Farmington Elementary Students Salute Veterans

Olivia and Evalyn Dourn were among the students at Farmington Elementary School who took part in an all-school assembly for Veterans Day on Monday, Nov. 13.

Along with the other students, the two sisters, who are in second grade and kindergarten, learned about "Taps," the American flag and the American Legion Honor Guard.

But the two siblings got a big surprise when they were called forward to greet a special guest.

Their father, Matt Dourn, who is a chief warrant officer in the Army National Guard, is currently stationed in the Virgin Islands. He made a surprise appearance during Monday's assembly through the use of FaceTime.

The Dourn girls, along with their little brothers Sawyer and Spencer, and their mother, Rebecca, were all there to see Matt Dourn's happy face illuminated on the gymnasium wall.

It was a familiar face for all of the students. Matt Dourn also works as a deputy for the Washington County Sheriff's Office. He is a liaison officer for the school, and walks through Farmington Elementary's hallways every day.

"Hi, Mr. Dourn!" all the students called out as they waved when they saw the special guest.

"He is a real staple of the community here," Principal Jacob Flood explained.

Matt Dourn, who was the USO Hero of the Year in Wisconsin, is a Blackhawk pilot who is currently helping with recovery efforts in the Virgin Islands from the recent back-to-back hurricanes.

"Part of my job as a helicopter pilot is to help because a lot of the roads got corroded in the hurricanes, and they don't have any power or electricity. They don't really have a lot of stuff, so people like me fly a helicopter to help them out," Matt Dourn told the students.

Schools Capitalize On Bidding Process

Kewaskum High School will likely have a new brick exterior on the west side of the building. And it may have a new entranceway, office, kitchen and cafeteria space.

All of these improvements may become part of the school district's current

building project. The potential improvements are possible because the Kewaskum School District has been receiving bids lower than was projected for the building project, according to District Superintendent James Smasal.

"As we progress down the line of remodeling and

redoing our high school, along with the middle school, we continue to fare very well on the bidding process thus far. And we are really excited about some of the things that we are able to include into the project," Smasal told the School Board on Monday, Nov. 13.

The building project is

running on schedule, and the district continues to tweak plans as it progresses, according to Smasal.

Bicycles Allowed On Village Sidewalks

People are now allowed to ride bicycles on sidewalks in the Village of Kewaskum.

The Village Board approved changes to two village ordinances last Monday, Nov. 6, to permit bicycles on sidewalks.

"We get a lot of questions from people if they can ride their bikes on sidewalks. Our stance is pretty much that it is safer for kids to ride on sidewalks, so this just changes the language to reflect current thought," Kewaskum Police Chief Tom Bishop said.

The ordinance now reflects conformity with the

village's enforcement.

"I prefer that children use the sidewalk versus riding on the street," Bishop said.

State law allows for municipalities to enact ordinances permitting bicycles on sidewalks.

Cyclists are required to yield the right-of-way to pedestrians.

New Sidewalk Approved

In other action, the Village Board approved installing a sidewalk on Silver Fox Drive North. Currently there is only one property that does not have a sidewalk. The village and the homeowner will split the cost.

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WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORT

House Fire

On Monday, Nov. 13, at approximately 11:21 a.m., the owner of a single family residence located in the 8500 block of Fairview Drive in the Town of Wayne contacted the Washington County Sheriff's Office to report that a dehumidifier in her basement was on fire. Deputies and firefighters from the Kohlsville Fire Department were subsequently dispatched to the scene. Assistance was also requested from the Allenton, Campbellsport, Kewaskum, Lomira, St. Lawrence, Theresa, and West Bend fire departments. Upon their arrival, deputies observed light to moderate smoke emitting from the residence.

Firefighters quickly located and extinguished a small fire in the basement. There were no reports of civilian or firefighter injury. Fairview Drive between Wayne Center Drive and Wilson Drive was closed to through traffic for approximately 1.5 hours to facilitate overhaul and clean-up operations. The residence sustained approximately \$15,000 in smoke damage.

An on-scene investigation revealed the following: A homeowner unplugged a portable dehumidifier after hearing it make a strange noise. A short time later, the homeowner observed that the dehumidifier had started on fire. The homeowner ran upstairs, called 911, and exited the residence. The cause of the fire is not believed to be suspicious.

Capsized Boat On Friess Lake

On November 13 at 2:52 p.m., a lake resident called 911 indicating she heard two individuals yelling for help from an overturned boat about 50-75 yards from the north shoreline of

Friess Lake in the Village of Richfield. The caller thought there were no available boats in the water to assist the fishermen who were clinging to the boat.

Richfield Fire and Rescue were summoned to the scene and the Washington County Dive Team began to assemble as a proactive measure.

Prior to first responders arriving, another nearby resident was able to launch a rowboat and bring the fishermen to shore where they declined any medical treatment. The boaters were identified as a 28-year-old Menomonee Falls man and a 32-year-old Milwaukee man.

The circumstances that caused the boat to overturn are still under investigation.

OWI Case

Deputies routinely patrol county parks. On Friday, Nov. 10, at 11:08 p.m. a deputy was checking on Ackerman's Grove County Park, located at 4875 County Highway Z in the Town of Polk, when he located an occupied vehicle after the posted closing time.

The deputy made contact with the woman, identified as a 55-year-old Rubicon woman, and noted several signs of impairment. The driver failed field sobriety testing and was arrested for third offense OWI. During a search the deputy located marijuana, a straw with residue and a white powder believed to be cocaine. She also had over \$4,000 in cash.

She was charged with a third OWI with a blood alcohol content above 0.08, possession of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia. Additional charges may also be forthcoming when lab results come back.

OWI Case

On Sunday, Nov. 12, at about 7:10 p.m. a 67-year-old City of Hartford woman was arrested for a second OWI after erratically driving through the towns of West Bend, Addison and Hartford. A deputy finally intercepted her as she came into the City of Hartford at a high rate of speed.

After the stop the woman unintentionally backed up and struck the front of the squad car, causing minor damage to both vehicles. Hartford Police were called in to write the accident report.

OWI Case

A deputy stopped a vehicle for swerving and traveling 67 mph in a 45 mph zone on County Highway P near Rusco Drive in the Town of West Bend on Saturday, Nov. 11, at 12:51 a.m. The driver initially refused to pull over, but did not increase speed. Once the deputy got the vehicle stopped, the two occupants refused to communicate with the deputy and pretended to be asleep. A second deputy arrived on scene and the driver abruptly "woke up" and became uncooperative. The second deputy was able to discreetly remove the keys from the ignition during the confrontation.

The two individuals then locked themselves in the vehicle, apparently not noticing the deputies already had the keys. The deputies, utilizing the keys, opened the door and both the driver and passenger were forcibly removed from the vehicle.

The driver, identified as a 53-year-old Town of Addison man, was then placed in the rear of a marked squad car where he began to kick at the upper door frame of the door, causing it to bend.

He was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital for a legal blood draw after deputies obtained a search warrant. During the medical clearance the driver continued to be resistive and had to be physically held down.

The man eventually cooperated during the blood draw, but then actively resisted deputies when he was put back in the squad car and transported to jail.

The driver was arrested for a fourth OWI, failure to have an ignition interlock device, failure to stop, criminal damage to the squad car and resisting both at the

scene and at the hospital. He remains in custody.

The passenger, a 50-year-old Town of Trenton man, was arrested for one count of resisting and posted bond.

Outstanding Warrants Case

A Washington County Sheriff's Deputy arrested a 36-year-old Menasha man on eight outstanding arrest warrants this past weekend.

The incident began Sunday, Nov. 12, at about 9:45 p.m. when the deputy observed the subject tailgating multiple vehicles at estimated following distances of 3 to 5 feet and traveling with his high beams activated on northbound Interstate 41. The driver was stopped in the area of Interstate 41 and County Highway K in the Town of Addison.

The driver initially refused to properly identify himself stating he only went by the name "Mustafa." He also told the deputies he was a "sovereign citizen and traveler" and not subject to government statutes. Approximately 29 minutes after the traffic stop he eventually admitted the State of Wisconsin recognizes him as a different name.

Under that name the man was taken into custody for the multiple warrants that included operating after revocation, resisting/obstructing, ignition interlock device violation for a third offense OWI and fleeing an officer. During the arrest he told the deputy his rights were being violated and the deputy was kidnapping him.

The driver was issued citations for operating without a license, following too closely and fail to dim bright lights and turned over to the Winnebago County Sheriff's Office to face the other outstanding warrants.

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

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Assembly Approves Law Enforcement Body Camera Standards Legislation

The Wisconsin State Assembly passed the Law Enforcement Body Camera Standards bill authored by Rep. Jesse Kremer (R-Kewaskum) and his colleague Sen. Patrick Testin (R-Stevens Point) on November 9. This legislation addresses policing technology as it relates to privacy and the fourth amendment by establishing minimal statewide body camera policy standards which carefully strikes a balance between privacy rights with public safety.

Critics said the bill will too often keep the public in the dark, preventing people from getting a clear view of crime in their communities and how officers are responding to it.

Senate leaders have not said whether they plan to take up the bill when they return to the Capitol in January.

Following the passage of AB351 on the Assembly floor, Rep. Kremer stated, "This is a piece of legislation that has been in the works with law enforcement stakeholders for nearly a year and a half. While there are countless scenarios related to body camera footage as it relates to public privacy, we feel that this bill strikes a careful balance to ensure that public transparency, as it relates to policing practices, is maintained while safeguarding personal privacy protections."

Under current law, and subject to a balancing test by the data custodian, most body camera footage may be released to the media or public.

Following discussions with local law enforcement officials, it was noted that nearly 95 percent of all video footage will be released if an open records request is received. While transparency is of utmost importance, there are situations and locations where the expectation of privacy must be protected. For instance, video footage of a child trafficking situation, a late night domestic situation within an apartment unit or a simple interview with a police officer in one's home regarding a neighbor noise complaint.

There is a consensus among Wisconsin's Law Enforcement community that minimal statewide guidance should be mandated and that victims need to be protected, Rep. Kremer further explained. "As technology continues to evolve, we as legislators must stay vigilant, and AB351 serves a sound foundation to give law enforcement the tools they need while ensuring our constitutional privacy rights are protected."

Rep. Kremer represents the 59th Assembly District which includes Southern Calumet, Western Sheboygan, Northern Washington and Eastern Fond du Lac Counties. Rep. 

Sharon Miscikowski Honored With DAISY Award

Sharon Miscikowski, West Bend, RN on the Med/Surg unit, has been recognized with Froedtert and the Medical College of Wisconsin St. Joseph's Hospital's second quarter DAISY Award for her patient care and professionalism.

"While my sister spent her last few days here at St. Joseph's Hospital and had wonderful care by numerous patient care staff, to me this nurse went above and beyond," said award nominator Lori Keon. "She treated our family like her own, constantly asking if she needed anything, making sure she was comfortable or if my family needed anything. You could tell in her eyes how much she

cares."

The DAISY Foundation, an acronym for Diseases Attacking the Immune System, recognizes nurses as unsung heroes of our society who deserve more recognition and honor than they receive. More than 1,900 hospitals throughout the United States participate in The DAISY Award program.

The DAISY Foundation provides each recipient with a sculpture, "A Healer's Touch," which is hand-carved for the foundation by artists of the Shona Tribe in Zimbabwe. The sculpture is made of Serpentine stone that comes from the mountains "where the most powerful shaman" live in Zimbabwe. The founda-

tion chose this design not only because it depicts the relationship nurses have with their patients, but also because the Shona people hold their healers in a position of great importance to the community and feel about their healers the way The DAISY Foundation and St. Joseph's Hospital feel about nurses.

At St. Joseph's Hospital, Sharon was honored at a recent ceremony at which she received a certificate, pin and the sculpture.

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Village Of Kewaskum Prepares Budget For 2018

Residents in the Village of Kewaskum may see a 2.9 percent increase in their village tax levy next year.

That was the projected tax levy at last week's Kewaskum Village Board meeting on November 6, when village trustees discussed a preliminary budget. The final numbers won't be known until the village receives information from the county.

The board will hold a public hearing on the budget on Monday, Nov. 27, at 7 p.m. before the final budget goes to the board for approval that evening.

If the budget stays at the preliminary numbers with less than a 3 percent tax levy increase, the village will qualify for expenditure restraint for next year, Village Administrator Matt Heiser said.

The proposed budget includes spending from reserves for village street projects and for the purchase of a new pickup truck for the Public Works Department.

The budget also includes hiring a new treasurer/deputy clerk in March. The plan is for that person to work for a couple of months with the current treasurer/deputy clerk, Janet Knops, who plans to retire next year.

The proposed budget includes installing a new floor in the village's Annex building next year. In addition, it covers a new router, a new computer and new software.

The budget also reflects a 3 percent increase in the library budget. The library budget adds benefits for the youth services/assistant director.

The proposed budget shows the total tax increment from the village's Tax Increment Financing District #2 (TID 2) is increasing from \$264,662 this year to \$309,721 in 2018. The increase is due to the new construction that has gone on in the district during 2016.

Town Of Wayne Receives Loan

The Board of Commissioners of Public Lands (BCPL) approved a State Trust Fund Loan totaling \$110,809.12 to the town of Wayne to purchase a tractor and boom mower. Board Chair Brad Schimel and Commissioner Doug La Follette voted in favor of the loans with Commissioner Matt Adamczyk voting no.

The Board approved loans totaling \$8,358,842.50 at today's meeting. They include:

· Town of Beloit, Rock County to finance sewer project, \$6,000,000

· Village of Combined Locks, Outagamie County to finance road projects, \$300,000

· Village of Combined Locks, Outagamie County to refinance WRS prior service pension liability, \$200,000

· City of Kiel, Calumet and Manitowoc Counties to finance TID number four development incentive, \$300,000

· Town of Lake Mills, Jefferson County to finance road projects, \$276,575

· City of Manawa, Waupaca County to finance tax settlement, \$238,458.38

· Town of Mount Morris, Waushara County to purchase tractor and accessories, \$110,000

· Village of Valders, Manitowoc County to finance TID land acquisition and ancillary expenses, \$130,000

· Town of Wayne, Washington County to purchase tractor and boom mower, \$110,809.12

· Village of Wyocena, Columbia County to purchase street sweeper, \$36,000

The BCPL operates entirely on program revenue, without taxpayer money and distributes more than 96 cents of every dollar of interest earned on BCPL State Trust Fund investments to Wisconsin's public schools. The 2017 earnings of \$32.1 million are the sole source of state funding for K-12 public school library materials.

Weekly HEALTH TIP

SAFE HANDLING OF TURKEY

The cooking process kills any surface bacteria, so experts say it's not necessary to wash the bird before cooking. This also prevents bacteria from being splashed around your kitchen. Thaw a frozen turkey in the refrigerator in a shallow baking pan to prevent juices from dripping onto other foods. Allow 24 hours of thawing time for every 5 lbs. of turkey. When preparing the turkey, wash your hands and kitchen surfaces frequently to avoid spreading bacteria. Cook the turkey until it reaches a temperature of 165 degrees in the breast or stuffing and 180 degrees in the thickest part of the thigh. It's safest to cook stuffing separately.

"We have an itemized list that we continually prioritize to get things done that are within the scope of the referendum that was passed," Smasal said. "We have 'one bite at the apple,' and if we are going to get something done, we need to make sure we are able to do so, if the finances are in our favor to do so."

Monday was the first time the high school cafeteria came up during a board meeting. The board had previously discussed improving the front entrance to the high school.

A new cafeteria would be larger than the existing one, and would allow enough space for round tables.

"It's not going to look institutionalized with long tables. It will be a comfortable gathering space for kids," Smasal said.

To create the additional space, the kitchen and serving area would be moved to where the existing office is. A new high

school office would be added on to the front of the building.

"We are waiting on the actual drawing of it," Smasal said.

"I see a big price tag with that," School Board Member Jim Leister said. "I would like to see it broken up for the board [to show] where our money is coming from."

The entire cost of the new cafeteria, kitchen, office and front entrance would be about \$750,000 to \$1 million, according to Smasal.

Last November, voters approved a \$28.42 million referendum to improve the middle school and high school facilities.

At the time, the conceptual plan for the project included connecting the existing middle school to the high school.

Over the past year, the plan has evolved and the project now entails tearing down the middle school and replacing it with a new, two-story middle school attached to the

high school, as well as upgrading the existing high school.

The projected cost last November was an additional 19 cents on every \$1,000 worth of property value. The actual cost has come in considerably lower, and taxpayers will pay an extra 7.4 cents on \$1,000 worth of property in 2018.

"We still have a lot more things that we could look at. The theater is another area that needs a lot of work yet. So we are trying to knock out as many things as we possibly can in a prioritized order, based on the feedback that we are getting," Smasal said.

"I'm just saying we have been very cautious getting to where we have gotten financially. It all ties in together. I'm not against it; things have been pushed to the side long enough. If we can turn [the high school] around and make it look fabulous, there is nothing wrong with doing that," Leister said.



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

KHS Girls Basketball Team Is Short On Experience

Looking at the fact that seven of his top eight scorers and top six rebounders have graduated, it's safe to say coach Russ Thull will be rebuilding the Kewaskum High girls basketball team this winter.

The lone returning scorer won't dazzle anyone with her height, but five-foot, two-inch sophomore Maxine Paulowske is a very good three-point shooter as her 2016-2017 numbers show. As a freshman, Paulowske hit a team-high 51 treys on her way to scoring 189 points in the team's 24 games.

She finished third in scoring behind Mikayla Dogs and Hailey Herriges, who both averaged a dozen points per game.

"She had a great off-season ... played a lot of basketball," Thull said of Paulowske after the team's scrimmage against Living Word on November 11. "I'm excited for her."

Paulowske was hitting from beyond the arc and demonstrated good hustle on the defensive end of the court. "She plays good defense. She keeps the girl (she is guarding) in front of her," Thull said.

The other three returning letter winners are seniors, including guard Star Below-Kopf, guard/forward Taylor Cook and forward Megan Marx. "They didn't play much last year but earned letters," Thull said, expecting all three will be able to help the team.

"Megan showed a lot today. She's going to bring physicality to our team," the coach said.

Other members of the KHS varsity include: juniors — Ashely Trapp, McKenzie Schneider, Leah Theusch and Abby Meidl; and sophomores —

Kaitlyn Leitheiser, Anna Surprenant and Megan Winkler. They are all listed as forwards.

Rounding out the varsity is freshman Kennedy Adams, a guard.

Trapp has stood out this far in Thull's eyes. "She's going to play a big role this year," he said. "She's so versatile and so strong."

Thull is also confident Leitheiser and Theusch can help the team. "She's a smart player who understands the game," Thull said about Leitheiser, adding while softball is undoubtedly Theusch's favorite sport, "She's got a lot of tangibles and could be a solid role player for us."

What the coach likes best about Surprenant is "She's a quick kid, and she can handle the ball with both hands."

Adams is "our quickest kid. We like her defense, and her ability to drive," Thull said.

"We're just very young ... inexperienced," Thull said. "Max is the only one who has varsity experience." Still, the Indians have some depth, and Thull indicated, "It will be interesting to see who jumps out and takes

advantage of the opportunities."

Concerning the front runners in the East Central Conference this year, Thull said, "I think it will be a four-team race," including defending champion Plymouth, Waupun, Kettle Moraine Lutheran and Winneconne. He said Waupun had probably the number one player in the league in six-foot, two-inch Meghan Flier, but did lose several key players and its coach.

Plymouth has several starters returning, and Winneconne "can't be counted out," according to Thull.

The Indians opened the 2017-18 campaign against Ozaukee on November 14 and entertains Cedar Grove-Belgium tonight (November 16). Freshman and JV games will start at 5:45 p.m. while the varsity will tip off at approximately 7:15 p.m.

The girls varsity roster is currently set at 11, while Coach Thull and his wife, Megan, added to their family roster in May with the addition of their daughter (and future basketball player) Nora. Big brother Will makes four.

Bauer Goes 6-2 At Preseason Nationals But Does Not Place

The 2017 high school wrestling season just began this week, but KHS junior Eric Bauer got started early, going up against some of the best prep athletes in the country.

On October 27-28, Bauer, who finished second in the state as a freshman and fourth a year ago, competed in the rugged USA Wrestling Preseason Nationals, going 6-2 but unfortunately was not able to place in the 145-pound weight class for high school juniors and seniors.

"Not as good as I had hoped for," Bauer described his finish in the tournament, which was held in Cedar Falls, Iowa. The meet used a 2-1-1 format, meaning the opening period, starting in a neutral position, went two minutes, and the next two periods were one minute each.

Bauer went into the meet as the second seed but had a bit of misfortune in his first match against Maxwell Wettengel of the Don Bosco (Iowa) team, losing to him 5-3 by sudden victory.

"I went to hit a slide-by, and I missed his arm... I went to my hands, and he got behind me for the two (points)," he said about the overtime sequence.

Bauer bounced back, however, to take six straight matches, the first via a bye. Then he posted three straight victories without giving up a single

point, starting with an 8-0 major decision over Elijah Jacobs of Lawrence Elite, then nipping Devin DeLancey 2-0 and finishing the run with a 7-0 win over Jaylen Rowlett of the Warren Wrestling Academy.

Win number five was a quickie, an 18-second pin over Trey Hild who was competing unattached, and after receiving a forfeit win, Bauer kept his win streak going with a 2-0 decision over Jack Tangen of the North Shore Edge Wrestling Club.

The streak came to an end in the next match, however, when Bauer ran into a buzz saw from the MWC Wrestling Club, Scott Fulsos, who dominated the match, winning 10-0. Fulsos wound up fifth in the competition.

"I needed to win this last match (to place)," Bauer said. "I was tired... There were a few questionable calls."

"It was pretty disappointing," Bauer said about his finish, especially since he placed fifth a year ago.

About KHS' season, Bauer said, "It should be a good year."

With 87 wins already under his belt, Bauer is a cinch to go over 100 this winter. He still is not sure where he will wrestle. "I'll probably pinch at (1) 32 or (1) 38 (pounds)," he said.

Bauer was accompanied to the meet by his dad, Mark Bauer, KHS assistant coach Charlie Deaton and one of his Ringers' coaches.

Steger, a 6-foot, 185-pound quarterback/receiver, was named as one of three utility players on the WFC (Wisconsin Football Coaches Association) All-State, First Team Offense.

Steger, who led the Indians to an East Central Conference title, scored 19 touchdowns while

rushing for 1,401 yards in 181 carries for an impressive 7.7 yard per carry average. He had a personal-high 224 yards rushing in the win over Winneconne. He was held under 100 yards just twice, gaining 53 against Plymouth and 11 yards in the 15-12 victory over Campbellsport.

The talented senior also caught 10 passes for 287 yards and four touchdowns.

The Indians' two-way starter Riley Donovan, a six-foot, two-inch, 295-

pound lineman received honorable mention as an offensive and defensive lineman, while Patrick Krier, a three-year starter, was among the 17 inside linebackers to receive honorable mention.

Donovan opened some big holes for Steger and protected the two KHS quarterbacks, Steger and Gabe Christenson.

Krier was the team's leading tackler with 79 total tackles in the team's 11 games. He had nine tackles for losses and three quarterback sacks.

Krier showed excellent mobility and had a nose for the football.

The team is selected by state coaches, from nominations in the all-district voting.

The Offensive Player of the Year is D.J. Stewart, Kimberly's six-foot, 175-pound running back, and the Defensive Player of the Year is also from Kimberly, six-foot, three-inch, 245-pound Boyd Dietzen, a defensive end.

Poole Threw For 1,300 Yards in First Year At Concordia

Out-gained by over 500 yards, Concordia University's football season came to a close on November 11 with a 70-6 loss to Hope College (8-2) of Ohio. The Falcons finished at 1-5 in the Northern Athletics Collegiate Conference and 2-8 overall.

Freshman quarterback Dalton Poole of Kewaskum provided one

of the few bright spots for the Falcons right at the end of the first quarter, when he connected with Josh Sanders for a 52-yard touchdown pass, capping a four-play, 77 yard drive.

Concordia had 236 yards of total offense in the contest.

Poole wound up going 17x30 for 209 yards, the one touchdown and one interception. For the year, Poole, who started the season as the second sig-

nal-caller and took over the reins after an injury to the starter, saw action in nine of the Falcons' 10 games, completing 100 of 184 passes (54.3 percent) for 1,305 yards and nine touchdowns. He was intercepted six times and fumbled eight times, losing four of them.

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

Henk Goes Out In Style After Illustrious Career At UW-La Crosse

While Kewaskum High was posting one of its most successful volleyball seasons in recent years, one of its former players, Stephanie Henk, was making history of her own at UW-La Crosse.

Henk and her Eagle teammates breezed past UW-Oshkosh and UW-Whitewater to win the WIAC (Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference) title under first-year head coach Amber Dunn. Henk was also named as the Player of the Year in the conference, becoming the first-ever woman in UW-La Crosse history to win the award two years in a row.

Henk, a five-foot, 10-inch senior setter, is fifth in Eagle history in kills with 1,196 and seventh in attempts with 3,146. She became the 10th Eagle player to record 1,000 kills in her career, and with that also had 679 career digs and 126 blocks.

In the tournament, the Eagles opened with a 3-1 win over UW-Oshkosh (25-13, 23-25, 25-15 and 25-18) on November 2 and in the finals on November 4 shut out UW-Whitewater 3-0 (25-19, 25-21 and 25-22).

Against the Titans, Henk was a power at the net, contributing an impressive 18 kills, along with four aces and four blocks. In the title match, she was credited with a dozen kills and 10 digs.

The Eagles were a perfect 7-0 in WIAC dual matches and finished the regular season at 21-6.

Before the tournament, Henk led UWL in kills with 302, in points with 351.5, in aces with 30, while ranking third in digs with 225. She is third in the WIAC in kills (3.47) and points (4.04) per set while ranking sixth in aces per set (0.34) and 18th in hitting percentage (.212).

"Steph has been a big part of our Eagle volleyball program this season," Dunn said of her senior standout. "Being the first volleyball player in our conference earning back-to-back conference offensive player of the year is just a

start of all the things she has been determined to accomplish this season."

Dunn reported Henk also won the Judy Kruckman Scholar-Athlete award, first team all-conference, player of the week, as well as a couple of all-tournament team honors.

"She is the type of player that doesn't require a lot of guidance." The coach went on, "I can give her a task, and she sets her mind to it and finds a way to do it as well as she can. Another reason why her accomplishments are no surprise to me."

"We are excited to see Steph in the NCAA Tournament and continue the great road we have been on!" Dunn said about the Eagles' trip to the NCAA Division III regional

in St. Paul, Minnesota.

The Eagles were successful in their tournament opener against College of St. Benedict (Minnesota) on November 9 but struggled the next day in the second round against the University of Northwestern-St. Paul and were eliminated from the tournament.

UW-La Crosse had difficulty stopping Lindsey Peterson, the reigning AVCA (American Volleyball Coaches Association) Player of the Year, who led the winners with 16 kills.

Northwestern-St. Paul won the match 25-19, 25-20 and 25-22, with Henk coming up with 14 digs but held to just six kills.

In the 23-25, 25-17, 25-14, 25-13 victory over St. Benedict, Henk contributed 15 kills and 10 digs.

Section 1. That Section 82-4 of Chapter 82 of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum, relating to streets and sidewalks, be and is hereby amended as follows:
Sec. 82-4 Prohibited uses of streets and sidewalks.

a. Permitting vehicles on sidewalks: No person shall operate a motor vehicle, minibike or motorcycle on any sidewalk within the village.
b. Playing in streets prohibited. No person shall play in or participate in any athletic contest within a public right-of-way.

Section 2. Severability. The several sections of this Ordinance are declared to be severable. If any section or portion thereof shall be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, unlawful or unenforceable, such decision shall apply only to the specific section or portion thereof directly specified in the decision, and shall not affect the validity of any other provisions, sections or portions thereof of the Ordinance. The remainder of the Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect. Any other Ordinances whose terms are in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed as to those terms that conflict.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage and posting or publication as provided by law.

**Industrial Hemp Bill Passes
Legislature In Historic Vote**



In historic votes this week, the State Senate passed industrial hemp legislation on a 33-0 vote and the State Assembly followed suit two days later with a 92-0 vote. The Wisconsin Farm Bureau-backed bill to legally permit Wisconsin farmers to grow industrial hemp for the first time in decades now awaits Governor Walker's signature.

Senate Bill 119, authored by Sen. Patrick Testin (R-Stevens Point) and Rep. Jesse Kremer (R-Kewaskum), creates a hemp pilot program that will permit farmers to grow industrial hemp through a licensing system from the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection.

"This is an exciting opportunity for Wisconsin farmers," said WFBF President Jim Holte. "The ability to grow industrial hemp opens up new market opportunities for Wisconsin farmers who have been struggling with low market prices for quite some time now."

Hemp has not been legally grown in Wisconsin since 1957. Provisions in the 2014 Farm Bill allow states to set up hemp pilot programs to permit the growing, cultivating and marketing of hemp. Thirty-three states have passed some form of legislation legalizing hemp production and research, and over thirty industrialized countries allow their farmers to grow hemp as a crop.

"Wisconsin once dominated hemp production from the 1930s to 1957," Holte said. "This legislation will allow farmers to once again position ourselves as industry leaders to capitalize on existing markets and capture those that are still emerging. I really want to thank Senator Testin, Representative Kremer and Assembly Agriculture

Committee Chair Representative Lee Nerison for working together to get this bill done."

The Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation is the state's largest general farm organization, made up of 61 county Farm Bureaus and representing agriculturists and farms of every size, commodity and management style.

The Farm Freedom Act's authors, Sen. Testin and Rep. Kremer, were both pleased at the bill's strong bi-partisan support.

"Over the last year, we've worked with farmers, processors, and our colleagues to craft a bill that ensures Wisconsin

growers will be poised to take the lead in an industry that was once dominated by Wisconsin farmers," said Rep. Kremer. "Today's unanimous vote is a product of that thorough process and will be the catalyst to create new careers and rural hi tech manufacturing in the decades to come."

"We're on the verge of once again increasing opportunity for Wisconsin farmers," said Sen. Testin. "Wisconsin has been a leader in hemp cultivation before, and this bill empowers our farmers to take the lead again."

The bill now needs only the governor's signature to become law.

ance. The remainder of the Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect. Any other Ordinances whose terms are in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed as to those terms that conflict.

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Hunters Reminded Registering Deer In The Correct Zone Still Mandatory For The Ongoing And Upcoming Deer Seasons

Tagging rules have changed, but registration requirements have not. Lucky hunters are still required to register their harvested deer electronically by 5 p.m. the day after being recovered. The GameReg system is simple, fast and convenient for hunters.

"Since its launch in 2014, most hunters have adjusted well to using the electronic registration options," says Kevin Wallenfang, big game ecologist for the DNR. "The simplicity and convenience has resulted in high compliance of registration requirements, but we also continue to offer walk-in registration opportunities at hundreds of locations around the state."

Hunters have three options for registering:

- online at GameReg.Wi.gov (fastest and easiest option);

- by phone at 1-844-426-3734 (1-844-GAME-REG); or

- at a walk-in registration site where the process will be completed electronically. A full list of registration sites can be found on the department web site.

The GameReg system will prompt hunters to

answer a series of questions, beginning with the deer tag number and the hunter's date of birth.

For more information regarding electronic game registration, search "GameReg."

Deer Tags

Even with the recent elimination of the requirement to carry paper deer carcass tags, hunters are still required to carry proof of their deer tags, and fill those tags only within the deer management unit and zone designated on the tag. Hunters have several options as to how they carry proof of their deer tags including paper copies, a DNR issued Conservation Card, a GoWild validated Wisconsin driver's license, or a GoWild digital file as proof of tags. The deer tag number is an important component of registering their deer.

Hunters also no longer are required to validate their tag, attach the tag to their deer or keep their used deer tag after the animal is processed. Hunters are reminded they must know the tag number in order to begin the harvest registration process.

All previously issued

deer carcass tags are still valid as an authorization to hunt within the assigned or designated location. Hunters making additional purchases throughout the remainder of this year's hunting seasons will be issued products that will not include the usual validation and attachment language.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 1/2 (1 lb.) loaves white bread
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 bunch celery, diced
- 2 onions, chopped
- 1 (1 oz.) pkg. sage seasoning mixture

DIRECTIONS

Allow the bread to become stale overnight. Break stale bread into pieces and place in a large bowl.

Melt the butter in a medium saucepan over medium-low heat. Slowly cook and stir the celery and onions until the onions are soft. Transfer to the bowl with bread and mix by hand until well blended.

Sprinkle the mixture with sage seasoning and use to stuff the bird.
