Kewaskum Kiwanis Club Grows In Membership

At a time when many civic organizations have dwindling membership numbers, the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club is growing.

In the past year, the Kiwanis Club has six new members, which equates to a 26.1 percent growth rate. That ranks the club fourth out of the 156 Kiwanis Clubs in the Wisconsin - Upper Michigan district. Those statistics don't take into account several more members who have joined in the past several weeks.

"I think everyone in the club is fairly satisfied as members, and they talk to other people, and that just leads to more interest in the club," said Bret Richards, who is president of the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club.

"Kiwanis is very well represented in this com-

munity, with some of the fundraising events we do. And just giving back to the community itself brings interest from like-minded people," Richards added.

The Kewaskum Kiwanis Club is part of Kiwanis International, a global organization that is dedicated to changing the world one child and one community at a time.

Kiwanis International was formed in 1915 in Detroit, Michigan. Today the nonprofit service organization is found in more than 80 nations and geographic areas.

In Kewaskum, many other local organizations are currently struggling to stay active. They cite aging members, as well as busy family and work schedules as obstacles to staying afloat.

Meanwhile, the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club is attracting more and

more members, many of whom are young adults.

"I wanted to get more involved in the community and be able to give back. I think this is a good way to do that by helping kids get more involved in the community and school activities," said Sarah Peterson, a 22-year-old who recently joined the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club.

"I feel like anything that helps kids is what I am game for," 25-year-old Joey Peterson added.

That is the major focus of the Kiwanis Club. In Kewaskum, the club sponsors students of the month and scholarships. It hosts various events such as an annual turkey shoot, and is active in upgrading local parks. It has purchased equipment for the local fire department and sponsors Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts.

Kewaskum Public Library Offers Free Online Courses

Area residents are now able to take online courses at no cost. All they need to have in order to register is a library card.

"These are real courses, taught by professional instructors. People are able to get certificates when they complete the courses. It really is awesome," Kewaskum Public Library Director Emily Goad said.

Six-week online courses are offered in a wide variety of topics. There are hundreds of instructor-led courses available in accounting and finance, business, computer applications, design and composition, healthcare and medical, language and arts, law and legal, personal development, teaching and education, technology, and writing and publishing.

Through this unique program from Cengage Learning, the Gale Courses are offered monthly. Participants can work through the courses at their own pace, and are able to interact regularly with instructors. The courses can be accessed through the local library's website and through the Monarch Catalog.

Kewaskum is one of the

33 area libraries in the Monarch Library System that now offers the Gale courses.

"We are very excited to offer more than 360 online courses to inspire and engage life-long learning in the communities in Dodge, Ozaukee, Sheboygan, and Washington counties," said Amy Birtell, director of Monarch Library System. "With Gale Courses, patrons of our member libraries will be able to enroll in courses covering all types of topics and subjects. Whether someone is considering going back to school to pursue a degree or just interested in digital photography, the course catalog offers something for everyone."

Gale Courses cover everything from health and wellness to creative writing, computer programming, GED test preparation and much more. Gale Courses are developed by expert instructors, many of whom are currently working at universities around the country, and have continuous enrollment dates.

Courses run for six weeks, with two new lessons released weekly (for a total of 12 lessons per course), and new sessions begin every month.

Library patrons can sign up for a session and pick the start date that best fits in their schedules. If someone is not able to complete a course, they may enroll again for a different session.

The courses are entirely web-based with comprehensive lessons, quizzes, and assignments. A dedicated professional instructor coordinates every course by pacing learners, answering questions, giving feedback, and facilitating discussions. Coursework can be completed from library computers or remotely from home computers.

For more information about the catalog of courses offered or to enroll in a course, visit <https://education.gale.com/l-monarchs/>. Here you can browse through the course offerings. Simply click on a class that interests you to find a detailed description of the course, read a mini bio about the instructor, glance through the class syllabus, review requirements that are needed to take the course, and see what past students have to say. All of this can be done before enrolling in the class.

Chief's Corner

Over the last five weeks we have witnessed two school shootings, one in Florida that took the lives of 17 high school students and another in Maryland that killed one student and seriously injured two others. One of the major reasons those two incidents had very different outcomes was the quick response of the School Resource Officer in Maryland. There are obviously other varying factors in these two incidents that can affect the conclusion, but none are larger than having an officer ready, willing and able to respond to the worst possible assignment of his career.

Sadly, there have been enough "mass shootings" to provide analysts with data to study these events. A "mass shooting" is defined, according to the federal government, as "three or more killings in a single incident."

*According to the FBI, out of the 160 active shooter incidents identified between 2000 and 2013, 69 percent of mass shooting incidents ended in five minutes or less, with 36 percent over in less than two minutes. This study identified 39 out of the 160 incidents occurred at educational environments which resulted in 117 individuals killed and another 120 wounded.

Having an officer on scene immediately is vital in stopping the threat from continuing, but that is not always feasible. This study also stated that 13.1 percent of incidents ended because "unarmed citizens made the selfless and deeply personal choices to face the danger of an active shooter... [and they] safely and successfully disrupted the shootings." The FBI further supports the importance of training and exercises - not only for law enforcement but for citizens as well.

The question to be answered here is this -- Are we prepared in Kewaskum?

The Kewaskum Police Department's number one

priority is the safety and security of the most precious and vulnerable members of our community - our children. We have an excellent working relationship with the Kewaskum School District with a full time officer assigned as School Resource Officer. Officer Kohn is assigned to the Kewaskum High School, Middle School and Elementary School. He is in each school on a daily basis to provide police protection, investigate possible violations of the law, support administrative efforts, be a resource for teachers, students and parents, and to create positive interactions with students.

Last summer, the Kewaskum School District took the initiative to increase the safety and preparedness of their school staff and students by providing ALICE training to all employees of the district. ALICE provides more options than just traditional lockdown procedures, such as evacuation, barricading and, if need be, engaging the suspect. Officer Kohn and Lieutenant Steiner are certified instructors and assisted in leading the training to all teachers and staff of the Kewaskum School District. Teachers then trained with their students at the beginning of the school year working on the options taught by ALICE, as well as evacuation drills and rally points. The results are an entire student body, teachers and staff that are more prepared and confident to respond in the event of an active shooter event. Teachers who received this training have personally told me that they feel more prepared than they were with a traditional lockdown only procedure. Our department has also reached out to our two parochial schools in the village to instruct their staff in ALICE and prepare them in the event a tragedy such as this occurs.

Safety and security of students has also been a

priority of the current school board members. I attended the last school board meeting and multiple members on the board, as well as the Superintendent, expressed their appreciation of our cooperative efforts. It is also valuable having a law enforcement professional with the Washington County Sheriff's Office currently serving on the school board as well to provide leadership in the area of school safety and security.

To revisit the question -- Are we prepared in Kewaskum?

We have an officer located in our schools each and every day who is trained in solo active shooter response. We have a staff and student body with appropriate training to respond. We have a supportive school board who cares and a police department with a commitment to school safety.

Yes, we are prepared.

None of this can guarantee complete safety and security in our schools or prevent a horrific tragedy from occurring as there are evil people in our world who wish to perpetrate evil against others. We have taken necessary and appropriate steps to be in the best position possible to balance safety and security and yet, maintain a successful educational environment. As laws and best practices change, we will also adjust to ensure that we are always doing what we can to provide a safe environment for our children to learn and grow.

WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

Garage Fire

On Tuesday, March 27, at 2:15 a.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a garage fire at 5344 County Trunk Q in the Town of Erin. The fire was reported by a passing motorist, who also notified the property owners that were home at the time. No one was injured as a result of the fire.

The structure was a detached garage, near the home, and was found to be fully engulfed upon arrival of deputies. The following fire departments responded: Richfield, Jackson, Slinger and Hartford. The fire was extinguished after their arrival.

The garage appears to be a total loss estimated at \$70,000. The house next to the garage also sustained minor damage.

County Trunk Q was closed for about an hour and a half near the residence. The cause of the fire remains under investigation, but it appears the fire started near a wood stove, in the garage, that had been used the prior evening.

Vehicle Pursuit

On March 24 at 12:28 a.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified by the Wisconsin State Patrol in Fond du Lac that it had received a 911 report of two vehicles driving recklessly at over 100 mph on Interstate 41 in Fond du Lac County. A Washington County Sheriff's deputy was dispatched to watch for the vehicles.

At approximately 12:40 a.m. the deputy observed the two vehicles operating at over 100 mph on Interstate 41 near State Highway 33 in the Town of Addison. The deputy attempted to conduct a traffic stop; however, both vehicles increased their speed and a pursuit was initiated. Two other deputies stopped in the median in an emergency turnaround on Interstate 41, south of the pursuit as it approached.

The vehicles approached the squad cars in the turnaround and immediately drove into the median, at which time

both cars began operating southbound in the northbound lanes of Interstate 41 at high rates of speed. The cars traveled the wrong way on the interstate for 20 seconds prior to coming back through the median. The vehicles then exited onto State Highway 144 in the Village of Slinger prior to tire deflation devices being deployed.

The pursuit continued until both cars approached a deputy that was deploying tire deflation devices at the intersection of State Highway 33 and State Highway 175 in the Town of Addison. Prior to reaching that intersection, the cars drove onto a residential property at a high rate of speed, causing damage to both cars. The driver of one of the cars exited his vehicle after it became disabled and attempted to get into the other vehicle as it was driving around the house, in an effort to elude deputies. That vehicle eventually made its way back onto State Highway 175 and continued northbound.

The driver of the disabled vehicle was taken into custody after a brief foot pursuit. That driver is a 19-year-old Neenah man. He was transported to the hospital, where he was treated for injuries he suffered during the accident at the residence. He was then transported to the Washington County Jail on several felony charges. He is also currently on probation in the State of Wisconsin for armed robbery.

The pursuit of the second vehicle continued into Dodge County before coming back into Washington County. That vehicle eventually stopped after it became disabled in a field on County Highway D near Interstate 41 in the Town of Wayne. The passenger of that car, an 18-year-old Neenah woman, was taken into custody. The driver escaped. A K9

from the Waukesha County Sheriff's Office assisted in the search. Also assisting was the Slinger Police Department as well as the Wisconsin State Patrol.

Both cars involved in the pursuit were later found to have been stolen overnight in Winnebago County. Speeds exceeded 115 mph during the pursuit, which lasted 20 miles. The investigation is ongoing.

Fire

On March 23 at 12:26 p.m., the Sheriff's Office received a report of heavy smoke coming from the area of the dead end of Sleepy Hollow Road in the Town of Barton. The first arriving deputy determined the fire was coming from the area directly behind Blue Leasing, which is located at 7405 Sleepy Hollow Road. The West Bend Fire Department was paged and the call was upgraded to a MABAS call. Fire departments from Jackson, Kewaskum, Newburg, Allenton and Kohlsville responded to assist.

The fire was extinguished by 12:56 p.m. It was determined that an employee of the business was burning trash in a burn barrel on the north east side of the property behind the building. A combustible lid was placed on top of the barrel, which ignited and the flames spread. Some scrap equipment and material was burned along with a semi-tractor sleeper. In addition, approximately two to three acres of grassland, which extended to the west, right up to the shoulder area of the on-ramp to Highway 45 northbound from County Trunk D, was burned.

There were no reported injuries associated with the fire. The damage estimate is between \$7,500 and \$10,000.

50 Years Ago March 29, 1968

Chester Dombrowski, 30, a former Chicago policeman, was being held in the Fond du Lac County Jail this week on charges of murdering another Chicago man whose body was found in a dump area on a farm field one and one half miles north of Kewaskum last September.

Dombrowski, who was now employed at O'Hare International Airport in Chicago, was arrested there Tuesday after a grand jury at Fond du Lac eight hours earlier indicted him in the September 12, 1967 slaying of Herbert L. McKinney, 27, a machinist's helper. McKinney's body, showing marks of a beating and with a bullet hole in the head, was found on a farm owned by Dombrowski and a brother, Bernard, about 100 yards from County Trunk S, a short distance north of the Fond du Lac - Washington County line between Kewaskum and New Fane. On furlough from the Chicago police force at the time of the slaying, Dombrowski was arrested after his rented auto hit a bridge and went into the ditch on Hwy 45 about two miles north of Kewaskum. The body of the slaying victim was found on the farm the fol-

lowing day following investigation of the car accident and information was obtained at that time.

75 Years Ago April 2, 1943

A big scrap harvest has been organized in a countywide drive for April 1 through the 10th. Election Day, April 6, has been designated as scrap harvest day in every town, village and city in Washington County. A scrap dealer or an implement dealer will be at every rural polling place for checking in the salvage and paying for it on the spot at standard prices. People in the village and Town of Kewaskum should bring their scrap to either L. Rosenheimer, A.G. Koch, Inc. or the Rex Garage.

The village of Kewaskum has lost another of its most outstanding citizens and prominent businessmen in the sudden death of Adolph Lehman Rosenheimer, 47, which occurred on March 29 at St. Agnes Hospital in Fond du Lac. Mr. Rosenheimer was taken to the hospital on Monday, March 22 and underwent an appendicitis operation the next day, after which pneumonia set in greatly weakening his condition. Several blood transfusions were

given to him and although the best of medical care was given him, it was more than his system could withstand and he finally succumbed.

A daughter was born to Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Kuehl of St. Kilian on March 24.

100 Years Ago April 6, 1918

The first official casualty report to strike this area announced the death of Private Pearson Brown, who was with the Rainbow division on the firing line in France. The message was received by his father at Campbellsport Monday evening. Pearson Brown enlisted with Co. E of Fond du Lac in June, 1917, and with his company was made a member of the Rainbow division and sent to France last fall. Although the message does not state so, it is thought that he was one of the Sammys recently caught in the fumes of the demon gas, originated and spread by the Hun.

Farmers are surprised to see the sudden rise in the prices of horses. For more than a year horses have been the only cheap animal on the farm and ranches and there was little or no sale of them. Now, however, the government has advanced the prices of artillery and cavalry horses to \$240 and so there is a sudden upward jump of \$25 to \$75 for good draft horses, at Chicago stockyards. Every farmer and breeder of horses ought to breed all suitable mares this season otherwise a good sound draft horse of 1,400 to 1,600 pounds may soon command \$300 or even more.

Voters To Decide On State Treasurer Position

Voters will decide whether the position of state treasurer should be eliminated when they go to the polls on April 3.

The statewide referendum on this election's ballot asks whether the state's constitution should be amended to eliminate the office of the state treasurer and to replace the state treasurer with the lieutenant governor as a member of the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands.

The state treasurer currently oversees state lands and funds that distribute money to public school libraries. The state treasurer currently is a member of the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands.

Wisconsin's current state treasurer, Matt Adamczyk, ran for office four years ago on a platform to eliminate the position.

"As the Wisconsin State Treasurer, I will work to keep an eye on your money by finding wasteful government spending....

I vowed to eliminate this office and I will work with the legislature to pass legislation to eliminate the treasurer's office. I fully support the elimination effort," Adamczyk is quoted as saying on the state treasurer website.

However, the Wisconsin Education Association Council (WEAC) is opposed to the proposal.

The state treasurer helps oversee School Trust Funds, which provides funding for school libraries and technology. According to the WEAC, eliminating the state treasurer's office would put more power over those funds in the governor's office.

The state treasurer is an independently elected fiscal watchdog, according to the website

SaveOurFiscalWatchdog.org. Eliminating the position would essentially eliminate a set of checks and balances, the website claims.

The treasurer is the "financial" commissioner for the Board of Public Lands Commission, SaveOurFiscalWatchdog.org states. The Board of Commissioners of Public Lands manages over \$1 billion in Trust Fund assets, 77,000 acres of School Trust Lands and the State Trust Fund Loan Program, according to the website. The funds are used to improve public schools, libraries, the UW system, and local community infrastructure like sewers and parks.

The state treasurer is one of the original state officers created by the Wisconsin Constitution in 1848, along with the governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general and secretary of state.

The state treasurer's responsibility of overseeing the state's unclaimed property program, was transferred to the Department of Revenue in 2014.

Constitutional amendments must be approved in two consecutive legislative sessions, then approved by voters.

If the treasurer is eliminated, then Lt. Gov. Rebecca Kleefisch would take over that seat on the Board of Public Lands Commission.

The referendum reads:

"Elimination of state treasurer. Shall sections 1 and 3 of article VI and sections 7 and 8 of article X of the constitution be amended, and section 17 of article XIV of the constitution be created, to eliminate the office of state treasurer from the constitution and to replace the state treasurer with the lieutenant governor as a member of the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands?"

Washington County Board Eliminates Administrative Assistant Position

Judy Steinert has retired from her position as administrative assistant to the county administrator.

The County Board recognized Steinert for her 35 years of service with Washington County during the County Board meeting on Tuesday, March 13.

At the March 13 meeting, the board also eliminated the administrative assistant to the county administrator position.

According to County Administrator Joshua Schoemann, following the retirement of Steinert, a number of the duties and responsibilities of the new eliminated position have been shifted around. Much of the workload is being picked up by the County Clerk's Department, according to Schoemann.

In other action on March 13, the Washington County Board approved resolutions that accomplished the following:

- Authorizing the Agricultural and Industrial Society to rename Hartford Savings Circle to Joyce Albrecht Lane at the Washington County Fair Park.

- Accepting the Economic Development Washington County Fiscal

Sustainability Plan with tax levy contributions from the county ending after 2021 and amending the 2017-2021 Capital Improvement Plan to allocate 2017 excess sales tax revenue to the EDWC Revolving (RLF) until 2021.

- Granting the petition of the Town of Farmington for County aided culvert replacement.

- Granting the petition of the Town of Kewaskum for County aided bridge replacement.

- Authorizing the sale of the Thoma Property to Cedar Lake Conservation Foundation, Inc.

The Board also approved resolutions granting jurisdictional transfers of portions of county highways CC, K, N, S and FD, and Pioneer Road, as well as, the potential creation of a new roadway between County Highway W and State Highway 83; as well as a jurisdictional transfer of a portion of County Highway MY to the Village of Newburg.

The County Board approved the following for ordinances:

- Amending the procedures for the transferring of funds.

- Adding one full-time grant-funded conservation technician position.

- Implementing a 3 percent general wage increase within pay grades 11A, 13A, and 14A of the sworn command staff at the Sheriff's Department, as well as, eliminating the compensation increase enacted in 2017 Ordinance 26 for employees in Pay Grades 11A, 13A, and 14A.

- Implementing a revision to the Shoreland, Wetland, and Floodplain Zoning District maps in the Town of Hartford.

At the meeting, Charlotte Martin, communications officer in the Sheriff's Department was recognized for her 26 years of service with Washington County.



What's In A Good Friday?

This being Holy Week, one of the principal days we pay attention to is 'Good Friday.' This is remembered as the day Christ's life was sacrificed on a cross 2,000 years ago. There is much symbolism in the sacrifice of Jesus Christ.

One aspect of note is that Jesus is considered the Lamb slain for the world. What does that mean? Jewish custom annually slaughtered a lamb at Passover in

remembrance of the time when the Hebrews were held as slaves in Egypt. At the termination of their 400 years of slavery, God sent Moses to Pharaoh to ask for the freedom of his people. This is where the plagues come in; the final one being the demise of all the first born of animals and people in the nation — that is unless there was the blood of a lamb on the doorposts of the house. In that case, the spirit of death 'passed over' the house and its inhabitants and they were saved from

the slaughter. This plague finally brought about the release of God's people from their bondage and they left Egypt, crossing the Red Sea.

This year the official celebration of Passover on the Jewish calendar and the official celebration of Good Friday coincide. It doesn't always happen that way, but this year it does. While the Jews are celebrating the Passover with lamb dinners, Christians celebrate the Lamb, Jesus Christ, who willingly gave His life so

that every one who believes He is the Savior can be restored to relationship with Father God through Him.

You see, at the same time Jesus gave up His last breath on the cross, the 'curtain' or 'veil' in the Temple (where God was worshipped in those days) was torn in two pieces. This was not man's doing as the curtain was very high, composed of many layers and also was extremely heavy. In addition, it was torn from the top down. The curtain normally separated the common folk from the presence of God on earth, signified by the Ark of the Covenant. Now the people had access to the God of the Universe; no longer was he inaccessible.

These events signified

that 1) Jesus was indeed the Son of God; 2) He was fulfilling the plan of God that was foreshadowed annually all those years since the original Passover, that the Lamb who was Jesus, has once and for all set us free from bondage; 3) God's plan always was to redeem us from darkness. What is that darkness or bondage for you? It could be drugs, it could be porn, it could be anger, it could be abuse, it could be inferiority, it could be depression, it could be PTSD, or it could be anything that keeps you from the good destiny God has for your life. When there seems to be no way out, there is. That way is through Jesus. I know it sounds sort of simplistic and hokey, but it is solid truth. Jesus is the way

when there seems to be no way; He is the answer when you have none.

Furthermore, there is no expensive or elaborate or time consuming route to get to that freedom He offers to us. It's really simple and easy. All you have to do is ask Him to help you and let Him know you're willing to allow Him to take over the control of your life. By giving it up, you're actually getting an upgrade from everything you've been able to do on your own. Isn't it time for an upgrade; time to get out of darkness and despair; time to get out of the muck and mire that has you held back from achieving all you can?

Give Jesus a chance. He may just surprise you. It may become a Good Friday for you, too.



Local Students Compete In Destination Imagination State Tournament

– Kewaskum Middle School Students Qualify For Global Contest

After competing in the state tournament for Destination Imagination, Kewaskum Middle School students are moving on to the global competition to be held in Knoxville, Tennessee, May 23-26.

But for apprentices struggling to make ends meet, the cost of something as basic as a pair of steel-toed boots can stand in the way of program completion.

Some apprentices juggle work, school and family obligations, and their modest wages are often not enough to cover equipment, clothing and tools for their trades. And even if they qualify for financial aid, it might fall short of their need.

Great Lakes scholarships have supported Wisconsin apprentices with financial need since 2013 when the

Tools of the Trade Apprentice Scholarship program was created. Since the program was launched, 38 Moraine Park apprentices have received scholarships from Great Lakes.

“We are optimistic that the program will be just as beneficial to the 200 technical college students who received scholarships this year as those in previous years,” said Richard D. George, President and Chief Executive Officer of Great Lakes. “We’re proud to help Wisconsin’s hard-working apprentices build brighter futures.”

The 14 Moraine Park students receiving scholarships this year are in the electrical, carpentry and tool and die technology apprentices.

New Alzheimer’s Association Report Reveals Sharp Increases In Alzheimer’s Prevalence, Deaths And Costs Of Care

For the second consecutive year, total payments to care for individuals living with Alzheimer’s or other dementias will surpass a quarter of a trillion dollars (\$277 billion), which includes an increase of nearly \$20 billion from last year, according to data reported in the Alzheimer’s Association 2018 Alzheimer’s Disease Facts and Figures report released today.

New findings from the report show the growing burden of Alzheimer’s on people living with the disease, their families and caregivers, as well as society at large. The number of older Americans is growing rapidly, so too is the number of people living with Alzheimer’s and the subsequent impact to the nation’s economy. By 2050, the total cost of care for Alzheimer’s is projected to increase to more than \$1.1 trillion.

Given the long duration of this disease, the strain on Alzheimer’s caregivers can last several years and produce serious declines in caregiver physical, emotional and financial well-being. In 2017, 16 million Americans provided an estimated 18.4 billion hours of unpaid care in the form of physical, emotional and financial support — a contribution to the nation valued at \$232.1 billion. The difficulties associated with providing this level of care are estimated to have resulted in \$11.4 billion in additional healthcare costs for Alzheimer’s and other dementia caregivers in 2017.

Mortality from Alzheimer’s disease continues to rise. While deaths from other major causes continue to decrease, new data from the report shows that deaths from Alzheimer’s

disease have more than doubled, increasing 123 percent between 2000 and 2015. For context the number of deaths from heart disease — the number one killer in America — decreased 11 percent.

“Alzheimer’s disease remains the sixth leading cause of death in the nation and the state of Wisconsin,” said Dave Grams, executive director, Alzheimer’s Association Southeastern Wisconsin chapter. “It is a public health crisis that we and our partners in the Wisconsin state legislature and the Wisconsin Department of Health Services take very seriously. Key stakeholders from across the state were convened last week for a two-day dementia summit to identify crucial priorities for our state’s next five year plan for Alzheimer’s disease and dementia.”

Spring And Elections Are Here —If You Need An ID To Vote, Start The Process For Free ID To Vote Now

The Wisconsin 2018 spring election is next week and the Wisconsin Department of Transportation Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) wants to be sure people know how to obtain identification, free of charge, that is valid for voting.

Most persons already have valid identification for voting purposes (driver license, identification card, military or student ID card, etc.). There is no separate "voter ID." Anyone unsure if their identification meets the requirements should visit the Wisconsin Elections Commission website to check.

For persons who need identification to show at the polls for voting, DMV offers free Wisconsin IDs and has a process, called Voter ID Petition Process, if the required documents needed for an ID are not readily available. This



process, available free of charge, can be used to quickly obtain a receipt valid to take to the polls for voting while the remaining documents or verifications are obtained. A list of the required documents, such as a birth certificate, are available at wisconsin-dmv.gov.

Anyone with questions related to obtaining an ID to vote should call DMV's Voter ID hotline at (844) 588-1069. However, DMV

does not have information regarding voter eligibility, poll locations, voter registration information or other election information. The Wisconsin Elections Commission has details at elections.wi.gov.

Start now at wisconsin-dmv.gov or at a local DMV Customer Service Center. To find a DMV, check hours, services and wait times, visit wisconsin-dmv.gov/centers.



The Wisconsin Stopover Initiative – Helping Migratory Birds

Join the Department of Natural Resources on Thursday, April 12, for the last program in the Kettle Moraine State Forest - Northern Unit's Evening

with Nature series, "The Wisconsin Stopover Initiative: Helping Migratory Birds." The presentation starts at 7 p.m. at the Ice Age Visitor

Center. The Center is located off Highway 67 half mile west of Dundee. This program is free, but donations are always gratefully accepted.

Every spring and fall, tens of millions of migrating birds sweep through the Great Lakes region and stop at a variety of sites on their way to breeding grounds as far north as Greenland and the Arctic Ocean and wintering grounds as far south as Argentina's Tierra del Fuego. These stopover sites provide birds with critical food and shelter during migration. Loss of these special habitats poses an ongoing threat to the health and stability of migratory bird populations in the Great Lakes region.

Join Kim Grveles, Avian Ecologist with the Department of Natural Resources' Natural Heritage Conservation Bureau, as she explains the needs of migratory birds, especially migratory stopover sites. Learn the significance of the Great Lakes region, particularly Wisconsin's Lake Michigan basin, for migratory birds. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that at an election to be held in the several towns, villages, cities, wards and election districts of the State of Wisconsin, on Tuesday, April 3, 2018, the following question will be submitted to a vote of the people pursuant to

law: 2017 ENROLLED JOINT RESOLUTION 7

To amend section 1 of article VI, section 3 of article VI and sections 7 and 8 of article X; and to create section 17 of article XIV of the constitution; relating to: deleting from the constitution the office of state treasurer (second consideration).

Whereas, the 2015 legislature in regular session considered a proposed amendment to the constitution in 2015 Assembly Joint Resolution 5, which became 2015 Enrolled Joint Resolution 7, and agreed to it by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, which proposed amendment reads as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 1 of article VI of the constitution is amended to read:

[Article VI] Section 1. The qualified electors of this state, at the times and places of choosing the members of the legislature, shall in 1970 and every 4 years thereafter elect a secretary of state, treasurer and an attorney general who shall hold their offices for 4 years 4- year terms.

SECTION 2. Section 3 of article VI of the constitution is amended to read:

[Article VI] Section 3. The powers, duties, and compensation of the treasurer and attorney general shall be prescribed by law.

SECTION 3. Sections 7 and 8 of article X of the constitution are amended to read:

[Article X] Section 7. The lieutenant governor, secretary of state, treasurer and attorney general, shall constitute a board of commissioners for the sale of the school and university lands and for the investment of the funds arising therefrom. Any two of said commissioners shall be a quorum for the transaction of all business pertaining to the duties of their office.

Section 8. Provision shall be made by law for the sale of all school and university lands after they shall have been appraised; and when any portion of such lands shall be sold and the purchase money shall not be paid at the time of the sale, the commissioners shall take security by mortgage upon the lands sold for the sum remaining unpaid, with seven per cent 7 percent interest thereon, payable annually at the office of the treasurer as provided by law.

The commissioners shall be authorized to execute a good and sufficient conveyance to all purchasers of such lands, and to discharge any mortgages taken as security, when the sum due thereon shall have been paid. The commissioners shall have power to withhold from sale any portion of such lands when they shall deem it expedient, and shall invest all moneys arising from the sale of such lands, as well as all other university and school funds, in such manner as the legislature shall provide, and shall give such security for the faithful performance of their duties as may be required by law.

SECTION 4. Section 17 of article XIV of the constitution is created to read:

[Article XIV] Section 17. The state treasurer holding office on the date of ratification of the 2015- 17 amendment providing for the deletion of that office from the constitution shall continue to hold that office until the first Monday of January in 2019. Any vacancy in the office occurring before that date shall be filled in the manner provided by law.

SECTION 5. Numbering of new provisions. If another constitutional amendment ratified by the people creates the number of any provision created in this joint resolution, the chief of the legislative ref-

erence bureau shall determine the sequencing and the numbering of the provisions whose numbers conflict and adjust any cross- references thereto.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the senate, the assembly concurring, That the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution is agreed to by the 2017 legislature; and, be it further

Resolved, That the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be submitted to a vote of the people at the election to be held on the first Tuesday in April 2018; and, be it further

Resolved, That the question concerning ratification of the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be stated on the ballot as follows:

QUESTION 1: "Elimination of state treasurer. Shall sections 1 and 3 of article VI and sections 7 and 8 of article X of the constitution be amended, and section 17 of article XIV of the constitution be created, to eliminate the office of state treasurer from the constitution and to replace the state treasurer with the lieutenant governor as a member of the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands?"

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Article VI of the Wisconsin Constitution provides for the election of a state treasurer every four years. Wis. Const. Art. VI, § 1. The Constitution spells out only one duty for the Treasurer: to serve as one of three members on the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands, which is charged with the sale of school and university lands and with the investment of funds arising from such sales. Wis. Const. Art. X, § 7. The other two members of that Board are the Attorney General and Secretary of State.

The referendum question proposes to eliminate the constitutional office of Treasurer. To fill the Treasurer's position on the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands, the Lieutenant Governor would serve as the third member of that Board.

A "yes" vote on this question would eliminate the constitutional office of the Treasurer. It would replace the Treasurer with the Lieutenant Governor as a member of the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands.

A "no" vote would retain the constitutional office of the Treasurer under Article VI. The Treasurer would also continue to serve as a member of the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands.

Notice is hereby given of a spring election to be held in Washington County on April 3, 2018 at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, for a referendum, if any, in the sample ballot below.

INFORMATION TO VOTERS

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the voter presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using an electronic ballot marking device ("Automark") to mark an optical scan ballot, the voter shall touch the screen at the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen at "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen at "no" if opposed to the question.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth or machine. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in casting his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

If the voter spoils an optical scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initiated by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve so the marks do not show. After casting his or her vote, the voter shall leave the booth, insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. If a central count system is used, the voter shall insert the ballot in the ballot box and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

15 Spring Yardwork Dos and Don'ts from Milwaukee NARI

Spring is coming to Wisconsin, and for homeowners that means yardwork. Homeowners can avoid landscaping mistakes with help from members of Milwaukee NARI, which has been promoting professionalism in the home remodeling industry and fostering consumer confidence for more than 55 years.

"Spring maintenance creates the beautiful yard you want with less summer care," said Heidi Sommer of Wandsnider Landscape in Menomonee Falls. Milwaukee NARI members provided 15 dos and don'ts to help homeowners get their spring yardwork done right.

Do cut down spent perennials and remove leaf debris. "This will also remove potential diseases that may have overwintered," said Sommer.

Do edge planting beds with a power edger or a spade shovel. "This will give the planting bed a nice, clean, unified look, keeping grass from growing into the bed and mulch from falling out into the grass," Sommer said.

Don't plant too early. According to Jeremy Santori of Bluemel's Garden and Landscape Center in Greenfield, "Planting too early in spring may lead to plant damage. Be mindful of the overnight temperatures so that you select the proper plants."

Don't rush to judgment on the survival of your hardy plants. They may be okay, even if they look like they aren't recovering from winter. "Soil temperatures are key," said Santori. "Your plants may need more time to leaf out, especially if we have a

later or delayed spring." Do use pre-emergent herbicide and fertilizer before seeds germinate. Santori said, "Once soil temperatures begin to rise, weeds will begin to germinate."

Do mulch planting beds with a shredded hardwood mulch. "The mulch will suppress weeds, insulate the soil, help retain moisture, reduce soil erosion, help feed plants, and aesthetically improve your landscape," Sommer said. She recommends using an all-natural product with natural forest nutrients to help plants grow.

Don't prune Forsythia, Lilac, and Viburnum shrubs. Sommer said pruning them in early spring could result in removing the flower buds.

Do prune other shrubs and most trees. Sommer said it's easier to do before they leaf out in the spring. "It's easier to see branching patterns and broken and diseased parts of the plant that should be removed."

Don't mulch too thick. "Two to three inches is a good thickness for planting beds," Sommer said.

Don't use colored mulch for perennials or ground-covers. Sommer explained, "Many colored mulches are made from construction debris. This kind of mulch can rob important nutrients from the soil that are critical for plant growth."

Do mulch in early spring, before the perennials pop out of the ground. Although waiting would decrease the amount of mulch used, Sommer recommends mulching early to save time, so that homeowners don't have to mulch around the plants.

Do use high quality soil. "Awesome plants loaded with color need awesome soil," Sommer said. "You can improve the soil over time with regular applications of a natural mulch or leaf compost, fertilization, and aeration."

Do use the right fertilizer for different plants. "Rhododendrons and Azaleas are acid-loving plants that need a boost if growing in less fertile soils. A complete fertilizer designed for acid-loving plants may be applied in early spring," Sommer said.

Don't rush to judgment on your yard's drainage if water pools. "In early spring, the ground is still frozen," Santori explained. "This leads many to believe their yard has a drainage problem due to pooling water caused by frozen ground. Allow the ground to thaw and see if the problem persists."

Don't start a hardscaping project before the thaw. "Allow the frost to fully come out of the ground before beginning your project. Retaining walls and patio projects that begin before frost has been removed have a significantly higher risk for settling or failure," Santori said.

"If you decide to have work done, it is important and to your benefit to start with a professional landscape plan," Santori said, urging homeowners to start planning this process now. "The sooner a plan has been established, the quicker you can get work scheduled and into a construction calendar. Starting the planning process early will allow for more quality time in your newly landscaped yard."




