## Kewaskum Public Library Begins Strategic Planning Process

During their meeting last Monday, Nov. 13, members of the Kewaskum Public Library Board toured the Kewaskum library.

The tour of the 2,986 square-foot building did not take long.

Library Director Emily Goad explained to board members how she has been trying to make room for the most popular items.

"I've been trying to weed through everything to see what items are being checked out so we can see if there is a way that we can better utilize the

space we have. Obviously, ultimately we need a bigger space," Goad said.

Goad has started working with Amy Birtell, director of the Monarch Library System, to develop a strategic plan for the library. One of the first steps is to determine the library's space needs.

At last week's meeting, Goad presented a report, which showed that the ideal space for Kewaskum's library would be 11,443 square feet, which is nearly four times the library's current size.

WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

**Suicide Attempts**

Over the past week or so, the Sheriff's Office has responded to eight suicide attempts. The details of each particular incident are not nearly as important as the message to those who may know someone struggling with mental illness to the point where they are contemplating self-harm.

There is a national network of local crisis centers that provide free and confidential emotional support to people in suicidal crisis or emotional distress 24 hours a day, seven days a week. These centers are committed to improving crisis services and advancing suicide prevention by empowering individuals, advancing professional best practices and building awareness.

From a local standpoint, if you or someone you know is experiencing a mental health crisis, please call the Washington County Acute Care Services - Crisis Intervention Team at 262-365-6565 or toll free at 1-866-906-6565.

Generally, law enforcement is able to take a person into temporary physical custody if they are mentally ill and pose a substantial probability of harm to themselves, or others, by recent acts or omissions, attempts or threats.

**Drug Case**

On November 15 at 10:12 p.m. a Washington County deputy stopped a 31-year-old Milwaukee man for driving varying speeds and not maintaining lane of traffic on Interstate 41 near State

Highway 28. The stop was based on a 911 call, as well as the deputy's personal observations.

The deputy concluded the poor driving was the result of the driver eating a sandwich rather than any impairment.

After the initial contact the deputy conducted a search of the vehicle based on the odor of drugs. He located 114 grams of marijuana in a pair of boots in the back seat.

The driver was arrested for possession of marijuana and also was held on a probation violation.

**Drug Case**

Deputies arrested a 27-year-old City of Milwaukee man for possession of methamphetamine after he was called in as an erratic driver on U.S. Highway 45 on Sunday, Nov. 12, by an off duty Milwaukee Police Officer.

The man was stopped on U.S. Highway 45 near Pleasant Valley Road at 12:30 a.m. and provided the deputy with a false ID. When he exited the vehi-

cle for field sobriety testing, the deputy located methamphetamine on the front driver's seat. He was arrested for possession of drug paraphernalia, possession of methamphetamine and obstructing.

Although this particular arrest occurred without incident, methamphetamine arrests are becoming more frequent in Washington County and pose heightened challenges for law enforcement.

Methamphetamine, or meth, is an extremely addictive and potent central nervous system stimulant that can have side effects such as behavioral problems, paranoia, psychosis and physical aggression. The user's mood can become unpredictable and can rapidly cause mood swings, suspicion and anger for those who abuse the drug regularly.

These side effects can cause an otherwise sensible person to violently lash out at officers, putting both themselves and officers at increased risk of injury.

That number is nothing new. About three years ago, plans for a library expansion were drawn up. That plan also included about 11,000 square feet. The Kewaskum Library Foundation owns the lot to the east of the library, so an expansion could be built there.

The library has not been renovated since 1985. A larger space would allow for more public computers, meeting spaces and a growing collection of books and materials.

The library has about \$380,000 that could go toward a library expansion. Still, preliminary estimates show that an expansion would be considerably more expensive.

It would take time to raise the funds, and the library has some pressing needs in its current space,

according to Goad.

"I would love to see a library expansion. But right now we also really need new paint on the walls and new carpeting," she said.

Last week, board members saw spots on the walls where paint colors don't match. They walked across the worn carpeting on the library floor. And they looked up at the missing ceiling tiles from a recent leak from when the roof was repaired.

Goad has tried to do what she can to improve the atmosphere inside the library. When she started working at the library a couple years ago, she started removing books from the top of shelves.

"It seemed dangerous to have them up that high. It would be lovely to have shelves that were smaller and more aesthetically pleasing," Goad said.

But there is not enough space to remove all the books from the tops of shelving. The Young Adult section still has books on the top of shelves, even though not all the patrons are able to reach them. There simply is not enough space to put them anywhere else.

Goad would like to see a "Friends of the Library" group formed to help with the library's current needs. She sees that as a feasible goal, especially after seeing the community come together during the library's recent food drive.

"The people here are so generous. They really are amazing," Goad said.


ter Joanne (John) Clark, sister-in-law Marilyn Heimermann, nieces, nephews other relatives and friends.

Anderson served as 2nd Lieutenant in the United States Army from 1964 to 1966 and was in the Army Reserves from 1966 to 1971.

He grew up in a noisy, fun-loving family of five with a strong religious faith. He had lifelong, small-town, rural values of honesty, hard work and commitment. Anderson learned hard work by sweeping "The Anderson Garage" floors and keeping meticulous parts inventory.

Being involved with the winning Minneota Viking team gave him focus, determination and self confidence, yet he remained humble his whole life. Many of his children had never seen pictures nor heard stories of his athletic accomplishments in high school until he passed.

# KHS Girls Basketball Team Needs Time To Develop

The defensive effort picked up a notch, but the Kewaskum High girls basketball team suffered through a cold spell in the second half on November 16, leading to a 40-27 non-conference loss to Cedar Grove-Belgium.

"Shots aren't always going to fall, but our defensive effort was a lot better than Tuesday (against Ozaukee)," KHS coach Russ Thull said afterward. The young Indians, with one freshman, three sophomores and one junior starting, stayed right with the Rockets through the first half and took the lead just a little over a minute into the second half when Ashley Trapp muscled the ball away from one of the Rockets and drove to the hoop for a layup for a 22-22 tie.

Trapp was fouled on the drive, made the free throw,

giving the Indians a 23-22 and sent the Rockets' high scorer, Amanda Meerdink to the bench with her third foul.

The door was open for the Indians to build on their lead, but unfortunately it took them over 14 minutes to score their next points. Down 23-38, it was Trapp who broke the ice with her rebound basket with 2:22 to play, and senior Megan Marx concluded the scoring with a rebound basket at 1:47.

Thull saw bright spots from his young players, like the 12 steals and 31 rebounds they had, but cold shooting again played a key role in the outcome.

"We've got to shoot better. Nine points in a half isn't going to win games," Thull said, confident his lone returnee and major outside threat, Maxine Paulowske, will find her range. "She's obviously struggling," he said, point-

ing to the fact Paulowske missed all 11 three-pointers she took after going 1x12 in the opener. "We have so much confidence in her. 'She'll be fine.'"

The bright spots in this game were provided by Trapp and Marx, who scored seven and six points, respectively. Trapp chipped in with five rebounds, one steal, one assist and only committed one turnover, while Marx also hauled down five rebounds, had one assist and two steals.

"I thought Megan Marx played a solid game, I'm excited about what's she's doing. She's coming in and competing," Thull said.

Sophomore Anna Surprenant chipped in with five points, one assist and two steals.

Meerdink, a five-foot, eight-inch senior forward, led the Rockets with 19 points, including a dozen

# Experience, Good Team Chemistry Should Help Indians Move Up In EC Conference

With four starters among six returning letter winners, coach Don Gruber is optimistic about the fortunes of the Kewaskum High boys basketball team this winter.

Help will also be provided from several athletic juniors and the return of a player who showed promise several years ago but was injured for much of his freshman season and didn't play basketball as a sophomore or junior.

The Indians had difficulties winning games during the 2016-17 season, winding up winless in the tough East Central Conference, which again had a final four representative in the Division 3 state tournament. Overall, KHS finished at 3-20, averaging under 50 points per game.

Graduation claimed six players from last season, but only one, six-foot, six-inch Brady Hanson started the entire year. He led the team in scoring with 424 points (18.4 ppg.) and rebounding with 191 (8.7 rpg.), but on the flip side, committed a team-high 99 turnovers and team-high 82 fouls.

The returning letter winners include six-foot, one-inch senior forwards Jared Chesak and Jordan Carlton, five-foot, eleven-inch senior guard Brent Goeden, five-foot, ten-inch senior guard Dan Kreis, five-foot, seven-inch senior guard Konrad Krueger and five-foot, nine-inch junior guard Brad Buechel, who moved up to the varsity about the middle of last season.

When asked about team strengths, Gruber said, "I think our experience will be (a strength). We're bringing back five guys who played a lot of basketball," adding the juniors have good skills but still must learn how to play at a varsity level.

Only Carlton averaged over 10 points, contributing 11.0 points per game, including 33 three-pointers and 38x48 free throws (.792).

Chesak scored 150 points (6.8 ppg), had 96 rebounds and blocked 11 shots and Gruber is expecting big things from him this season.

"Jared plays taller than

six-foot, one-inch," Gruber said. "Fundamentally he does a lot of things right."

Goeden, Kreis and Buechel shared the two guard spots and did a pretty good job passing and handling the ball for the team. Kreis and Goeden provided 52 and 23 assists, respectively, while committing 69 and 27 turnovers. All three will be called on to score a little more this season.

Juniors Carson Dogs, Jacob Schlosser, Ryan Prochnow, Talon Ralph and Jon Leister should provide help after playing JV ball a year ago. Others on the varsity are five-foot, eight-inch guard Dawson Fox, and five-foot, ten-inch junior Tom Klemme.

The Indians were involved in a four-team scrimmage at West Bend East on November 18.

"We really were short guys there," Gruber said, as he only had eight players available, making it difficult to compete with the Division 1 Suns, Oak Creek and Greendale teams. Gruber was pleased with the overall play of Chesak, Buechel's shooting against Oak Creek, and six foot senior forward Cole Surprenant, who returned to basketball after a two year absence.

"There's no doubt he's going to help us," Gruber said, indicating Surprenant has shown he is good at rebounding and driving to the basket.

With no player over six-foot, one-inch, the Indians will have to work hard on their rebounding. "We are going to miss the six-foot, six-inch presence," Gruber said, but he likes the team chemistry thus far. "I think

the guys like playing. That can be a strength," he said, indicating the players are sharing the ball and looking for teammates who are open to score.

As far as top contenders in the EC Conference, Gruber didn't hesitate in tabbing Waupun as the best shot at number one. "The (Marcus) Domask kid and (Owen) Theune are two of the top players in the conference," he said. Those two combined for 843 points a year ago.

Gruber looks at Plymouth and Kettle Moraine Lutheran to have teams that could press Waupun and says Campbellsport has several seasoned veterans, which makes them a possibility at finishing in the upper division.

After going to state in March, Ripon may be down, according to Gruber, because it lost its top seven or eight players.

As far as his Indians are concerned, Gruber said, "I am hoping we'd be in the middle of the pack. That will be our goal."

Gruber will be assisted on the varsity level by Don Hauser, while Aaron Gaedtke has moved up to the JV team and Jake Cull will coach the freshmen.

The numbers in the program are good with 14 on the varsity, 14 on the JV1 team and 11 on the JV2 team.

The Indians open the season at Slinger this Saturday, Nov. 25, at 4 p.m., then play Kiel in the home opener on November 28 and are at North Fond du Lac on November 30. The EC opener for the Indians is at Waupun on December 12.



# Kewaskum Public Library Shares Art Of Craft Beer

Matthew Janzen was working as an intern for an ad agency when he was introduced to craft beer for the first time.

"The internship was an unpaid position, but they would pay me with free beers at happy hours," Janzen said.

He was at one of those hoppy hours when a partner in the agency gave him a beer.

"This beer hit me in the nose before it every touched my lips. It smelled like fresh mountain air, and I was in the basement of Landmark Lanes on the east side of Milwaukee, which is a bowling alley and people have been smoking in it for hundreds of years, I'm assuming, beforehand. So it was a surreal feeling," Janzen said.

Janzen was intrigued. He went home and started researching and learning about craft beer.

Janzen, who has a degree in

journalism/advertising/media studies from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, landed a paying job in advertising. But his passion stayed with craft beer.

On an off day of work, Janzen went to Lakefront Brewery and started snapping photos of the exterior of the building. The owner walked out and asked if he would like to take pictures on the inside of the building. Janzen readily agreed, and he received a personal tour of the brewery.

"At that point, I realized I could probably get into every brewery in the state. And I was pursuing this idea of creating a directory that had good photography and good design and was up to date," Janzen said.

But as Janzen started taking photos at other breweries, he saw the potential for more. The idea of a coffee table book about craft beer was born.

Janzen decided to quit his job at the ad agency

and pursue his passion: craft beer.

"I spent two years traveling around the state, going to all the breweries, hop yards, barley fields, equipment manufacturers and everything that supplies or somehow supports the industry of craft beer in the state," Janzen said.

Janzen paired up with Chris Walker, who agreed to design a book filled with Janzen's photographs and writing.

The result is a 272-page, hardcover book entitled *State of Craft Beer*. A total of 130 locations made it into the book, but Janzen visited more than that, he proudly explains.

The book shows how beer is made, bottled and distributed. With colorful photos, it details each step in the beer business.

The book also captures the camaraderie that exists in the industry. For example, Janzen shared a story from Black River Falls, where two workers, Tyler and Tanner, work alternating 12-hour shifts.

"Tanner told me that Tyler is the only person he says good morning to and good night to," Janzen said.

Once he had the book in hand, Janzen had to pay to have it published.

He went to different breweries to see if any would preorder. That took five months. To make up the rest of the money he needed, Janzen took out credit cards.

Now Janzen is touring libraries across the state, giving talks about the book and his experience.

He spoke at the Kewaskum Public Library on Wednesday, Nov. 1. After speaking at the library, he did what he normally does...checked out a local watering hole. The local spot turned out to be the Great Outdoors Supper Club in St. Michaels, where he got a craft beer and a traditional Wisconsin fish fry.

Janzen will be in the area again, speaking at the West Bend Community Memorial Library on Wednesday, Nov. 29, from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m.

# Thanksgiving Recipes

## Energy Is Among Least Expensive Ingredients For The Holiday Meal — Electricity Is Less Than Three Percent Of The Cost Of A Thanksgiving Meal

This Thanksgiving, cooks across Wisconsin will all use one universal ingredient — energy. When compared to all the other ingredients for the big holiday meal, energy is one of the lowest cost items. This is especially true for customers of Alliant Energy.

"Dining with family and friends is often the centerpiece of a Thanksgiving celebration," said Linda Mattes, vice president of Customer Operations. "Electricity and natural gas are the key ingredients that make these meals come together."

The cost of a turkey feast changes every year. The same is true for the cost of energy needed to cook the meal. This year, the American Farm Bureau Federation figures the average Thanksgiving meal for 10 people will cost \$49.12.

For Alliant Energy's Wisconsin customers, the average electricity cost to

make Thanksgiving this year is \$1.43. If you are using gas appliances, the average cost is \$0.43.

Tips for an energy-efficient holiday:

- Let the furnace rest. If your holiday cooking doesn't heat up your house, your guests will. Turn your thermostat down three to five degrees to save energy while staying comfortable.

- Skip the preheat. The turkey is traditionally stuffed early in the morning and roasted for hours. When cooking meats or dishes for several hours, there is no need to pre-heat your oven.

- Use glass or ceramic pans. They heat faster than metal pans, and you can lower the temperature by 25 degrees, reducing energy use.

- Cooking together saves energy. Cook as much of your meal at one time as possible. Foods with different cooking temperatures can be cooked

together, if the temperature difference is less than 25 degrees.

- Close the oven door. This Thanksgiving, resist the urge to open the oven door and check the meal. One open of the door will decrease the temperature inside by 25 degrees. This means your oven has to use more energy to stay on temperature.

- Coast to the finish. Food keeps cooking even after you turn off the burner. When food is almost ready, turn off the oven or burners and let existing heat finish the cooking for you.

- Don't overlook the microwave. Efficient microwaves use about half the energy of conventional ovens.

- Clean while it's hot. If your oven needs a self-cleaning cycle, do it while the oven is still hot.

- Run a full load. Fill your dishwasher, and you will use less hot water than doing them by hand.

## Cost Of Thanksgiving Dinner Less Than \$5 A Person

You can be thankful for an affordable dinner this Thanksgiving according to Wisconsin Farm Bureau's annual informal survey.

"This year's survey came in 54 cents lower than last year's price of \$47.91," said Wisconsin Farm Bureau's spokesperson Amy Eckelberg. "The survey's total price of \$47.26, when divided by ten, shows a home-cooked Thanksgiving meal can cost less than \$5 per person."

The American Farm Bureau Federation's national survey of the same items (turkey, cubed stuffing, sweet potatoes, rolls with butter, peas, cranberries, a relish tray of carrots and celery, pumpkin pie with whipped cream and beverages of milk and coffee, all in quantities sufficient to serve ten people) averaged \$49.12, \$1.86 more than Wisconsin's price.

"Thanksgiving is a time for gratitude," Eckelberg said. "This year we can be thankful for our farmers who are working hard to provide an abundance of food for us to enjoy."

### Talking Turkey

Wisconsin's average price for a 16-pound turkey was \$21.92 in 2016. This year the price of the same 16-pound turkey is \$20.96, down 96 cents.

"Grocers typically feature turkey in special sales and promotions leading up to Thanksgiving," Eckelberg said. "Watch for an even better bargain as the holiday approaches."

Turkey production across the U.S. has fully rebounded from the 2015 Avian Influenza crisis that occurred throughout the Midwest. There is a plentiful supply of turkey, hence the lower price in this year's survey.

### About The Survey

Wisconsin's Thanksgiving price survey is an informal, annual review of food price trends in relation to changing farm prices, weather and wholesale and retail food marketing. Wisconsin Farm Bureau members collected price samples of 12 Thanksgiving food items in 33 communities in

October and November.

"The survey shows that food prices are extremely stable," Eckelberg said. "This is the lowest price the survey has reflected since 2010."

Farm Bureau volunteer shoppers are asked to look for the best possible prices, without taking advantage of special promotional coupons or purchase deals. While Farm Bureau does not make any scientific claims about the data, it is an informal gauge of price trends.

The Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation is the state's largest farm organization. Made up of 61 county Farm Bureaus, it represents farms of every size, commodity and management style.



## People Traveling Over The Thanksgiving Holiday Period Asked To Plan Ahead

### — Keep An Eye On The Weather, And The Possibility Of Deer Along Roadways

Although most major highway construction work has concluded for the year, motorists traveling over the Thanksgiving holiday period may still encounter ongoing road work along with the potential for heavy traffic in key travel corridors. Officials with the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) expect peak travel periods to occur between noon and 8 p.m. on Friday, Nov.

17 and on Sunday, Nov. 26.

"Traffic crashes tend to peak over the next couple months due to several factors including an abundance of holiday travelers and hunters, the potential for rapidly changing weather, decreasing daylight, and increasing deer activity," said David Pabst, director of WisDOT's Bureau of Transportation Safety. "It's the responsibility of every driver to

watch their speed and following distance, always drive sober and alert, and ensure everyone is buckled up."

# DNR Assessed Lakes And Rivers Remain Healthy

## – Department Seeks Public Comment On Proposed List Of Impaired Waters

The majority of Wisconsin's lakes and rivers recently assessed by the Department of Natural Resources received a good bill of health, continuing a trend of improved surface water quality across the state.

At the same time the DNR is working to identify new waterways to target for pollution reduction plans. The department's recent assessment also included 240 new waters that meet the criteria for being classified as impaired, and is seeking public comment on the new listings.

"Long-term trend and satellite monitoring show that we are making progress with good overall water quality," said Sharon Gayan, director of the DNR Water Quality Bureau. "Wisconsin waters stay healthy through combined efforts including strong partnerships with citizens, lake associations, local government, permit holders and others implementing practices that protect and restore waters of the state. However, through expanded monitoring, we've identified lakes and rivers where more work is needed to improve water quality for fish to thrive and for people to enjoy them recreationally."

Over the past five years, Gayan said the DNR has completed assessments on more than 6,000 additional waterways. The vast majority, more than 80 percent of assessed waters, are in good condition. For the 2018 listing updates, 35 waterbodies are also proposed to be removed from the list, the highest number of delistings since 2010.

The impaired list identifies waters that need additional management attention. A majority of these new listings - 183 - are for lakes or river stretches that exceed new, more restrictive phosphorus standards that took effect in December 2010. Many of these new phosphorus listings are in areas with restoration plans already in development and were waters that had never been previously assessed for phosphorus.

"The listing does not necessarily mean that phosphorus levels in these waters got worse," said Gayan. "Phosphorus levels may be improving in some, but not enough yet to meet these new standards."

Gayan added that listing waters as "impaired" requires the state to develop restoration plans for them

and also may make them eligible for state and federal cleanup funds, which can help speed improvements.

Public comments may be submitted by December 29, 2017, and can be emailed to DNR at DNRImpairedWaters@wisconsin.gov, or sent by U.S. mail to Ashley Beranek, DNR, Water Evaluation Section (WY/3), Box 7921, Madison, WI 53707. Comments postmarked or received by December 29, 2017, will be considered before submitting the final draft list to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency for approval.

The Impaired Waters List is submitted to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency every even-numbered year under Section 303(d) of the Clean Water Act (40 C.F.R. §130.7(b)). The department follows standard procedures to assess waterbodies against water quality standards, these are known as Wisconsin Consolidated Assessment and Listings Methods (WisCALM).






