## Three New Businesses To Go Into TIF District

Three new businesses are coming to the TIF (Tax Increment Financing) District in Kewaskum.

A plumbing contractor, a graphics sign shop and an exercise facility will all be housed in a new 11,200 square-foot building that will be constructed off Industrial Drive, directly west of Daco Precision, Inc.

"We are happy to be here

today. We have been working diligently the last two and a half, three years or so [to develop commercial parcels in the TIF District]," said Kraig Sadownikow, who presented the proposed building plans to the Village Plan Commission on Thursday, Jan. 11.

Stellar Abodes, LLC, is purchasing the property and hopes to run a plumbing business from the location, as well as lease to two tenants. One of the poten-

tial tenants is a graphics sign shop.

The other business that plans to lease space in the building is Next Level Fitness, which will focus on small and large group training in a safe and effective environment with professional instructors and trainers. Next Level Fitness currently works out of Holy Trinity Church in Kewaskum.

## Village Board Approves More Logging At Reigle Family Park

More trees will be logged at Reigle Family Park in Kewaskum.

The Village Board decided unanimously on Monday, Jan. 15, that trees should be removed from the western border of the park between the two driveways. Trustee David Spenner was absent from the meeting.

"I personally think that we should clear cut the trees between the two driveways on Edgewood so you have a view into the park. There's not much for trees there anyway, just some old scrubby bushes. It would open up the whole park," Trustee Dave Zehren said.

At Monday night's meeting, the board also discussed the problem that the trees that were left standing may not be strong enough to survive strong winds.

"We don't want to see those trees topple over. If there are only a few left, they probably aren't going to have the strength to stand up to the wind," Ben Propson, who is lead plant

operator for the village's wastewater treatment plant, told the board after speaking with a forester.

The Village Board had initially wanted to leave as many trees as possible to create a border between the park and neighboring properties.

"I just don't think those trees are going to do what you want them to do. They are not going to give the property owners any privacy," Trustee Richard Laubach said at the meeting.

"There are no branches on the bottom 12 feet of them trees all the way around. You can look right underneath them, unless you are 14 feet tall," he added.

Logging is expected to be completed within the next two weeks. One of the logging trucks broke down, so the completion date was moved back slightly, Dan Fischer, who is president of the Kewaskum Youth Soccer Organization, told the board Monday night.

Logging started at the 31-acre park on January 5 to clear space for soccer

and baseball fields.

Proceeds from the logging will be used for park development.

## Large Ebook Collection Now Available For Kewaskum Students

Students in the Kewaskum School District now have over 3,000 ebooks available to them.

Kewaskum is one of 52 school districts and individuals from across the state that joined the Wisconsin Schools Digital Library Consortium. The new collection became available for participating school districts on

Monday, Jan. 8.

"This has more than doubled the available resources for students," said Andy Mayer, who is the library media specialist for the Kewaskum School District.

To access the new collection, students can visit the district website at [www.kewaskumschools.org](http://www.kewaskumschools.org) and click on "Library" under the Quick Links.

In the same way that

regular books are checked out, each student can then login using their Destiny username and password to have full access the collection. The ebooks can be checked out or put on hold.

The website offers information and a help page about the available resources.

## Continued From... Village Board Approves Logging

Other items at Monday night's Village Board meeting included:

### Land Division Approved

The Village Board unanimously approved a request from Mercedes Otten to divide seven acres of land from a 25.6 acre parcel in the Town of Kewaskum. The property is located at 3878 Ridge Road, within the village's Extraterritorial Zoning Area.

### Public Works Report

At Monday night's meeting, Dennis Aupperle, who is the working foreman for the village's Department of Public Works, reported that the department had repaired two water main breaks. One was on December 30 on Western Avenue, and the other was on January 5 on Fond du Lac Avenue.

Aupperle also reported that one of the village's snow plows had broken on Monday, Jan. 15. The department hoped that the

plow would be fixed this week.

### Spring Bulk Pickup

Spring bulk pickup in the village will be held on Wednesday, April 25.

### Stormwater Management

Mark Mickelson and Dan Schaefer, engineers for Short Elliott Hendrickson, Inc., (SEH) have been working with the village on planning stormwater management. They spoke at Monday's meeting to introduce stormwater ordinances and MS4 (municipal separate storm sewer system) permit recommendations. The Clean Air Act and defines stormwater as a pollutant, Mickelson said. The EPA requires the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to monitor and permit discharges from urbanized areas.

The Village of Kewaskum was issued its MS4 permit in April 2014.

That permit requires a 20 percent reduction in total suspended solids.

In February 2016, a stormwater planning grant was issued for the village to complete a portion of the compliance requirements for the permit. In summer 2016, the DNR issued a draft for the Milwaukee River TMDL (Total Maximum Daily Loading). The TMDL regulates discharges for pollutants of concern, suspended solids and phosphorus.

Recommendations for the village's MS4 permit include:

- Review and approve the updated stormwater and erosion control ordinance.
- Submit the stormwater management report to the Wisconsin DNR.
- Funding alternatives - consolidate and expand existing stormwater utility districts.
- Review and discuss alternatives presented. For future MS4 compliance with TMDL, SEH rec-

ommends the water quality trading alternative, which is the least costly scenario.

- Public Works staff to complete a shortened list of village BMP upgrades and re-evaluate WQT credit requirements upon completion.

- Public Works staff to implement pollution prevention plan, illicit discharge inspections and annual reports to the DNR.

SEH recommends that the village submits a stormwater management plan to the DNR for review and approval and submit to the DNR for grant reimbursement in January 2018.

SEH recommends that the village's stormwater ordinance be updated in February.

The draft TMDL is likely to become final in one to two years. Implementation is likely to occur three to five years following TMDL approval.

## Two UW-WC Professors To Receive Kaplan Award

Two UW-Washington County professors were chosen to receive an Arthur M. Kaplan Award for the 2017/18 academic year. They include: Dr. Talitha Selby (Chemistry) and Dr. Swapnil Tripathi (Physics/Astronomy). The announcement was made by Dr. Cathy Sandeen, UW Colleges and UW Extension Chancellor, noting, "our students and our institution are made stronger" by their efforts.

Associate Professor of Chemistry, Dr. Talitha Selby's award was in recognition of her efforts to bring "laboratory experiences to students that help them to understand difficult concepts even before they are discussed in lecture." Dr. Selby uses an empirical model for molecular polarity in thin layer chromatography measurements to help nursing students better understand solubility trends of large organic molecules.

Associate Professor of Physics/Astronomy, Dr. Swapnil Tripathi was recognized for his "continual work to improve teaching and meeting the needs of students." Dr. Tripathi redesigned the Flex Physics 100 course and developed a new homework system for an Engineering class. It was noted that these "adjustments demonstrate commitment to student needs."

The Arthur M. Kaplan Award program was established to recognize outstanding contributions

made to education by UW Colleges faculty and academic staff. It pays tribute to the positive spirit that Provost and Vice Chancellor Emeritus, Arthur M. Kaplan contributed to enhance education at the UW Colleges. The Kaplan award is for \$250, with matching funds awarded from the Washington County Campus Foundation.



## Wisconsin State Taxes Rose 1.7 Percent In 2017

State taxes and fees in Wisconsin totalled \$18.8 billion in 2017, a 1.7 percent increase over 2016.

The major state taxes are individual and corporate income taxes, sales taxes, the gas tax and the unemployment insurance payroll tax; major fees include those for vehicle

registration and hunting licenses.

The individual income tax is Wisconsin's primary source for funding state government. Collections totalled \$8 billion in 2017, a 3.9 percent increase over 2016. Revenues exceeded sales (\$5.2 billion) and corporate income taxes (\$920.9 million) combined.

## Weekly HEALTH TIP

### OMEGA-3S PROTECT THE BRAIN

In a recent study, researchers found an association between higher levels of omega-3s (EPA and DHA) and better brain blood flow and cognition. The 166 participants were separated into two groups, those with higher omega-3 levels and those with lower omega-3 levels. Using brain imaging, they found a correlation between increased blood flow in regions of the brain associated with memory and learning and higher levels of omega-3. The converse was also true; those with lower levels of omega-3 had reduced brain blood flow. Experts say it's possible that relatively simple changes in diet could improve cognitive function.

# Three New Businesses To Go Into TIF District

The Kewaskum Plan Commission unanimously approved the proposal at last week's meeting, contingent on engineer review.

Construction is expected to begin in February or March.

The building will be situated on a three-acre parcel that is currently zoned M-1, for light manufacturing. Both the plumbing contractor and graphics business fall into that category.

The village's code does

allow commercial uses of facilities such as athletic clubs, provided that the services are oriented toward industrial district users and employees and that other users are incidental customers.

The Plan Commission directed Village Administrator Matt Heiser to change the wording on that conditional use so that athletic facilities do not need to be oriented toward industrial users and employees.

The businesses will be

the first to move into commercial property in the TIF District that Kilo Tango, LLC, purchased in 2015. Managed by Sadownikow, Kilo Tango entered into an agreement with the Village of Kewaskum in August 2015 and committed to building \$2 million worth of improvements by 2019 and another \$2 million worth of improvements by 2021.

The new development will bring approximately \$750,000 worth of improvements to the TIF

District. The property makes up about 20 percent of the usable commercial acres available in the TIF District, according to Village President Kevin Scheunemann.

"We hope this is some good motivation for the development out there," Sadownikow said.

The proposed building is designed so that a fourth tenant could one day be added if needed,

Sadownikow said. Sadownikow is president of American Construction Services, a real estate developer, architectural firm and construction management company based in West Bend.

The architectural drawing presented to the Plan Commission depicts two future buildings. There are currently no plans for those structures, but the hope is that there will be

development there in the future, Sadownikow said.

The TIF District was created in 2005. In 2008, the nation entered into the Great Recession, and all construction in the TIF District halted.

Over the past two years, residential construction in the TIF District has increased. New construction added \$1.9 million of value to the TIF in 2016.

# Deadline Approaching For Broadband Grants

LuAnn and Ken Larson are not able to get the Internet, cell phone service or snow plowing.

"It's like we live in the Bermuda Triangle," LuAnn said.

In reality, they live in the Town of Auburn.

While they will still have to live with some of the challenges of rural living, there may be a fix on the horizon for one of the issues. There is now an opportunity to expand broadband service in the area.

The Public Service Commission of Wisconsin is currently accepting applications up to \$7.5 million in grants to expand broadband service to underserved areas of the state. This grant money is available from funds that were approved in the state budget last year. Grant applications are due January 25.

Local internet companies are vying for the grants. For example, Ethoplex is applying for broadband grants in the Washington, Dodge and Fond du Lac County area.

Ethoplex, which received one of the grants last year, offers a wireless internet service that has towers in the area. One tower is located on the water tower in Kewaskum and another is located in Kohlsville.

In addition to building large towers, Ethoplex offers mini towers to service as few as five homes. There is no charge to the residents to install the towers, said Keefe John, who is president and CEO of Ethoplex.

Internet service providers can work with other entities to apply for the grants.

"It does help if there are some public or private partnerships," John said.

Therefore, representatives have been attending area town board meetings to seek support in applying for the grants. They can also pair up with other public entities, such as a school.

"It seems like the municipalities are more than eager to work with us because they want better broadband for their residents," John said.

Dave Desens, who lives in the Town of Farmington, knows the challenges of living with poor Internet service.

"There are plenty of people around here who can't get it," he said.

It makes things like working from home challenging. Even simple tasks like paying bills and balancing checkbooks can't be done.

School students have to go online to turn in their work, and when they have no Internet service, it is difficult to do homework.

"Education and telemedicine are hot topics in the broadband world. Especially in rural areas where there are not that many doctors, a lot of people are moving to the online video streaming appointments. And if you don't have broadband, you can't do that either," John said.

Getting a grant is a competitive process for internet companies from across the state, and so the communities that have the most support tend to get the most amount of broadband grant funding, he said.

"Part of the grant process is to get public support, so the more people who live in these areas who write in comments about how they want better broadband in the area, that would help our grant application," John said.

"We encourage the residents of Washington County and the surrounding area to put in public comments in support of Ethoplex's grant applications. The more public support we get, the better chance we have of fixing the broadband issues in the area," John said.

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## Continued From... Large Ebook Collection Now Available For Kewaskum Students

"It is school focused, so a lot of the titles are intended for kids," Mayer explained.

The consortium offers three levels, so that there are available resources for elementary school students, middle school students and high school students.

Restrictions are set up within the system so that elementary students are not able access high school materials. Fourth graders can access middle school ebooks, and eighth graders can access high school materials, but otherwise students can only access their own grade levels or lower.

A board made up of school administrators, librarians and teachers decides which materials should be added to the consortium.

Because the consortium is brand new, Mayer expects the collection to continue to grow. The plan is to add digital audio books to the system during the next school year.

Mayer started a collec-

tion of ebooks for the Kewaskum School District when he began working here six years ago. That collection has continued to grow, and Kewaskum Schools currently own about 1,300 ebooks, he said.

In addition to the schools' own materials, the school library website has links so that students can check out materials from the public library and other programs as well.

Although the digital books are a good option, Kewaskum schools will continue to offer paper books, which most students seem to prefer, Mayer said.

"I've read that 35 percent of people prefer reading ebooks. It is all personal preference. But it's a nice option to have," Mayer said.

He pointed out that there are some definite benefits to the online books:

- You can't lose an ebook.
- You can't damage an ebook.
- You can't have late fees

with an ebook because it is automatically returned on time.


Another advantage is that teachers can project ebooks onto large screens for their students to read together.

Currently the ebooks are available only to students in fourth grade and older. Mayer will be working to get user names and passwords for the younger students over the next couple of months.

He plans to visit classrooms and get input from teachers to find out what resources they would like their students to have.

The cost of joining the Wisconsin Schools Digital Library Consortium is about \$1.50 per student. The school district has paid to be part of the consortium through August and can choose to extend that participation.

"Our goal is to have as many options available as possible to get people to read," Mayer said.



# Move Over Campbellsport; Kewaskum Wrestlers Are In The Top Spot

After pummeling Campbellsport 47-21 on January 11, the Kewaskum wrestling team is heading toward the East Central Conference's "victory lane," and sharing driving honors are two young men who probably aren't old enough to secure their temporary driving permits.

With surprise pins from freshman Tucker Schmidt at 220 pounds and sophomore Nathan Lawrence at 285, who came into the meet with a combined 6-24 record, the Indians shut the door on any comeback hopes by the Cougars, who fell behind 23-0 in the match.

The 12 points from the two big men, put the Indians ahead 35-12, and 106-pound Nathaniel Droese clinched the win with a 7-3 victory over Roman Skorupa.

"Most of the pins tonight, we weren't expecting," a dazed and happy KHS coach Scott Rhoads said afterward, especially the two from Schmidt and Lawrence, who have only been wrestling a couple years and usually got to face more experienced opponents.

Schmidt took a 4-1 lead over Blake Weisser in the first period, only to end up on his back in the closing seconds, but get new life when the buzzer sounded. Weisser chose the down position for the second period and Schmidt used a half-nelson to turn him and get the fall in 2:20.

Indians on the sideline erupted with excitement and got a chance to duplicate the celebration when Lawrence used a headlock to flatten senior Zach Carey in just 48 seconds. The huge crowd, on hand for Alumni Night, Youth Wrestling Night and the showdown dual, was equally excited because Campbellsport had held the upper hand in the rivalry in recent years.

The two could be called the heroes of the match, although neither man felt that way. "I wouldn't say we're the heroes. The whole team are the heroes," Schmidt said, while Lawrence said the situation was only possible because, "The team

has been helping me get through the losses" this season.

About his match, Lawrence said Carey came out like he wanted to "rip my head off," but "as soon as we hit the ground (mat), I had his head," and used the grip to toss Carey to his back.

When asked if he thought this would propel him to more wins this season, Schmidt said, "I'm hoping so. I've been training all year and getting better."

The victory was Rhoads' first over Campbellsport, something he didn't realize right away.

"Probably ... I want to say it is," Rhoads, in his fifth season as head coach, said.

CHS coach Mark Peterson, who is nearing his 300th dual meet victory, knew his team was in for a battle. What he didn't know was his 220-pound senior would quit the sport a week ago, plus five of the Indians, Braden Maertz, Eric Bauer, Alex Deheck, Tanner Goeman and Sam Larson, were dropping a weight for the match, and that produced some more favorable KHS matchups.

"We talked about it after the Ripon dual," Rhoads said, explaining, "We had to track their weight perfectly" because new WIAA regulations limit how much weight can be lost in a week. "They all cleared for this (new weights) just two days ago," he said.

Bauer, the Indians' two-time state D-2 place winner, went down to 138 and started off the match versus Taylor Heltemes and put on a scoring clinic with four takedowns and a near-fall en route to an 18-3 technical fall.

"We started with our hammer," Rhoads said about the draw for match positions.

Next came Deheck, who got the crowd revved up with his 47-second pin over Peyton Feucht for an 11-0 KHS lead.

The snowball just kept getting bigger as Goeman used good riding technique to shut out Devyn Urban 4-0, and Larson used three takedowns toward a 7-3 win over Dylan Urban.

With Larson moving

down, Eduardo Padilla will slide into the 170 spot full time, and he wasted no time showing his dominance against Ethan Meyer, who exchanged places with Joe Lindsley at the last minute. Padilla got the pin in 2:20.

Campbellsport got its wins from Lindsley at 182 (pin), Matt Koebel (forfeit) at 195, Dylan Bublitz (decision) at 113 and Cade Heisdorf (pin at 126). Heisdorf's dad, Dan, who graduated from Kewaskum High, is Peterson's long-time assistant coach at Campbellsport.

The match ended with Maertz and Logan Kreuser putting on a clinic in countering technique. After six minutes, the score was 0-0 but it didn't stay that way long as Maertz tackled Kreuser for a double leg takedown and the 2-0 overtime win.

KHS is currently 5-0 in EC action with just Waupun — which only has five or six varsity wrestlers this year — on its schedule. Campbellsport, 3-1 and EC champs the past two seasons, still has to face Ripon and Berlin.

"Ninety-nine percent of the time the dual meet champion wins the conference title," Rhoads said, "But we're not going to get big-headed." The EC Tournament is set for February 4 at Winneconne.

Muckerheide, only a freshman, has struggled against most experienced wrestlers in the other tournaments but he dominated in this one, going 5-0 with five pins including one in 1:33 over Nathan Bell of Pius XI in his last match.

## Decision Has Been Made: Donovan Is Heading For Augustana

While the official signing day for college football is still several weeks away, Kewaskum High football standout Riley Donovan is 100 percent committed to attending NCAA II Augustana University in Sioux Falls, South Dakota next year.

"As far as I am concerned, the verbal commitment makes it official. I'm going to Augustana," Donovan, the 6-foot, 3-inch, 290 pound tackle said Sunday night, indicating he made one other official visit, to St. Cloud State but decided the Sioux Falls school was the right place for him.

When asked what he liked about Augustana, Donovan said, "Just about everything. It felt like home. I loved the staff, loved the other players, loved the facilities," he said. Augustana has about 100 majors and has a student population right around 2,000.

Donovan said Jason Piittmann, his football coach and the athletic director at Kewaskum High School, helped set up meetings with the schools he visited and "helped me establish relationships with the schools."

Concerning what side of the ball he will play on, Donovan said, "They recruited me at a defensive tackle" adding, "I have no preference but I'm definitely a fan of the defensive side of the ball. It's a good position."

Donovan was a first team all-East Central selection on both offense and defense, and he received honorable mention on the Wisconsin

Football Coaches Association's All State Team.

The Vikings compete in the Northern Sun Collegiate Conference against schools such as Upper Iowa, St. Cloud State, Bemidji State, and Winona State. This past year, the Vikings finished with a 4-7 record under head coach Jerry Olszewski. The year before they were 8-3.

The team's defensive coordinator is Jordan Malone, who will be starting his second year with the team this fall.

"It's about an eight-hour drive from here," Donovan said about the distance from Kewaskum to Augustana, where he is planning to major in biology. He said he will be receiving partial scholarships for athletics and academics.

"I think I've got a lot of opportunities waiting for me at that university," Donovan said, but before that he still has track to think about, and he is keeping his eyes on the NFL playoffs where his favorite team is still alive. "I'm actually a Patriots' fan, so if the Patriots make it (to the Super Bowl), that would be fine," he said.

As far as the upcoming spring season, Donovan said, "I'm excited for track, I'm hoping for another appearance at state in the discus." In June of 2017, Donovan placed 11th in the D-2 discus competition with a throw of 136 feet, 6 inches. His personal best was a toss of 152-01.

On Wednesday, Feb. 7, Donovan will sign a letter of intent in a short ceremony at Kewaskum High School.

# Comeback By Kewaskum Boys Falls Just Short

Coach Don Gruber just can't figure out why his Kewaskum High School boys basketball team has been getting off to slow starts in recent games.

Playing at Campbellsport on January 11, the Indians struggled again in the early going, falling behind by 15 points before roaring back to make a game of it, eventually losing to the Cougars by three points, 43-40.

For Campbellsport, the win was its second against three losses in the East Central Conference, Kewaskum is still looking for its first EC win, dropping to 0-5 and 3-8 overall.

"We had some real good looks, didn't make any long shots for the longest time," Gruber said about the contest. "We got behind 24-9, but by half we got it back to 29-19."

Late in the first half, Brent (Goeden) hit two, three balls, which gave us a lot of confidence," Gruber went on about back-to-back three-pointers by the senior guard,

who sparked the Indians.

The Indians turned up the heat on the Cougars in the second half. "We went to a trapping zone," the coach said. "That seemed to work. We got a couple of steals out of it, and a couple of layups."

The Indians outscored the hosts 21-14 after the break. "We had it down to four (points) for quite a while," Gruber said, reporting "Jared (Chesak) hit a shot at the buzzer" for the final points.

Chesak, who is just a little over 6-foot tall, has had to battle taller players all season long and this game was no different as Kade Walsh and Nicholas Narges are at least two inches taller. Chesak more than held his own, scoring a team-high 11 points (5x11 shooting), with nine rebounds, one assist and two steals.

"Jared had a good all-around game," Gruber said, referring to his scoring, rebounding and passing.

"We rebounded well," Gruber said. "At one point, I think we had four offen-

sive rebounds (in a row) but we didn't score off them."

The third-year coach liked the way his team ran the offense in the second half, but he was disappointed with the number of transition points his Indians gave up. "We gave up 11 or 12 transition points, just didn't hustle back," Gruber said.

Jordan Carlton (3x10) and Brad Buechel (4x11 shooting) chipped in with nine points while Goeden had six (2x3). For the Cougars, Connor Kissinger was the high scorer with an even dozen on four baskets beyond the arc, while Trevor Ramthun had eight points and Walsh six.

"Campbellsport has a couple guys who can shoot the ball. We defended them pretty well," Gruber said. "It was definitely a game we were in despite the slow start."

After entertaining Winneconne on January 16, the Indians travel to Kettle Moraine Lutheran on Friday, Jan. 19 for a tough assignment against

the Chargers, who are in first place after recently handing Waupun its first loss of the year.

# Ray Thelen's Ashford: When Iron Buzzled Beer

Ray Thelen died on July 28, 2017. In the summer of 2016, he sat down for an interview on his version of Ashford history. It was the only time I had a conversation with him, but it was enough to recognize his appreciation for the past.

The following extends from that discussion about being raised on a dairy farm on what became Super Drive, the road which starts just west of Ashford out of town, and heads due north. When it came down to local history, there was something about the objects of everyday life in the 1940s that stuck out for Ray — asparagus, eggs, cookies, and warm beer from a hot iron rod at Joe Janous's Blacksmith Shop.

## Asparagus At The Erikson's

In the old days, there were two taverns in Ashford. Ray first covered the one that no longer exists.

"We had John Erikson: he was the one that was across from the garage there."

Later on, the tavern switched hands to Oscar Batzler, Roy Wenzel and Jerry Beisbier. At the time Ray was 18, which was about 1949, he guessed Erickson no longer owned it.

When it came to Erikson's, there was one aspect Ray wanted remembered most, and it was long before he enjoyed a good beer. "But one thing I got to put in there about John Erikson: he loved asparagus. And on the south side of the cemetery at St. Martin's, that was just loaded with asparagus." This was working your way up the hill. "So during the noon hour (from St. Martin's School), a couple of us boys would pick handfuls of that, take it down by John, and we'd get an ice cream cone. Which was the best part of the day! Awh yea. Aaawwh — you bet!" It was worth picking, and Erickson "just loved it."

Ray said that during his childhood, "We could go in to get the ice cream. (Though) You couldn't drink no beer or nothing." He couldn't remember the brand of ice cream, but "they were double dips — they weren't just a single cone." And it was a heck of a deal when the ice cream was traded for some stalks of vegetables.

When did he start going to the tavern for a drink? With a wry grin and laughing, he said, "When I was 18 years old already." But Ray added context: "Nobody questioned you. You know, you had fun." He paused; then added, "And we maybe drank a beer or two, you took your time, you went home."

**Thelen's Eggs  
For Brath's Groceries**  
"So down from Ollie Schill Trucking was the

store, and that was operated by Frank and Mamie Brath. And when Frank passed away, it kinda went down to their daughter Evelyn and my uncle Alex (Thelen), and they ran it many a many a year, and when they moved out, they sold it to the Urbans: Jim and Shirley, which is still owned and operated by Shirley. It's called Urban's Ashford Mall. It's open seven days a week, and you can go in any time you want."

Ray went back in time to when the Braths owned it around the 1930s. They had "any kind of groceries. And I remember on the farm we would have chickens — and my dad had crates of chickens, and on Saturdays he would take the eggs over dare ('dare' is how Ray's German accent said 'there'), and exchange them for groceries. And if there was anything left besides, after the groceries were paid, there was a little cash to put in the pocket. That's how we lived." Once the store switched to Alex and Evelyn Thelen, then "Uncle Alex" got the eggs.

The trade-off of eggs propped the Thelen dairy farm with many chickens. Ray thought his farm alone must have had "over a hundred because we'd usually get 30 dozen cases every week." They just delivered eggs on Saturdays; but Ray said neighbors would come to the Thelen Farm to get eggs too.

## Grandma Tremmel's Cookies

Ray recalled herding cows to what is essentially Super Drive northbound. "We chased the cows down to the marsh. And if you go down where we call Tremmel's Hill — that's before you get to Al Serwe's Driveway." If you drove from the Thelen Farm down past Tremmel's today, it would be over a mile.

"We would chase the cows down there, and on the way back we would stop and open up the mailbox and there were always cookies in there. Always. She baked cookies. And — morning enough, we stopped, and there were always a bag of cookies in there."

What kind of cookies did she bake? Ray didn't forget. "Any kind. You name it. Chocolate chip. Peanut Butter. But they were in there at morning and they were in there at night. We always took a little water along."

The process of a youngster walking from the Thelen farm past Tremmel's might take an hour, yet "the cookies were always in the mail box." Once he tried to save time on the way there; but not so much on the way back.

"And I'll never forget one time — I got to be smart; I took the horse. Her name was Betty. I rode the horse. I got on the stool

here at the barn, and I got on her, and I walked 'em (cows) down there (past Tremmel's). And when I got off of her, I had to get off to close the gate. And I couldn't get back on her. So I had to walk home! That I'll never forget." Of course, there was a stool at the farm, "but there wasn't any down there (in the back 36 acres), and I had to walk home."

## Warm Beer

Ray Thelen knew older people who drank warm beer. "Oh yea." Then he added, "I tell you about one thing. You talk about Joe Janous. (Ray pronounced it Yawn-ush, not Jan-us). There was a tavern (what was then or soon became Fleischman's) next door, and Joe had a kettle. And we would go to work for 50 cents — or even a quarter. We went over to the tavern and opened up the spout and give you a whole darn little pail full of beer, (then we) brought it home in the shop by Joe, and he would pull a big iron out of the forge and put it in the beer and it would buzzle and warm the beer up, and then we drank it. I'll never forget that. He always had that going in the forge."

Ray enjoyed story telling. When he reminisced about the old Janous Blacksmith Shop next to the tavern, he was smiling about how one could get a whole bucket of beer for 50 cents. All this as his wife, Elaine, was laughing at the flashback, she herself having just offered their guest a cold beer out of the fridge.

Yet there is some serious intrigue about the set up for that beer touched by the iron. When it came down to whether Janous used the iron to warm the beer or to fuzz it up again, Ray answered, "To fuzz it. Cause I know the forge was always going. I mean where he went to work, he always had plow shares — they always had to be heated so he could put the points on the plow shares, you know. Anywhere there, he had a big rod iron in there. And he'd say, 'here's a quarter, here's 50 cents. Go over get a pail of beer. So we'd go bring the beer back and he'd pull out that rod out of there, and push it in there and it would kind of bubble and fuzz a little bit and it tasted darn good — But he always did that. He had to put that in there."

Others have told stories of how one would run the risk of the beer getting really bubbly with less liquid in the pail. So in traveling with a pail, one could end up transporting half the beer intended and the rest in fluff and suds. Ray did affirm what others recalled, that beer haulers might have larded around the edge of the pail.




Ray Thelen described St. Martin's. "Ashford had a school. A church and a school — it was a two-room school, and it was taught by the nuns. One nun taught grades one through four. The other nun taught grades five through eight, and the third nun was the housekeeper. And I remember it had no indoor plumbing. So we had to go outside and go into that little one-door shack in winter and summer — which was not too bad."

The school had two outhouses, "His and hers." He added facetiously, "I was gonna put down maybe 'heated seats,' but that wasn't." Despite the lack of heated outhouse seats, he recalled the school's upstairs had an area where, "The kids would put on plays. It was just like a regular hall, with a stage and the parents would come and watch the shows they put on which was really nice." Particularly, he recollected, shows near the religious holidays: "It wasn't that many... maybe one or so a year. But it was at Christmas time that they (children) put on a little Christmas show... And the parents would come in and they would watch it there. And it was fun."

The classes were on the first floor. "Everything was on the first floor. It was two rooms. The first through four, and five through eight room."

This undated Postcard is a correspondence from Ashford by Byron. Judging by the style and one-cent postcard stamp, it's likely to be from around 1910.

Maureen Betz of the Byron Historical Society noted it was "Sent to Henry Betz of Byron by Jake Beck of the Town of Ashford. Jake was married to Clara Delfeld, whose sister, Catherine Delfeld, was married to Henry Betz."

It seems that sometime around midcentury, these trees were either cut down or died. At least one source in different interviews recalled the trees as maples, but it appears the canopy of trees resembles a variance of poplar here in 1910. Another source suggested the trees came down in 1952, and recalled some cedar too. Either way, one is left to wonder what it was like to drive the horse carriage thru the tunnel of shade in 1910.

Above is a picture of the Tremmel Barn. Today the house is gone but the small barn lingers, as did Ray Thelen's memory of it. It is located more north on Super Drive, and is only about 30 feet long.

When he was around eight, Ray recalled the barn use. "Oh yea, they had hay and everything in there. Oh yea. They had cattle and all that in there." Ray could not remember their first names, just as "Grandpa and Grandma Tremmel." Yet she had the talents of a Betty Crocker and left cookies in the mailbox for the Thelen boys who were herding the cows northwest of Ashford.

The Tremmels themselves did not have kids. "No. They were brother and sister." So why were they called grandpa and grandma? "Well, that's what we called them." Ray said as he got older and married, it was funny because his own girls "always called that the 'chickie house.' That little barn."

"Oh yea. Yea. Yea. Oh yea. You always had to around the rim of the pail." Ray wasn't sure, but he thought it was lard or something "on that order." So that flattened the beer to increase the volume while filling up the pail.

Now, in terms of the hot iron in the fresh, full pail in the Blacksmith shop, there appears to be mixed messages about the purpose of the iron. Was it to warm the beer, or refuz it? Ray didn't deny that the beer was warmer. Did that make it hot beer or warm beer? "No, just kinda on the warm side. Not hot."


But a different taste? "Oh yeah, an all together different taste." He was at loss of words when it came to describing the different flavor. "Oh it would give it a taste. It would give it a taste that you wouldn't believe. You wouldn't think beer would have a taste like that. But I always remember that that hot iron hadta go in that pail of beer." When pressed on what the taste was like, he said, "Well, not a sharp one. But more like a beer taste." You would have had to been in Ashford in the 1940s to understand. And yes, Ray said the beer brand was West Bend Lithia.

how proud he was of where he came from. In addition, hard work and getting by with family and good neighbors was customary. Rather than complaining about the Great Depression, he reminisced about the ice cream he traded for asparagus. His belly was full. And if it wasn't from ice cream, it might be from Grandma Tremmel's cookies, who wasn't even a grandma.

Instead of grouching about farming and masonry, he took pride in what his family farm and his own hands built. His entire life he passed Super Drive taking in the fields his family planted. In good times, they'd take a break for a pail of beer at the Janous Blacksmith Shop.

His language was a broken German mixed with English. Many millennials would have struggled to understand his wisdom; yet his communication was distinctly clear to those who appreciate the old days. Maybe he even invented a word or two? What better word to describe Joe Janous's iron impact on the beer pail than a mixture of bubbling and fuzzed: "buzzled."


"Oh yea, those were the old days," he would say. And thankfully, he remembered the stories well and shared them often.



Raymond F. Thelen was born on the family homestead in the Town of Ashford on May 8, 1931, the son of Leo and Eleanor (Haas) Thelen. He married Elaine M. Gauger at St. Martin's Catholic Church in Ashford in 1962. He was proud to have farmed, and shared his stories often.

According to his obituary, he also "worked at Stella Cheese, a canning factory and then worked as a mason for many years. ## Student Entries Welcome By January 31 For Govenors Business Plan Contest

Looking for a self-directed project this semester that can lead to prizes, mentoring and live connections to the business world? The 15th annual Wisconsin Governor's Business Plan Contest will accept entries online for the 2018 competition until 5 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 31.

The contest is designed to encourage entrepreneurs in the startup stage of tech-based businesses in Wisconsin. It links up-and-coming entrepreneurs with a statewide network of community resources, expert advice, management talent and possible sources of capital.

It also leads to valuable public and media exposure for the top business plans and helps spur economic growth in the state. Two winning BPC plans from recent graduates have gone on to appear of ABC-TV's "Shark Tank," including Hyde Sportsweat. That episode will air 8 p.m. January 21.

Finalists will share in more than \$100,000 in cash and service prizes. There is no cost to enter.

For their initial entries, contestants will submit a 250-word (or 2,000-character) idea abstract online at [www.govsbizplancontest.com](http://www.govsbizplancontest.com). That's where contestants will also find business plan templates and other information, such as the Entrepreneurs' Toolkit. The toolkit provides business startup information and assistance, networking contacts and technical resources.

Contestants who advance to subsequent contest rounds will expand their plan in stages. More than 70 judges drawn from the finance, sales, marketing, research and technology sectors across Wisconsin will score the entries and provide feedback on submissions.

To get started, contestants will need to create a simple account at [www.govsbizplancontest.com](http://www.govsbizplancontest.com).

All entries are submitted through the website. Contestants use their account to gain access to mentors throughout the process, as well as review the judges' comments and feedback.

Since its inception in 2004, more than 3,500 entries have been received and about \$2.2 million in cash and services (such as legal, accounting, office space and marketing) have been awarded. Contest categories are Advanced Manufacturing, Business Services, Information Technology and Life Sciences.

Wisconsin residents 18 years old and older are eligible, as are teams from Wisconsin-based businesses and organizations. Businesses or teams from outside the state are also eligible to compete if they demonstrate intent to base their business in Wisconsin. Entrepreneurs may also enter multiple ideas, though each idea must be separate and distinct.

Companies or individuals that have raised less than \$25,000 in private equity for their plans in a current form are eligible to enter. Generally speaking, private equity refers to angel and venture capital.

As with past contests, the 2018 competition will take place in stages:

In Phase 1, which is open until 5 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 31, the contest will accept idea abstracts on the website. Entries should be roughly 250 words (or no more than 2,000 characters, including spaces) and will be graded by the pool of BPC judges. The top 50 idea abstracts will advance to Phase 2.

In Phase 2, which runs

from February 19 to 5 p.m. March 12, the top 50 idea abstracts will submit an executive summary. The top 20 executive summaries will advance to Phase 3. A mentored "boot camp" for contestants will be held in early March.

In Phase 3, which runs from April 2 to 5 p.m. April 23, the top 20 executive summaries will prepare full business plans. Judges will review the plans and pick three finalists from each of the four categories to advance to the final presentation round. Mentored practice sessions will be offered to the top 12 in late May.

The top 12, or "Diligent Dozen," will square off with oral presentations during the Wisconsin Entrepreneurs' Conference on June 5 at Union South in Madison.


Past finalists have launched companies that have raised more than \$200 million in angel, venture, grants and venture debt over time - all while creating jobs and economic value for Wisconsin. The contest's major sponsors include the Wisconsin Economic Development Corp.

The 2017 grand prize winner was Northern Star Fire, an Eau Claire startup company whose device is an eight-directional compass that firefighters place inside their breathing apparatus and helps maintain and/or regain their orientation in low visibility conditions.

Category winners in 2017 were Northern Star Fire (Advanced Manufacturing), Compost Crusader (Business Services), DotCom Therapy (Information Technology), and Nano Red (Life Sciences).

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# New Pricing Structure To Go Into Effect On Wisconsin State Park System Properties

A new demand-based pricing structure for Wisconsin State Park System properties will go into effect on February 15, 2018, that is intended to encourage use and manage capacity while providing funds for property improvements that directly enhance visitor experiences.

There will be no increase in the annual admission fees to park system properties, however daily admission fees will increase at three properties: Devil's Lake, Peninsula and Willow River state parks. Devil's Lake daily admission fees will increase \$5, with resident daily fees going from \$8 to \$13 and non-resident daily fees going from \$11 to \$16. Daily fees at Peninsula and Willow River will increase \$2, with resident daily fees going from \$8 to \$10 and non-resident daily fees going from \$11 to \$13.

Camping rates will be adjusted across the system based on demand, by both increasing and decreasing camping rates. Depending on campsite type and time of year, some properties will experience both a rate increase and a rate decrease. The average camping fee increase will be \$3 per night and will range to a high of \$7 at Devil's Lake and Peninsula on electrical sites during summer weekends. The greatest camping fee decrease will be \$5 per night.

"We believe this new pricing structure will help us better manage the demand we're seeing at some of our highly used properties while encouraging use at our lesser visited properties," said Ben Bergey, director of the

Wisconsin State Park System.

The 2017-2019 state budget set new rates and authorities for the DNR including: the ability to adjust camping rates from the base rates set in statute and the ability to adjust daily admission fees from the base rates set in statute, at all properties. Also included in the budget is a \$5 increase on all electrical campsites at Devil's Lake, Peninsula, Kohler-Andrae, High Cliff, and Willow River.

Also authorized in the 2017-2019 state budget, the park system plans to reinvest \$2 million in user fees to fund property improvements, including the electrification of an additional 200 campsites at different campgrounds throughout the system including Big Bay, Blue Mound, Buckhorn, Copper Falls, Devil's Lake, Governor Dodge, Harrington Beach, Hartman Creek, High Cliff, Interstate, Lake Kegonsa, Mirror Lake, Nelson Dewey, Pattison, Peninsula, Perrot, Potawatomi, Wildcat Mountain, Willow River and Wyalusing. They will also fund technology improvements at parks and the addition of electronic pay stations at various properties.


Other improvements will be made at a number of properties throughout the state, and may include new fire rings, picnic tables and grills; graveling and grading campsites and repairs to facilities, entrance roads and parking.

Under a separate funding act (Act 71) approved by the legislature, the park system will complete \$4.5

million in water and waste water infrastructure improvement projects at various state parks across the state, including the replacement of vault toilets and camper dump station at Peninsula State Park and replacement of

water infrastructure at Devil's Lake State Park.

Implementation of the new rate structure will begin on February 15, 2018. For more information about the Wisconsin State Park System, search for keyword "parks."

### VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on Election Day may request to vote an absentee ballot. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen, who will be 18 years of age or older on Election Day, who has resided in the ward or municipality where he or she wishes to vote for at least 10 consecutive days before the election. The elector must also be registered in order to receive an absentee ballot. Proof of identification must be provided before an absentee ballot may be issued.

### You must make a request for an absentee ballot in writing.

The deadline for making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail is:

5 p.m. on Thursday, February 15.

Note: Special absentee voting application provisions apply to electors who are indefinitely confined to home or a care facility, in the military, hospitalized, or serving as a sequestered juror. If this applies to you, contact the municipal clerk regarding deadlines for requesting and submitting an absentee ballot.

### NOTICE TO ALL WASHINGTON COUNTY DOG OWNERS

Pursuant to Section 174.052, Wisconsin Statutes, notice is hereby given to all owners of dogs in Washington County that dog licenses and rabies vaccinations are required.

Vaccination by a licensed veterinarian against rabies is required of all dogs (Section 95.21(2)) within 30 days after the dog reaches four (4) months of age and revaccinated within one year after the initial vaccination. The owner of a dog shall have the dog revaccinated against rabies by a veterinarian when the certificate expires or within three (3) years of previous vaccination. The certificate of rabies vaccination must be presented to the collecting official before a dog license may be issued.

All dogs five (5) months of age or older require a license. The minimum license fee for neutered males or spayed females is \$3.00, upon presentation of evidence attesting to the same, and \$8.00 for the unneutered male or unspayed female dog or one-half of these amounts if the dog became five (5) months of age after July 1, of the license year. The governing body of any town, village, or city may raise the minimum dog license tax. Any person who keeps multiple dogs or operates a kennel may apply for a multiple dog license. The fee is \$35.00 for twelve (12) dogs or less and additional \$3.00 for each dog in excess of twelve (12).

Dog licenses may be obtained from your local town, village or city treasurer or designee during the course of any given year. Dog owners should notify their treasurer if their dog is given away or has died, so that you will not be considered delinquent. An affidavit of death is available.

### PENALTY

Every owner of a dog five (5) months of age or older who fails to obtain a license by April 1, will be assessed a late fee of \$5.00.


