Kewaskum To Hold Fireworks On Tuesday, July 3

The Village of Kewaskum will hold its annual fireworks display at River Hill Park on Tuesday, July 3, at dusk, approximately 9:30 p.m. The rain date is July 4.

To reserve spots to view the fireworks, spectators are allowed to lay tarps on the hill starting at 6 a.m. on Saturday, July 1.

On July 3, the band "Shut the Front Door" will perform in the large shelter on top of the hill from 6:30 p.m. until midnight.

Food and beverages will be served at the park, beginning at about 5 p.m. Hamburgers, brats, fries and cheese fries are among the offerings. Beer and soda will be sold as well. Proceeds benefit the Kewaskum Firefighters Association.

In addition, the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club will sell popcorn and ice cream.

No carry-ins are allowed, and sparklers are prohibited.

Following the fireworks, cars parked on the west side of the Milwaukee River will be directed west on Main Street, and cars on the east side of the river will be directed to go east.

Once the River Hill Park parking lot is cleared out, cars parked in the grass lot on Prospect Street will be directed to go either north on Parkview Drive or east on Highway 28.

Bandstand Receives Encore Treatment

A crowd of about 75 people gathered on Tuesday, June 19, as the bandstand in River Hill Park was dedicated to the memory of Larry Ammel, a former band director at Kewaskum High School who died on April 16, 2017.

"He impacted the lives of countless young people during his successful tenure as the Kewaskum High School band director," Village President Kevin Scheunemann said. "After the conclusion of his career he continued to

serve the community in a variety of ways including a term on the Village Board and being a leader of the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club."

Ammel also led musicians at Peace Church. He founded the Kewaskum Area Arts Council, the Kewaskum Big Band and the Music In The Park program.

The bandstand dates back to 1938, when the Village of Kewaskum received a \$12,355 grant from the Works Progress Administration to improve River Hill Park. In addition to building a bandstand, the grant money was used

to seed and grade the park, add riprap, create landscaping, and construct fireplaces and bathhouses.

In its early years, the bandstand was used for concerts and gatherings at the park. Later, the bandstand was used for the Independence Day celebration and the Kewaskum Firemen's Picnic. It also has served as a venue for wedding photos.

However, in recent years the bandstand fell into disrepair. In 2016, the Village Board considered razing the structure.

Work Continues On Reigle Family Park

Trucks could be seeing coming and going from Reigle Family Park last Friday as about 140 loads of crushed asphalt millings were delivered to Kewaskum's newest park.

The millings will be used as a base for a parking lot in the village park. The asphalt material is from Edgewood Road, where a village street project is currently underway.

"It is really exciting to see things come together as the park is developed," said Nathan Scheel, president of the Kewaskum Athletic Association (KAA).

The KAA and the Kewaskum Youth Soccer Organization (KYSO) are responsible for developing the new 31-acre village park, which was created last October.

The estimated price tag for the park is about \$2.1 million. About half of that has been raised, and many in the community are stepping forward with in-kind donations.

For example, Stark Pavement Corp. donated the milled asphalt, valued at about \$30,000 to the park.

"We greatly appreciate

that we were able to work together. We didn't have to truck the product all the way back to Brookfield, and we are trying to expedite getting the park done to make the residents and park users happy," said Stan Maertz, who works for Stark Pavement Corp. and lives in Farmington.

The support from the community gives new meaning to the term "community park," according to KYSO President Dan Fischer.

"We appreciate all the in-kind donations we have been receiving. They are really helping to make this park a reality," Fischer said.

Stoney Hill Specialties reworked its schedule and helped pile the asphalt grindings and tree brush at a reduced cost.

In addition, the Kewaskum School District donated excess topsoil from its construction project to the new park.

Work on the park began in January, when trees were logged from the park. Once warmer weather arrived in March, the tree stumps were ground and brush was piled up within the park.

Kevin Parish, a civil engineer for Quam

Engineering, donated his time to create a conceptual plan and grading plan for the park.

The conceptual plan for Reigle Family Park includes nine soccer fields, two baseball fields, concession stands, restrooms and parking areas. Also included are nature trails, children's playground, fishing pond and picnic spaces.

The grading plan was sent to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) earlier this week. That DNR must approve that plan before any excavation can begin.

Planning is underway for a trail that will go around the park's two-acre pond. Colin Duren, a local Boy Scout, has adopted that path as his Eagle Scout project.

"The park is definitely an awesome project. If you haven't been down to the pond area, it is definitely worth the walk down there to see how beautiful the land is and everything the park has to offer," Fischer said.

Moraine Park's Medical Laboratory Technician Program Earns 10-Year Accreditation

Moraine Park Technical College's Medical Laboratory Technician (MLT) program has been awarded a 10-year accreditation, the maximum time frame that can be granted.

To earn this accreditation, Moraine Park had to meet the standards set by the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Science (NAACLS) and had to demonstrate compliance by having policies that support students' needs, teaching excellence and continuous monitoring of academic data.

Obtaining this accreditation required a two-step process. The first step, self-study, was an overview that explained how the College complies with the NAACLS standards. The second step, an on-site visit, verified the

compliance. Any deficiencies found through the process would require a plan of correction by the College, however, Moraine Park's report did not indicate any deficiencies. As a result, they earned a full 10-year accreditation.

"This is an extreme honor," said Linda Bau, medical laboratory technician program director and instructor at Moraine Park. "This accreditation recognizes our efforts to support the laboratory profession by providing our students and future laboratorians with the best educational experience we can."

Students who graduate from an accredited program are eligible to take the National Certification Exam to become a certified Medical Laboratory Technician, which is a common requirement

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

Moraine Park Holds GED/HSED Graduation Ceremony

Moraine Park Technical College held its 26th annual GED/HSED graduation ceremony on June 7. For the 2017-18 school year, 141 students received their General Education Development (GED) and High School Equivalency Diploma (HSED) certificates.

LaToya Singleton of Kewaskum, Nicholas Martinez of Fond du Lac, and Delilah Hernandez of West Bend served as student speakers at the ceremony.

Singleton spoke on the importance of putting herself first through this journey.

"I remember thinking that I've already gotten so far in life without it, and began wondering why I had decided to go through this all over again," said Singleton. "I decided right at that very moment that I was going through it because I deserved it. I wanted my husband and family to be proud of me, I wanted to show them that they should never give up and that it's never too late to pursue your dreams. Most importantly, I wanted to feel proud of myself."

Singleton will continue her education at Moraine Park this fall, she has chosen early childhood as her program of study.

Martinez shared his story of immigrating from Mexico when he was 15 and his struggle to adapt to a culture and language that were foreign to him.

"My dad passed away

when I was 11 years old, so I had to start working at a young age to help my mom with expenses. I could not find a better future in my country, so I decided to come to the United States," said Martinez. "When I came here everything was different—the language, culture, and lifestyle. I was in a foreign land. I worked at a farm for many years and took English classes at Moraine Park until I felt ready to start studying for my GED."

Martinez was also presented with an opportunity to join one of Moraine Park Technical College's Economic & Workforce Development (EWD) boot camps. The boot camp programs teach skills that are unique to a particular career pathway and are designed to help combat the skilled worker shortage. Martinez accepted the opportunity and began working towards his welding degree, in conjunction with his GED.

"I spent every day from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. in the classroom. On May 25th, I graduated from the welding program and since then I have been working full-time as a welder," said Martinez. "This fall, I am planning on going back to school to continue my education. I believe education is the key that will open many doors."

Hernandez also spoke about her journey and explained that, for her, the time it took to get here isn't

a factor. "Three weeks before the due date of my third child, I decided to make a change and be consistent. I attended the eight-hour orientation class because I was determined to obtain my GED," said Hernandez. "It has been 15 long years since my high school class graduated without me, but the length of time is not the relevant factor for me. What is relevant is that it has been accomplished and that I made it happen."

And, Hernandez isn't stopping here. She has plans to pursue a nursing degree, with a goal to be an emergency department nurse.

"The opportunities in the nursing industry are vast," said Hernandez. "I plan on working throughout my career, taking it day by day, and enjoying the journey towards my future."

Singleton and Martinez were recipients of a Moraine Park Foundation Basic Education Scholarship, this is the eighth year that the \$500 scholarships have been awarded to one or more students pursuing further education at Moraine Park.

In order to earn their GED/HSED, the students had to pass all four subject portions of the nationally recognized GED tests, as well as meet requirements in employability, digital literacy, health, and civics.

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

But Ammel did not want the community to lose the iconic gazebo. He spearheaded an effort for the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club to restore and refurbish the bandstand.

First, the Kiwanis Club replaced the roof.

Then Colin DeYoung, a member of Boy Scout troop 744, decided to paint the structure as his Eagle Project. Colin, who recently turned 16, worked last summer to restore the bandstand.

To complete the project, Colin pressure washed the bandstand, scraped it and then painted it. In addition, Colin replaced some of the boards and fixed the steps.

"It turned out to be more work than what we thought at first, but it worked out great," Colin said.

It took about 18 people to do over 200 hours of work to complete the project. Most of the workers were Scouts, but several Kiwanis members volunteered as well.

"We had to line up pressure washers and go to the Village Hall and get keys, so it was a lot of running around. It was hard for me to find rides everywhere, working around my schedule and my parents' schedule, and our troop schedule," Colin said.

The biggest challenge was determining the cost

and figuring how to pay for the supplies, according to Colin. He appreciates Heberer Bros. for providing scaffolding and the village for providing water.

The Unanimous Declaration Of The

When in the Course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. — That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, — That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security. — Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid world.

He has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

He has forbidden his Governors to pass Laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his Assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other Laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of Representation in the Legislature, a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their Public Records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused for a long time, after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected, whereby the Legislative Powers, incapable of Annihilation, have returned to the People at large for their exercise; the State remaining in the mean time exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.

He has endeavoured to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the Laws for Naturalization of Foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migrations hither, and raising the conditions of new Appropriations of Lands.

He has obstructed the Administration of Justice by refusing his Assent to Laws for establishing Judiciary Powers.

He has made Judges dependent on his Will alone for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of New Offices, and sent hither swarms of Officers to harass our people and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, Standing Armies without the Consent of our legislatures.

He has affected to render the Military independent of and superior to the Civil Power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his Assent to their Acts of pretended Legislation:

May we think of freedom, not as the right to do as we please, but as the opportunity to do what is right.

— Peter Marshall

Thirteen United States Of America

For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us:

For protecting them, by a mock Trial from punishment for any Murders which they should commit on the Inhabitants of these States:

For cutting off our Trade with all parts of the world:

For imposing Taxes on us without our Consent:

For depriving us in many cases, of the benefit of Trial by Jury:

For transporting us beyond Seas to be tried for pretended offences:

For abolishing the free System of English Laws in a neighbouring Province, establishing therein an Arbitrary government, and enlarging its Boundaries so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these Colonies

For taking away our Charters, abolishing our most valuable Laws and altering fundamentally the Forms of our Governments:

For suspending our own Legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War against us.

He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.

He is at this time transporting large Armies of foreign Mercenaries to compleat the works of death, desolation, and tyranny, already begun with circumstances of Cruelty & Perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the Head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow Citizens taken Captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their Country, to become the executioners of their friends and Brethren, or to fall themselves by their Hands.

He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavoured to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian Savages whose known rule of warfare, is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions.

In every stage of these Oppressions We have Petitioned for Redress in the most humble terms: Our repeated Petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A Prince, whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have We been wanting in attentions to our British brethren. We have warned them from time to time of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity, which denounces our Separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, Enemies in War, in Peace Friends.

We, therefore, the Representatives of the united States of America, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name, and by Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these united Colonies are, and of Right ought to be Free and Independent States, that they are Absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain, is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as Free and Independent States, they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, establish Commerce, and to do all other Acts and Things which Independent States may of right do. — And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes, and our sacred Honor.



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
