## House Fires Occur In Wayne And Farmington Townships

Two area families were displaced this week after house fires occurred in the towns of Wayne and Farmington. A third home was saved after an alert neighbor noticed fire coming from a house in the Town of Wayne.

### Wayne House Fire

On February 15 at 8:23 a.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office received a report of heavy smoke coming from the residence located at 8294 Broadview Lane in the Town of Wayne. The caller/homeowner reported the toaster was on fire, but they put it out with a fire extinguisher and there might be fire in the wall. The Kohlsville Fire Department was paged and the call was upgraded to a MABAS call. Fire Departments from

Kewaskum, West Bend, Allenton and St. Lawrence responded to assist.

Upon arrival of the first sheriff's deputy and fire personnel, there was smoke coming from the soffit on the north side of the residence and coming out of the garage door on the south side of the residence. There were active flames also located in the kitchen area emanating from a corner of the kitchen where appliances were located on the counter. The fire was extinguished by 9:02 a.m., and assistance from fire investigators from the Sheriff's Office was requested.

There were no reported injuries associated with the fire. This is an active investigation. The damage estimate is in excess of \$100,000. The damage from the fire was confined

to the kitchen area, but there is smoke and water damage as well.

### Farmington House Fire

On February 19 at approximately 3:44 a.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a house fire at 7720 Tomahawk Drive in the Town of Farmington.

The fire was reported by a neighbor who observed flames coming from the rear portion of the two story residence. The neighbor called 911 and ran over to the house to check on the neighbors. The four occupants inside the house were awoken by the smoke detectors and heavy smoke inside the residence. They were able to safely escape the home.

## Village Creates New Vaping Ordinance

Juveniles under the age 18 are no longer allowed to purchase or possess electronic nicotine devices in the Village of Kewaskum.

The Village Board approved a new ordinance Monday night that regulates the purchasing and usage of electronic nicotine delivery system (ENDS) vapor products by minors. The ordinance prohibits the sale of ENDS products to anyone under the age of 18.

There was no discussion before the vote at the February 19 meeting. Richard Laubach was the only trustee to vote against approving the ordinance.

Police Chief Tom Bishop explained to trustees at the February 5 village board meeting that state law does not allow minors under the age of 18 to possess nicotine. Vaping products generally contain nicotine, but there is no way to test if the cartridges used on the vaping prod-

ucts actually have nicotine, according to Bishop.

In the ordinance, "vapor products" include noncombustible products that may or may not contain nicotine and employ a mechanical heating element, battery, electronic circuit or other mechanism to produce a vapor. These include things such as electronic cigarettes, electronic cigars, electronic cigarillos, electronic pipes, vaporizers or similar devices.

According to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, approximately 11 percent of high school students and 4.3 percent of middle school students across the nation were using e-cigarettes in 2016.

The new village ordinance was modeled after a proposed ordinance that the City of Hartford is currently considering, Bishop said.

The fine for a juvenile smoking in the Village of Kewaskum begins at \$124.

## Finding Hope And Living Life

About three years ago, Dan Stevens saw an ad in the paper about a presentation that Deetra Kajfosz was giving about suicide. Kajfosz was sharing her personal story of how she

had reached her lowest point and did not want to go on living.

"This is exactly what I am dealing with," Stevens thought to himself.

It was a free program that was being held at a church. There would be a

crowd, so Stevens, a 33-year-old Kewaskum native, felt like he would not be put on the spot.

Stevens, who has dealt with depression his entire adult life and has had made numerous suicide attempts over the years,

attended the program. He heard Kajfosz's message of hope and started going to the Life Of Hope program for help.

And he is still alive today to tell about it.

# Cougar Sighting Verified In Washington County

Video footage of a large cat submitted by landowners in Washington County has been verified by Department of Natural Resources biologists as a cougar.

The animal was recorded on a security camera during the early morning hours of February 7 as it crossed a walkway in front of the residence. While there is no evidence of a breeding population in Wisconsin, individual cougars do move through Wisconsin periodically.

"A cougar's ability to cover ground is very impressive," said Scott Walter, DNR large carnivore specialist. "As an example of their range, DNR staff collected genetic samples from a cougar in Oconto County in 2010, and this cat was subsequently killed by a vehicle

in Connecticut, roughly 70 miles from New York City, after travelling over 1,100 miles."

A cougar was confirmed January 8 on a trail camera photo in Fond du Lac County, while four photos taken in Lincoln and Langlade counties in mid-December 2017 were also confirmed to feature a cougar. Without genetic samples, it is impossible to determine if this is the same animal confirmed in Washington County. Dispersing cougars are known to travel significant distances and it is possible these confirmed photos recorded a single cougar.

It is likely that the cougar recently confirmed in Washington County is passing through the area, and is now out of the area.

While a handful of cougar sightings were con-

firmed in Wisconsin in recent years, cougar sightings as whole are uncommon. The nearest established cougar population is in the Black Hills area of South Dakota, and animals dispersing through Wisconsin are believed to originate from this population.

DNR staff rely almost exclusively on the public for reports of cougars and other rare mammals. Anyone with an unusual sighting or trail camera photo are encouraged to fill out the Large Mammal Observation Form so that our biologists can work to identify the animal.





### Vehicle Crash With Injury

### OWI Case

A 19-year-old Town of Trenton man was arrested for first offense OWI on February 15 in Allenton after getting his vehicle stuck in the mud behind Farmers Inc. The Fillmore Fire Department responded and was assisted by the Boltonville, Kewaskum, Newburg, Silver Creek and Waubesa fire departments. Fire crews arrived and were able to quickly put out the blaze, although not prior to the fire spreading to the attic of the residence. There were no injuries as a result of the fire. The home suffered severe damage as a result of the fire, smoke and water.

The cause of the fire remains under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff's Office and the Fillmore Fire Department. Early indication points to the origin of the fire being most likely electrical in nature.

### Alert Neighbor Saves House From Fire In Town Of Wayne

The quick thinking of an alert neighbor likely saved a Town of Wayne home from major damage on February 12 at 11:04 a.m. The 63-year-old neighbor looked out his window

and noticed large pieces of ash falling in his yard. He then exited his home and saw heavy smoke and fire coming from the neighbor's attached garage. He ran over to the home with a fire extinguisher while his wife called 911.

After emptying the fire extinguisher on the fire, the man continued to put snow on the fire until a deputy arrived with another fire extinguisher. Together, they were able to pull the combustible material away from the side of the garage and the home only received damage to the exterior siding.

Investigators made contact with the homeowner who was not on scene. The homeowner had placed fireplace ash into a garbage can at 4 a.m. that morning. Prior to that, the ashes where inside a metal container outside the home for three days.

Kohlsville Fire Department also arrived on the scene and completely extinguished the fire.

If you have prediabetes, taking a 1- to 2- mile brisk walk each day may help to improve blood sugar control. Researchers separated 237 people with prediabetes into 4 groups. Group 1 followed the Diabetes Prevention Program (DPP), a combination of a calorie-reducing diet and moderate exercise (7-1/2 miles of brisk walking per week). The other groups only exercised. One did 7-1/2 miles of brisk walking a week, another did 11-1/2 miles of brisk walking a week, and the last did 11-1/2 miles of jogging per week. At the end of 6 months, the DPP and the 11-1/2 miles of brisk walking per week lowered blood sugar the most.





# Six KHS Wrestlers Pass The Test And Head For State

Spectators at this weekend's WIAA State Individuals Wrestling Tournament might notice Kewaskum High coach Scott Rhoads with a new hair style, one given to him by some amateur barbers, but some pretty darn good wrestlers.

After Alex Deheck won his wrestleback match at 145 pounds in the February 17, D-2 Cedar Grove Sectional, guaranteeing the Indians would be taking six wrestlers to tournament, one of the parents quickly yelled out "Haircut."

When asked about the remark, Rhoads said, "I told them (the kids) if we got six through, they get to cut my hair." While he may look funny for a couple weeks, this is one bet Rhoads doesn't mind paying off, not at all.

Kewaskum had a pair of champions, juniors Eric Bauer at 138 pounds and Tanner Goeman at 152.

For Bauer, this will be his third trip to Madison's Kohl Center, and the first for Goeman, who is much improved this year.

Finishing second was Mason Pomeroy at 120, while Adam Bruss at 113, Braden Maertz at 132, and Alex Deheck at 145 all qualified for state by virtue of their third-place finishes.

Bauer (37-3) breezed through the competition, starting off with a 12-3 major decision over Ben Kalara of Lake Mills, then pinning Tommy Cushman of Whitewater in a mere 1:52 and finishing off the day with a four takedown, 11-2 major decision over Campbellsport's Taylor Heltemes.

"I feel pretty good," Bauer said afterward, noting he was able to follow his game play without any difficulties. "I just wanted to make sure I was in good position," he said.

Bauer and Heltemes have squared off before so they knew each other's tendencies. "I think this is the fourth time (we met)," he said adding the nine-point win wasn't his best against the Cougar athlete. "I think the first time, I tech falled him."

Bauer lost to defending champion Sam Suhr of Ellsworth in the semis last year and would like another shot at him this year in the finals, but he's also figuring there will be a couple of other formidable challengers. "As long as I wrestled smart and wrestle my match, I'll be fine," he said.

Bauer likes the fact KHS has strong wrestlers from 132 to 152, which helped prepare for the big tournaments. "It helps having good partners," he said. "We push each other every day."

Goeman (40-9) was a big story at KHS this winter, turning into a top-rated D-2 wrestler. He started off with an 11-2 major win over Angel Cortes of Martin Luther, then outscored Kiel's Alex Kleinhans 8-4 in the semis before carefully carving out a 9-4 win over Bryce Morgan, a sophomore from Cedar Grove-Belgium.

"It's what I wanted ... It's what I've been working for," Goeman said about going to state. What helped him make a big jump was first and foremost trying out for special state freestyle teams. He also said, "I learned how to lift (weights) better ... went on more runs and went to a lot more practices."

Still, Goeman admitted he had butterflies before his first match. "I was worried about messing up," he said. "I overcame it. It kind of left me (when I started the matches.)"

Concerning the win over Morgan, Goeman said, "I didn't want to stop moving. I didn't want him to be able to capitalize on me."

Pomeroy (38-13) received a bye in the first round, then went up against Lucas Schevikhoven of Sheboygan Lutheran (40-0) in the semis and had Schevikhoven on his back for a five-point move in the first period. Schevikhoven prevailed, however, coming back with 20 straight points for a 20-5 technical fall.

The loss didn't daunt Pomeroy, however, as he bounced back with a 6-0 decision over Quinn Hoopmann of Cedar

Grove in the first wrestleback and secured second place with a 7-5 overtime decision over Joe Moede of East Troy.

All year long, Rhoads was hoping his lone senior, Bruss (35-15) would advance. He looked a little sluggish in his first match, a 9-5 win over Jacob Greidanus of Delevan-Darien, but then he was much better in the semis where he defeated Jefferson's West Wright 4-2 on a takedown 17 seconds into overtime.

Bruss faced an old nemesis, Campbellsport's Dylan Bublitz, in the finals and lost 6-1 after giving up a takedown and near fall in the first period. This forced Bruss to have one more match to determine second and third. In this one he lost to Kiel's Andrew Schad 7-3.

The sophomore Maertz (40-10) will be making his second trip to state after he won two matches, lost one and forfeited to Aidan Medora of St. John's Military/Northwestern in the semis.

After pinning Whitewater's Jaden Salmieri in the first round, Maertz decided to forfeit to Medora, a state runner-up in 2017.

"He's had a neck injury that's bothering him," Rhoads said. Still, Maertz came back with a 3:21 pin over Dylan Teunissen of Cedar Grove in the first wrestleback, then outlasted Logan Kreuser of Campbellsport in a 5-3 overtime match before ending the day with an 8-3 loss to Ellis Pflieger of Grafton.

Deheck (26-8) had a rather auspicious start to his tournament, facing the eventual champion, Max Ward of Elkhart Lake/Glenbeulah in the first round and getting pinned in 1:22 after getting caught in a Spladle.

Deheck knew he had a good chance to come back, and he made the most of it, pinning Sheboygan Lutheran's Jack Schilling in 2:34 and pinning Josh TeStroete of Cedar Grove in 1:15 before losing to Andrew Forsythe of North Fond du Lac/St. Mary's Springs, 8-4 in the battle for second.

Sam Larson (27-17) went 0-2 at 160 pounds and does not advance.

Three Indians were eliminated from the competition after their first matches because the wrestler they lost to, lost in

## Tigers End Kewaskum's Run Toward Team State

The Kewaskum High wrestlers breezed past Jefferson in the first round of the February 13 Team Sectional at East Troy but fell one short of their goal of becoming the first team to qualify for the Team State when they were edged by Chilton/Hilbert 30-29.

Both teams earned seven wins, but the Tigers had the extra point by virtue of its three pins to one for the Indians, who also picked up a six-point forfeit in the final match at 132.

KHS also advanced to the Team Sectional finals in 2013, but this loss might have been more painful because it was so close.

What it came down to, according to KHS Scott Rhoads, was the Tigers were going for what he called "big reward moves," and "this time it paid off in their favor."

Rhoads went on to explain how the Chilton wrestlers were trying for front headlocks with ankle picks, and "They pulled that into a cradle," not always for pins but for big points.

When asked if any of the Indians came up with upsets, he noted heavy-weight Nathan Lawrenz had a couple, but "In the middle, it was just the opposite. Chilton upset us a couple of times."

Lawrenz "had a great night," Rhoads said, referring to the fact Lawrenz pinned his Jefferson opponent in 1:55, then caught Jacob Gehl in a pin move in the first period, cutting Chilton's lead to 18-16.

Next up were the 106-pounders, Nathaniel Droese for KHS and Joe Boehnlein for Chilton. Boehnlein prevailed, scoring a pin, and now the combined Chilton/Hilbert team was up by eight (24-16) with just three matches to go.

Senior Adam Bruss came through for the Indians, winning 13-6 over Phoenix Ladd, and then Mason Pomeroy's major decision tightened things even further, bringing the Indians to within a point 24-23.

Maverik Ott, a 36-9 sophomore, sealed the deal for the Tigers when he took an 8-0 lead, then pinned freshman Isaiah George in 3:39.

Eric Bauer at 138, Alex Deheck at 145, Braden Maertz (pin and forfeit), and Lawrenz all went 2-0 on the night for the Indians.

"Eric Bauer pulled off a big major," Rhoads said, indicating he spent much of the match letting Dylan Anhalt go and taking him down to get the extra team point.

In Round 1, Chilton/Hilbert eliminated East Troy 42-27, and the Indians topped Jefferson 46-27. The Indians started with five straight wins, starting at 132, for a 22-0 lead.

"I think Ashley is playing some of her best basketball of the year," Thull said about Trapp, who had a team-high nine points with one assist, one rebound and two deflections. "She's turning into such a nice leader for our team."

Next came Paulowske with eight points, five rebounds and one steal. The Panthers were targeting the junior scorer as PHS coach Brad Shutter was yelling, "Know where No. 23 is," because of her ability to get open for three-pointers. In this game, Paulowske got off 10 shots, was 1x5 on two-pointers and 2x5 on threes.

Cook scored a bucket early in the game, while Marx contributed a pair of assists, one rebound and two deflections, and Below-Kopf, who averaged 2.0 points and 2.0 rebounds per game, chipped in with a pair of rebounds.

With eight of 11 varsity players returning, next year appears to be very promising.

The Kewaskum High boys basketball team got an "A" for effort but unfortunately no "W" (win) in its game at Winneconne on February 16.

A last-second drive by Talon Ralph missed, and Jared Chesak's rebound attempt hit and rim and bounced away, and the Indians came up a point short in a 60-59 battle against the Wolves, who are currently tied for fourth place in the East Central Conference.

Winneconne had taken its first lead since the 13-minute mark of the second half on a three-point play by Austin Hecker with 11.8 seconds to go. Hecker took off on a drive, getting the basket and the foul call while flattening guard Ty Cook in the process.

After converting the free throw, the score was 60-59, but the Indians still had time to score.

The matchups changed in the second half, and the big forward wound up with 18 more points off several defenders.

It seemed like the basketball hung up in the air for a good minute. If it would go in, Kewaskum would have its first East Central Conference win in two years, and a miss would mean another loss, one to arch rival Campbellsport.

The ball hit the rim, then bounced harmlessly to the floor, and the visiting Cougars escaped with a 45-44 victory, their sixth this season against six losses in EC action.

The Indians' leading scorer and best free throw shooter, Jordan Carlton, was called on to take the shot during a time out with just under :06 on the clock.

"I was trying to get a 1-4 isolation," KHS coach Don Gruber said, "with shooters on the wing to rotate in case they would collapse, we would have an open look."

The ball was inbounded to Jared Chesak, who passed to Carlton, who shot from just outside the three-point line.

"Another heart-breaking loss for the kids," Gruber went on, referring to the fact the Indians had the lost shot against Ripon recently, when Talon Ralph missed at the end of regulation, and KHS lost the game in OT.

"I thought our defense was pretty solid," Gruber said, aware the Cougars have three good outside shooters in Trevor Ramthun, Connor Kissinger and Jacob

Johnson.

Ramthun scored the first eight points for his team, which got off to an 8-2 start and a 13-8 lead when the Indians' Brad Buechel found his shooting eye. Buechel, who has struggled in the team's last six games, drained back-to-back threes, and the Indians were only down by a point, 17-16 with 5:09 left in the first half.

The rest of the way, CHS scored seven points to three for the Indians on a trey by Brent Goeden from the left wing with 2:30 left on the clock.

KHS missed two shots, including a spin out, and had a traveling call, and Campbellsport went for a final shot, holding the ball for 20 seconds before Ramthun missed at the buzzer.

The second half was tight all the way, with Kewaskum holding leads of 27-24, 32-31, 34-33, 36-35 and 38-35 and the score tied at 24-all, 27-27, 29-all and 38-38 before the Cougars crept into the lead.

CHS sophomore Jacob Johnson was instrumental in the surge, hitting a three-pointer to tie the score (38-38) and then hitting another long shot for a 41-38 Campbellsport advantage with 4:22 to play. Those were his only points of the contest.

Kewaskum scored just six more points, with Goeden converting a pair of free throws with 3:38 left to play, Carlton was successful on a drive to the basket and Ralph

making a nifty move inside with 1:32 remaining (44-45).

The Indians played some tenacious defense down the stretch, and their decision to foul paid off as Johnson missed a one-and-one opportunity with :49 to play.

Later, the ball went out of bounds to Kewaskum and Gruber called a time out with 30.2 to play. Goeden inbounded to Carlton, who passed to Chesak, left of the basket, but his hook shot was short.

Kewaskum then fouled Kade Walsh, who missed the bound attempt, and after Carlton rebounded the ball, the Indians took time for their final shot.

Carlton led the Indians with 17 points, while the other starters, Buechel, Ralph, Chesak and Goeden, chipped in with nine, seven, six and five.

Ramthun and Kissinger combined for 26 of the Cougars' points.

Not being fully satisfied, he decided to sneak into his dad's closet and try out the concertina. When his dad was off driving school bus, Brian would practice and practice on that concertina.

One Sunday afternoon as the family took their afternoon naps, Brian took his dad's concertina out of the closet and practiced. When his Dad woke up from his nap to the sounds of Brian playing "At the Spring Waltz," he realized his son's passion. From that time on, the concertina was never locked in the closet, and practicing

Sometimes Brian would go and practice in the barn just to give the family a break. Although Brian can read trumpet music, concertina music remained foreign to him. recorded and played by many bands in the Midwest.

# Continued From... Finding Hope And Living Life

## Life Of Hope

On January 24, 2001, Deetra Kajfosz, a 27-year-old mother of two, attempted suicide. She survived the attempt, but kept her story to herself.

Then, in 2014, Kajfosz lost a personal friend to suicide.

It was not an isolated case. In 2012, Washington County reported that 90 county residents had been hospitalized for self-inflicted wounds that year.

Kajfosz decided she needed to do something about the suicide epidemic. She decided to speak out and share her story. She wanted to help educate the public about suicide and try to prevent future tragedies.

So in October 2014, the first organized meeting was held in Kajfosz's dining room. In January 2015, Life Of Hope was officially created as a 501(c)3 non-profit organization dedicated to suicide prevention.

"Life Of Hope is about finding ourselves in those moments of brokenness, connecting with others to reconnect with that sense of hope," Kajfosz said.

The program held meetings wherever it could find space. Groups would meet in the library, at a coffee shop or in Kajfosz's home.

In September 2015, Life

of Hope moved into a physical office at 139 N. Main St., Suite 104, in West Bend.

Over the past three years, Life of Hope has reached over 4,000 people. The program offers awareness, education and support services. All programs are offered free of charge, and the program relies on charitable donations.

"I've enjoyed watching the organization grow," said Jim Shutes, who has served on the organization's board since the beginning. "I've watched them evolve. It's been a real treat, a wonderful ride. It is a marvelous organization and wonderful, wonderful people."

## Facilities

The first thing most people notice when they step into the Life Of Hope office is the bright paint colors on the walls. Vibrant shades of orange, green, blue and purple are in each room.

"We talk very little about suicide here. We talk about life. We talk about hope. We talk about connections. And the colors are really a reflection of being able to connect with that vibrancy and being able to infuse a sense of color where sometimes it just feels really dark," Kajfosz

explained.

In addition to the bright colors, symbols of hope can be found everywhere. There are butterflies, hearts and inspirational messages throughout the building.

Over the past three years, Life Of Hope has continued growing, and the office space has been added on two times. The expanded space was completed about three months ago.

A classroom provides space for QPR (Question, Persuade, Refer) training classes. The classes teach individuals how to respond to a potential or existing suicidal crisis. Those classes are also offered on site for businesses, churches, organizations and schools.

The most recent addition includes office space for Amy Lynn Schultz, the stabilization support specialist. Schultz's office has a very homy feel so that people who are in crisis feel comfortable.

Schultz meets with people who are struggling with thoughts of suicide, those who may have survived a suicide attempt, as well as with people who have a loved one who is struggling or those who have lost someone to suicide.

"They are able to face to

face with someone who really understands," Kajfosz said.

The new space also includes a break room, which has a large table, refrigerator and storage space for food. Like the other rooms in the building, the break room is filled with inspirational messages and symbols.

"If we were meeting in a challenging situation with one of our guests, or if just one of us is having a difficult day, we didn't have any place where we could go that wasn't all about what was on our desks. This may sound silly, but this is probably my favorite part just to give us something that is about our own mental wellness," Kajfosz said about the new break room.

## Coordinating Programs

Life of Hope offers a variety of programs for the community.

For Dave Earhart, the support groups have been a lifesaver for his family.

"Basically, Life of Hope has been here for us and for our daughter," he said.

In addition, Life of Hope works with other organizations in the county to offer referral services. For example, Life Of Hope works closely with NAMI (National Alliance on

Mental Illness) of Washington County to offer the AHA (Acceptance Harmony Affirmation) program.

The AHA offers social activities for adults ages 18 and older to promote wellness. In January, AHA started a walking group that meets on Monday evenings at the YMCA in West Bend.

"Walking is a good way to battle depression and by walking with others we are forming a community," said Kelley Hamann, one of the AHA cofacilitators.

"We chose our night that we meet very carefully. We actually chose Monday nights because Monday is the highest incidence of suicides," Hamann said.

Stevens is grateful for the walking group.

"It creates a place to go to that kind of gets your mind off of the depression and suicidal thoughts so you are not talking about it," Stevens said.

The AHA program would like to create other groups where there is interest. The groups could be centered around other topics such as poetry, creative writing, music, game night, a book club, volunteer work, creative writing, art therapy or yoga.

"We are constantly listening and evolving and

growing, if we see there is a need in the community," Hamann said.

## Getting Help

For anyone who is dealing with depression, Life of Hope is there to help.

"The people here came at me in a loving way about what do you need, how can I help you type of thing. There are no judgments here," Stevens said.

Stevens has a wide network to help him. He has loving family members that have been supportive. He has medical doctors that have helped.

And he has Life of Hope.

"I'm just glad that an organization like this exists.

especially this close to home," Steven said.

# Learning About History Through The Eyes Of A Lumberjack

Fourth-grade students at Kewaskum Elementary School got a firsthand look at what life was like for early settlers in Wisconsin.

On Friday, Feb. 16, members of the Kewaskum Historical Society visited the fourth-grade classes. They brought with them tools, artifacts and pictures to show what life was like in the Kewaskum area in the 1800s.

Dressed in flannel plaid shirts, the students looked like young lumberjacks, and they listened attentively as Historical Society members Mike Paul and Matt Harvey explained how logging was done in Wisconsin's early days.

The students also listened as Eva Harvey and Hannah Schladweiler from the Historical Society demonstrated how household items were used. The fourth-graders were especially interested in how laundry was done before electric washers and dryers were invented.

For fourth-grader Chase Cook, an exciting part of the presentation was seeing his grandmother's house in a photo that was part of a slide show that Historical Society member Aaron Laatsch shared.

After listening to the guest speakers, the students took part in a Paul Bunyan Readers Theater. They learned about how early settlers carved wood, so they tried their hand at making their own soap carvings from soap and craft knives.

To end the day, the students enjoyed a hearty flapjack breakfast, complete with pancakes, applesauce, donuts and black lead (grape juice).

The day was a culmination of a social studies unit the students had just completed about Wisconsin becoming a state. In class,

they have been learning about immigrants, logging, mining and Kewaskum's establishment as a township.

"The students love having when people come in and tell stories or show them artifacts," said fourth-grade teacher Pam Berres.

This was the second year that the fourth grade students at Kewaskum Elementary School partici-

pated in Lumberjack Day. It appeared that the day brought lessons that the students will remember.

"It helps to give them those hands-on experiences that they will remember. We often put kids in front of books and just have them read, or just stand in front of them and teach them. But when they actually do hands on projects, it definitely sticks a lot better," Berres said.
