Safety A Priority For School District

The Kewaskum School District's capital project is running on schedule, and is being completed with student safety in mind.

Board members discussed issues regarding student safety at the School Board meeting on Monday, March 12.

"The legislature and the governor are looking at providing a one-time amount of money to school districts for updating or putting some type of school safety things in the budget," Superintendent James Smasal said.

If the district does receive money, a big portion would be used for enhancing security on the front of the high school as the building project is completed, Smasal said.

Also related to safety, Smasal mentioned the national school walkout event planned for 10 a.m. on March 14 in response to the school shooting in Parkland, Florida, in February.

A letter went to district families on March 9 that said that the district wanted to ensure all students felt safe and respected, regardless of what they chose to do. If a walkout occurred, classes would continue according to the regular school day schedule, according to the letter signed by Smasal.

Parents who decided to excuse their child from class to participate in a walkout were to contact the school's attendance office prior to the event to excuse the absence.

Wedding Gowns And Tradition – Display Shows Evolution Of Wedding Dresses

Hannah Schladweiler has always been obsessed with tradition.

When she got married, she made sure to have something old, something new, something borrowed and something blue.

"I even had a penny in my shoe," she said.

So she was honored when a friend gifted her a collection of traditional wedding dresses in 2015. Schladweiler wanted to continue her friend's legacy of teaching others

about the collection,

which is made up of gowns that span 100 years.

Schladweiler, who is from Beechwood, has experience researching, designing and making clothing for museums. She is currently contracted by the Wisconsin Historical Society and has worked as a clothing coordinator for the Wade House in Greenbush.

When Schladweiler first examined the wedding gown collection, she was amazed when she examined the collection.

"I couldn't help looking at it and thinking wow, we are borrowing a lot more than we think. The individual elements within the dresses keep

showing up over and over again," Schladweiler said.

On Saturday, Schladweiler shared her collection with the Farmington Historical Society. About 50 people attended the presentation, which was held at the Boltonville Fire House.

"This program was particularly appealing because if you go back in Boltonville's history, there was a woman who lived here who made wedding gowns. Her name was Sophia Kraetsch," said Marcia Theusch, president of the Farmington Historical Society.

Sticking To Business – Maple Syrup Has Sweet Rewards

Four years ago, Isaiah Cochran's parents, Sally and Chris Cochran, began making maple syrup at their bed and breakfast, Hidden Serenity.

Two years ago, Isaiah decided he wanted in on the action. So he began to make and bottle his own maple syrup from the family's trees.

But he wanted to do more than just make

maple syrup. He wanted to sell it.

So Isaiah, a 16-year-old sophomore at Kewaskum High School, worked with his dad and sister, Krystal, to develop a label.

And he began to sell his product, Iszi Liquid Gold, at a stand.

Business Sense

Isaiah markets his syrup wherever he can.

"I had like a little lemonade stand, where I sat out

there and sold syrup across from the Shalom Wildlife Sanctuary," he said.

He sold his syrup at rummage sales. And pretty much wherever he went.

"I will sell it to teachers, friends, whoever wants it," he said.

Business has been good. In the last couple of years, he has sold all of the syrup he has made.

WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

Fatal Crash

On March 11 at 4:06 a.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a single vehicle car crash on Midland Drive south of Mohawk Road in the Town of Wayne. Deputies responded along with the Kohlsville first responders, and Kewaskum Fire Department and rescue.

A 35-year-old City of Hartford man was extricated from the vehicle. Lifesaving measures were performed, but the man was pronounced dead at the scene as a result of the crash.

The crash remains under investigation. Evidence indicates the car was being driven southbound on Midland Drive and it left the paved roadway, striking a culvert and a tree. The crash is still under investigation, but speed and lack of seatbelt are believed to be contributing factors.

Man Falls Through Ice

On March 11 at 6:25 p.m., a 68-year-old Town of West Bend man fell through the ice on Big Cedar Lake while taking his dog for a walk. A nearby resident saw the incident unfold and contacted 911. The incident occurred near Penny Island on the north part of Big Cedar Lake in about five feet of water.

Several area residents went out to the scene with ladders and a canoe, and were able to assist the man and his dog to the shore before rescue units arrived. The Washington County Dive Team also was activated as a proactive measure, but was subsequently cancelled.

The man was in the water for about 14 minutes but was treated and released.

Traffic Stop Result In Deputy Administrating Narcan

The Sheriff's Office responded to a report of a vehicle "all over the road" and almost hitting several cars head on. The call came in at 9:30 p.m. on March 7 in the area of State Highway 167 and Scenic Road in the Village of Richfield.

Deputies were able to locate the vehicle and made contact with the driver, who was identified as a 36-year-old Town of Addison man. During the contact, the driver's condition began to deteriorate and rescue was summoned to the scene.

The deputy became concerned the driver was in the early stages of an opioid overdose as the conditions worsened. The deputy administered Narcan and turned over patient care to Richfield Rescue personnel

when they arrived on scene.

The driver was arrested for OWI and transported to St. Joseph's Hospital by rescue. After medical clearance, the man was taken to jail for felony bail jumping and OWI third offense charges.

High-Risk Traffic Stop

Two deputies were returning from a prisoner escort on March 8 at 12:20 a.m. when a vehicle swerved into their lane on Interstate 41 near County Highway K in the Town of Addison. The deputies checked the plate and determined the vehicle was stolen from Menasha several days prior.

With the assistance of Slinger Police Department, a high-risk traffic stop was done on the vehicle that was occupied by five individuals. Interstate 41 was closed for about 10 minutes as all the occupants were taken into custody.

The driver, a 16-year-old male from Menasha, knew the vehicle was stolen and was arrested for operation without owner's consent. One of the passengers, a 17-year-old Green Bay male, was arrested for stealing the vehicle. The three other passengers, ranging in ages from 16 to 18, were released.

Washington County's Hazardous Waste 2018 Full Service Collection

The Washington County Full Service Clean Sweep is an opportunity for county residents to properly dispose or recycle unwanted hazardous chemicals, electronic goods, pharmaceutical medication, and used tires. TVs and large household appliances will be accepted again this year. This is the ninth consecutive year for the Full Service Clean Sweep Program coordinated by the Planning and Parks Department, while partnering with the County's Health Department, Sheriff's Department and the Highway Department. The drive-through collection makes this program simple and effi-

cient for participants.

A \$30 pre-registration fee is required for the hazardous waste and electronic goods. The Pharmaceutical Collection does not require anyone to pre-register. At the Used Tire Collection a maximum of 20 tires will be accepted per participant and disposal fees apply at the time of collection. Registration is limited.

The 2018 Full Service Clean Sweep event will be held on Saturday, May 5, 2018. Collection will be from 8 a.m. - noon at the Washington County Slinger Highway Shop, 314 West Washington St., (Hwy 175) in Slinger.





Continued From... **Wedding Gowns** **And Tradition**

Kraetsch was born in the Slinger area in 1849 and moved as a child with her family to Boltonville.

When she was young, Kraetsch contracted an illness and suffered from growth issues and deformities in her wrists and hands.

"She was really small featured. Her father wanted her to be self supporting, so he built her that tiny house right near the town hall. He built the cupboards and everything for her size," Theusch said.

Kraetsch spent her time sewing and established a dress-making school out

of her home. She taught an estimated 200 girls how to sew.

"As the story goes, she wore out three of those pedaled sewing machines," Theusch said.

Kraetsch became known across the area as a seamstress of wedding gowns.

None of Kraetsch's dresses were at Saturday's event, but there were eight dresses displayed. The oldest dress that the crowd saw dated back to about 1889, and the newest was from the 1980s.

Schladweiler also

brought a cutout of the wedding dress that Queen Victoria wore in 1840 when she married Prince Albert.

"Queen Victoria was a major trendsetter, and she got married in white because it was fashionable. And because she liked white," Schladweiler said and pointed out that in the 1700s, silver had been the color of choice for wedding gowns.

Everyone seemed to follow Queen Victoria's lead, and upper class brides wanted white wedding gowns. By the 1880s, middle class brides were

wearing white also.

At that time, brides would wear their wedding dresses every day as well, Schladweiler said. White was a popular color for everyday use, but those who didn't want a white dress would dye them.

Schladweiler's favorite dress in her collection is a gown from 1914 that belonged to a woman in Fredonia.

"She made the dress herself. She told her granddaughter she picked raspberries all summer

from a local farmer so she could buy the silk and the lace for the dress," Schladweiler said.

Then, after wearing the white gown in her wedding, she dyed it navy blue. Schladweiler believes the woman wore the dress for a long time and added nursing panels on top.

Also in the collection is a 1982 gown fashioned after the Princess Diana wedding gown.

"There are a lot of things the same between

Princess Di and Vicky. You still have a full skirt, still have lots of lace going on, and fabulous puff sleeves. The Princess Di dress has an imitation bertha and has almost the same pleats," Schladweiler pointed out.

Now, as the world awaits the royal wedding of Prince Harry and Meghan Markle on May 19, one of the questions is whether the 2018 wedding gown will carry on some of the same features as Queen Victoria's gown.

School Facilities To Close During Summer For Capital Project

The Kewaskum School District capital project will be going full force this summer, with a completion date of September 10, 2018, which is the start of the 2018-19 school year. The district is excited about the progress of this project. The district looks forward to the completion of the enhancements to school facilities and grounds for the students and communities.

Accordingly, there will be disruption to the middle/high school campus facility use during the summer months. The last day

of the 2017-18 school year for students is May 25. The demolition of the current middle school will begin soon thereafter, and construction will ramp up as crews use the summer months to finish at both the new middle school and the high school.

Parking lots and field spaces will also be redesigned and unavailable. Consequently, all access to facilities and grounds at the middle and high school during the summer months will be closed. The Fitness Center will close starting

Summer school will take place June 5 - 29, with all classes held at the Kewaskum Elementary School. Middle School and High School office staff will be reassigned to alternate locations. Continued From... Safety A Priority For School District

Students who left class without parent permission would be considered unexcused for that time period.

The letter stated that to ensure student safety, those who chose to walk out would be directed to a safe meeting place.

School Board Member Tim Ramthun asked at Monday's meeting if the district has a process in place if an emergency situation were to occur here.

"If we had a credible threat, is there a process to evacuate students in a safe manner," Smasal

said.

"Each situation is a little different. You are not going to have a blanket response. Everything has to be evaluated on a case-by-case basis," added School Board Member Mark Sette, who is also a detective with the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

"It is a very difficult topic to discuss," Smasal said. "I think we are very fortunate in this district in that we have two different law enforcement agencies that work with us.

"The village does a fan-

tastic job and we appreciate the partnering we have. I think we work very well together and are very confident in each other's capabilities," Smasal said.

In addition, the district benefits from the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

"I am not over exaggerating here. Every day a deputy stops at i4Learning and at Farmington Elementary. We have a presence in those two buildings every day, and that is unheard of. We are very appreciative of those efforts," Smasal said.

Continued From... Sticking To Business

No one is surprised that Isaiah has developed a booming business. He has always wanted to be an entrepreneur.

When he was in fifth grade at Farmington Elementary School, he started a duct tape wallet business. He even had employees.

"If the other kids sold wallets, I'd pay them a dollar. I made the rest," Isaiah explained.

One of Isaiah's friends caught on, and a little competition started.

"Finally, the teacher said no more selling anything because people would come up and buy the wallets. They wanted people to buy from the school store," Isaiah said.

So Isaiah and his friends made a deal with the school and sold their duct tape products at the school store to raise funds for the school's fifth-grade class trip.

Today, Isaiah has other jobs as well. He works for a race timing company and mows lawns during the summer. He also helps out at his parents' bed and breakfast.

Making Syrup

At this time of year, though, Isaiah concentrates his efforts on his syrup business. It can be time consuming, and conditions must be just right.

In order to make maple syrup, temperatures need to get below freezing at night and above freezing during the day.

The sap flows quickest when temperatures reach about 50 degrees during the day and below freezing at night. In Wisconsin, maple syrup typically starts to flow each year at the end of February or beginning of March.

"The freezing temperature freezes the

sap and causes it to go down into the roots during the night. When it warms up, the sap shoots up the tree, and that's when we collect it through the spiles," Isaiah explained.

The spiles currently are tapped into about 40 trees on the Cochran family's 12 acres.

The sap is collected in plastic bags that hang on the spiles. Once the bags are filled, Isaiah dumps the sap into a large container.

From there, the sap is placed on a wood stove called an evaporator so it can boil.

"The majority of what comes out of the trees is water, and then that little bit of natural sugar. So when it boils down, it will take the water out of the sap and make it thicker," Isaiah said.

It takes about 40 gallons of sap to make one gallon of syrup, Isaiah said.

"So it will take a lot of sap and a lot of boiling it down before we can get a whole gallon," Isaiah said.

After boiling the sap outdoors on the evaporator, Isaiah brings it into his kitchen. There, he filters it, but doesn't add any ingredients. He then boils the syrup a while longer on the regular stove.

To make sure it is has the correct sugar content, Isaiah uses a hydrometer, which measures the sugar percentage in the water and the density of the sap.

"You'd be surprised at how thin the syrup is. The store stuff is so much thicker with the preservatives. This isn't as thick, but definitely much tastier," he said.

Although Isaiah does enjoy making and selling the syrup, there is no question as to what his favorite part of the syrup business: the final product.

Heckendorf, Stoltz Propel Chargers To D-3 "Final Four"

Two student athletes from Kewaskum, Brandon Heckendorf and Jacob Stoltz, were instrumental in making history for the Kettle Moraine Lutheran boys basketball program on March 10.

The Chargers (21-5) battled back from a 34-21 halftime deficit to tip Waupun 53-48 to earn their first-ever berth in the Division 3 WIAA State Basketball Tournament.

Playing in front of a standing-room only crowd at the Whitefish Bay High School Field House, KML used the "refuse-to-lose" mentality to come back

from the 13-point deficit.

"At half, we knew we were not done. We knew we were not out of it," Heckendorf, a six-foot two-inch guard, said Sunday night, pointing out, "Waupun shot lights out in the first half," but the Chargers were convinced they would not be able to keep up that pace in the second half.

"We started to play physical ... We just wore them down," Heckendorf said. "To start the second half, we went on an 18-4 run to take a 39-38 lead. The go-ahead basket was scored on a layup by Heckendorf.

"We came out fighting in the second half," the five-

foot 10-inch right-handed sophomore Stoltz said. He also came up with a huge play in the run when he stole the ball and went in for a layup. The steal came off of Warrior forward Owen Theune, according to Stoltz, who said he scored with the left hand.

The game remained close until the eight-minute mark when KML scored eight straight points to erase a 43-41 deficit and jump out front 49-43. Oddly enough, the Chargers did not have a single, three-point goal until then, but came up with two long-range bombs within three possessions that helped secure the victory.

Waupun was leading 43-41, Heckendorf said, when he put up a three from the right wing, putting the Chargers ahead 44-43. After Zach Zuleger was successful on a pair of free throws, it was Solomon Zarling, the hero in the 48-47 victory over Dominican, sinking another three for a 49-43 advantage.

"Both of us hit it from the same spot," Heckendorf said, and it was at that point Stoltz said he started thinking he and his teammates were going to win. "I had a good feeling about it," Stoltz said but still concerned until the final buzzer sounded.

It was pandemonium after that as KML fans poured out on the court to celebrate with their players. "It was incredible," Heckendorf said. "The atmosphere that was created there ... standing room only. It was something special."

Stoltz expects the euphoric atmosphere will continue this week. "I'm sure we will have a pep rally this week. It will be so much fun."

Zarling led the Chargers

with 14 points, while Zuleger was next with 13 and Heckendorf and Stoltz each added 20.

Waupun's all-state junior Marcus Domask led all scorers with 24 points but from there the scoring dropped off to eight by Trevor VandeZande.

This was the third time the Chargers and Waupun played each other this season. "We beat them at our place in January, and they beat us at their place in February. Both were close games," Stoltz said, also praising his coach Todd Jahns for the work he has done in building the KML program.

"I love him," Stoltz, who starting playing basketball at age four and participated at St. Lucas Lutheran School and in KYB (Kewaskum Youth

Basketball) programs, said. "He's a great coach, very successful and well known throughout the state."

The other three teams in the D-3 tournament are Valders (23-3), East Troy (20-5) and Prescott (24-2). KML will play Valders today (March 15) at 1:30 p.m. at the Kohl Center in Madison.

"They're lengthy, and they're physical," Heckendorf said of Valders. "It should be a physical game. We should match up with them well."

"They're the number two seed right now. They've got to be good," Stoltz said of Valders, which knocked off unbeaten Appleton Xavier 59-57 in the finals of Sectional Number Two.

If the Chargers win, they will play in the finals on

WIAA To End Summer Baseball After 2018 Season

After 20 more teams have indicated their intentions to move to spring baseball, the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA) announced March 2 it will end sponsorship of summer baseball after the 2018 state tournament.

The sport will have 50 schools sponsoring the summer baseball in 2018, but the projected number for the following year had been under 30 with Homestead, the Brookfield and West Allis teams, Marquette, Menomonee Falls and others indicating they would switch to spring.

Summer baseball programs reached a high of 110 teams in 1990, and the WIAA had conducted a state summer baseball tournament since 1965.

This move is especially disheartening for Kewaskum High baseball coach Doug Gonring, who grew up playing summer baseball while at West Bend East High and spent 22 summers at East and now Kewaskum coaching the sport he loves. He directed state championship teams at East in 1999 and 2002.

"I'm disappointed," Gonring said last week. "Baseball is supposed to be played in 80-degree weather and on green grass," pointing out the spring season is two weeks away (March 19 starting date), and the frost isn't out of the ground yet.

Weather isn't the only negative issue, according to Gonring, who said spring baseball games have to be played at 3 p.m. rather than at 5:30 to get finished before dark, so there will be fewer people able to watch the games. Also when rain-outs occur, doubleheaders have to be scheduled, starting at 1 p.m., meaning students will miss classes, and districts will have to bring in substitute teachers for the coaches.

Gonring feels summer

baseball suffered because "There are too many teacher-coaches who want their summers off," He went on, "For years, we fought this ... Gary Perkins (former West Bend East coach) and Tim O'Driscoll (former Arrowhead coach)," but recently there was a "snowball effect" that prompted the decision.

"The bigger schools are not going to be affected by this (ending summer ball)," Gonring went on, but smaller schools will be because some of the student athletes are already participating in others sports.

Gonring also isn't sold on building the new diamond behind the new middle school. "I'd love to have a new baseball field but not at that cost," he said, indicating the district is putting a lot of money into something residents will be paying off for years.

Gonring declined to say whether or not he will coach after this summer, choosing rather to concentrate on this year's team. "It's a very talented group of young men. I'm looking forward to coaching them," he said. "We're going to strive to be the best we can be. We have a chance at being special."

The move also has an effect on another coach at KHS, Casey Scheel, who took over as head golf coach last spring and has been the freshman, now JV 2 coach, at the school. This year Scheel resigned as JV 2 coach but will continue helping with the varsity team.

Scheel said last Monday, "It will be impossible to do both golf and baseball next year as a coach, so I would stick on as the golf coach."

He said the move will also force some athletes to make tough decision. "Many of the baseball players participate in springs sports, such as tennis, track, and golf. The move to spring could end up hurting the numbers in some of those sports, and even baseball could see a

decrease in numbers," Scheel said. "It's one of those things that nobody really knows what the outcome will be, because it is really up to the student athletes and what they want to do."

Currently, Scheel has two athletes who golf and play baseball. Junior Brad Buechel was on the golf team that qualified for state and also was the starting shortstop on the baseball team.

"Brad will have a tough decision," Scheel said, adding he will support any decision the athlete makes. The other golfer/baseball player is a sophomore who has not been on either varsity team.

While Scheel said he understands the WIAA's decision, it isn't one he particularly likes. "I really

believe baseball is a summer sport, to be played in warm weather. With the weather, often times you see teams enter the play-offs with less than 15 games played due to cancellations, he said."

One good thing, according to Scheel, is, "Fortunately for Kewaskum, the School District is ahead of the game by the planning of a new field which will include field turf, which will alleviate some stress on the weather and cancellations."

If Scheel could make one recommendation to the WIAA it would be "to start the spring baseball schedule a few weeks later now that all high school teams will be playing, just to give more time for the weather to cooperate."

Miller Comes Home To Tackle Full 2018 MSA Slate

After spending the bulk of the past eight seasons competing in various non-winged and winged Sprint Car events in the Indiana, Ohio and Pennsylvania region, Plymouth native Adam Miller is set to return to his Wisconsin home turf to contest the complete 28-event 2018 Midwest Sprint Car Association (MSA) schedule.

Miller will team up with his brother, Justin, who is coming off a career-best runner-up showing in the 2017 MSA and Plymouth Dirt Track Racing (PDTR) 360 Sprint Car standings, to form a potent two-car Miller Family Motorsports Team in 2018.

"Our 2018 season will be focused 100 percent with the MSA and a couple 'fun' dates sprinkled in, so I can get my non-wing fix," Miller said. "My brother, Justin, and I are looking to chase point titles with both MSA and PDTR. We have a good program set up and we're super excited to take on the schedule as teammates which has been a dream of ours since watching the

Winged Mods at Plymouth as little tikes."

During the upcoming 2018 season, Miller is primed to enter 21 events at the one-third mile Plymouth Dirt Track at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds in Plymouth, Wis., where he got his start in racing competing with PDTR and MSA in 2006.

"My rookie season was in a 360 Winged Sprint Car back in 2006," Miller said. "I ran at Plymouth and with the MSA. I think I finished 12th in MSA points that year. I had rented a ride from Randy Sippel a half a dozen times before that and crewed for Randy's Open Wheel Driving School program, as well as T.J. Luedke from 2000 to 2005.

"My dad took me to the races at Plymouth when I was young, and I have been full throttle ever since then," he said. "There isn't much I'm more passionate about than racing."

After a couple of seasons competing in the 360

Sprint Car division, Miller advanced to the 410 Winged Sprint Car ranks in 2009 where he found success with the Wisconsin Outlaw Sprints Series.

"I was the 2009 Wisconsin Outlaw Sprints 410 Rookie of the Year and ran fifth in points that year with that group," Miller said.

A job switch in 2010 found Miller move his racing operation to the Indiana area.

"I moved for work to Indiana and spent some time working in Pennsylvania," Miller said. "I raced as a regular at Paragon Speedway and the Midwest Sprint Car Series for part of 2010 and 2011 in a 410 Non-Wing Sprint Car. In 2012, I raced a 410 Sprint Car at Lernerville Speedway in Pennsylvania before competing with the BOSS [Buckeye Outlaw Sprint Series] 410 Non-Wing Sprint Car series in Pennsylvania, Indiana, Ohio and West Virginia in 2013 and 2014. I had

back-to-back top-10 points finishes with BOSS during those years, which was pretty cool.

"It was a lot of hard work, travel and one heck of an education as a driver as I had no idea what I was getting into," he said. "I sure had a lot of fun as I had a chance to run 25 different tracks outside of Wisconsin and had a couple of good runs at Eldora in the process which I'll always cherish. Eldora was the most famous track I ran during those years, but not my favorite as that would be Lawrenceburg Speedway in Indiana."

Miller, who is a health-care construction project manager by trade, jumped at the opportunity to move back to his Plymouth, Wisconsin hometown last fall in time to compete in the final PDTR-MSA event of the season at The Plymouth Dirt Track on Sept. 30, 2017.

"It was a personal decision to move back to Wisconsin," Miller said. "I had always missed the area and it finally became

a desire and my wife, Ange, and I made it happen. It felt great to be back in the saddle, I was rusty and had some equipment that was more or less thrown together, so it was fun for what it was. I'm a competitor though, and I want to win. I didn't feel like I performed the way I'm capable of, so I had some mixed emotions."

Looking forward to his 32-race 2018 season, Miller is driven to finally nail down an A-main victory, while having a bit of fun along the way.

"I've won heat races and B-Mains in every car I've raced, but I'm still chasing that elusive A-Main win," Miller said. "I'm aiming to change that this year. I gave a couple away with BOSS and I'm using those as learning experiences. Winning races is tough and it's not something that can be expected or taken for granted.

"My main goals are to be competitive, run 100 percent of the MSA schedule and win races," he said. "Most importantly I want to have fun. Admittedly, I would love to go 1-2 in the championship standings at Plymouth, with the MSA, or both, with my

brother. We're in a good spot with our program, but we just need to take it one night at a time."

Miller heads into the new season with a dedicated pit crew in his corner.

"My pit crew consists of Ange, Destynee, Dacota, Deighton, Deven, Brian, Jim and Mark," Miller said. "We have good support from our extended family and friends and Justin and I will share crew guys too."



ORDINANCE TO CREATE SECTION 122 OF ARTICLE III OF CHAPTER 42 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE HEALTH AND SANITATION.

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WASHINGTON COUNTY, WISCONSIN, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That Section 122 of Chapter 42 of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum, relating to (ENDS) electronic nicotine delivery system vapor products, be created as follows:

42-122 SALE, PURCHASE, AND POSSESSION OF ELECTRONIC NICOTINE DELIVERY SYSTEM VAPOR PRODUCTS (1) "Vapor Products" shall mean non-combustible products, that may or may not contain nicotine, that employ a mechanical heating element, battery, electronic circuit, or other mechanism, regardless of shape or size, that can be used to produce a vapor in a solution or other form including but not limited to an electronic cigarette, electronic cigar, electronic cigarillo, electronic pipe, vaporizers, or similar products or devices. "Vapor products" shall include any vapor cartridge, solution, or other container, that may or may not contain nicotine, that is intended to be used with an electronic cigarette, electronic cigar, electronic cigarillo, electronic pipe, vaporizer, or similar products or devices. "Vapor products" do not include any products regulated by the United States Food and Drug Administration under Chapter V of the Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act.

(2) SALE OF ELECTRONIC NICOTINE DELIVERY SYSTEM VAPOR PRODUCTS TO MINORS PROHIBITED. No person, by himself, his servant or agent, or as the servant or agent of any other person, shall sell, give away, or otherwise dispose of, by vending machine or otherwise, any electronic nicotine delivery system vapor products to any person under the age of eighteen (18) years.

(3) PURCHASE OR POSSESSION OF ELECTRONIC NICOTINE DELIVERY SYSTEM VAPOR PRODUCTS BY PERSON UNDER 18 PROHIBITED. (1) No person under 18 years of age may falsely represent his or her age for the purpose of receiving any electronic nicotine delivery system vapor product. (2) No person under 18 years of age may purchase, attempt to purchase, or possess any electronic nicotine delivery system vapor product except as follows:

a.) A person under 18 years of age may possess an electronic nicotine delivery system vapor products for the sole purpose of resale in the course of employment during his or her working hours if employed by a retailer. The defenses provided in Wis. Stat. § 134.66(3)(a)-(c) shall also be defenses to any prosecution hereunder.

Section 2. Severability. The several sections of this Ordinance are declared to be severable. If any section or

portion thereof shall be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, unlawful or unenforceable, such decision shall apply only to the specific section or portion thereof directly specified in the decision, and shall not affect the validity of any other provisions, sections or portions thereof of the Ordinance. The remainder of the Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect. Any other Ordinances whose terms are in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed as to those terms that conflict.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage and posting or publication as provided by law.







More Success Expected From KHS Wrestlers In The Future

When the wrestling season rolls around next fall, Kewaskum coach Scott Rhoads will be in an enviable position. How many other high school coaches in Wisconsin will have the luxury of having five returning state qualifiers, and six defending East Central Conference champions?

Not many, that's for sure, but just because his returning regulars have already achieved a great deal of success, doesn't mean Rhoads will take the pedal off the metal for their summer workouts and practice sessions leading up to the actual competition.

You can be assured Rhoads will be pushing for Eric Bauer, Braden Maertz, Alex Deheck, Tanner Goeman and Mason Pomeroy, the defending state qualifiers who combined for 183 victories this year, along with regulars Nathaniel Droese, Isaiah George, Sam Larson, Eddie Padilla, Tucker Schmidt and Nathan Lawrenz to attend camps, enter state and even national competitions during the summer in an effort to move up

another level in the sport.

The Indians reached two major goals during the 2017-18 season, winning the ECC title (although they probably didn't want to share it with Campbellsport) and claiming the D-2 regional hosted by Waupun.

They fell one point short of another goal, becoming the first KHS team to qualify for the WIAA State Team Tournament, and were unable to have an individual reach the finals in the Individual State Tournament.

Bauer, who was second as a freshman and fourth his last two seasons, wants to take one more step on the podium, and the four others probably won't be happy unless they reach the podium, too.

For Bauer, who finished his junior year at 39-5 — he missed several matches because of injuries — there will be another goal, winning as many matches as he can in an effort to surpass Brett Scoles, from the class of 2013, as the winningest wrestler in KHS history. Bauer currently had 126 victories, while Scoles, a senior wrestling for UW-Parkside, had 140 in his four years

at the school.

Others in the top-seven of all-time wins include: Rhoads with 134, Joel Dzedzic, 131; P.J. Krueger, 130; Bo Seibel, 129; and Cody Seibel, 128. With the many tournaments KHS is now participating in, Bauer should surpass Scoles before Christmas, and it's a good bet he could reach the high 160s before all is said and done.

Concerning the team, there is other unfinished business, getting to Team State and try to move into company with Luxemburg-Casco, Freedom and Ellsworth, perennial powers in Wisconsin in Division 2 team events and producers of four champions and three runners-up in the state meet.

"I'm predicting we end up in the scenario (in Team Sectional) with Chilton. They also only had one senior," Rhoads said. "I'm hoping we have enough leadership to make gains on Chilton."

The coach has seen indications that will happen. "Our kids have it in their heads (to get better). They are going to put in the next-level effort this off-season" to be even more competitive.

Improvement Didn't Equal Wins for KHS Boys

Sometimes wins and losses don't tell the whole story of a high school basketball team.

That may have been the case of the Kewaskum High team this past winter. The Indians finished 0-14 in East Central Conference play and 3-20 overall, but improvement was evident. Looking at the second round of conference play, KHS lost two games by one point, one game to Ripon in overtime and several others in the closing minutes.

"We have lost nine games by a total of 27 points," KHS coach Don Gruber said after a disappointing 60-59 defeat at the hands of Winneconne, which made a three-point play with 11 seconds remaining. The number went to 10 losses by 33 points after the Indians battled hard against co-champion Kettle Moraine Lutheran before losing 40-34 in the ECC finale.

This was Gruber's third season as head boys coach, and he hasn't had a lot of luck having all his players on board for the opening games. Two years ago, there were four Indians who sat out from four to six games because of code violations from the fall season. This year, it

was more of the same, with three juniors missing time early and others sitting out at the end of the season.

Still, the Indians won three of their first four games, but after that struggled because of a lack of height and depth in the tough EC, which is in position to have another state qualifier for the third year in a row. (Waupun captured the D-3 state title in 2016 defeating Appleton Xavier 59-58, and Ripon advanced to Madison but lost to the eventual champion, Appleton Xavier 81-74 in the semi-finals last year. Both Waupun and KML have the talent to advance this year, and Plymouth surprised top-seeded Cedarburg in the regional final on March 3, knocking the Bulldogs out of the tournament.)

Gruber saluted his senior starters, Jared Chesak, Brent Goeden, Jordan Carlton, Dan Kreis and Dawson Fox for battling hard despite their odds and for carrying out their assignments.

"(At the end of the year), We played some excellent basketball but did not come up with the big play," Gruber said. "Sometimes we got a call that went against us. Or we didn't get a call ... or we were out of position."

"We were in so many

games that slipped away on us," Gruber went on, indicating it wasn't always players' mistakes. "Sometimes it was decisions I made."

Team positives, according to Gruber, were "Our defense kept us in a lot of games," and, "The guys all built the teamwork. We shared the ball very well."

While Gruber preached teamwork rather than individual statistics, there were individual highlights. Carlton topped the 500-point mark for his career, scoring 569 points in two years, while averaging 13.8 points per game this year. Chesak scored 8.9 per game and hauled down 5.2 rebounds to lead in the latter category, also coming up with 2.6 assists per game.

Goeden averaged 3.0 ppg, hitting 11x26 three-pointers for a .423 average and had just 1.6 turnovers per game, lowest on the team. Kreis scored 3.4 ppg and chipped in with 26 assists.

After missing the first three games, Talon Ralph scored 7.0 points per game and Brad Buechel, averaged 6.5. and was second on the team in assists with 44.

In their exit interviews with Gruber, many of the players pointed to good teamwork. as positives

they experienced.

Returnees next year will include juniors Buechel, Ralph, Ryan Prochnow, Jacob Schlosser, Carson Dogs and Thomas Klemme, along with Hunter Grady and Travis Griesemer, who played

with the JV team. Sophomore Ty Cook played in several games at the end of the season, and Joseph Bocher, at 6-5, is expected to provide much needed height.

Several junior varsity players are also expected

to move into starting roles. "Next year is going to be a challenge, bringing up those sophomores, in that they have to adjust to the speed of varsity basketball and in their skills and basketball IQ," Gruber concluded.

The Kewaskum High School girls basketball team didn't win any games during the 2017-18 season, but the Lady Indians, who finished up at 0-23, did get better, and their improved skills and experience should be evident next winter when they take the court again.

The Indians had several challenges during the year — a lack of height, a lack of experience, with no senior starters, and difficulty in knowing when to take shots that would be considered high-percentage shots.

Coach Russ Thull was well aware of the latter, and it was something he addressed many times with the girls during their practices and games.

"One thing that we are really trying to focus on is making sure that we are shooting good shots. We have struggled this year with shooting shots that are contested. With that

comes a low shooting percentage," Thull said. "We need to do a better job finding open players off of our penetration."

One thing Thull didn't have to worry about was the girls giving up. There certainly is no quit in junior Ashley Trapp, sophomore Maxine Paulowske, freshman Kennedy Adams, nor any of the others who saw action. Right after the final East Central Conference game against powerhouse Plymouth, the three commented about the present and the future of the KHS varsity team.

"Overall we worked together. We worked as a team," Trapp said, promising, "We're going to work harder in the offseason ... I feel like next year we're going to have a real good team."

Trapp was fourth on the team in scoring with 81 points (3.7 points per game) and led the team in rebounding with 102.

Paulowske, the team's

5-foot, 5-inch guard led the team in scoring with 284 points (13.0 ppg. average) including 64 three-point shots, wasn't surprised the team struggled. "I felt losing all those seniors (from last year) was going to be difficult," she said. "It made me do more."

Paulowske, who has scored 473 points while hitting 115 threes in her two years on the varsity, complimented her teammates, saying, "They helped me become better," and she hoped, "I helped them."

Thull felt Paulowske improved her defense tremendously from her freshman to sophomore year, and is confident she will be even better as a junior. Paulowske is confident about her teammates as well. "I feel we'll get a lot better with all our returnees."

Adams admitted she had to make a quick transition from middle school

basketball to the varsity. "It's a lot more difficult (varsity play)," she said. "It's a lot faster paced."

About what made the adjustment possible? "You definitely have to push yourself," she said. "I feel like I'm improving a lot."

Kennedy wound up as the team's second leading scorer, hitting 143 points, and was fourth in rebounding with 68.

Others who played significant minutes this season include Kaitlyn Leitheiser, Megan Winkler, Anna Surprenant, Kenzie Schneider and Abby Meidl. All should help the Lady Indians to move up the ECC ladder next season.

"We're excited for next year," Trapp said on behalf of the returnees. So is coach Russ Thull. "I am looking forward to seeing what this group of girls can do moving forward. I am already looking ahead and can't wait to start working this summer."

KHS Bowlers Miss State Finals By One Place; Marks 29th Overall in Singles

After a good late-season run, the Kewaskum High bowling season came to a close over the past weekend when the three individual qualifiers, Cody Marks, Robbie Walls and Will Walters, and the team were eliminated in the Division 2 qualifying round of the Wisconsin High School Bowling Club's State Tournament.

The team just missed a berth in the finals, finishing sixth, one place away from the two-game shootout round at Dale's Weston Lanes in Weston, Wisconsin. There were 25 teams competing in the state meet in Division 2.

In the team competition,

the Kewaskum boys combined for a 2,715 total, just 14 pins behind the team from Peshtigo. Amherst was first with a sparkling 3,000, 187 pins ahead of Antigo's 2,813, while Wilmot and Monroe were tied for third at 2,776.

Along with Marks, Walls and Walters, other bowlers competing for KHS were: seniors Donald Keaton and Jack Taylor; junior Robert Heinan; and sophomores Colin Niekamp, Derek Baulfanz and Benjamin Schellinger.

The fifth and fourth seeds, Peshtigo and Monroe, faced each other in the first round with Peshtigo winning 324 to 300, and then Peshtigo eliminated Wilmot, 365 to

311. No information was information on the final matches held on March 4.

"They bowled pretty well," Kewaskum head coach Art Marquardt said about his team's effort, but, "If you talk with each one of them, they thought they could have done better."

In the singles competition, which led off the meet on March 2, Marks came the closest to advancing to the 24-man finals. He came in with a 578 total for his three games to finish 29th overall, just 11 pins from advancing. Marks' scores included a 179, 203 and a 196.

"It was a cool experience," Marks said, adding, "When I was a freshman,

Art took me to state to watch the varsity boys, and I knew I wanted to come back to bowl at state. It was a goal of mine to get there for singles and state, and I did it."

"Being so close ... It sucks," Marks said, especially considering the team was 14 pins short of making the finals, too. "The team now knows why Art tells us every pin and spare counts."

Walls was next for Kewaskum with a 557, good for 38th in the field of 94. Walls struggled in the first game with a 179, then rolled a 205 and finished with a 215 for his total.

Walters was way off his usual average, starting with back-to-back games

of 154 and 153 before breaking loose for a 191 and a 498 total, placing him 78th in the field.

Concerning going to state with friends, Marks said, "Robbie Walls and I have been friends since grade school, so it was fun to go up there our senior year and finish out our bowling season. I have made other friends on the team as well because of it being so small that you get to know each other pretty well."

The qualifying leader was Zach Thomas, who was red-hot with games of 228, 237 and 206 for an impressive 671. Thomas, who bowls for Middleton High School, ended up second in the finals behind

Darin Bloomquist of Rhinelander. Bloomquist had a 665 in qualifying and a 674 in the semis for a 1,339 total, three pins ahead of Thomas.

Marquardt had announced this would be his last season coaching bowling, and Marks said, "Art is a great coach. I thank him for making me the bowler I am today."

Marquardt, who coached bowling for a dozen years, complimented the seniors who reached their goal of qualifying for state after three misses. "These guys worked hard all season. They got better as the year went on and were able to get to state."
