Kewaskum Christmas Parade To Be Held This Sunday

The Kewaskum Chamber of Commerce's annual Christmas Parade will stroll down the festively decorated Main Street this Sunday, Dec. 3, at 5 p.m.

The theme for this year's parade will be "Silver Screen Holiday."

The parade route will start on Third Street, which turns into Parkview. The parade will make its way south on Parkview before turning west on Main Street. Once it reaches Fond du Lac Avenue, the parade will turn north before turning right on First Street and

ending near Engelhardt Dairy.

Spectators can participate in the season of giving by donating to the Kewaskum Community Food Pantry, which will collect food along the parade route.

Santa will make his grand appearance at the end of the parade.

The annual parade is organized by the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce, which funds it through sponsorships, membership and events.

Vision Screening Held In School District

Kewaskum Elementary School secretary Jill Ebert remembers getting glasses when she was a young girl.

"It was like the old-fashioned projector where you turn the knob and everything comes into focus. That's what it felt like when I put my glasses on," Ebert said.

Putting on glasses revealed a whole new world for Ebert that she didn't even realize she was missing.

"I didn't know I needed glasses until I got tested in school in third grade. I just thought everybody saw like that," Ebert said.

Vision screening was recently held for all third-grade students in the Kewaskum School District. Like Ebert, some of the students found out through the screening that their vision was not perfect. Those students were referred to an eye doctor.

"Studies show that 80 percent of learning is through your vision. That is why vision screening is really, really important," School Nurse Kim Bocher said.

One in four school-aged children have a vision problem, Bocher said. Vision problems can make it difficult for children to read and learn, and many fall behind in school or show behavioral problems when they cannot see well.

"People thought my nephew had an attention deficit disorder. They found out that he didn't. He had been misbehaving because he was seeing double," said Mary Sauer, a member of the West Bend Lions who helped test students in Kewaskum earlier this month.

Members of area Lions and Lioness clubs volunteered their time to conduct the screening for third-graders in the school district, free of charge.

It was the first time in

over 16 years that vision screening was held in the Kewaskum schools. At one time, the Washington County Health Department provided vision and hearing testing for third-graders, but that was before the current elementary school was built, Ebert said.

The screening that was held this year, though, went much quicker than it did years ago.

Back then, a traditional test with a large "E" or a large picture was used on the top row. The test is somewhat subjective as a person being tested can guess a letter, and the tester determines whether the person passes or fails the test.

"Especially with little kids, the child could push on their eye when they are covering it, and then when they uncover that eye and use it, things look blurry," Bocher said.

Village Winter Parking Restrictions To Go Into Effect

Kewaskum Village Parking Restrictions and Snow Emergency Parking Restrictions will go into effect at midnight on December 1, 2017, and will be in effect until midnight on April 1, 2018. According to municipal code, no person shall park or stop any vehicle on any public street or highway within the village between 2 and 6 a.m. from December 1 to April 1 of each year. Notwithstanding such restrictions, vehicles may be parked for a period of time not longer than three minutes for loading or unloading of passengers, provided no other regulation restricting parking as

to place, time or manner is violated thereby. The fine for violating the ordinance is: \$20 if paid within five days of the issuance of the parking citation; or \$30 if paid between six and 28 days. After 28 days, the amount is \$40 and a notice will be sent to the Motor Vehicle Department to suspend any and all vehicle registrations held by the owner and refuse renewals of the same until the citation is satisfied. An important fact is the owner of the vehicle is responsible for the payment of the citation, whether or not he or she was the operator.

WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORT

Single Vehicle Crash

On November 27 at 8:56 a.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a single vehicle crash on County Highway W approximately 0.1 mile south of Crooked Road in the Town of Addison. Sheriff's deputies, and members of the Allenton and St. Lawrence Fire Departments, were dispatched to the scene. The Wisconsin State Patrol also responded to assist with traffic control.

Upon their arrival, rescue personnel located a severely damaged automobile in the west ditch line of County Highway W. The driver and sole occupant of the vehicle, a 19-year-old City of Hartford man, required extrication from the vehicle and was then flown via Flight For Life to Aurora Medical Center in Summit.

An on-scene investigation revealed the following: The crashed vehicle was northbound on County Highway W when it veered left and through the southbound lane of travel. The vehicle left the roadway, entered the west ditch line, and struck a tree. No other vehicles were involved in the crash, and the operator was wearing his seatbelt.

After being extricated from the vehicle, the operator was transported via ambulance to a nearby off-road location where Flight For Life had been staged. His injuries are serious but are not believed to be life threatening. The matter remains under investigation, but driver fatigue and inattentiveness are believed to be contributing factors.

County Highway W was closed between County Highway S and Crooked Road for approximately 1.5 hours to facilitate rescue and clean up operations.

Injury Accident

On November 24 at 10:42 a.m. the Sheriff's Office was notified of a pickup truck versus a transit bus accident on Highway 45 southbound south of County Trunk D in the Town of Barton. Callers reported the bus went off the road into the ditch and possibly rolled. West Bend Fire and Rescue was dispatched along with deputies from the Sheriff's Office. The bus was a

Washington County Shared Ride Taxi bus. Upon deputies' arrival, the bus was lying on the driver's side off the shoulder area of the road and into the woods. The driver of the bus was out and not injured. He reported the one and only passenger was trapped inside. The pickup truck involved was located pulled over on the side of the road approximately 0.2 mile south of the bus. This vehicle was occupied by a male driver and female passenger who were later transported to St. Joseph's Hospital via ambulance due to their reported injuries.

West Bend Fire used an inflation device to lift the bus up so the passenger's leg could be freed from underneath the bus. The passenger was taken to an ambulance for treatment while Flight for Life was called to the scene. The passenger was then flown to Froedtert due to the extent of her injuries. During this time there was a full closure of Highway 45 in both directions to allow for Flight for Life landing and take-off.

A preliminary investigation showed the bus and pickup truck were southbound in the right lane with the bus in front of the pickup truck. The pickup truck came upon the bus and then swerved into the left lane, but collided with the rear driver's side corner of the bus causing it to spin out of control.

Injury Accident

On November 22 at 8:56 a.m. the Sheriff's Office was notified of a two-vehicle accident in the area of Highway 33 and N. Oak Road in the Town of Trenton. Callers reported a possible head-on collision and a subject with a head injury. West Bend Fire and Rescue was dispatched to the scene along with deputies from the Sheriff's Office.

Upon deputies' arrival, there were two vehicles in the center of the roadway; a SUV with no damage and a Ford Focus with severe front end damage and the operator was still inside. There was also a cargo type van with severe front end damage off the road in the south ditch line. The operator of the Ford Focus was extricated from the vehicle and transported to St. Joseph's Hospital where he was going to be flown via Flight For Life to

Froedtert Hospital due to the extent of his injuries.

Through the investigation and witness statements it was learned that westbound traffic was stopped due to highway maintenance being conducted by the Washington County Highway Shop. The van was westbound and the operator didn't see the stopped traffic so the operator swerved into the eastbound lane to avoid rear ending the vehicle in front of him. At this time eastbound traffic was moving and the Ford Focus was struck head-on by the van. There was warning signage posted in both directions notifying motorists of the road work and the presence of flagmen.

The driver of the van is a 21-year-old Mequon man who will be cited for inattentive driving. The operator of the Ford Focus is a 55-year-old West Bend man.

Car Crash

On November 22 at 2:46 a.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified by a passing motorist of a vehicle on its side, in a field on County Highway K north of County Highway E in the Town of Hartford. The Washington County Sheriff's Office dispatched sheriff's deputies as well as requested assistance from the City of Hartford Police Department to respond and check for any possible injuries. Upon deputies' arrival, a single male occupant was found to be trapped in the car. The Hartford Fire Department as well as Hartford EMS were dispatched to the scene.

The driver, a 20-year-old City of Hartford man suffered serious leg injuries as a result of the accident. Flight for Life Helicopter out of Waukesha was requested to respond to Aurora Medical Center in Hartford due to the nature of the injuries and the prolonged extrication at the scene. The victim was

transported by Flight for Life to Aurora Summit Medical Center.

The investigation showed that the driver was driving southbound on County Highway K when he lost control and drove off the right side of the road and eventually rolled the vehicle. The driver told investigators that he was driving around in his car consuming alcoholic beverages. He indicated that while he was drinking a beer he fell asleep which resulted in him losing control. He was arrested for absolute sobriety as a result. The driver was not wearing a seatbelt.

Assist Department of Natural Resources

The Sheriff's Office received a call from a concerned hunter near Lowe Lake reporting two subjects shot a deer with a 30.06 rifle in a muzzle-loader only section on Monday, Nov. 20, at 8:12 a.m.

The Sheriff's Office dispatched the local DNR Warden to the area where the vehicle was last seen. A deputy subsequently located the vehicle on State Highway 167 (Holy Hill Road) at State Highway 164.

The deer was located inside the car along with a loaded 30.06 rifle. The investigation was turned over to the DNR.

Theft

The Sheriff's Office is investigating multiple thefts from vehicles that occurred after 9:30 p.m. on November 19 in Allenton.

The thefts would have occurred from at least four vehicles in the 300 block of Weiss Street and the 500 block of Main Street. Items taken included loose change, a wallet, purse, cigarettes and a hunting backpack containing hunting gear.

Village Board Updates Loud Noise Ordinance

The Village Board updated its loud noise ordinance at its meeting Monday night.

Under the ordinance, "No person shall make or cause to be made any unreasonably loud, disturbing or unnecessary sounds or noises such as may tend to annoy or dis-

turb another person or ordinary sensibilities in or about any public or any private place."

Lawnmowers, chain saws, powered garden and lawn equipment and other non-construction maintenance equipment can be operated between 7 a.m. and 9 p.m. only.

Exceptions include: any vehicle of the village, coun-

ty or state engaged in necessary public business; excavations or repairs of streets or other public construction when necessary for public welfare; operation of emergency equipment; and snow blowers, snow plows and other snow removal equipment.

Village Of Kewaskum Sets 2018 Budget

Kewaskum village residents will see an increase of about 1 percent in their property tax bills when they arrive in December.

The village's portion of the levy is going up 1.9 percent, as the Village Board approved a \$2.55 million budget for 2018 Monday night. That raises the village's budget by about 2.75 percent over this year's budget.

However, the village has an increase in assessed value, so the mill rate will increase by only 13 cents, or 1.88 percent, according to Village Administrator Matt Heiser. That equates to the additional \$26 on a property assessed at \$200,000.

The village will contribute an additional \$305,453 to cover debt payments for the tax increment financing (TIF) district. This is approximately \$35,000 less than it spent on the TIF shortfall in

2017.

"That is the great news in this year's budget. Given the fact that I believe this year we've had even more growth in the TIF than we did the prior year, I think the number on the TIF will be even better next year," Village President Kevin Scheunemann said.

Water and sewer rates will not increase in 2018. The utilities are incurring debt to pay for the Roseland Drive project and the Habeck/Keller street projects. In addition, the village's budget includes \$50,000 for corrective measures for stormwater, as mandated by FEMA and DNR guidelines.

"I'm not exactly thrilled about \$50,000 in the stormwater issue, but that is being shoved down our throat by state and the federal authorities. That is not exactly an option," Scheunemann said.

The village began plan-

ning the 2018 budget in September.

The budget, which will draw \$69,000 from reserve funds, includes a \$20,000 insurance check from damages incurred during a storm at Wildlife Park. That insurance check will cover four expenditures: \$4,000 for a large shade umbrella for the pool at Kiwanis Park; \$3,000 for the ceiling of a rental shelter in Kiwanis Park; \$1,000 for dugout improvements for the hardball diamond at Kiwanis Park; and \$2,000 to reroof the bathrooms in River Hill Park.

The budget also includes:

- A 2 percent pay increase for village staff.
- A 3 percent increase for the library.
- \$4,000 for a new router.
- \$1,800 for a new computer.
- \$10,000 contribution for a future snow plow purchase.
- \$5,000 for a potential

compensation classification study for the wastewater treatment lead operator position for 2018.

-\$10,000 for a new floor in the Annex.

-\$25,000 for new metal panels on the exterior of the firehouse.

-\$20,000 for a new pickup truck for the Department of Public Works.

-\$55,000 to go toward Habeck/Keller street projects.

Village property taxes will also reflect the following changes from 2016 to 2017:

Washington County: 0.3 percent increase.

State of Wisconsin: No tax this year.

Kewaskum School District: 2.8 percent increase.

Moraine Park Technical College: 3.1 percent increase.

State tax credit: 5.2 percent increase for the village.

Santa Has History Of Making Grand Appearance

- Santa Parachuted From A Plane In 1938

On Sunday, Santa Claus will be the featured guest in the Christmas parade that goes through Kewaskum.

He has been in the parade here ever since it began 28 years ago. But he has been making grand appearances in Kewaskum for much longer than that.

Perhaps the most memorable was on Saturday, Dec. 10, 1938, when Santa arrived in an airplane. He parachuted from 1,857 feet in the air into the Village of Kewaskum that year.

It was a highly publicized event. As stated in the *Kewaskum Statesman* on December 2, 1938, it was "an event never before attempted in this vicinity." The Gem Theatre Circuit of Milwaukee even came to Kewaskum to film a movie of the spectacle.

The event attracted thousands of people, both young and old. People were on hand as early as 8 a.m. for the spectacular event, even though it was not scheduled to take place until after 10 a.m.

"We can't recall a time when Kewaskum's Main street was so crowded," an article in the *Kewaskum Statesman* reported on December 16, 1938.

People lined up on Main Street from Fond du Lac Avenue to the post office and beyond. Hundreds gathered at village homes, while hundreds more sat in parked cars, all awaiting Santa's arrival.

Records show that the crowd became uneasy when Santa arrived late. The weather was quite cold, but all seemed to forget about this when the plane carrying the beloved saint was sighted.

A special siren sounded, announcing the arrival of Santa. His plane flew over the town, and then circled back, flying very low. Santa could clearly be seen waving at the crowd.

The plane circled around again, and then, as the plane flew just south of the village, Santa jumped.

As Santa dropped through the air with his parachute, the sirens on both of Kewaskum's fire trucks sounded as they drove to pick up the big man.

The wind was stronger than expected that day, and Santa and his parachute were blown a little off course. Instead of landing just outside the village limits, Santa floated about a mile farther and landed in a large tree about a mile east of town, in a field behind the Nic. Haug farm.

Kewaskum's firefighters rescued Santa from the tree and brought him into the village in a fire truck. The big man then handed out over 1,500 bags of candy and nuts to all the happy children.

Santa was unharmed in the jump, but his parachute was punctured almost beyond repair, according to reports. Santa undoubtedly still remembers this near disaster, but he is always happy to return to Kewaskum each year.

Christmas Parade Marshals Named

Continued From... Vision Screening Held In School District

With the tests that the Lions clubs used this year, there is no guesswork. The student does not need to read anything. There are no puffs of air or bright lights in the student's eyes.

The student simply looks into a camera, which measures each eye and reveals whether or not the student needs corrective glasses. It even identifies the necessary prescription for each eye. The entire test takes less than eight seconds.

"It's pretty phenomenal," Bocher said.

Students who already wear glasses were able to be screened while wearing their glasses, and the test showed whether their glasses were the correct prescription.

If a student did not pass the vision test, Bocher contacted that student's parents. Bocher then gave the results to that student's eye doctor, and asked the doctor to get back to her after examining the student.

"We want to know that there is follow up," Bocher explained.

For families who are not

able to afford eyeglasses or a complete eye exam, a special program was offered through Shopko and Eye Care Optical of West Bend.

This year is the first time the Lions and Lioness clubs have used the test for schools in Washington County.

"The test is very easy to use. It tells us if the student passes or to refer them. It can tell if someone has a lazy eye, is cross eyed, near sighted or far sighted. It reads everything," said Mary Lou Desrosier, a member of the West Bend Lioness Lions Club.

Before now, when there was no test offered in the school district, if a teacher had a concern about a student's vision, they contacted Bocher. She then used a wall chart to screen the student's vision, and she would let the parent know if there was an issue.

"Sometimes it is just a matter of rearranging the child in the room so they are closer to the board if they can't get glasses," Bocher said.

It is recommended that students have their vision

tested before entering kindergarten. Once they start school, students should have their eyes checked yearly.

Kewaskum Boys Face Too-Tall An Order

The Kewaskum boys basketball team was able to hold Slinger's Derek Sabin in check for the first half of their season-opener on November 25, but in the second half, the six-foot, eight-inch post player who recently signed a D-1 letter of intent with Belmont University (Nashville, Tennessee), was too much for the Indians to handle.

Sabin scored 13 of his team-high 14 points after the break to lead the taller Owls to a 50-31 victory.

"I thought we played a good, strong first half. They did a lot of good things ... reversing the ball and sharing the ball," Kewaskum High School coach Don Gruber said. "They competed the whole game. They were working hard right to the end."

Kewaskum led once in the game at 5-4 with 13:40 remaining after Dan Kreis scored on a successful banker inside, but then the Indians struggled offensively, falling behind by eight points at intermission, 22-14.

The deficit grew early in the second half as the Owls went on a 10-0 run, pushing their lead to 40-19. First Sabin scored inside, then Sam Dodge added a rebound basket, Sabin hit a three from the top of the key, Matt Wetherall added a bucket and Sabin popped in one of two free throws.

Finally, six-foot senior forward Jerad Chesak broke Slinger's monopoly by driving for a basket with 11 minutes to play, going right around Sabin for the two points. Chesak added one more basket on a baby hook, but in the final five minutes, the Indians managed just four more points, a short jumper by Kreis and a pair of free throws by Cole Surprenant.

"They pressed us in the second half, and we had too many turnovers," Gruber said. KHS also didn't shoot very well, hitting just 12 of 39 shots.

The KHS coach, starting his third season, was pleased with his team's defense. "Down low, our defense was good," he said, adding, "Jared was

giving up six or seven inches."

Chesak led the team with 12 points on six of 12 shooting, while fellow senior Jordan Carlton added 10 points, including a pair of wide open threes from the base line, one in each half.

"I thought Danny drove to the basket well," Gruber went on about one of his guards, who chipped in with six points.

When asked if he thought they would face a taller team than Slinger this season Gruber said, "I don't think so. They had to be 6-8, 6-6 and 6-4."

That kind of height makes it difficult for a team where the tallest player is six-feet, two-inches.

"You get to the second half (against them), and you get worn down," Gruber said.

Gruber said he told his players afterward, "Let's not be happy with this. We've got to keep improving. There's more in the

tank than we saw tonight."

Several KHS players were on the bench in street clothes, reportedly sitting out because of athletic code violations.

After hosting Kiel on November 28, the Indians are at North Fond du Lac tonight (November 30) and travel to Mayville December 2 before opening East Central Conference play on December 12 against highly regarded Waupun.


The "Buc's" Stop Here!

School District Continues Exploring Potential Baseball Field Locations

In October, the Kewaskum School Board directed school administration to look into options of improving the baseball diamond that the high school baseball team uses.

Under that directive, the district is currently considering building a baseball diamond where the current middle school sits. A new two-story middle school is being added on the high school building.

An earlier plan had been to put a soccer field at the old middle school's location. However, if it is feasible, a baseball diamond and possibly a softball diamond could be built there.

The school district is planning on installing a biofilter for its building project, and a baseball field would impact the biofilter plan. In addition,

there are some wetlands and floodplains on the north end of the school property.

"There are a lot of moving pieces to that idea [of building a baseball field on the school property]," Village Administrator Matt Heiser said at the Village Board meeting Monday night.

Village staff is meeting with representatives from the school district and the Department of Natural Resources this Thursday, Nov. 30, to discuss the matter.

The school district anticipates spending up to \$600,000 on a new baseball diamond, and would like to put artificial turf on the infield.

Currently, the school uses the baseball diamond on the southwest side of Kiwanis Park. However, home plate faces the wrong direction,

and the outfield is not level. One option the school has considered is to fix up the current field it uses.

Another option the school has considered is creating a new diamond on the north side of the creek, where there currently are baseball fields that the Kewaskum Athletic Association (KAA) uses for youth baseball.

The school district had a topographical survey done on the Kiwanis Park land in October so that it could evaluate any possibilities at Kiwanis Park.

However, the Village of Kewaskum is currently exploring its options for managing stormwater on Edgewood Road. One solution would be to build a retention pond on the northwest side of Kiwanis Park. If that is done, the school would not be able to use that space for a new baseball diamond.

Also, the retention pond could possibly impact one of the baseball diamonds that the KAA uses.

A remaining option for the school is to build a new field at Reigle Family Park, a new park that was recently created on Edgewood Road.

The KAA and the Kewaskum Youth Soccer Organization are in the early stages of developing Reigle Family Park.



Buy Local: Buy A Real Christmas Tree

– Real Christmas Trees Benefit Wisconsin's Economy And Environment

Besides creating memories and family traditions, cutting a real Christmas tree benefits the economy and environment.

"A real Christmas tree is an environmentally friendly option that also supports local Christmas tree growers," said Sarah Marketon, Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation's director of communications. "With many consumers showing a preference for local products, the tradition of celebrating Christmas with a real tree is a great option."

Christmas trees absorb carbon dioxide and other gases, and in turn emit oxygen. For every real Christmas tree harvested, two to three seedlings are planted. Tree farms are

also a great habitat for wildlife to live.

"Christmas trees are often grown on soil that wouldn't otherwise be used to grow crops," Marketon added.

Even after Christmas, the real trees can be recycled into mulch to be used on trails or gardens. Some recycled cut trees are used as soil erosion barriers or wildlife habitats.

Meeting consumer demands for real Christmas trees this year won't be a problem due to ideal weather conditions.

There are plenty of trees available, according to Cheryl Nicholson, executive secretary of the Wisconsin Christmas Tree Producers Association.

"It's a great year for fam-

ilies to venture out to get a real Christmas tree," Nicholson said. "With the good growing season this past summer the trees look great."

Wisconsin has more than 365 licensed Christmas tree farms. According to the most recent agricultural census, Wisconsin is fifth in the nation in the number of trees cut and acres (more than 23,000) in production. More than 600,000 evergreens are harvested each fall.

"The sale of Christmas trees and wreaths generates more than 16 million dollars for Wisconsin's economy and thousands of residents are employed in the industry, because it is a labor-intensive agri-

culture crop," added Nicholson. "Many tree farms offer gift shops, farm animals, reindeer, bonfires, hot chocolate, wagon rides and other activities, which makes for a fun winter-time ag-tourism trip for families."

Brighten The Indoors With Colorful Amaryllis Blooms

Brighten those gray winter days with a few colorful, easy-care amaryllis. The six- to 10-inch trumpet shaped blossoms are sure to generate a smile and brighten your mood. And consider sharing the fun of growing these beauties with friends and families. Watching the bulbs transform into beautiful blossoms is an experience everyone will enjoy — and it's a gift that requires no dusting.

When buying amaryllis, purchase large bulbs for the biggest and longest lasting floral display. One jumbo bulb will send up multiple flower stems over several weeks. Smaller bulbs can be planted two or three to a pot to create a living bouquet.

Try some of the newer varieties like 'Lagoon' and 'Red Pearl'. Their 10-inch blossoms are sure to enliven any indoor decor. Grow the 'Nymph' series of double amaryllis if you prefer large flowers on shorter stems. 'Cherry Nymph' has a rose-like beauty with layers of fire engine red petals.

And for something different, grow amaryllis 'Evergreen' with long and narrow, pale chartreuse petals. Large bulbs will have two or more stems, each with four or more flowers. Or plant the uniquely shaped 'Exotic Star' with garnet red stripes and apple green highlights on ivory petals.

Grow your amaryllis in a pot with drainage holes and use a quality potting mix. Plant large bulbs in individual pots that are seven to eight inches deep and five to six inches across. Or group several bulbs together in a larger container.

Look for unique containers or decorative baskets to showcase these beauties. To see some creative ways to display and decorate your home with amaryllis, download a free Winter-Blooming Bulbs Inspiration Book (longfield-gardens.com).

When planting amaryllis bulbs, the top half of the bulb should stay above the soil surface. You can dress up the container by covering the soil surface with moss or decorative stones. Water the potting mix thoroughly after planting, and place the container in a cool (60-65°F), bright location. Water sparingly until the sprouts appear, and then start watering weekly, allowing the soil to dry out in between.

Or go soilless. Place several inches of pebbles in the bottom of a glass vase or watertight container. Cover the pebbles with water. Set the bulb on top of the pebbles and add more stones around

the bulb to hold it in place. Add water as needed, keeping the water level just below (almost touching) the bulb.

Now relax and wait the month or more needed for your amaryllis bulb to wake up and start growing. Flower buds usually emerge before the leaves, but sometimes the leaves come first. When the buds begin to open, move your amaryllis away from direct sunlight to extend the flower display.

You can also display these magnificent blooms in a vase. Wait until the buds are soft and showing a little color, then cut the stems to the desired length and place them in a clean vase with fresh water.

To keep your blooming plant looking its best, use scissors to remove individual flowers as they fade. Cut the entire stem back to the bulb once it has finished blooming. And watch for a second or third flower stem to appear. Some bulbs produce multiple stems at one time while others rest a week or two before sending up another flower stem.

That's all there is to it. Just plant, water and place in a brightly lit location for weeks of fresh, colorful flowers this winter.

The daughter of an inventor, the late Albert Clark of West Bend, Kober had a vision for this property since 2009. She and her husband Brian acquired the land and buildings in 2012, the same day IRS designated Bridget Center a charitable organization.

About the buildings, Kober says, "When we restore beautiful, old community buildings, we har-

ness the energy of love and connection that served here long ago."

Bridget's tagline is "Enter for the joy of it!"

"Sometimes life doesn't feel so joyful, but when people come together with a clear vision of what is possible or spend time in this natural setting, magic happens. Here, we remember divine connection, and we are never alone," Kober said.
