Kewaskum Statesman Brings Home Three State Awards

Anne Trautner of the Kewaskum Statesman was recognized for excellence in photography and reporting at the Wisconsin Newspaper Association Foundation's annual convention held at the Sheraton Madison Hotel on Friday, April 13.

Trautner received three awards in the 2017 Better Newspaper Contest: First Place for General News Photo; First Place for Portrait or Artistic Photo; and Honorable Mention for Reporting on Local Education.

All three awards were in the division for weekly newspapers in Wisconsin with circulation between 2,001 and 3,500.

The 2017 Better Newspaper Contest included 2,819 entries from 119 newspapers. Eligible entries were published between

September 1, 2016, and August 31, 2017. Entries were judged by members of the Iowa Newspaper Association.

The Wisconsin Newspaper Association (WNA) was established in 1853 and is among the longest serving press associations in the world. Created by and for Wisconsin's newspapers, WNA exists to strengthen the newspaper industry, enhance public understanding of the role of newspapers, and protect basic freedoms of press, speech and the free flow of information.

In addition to serving member newspapers, WNA serves advertisers through advertising placement programs and additional clients through media monitoring services.

Farmington Elementary School Named High-Achieving and High-Progress School

Farmington Elementary School is a 2017-18 Wisconsin Title 1 School of Recognition. The school was one of 11 schools in the state to be named both a High-Achieving School and a High-Progress School for 2017-18.

In total, 135 schools from across the state are being recognized for their success in educating students. All of the schools receive federal Title I funding to provide services to high numbers or high percentages of economically disadvantaged families.

"The state's Title I Schools of Recognition

awards recognize the efforts of students, their families, teachers, school administrators, and school staff members to break the link between poverty and low academic achievement," State Superintendent Tony Evers said. "Their success is something to celebrate."

Schools receive federal Title I aid when they have significant numbers of students from low-income families. The schools that earn recognition also must meet the state's test-participation, attendance, and dropout goals as well as additional award criteria.

Schools that have been designated as High-

Achieving Schools have achievement gaps that are less than three points between student groups or show evidence of reducing gaps, and demonstrate high achievement at the school level.

High-Progress Schools fall within the top 10 percent of schools experiencing growth in reading and mathematics for elementary and middle school students or the top 10 percent of schools with the greatest improvement in high school graduation rates. In addition, High-Progress Schools have achievement gaps that are less than three points between student groups

or show evidence of reducing gaps.

The Wisconsin Title 1 Schools of Recognition will be honored during a May 21 ceremony at the State Capitol.

This year's Title I School of Recognition Award recipients include 111 elementary schools serving students in kindergarten through eighth grade, 18 middle or junior high schools, and six high schools.

Farmington Elementary School was named a Title I School of Recognition - High Achieving and High Progress School in 2015-16.

Farmington Town Board Discusses Road Projects

March 24.

The Town of Farmington will see some road improvements this summer, but not as many as town officials would like because of the high cost of road repairs.

The Farmington Town Board voted last Tuesday to begin the bidding process to redo a box culvert on Wescott Road, about 2,500 feet south of East Moraine Drive.

The bill to replace the culvert cost will be equally split with Washington County. The County Board agreed on March 13 to pay about \$49,000 for the new culvert. The county's assistance comes from a county Aid Bridge and Culvert program, which provides a reimbursement for taxes that residents paid several years ago to help offset construction expenses.

At last week's meeting, the Farmington Town Board discussed the need to widen Wescott Road where the new culvert will be. The road is currently about 18 feet wide, and the town board would like to widen it to 24 or 26 feet.

Chris Elbe and Mark Foyse examined the spot on Wescott Road, as well as other roads throughout the town during a road tour on Saturday,

"The roads are getting pretty bad. And we don't have much money," Elbe reported at the Town Board meeting last Tuesday, April 10.

One road that Elbe and Foyse agreed needed work is Camp Awana Road. The town is considering making that a road project for next year, so Elbe requested that Kunkel Engineering Group put an estimate together, to plan for next year's budget. The number was not what Elbe expected.

The amount to redo the 1.5 mile stretch between Highway H and Pioneer Drive came to \$421,000.

"I'm baffled, I guess," Elbe said after seeing the estimate. "I was thinking it would be about \$150,000."

"I thought maybe we'd take a few roads off this year and save up a little more for next year for Camp Awana, but at \$421,000, it doesn't pay to talk about it," Elbe said.

The town will never be able to rebuild any roads if that is the cost, Elbe said.

The board discussed the possibility of the cost coming down if the refinished road was not as thick as the original estimate.

are on the town's radar.

Newark Drive is another rough road.

That road is on the radar also, but half of it is the Town of Trenton's responsibility. So Farmington is working with Trenton to schedule when the entire road can be done at the same time.

"Our theory is a contractor is going to come in and do six miles of road at a cheaper rate than come

back next year and do just one small section. Why not do it all at one time," Foyse explained.

Until then, the townspeople know how to maneuver along the bumpy road.

"I have to put a lid on my coffee every morning," Foyse said.

In Other Words...

– The Bumpy Road To A Decision

The Town of Farmington has a lot of roads.

There are 66 miles of roads in the town, to be exact. And I have now been on nearly every inch of roadway.

I rode along with Town Chairman Chris Elbe and Town Supervisor Mark Foyse on Saturday, March 24, as they drove through the town to determine which roads needed repairs. The road tour was officially a Town Board meeting.

It was a long meeting.

And a bumpy one.

The two town officials worked off a list of several hundred spots that Kunkel Engineering had identified as problem areas. Elbe and Foyse wanted to check out those spots and prioritize which ones needed the most work.

I sat in the backseat of Foyse's pickup truck, taking notes. I wrote down the name of each road we drove on.

Since it was not a very smooth ride, my handwriting from that meeting is difficult to read. According to my notes, Camp Awana Road stands out as one of the bumpiest roads. At

least that's what I think my scribble says.

Elbe and Foyse said they would like to have Camp Awana Road fixed next year. But no one is sure if the town will be able to afford it.

That was pretty much the theme of the road tour. There are a lot of roads that need repairs, and not a lot of money in the budget.

As Elbe told me when we started out, "This is the meeting we have each year where we realize how much money we don't have."

In 2016, when prices were down, it cost the town approximately \$115,000 to pulverize and completely redo one mile. With a budget of \$100,000, the town is limited on what it can do this year.

So we drove around the town, evaluating each street, lane and highway.

Disclaimer: I know very little about how to construct a road. So I just listened and tried to pick up any road construction tips I could.

It helped that Elbe used excellent technical terms to describe the condition of each road. Here are

some of his quotes:

"This road is a goner."

"That one is really falling apart."

"This one is getting pretty rough."

"This road is shot."

"This one isn't the best."

"This is a dandy."

"This road is in bad shape."

"This one is crumbling."

I learned about alligator cracks and potholes.

And I was able to pick up some pointers. According to Foyse, the key to road longevity in the Town of Farmington is to prevent any heavy truck traffic.

They blamed garbage trucks, snowplows and construction equipment for a lot of the damage to roads. Weather and water were also cited as main culprits.

Roads that are on higher land seem to have fewer problems than those in low-lying spots that accumulate moisture.

Elbe and Foyse got out of the truck a couple times

to check out culverts. The town has already fixed the culvert on Camp Awana Road a couple times. It needs some attention once again.

They also inspected the culvert on Wescott Road. That one will be redone this year, using town and county funds.

Some of the roads in Farmington are very narrow. While it makes it difficult for two-way traffic, it comes in handy for snowplowing, Elbe and Foyse agreed.

"You put the plow on the wing and you hope nobody is coming. You can do the whole road in one pass," Elbe said with authority.

To keep costs down, the two board members discussed the possibility of just resurfacing roads, rather than completely rebuilding them.

And because of the lack of funds, some roads will have to wait to be repaired. Roads like Forest View and Lakeview

It was more than enough for the win, however, as Lehn struck out 15 and now has 30 for the year, she walked three. Lehn struck out both Claire Peterson and Kylie Hraban three times in the game.

When asked how many no-hitters Lehn currently has, Gosse said, "I think she's got seven, complete-game no-hitters in her last two years," indicating there may be a few more when she pitched three or four innings.

KHS was not a gracious host to the Warriors' pitcher Megan Van Ruiswyk, who was their starter a year ago. The Indians knocked Ruiswyk around for 11 base hits, including a double by Maddie Geidel, who went 2x4 and is currently batting .a hefty 625 (5x8) after the first two conference games. Lehn and Kaitlyn Miller each had three hits, while Tara Theusch and Geidel each had two.

The Indians scored two runs in the bottom of the first on Lehn's one-out single, the double by Geidel, which put runners at second and third. After Waupun intentionally walked Megan Marx to load

the bases for a possible force play, Miller came through with a clutch RBI single for a 1-0 lead, and then Ashley Trapp hit a sacrifice fly to score Geidel.

The second inning was twice as nice for the Indians, who pushed four runs across the plate. After Skylar Donath drew a walk, Tara Theusch stroked a double, and Lehn drove them both in with her single. Marx was hit by a pitch, then Miller singled in her second run of the game, and after Trapp lined out to short, Leah Theusch gave the Indians a 6-0 lead with her RBI single.

Despite the cold conditions the game was played in, both teams played pretty good defense.

About this week's schedule — KHS was scheduled to host Berlin on April 17, go to Ripon on April 19 — Gosse said, "I don't think there's any chance," adding the April 21 tournament at Shawano is also in doubt because of all the snow in northern Wisconsin.

KHS Golfers Aiming For Better Finish In Conference

Monopolies are now allowed in certain areas of business, but there is no rule against a family monopolizing the number one position on a high school golf team.

For the past three years Schlossers, Sam and Jacob, have dominated the number one spot on the Kewaskum High team, and second-year head coach Casey Scheel said recently Jacob has pretty much locked up the spot for the 2018 season.

"He handled it so well last year as a sophomore, and performed well. He will anchor the number one spot," Scheel said, reporting he has letter winners, Jordan Carlton, Brad Buechel and Talon Ralph, at numbers two, three and four, the same positions they played a year ago when they finished fourth out of eight teams in the Division 2 state tournament.

"It's not often you can keep numbers one through four golfers the same year to year, but that will be a big advantage for us," the coach said, reporting junior Travis Griesemer, who played in a couple varsity matches and in one round of the 36-hole state test, is the "frontrunner" for the number five spot.

Last season, Schlosser averaged 39 strokes per 9-hole round, while Carlton was at 41.75; Buechel,

41.50; Ralph 42.71; and Griesemer, 45.0.

Two sophomores, Andrew Carlton and Toree Ralph, could challenge Griesemer that final spot. They averaged 44.17 and 46.8 in JV competitions a year ago. Both have grown, according to Scheel, who said, they should be able to hit the ball farther and as a result have shorter irons into the green instead of 4- or 5-irons.

As far as the East Central Conference is concerned, Scheel is confident, "We will be the most experienced team in regards to varsity level," with defending champion Plymouth still a challenger even though they graduated two regulars. "Waupun will be very strong this year," Scheel said, indicating Winneconne is another team to watch.

Using points from places in the mini-tour events and the 18-hole EC Tournament, KHS wound up second a year ago, six points behind Plymouth.

The battle for the individual medal should also be interesting since the 2017 medalist, Solomon Zaring of KML, is back, but Schlosser and several others could unseat him.


Scheel is working with a squad of 18 players, including seven freshman, which is "great to see," according to Scheel, who said many of them are new to golf but a few of them will have

opportunities to play in the JV meets.

New this season will be a two-day tournament hosted by Sheboygan North and held at the Whistling Straits Irish course and Meadow Valley courses at Blackwolf Run on April 18 and 19. "This tournament has top competition from D-1, D-2, and D-3 from around the state. Hopefully weather allows us to get there this week," Scheel said, adding the Indians will also compete in the Fort Atkinson Invite at Blackwolf Run on April 27.

"Our first goal as a team is to take care of conference during the regular season. We were close to winning it last year, but fell short," Scheel said. "Then our next goal is to get back to team state. A lot of things have to go right to make team state, but that will still be our focus. It's always nice to win regionals, so you're paired up with the other regional champions at sectionals, and then when you get to sectionals, it's finish in the top two, which will secure a bid to state. Now that we know what state is like, it'd be great to get back there again."

Thus far, KHS has had three meets cancelled or postponed. The Indians were scheduled to play an EC meet at the Mascoutin GC near Berlin on April 16, and the next one is set for April 23 at Quit Qui Oc, Plymouth's home course.


of the seventh," Gosse said, adding, "She's hitting the ball real well. She's seeing the ball well."

Track Teams Participate In KML Invitational

After their first two meets were postponed because of bad weather, the Kewaskum High track teams were able to get an invitation to the Kettle Moraine Luther Invitational, held April 12, and were happy to have the opportunity to compete outdoors.

The Indian boys, with big points from sprints and relays, wound up fourth out of eight teams, scoring 96 points. Finishing 1-2 were Watertown Luther Prep with 148 and Living Word with 118. The Lady Indians had to settle for sixth place 82 points. Menomonee Falls won the meet with 116 points, two ahead of the host Chargers' 114.

"I think we did all right," KHS co-head Coach Kris Evans said Monday.

KHS racked up 24 points from the 1-2-3 finish by Cade Peterson, Cameron Dodge and Tony Steger in the 100 meters where their respective times were 11 and .49 seconds (11.49), 12.10 and 12.13.

"I feel real good about our sprint crew this spring. They are super, capable runners," Evans said, adding, "I expect them to be in the mid to low 11s by the end of the season."

Those three, plus Cole Surprenant, teamed up for an impressive win in the 4x100 meter relay. Their time was 44.12, over two

seconds ahead of Luther Prep.

Evans also had Peterson run the open 200, and he responded with a first place with a time of 22.58, which was close to the 22.50 he ran in the D-2 state meet a year ago.

Sophomore Sam Schultz contributed 10 points to the team with his first-place high jump effort of 5 feet 9 inches. "He's getting better and better. I really want to see him at 5-10 or 6-0 by the end of the year," the coach said.

It was a tough day for the Indians in the weight events. Defending state qualifier Riley Donovan had to settle for a throw of 130 feet, 7 inches (130-07), good for second in the discus, while Jon Leister was third at 116-01.

Leister barely surpassed 40 feet (40-06.50) for third place in the shot, seven feet behind the winner.

One other top-three finish came in the 4x200 relay where Tyler Heus, Kyle Bath, Gabe Christenson and Surprenant placed third in 1:40.64. Surprenant also long jumped 18-04.50 which was good enough for fourth place. "A great jump for him," Evans said, reporting there was a crosswind which may have affected the jumpers.

On the girls' side of the meet, KHS has no first places, but sophomore Emily Halterman heaved

the discus 95-06 for a second in that event, and another sophomore, Anna Peterson, a transfer from Kettle Moraine Lutheran, took a second in the 200 with a time of 29.03.

"Track is an effort sport," Evans said, indicating Halterman is "a girl who works really hard. It's no wonder to me, she is finding success."

Another highlight was the 3-4 finish by Romela Olla and Alyssa Butz in the 3,200. They had times of 12:55.26 and 13:13.12. Butz had already run the 4x800 relay and the 1,600 earlier in the meet, taking fourth place with a time of 6:03.03.

"Butz is a ninth grader with a lot of energy," Evans said, confident she and Olla will score scads of points this spring.

KHS picked up a place in each of the hurdle races. Freshman Allyson Casey hit the finish line in the 100 hurdles in 21.64, which was good for fourth place, while Maddy Thull, who had a conflict and didn't get to the meet until after the 100 hurdles, her specialty, placed third in the 300s in 57.83.

The best place in the relays came in the 4x200 with Courtney Butzlaff, Abby Meidl, Peterson and Emily Halterman totting the baton two laps for a 2:00.21, good for second, while Butzlaff, Lizzy Lightner, Peterson and Breanna Rice placed third in the 4x400 with a time of 4:42.75.

Lightner cleared 4-4 to take fourth in the high jump.

The April 17 quad scheduled to be held at KML has been cancelled. Tomorrow, April 20, Kewaskum is scheduled to be at West Bend for the West Bend Invitational, which gets underway at 4 p.m.

The board of review may not hear an objection to the amount or valuation of property unless, at least 48 hours before the board's first scheduled meeting, the objector provides to the board's clerk written or oral notice of an intent to file an objection, except that upon a showing of good cause and the submission of a written objection, the board shall waive that requirement during the first two hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, and the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the fifth day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than five days with proof of extraordinary circumstances for failure to meet the 48-hour notice requirement and failure to appear before the board of review during the first two hours of the board's first scheduled meeting.

4. Objections to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the clerk of the board of review within the first two hours of the board's first scheduled meeting.

Stats., that person provides to the clerk of the board of review notice as to whether the person will ask for the removal of a member of the board of review and, if so, which member, and provides a reasonable estimate of the length of time the hearing will take.
