Kewaskum To Celebrate 125th Anniversary In 2020

– Logo Contest Offers \$1,000 Prize

The Village of Kewaskum will turn 125 years old in the year 2020, and plans are already underway for a big week-end celebration.

“We are really excited to celebrate the village’s rich history. Plans are to include lots of activities that will appeal to people of all ages,” said Aaron Laatsch, a volunteer for the Kewaskum Historical Society and one of the organizers of the celebration.

The celebration will be held June 12, 13 and 14 in 2020. Among the festivities will be a parade, fireworks, historical re-enactors, a 5K run, pancake breakfast, live music, entertainment, food and games.

To help promote the 125th anniversary celebration, the public is invited to be part of Kewaskum’s history and enter a logo contest. The winner of the logo contest will receive a prize package valued at \$1,000.

Caring For The Milwaukee River

– Volunteers Help Clean Up The Milwaukee River In Kewaskum

Despite the snow and cold weather, about 50 volunteers showed up at River Hill Park in Kewaskum on Saturday, April 21, ready to clean up the Milwaukee River.

“This is the biggest turnout yet,” said Gino Giudice, who is a member of the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce, and coordinator of the local event.

It also was the first time there was snow on the ground during Kewaskum’s annual river cleanup.

“We have had a lot of inclement weather before, but I think this is the first time there has been snow,” Giudice said. “Most of the time, it’s windy and everything is blowing all over.”

Saturday’s event was part of the 23rd annual Milwaukee Riverkeeper Spring Cleanup. The Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce brought the program to Kewaskum about a decade ago.

Each year, the day starts out with volunteers gathering under the shelter at River Hill Park for donuts and juice. Then they split into small groups, each covering a different area of the river.

Armed with rubber gloves, grabbers, pinch-

ers, nets, rakes and garbage bags, the volunteers walk along the river bank and clean up any garbage they find.

It has made a difference. When the program started in Kewaskum, a lot of garbage was pulled out of the river. The quantity seems to decrease each year.

“We have come up with all sorts of things out of the river, from tires to sleeping bags. That first year, there

was even a chair we pulled out,” Giudice said.

This year’s event collected smaller items. As usual, there were a lot of plastic bottles, papers and cigarette butts found along the river.

Cleaning up the river brought big smiles to river keepers, especially the youngest ones, like 6-year-old Bella Forcier and 6-year-old Xack Kleinke.

SHERIFF'S REPORT

Motor Vehicle Crash

On Saturday, April 21, at approximately 4:41 a.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a single vehicle roll over crash with injuries, in the Town of Kewaskum, on County Highway H east of Townline Road. The Sheriff's Office requested the assistance of the Kewaskum Police Department, and upon their arrival it was learned that one of the occupants had been ejected.

The Kewaskum Fire Department was paged and arrived a short time later requesting a paramedic intercept from the West Bend Fire Department. Due to the injuries the passenger sustained in the crash, Flight for Life was requested to respond to the scene. The passenger, a 32-year-old male from the Village of Kewaskum was transported via Flight for Life to Froedtert Hospital in Milwaukee with nonlife-threatening injuries. The driver, a 39-year-old female from the Town of Barton was taken to a local hospital with nonlife-threatening injuries.

The investigation revealed that the vehicle was east bound when the driver attempted to avoid an animal in the roadway. The vehicle then left the road, reentered the roadway and began to roll, coming to rest in the south ditch on its roof. County

Highway H was closed to traffic for approximately 90 minutes to assist in rescue efforts and the landing of Flight for Life.

Alcohol does not appear to be a contributing factor, and the accident remains under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

Stolen Vehicle

On Saturday, April 21, at 5:32 p.m., the Sheriff's Office received information from OnStar that a stolen car was northbound on Interstate 41 near County Highway K. Squads were able to get behind the vehicle near Mohawk Road in the Town of Wayne. The vehicle was traveling 83 mph. The 911 Communications Center coordinated with OnStar to bring the vehicle to a controlled stop with deputies close behind. OnStar was able to gradually slow the vehicle down to idle speed while keeping the steering functioning.

A 16-year-old City of Milwaukee male was taken into custody without incident. Charges of operating a motor vehicle without owner's consent, possession of drugs and possession of drug paraphernalia will be referred to youth court. The youth was transferred to the Waukesha County Sheriff Office as the youth took the vehicle from a youth treatment center in Waukesha County.

Fond du Lac County Sheriff To Exhume Remains Found Near St. Kilian In 2008

As part of the ongoing investigation to determine the identity of Jane Doe, the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office is releasing a newly updated facial reconstruction of her, and will be utilizing new forensic technology to try to determine who she was. Her remains were discovered by deer hunters in a shallow creek in the southern part of Fond du Lac County, near St. Kilian, on November 23, 2008.


In addition to the new facial reconstruction, the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office, with assistance from the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children (NCMEC), will be exhuming Jane Doe's remains on Thursday, April 26. Having access to her remains will provide the forensic anthropologists another opportunity to examine her remains and focus on specific features unique to Jane Doe that may assist us in identifying her.

Furthermore, the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office will be facilitating chemical isotope analysis on her bones which could provide historical data that could lead us to geographic regions where Jane Doe may have previously resided. Additional testing such as DNA phenotyping may also be performed. DNA phenotyping can predict genetic ancestry, eye color, hair color, skin color, and face shape.

Jane Doe was petite, approximately 15-21 years of age, stood approximately five-feet, one-inch tall, and weighed around 120 pounds. Her hair was light brown to dark blonde in color, 12-14 inches in length, and she is believed to be Caucasian; however, she may be of Hispanic, Asian, or Native American descent.

This information has been widely disseminated and posted on numerous websites. Jane Doe's DNA is entered into the National DNA Database and her dental records are also on file. These records are routinely checked against missing persons as well as other databases.

On November 29, 2016, NCMEC sponsored a comprehensive case review at their headquarters in Alexandria, Virginia. Over a period of two days,

detectives Ryan Murphy and Pete Vergos presented the "Jane Doe" case to a panel of experts from NCMEC, the FBI, NCIS, and another forensic anthropologist.

One of the recommendations was to get an updated facial composite of Jane Doe completed, as the technology and techniques have advanced significantly since it was originally completed in 2009. The new composite of Jane Doe is now being released.

In releasing this new facial reconstruction, the sheriff's office hopes someone recognizes the new image and takes the time to report a tip. Someone out there knows Jane Doe. She has family and friends somewhere. Everyone can help in

these efforts and the Sheriff's Office hopes the public will disseminate her information throughout social media. It only takes one person to recognize her and assist us in reuniting her with her loved



New Book To Detail Kewaskum History

In 1976, a Kewaskum High School student named Mark Smucker wrote a book about the history of the Village of Kewaskum.

Titled "Kewaskum Then and Now," the book contains information about Chief Kewaskum, early leaders, businesses, government, transportation, recreation, education and churches in Kewaskum.

Smucker, who was a member of the Kewaskum Historical Society, did a lot of research to create the 140-page book. He found information in various history books and interviewed numerous people in the Kewaskum community.

The book arguably became the best historical record in existence about the village.

Smucker died in 1979, just three years after completing the book.

There have been no

updated editions of the book.

Until now. A new book detailing the village's history is currently being created by Kewaskum Historical Society volunteers Aaron Laatsch and Anne Trautner.

Laatsch is a fifth-generation Kewaskum resident with a passion for researching and preserving local history. Trautner is a journalist with the Kewaskum Statesman who shares an interest in Kewaskum's treasured past.

Titled "Kewaskum, Wisconsin: The Making Of A Village," this new 208-page, hard-cover book will contain historic photos and a comprehensive village history. This "coffee-table" style book also will have memories of local residents scattered throughout the pages.

The book focuses on Kewaskum's early history,

prior to 1940. The pages will feature pictures of Kewaskum relics, historic documents and maps. Detailed chapters will contain information about Chief Kewaskum, the area's pioneer settlers, the village's first businesses, schools, early churches, local government and civic groups.

The book, which is being created in conjunction with the village's 125th anniversary in 2020, will be available for purchase beginning in November 2019.

This parallels the book's predecessor, "Kewaskum Then and Now," which was sold again when the village celebrated its 100th anniversary in 1995.

"The goal is to create a book that will carry out the mission of the Kewaskum Historical Society of preserving and documenting Kewaskum's past," Laatsch said.

All proceeds from the

book will benefit the Kewaskum Historical Society.

The society maintains a museum and log cabin, as well as an extensive digital collection of photos and documents. Each year, the Kewaskum Historical Society sponsors Early Farm Days for the entire community. Society members also regularly visit local schools to educate students about the village's history through regular classroom and summer school programs in the Kewaskum School District.

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

The 125th Anniversary Celebration

The first settlers arrived in the Kewaskum area in 1852. On May 7, 1895, the Village of Kewaskum was officially incorporated.

Laatsch, who has been researching the village's history for the past 20 years, knew that the Village of Kewaskum would be turning 125

years old in 2020. As he thought about this milestone, he wanted to commemorate the event.

He knew that the village had held a big 100th anniversary celebration in 1995. That made him think. Why not do something similar in 2020?

Laatsch brought the idea of a village-wide celebration to people he knew, and the concept sparked a lot of interest. He started speaking to area organizations and businesses and garnered the same response.

"There has been overwhelming support for the event," Laatsch said.

River Hill Park in Kewaskum has been reserved to host the activities the weekend of June 12, 13 and 14 in 2020. That will be the weekend after the high school graduation and the weekend before Father's Day.

With the help of local individuals and groups, plans are in the works for numerous activities. Live music and entertainment will be featured all weekend long. A 5K run is planned for that Saturday morning. Fireworks will light up the night sky that evening. Sunday will bring a village parade.

The Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce decided to move its annual Party on the Pavement that year to become part of the 125th anniversary celebration. The vendors, food and entertainment that Party on the Pavement typically features will be located with the other festivities that year at River Hill Park.

"I am really excited about the entire event. It will be great for area businesses and the entire community," said Kristy Vogt, president of the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce.

Similar to the 100th anniversary celebration, there are plans for early pioneer re-enactors to set up tents along the river bank where visitors can learn about how life was when people first settled in the area.

As a member of the Kewaskum Historical Society, Laatsch hopes this will bring a learning opportunity for summer school students.

"I am hoping the summer school classes will be able to walk to River Hill Park and see firsthand how early pioneers lived," Laatsch said.

"It is a good opportunity for everyone to celebrate

everything our community has to offer, and to pay tribute to those who made it happen," said Jim Dorn, who is a member of the American Legion and Kewaskum Kiwanis Club.

Last Thursday, the 125th Anniversary Celebration Committee met for the first time. Committee members include village officials, as well as representatives from area businesses and

organizations.

"We are off to a great start and really appreciate all the support," Laatsch said.

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

One lucky group cleaned up where the river goes through the Hon-E-Kor Golf Course. That is always the most coveted area to clean, according to Giudice.

"A lot of kids will brag about how many golf balls they find on the course. There is the bonus of that," he explained.

"And then the parents say they are not going on that side of the river next year because they don't need any more golf balls," laughed Claire DeYoung, who volunteers at the event each year.

Among the helpers in Saturday's group were volunteers from Boy Scout Troop 744, Holy Trinity youth group, the Kewaskum Key Club, Daisy Troop 8377 and Brownie Troup 8037, as well as other organizations.

Some of the volunteers, like Ashley and Ethan Ellefson, came on their own simply because they wanted to help. It was the first time they were involved, so Ashley, who is 15, and Ethan, who is 13, weren't quite sure what to expect.

"I actually thought it was going to be kind of boring, but it's fun," Ethan said.

Thull Shines In Spring Game At South Dakota

A brand new year with his healed hamstring and a goal of being a starting running back for the South Dakota Coyotes.

Of whom are we speaking? Brandon Thull, former record-setting running back for the Kewaskum High School. (During his senior year, Thull rushed for 2,161 yards and scored 36 touchdowns.) After redshirting his freshman year, Thull missed his entire sophomore season because of a hamstring pull he suffered last summer.

Thull got a chance to show he is healed and just how well he can run during the Coyotes' spring game, which was held in Vermillion on April 20. Six running backs saw action in the game, gaining 100 yards in 24 total carries, with Thull and sophomore Ben Klett responsible for 62 of those yards. Thull, a 5 foot 10 inch, 195-pound halfback led the way with six carries for 32 yards (5.3 yards per carry).

"I was injured during practice (last) August. It took me about three to four weeks for it to heal," Thull said. By that time, it was the middle of the season, and he sat out the rest of the year. "Now, it's feeling pretty good ... no pain," he said.

About his longest run, a 12-yarder, Thull said, "It was just power run up the middle. I bounced it outside to get as many yards as I could."

The spring game usually has the offense going up against the defense, but, "This year they changed the format, giving the defense 27 points (to start)," Thull said, indicating the

offense ended up winning 33-27.

Thull said no depth chart was determined after the game, adding, "It comes down to the fall camp practices."

Thull and most of the other players will remain on campus during the summer. "I'll be down here, lifting and running," he said.

And how will South Dakota do this fall?

"We've got some younger players in the offensive line," Thull said, optimistic about the Coyotes' chances. "Overall, our team should be pretty good this fall."

Thull started in the field of nursing but indicated he has changed his major to Health Care Administration.

"Grades are pretty good. The classes aren't too difficult," he said.

Thull's parents, Mark and Tina, were at Friday's game, returning to Kewaskum on Sunday.

The spring game was the final practice for the Coyotes, who will begin their summer workouts on the campus in late May. The Coyotes open the 2018 season on Saturday, Sept. 1, playing Kansas State in Manhattan, Kansas.

Indians Stay Perfect; Geidel Smashes Home Run Number 3

After shutting out host Campbellsport 11-0 in five innings on April 23, Kewaskum softball coach Jeff Gosse searched far and wide for flaws in the Indians' game, but he couldn't find any.

Gosse praised his all-star junior pitcher, Kennedy Lehn, who struck out 11 — she currently had 41 Ks in three games — and gave up just one hit.

"They hit well tonight," Gosse went on about the offense. "We executed our small ball offense. We executed our long ball offense."

Then there was also the defense, which pretty much sparkled, prompting Gosse to say, "We were working on all cylinders. That's what a change in the weather can do."

The host Cougars and KHS came into the game

with perfect 2-0 records in East Central play but it quickly became obvious the Indians had a little more firepower at the plate than the hosts.

Tara Theusch led off the game with a double, moved to third on a passed ball and scored on the catcher's wide throw past third base.

The 1-0 lead stretched to 3-0 in the second. KHS manufactured the first run on a walk, an error on a bunt and a ground out, and then Ashley Trapp stole home.

Maddie Geidel's two-run home run to deep center was the big blast in the top of the third. Geidel, who already has three homers this season, drove in Lehn, who led off the inning with a single to center.

The Indians continued its two-run outbursts in the top of the fourth as Trapp and

Leah Theusch hit back-to-back singles and the bases were loaded after Kaitlyn Leitheiser beat out a bunt. Following a strikeout, Tara Theusch hit a clutch single up the middle, sending Trapp and Leah Theusch home for a 7-0 lead.

CHS pitcher Alyssa Muench got the first two batters out in the fifth, then an infield popup by Leah Theusch between home and first created a little controversy. CHS fans were certain their first baseman made a diving catch on the ball, but after a powwow between the two umpires, Theusch was called safe. That opened the door for four runs to score. Leitheiser followed with an RBI double, Skylar Donath hit an RBI single, and Lehn helped her own cause with a 2-run single.

Lehn struck out three Cougars in the bottom of

the fifth, ending the game via the 10-run mercy rule. Lehn got her third straight win but wasn't entirely satisfied with her effort because she walked two and had more pitches outside the strike zone than she wanted.

"I just could have thrown a better game," Lehn said afterward, adding "They got a hit, so I'm mad about that." (Muench got the hit, a single in the bottom of the second.)

Lehn took time to praise her teammates. "The team did very well hitting today," she said, and, "I'm just glad they have my back all the time."

KHS, currently 3-0, is hosting Plymouth today (April 26) at 4:45 p.m.

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Indians Go Indoors To Beat The Weather

– Finish Third And Fifth In Ripon Test

With the West Bend outdoor invitational up in the air because of the recent snowstorm, Kewaskum decided it was best to take its track teams to the Ripon indoor meet on April 20. It turned out to be a good call since the West Bend meet was cancelled, and the Indians were able to run in the Ripon College's Willmore Center. With several big meets on the horizon, KHS co-head coach Kris Evans did not overtax any of his athletes, keeping them to one or two events, resulting in a fifth-place finish by the boys (59) and a third by the girls (77.5).

Plymouth won both ends of the competition, with the Panther men amassing 158 points and the Lady Panthers piling up 149.

"We set a new (indoor) school record in the 4x200-meter relay," Evans said about highlights from the competition. Cade Peterson, Tony Steger, Cole Surprenant and Cameron Dodge combined for a time of 1 minute, 36 seconds (1:36.00), which was good for third place. The quartet from Wautoma won the race in 1:34.68.

The old mark of 1:36.94 was set back in 2002 by Chris Canter, Tom Ogi, Andrew Lickel and Tony Fitts.

Evans also said Peterson set a school record in the 60-meter dash. (*The Statesman* was unable to find the previous best because there is no 60-meter dash listed on the school's record board.) His time of 7.22 was good for second place, .20 behind the winner, Max Bennett of Wautoma.

Evans was thrilled with sophomore Sam Schultz, who cleared 6 feet, 1 inch (6-1) to win the high jump by five inches. Schultz cleared 5-6 in his first meet, 5-9 in the second and now added another four inches to his best personal mark.

"Phenomenal," Evans said about Schultz's rapid ascent. "He's only three inches from the record," co-held by Travis Jacak and Jason Hanson, who is currently his coach in the event.

Other top-four finishes are as follows: Riley Donovan, third in the short put (40-08.50); Ben Brase, fourth in the 1,600 (5:07.09), and Sam Melzer, tied for fourth in the pole vault (9-6).

Freshmen Gannon Kreuser and Clayton Kapped finished fifth and sixth, respectively, in the 3,200 with p.r. (personal records) times of 12:05.45 and 12:14.02, while sophomore Jed Ermer turned in a good 400 (57.23), giving him a seventh place.

Evans called juniors Abby Meidl, Maela Olla and Grace Marchello, along with freshman Alyssa Butz "standouts in the meet. I think the three of them scored over 30 points."

Olla won the 3,200, covering the distance in 12:52.11 with Butz second (13:08.97) and Ellie Spalding sixth in 15:05.68. Olla also placed second in the 1,600 (5:55.84).

Butz picked up good points with her fourth in the 1,600 (6:00.38) while Marchello placed sixth in the 800 (2:49.29) and sixth in the 1,600 (6:13.05), which was the Indians' best event.

Meidl captured top honors in the pole vault, after clearing 9-03.

"That ties her personal best," Evans said. "Now we're trying to get her to 9-6 and above."

Meidl was also part of the third-place 4x200 relay (2:01.67), running with Anna Peterson, Jillian Rettler and Hannah Debelak.

Lightner, out for the sport for the first time, finished fourth in the 400 (1:08.97), fourth in the high jump with a p.r. of 4-8 and helped the 4x400 relay to a third place of 4:53.42. Other runners in the relay were Meidl, Faith Mertzig and Peterson.

About Lightner, Evans said, "She's very eager, very malleable," willing to not just try events but, "attacks them."

Sophomore Emily Halterman placed fifth in the shot put, tossing the iron ball 31-03.

Kewaskum was scheduled to run at the Washington County Invitational on April 24 and tomorrow (April 27) will compete in the annual Alzheimer Invitational in Pewaukee.

Distance Runners Look To Lead KHS Girls Team

Distance events ... pole vault hurdles, and probably even the discus and high jump will be strengths of the Kewaskum High girls track team this spring.

"That's pretty much the hope," co-head coach Kris Evans said early in the week, pointing out home schooler Maela Olla, freshman Alyssa Butz and sophomore Grace Marchello provide excellent depth in the 800, 1,600 and 3,200 events where the Indians are expected to pick up big points in weekly invitationals and the East Central competitions.

Others expected to be consistent point-getters are Abby Meidl in the pole

vault, Maddy Thull in the 100 hurdles, Emily Halterman in the weight events and newcomer Liz Lightner in the high jump.

When she gets healthy, senior Sarah Butschlick will be a scoring threat in the 100 and 300 hurdles. The three-year regular injured her hamstring the first week of the season and will need time to heal.

Evans is real excited about Meidl's potential in the high jump. She has already cleared 9 feet, 3 inches (9-3) and that was indoors. A jump of 10-0 is a realistic goal for her, and Lightner, a senior out for the sport for the first time, could reach 5-0 in the high jump by the end of the season.

In the discus, the Indians have Halterman,

who is a very hard worker according to Evans. Having thrown the discus over 95 feet in the team's only outdoor meet, she can realistically surpass 100 feet in the next month.

Senior Breanna Rice will lead an otherwise young group of sprinters and middle distance runners, who need time to develop.

Will that be enough to propel the Kewaskum team to the upper division of the EC? That is the \$64 question right now because of the time missed on the track due to recent weather conditions and because the coaches haven't gotten a look at what many of the other conference teams are doing.

Evans did get a look at Plymouth at the recent Ripon Indoor Invitational held at Ripon College, and he was impressed with the Panthers' talent and depth.

"Plymouth's always a killer," Evans said, adding, "I see us having a couple

standout events, but I don't think we will win a lot of meets ... I see us right in the middle of the conference."

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Saving The Best For Last

– Lehmann Places Third In Rail Jam

Each spring since he was 10 years old, Ayrton Lehmann has made a “pilgrimage” to Copper Mountain in Colorado for the USASSA (United States of America Snowboard and Free Ski) Nationals.

The latest, which he made in early April, proved to be the best for the 17-year-old Kewaskum High athlete, who finally reached the podium in one of the events, which is a goal of all winter enthusiasts who have ever strapped their bindings and roared down a snow-covered hill.

“This was the last one (nationals) ... A good way to end it,” Lehmann said about his third place finish in Rail Jam, his specialty.

The competition hadn’t gone all that well until the Rail Jam. Lehmann had decided to compete in three of the five events and said in the first, the Slopestyle, “I fell on both runs.”

That left two events to reach his goal of attaining a top-three place, and the Boardercross also had disappointing results, but not because of something Lehmann did or didn’t do. The event, which is like “Roller Derby” on snow, features four boards racing down the hill at the same time. Since only one can finish first, there can be exciting and unpredictable results.

Lehmann said he was running a close second in the race when the leader “fell in front of me. I tried avoiding him. Then I crashed.”

That left Rail Jam for those 14 and over, which was held on April 3, and things finally came together for Lehmann in this event. “There were two heats of 25,” he said, indicating he was among the

top eight in one of the heats who advanced to the finals where he had a very good run. “I think I did well, but I didn’t know I’d get third,” he said.

“I landed three of six tricks in the final, so I got third place. It was pretty cool,” Lehmann said, reporting, “I did a Switch 270 (degree) ... I think I did a Switch Hand Slide 270 and then a front lip slide.”


After his run, Lehmann was pretty certain he would score well, and he did, receiving 1,430 points, good for third. The winner of the event was Cole Solner of Apple Valley, Minnesota. He received 1,765 points.

Lehmann spent two weeks in Copper Mountain this spring. “I went out with a couple of my teammates,” Lehmann said. “We got to snowboard about a week before the competition.” Lehmann had practiced this season at Little Switzerland in Slinger and competed in a lot of the Md West Best competitions.

For Nationals, “I was with Team WASST (Wisconsin Advanced Snowboard and Skiing Team),” he said.

Starting late in August, Colorado will become home to Lehmann, who has decided to attend the Colorado Mountain College in Leadville, which is about 20 minutes from Copper Mountain, one of the tallest peaks in the state, reaching 10,200 feet in elevation.

“I’m going to learn now to run maintenance operations (at a snowboard facility) and design terrain jumps,” Lehmann said, indicating Ski and Mountain Operations is a two-year program at the school, which has 11 campuses with a variety of certificate, associate degree and bachelor’s programs.

Appointments are available at the following locations: Washington County Human Services, West Bend; United Way Resource Center, Hartford; Germantown Senior Center; Jackson Community Center; and Kewaskum Village Hall.

Documents needed to complete the application must be brought to the appli-

cation appoint. These documents include: photo ID (mandatory for first-time and new Washington County applicants); social security numbers and dates of birth for everyone in the household; current gas, electric or oil energy bill (or lease/letter from your landlord if heat is included in your rent); and proof of gross income for the entire household for the three months prior to the application month (child support, wages, pension, unemployment, etc.)

Qualifying for energy assistance gives you access to other benefits including: crises benefits, furnace/heating system repair or replacement and weatherization program.

Migratory Bird Hunting Season

As a result of great scientific information and input from the public, migratory game bird hunters in Wisconsin pursuing ducks, geese, doves, woodcock and other migratory game birds will see some notable changes in 2018.

The final season framework was approved by the state Natural Resources Board at its April 11, 2018 meeting in Madison.

"These season frameworks were based on input we received from the public, input from conservation and hunting groups, and results from a waterfowl hunter survey," said Taylor Finger, Department of Natural Resources migratory bird ecologist. "We expanded our outreach efforts in 2018 using social media to increase our engagement with our users, and we saw attendance at statewide public hearings double and a nearly 400 percent increase in total comments received regarding the 2018 waterfowl season proposals."

Finger notes that the waterfowl season structure process is a perfect example of the important role the public can play in decision making, and thanks all those who submitted a comment or attended a meeting.

The first of the 2018 migratory game bird seasons will open with the early Canada goose, mourning dove and early teal seasons starting on September 1. Regular waterfowl hunting seasons will include a 60-day duck season which will start with a statewide opener on September 29 and 92-day regular goose season which will have two splits to allow hunting during the Christmas and New Year's holidays.

Highlights from the approved season structure include: North duck zone will open one week later than in previous years,

resulting in a single statewide opener for the North, South and Mississippi zones on Sept. 29; elimination of the Horicon Canada goose Management Zone (resulting in a single statewide regular goose zone); increase in the daily Canada goose bag limit to three birds per day; a second split in the South Canada goose zone resulting in a goose season that is open during the Christmas and New Year's holidays; and increase in the pintail daily bag limit (from one to two) based on US Fish and Wildlife Service season framework.

As a reminder to Canada goose hunters, registration of Canada geese and in-field validation of the Canada goose hunting permit is no longer required.

Early season dates are as follows:

- Early Teal - September 1-7 (6 birds per day, Sunrise – Sunset Shooting Hours);
- Early Goose - September 1-15 (5 birds per day);
- Mourning Dove - September 1 to November 29 (15 birds per day);
- and Woodcock - September 22 to November 5 (3 birds per day).

Duck season dates and bag limits are as follows:

Opening day shooting hours would begin one-half hour before sunrise for all regular waterfowl hunting seasons.

Youth Hunt - September 15-16;

North Zone - September 29 to November 27;

South Zone - September 29 to October 7 and October 13 to December 2 (five-day split);

and Mississippi Zone - September 29 to October 5 and October 13 to December 4 (seven-day split, closed October 6-12).

The daily bag limit statewide is six ducks, including no more than: four

mallards, of which only one may be a hen; one black duck; two canvasbacks; three wood ducks; two pintails; three scaup; and two redheads.

Five mergansers can be harvested daily, of which no more than two may be hooded.

With the elimination of the Horicon Canada goose management zone, the state is now a single statewide Exterior goose hunting zone for the regular season. The Mississippi River is a sub-zone within the Exterior Zone. For Canada goose hunters that have already purchased a Horicon Canada goose permit, your permit will still function as your regular Canada goose season authorization and does not require that you re-purchase an Exterior Zone goose permit.

Another change was made to the daily bag limits which increased from two geese per day to three geese per day during the regular Canada goose hunting season. Lastly, the Natural Resources Board approved the incorporation of a second split in the Southern Zone regular Canada Goose season which would close the season down with the South Zone duck season and reopen again on December 16 and run through the Christmas and New Year's holidays.

Exterior Zone (92 days total): North - September 16 to December 16; South - September 16 to October 7 (5-day Split) and October 13 to December 2 (13-day split) and December 16 – January 3, 2019; and Mississippi - September 29 to October 5 and October 13 to January 3.

- Place cut ends of trimmings facing the street.
- Place small trimmings (less than 1/2 inch in diameter) in a pail, garbage can or bundle and tie with string or twine
- The normal chipping schedule is the first and third Monday of the month starting in April (weather permitting) ending the third Monday in October. When the Monday is a holiday brush chipping will be done Tuesday of that week.

The Brush Collection Policy limits brush chipping to tree trimmings.

It prohibits property owners from cutting down trees and placing them at the curb for pickup.
