## 9/11 Memorial Concept Plan Approved For Village

The Kewaskum Village Board unanimously approved a conceptual drawing for the 9/11 Memorial that is being planned to be built in front of the Annex building on the corner of Fond du Lac Avenue and First Street.

Members of the Kewaskum Remembers 9/11 Memorial committee appeared before the Village Board Monday night to seek design approval for the 9/11 Memorial site plan.

"This is an excellent concept. Thank you for all your work on this," President Kevin Scheunemann told the committee members.

The 9/11 Memorial committee plans to launch its fundraising campaign at the end of May, according to Dustin Melzark, committee member and architect for the memorial.

"We are currently working with Epic Creative out

of West Bend to develop a marketing and fundraising plan. We have also partnered with Groth Design Group out of Cedarburg to update our 3D animation and David Jenkins of TBP Productions to develop a marketing video explaining the meaning behind this park and why it has ultimately ended up in Kewaskum," Melzark said.

In addition to remembering those who lost their lives on September 11, 2001, the memorial will pay tribute to first responders and to members of the military.

Members of the Marine Corp League and the Kewaskum American Legion had approached the 9/11 Memorial committee about including the military in the memorial, and the committee readily agreed.

"The recognition of the armed forces is synonymous, actually, with 9/11," said Gordon Haberman, whose daughter, Andrea

Haberman, was killed in the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001.

To honor Andrea Haberman, who graduated from Kewaskum High School, and the others lost in the 9/11 attacks, plans for a memorial in Kewaskum began about six years ago. The memorial will be centered around a steel beam recovered from the North Tower.

The goal is to create not only a memorial, but also an educational center about 9/11.

Last year, the Kewaskum Remembers 9/11 obtained its 501 (c)(3) status. The organization has received support both locally and nationally.

The plan that was approved Monday night has been broken down into four stages to use as fundraising goals. The stages include:

#### Stage One

Stage One includes the

section of steel beam recovered from Ground Zero.

The steel beam sits on a pentagon-shaped piece of cut stone. Each point of the pentagon is oriented toward one of five learning stations included in this stage.

One point honors the first responders of 9/11. The second is a sculpture paying tribute to the Twin Towers. The third is the amphitheater and a teaching podium. The fourth is a sculpture of the Flight 93 flight map. Finally, the fifth is a tribute to the various trade groups who worked to deconstruct Ground Zero.

All of this is encompassed by a circular, blue-stone patio ringed by red granite, which is Wisconsin's state stone. Surrounding the granite is a ring of pear trees, which is anchored by Calatrava white roses.

But when Gajewski went up to pay the bill after they finished eating on March 13, she found out that this trip was extra special.

The waitress told

Gajewski that the meal had already been paid for. Gajewski couldn't believe her ears.

A gentleman who had been sitting across from the Kettle Moraine Gardens group had paid for all seven meals.

"That had to be well over \$100!" Gajewski said in disbelief.

The kind stranger had instructed the waitress to not tell the group that he had paid until after he was gone. The only clue that the group had was that the waitress said the man had an accent that sounded like he might have been from Australia.

## WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

### House Fire

On Saturday, March 31, at approximately 8:52 p.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a house fire at 4049 Lake Drive in the Town of West Bend. The fire was reported by the homeowner as a chimney fire which may have moved into the walls of the residence. The Slinger Fire Department was paged and the call was upgraded to the MABAS Box Level. Fire departments from St. Lawrence, Allenton,

Hartford, Jackson, Kewaskum and West Bend responded to the scene to assist.

Upon arrival of the first sheriff's deputy, heavy smoke was seen coming from the roofline and flames were reported around the chimney area. The fire was quickly brought under control and extinguished just after 10 p.m. Lake Drive was closed to traffic for approximately three hours to assist in firefighting efforts.

There were no reported injuries as a result of the fire. The home suffered significant damage as a result of the fire, smoke and water. The damage estimate is in excess of \$200,000. The cause of the fire remains under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff's Office and Slinger Fire Department. However, early indications point to a fireplace which was being used at the time.

They were all equally affected and said a prayer of blessing for the wonderful man and his gift.

Then the chaperones left a generous tip for the waitress. They wanted to do their share of "paying it forward."

Bublitz, one of the restaurant owners, was working that day.

"I don't know who they were. There

were two gentlemen and a woman. They seemed to be business people from out of state, maybe out of the country because one of the gentlemen had an accent of some sort," Bublitz recalled.

Bublitz was not completely surprised by the generosity.

"It happens from time to time. It's not an everyday occurrence, but I would say about once every other month somebody picks up a tab for someone or a couple. But nothing of this size. It was very generous of him," Bublitz said.

It brightened the day for everyone in the restaurant that day.

"It is always nice to see kindness out there in the world," Bublitz said.

Meanwhile, Gajewski and the others from Kettle Moraine Gardens remember that kindness.

"There are good people in this crazy world and we were fortunate enough to have been the beneficiaries of one of them," Gajewski said.

The Kettle Moraine Gardens group will probably never be able to tell the mystery man "thank you" in person, but they hope to inspire others to do good by paying the kindness forward to others.

## Survey Says...Food Prices Remain Stable In Wisconsin

Shoppers are seeing stable food prices at the grocery store according to the latest Wisconsin Farm Bureau Marketbasket Survey of 16 basic food items used to prepare one or more meals. It showed that the average cost of these items was \$50.14. The average cost is \$0.48 (or nearly one percent) higher than the same survey conducted last fall and \$1.16 (or 2.4 percent) higher than a year ago.

The survey items that saw the greatest price increases since last year were: one dozen, large, Grade A eggs; boneless chicken breast, ground chuck and Cheerios.

"The item that saw that largest price increase was

eggs," said Wisconsin Farm Bureau's Director of Communications. "We are most likely seeing this increase due to an outbreak of avian influenza in South Korea, which has contributed to more American eggs being exported. As demand increases the price does as well."

Overall, prices were stable compared to a year ago, with six of the survey's 16 items being lower in price.

An over-supply of milk continues to have a dampening effect on the price Wisconsin dairy farmers receive for their milk. The reduced price continues to be passed on to shoppers. The price of a gallon of

whole milk dropped 8.9 percent (from \$3.25 to \$2.96) from last year.

White bread and sliced

deli ham also saw price decreases of 11 percent and 3.3 percent, respectively, from last year.

## Tornado And Severe Weather Awareness Week

Gov. Scott Walker has proclaimed April 9-13 as Tornado and Severe Weather Awareness Week in Wisconsin. This awareness campaign is launched every year in April to remind people of the dangers associated with tornadoes, thunderstorms, flooding and hail and to encourage citizens to educate themselves regarding protective safety measures.

The Washington County Office of Emergency Management, along with Wisconsin Emergency Management (WEM), ReadyWisconsin, the Wisconsin Broadcasters Association (WBA) and the National Weather Service (NWS), are once again promoting Wisconsin's Tornado and Severe Weather Awareness Week. WEM has sent out a press packet to all state media containing background information. Additional information can be found on the WEM website: <http://emergencymanagement.wi.gov> or the ReadyWisconsin website: <http://ReadyWisconsin.wi.gov>

On Thursday April 12,

Washington County will participate in the statewide tornado drill. The drill will begin with a "test" tornado watch issued at 1 p.m. and a "test" tornado warning to be issued at approximately 1:45 p.m. This portion of the drill will conclude at 2 p.m. Then, there will be a second "test" tornado warning issued at 6:45 p.m. This will allow families to practice their home emergency procedures as well as the second shift of area businesses/agencies. NOTE: there will be no "test" tornado watch issued prior to the evening test - just the warning at 6:45p.m. This portion of the drill will conclude at 7:00 p.m.

These drills will test the notification procedures that take place during a severe weather event. Various types of watches/warnings are issued by the NWS and disseminated to local dispatch centers. From there the dispatch centers pass along the information to local public safety agencies and key personnel. These are the same watches/warnings available to the public through the media or over

the NOAA weather radio network.

Weather warning sirens in Washington County are owned and operated locally by the various cities, villages and townships. Due to this fact, the sirens in your area may or may not sound on April 12 depending on participation by the local jurisdiction in the drill, or the fact that a particular system may choose not to deviate from its normal testing schedule.

If actual severe weather occurs anywhere in the state on April 12, the drill will be postponed until Friday, April 13.

All residents of Washington County are encouraged to become familiar with the designated shelter areas and weather procedures needed to be safe if you are at home, school, work, shopping or on the road. The best way to stay informed about severe weather conditions is to purchase a weather radio.

Additional information can be obtained from your local or state Emergency Management Agency, the National Weather Service or your local chapter of the American Red Cross.

## April Is National Safe Digging Month

April marks the 10th annual National Safe Digging Month, which reminds Wisconsin residents to contact Diggers Hotline before any digging project to have underground utility lines marked.

Diggers Hotline is a free service that helps protect Wisconsin residents from injury and repair costs that may occur when striking a buried utility line.

Anyone in Wisconsin digging with a shovel, posthole digger or anything else that disturbs the soil is required to contact

Diggers Hotline, either by phone by dialing 811 or at [www.DiggersHotline.com](http://www.DiggersHotline.com) three working days before the project begins. Diggers Hotline then notifies the appropriate utility companies, which send out professional locators to mark the locations of underground lines with flags or paint at the dig site.

Installing a mailbox, building a deck, planting a tree and laying a patio are all examples of digging projects that need Diggers Hotline before starting.

It doesn't matter how deep the digging project will go. The depth of utility lines can vary for a number of reasons, such as erosion, previous digging

projects and uneven surfaces. Utility lines need to be marked because even when digging only a few inches, the risk of striking an underground utility line still exists.

Every nine minutes an underground utility line is damaged in the United States because someone decided to dig without contacting 811.



Martin J. Schreiber, former governor of Wisconsin, met his wife, Elaine, in 1953 when they were in high school.

Elaine quickly became the love of Schreiber's life. They married and had four children. Schreiber remembers her as intelligent, kind, gracious, loving, understanding, self-sacrificing and forgiving. "If it weren't for her, there wouldn't be me," Schreiber wrote.

Starting somewhere 2005, Schreiber began to lose the Elaine he knew.


She had Alzheimer's disease.

The "Bookies" Book Club in Kewaskum will discuss the book "My Two Elaines," written by Martin J. Schreiber, when they meet at the Kewaskum Public Library on Tuesday, April 17, at 9:30 a.m.

Everyone is welcome to join the discussion. Simply read the book and show up.

This month's book was a special request from Kim Bocher, who is a school nurse for the Kewaskum School District.

"His main purpose of the book is to share with people how hard the journey is to take care of someone with Alzheimer's and how he wishes he would have asked for and accepted help much earlier than what he did. Because it



nearly destroyed him trying to take care of her by himself," Bocher said.

The book illustrates how difficult Alzheimer's was on Schreiber's career, his circle of friends and his family.

It is something many people can relate to. An estimated 5.7 million Americans have Alzheimer's, according to the Alzheimer's Association.

"My Two Elaines" is known for touching the heart of caregivers.

And it is an easy read. The book has a total of 126 pages, all filled with large print.

"You can read it in a weekend. It's not complicated at all," Bocher said.

Still, the words can be hard to read at times.

"You will cry," Bocher said. "It is not covered up. He talks about it."

In one section, Schreiber writes about how angry he was with his children when they wouldn't call to talk to their mother because she didn't know who they were, and he felt estranged.

He then went to counseling, which helped him understand why it was so hard for the children to call and talk to their mother. And then he forgave them.

Bocher admits that when she first started the book she thought Schreiber was whining about how hard this was on him.

"How can you make this about you?" Schreiber thought to herself.

But by the end of the book, she realized it was about Schreiber.

"It was about how it affected him, his career and his life. The purpose of the book is to help the caregiver, or the family, or the coworker," Bocher said.

Today, Elaine Schreiber lives in an Alzheimer's facility. Martin Schreiber is still working.

"It's a great book. It's really, really good," Bocher said.


### About the Museum of Wisconsin Art



# Museum Of Wisconsin Art Presents Daniel Gerhartz: The Continuum Of Beauty

The Museum of Wisconsin Art (MOWA) is pleased to announce the mid-career retrospective of Kewaskum artist Daniel Gerhartz. The exhibition, Daniel Gerhartz: The Continuum of Beauty, features more than 30 paintings in the Hyde Gallery. Opening with a party on Saturday, April 14, The Continuum of Beauty presents the work of Gerhartz who embraces a form of Realism.

"I want my paintings to represent a world that people strive for, even if it doesn't actually exist," said Gerhartz. "I paint a world of gratitude, greater acceptance, and giving rather than discord. I hope that my paintings provide some light to contrast the darkness in people's lives."

"Gerhartz highlights beauty in many ways and is deliberate in creating beauty amidst a world that often seems harsh or ugly," said Graeme Reid, MOWA director of exhibitions and collections. "He is preserving a traditional nineteenth century style of painting done from life in the studio or en plein air. His talent is truly something special and recognized as such through his international gallery representation."

Nestled deep in the woods near Kewaskum, in Wisconsin's lush Kettle

Moraine, sits Gerhartz's studio. Inside, it feels as though you have stepped back in time to the grand manner painting of the Gilded Age. Canvases finished and unfinished line the walls. Paints, brushes, and a palette flank an enormous wooden easel; overstuffed chairs, props, and luxurious fabrics await the next model. Gerhartz, born in Kewaskum in 1965, practices a form of Realism that traces its origins to the great figurative and portrait painters of the late nineteenth century.

Classically trained at the American Academy of Art in Chicago, Gerhartz possesses effortless technical facility for painting and a deep, abiding kinship to the traditional artists he first discovered three decades ago in the galleries of the Art Institute of Chicago: John Singer Sargent (1856-1925), Joaquin Sorolla (1863-1923), and Anders Zorn (1860-1920). These artists provided inspiration for Gerhartz in their understanding of the human form, use of brilliant color, vigorous brushwork, and light as both illumination and emotional element. Above all, each excelled at conveying concepts of classical female beauty.


This exhibition of more than 30 paintings is the artist's first major retrospective; it includes many

new, never before seen works. His subjects hover between traditional figurative painting and portraiture; only about five percent of his production is true commissioned portraiture. Gerhartz often depicts an interrupted moment, as if the sitter has just realized the artist's presence. In the majority of his paintings, he relies on his wife, children, or a friendly farmer as models. These paintings are not portraits per se but rather vignettes, archetypes of maternal love, childhood simplicity, or grandfatherly affection; they often evoke an earlier and more humble way of life.

For Gerhartz, despite the currency of Conceptual or Postmodern styles, beauty is still a worthwhile aspiration. He finds inspiration and meaning in time-tested ideas about painting, simplicity, and family.

# Daniel's Landscaping Wins Award On Area Residence

Daniel's Landscaping won an award from the Wisconsin Landscape Contractors Association's Excellence in Landscaping Awards on a landscaping project they did at the Luetschwager residence in the West Bend area. On Friday, March 2, at the Wisconsin Club in Milwaukee, the Campbellsport company received an award for the work.

Owner Dan Stukenberg explained his landscaping on this project:

"In 1999 we began working with a newly retired client and their recently purchased classic mid-century modern ranch. They are avid gardeners and wanted a master plan that could continue to grow with them through the years. Budget was a factor in what areas were to be completed and when. As importantly, this design was about balancing their needs and wants.

"The first project was a wheelchair ramp for their daughter who has MS. This was completed using brick colors harmonious to the stone work on the house, and included a small sitting area outside the entrance. All over-

grown plantings were removed from the front and replaced with new ones. Spoils were used from the ramp/sitting area to improve drainage around the house.

"The following spring the client's favorite varieties of trees were installed on the south and west borders of the property. These included red bud trees, hemlock, serviceberry, pagoda dogwood and hawthorn. Planting beds were concurrently established in the same area.

"The third phase included collaborating with the client on development of formal flower gardens in the backyard and adjacent amenities. Years later, as the plantscapes reached maturity, client desired easier maintenance. At that time we put in antique brick borders for planting beds, weed barrier and Mississippi Stone mulch. Accent boulders were installed as focal points throughout the beds. The stone and brick provided a strong visual impact by complimenting the stone on the house.

"When walking to the backyard gate from the driveway, a simple brick bordered bed was

installed for ease of mowing. Once inside the gate there is a raised vegetable garden, which we constructed to make planting, weeding and harvesting less of a chore. As you continue through the back yard, you come upon another phase of the landscape; a garden shed nestled between the pagoda dogwood and red bud trees planted years earlier. A beautiful park-like setting. A lovely grass lane leads you back full circle to the front of the property.

"The client is impressed with the durability of the landscape, and is pleased with how the design has grown to accommodate their changing needs and desires. They have stated that numerous times passersby have stopped to admire and express how appealing their property is. They couldn't be happier with the results of every completed phase and future projects have already been discussed."

Daniel's Landscaping is based in Campbellsport and has won many awards over the years for owner Dan Stukenberg's landscape designs.

## Indoor Meet Produces Two Places By KHS Girls

The Oshkosh High School Indoor Invitational, held on March 27, gave Kewaskum High track coach Kris Evans a pretty good indication he will get good points in every meet in the pole vault, the hurdles and the distance events.

KHS scored eight points in the 31-team event for small schools in the UW-Oshkosh Kolf Field House, good enough for a tie for 20th place with Two Rivers and Princeton/Green Lake.

"We didn't have a full team. We didn't have the bodies," Evans said, indicating some girls were on family vacations and others in Florida with the school's music groups. Still, getting eight points was "not a bad day."

Junior Abby Meidl had the best finish, a third in the pole vault, after she cleared nine feet, six inches (9-6) in the event. "It matches her all-time high," Evans said, noting clearing that height is an encouraging sign for the outdoor meets.

Sophomore Madelyn

Thull also opened the season with a good showing, taking eighth place in the 60-meter hurdles. Her time in the finals was a 10 and .91 hundredths (10.91) after hitting the finish line in 10.90 in the preliminaries.

Evans said Thull wanted to be a sprinter but was steered into hurdling and did "amazing things" in her first year and will improve as she continues working on her form and flexibility.

Just missing a place was home schooler Maela Olla, who was a standout on the cross country team last fall. She was clocked in 12:53.36 in the 3,200 meter run.

"Our goal is to get her in the low 12-minute range," Evans said, pointing out the 3,200 is tough indoors because the air is dry and the corners are tight.

Another good effort came from freshman Hannah Debelak, who was 16th overall in the 60-meter dash which started with 59 entrants. Her time was an 8.74.

Both Kewaskum teams will be competing in the annual Oostburg Invitational Friday, April 6.

## KHS Soccer Team Is Looking For New Scoring Threats

With his two leading scorers off to play college soccer, Luke Piwoni, starting his eighth year as head coach of the Kewaskum High girls soccer team, has been using the past couple of weeks to develop the team's offense for the 2018 season, which opens this afternoon (April 5).

"Goal scoring is an area that we hope to improve. We have a lot of experience to replace from last season so there will be a lot of opportunities for everyone to step up and fill our scoring needs," Piwoni said recently. "We will be young and just need to get experience and continue to improve and develop as the season progresses."

Gone are Molly

Schulteis (to Carroll University) and Lizzy Bauer (Wisconsin Lutheran) who were one and two in scoring a year ago. Schulteis scored 10 goals and added four assists her senior season while Bauer was next with five goals and six assists, helping the Indians to a 4-9 record and a sixth-place finish in the rugged East Central College.

Among his nine returning letter winners, Piwoni has two forwards, sophomore Arianna Krueger and senior Paige Airaudi and a pair of midfielders, junior Claire Schleider and senior Morgan Denlinger, who will be expected to carry the load, along with several freshmen, who have made the varsity squad.

"We will have six freshmen on varsity to begin the season, and I believe

all will help us," Piwoni said, including four he expects to make their mark early. They are Gwynn Manteufel (defender), Kennedy Adams (midfielder), Andrea Butz (midfielder) and Nicole Butz (keeper and multiple positions), two-thirds of the Butz triplets. (The other one, Nicole, is out for track where she will be a top distance runner.)

"They all have separated themselves from others and made their mark with their aggressiveness, speed, and physicality," Piwoni said. "They will be relied on to help the team immediately."

As far as team strengths, Piwoni said, "We have a lot of returning defenders from last season so I am hoping that can become a strength of the team this season. They are still young and mostly sophomores but they all have a full season of varsity experience under their belts, and I believe they will continue to progress and improve."

Back to lead the defense are: seniors Brandi Geldnich, Emma Penfield and Taylor Cook, along with sophomores Taylor Fischer and Kaylee Ducharme. Cook played on the JV softball team for two seasons, then switched over to soccer where she became the starting goalie and gave up an average of 3.12 goals per game.

In the league's first year of playing each team just once and then the top four teams playing one tournament and the bottom four playing another to determine the final placements,

Winneconne and Plymouth were the co-champions with 13-1 records and 26 points. Piwoni includes both teams in his pre-season picks to challenge for the 2018 titles.

"Winneconne is the favorite in my mind after finishing as the state runner-up to Catholic Memorial last season, and they are returning almost their entire roster," Piwoni said. Winneconne had the top five scorers in the league last spring, including sophomores Emily Heyroth and Kaitlyn Frierdich, who scored 85 and 76 points, respectively. (Goals are worth two points and assists one to determine point totals.)

"Plymouth will be right there at the top as well, they are always in the mix for the conference title," the coach said, indicating Kettle Moraine Lutheran is another possible contender.

And what do the Indians need to do to finish in the top four of the EC? "We have to play with maturity and grow up quickly. We will be young but the younger players have a lot of soccer experience. If we set the tone and pace of the game we will be able to compete with the top of the conference," Piwoni said.

Piwoni will be assisted on the varsity level by Keith Traska and Amy Piwoni. Megan Scapin will be in charge of the JV team.

The Indians open with a non-conference game at Kiel. Their first conference game is at Waupun on April 10.

## UW-WC Students To Present Research In Madison

UW - Washington County students, Amelia Hansen and Benjamin Spicer along with faculty mentor, Dr. Mohamed Ayoub will present a poster "Testing Experimental and Theoretical Descriptors of Selected Hydrogen bonded Complexes: Natural Bond Orbital Study" at the 15th Annual UW System Research in the Rotunda, State Capitol in Madison on Wednesday, April 11, 2018.

For their project, the students investigated a wide range of hydrogen-bonded complexes using density functional theory level of theory with aug-cc-pvtz basis set and natural bond orbital. For each complex (B...HA), they obtained a variety of experimentally measurable descriptors: IR frequency shift of the hydride bond, H-bond penetration distance, covalent bond length shift and NMR proton shielding shift. They also evaluated theoretical descriptors related to inter-molecular B...HA ↔ BH+...A- reso-

nance covalency: charge transfer, and H-bond order and covalent bond order. Correlation coefficients were evaluated to relate each descriptor to the principle property hydrogen bond energy as well as to one another.

Hansen and Spicer were enrolled in the Independent Study in Chemistry (CHE 299) class for the 2017/18 academic year and have been working on this undergraduate research project under Dr. Ayoub's supervision.

Since 2006, UW-WC chemistry students (under Dr. Ayoub's supervision) have been presenting their undergraduate research at a variety of state-wide symposia and conferences, including UWS Posters in the Rotunda, the UWS Symposium for Undergraduate Research and Creative Activity, American Chemical Society-Milwaukee and the Wisconsin Science and Technology Symposium.

## UW-WC Expands High School Engineering Experience

UW-Washington County has announced the expansion of its High School Engineering & Leadership Experience, scheduled for June 18-22. The college preparation course now includes a new leadership component as well as additional engineering firm visits.

Administered through the Continuing Education Department, the program is designed for high school juniors and seniors interested in pursuing a career in engineering. Holly Wehrhahn, Continuing Education Director, stated, "I'm so thankful for the rallying support of the Sheboygan engineering companies this year! Because of the growing response, our students will come away with multiple experiences about what it's like to be an engineer at these companies who they've already networked with as they begin college."

### Stage Two

Stage Two is a secondary, crushed granite path around the first stage. At the eastern side of the path is a curved, Corten steel wall that bears the names of all the victims who lost their lives on 9/11. The wall is 3/8-inch thick, 4 feet tall and approximately 100 feet long.

This curved piece of steel will be visually reinforced by another row of pear trees.


### Stage Three

Stage Three includes removing and repaving the parking area immediately south of the planned

memorial park. It also includes constructing new walkways and sidewalks from the parking area to the memorial park. Lighting and additional signage is also included in this stage.

### Stage Four

Stage Four involves creating a landscaped area for the display of flags. The plan is to have flags representing the United States of America, the United States Army, Navy, Marines, Air Force and Coast Guard.
