Local Fan Knits At Brewers Game

Carolyn Janz went to the Milwaukee Brewers game last Monday night, and brought along her knitting needles and yarn.

She was among the hundreds of fans who sat in Miller Park and knitted during the Brewers game against the Chicago Cubs. The knitters were all taking part in a Brewers "Stitch N' Pitch" theme night.

"It's the only time weapons are allowed in the stadium. There were a lot of knitting needles and scissors there," Janz said.

The knitters were from all over Southeastern Wisconsin. Some knitters represented yarn shops at the game. Others came on

their own simply because they enjoy knitting and watching baseball.

Janz attended the game with a group of five other local knitters that she gets together with on a regular basis. The local knitting group typically meets every Tuesday night at Panera Bread in West Bend to knit.

Occasionally, though, the group goes on outings, although it is not usually to a baseball game.

"Sometimes a couple of us get together and go to different yarn shops," Janz said.

The group refers to those outings as yarn crawls, not to be confused with pub crawls.

During last week's

Brewers game, the knitters did a lot of cheering. But when they weren't standing up and clapping for their team, the knitters sat and worked on their masterpieces.

Each crafter had a different project. Some made hats. Some knit mittens. Others worked on sweaters. Janz's sister Chris crocheted a star-shaped baby blanket for her grandson.

Janz considered bringing one of three knitting projects she had already started to the game. Because of the warm temperatures, she decided against bringing the sweater she was working on.

Kewaskum School District Receives Safety Grant

The Kewaskum School District received a \$106,347 grant through the Wisconsin Department of Justice School Safety Grant program.

The funds will be used to upgrade the security at all five of the Kewaskum school buildings, including installing shatter-resistant film at each of the school entrances and creating a more secure front entry for the high school.

"School safety is our first priority. Learning cannot effectively happen if students, parents, and staff do not feel that they are work-

ing in a safe environment," Kewaskum Schools Superintendent James Smasal said. "Because we are a community school district, these security enhancements will benefit not only students, but the entire community as well."

The Kewaskum School District is one of 20 school districts across the state that received a grant from the DOJ's Office of School Safety on June 13. Combined, the 20 schools will receive \$1,382,045, which will be spent on building safety improvements, as well as training for faculty and staff. More grants will be awarded

soon.

"This collaborative grant is a vital step in keeping our children, faculty and staff safe while in school," said Kewaskum Police Chief Thomas Bishop. "The Kewaskum School District and the Kewaskum Police Department have a great partnership that values safety and security in our schools and this grant funding will allow us to further that objective. I commend Gov. Scott Walker, DOJ, and the State Legislature for making school safety a priority in the State of Wisconsin."

The band has number of records on the PolkaLand and MJ recording labels. Washington County Bird Tests Positive For West Nile Virus – Protect Yourself Against Mosquito Bites

The Washington Ozaukee Public Health Department reports a dead crow found in Washington County on May 17 has tested positive for West Nile virus. This is the first common crow that tested positive for West Nile virus in Washington County since surveillance for the mosquito-transmitted virus began May 1.

"The positive bird means that residents of Washington County need to be more vigilant in their personal protective measures to prevent mosquito bites," Health Officer Kirsten Johnson said.

West Nile virus is spread to humans through the bite of an infected mosquito. Mosquitoes acquire the virus by feeding on infected birds.

"Washington County residents should be aware of West Nile virus and take some simple steps to protect themselves against mosquito bites," Johnson said. "West Nile virus is here to stay, so the best way to avoid the disease is to reduce exposure to and eliminate breeding grounds for mosquitoes."

The Washington Ozaukee Public Health Department recommends the following:

- Limit time spent outside at dawn and dusk,

when mosquitoes are most active.

- Apply an EPA-registered insect repellent to exposed skin and clothing since mosquitoes may bite through clothing.

- Make sure window and door screens are in good repair to prevent mosquito entry.

- Properly dispose of items around your property that hold water, such as tin cans, plastic containers, ceramic pots or discarded tires.

- Clean roof gutters and downspouts for proper drainage.

- Turn over wheelbarrows, wading pools, boats and canoes when not in use.

- Change the water in bird baths and pet dishes at least every three days.

- Clean and chlorinate swimming pools, outdoor saunas, and hot tubs; drain water from pool covers.

- Trim tall grass, weeds, and vines since mosquitoes use these areas to rest during hot daylight hours.

- Landscape to prevent water from pooling in low-lying areas.

The majority of people (80 percent) who are infected with West Nile virus do not get sick. Those who do become ill usually experience mild symptoms such as fever, headache, muscle ache, rash, and fatigue. Less

than 1 percent of people infected with the virus get seriously ill with symptoms that include high fever, muscle weakness, stiff neck, disorientation, mental confusion, tremors, confusion, paralysis and coma. Older adults and those with compromised immune systems are at greater risk of developing central nervous system illness that can be fatal.

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) has monitored the spread of West Nile virus since 2001 among wild birds, horses, mosquitoes, and people. During 2002, the state documented its first human infections and 52 cases were reported that year. During 2017, 48 cases of West Nile virus infection were reported among Wisconsin residents. West Nile virus infections in humans have been reported from June through October; however, most reported becoming ill with West Nile virus in August and September.

DHS will continue surveillance for West Nile virus until the end of the mosquito season. To report a sick or dead crow, blue jay, or raven, please call the Dead Bird Reporting Hotline at 1-800-433-1610.

Cases Of Interest

On May 21 at approximately 11:16 a.m., the Kewaskum Police Department and Kewaskum Fire Department Rescue Squad were dispatched to the Bonne Belle Motel, 900 Prospect Dr. in the Village of Kewaskum for an unresponsive male.

A 27-year-old man was staying at the motel with a family member. The family member attempted to wake him up that morning, but the man was unresponsive. The family

member then called 911. The first officer on scene found the male subject with no pulse and not breathing. Officers and EMTs from the Kewaskum Fire Department began CPR. West Bend Fire Department Paramedic Intercept was called to the scene to assist. After performing CPR for an extended period of time, rescue personnel were able to regain a pulse and the man was transported to the hospital.

The man was pronounced dead at the hospital two days later.

At this time this case is under investigation by the Kewaskum Police Department. No further information will be released.

WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

141 Injury Crash

On June 17 at approximately 8:56 p.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a three-vehicle injury crash on Interstate 41 southbound between U.S. Highway 45 and Holy Hill Road. Personnel from the Sheriff's Office and Richfield Fire Department responded to the scene. Upon their arrival, the occupants of the vehicles were found to have minor injuries.

The preliminary investigation showed the following: A passenger car being operated by a 39-year-old Milwaukee man was southbound on U.S. Highway 45, attempting to merge onto Interstate 41. As that vehicle began to merge, it collided with a second passenger car being operated by a 34-year-old Oak Creek woman, who was also traveling south on U.S. Highway 45, merging onto Interstate 41.

The vehicle operated by the Oak Creek woman was then pushed into the outer lane of Interstate 41, where it collided with a passenger car pulling a trailer, being operated by a 59-year-old Milwaukee man. The vehicles being operated by the 34-year-

old Oak Creek woman and the 59-year-old Milwaukee man collided with the outer guard rail of Interstate 41 and came to rest. The vehicle operated by the 39-year-old Milwaukee man continued southbound and pulled onto the shoulder a short distance later. There were no serious injuries as a result of the crash, and none of the vehicle occupants were transported for medical care.

The outer two lanes of Interstate 41 were closed for approximately one hour for investigative, rescue and cleanup operations. Germantown Police Department and Wisconsin State Patrol assisted with traffic direction and the initial investigation. The crash remains under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff's Office. Impairment does not appear to be a factor in this crash.

Wallace Lake Fatality

Merlin L. Waechter, an 81-year old Town of Trenton man, died after a weed-cutting machine capsized on Wallace Lake on June 14.

On June 14 at 12:10 p.m. the Sheriff's Office received a report from an area resident in the 7100 block of S. Wallace Lake Drive in the Town of Trenton that a weed cutting machine on Wallace Lake was capsized. The caller said the machine

was being operated by an elderly male subject approximately 20 minutes prior to the call, but the caller did not see the man anywhere. Squads were dispatched to this location and the Washington County Sheriff's Office Dive Team was paged.

The first deputy arrived approximately two minutes after being dispatched and observed the machine capsized approximately 47 yards off the shore. The deputy entered the water. A couple residents were already in the water making their way to the machine. Upon arrival at the machine the deputy went under the water and was able to feel a human appendage, but was unable to free the subject and there were no signs of life. The water depth was approximately 4 to 4.5 feet deep.

When members of the dive team arrived, they were assisted by West Bend Fire Department and Newburg Fire Department. Working together they were able to free the man at approximately 1:58 p.m. Waechter was later pronounced deceased by the Washington County Medical Examiner.

Waechter had been operating the machine removing weeds from Wallace Lake.

The incident remains under investigation and no further information is being released.

SHEBOYGAN COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

Fatal Crash

On Sunday, June 17, at approximately 3:34 p.m., the Sheboygan County Joint Dispatch Center received a 911 call of a two-vehicle, head-on crash, on State Highway 28 south of Abbott Drive in the Town of Scott.

One person died as a result of the crash. Another person was transported via Flight for Life to a local hospital. A third person was transported via Random Lake Ambulance to a local hospital.

Names had not released as of press time.

The investigation is ongoing. State Highway 28 between State Highway 144 and Abbott Drive in the Town of Scott was closed following the accident due to accident reconstruction.





Students Applying To UW System Two-Year Campuses Have Application Fees Waived

University of Wisconsin System President Ray Cross announced that application fees will be waived, effective immediately and through September 7, for students applying to any of the 13 two-year UW Colleges campuses for the upcoming fall 2018 term. This is when the largest volume of applications to the UW Colleges are usually submitted.

"Waiving the application fee demonstrates our continued commitment to the access and affordability mission of these campuses," said President Cross. "During the transitional

period of our restructuring, we want to reassure prospective students that all campuses remain open and we encourage them to apply and enroll."

As part of a restructuring initiative, the UW Colleges campuses will be joined with the System's four-year comprehensive and research institutions as branch campuses effective July 1, 2018, pending formal approval by the Higher Learning Commission later this month. A primary goal of the restructuring is to expand higher education opportunities available to students.

The UW Colleges have traditionally served as important access points for students, particularly those at risk of not being able to afford college: first-generation, low-income, and underserved communities. The restructuring plan maintains existing tuition levels for classes currently offered at the two-year institutions to keep them affordable for students and families.

The one-time application fee waivers are intended to eliminate one possible barrier for prospective students during the transition.

The Rev. Edwin Kornath started a new assignment as pastor for St. John Vianney parish in Brookfield on Tuesday, June 19.

Kornath has served as pastor of Holy Trinity and St. Michael parishes in Kewaskum for the past 13 years.

"It has just been gratifying to preach the word of God for these 13 years here," Kornath said. "I have just been humbled and honored to serve here. I have enjoyed praying with the people at both St. Michael and Holy Trinity, as well as the two chapels."


The Rev. Jacob Strand, who has been a priest for six years and recently completed advanced studies in Rome, is replacing Kornath. Strand has been named the shared administrator for Holy Trinity and St. Michael parishes.

To bid farewell to Kornath, the two parishes held a luncheon on Sunday. It was a time to reflect on some of the things that happened during Kornath's tenure here.

Under Kornath's leadership, a new gymnasium and parish center were built at Holy Trinity. In addition, St. Michael is currently undergoing capital improvements.

Air conditioning was added at the St. Matthias Chapel, and summer Masses were added there as well.

Not all of the building that has occurred has been with stone and mortar. There has been spiritual development as well. Bible study groups have met regularly at both parishes, and both the religious education and parish school programs have grown. The school added a 3K program a few years ago.

Kornath, who is 61, grew up in South Milwaukee, and his home parish was St. Josaphat Basilica, where he attended grade school.

Kornath was ordained a priest in 1984. He served as a priest at St. Rita's in West Allis, St. Agnes in Butler, St. Aloysius in West Allis, St. Matthew in Campbellsport and St. Thomas Aquinas in Waterford before coming to Kewaskum.

Kornath's new assignment will have some new challenges.

St. John Vianney parish is nearly double the size of Holy Trinity and St. Michael combined. It has roughly 2,700 parishioners, and St. John Vianney Catholic School had 368 students this past school year.

"I am honored that the archbishop trusts me to go to such a large parish. I am humbled and honored by that," Kornath said.

Kornath's new parish has a larger staff as well. There are 12 full-time lay

staff members there, as well as an associate pastor and a retired priest who helps out.

Kornath plans to retire in seven years and would like to return to Washington County at that time.

"Washington County really needs retired priests," Kornath explained.

It is also a place Kornath has grown to love.

"I love the Kettle Moraine area. The people here are very good, very practical people here. It is like that proverbial saying, 'salt of the earth' people who take their faith seriously. They take their families seriously. They love their country. They are hard-working. They know how to come in and volunteer," Kornath said. "It has been a real joy to be up here."

And Brookfield is only 40 minutes away, Kornath pointed out.

"It is never goodbye, but until we meet again," he said.

After donating, take time to enjoy a snack and beverage with others who have recently donated blood. Re-hydrate with plenty of fluids over the next 24-48 hours. Avoid

strenuous physical activity or heavy lifting for about five hours after donation.



"Momentum to improve school safety, training, and law enforcement collaboration continues with today's school safety grant awards," said Attorney General Schimel. "In just over two months, the public safety professionals at DOJ, in conjunction with dozens of educational stakeholders, established a meaningful way to improve school safety, through physical improvements to school buildings, and a focus on mental health training for school faculty."

Grant dollars are divided into two categories: the Primary School Safety Grant and Advanced School Safety Grant. DOJ's Primary School Safety Grants focus on

baseline improvements to schools, including door locks and hardening school entryways.

The Advanced School Safety Grants are prioritized to award grants on a competitive basis to schools that have met minimum security thresholds. In addition to making upgrades to school buildings, one of the School Safety Grant prerequisites is providing all full-time teachers, aides, counselors, and administrators with a minimum of three hours combined training in Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACE) and Trauma Informed Care/Trauma Sensitive Schools (TIC/TSS) before the end of the 2018-2019 school year; or demonstrate that staff has already received such training.

Highlights from the school safety grant applications include such improvements as:

- ◆ Securing school entry areas with shatter resistant film;
- ◆ Installing electronic security and surveillance systems, updated camera systems, and updated telephone/PA systems;
- ◆ Training of a new safety coordinator through the WSSCA School Safety Coordinators Certification Program, provide trauma care kits for each classroom, and the training of all staff on Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACE) and Trauma Informed Care/Trauma Sensitive Schools (TIC/TSS);
- ◆ Improving notification systems district wide, as well as creating public access to "stop the bleed" kits in locations near AED devices;
- ◆ Installing a telephone in each classroom where currently no telephone exists;
- ◆ Adding ADA/Fire code compliant locks and fencing with proper signage on doors; and
- ◆ Reconfiguring an entry way through securing the door system and having a more visible check-in area and direct communication

with an individual wishing to enter the building.

Specific building improvement details were not released at this time. If released publicly, such information could negatively impact school safety measures, enable individuals to evade school security, and endanger the safety of students, teachers, and other school employees.

Over the past two months, since 2017 Wisconsin Act 143 was signed into law, the Wisconsin Department of Justice (DOJ) has consulted with numerous stakeholders in the fields of education, security, law enforcement, and mental health. These specialists, listed at the end of this press release, worked with DOJ's own security experts to develop how the School Safety Grant Initiative will create sustainable improvements in Wisconsin schools.

"We are working to make Wisconsin schools safer through our \$100 million School Safety Plan," said Gov. Walker. "We want to help ensure that our kids, teachers, and parents are safe. Thank you to our school districts and local law enforcement for coming together to enhance school safety across the state."

Grant applicants are required to partner with law enforcement agencies to ensure that proposed expenditures, visitor protocols, and school safety plans will be effective and provide students with the safest learning environment possible.

In addition to helping keep schools safe from violent attacks, DOJ will be closely monitoring for behavior that could affect a school's ability to pay market rates for products like door locks and shatter-resistant film for glass. DOJ will review and investigate any instances of inappropriate pricing behavior so the benefits of the program are not reduced.

Receive training and resources to respond to a life-threatening event whether at home or within the community. An injured person can die from blood loss within five minutes.

No matter how rapid the arrival of professional emergency responders, bystanders will always be first on the scene. A person who is bleeding can die from blood loss within five minutes, so it is important to quickly stop the blood loss.

Bystanders can take simple steps to keep the injured person alive until appropriate medical care is available. There are some very simple actions anyone can take to help save a life.

"Stop the Bleed" is a nationwide campaign to empower individuals to act quickly and save lives. Four partners - Fond du Lac Fire/Rescue, City of Fond du Lac Police, North Fond du Lac Fire/EMS and Agnesian HealthCare - are bringing this program locally to provide lifesaving training initially to first responders and schools, and now to the general public.

Over 408,000 Wisconsin Child Sales Tax Rebate Claims

The Wisconsin Department of Revenue (DOR) is reminding eligible claimants to file for their \$100 per child sales tax rebate. Claims must be filed by July 2, but DOR encourages those who are eligible not to wait until the last minute. DOR estimates that roughly 670,000 households, with 1.22 million children in total, are eligible to file a claim.

"We're pleased to see that so many people have already filed," said Department of Revenue secretary Richard Chandler. "We encourage people to do it soon, so they don't forget. After July 2, we are unable to accept

claims, so if you're eligible, don't wait."

Have a dependent child/children? You're likely eligible for a \$100 (per child) sales tax rebate! Sound fiscal management and a strong economy resulted in a state budget surplus of almost \$400 million for the State of Wisconsin. Recently, a law was passed to return some of that surplus to taxpayers in the form of a Child Sales Tax Rebate. If you're eligible, you can claim it between May 15 and July 2.

What is the Child Sales Tax Rebate? It is a \$100 rebate for sales and use tax paid on purchases made for raising a

dependent child in 2017.* You may claim \$100 for each qualified child.

Who can claim the Child Sales Tax Rebate? If you have a qualified child, you're likely eligible. Each child's rebate may only be claimed by one individual. A qualified child must be:

- Under age 18 on December 31, 2017
- A dependent of the claimant for tax year 2017
- A Wisconsin resident on December 31, 2017
- A United States citizen

How do I claim my \$100 (per child) Child Sales Tax Rebate?
The fastest and most convenient way is to go to childtaxrebate.wi.gov

where you will find more details, frequently asked questions and information. You can apply for the Child Sales Tax Rebate online 24/7 through July 2.

If you don't have internet access, you may file a claim by phone at (608) 266-KIDS (5437), Monday-Friday from 7:45 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Please keep in mind that going online will be faster and more convenient.

Close-Knit Family

Janz learned how to knit when she was 7 or 8 years old when she attended Holy Trinity School in Newburg.

Janz enjoys knitting more things than just socks, though.

"I like the challenge of taking a written pattern and making it into something. It's fun to play with the colors," Janz said.

"It can be frustrating if you are new at it because you are trying too hard. But if you don't have to think about it, and it just happens, then it's easy," Janz said.

"Bigger yarn and bigger needles get heavier, and sometimes that is harder on the hands. Smaller needles are easier on the hands but harder on the eyes as you get older," Janz said.

Last week's "Stitch N' Pitch" theme night was part of a national program that major league baseball teams hold each year. Janz attended her first "Stitch N' Pitch" Brewers game three years ago.

The Brewers lost the game last Monday to the Chicago Cubs, with a final score of 7-2 in 11 innings.


Still, Janz and her knitting friends had fun. They each received a special Bernie Brewer bobble head for their participation. And they all had gotten some knitting accomplished.

"Hopefully I will get to go to more Pitch N' Stitch events," Janz said.





Long-Time Racing Fan Surprises Goeden With Look-Alike Car

Back in 1976, as a 10-year old racing fan, Michael Moore got a ride from Kewaskum's Willie "The Master" Goeden after a night of racing at the Cedarburg race track. He never forgot that experience.

Moore, then of Wisconsin and currently a resident of Columbia, Georgia, after retiring from the military, more than paid back the gesture in an emotional reunion on June 15 at Road America near Elkhart Lake.

Goeden, who piloted the No. 72 late model and raced seven nights a week in his heyday, was taken to the track under false pretenses.

"We told him there was someone to see him who was a big racing fan," Wendi Dreher, one of Goeden's daughters, said.

Little did Goeden know Moore, who now competes in road racing, had painted his car just like the Camaro Goeden drove in 1987.

"Moore read up on the car and built one like it," Dave Goeden said.

The entire Goeden family - wife Jeanne, sons Dave, who pitted for his dad, and Don, a very successful modified race car driver, and daughters Wendi, Candi Block and Nanci Czuppa - was on hand to witness the surprise.

"They had the car covered," Dreher said, adding that when it was removed, Goeden could hardly believe his eyes.

"He was very emotional.

He started tearing up," she said about her dad, and he wasn't the only person to show his feelings.

Moore cried too, according to those present. All the family members agreed it was amazing to see how one simple act of kindness brought so much joy to the two men and others.

"Mike was hit in the heart ... Dad was hit in the heart. It was really cool," Dave Goeden said.

His mother agreed. "He was overwhelmed, and he thoroughly enjoyed the day," she said.

"He [Moore] was only in Cedarburg for a short time" when he was a kid, Jeanne Goeden said. "That he remembered the ride in the car ... It must have meant an awful lot to that young man."

Moore concurred after solving the mystery of how he got to ride in the Number 72 car.

"We went to the Cedarburg track every Wednesday night, and they drew tickets," he said from Road America on Saturday, explaining the winner got to ride around the track with the fastest qualifier.

On one of those nights, Moore's sister's friend had her ticket drawn, but she was too afraid to ride in the car, according to Moore, who said, "The next thing I knew, I was standing next to Willie Goeden."

After retiring from a 28-year military career, Moore had some time on his hands and along with his brother-in-law, Marc Duff, built the car Moore races.

"This past winter, I paint-

ed it to Willie's paint scheme," Moore said.

When asked about the experience at Road America, Moore said, "It is bigger than life to meet one of your childhood heroes."

Moore added that hearing Goeden's stories "was phenomenal."

The Goeden family showed their gratitude by hosting a Wisconsin-product snack party.

"They [Moore and his crew] gobbled up the [Kewaskum Frozen Foods] summer sausage and cheese today," Dave Goeden said, reporting Georgia residents have difficulty finding Jays Potato Chips in Georgia, so his sister, Nanci, brought a big selection for them to take home after the weekend of racing.

Czuppa was able to get in contact with Moore through Facebook, and she organized the event for her dad, who said he was very grateful for her efforts.

Moore, who races in the SCCA (Sports Car Club of America) had become a lifelong fan of Goeden's after the ride in the race car. Now the Goedens have become family.

"The Goedens adopted me. I'm now the Goeden's sixth child. We are one big family," he said.

Moore, who has only raced seven or eight shows this year, said he and his crew are already coming back to Wisconsin next year. It's a good bet many of the Goedens will be in the crowd cheering him on.
