.

The XYZ Club is always accepting new members.

The cost of joining the group is not much. There is a \$3 yearly fee to be a member. In addition, it costs members 50 cents to play.

The fees help to pay rent for the Annex, as well

as four dinners a year.

And occasionally members bring in extra things to the card table.

Sometimes they bring fruits or vegetables from their garden to share. Other times they arrive at the Annex with plants to share.

"If somebody is sick, we send a card or flowers," Ciocarelli said. "It's a really nice group, and everyone helps each other."
