## Christmas Parade Welcomes Holiday Season

With mild temperatures and a clear sky, conditions were ideal, and a large crowd turned out for the Kewaskum Christmas Parade on Sunday, Dec. 3.

Many had been preparing for the big event over the past couple of weeks. The result was a lot of festive lights and Christmas spirit parading down Main Street in Kewaskum.

The spectacle included many regular performers, such as the Wacky Wheeler, Downtown Harrison and the River City Christmas Brass Band. But it also had new entries, such as Reigle Family Park, a new 31-acre park that was created in Kewaskum earlier this year.

The hour-long parade included 18 floats, all vying for an award in the float contest. They each were decorated for this year's theme of "Silver Screen Holidays."

The winning float was Geidel's Piggly Wiggly's whimsical, yet elaborate float that featured the Grinch overlooking Whoville.

Two floats tied for second place. The Kewaskum Cub Scouts, with a float that depicted "The Polar Express," came in second along with the Kewaskum Youth Soccer Organization (KYSO) that had a float of "A Christmas Story."

Goeden's Auto Body rounded out the top prizes, placing third with a float based on the film "Elf."

"There were so many good floats this year. It made the judging very, very tough, and it was real close," said Mike Geidel, who chaired the parade committee.

### Horse Power

Not all the parade entries were floats. The girls in Girl Scout Troop 8394 were among the parade "walkers."

The girls in the fourth-grade troop were bummed when they learned they would not be able to ride on a float this year. They still wanted to participate and decided to walk.

When the girls found out that Peggy Spangenberg was going to bring her horses to walk with them, they were overjoyed.

## Kewaskum 9/11 Memorial Draws Support From Across The Country

### – 9/11 Memorial Receives \$50,000 Donation

The Kewaskum Remembers 9/11 memorial is a little closer to becoming a reality, after attracting supporters from across the country.

The memorial is receiving a \$50,000 donation from the W. Martin and Andrea A. Deputy Beacon Foundation, based out of South Carolina.

"This memorial will not only give people a place to gather and remember the souls who lost their lives that horrible day, but it is our wish that this memorial will also serve to educate people, some not even born at the time, how it brought this country together," W. Martin Deputy said.

One of the people who was killed in the World Trade Center in the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001, was Andrea Haberman, a 25-year-old Kewaskum High School graduate.

To honor Haberman and the others lost in the 9/11 attacks, plans for a

memorial in Kewaskum began about six years ago. The hope is to construct a Kewaskum Remembers 9/11 memorial in front of the Annex building, located at 1308 Fond du Lac Ave. in Kewaskum. The memorial will be centered around a steel beam recovered from the North Tower.

Although Deputy has lived in Charleston, South Carolina, for the past 20 years, he has ties to Wisconsin and to the Haberman family. Deputy was born and raised in

Mequon. And he worked for Andrea Haberman's father, Gordon Haberman some 30 years ago.

"My first job when I was 16 was for Gordy at Piper's Restaurant in Mequon. I started as a dishwasher, worked as a line cook and managed a little bit, Deputy said.

Both Deputy's sister and brother also worked for Haberman, and the two families became close friends.

Still, the Haberman family is overwhelmed by the donation.

"There are no words. That's all I can say. I'm humbled," said Kathy Haberman, Andrea's mother.

"It is just amazing news," Gordon Haberman added.

# Chief's Corner

Last Sunday was another awesome Christmas Parade organized by the Chamber of Commerce. Thank you to everyone who played a role in organizing and assisting to make this year's parade another success!

Although the weather was very comfortable for the parade, December is upon us and that means winter is set to arrive any day now. As you get your Christmas shopping done and purchase those perfect gifts for your loved ones, it is important to understand that some of this year's hottest gifts may not be legal to use around the village.

According to Wisconsin statutes, in order to operate a motorized vehicle on the highway, the vehicle must be operated by a licensed operator and must be registered. The definition of 'highway' includes "all public ways and thoroughfares," which does include sidewalks. Some of the season's most popular Christmas gift items, such as motorized scooters and self-balancing electric scooters (hover boards), are not legal to be operated on any sidewalk that is adjacent to a public road. Local communities are unable to

waive this as it would violate state law. Ultimately, the only places on which motorized scooters can be operated are private property, private roads, and private driveways, with permission. These items may be the perfect gift for someone in your family, but make sure they understand where they can legally operate one.

Throughout the year we get many questions about motorized vehicles and their use on village streets and sidewalks. The Village of Kewaskum does allow for low-speed vehicles to be operated on village streets; however, these vehicles must meet very specific standards as specified in state statute. Motor vehicles such as lawnmowers, go-carts, "gators" and golf carts were designed for off-road use only and may not be operated on a sidewalk or street.

With winter ready to strike any day now, it is important to prepare for snow removal. All-terrain vehicles (ATVs), although generally illegal to use in the Village, may be used for snow removal purposes, per state statute. ATVs may be operated on the roadway or sidewalk for the purpose of

removing snow and must have the snow removal device attached. Operators may travel up to two miles if necessary to remove snow. Please be sure to have appropriate lighting and other safety precautions to ensure your safety.

Snow also means snowmobilers will once again bundle up and hit the trails. Village ordinances do not allow for operation off of the Eisenbahn State Trail. The only location in the Village to get on/off the trail is at Kohn's Filling Station (BP Station) on Fond du Lac Avenue. However, that location is private property so riders should receive permission prior to parking and using their lot. Any snowmobile operated off trail will be issued a citation.

This time of year does bring about many different opportunities to enjoy the outdoors. Just be sure that when doing so, you are operating within local laws and ordinances.

The driver showed signs of intoxication, failed the Standard Field Sobriety Tests, blew a 0.15 in a PBT and was arrested for


OWI. There were no injuries related to the crash.

—Governor Walker Signs Farm Freedom Act Into Law

Wisconsin farmers will have the freedom to grow a new crop next year. The Farm Freedom Act, which enables the cultivation of industrial hemp, was signed into law by Governor Walker on the heels of its unanimous passage through both the Assembly and the Senate.

Both Representative Jesse Kremer (Kewaskum) and Senator Patrick Testin (Stevens Point), the Farm Freedom Act's primary authors, were excited about the new opportunities that the bill gives to farmers.

"After more than a year working with farmers, processors, and many of



entrepreneurs who are poised to become national and global leaders in this industry in the decades to come."

Senator Testin agreed that the day was a significant milestone for Wisconsin farmers — and that it was a long time coming.

"I am grateful that former representative Eugene Hahn could join us at the signing," said Sen. Testin. "He was a champion of this bill for years, and he laid the groundwork for today's success. It's very gratifying to be able to get this done for Wisconsin farmers."

**Weekly HEALTH TIP**

**DANCING IS GREAT FOR THE BRAIN**

Exercise has been shown to fight age-related brain decline, but it's not clear if one kind of exercise is better than another. Volunteers, average age 68, were assigned to an 18-month weekly exercise program of either learning dance routines or endurance and flexibility training. Afterward, both groups showed an increase in the hippocampus region of the brain, which is associated with memory, learning and balance. While both groups improved, only the dancers showed a change in behavior in terms of improved balance. The difference may be due to the challenge of learning new dance routines every two weeks and recalling them without cues.

The anticipated cost of constructing the memorial is \$225,000, with another \$200,000 of in-kind gifts of material and labor.

This year, the Kewaskum Remembers 9/11 obtained its 501 (c)(3) status. A survey of the proposed site has been completed, and the design is currently being developed.

"Hopefully early next year we will be able to present the design to the village board," said Gordon Haberman.

This recent donation adds to support that the Kewaskum Remembers 9/11 has received locally.

"The village has been just so helpful to us. We've had support with previous donations from so many different companies. Here we have a gentleman in South Carolina who believes in the reasons for this memorial. We have a lot of people very interested in having this be a success," Gordon Haberman said.

"Our hope is this will be a catalyst for us to increase the amount of donors and hopefully attract donors that will put us over the top and allow us to begin construction on that after plans are ready and approved by the village. So it's an exciting period for the memorial," Gordon Haberman added.

Deputy would like to see the memorial become a place where people can not only reflect on what happened on 9/11, but also can learn from it.

"Maybe some good can come out of it. Maybe, as horrible as it may sound, there are communities around the world, that are not finger pointing, but maybe saying we should take a look at how we got here," Deputy said.

Deputy has two children, ages 15 and 12, and he would like them to know about the events of 9/11, something that happened before they were born.

"It seems to me it would be tough for them to understand or learn if there wasn't some sort of memorial. A place not to just bow your heads and to say it happened, that's too bad, never forget. But also: What can we garnish from this?" Deputy said.

Although the name of the memorial is Kewaskum Remembers 9/11, Deputy said it is not just Kewaskum that remembers. It is the entire nation.

"It is not just a regional thing," Deputy said.

## School Superintendent Gives Update On Capital Project

The Kewaskum Board of Education is happy to announce that the predicted tax increase of 19 cents per \$1,000 of property value has decreased to 7.5 cents per \$1,000, meaning that a property valued at \$200,000 will realize a \$15 increase versus the predicted \$38. Increases in housing values and growth in our communities attributed to this significant decrease, which is great news for our taxpayers.

Additionally, we continue to make great progress with the capital project, with the walls established, floors poured and roofing beams being put into place. The mild weather has created excellent working conditions for C.D. Smith, and they have been taking full advantage of it.

Behind the scenes we have been working closely with Bray Architects and C.D. Smith during the bidding process and are elated to share that the bids, with approximately 80 percent of them submitted and approved, have been favorable. During the planning stages of the capital project, the Long Range Planning Committee prioritized a list of alternative high school remodeling projects in case this favorable situation presented itself. Now that this has become a reality, we have added two items from the alternative list to the project.

The first addition to the scope of the project addresses the seven-foot height change between the middle and high school buildings. We designed an outdoor tiered seating area in the courtyard that was created to bring in natural light to

both the new middle school and existing high school areas. This area will seat approximately 300 people which can be used for outdoor classrooms, musical concerts, or drama productions. Requisite sound and lighting needs will be included, making it available for evening use as well.

The second addition is to remove the existing metal sheeting around the high school gymnasium area and replace it with more durable, energy efficient brick. The brick will match the exterior brick that will be used for the new middle school and will blend nicely into the existing brick exterior on the high school.

The School Board and administration are constantly monitoring the construction, with the goal of maximizing the approved referendum dollars. The aforementioned additions are examples of this. We are committed to updating, fixing and enhancing as many secondary building needs as possible, with the goal being that our high school and middle school buildings will be in great shape for many years to come.

C.D. Smith is welcoming the community to tour the first phases of the construction site on Monday, Dec. 11 at 4 p.m. Those interested in attending should sign up by calling 262-626-8427, extension 8005.

The crew of about 15 people worked all of last week on the parade, averaging about three hours a day.

It is something the workers look forward to every year. It helps create lots of Christmas spirit, according to Carolyn Janz, who has helped create the Pig's float for the past decade.

"There are things they need help with, and we just chip in and do it," Janz said.

But the group enjoys the



work. So much so that float builders are known to return to help make the float, even if they no longer work at Piggly Wiggly. They enjoy the camaraderie and the creativity. Plus, it's fun, Janz said.

Each year the process begins with the crew getting together and brainstorming to come with ideas for a spectacular float.

"Then we try to make it all work with what we have. And we just kind of see what we can do with the limited amount of time," Janz said.

This year, after the float's masterminds decided to go with the "Grinch" theme, they researched ways to make the float come alive. Once they decided what they would like to build on the float, they found pictures online of Whos and Whoville online.

## Paulowske Finds Her Shooting Eye, But Indians Still Fall

Kewaskum girls basketball coach Russell Thull knew it was just a matter of time before his sharp-shooting sophomore guard, Maxine Paulowske would start hitting her shots.

In the Indians' game against host Random Lake on November 28, Paulowske was right on target, hitting 20 of her game-high 25 points in the first half when the Indians surged into a 30-16 lead. Unfortunately, the Rams answered, scoring 40 points in the second half to win the game 61-45.

We played our best half of the year, unfortunately we didn't duplicate that in the second half," Thull said afterward. "A strong first half helped us take a lead going into halftime, 30-21. The lead was built by a solid defensive effort as well as a huge first half by Maxine Paulowske. She shot six of seven from three (point land) and scored 20 first half points."



## Bauer Stands Atop The 145 Victory Stand; Indians Take Fourth At Slinger

They had hoped for three or four champions, but the Kewaskum High wrestling team had to settle for just one in the December 2 Gunslinger Invitational hosted by Slinger.

Eric Bauer was the lone Indians finalist and the lone champion, winning the 145-pound weight class with relative ease. He capped off a 4-0 day with a first period pin over Burlington's Jake Skrundz. The pin time was a brief 1:09.

"In the finals, he beat up on that guy," KHS coach Scott Rhoads said of his junior standout, noting, "His semifinal match was his toughest, 4-2 in the third period. They were both on their feet. It was nerve-wracking," but Bauer refused to give up a takedown to edge Max Bruss of DePere by two points.

En route to the finals, Bauer had a pin, an 11-0 major decision and a technical fall.

Kewaskum wound up fourth in the 16 team field,

scoring 268.5 points. Burlington was a runaway winner of the tournament, amassing 448 points, nearly 100 ahead of the host Owls, who had 353.5. Arrowhead was third with 289.

"Getting fourth as a team is something we were impressed by. We didn't expect to place that high," Rhoads said, pointing out 14 of the 16 schools are D-1.

After Bauer, the Indians claimed one third place and three fourths. While one might have guessed one of the returning state qualifiers took the third, but they would have been wrong. It was Sam Larson, who had a good outing, going 3-1 to finish third at 170 pounds.

"It seems he's on quite a mission this year," Rhoads said about Larson, who finished off his day with a 17-5 major decision over Beaver Dam's Mateo Ramirez. He also had two pins.

The fourths came from Nathaniel Droese at 106, Braden Maertz at 138 and Alex Deheck at 152.

Droese, who was 3-2 on

the day, finished the tournament with a 5-1 loss to Carter Ziebell of Slinger. "He had a pretty good day. He ran into some good wrestlers," Rhoads said of Droese.

Maertz (3-2) had a good start in the tournament, with a pin in 1:40, a 6-3 decision and another pin in 1:54, but his winning run was stopped by Slinger's Caleb Ziebell, who beat him by major decision 8-0, and in the battle for third, he was beaten 5-1 by Fort Atkinson's Draven Sigmund.

"I would say his bracket was the toughest in the whole tournament," Rhoads said of the 138 class.

Deheck (3-1) was forced to forfeit his match with West Bend East's Bryce Henschel because of an injury. "He had something wrong with his foot after the semis," Rhoads said, indicating, because he forfeited, Deheck won't have to count this as a loss.

Earlier in the day, he won a 6-1, a 9-0 major decision and a 7-2 decision before losing by major decision to Evan Sinda of Muskego 8-0.

The other KHS top-10 finishes came from fresh-

man Kannon Muckerheide at 182, senior Adam Bruss at 113 pounds and junior Tanner Goeman at 160. Muckerheide (3-2) placed sixth, while the two others were seventh.

Muckerheide lost his final match by a single point, 9-8, to Tyler Larsen of Muskego.

In his final match, Bruss, who went 3-2 on the day, pinned Sawyer Bradenburg of Fort Atkinson in a quick :17.

Goeman (3-2) put the finishing touches on a good day with a pin in 1:57 over Waukesha West's Sam Mikulak.

Kewaskum's other participants finished as follows: 120 pounds, Mason Pomeroy was 10th; at 126, Isaiah George was 13th; and Alex Butler was 11th at 132. Freshman Tucker Schmidt had a tough day at 220, going 0-5, while Nathan Lawrence was 1-3 and placed 11th at 285.

Teams could take extra wrestlers so KHS took Jaden Rhoads, the coach's nephew, at 145, and he went 0-4.

The Indians travel to Winneconne tonight (December 7) and will compete in the Sun Prairie Invitational on December 9.

## Stars Return; KHS Should Have A Good Wrestling Season

Students at the Kewaskum Middle School may have noticed a little more spring in Scott Rhoads' step recently. The reason is simple — Rhoads, a social studies teacher there, can hardly wait to get the Kewaskum High wrestling season started.

Who wouldn't be excited? Rhoads, starting his fifth year as head coach, has four returning state qualifiers, who combined for 128 wins a year ago. He also returns six other letter winners.

Leading the Indians is junior Eric Bauer (38-2), who finished second in the D-2 state meet as a freshman and fourth as a sophomore. Bauer will be looking to move up the podium ladder this winter and will be going after his third straight East Central Conference title.

"He's pretty well ready to go," Rhoads said about Bauer, who recently went 6-2 in the annual USA Wrestling PreSeason Nationals and just missed placing.

The others who have state experience and are returning include Adam Bruss, who was 25-7, Braden Maertz, 33-5; and Alex Deheck, 29-10. Bruss is a senior while Maertz is a sophomore and Deheck is a junior.

"Braden (Maertz), Eric, Tanner (Goeman), Alex (Deheck) and Nathaniel Droese are training all year long now," Rhoads said, indicating they work out at private facilities.

The other returning letter winners are sophomore Mason Pomeroy, juniors Droese, Goeman, Sam Larson and Eddie Padilla, who combined for 100 wins, and sophomore Alex Butler, who wrestled as a JV most of the year, filling in on the varsity several times.

Rhoads is happy to report he and assistant coach, Charlie Deaton, are working with a squad of 20 athletes, which is an increase of three or four from last season. Also, this number includes several bigger kids, which has

been an Achilles heel for the Indians in recent years.

"Yeah, we have a lot of bigger kids this year," Rhoads said, reporting sophomore Nathan Lawrence is back after a year's absence. "He looks like our starting heavy-weight ... He weighs about 230-240 (pounds)."

"We have a freshman at 220 ... Tucker Schmidt," Rhoads went on. "This will be his second year wrestling."

Freshman Ben Leister will need a little time to learn the basic wrestling moves, but Rhoads is happy to have him out for the sport, and says, "Kannon Muckerheide, a freshman, will be shuffling between 182 and a 195." Muckerheide qualified for the State Kids Tournament last spring.

Looking at the East Central teams, Rhoads said, "I believe we are focusing on Ripon and Campbellsport as some of the bigger threats. Campbellsport won the last two EC titles, but Kewaskum may have the edge this year as far as its returnees."

There are just seven teams in the EC Conference as Kettle Moraine Lutheran tried to field a team several years ago and dropped the sport last year.

Kewaskum changed up its tournament schedule this winter. After feeling team tournaments were the answer for his younger athletes, now Rhoads is reversing course and taking the Indians to individual tournaments. "We need real tough individual tournaments to challenge our juniors," he said.

One such tournament is the Mid-States Tournament, which is hosted by UW-Whitewater on Thursday and Friday, Dec. 28-29. "It's a real tournament. The top five teams are state-challenging calibre teams," Rhoads said.

The Indians opened at the Gunslinger Invitational on December 2. "We're ready to go," Rhoads said. "We should have three or four people come away with championships."




## Packers Playoff Season Needs A Win Over Browns!

About the seniors who led the way to a third straight East Central Conference title, one a shared title with Berlin and Plymouth, KHS coach Jason Piittmann said, "We had some seniors who were in their third year of playing varsity and that provided great experience for them to help guide the young guys on the team - especially since we had some freshmen getting significant playing time."

He went on, "The senior class did a superb job of leading the way. It has been a treat to watch them grow and develop over the past four years."

"It was fun to watch this group come together and gel as the season went along. The conference schedule favored us in that we were able to find our identity, as a team, with our early season games. It was different, but good, with two new non-conference opponents," Piittmann said. "Campbellsport tested us early, which ended up being a good thing for us. By the time we got to the Plymouth game we were playing pretty good football, which we needed to defeat them. We continued that through to the Berlin game where we played remarkably well in shutting them out, and then not letting up as we got to the end of the season and first round of the playoffs."

About the playoffs,

Piittmann said it was disappointing not to get the number one seed and having to play Green Bay Notre Dame in Level 2. "It was a unique season on the JV and JV2 levels with shuffling some kids so we could field three levels of teams. We ended up with some 'not so good' match-ups for the JV due to a number of conference schools not fielding teams at that level," Piittmann said. "Overall very impressed with the way these kids kept pushing and working hard. There is plenty of promise in those classes."

It was previously announced that Steger was a first team selection on the WFC All State team as a utility player, while Donovan and Krier were given honorable mention.

The Indians were blanked in the balloting for the Associated Press All State Football Team, which was announced on December 1.

## December And January Hold Additional Opportunities For Deer Hunters

The nine-day gun deer hunt may be over, but hunters can still participate in the muzzleloader season, archery and cross-bow seasons and two antlerless-only gun hunts.

The muzzleloader deer season runs from November 27 through December 6 and gives hunters the opportunity to fill any unused deer tag and extend their gun deer season. Thousands of hunters participate in this hunt every year using both primitive and modern muzzleloaders.

The annual statewide four-day, antlerless-only hunt will take place December 7-10. Hunters may fill any unused antlerless tags while hunting in the proper deer management zone, unit and land type specified on the tag.

In addition, the antlerless-only holiday hunt will

be offered in 17 farmland units from December 24 through January 1, 2018. These seasons are used at the request of County Deer Advisory Councils and utilized in units with high deer numbers in need of antlerless harvest to slow overall herd growth. Hunters may fill any unused antlerless tags in their proper deer management zone, county and land type. Any unit where the holiday hunt is not offered will be open for archery and crossbow hunting, and bucks may be taken.

Any legal firearm, cross-bow or archery equipment may be used during the statewide antlerless-only and holiday hunts.

Additional opportunities are also available for U.S. Armed Forces members and Class A and C disability permit holders.

The archery and cross-bow seasons will remain open through January 7, 2018 statewide.

Metro sub-units have special deer seasons that include the gun deer season to remain open through December 6, while archery and cross-bow seasons remain open through January 31, 2018. All hunters except waterfowl hunters are required to wear blaze orange or blaze pink clothing during any open firearm deer hunt. Other outdoor enthusiasts recreating on public lands are encouraged to wear bright colors for their own safety during these periods.

Jordan Carlton led the Indians. He had 24 points, including 8x9 free throws, while Jared Chesak and Brad Buechel also hit in double figures with 11 and 10, respectively.

The Cardinals are young, with just one senior listed on the team, but they are tall, and at times, the Indians had their hands full with six-foot, six-inch sophomore Joseph Adamson and six-foot, four-inch Jackson Mittelstadt, who combined for 28 points, including a thunderous dunk by Mittelstadt midway in the second half which tied the game at 38-all.

From then on the game was very close, with three ties and seven lead changes before the game ended with the scoreboard showing both teams with 53 points.

Mayville nearly won the game after Hunter Hempel put up a three at the buzzer, drawing a foul by Carlton. Luckily for the Indians, Hempel missed the first free throw. He swished the next two, and it was on to an extra four minutes of play, with the Cardinals taking a four-point lead on back-to-back buckets by Matthew Schellinger and Adamson.

Mayville would not score again, however, and the Indians climbed back into the lead after some urging by their coach who told them they had two minutes to make a difference, and they responded.

After missing a shot

inside, Carlton hit a pair of free throws to draw within two, and he tied the game at 57-all with a short jumper after taking a pass from Jared Chesak.

With :58 to go, Carlton hit two more free throws, giving the Indians their first lead in overtime. He was called for an offensive foul with 34 seconds remaining, but Mayville missed its shot. Buechel grabbed the errant rebound and was fouled. He had a chance to ice the game with a double bonus, but both free throws spun out of the circle.

Mayville missed a shot with about 10 seconds to go. The Cardinals fouled after the miss, and Chesak scored one of two free throws for a three-point lead, then Alex Nadalski was way off the mark on his three-point basket at the buzzer, and the Indians had win number three.

KHS shot 42 free throws in the game, hitting 31 of them for an impressive 73 percent. That helped the Indians cause, especially in the first half when they had just five baskets.

And did Gruber think his team would win three of their first four games? "I knew we would have an opportunity for three wins, and the kids made it happen," he said.

"We've got a very tall order coming up against Waupun," Gruber went on about the team's next game at Waupun in the East Central opener on December 12.

Gruber was concerned about how his team dealt with the Oriole's pressure, leading to 19 turnovers.

This year's recipient organization projects include:

Albrecht Free Clinic, "Healthy Smiles Change Lives" -- \$70,000: Good oral hygiene and dental care has been identified by the Albrecht Free Clinic as an emerging community health need. Funds will support emergency care, basic restorative and oral hygiene, and education for the uninsured and underinsured.

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Washington County, "Mentoring for Mental Health" -- \$8,000: The program will serve children 6-18 years of age in families facing adversity, and pair them with mentors who will provide awareness and education. The long-term goal is for the children to manage their illness or issue in a healthy way, avoid seeing drugs/alcohol as a solution and develop strong self-confidence and higher aspirations.

Boys & Girls Club of Washington County, "Healthy Choices Initiative" -- \$25,000: With the increasing risk that youth are facing with childhood obesity, the goal of this project is to improve the health and wellness of youth through proper nutrition, education and a positive influence regarding diet and exercise. Funds will provide 20,000 meals for youth in the Hartford, Jackson, Kewaskum and West Bend summer programs.

Casa Guadalupe Education Center, "Healthy Latinos, Healthy

Futures" -- \$22,250: Funds will support health seminars and programs, outreach initiatives and transportation needs to promote education about health screenings, diabetes prevention, active lifestyles and nutrition for Latinos living in Washington County.

Elevate, Inc. "Too Good for Drugs" -- \$25,600: Funds will be used to implement "Too Good for Drugs," a prevention program at all five elementary schools at the fourth grade level in the West Bend School District. The program will give youth access to information regarding alcohol and drugs in their school setting for safe and healthy decision-making.

Family Promise of Washington County, "Health Services & Housing for the Homeless" -- \$20,600: Family Promise will open a new Singles Shelter in February 2018, tripling the client base by 85-100 clients annually. The funds will be used to identify unaddressed behavioral health and physical health needs of individuals who are homeless, connect them to quality health care services, encourage follow-through with recommended treatment, and ensure safe and stable housing while seeking services.

Friends Inc., "Opening Doors Program" -- \$15,000: For individuals experiencing violence in their homes or relationships in Washington County, this project supports safe housing, child-care, mental health and substance abuse treat-

ment, and access to 24-hour crisis intervention. These services help individuals escape a violent relationship and gain access to mainstream resources to prevent further victimization for themselves and any children.

Interfaith Caregivers of Washington County, "Senior Transition Program" -- \$22,000: Funding will help seniors live and thrive in their homes and community by providing transportation to medical appointments, pharmacies, grocery stores/food pantries and exercise and wellness programs. When transportation barriers for seniors are removed, a senior's access to health care and other vital services such

as nutrition and wellness improves.

Kettle Moraine YMCA, "Wellness Programs" -- \$31,500: Funds will be used for the Diabetes Prevention Program through classes, screenings and community programs. This 12-week program engages adults with a current or past cancer diagnosis who are overweight or pre-diabetic in a group lifestyle intervention to help avoid effects of diabetes. Funds will support LIVESTRONG at the YMCA program through classes, pre- and post-assessments and in supporting survivors.

Froedtert & the Medical College of Wisconsin St. Joseph's Hospital, found-

## AAA Urges Drivers To Safely Secure Christmas Trees —Millions Of Drivers Facing Expensive Damage And Fines From Improperly Secured Trees

According to a new AAA survey, an estimated 20 million Americans who purchased a real Christmas tree in the last three years did not properly secure it to their vehicle, risking serious vehicle damage and dangerous road debris.

Vehicle damage that results from an improperly secured Christmas tree, such as scratched paint, torn door seals and distorted window frames, could cost up to \$1,500 to repair. In addition to vehicle damage, Christmas trees that are not properly secured are a safety hazard for other drivers. AAA urges all drivers to transport their Christmas trees safely this holiday season.

"Twine that is wrapped around trees and looped through door jams or open windows can cause serious damage to door seals and window frames," said Nick Jarmusz, director of public affairs for AAA — The Auto Club Group. "Drivers should never secure a Christmas tree to the top of a vehicle without a roof rack."

And according to the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety, road debris — which could include objects like improperly secured Christmas trees that fly off cars, landing on the road or on other cars — was responsible for

more than 200,000 crashes that resulted in 39,000 injuries and 500 deaths over the past four years. And, about two-thirds of debris-related crashes are the result of improperly secured items falling from a vehicle.

Fortunately, Christmas trees can be safely transported by taking the following steps:

- Use the right vehicle. It's best to transport a Christmas tree on top of a vehicle equipped with a roof rack. However, if you do not have a roof rack, use the bed of a pickup truck, or an SUV, van or minivan that can fit the tree inside with all doors closed.

- Use quality tie downs. Bring strong rope or nylon ratchet straps to secure the tree to your vehicle's roof rack. Avoid the lightweight twine offered by many tree lots.

- Protect the tree. Have the tree wrapped in netting before loading it. If netting is unavailable, secure loose branches with rope or twine.

- Protect your vehicle. Use an old blanket to prevent paint scratches and protect the vehicle finish.

- Point the trunk towards the front. Always place the tree on a roof rack or in a pickup bed with the bottom of the trunk facing the front of

the vehicle.

- Tie it down. Secure the tree at its bottom, center and top. At the bottom, use fixed vehicle tie-down points and loop around the trunk above a lower branch, to prevent any side-to-side or front-to-rear movement. The center and top tie downs should be installed in a similar manner.

- Give it the tug test. Before you leave the lot, give the tree several strong tugs from various directions to make sure it is secured in place and will not blow away.

- Drive slowly and easily. Take the back roads, if possible. Higher speeds create significant airflow that can damage your Christmas tree and challenge even the best tie-down methods.

Drivers can face hefty fines and penalties as well as jail time if an unsecured tree falls off their vehicle. Currently every state has laws that make it illegal for items to fall from a vehicle while on the road.

Most states' penalties result in fines ranging from \$10 and \$5,000, with at least 16 states listing jail as a possible punishment for offenders. Drivers can prevent injuries and avoid penalties by properly securing their loads to prevent items from falling off the vehicle.



Why do some kids grow up with ease while others struggle? Search Institute Researchers identified specific, practical things that can have a tremendous and lasting positive impact on youth. **Bonding To School**

Youth are more likely to grow up healthy when they care about their school.

**School Staying Power**

What's the difference between those who drop out of school and those who stay? Researchers Laurence Steinberg, Bradford Brown, Sanford Dornbusch, and Christopher Cross have identified three factors that cause young people to feel disconnected from their schools. They are:

- disinterest
- boredom, and
- lack of connection.

Those who stay in school and do well have the opposite experience. They like it there. They have people who enjoy seeing them every day and who miss them when they're absent. They have families and friends who are proud of what they do there. They have fun and enjoy learning at school; they are stimulated and challenged. Their school is accessible to parents and people of color. In essence, school is a good place for them to be.

**Time Together**

Three ways to help your child bond to school:

1. Set up a school bulletin board in a prominent place in your home. Hang up the school calendar and school notices. Meet once a month to choose which school activities to attend as a family.
2. Call the school and see if you can subscribe to the school newspaper through the mail. When it arrives, read and discuss it with your child.
3. Make supportive signs for big events.

**Talk And Share**

Part of bonding to school involves knowing that someone in school

cares about you. Tell your child about one adult and one peer in your school that cared about you when you were in school. Ask your child which adults and which friends at school he or she likes best and why.

**Liking School**

If your child does not like school, ask her or him why. Help your child work to solve the problem, so he or she is able to enjoy school.

Over time, the contest has led to valuable public and media exposure for the top business plans and spurred economic growth in Wisconsin. Finalists will share in more than \$100,000 in cash and in-kind prizes.

For their initial entries, contestants will submit a 250-word (about 2,000 characters) idea abstract online at [www.govsbizplancontest.com](http://www.govsbizplancontest.com). That's where contestants will also find business plan

templates and other information, such as the Entrepreneurs' Toolkit. The toolkit provides business startup information and assistance, networking contacts and technical resources.

Contestants who advance to subsequent contest rounds will expand their plan in stages. More than 70 judges drawn from the finance, sales, marketing, research and technology sectors across Wisconsin will score the entries and provide feedback on submissions.

To get started, contestants must create a simple account at [www.govsbizplancontest.com](http://www.govsbizplancontest.com). All entries are submitted through the website. Contestants use their account to gain access to mentors throughout the process, as well as review the judges' comments and feedback.

Since its inception in 2004, more than 3,520 entries have been received and about \$2.2 million in cash and services (such as legal, accounting, office space and marketing) have been award-

ed. Contest categories are Advanced Manufacturing, Business Services, Information Technology and Life Sciences.

Wisconsin residents 18 years old and older are eligible, as are teams from Wisconsin-based businesses and organizations. Businesses or teams from outside the state are also eligible to compete if they demonstrate intent to base or expand their business in Wisconsin. Entrepreneurs may also enter multiple ideas, though each idea must be separate and distinct.

Companies or individuals that have raised less than \$25,000 in private equity for their plans in a current form are eligible to enter. Generally speaking, private equity refers to angel and venture capital.

As with past contests, the 2018 competition will take place in stages:

• In Phase One, which is open until 5 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 31, 2018, the contest will accept idea abstracts on the website. Entries should be roughly 250

words (or no more than 2,000 characters, including spaces) and will be graded by the pool of BPC judges. The top 50 idea abstracts will advance to Phase Two.

• In Phase Two, which runs from February 19 to 5 p.m. March 12, 2018, the top 50 idea abstracts will submit an executive summary. The top 20 executive summaries will advance to Phase Three. A mentored "boot camp" for contestants will be held in early March.

• In Phase Three, which runs from April 2 to 5 p.m. April 23, 2018, the top 20 executive summaries will prepare full business plans. Judges will review the plans and pick three

finalists from each of the four categories to advance to the final presentation round. Mentored practice sessions will be offered to the top 12 in late May.

The top 12, or "Diligent Dozen," will square off with oral presentations during the Wisconsin Entrepreneurs' Conference on June 5 at Union South in Madison.

Past finalists have launched companies that have raised more than \$200 million in angel, venture, grants and venture debt over time – all while creating jobs and economic value for Wisconsin. The contest's major sponsors include the Wisconsin Economic Development Corp.

The 2017 grand prize winner was Northern Star Fire, an Eau Claire startup company whose device is an eight-directional compass that firefighters place inside their breathing apparatus and helps maintain and/or regain their orientation in low visibility conditions. Category winners in 2017 were Northern Star Fire (Advanced Manufacturing), Compost Crusader (Business Services), DotCom Therapy (Information Technology), and Nano Red (Life Sciences).
