About two years ago, Dr. Robert Butler began remodeling his chiropractic office at 1417 Fond du Lac Ave. in Kewaskum.

Then Butler started thinking. He uses two treatment rooms for his business, and so much of the 1,400 square feet in his building was not being used. He decided that maybe he should rent out that space to other businesses.

So he put out a "For Rent" sign in front of his building.

**PUZZLING NEWS**

A British study suggests that doing a crossword puzzle every day may help keep your brain sharp. The study of 17,000 people 50 and older discovered that the more often participants did word puzzles, the higher their scores were on tests of reasoning, attention and memory. Experts say that while the study reveals a link between word puzzle use and cognitive skills, it is not known if doing puzzles regularly actually improves skills. More study is needed to test if there is actual improvement in brain function in people who start doing word puzzles. Until then, exercise, don't smoke and eat a healthy diet.

## KHS Students Learn About Money

"Money makes money and money costs money."

"That's a very interesting quote that makes me think," said Kenzell Bocher, a student at Kewaskum High School.

It is one of the messages that juniors learned last month during their finance class at Kewaskum High School.

Joe Fazio, who is chairman, CEO and co-founder of Commerce State Bank, gave the message when he came to the school as a guest speaker. The students also read the message in Fazio's book, *This might be a dumb question but...How Does Money Work?*

Fazio's book covers a wide variety of topics, from savings to borrowing, to investing. When Fazio visited the class, it helped drive the lessons home.

"The application of it was what he brought in. He is another viewpoint, and the kids like to see that and really find out how important it is. His experience is really good," KHS business teacher Tim Rohlinger said.

Fazio wrote the book not just for high school students.

"I think everybody needs to understand money," Fazio said.

### Life Lessons

Fazio feels that even adults do not always understand money because it is something that they don't talk about as a family or as a society.

"What happens is you have a birthday when you are 9 years old, and some people give you cash. Your grandma or your uncle or your mom pulls you aside and tells you not to tell anybody how much money you have. They tell you it's nobody's business but yours," Fazio said.

When you get older and start earning money at a job, they tell you the same thing, he said.

"Don't tell anybody how much money you make. It's nobody's business but yours," is the advice people give you.

Therefore, people don't have discussions about money and how it works. It

remains a private, unspoken thing.

"What I'm trying to do is start that conversation. Maybe it is to start that conversation between husband and wife. Between father and son, or father and daughter, mom and son," Fazio said.

To get people to start talking about money and understanding financial strategies, Fazio tried to use everyday terms in his book that people could relate to.

For example, Fazio wrote that credit cards are like power tools.

Power tools can make jobs easier. Using a power drill, power saw or a snowblower can even make a job more fun to do.

But if safety precautions are not taken, they can also cause a lot of damage or injuries.

Likewise, credit cards can make buying things much easier. But if credit cards are not paid off, they can be dangerous because they can become very expensive and can damage credit ratings.

By using this type of comparison, Fazio hopes his book will hold people's attention.

"Then they can understand it, versus, if you tell people you are going to help them understand money, and the first thing we are going to do is some budgeting. And then you bring out a checkbook register. The only thing people hate more than finances, typically, is math, so let's combine the two and you have immediately turned them off," Fazio said.

Fazio's way of explaining finances seemed to be effective for the Kewaskum students.

"He had a good and simple way to explain how to spend money and how to save it," student Maddie Geidel said.

Fazio used stories throughout his book as a way to hold the reader's attention. That way, Fazio hopes that people will learn how to get the best credit card or the best mortgage rate, how to finance a car or how to decide if a 401(k) better than an IRA.

### Class Lessons

Hearing Fazio speak in person helped drive the lessons home, according to Rohlinger.

"It was nice to have another insight into the topics that we covered because they are so important for the kids," Rohlinger said. "I liked it because he was very down to earth and kept the kids engaged."

The students concurred. "It was cool to hear from a guy who makes a living off the stuff we are learning about in class," Brenden Rice explained.

All juniors at the school are required to take the class on personal finance. Fazio has spoken at a couple college campuses, but speaking to high school students is something new as a result of his book.

Several of the KHS students commented on how they liked Fazio's suit and bow tie.

When Fazio helped start up Commerce State Bank, he had not envisioned that he would be such a sharp dresser. In fact, Fazio had wanted to call the bank Casual Bank and wear casual clothes all the time.

"But bankers always wear suits, and the other guys said they didn't have enough casual clothes for work, so it couldn't be called Casual Bank," Fazio explained.

So instead, they decided to name the bank Commerce State Bank in honor of Commerce Bank of Beverly Hills, the bank that was featured in *The Beverly Hillbillies*.

Most of the Kewaskum teens were unfamiliar with *The Beverly Hillbillies*, but they did understand Fazio's lesson on how to effectively save money.

"The best way to save money is to never have it pass through your hands, because when money passes through your hands, it usually stops and looks for something to spend itself on," Fazio said.

"So learning the habit of saving and doing that so that money is taken out of your paycheck through a 401(k) or other means, is really great," he advised.

Last June, Delta Defense sponsored an event to recognize all the Champions of Change nominees. Awards were presented in 10 categories. Additionally, a Judges' Choice award was given to a nominee deserving of additional recognition.

The Kewaskum Remembers 9/11 Committee was selected as the Judges' Choice and was cited for "building a memorial not only to honor those that were lost on September 11, 2001, but to also teach the community about the events on that fateful day."

"What they are doing in Kewaskum is amazing," said Melanie Gonring, program director for the Volunteer Center.

Along with the award, the Volunteer Center of Washington County gave \$500 to the Kewaskum Remembers 9/11 Committee, and the committee could present the \$500 to the charity of its choice.

The committee decided to give the donation directly back to the Volunteer Center.

### The Hub

The Hub will be a new coffee shop in West Bend, but all proceeds will benefit nonprofit organizations throughout Washington County.

The Hub will have two paid employees, but the rest of the crew will be made up of at least 50 volunteers.

The idea came about after Ric Hartman purchased the 10,000-square-foot building at 303 Water St. in West Bend. The building had sat vacant for many years, but with its location near the Milwaukee River, the Eisenbahn Trail and the Museum of Wisconsin Art, Hartman envisioned that it could become something special.

He renovated the industrial space and opened the Gallery of Wisconsin Art there earlier this year. But he had even bigger plans.

He had seen a PBS program that highlighted a nonprofit bar.

He approached the staff at the Volunteer Center and asked, "Wouldn't that be a cool idea for a coffee shop to be located by the art gallery? Do you know anybody that would be interested?"

The Volunteer Center

jumped at the opportunity. "It was a perfect pairing," Gonring said.

Rinzel, who hails from Kewaskum, previously helped manage a coffeehouse in Cedarburg. As an experienced barista, and is looking forward to the new venture.

"It is an honor to be chosen to be a part of this. It's new and it's unique. The idea of the marriage of coffee and volunteerism seems perfect to me," Rinzel said.

The Hub is in need of volunteers to serve as baristas. They will all be trained so they know how the cafe will run and how to properly work the espresso machine.

The idea is that when people come to The Hub, they can learn more about ways to volunteer in the community. And if they don't have time to do a particular activity, they will still help out local charities by purchasing a cup of joe at The Hub.

One of the people the Volunteer Center has connected with through the project is Dustin Melzark, an architect who has helped with creating the new space. Melzark also serves on the Kewaskum Remembers 9/11 Committee and is designing the new 9/11 memorial for Kewaskum.

The Hub is being built by a staff of mostly volunteer contractors. Once the renovation is complete, the staff would like to offer volunteer happy hours and live music.

"It is a fun, trendy space - I am excited about it," Gonring said. "The sky is the limit where we can go with this."

### The Volunteer Center

The Volunteer Center of Washington County was created in 1983 as the county's volunteer clearinghouse program, which matched volunteers to community needs.

The center continues to do that, but the way that it connects with volunteers has changed over the years. Originally, people would call or stop in at the center to find a place where they could volunteer.

Over the years, more and more people have gone online to connect with the Volunteer Center. But people still wanted to have some actual face-to-face contact with the center's staff and the places

they help.

"So we've been trying to come up with fun and creative ways that people are reaching out," Gonring said.

One of the main things that the staff heard was that people want to help, but they don't have time.

"So last year we started a program called the Do Good Bus," Gonring said.

The Do Good Bus always provides a surprise adventure for people who want to help out.

Monthly community rides are planned, but participants never know their destination.

"You might be headed to feed the hungry, clean up a park or play Bingo with seniors," Gonring said.

The Volunteer Center will provide details such as how to dress and where to meet the bus. And then participants board the bus for an adventure of volunteering.

Over the past year, the Do Good Bus has gone on 29 trips. Volunteers have taken trips to visit senior centers, build a swing set and build handicapped accessible garden beds, to name a few of the projects.

"It is so rewarding to be on the bus, and see how it affects the volunteers personally. So many people make new friends. It's been really fun to come to work every day and see that," Gonring said.

In 2018, the Do Good Bus will make a trip on the third Saturday of each month.

In addition, the bus helps people pinpoint volunteer work they are interested in, whether it be working with parks, the Humane Society or senior programming.

"Whatever you are interested in, there is something we can find for you," Gonring said.

# KHS Wrestlers Clear Another Hurdle On Their EC Schedule

The Kewaskum wrestling "family," including fans and former athletes who competed in the sport, was out in force December 21, as their Indians took on Ripon in what was anticipated to be a battle between two East Central contenders.

With pins from Eduardo Padilla, Nathaniel Droese, Mason Pomeroy and Alex Butler and 18 points from forfeits at 152, 113 and 138, the Indians rolled to a 45-33 victory, their third straight in conference action and fourth overall this season.

Despite the 12-point win, coach Scott Rhoads thought some of his athletes weren't at their best. "As a team, we were a little flat. The kids are excited because Christmas is coming," he said, adding, "That isn't a good excuse."

Rhoads was happy with the efforts of Padilla at 182 pounds and the way Tanner Goeman came back to win a 5-4 decision at 160 after being behind 4-1 in the second period.

"Eddie brought some flair tonight, He was ready," Rhoads said about the 3:15 pin by his junior 182 pounder.

Goeman and his opponent, Brady Kissinger, were pretty evenly matched, although Goeman found himself behind after the first period when Kissinger worked a double leg move for a takedown and a 2-0 lead.

Kissinger took the down position in the second period and used a switch for a reversal, giving him a 4-0 lead. Goeman got one point closer then escaped with :24 left in the period.

Down 4-1 with two minutes to go, Goeman was awarded a point because the official felt Kissinger was stalling, then he escaped and with 34 seconds left in the match

scored a takedown for a 5-4 victory.

"Tanner's a good third period wrestler," Rhoads said.

Ripon won three matches in a row at 195, 220 and 285, then the Indian lightweights took over, winning four of the next five matches, including three by fall and one by forfeit. Adam Bruss would have certainly preferred to have had a match, especially considering it was Senior Night, and he is the only senior on the Kewaskum High School team.

Before the match, Rhoads paid tribute to Bruss, praising him for being a motivator and for "pushing his teammates to be their best."

Rhoads announced Bruss currently had 69 victories in his career. "He's really come around the last two years," and is currently 3-0 in East Central action and 11-6 on the year.

About his team's 3-0 start in conference matches, Rhoads said, "We knew they (Tigers) would be competitive, now we have our sights set for Campbellsport on January 11."

Eric Bauer and Kannon Muckerheide both sat out the match. Muckerheide had impetigo and will be ready for the Mid States Wrestling Classic on December 28-29. Bauer was injured at Fond du Lac last week and may also miss the Mid States.

"I got in a weird position. My arm started to bend in a couple different directions," Bauer said. "Hopefully I'll be back in a week or two."

At the Marty Loy, Bauer did reach a milestone, posting his 100th career win in his first match. Now he will take aim at Rhoads' mark of 132, and the school record 137 wins by Brett Scoles, who is in his



# KHS Boys Suffer Another Painful Loss

It wasn't a slow start that hampered the Kewaskum boys basketball team in its non-conference game at Cedar Grove-Belgium on December 19.

Defensive lapses, turnovers and two technical fouls tipped the scale in the Rockets' favor 59-58.

"Ouch," was the first comment made by Kewaskum High School coach, Don Gruber after talking with his players in the locker room after experiencing another tough loss.

"It was a winnable game," Gruber went on, pointing to the fact the Indians had forged to a seven-point, 55-48 lead with 4:03 remaining when the roof caved in.

After Michael Navis drove right down the lane for a basket, Jordan Carlton, who was the game's leading scorer with 26 points, was hit with a five second call, and the Rockets' Jason von Heimberg used the opportunity to cut the margin to three points (55-52) when he successfully drove the base line.

On Kewaskum's next possession, Cole Surprenant was knocked to the floor, and mysteriously he got called for the foul, giving the ball back to Cedar Grove. When Jordan Villa put up a shot, Carlton was whistled for a shooting foul, which was his fifth foul in the game, ending his night.

As he exited the floor, Carlton loudly smacked

his hand on the team's water bucket, and the official immediately signaled a technical foul on him, sending Villa to the free throw line. He made all four free throws, erasing Kewaskum's lead, and putting the Rockets ahead 56-55.

As is the case on technicals, Cedar Grove also got the basketball but missed two shots on the possession, and seconds later the Rockets were called for a foul, putting Talon Ralph at the line for a one-and-one situation with 46.8 seconds remaining.

Ralph missed the first attempt, but after one of the Rockets grabbed the rebound, Jared Chesak knocked the ball away. Brad Buechel followed with a missed shot, then Ralph committed a foul with :18 left. Villa missed both free throws, and Dan Kreis grabbed the ball after the second miss.

Kewaskum High School took a time out to set up a play, but Kreis' attempt to get the ball to Chesak under the basket was out of his reach. Then in frustration, Chesak punched the mat on the wall, and he was called for a technical with 6.8 seconds to play.

Villa made one of two free throws, then Buechel fouled Brett Mentink, and he made both tries, giving the Rockets a 59-55 lead.

Buechel swished a three-pointer just before the buzzer, making the final score 59-58.

Gruber felt one difference in the game was how the Rockets penetrated for

drives. "We couldn't stop them," he said.

"We were still in control of the game until the technicals," Gruber said, obviously disappointed in the outcome and the way the Indians lost. "I told the guys we've got to represent ourselves better," he said.

The Indians dropped to 3-5 with three straight losses. This was their sixth road game of the season, and their next two games against Ripon and Randolph (December 29, at Berlin at 5 p.m.) are also on the road.

The 26 points by Carlton came via 10x20 20 shooting from the floor and six of seven free throws, but he also committed a team-high seven turnovers. Buechel scored 10 points while Chesak, Surprenant, and Kreis all added six points.




