Reigle Family Park Receives \$100,000 Grant From West Bend Mutual

Reigle Family Park, the newest park in the Village of Kewaskum, has been awarded a \$100,000 grant from West Bend Mutual Insurance Company.

"We are extremely grateful for this very generous donation and excited about what it means for the entire community," said Dan Fischer, president of the Kewaskum Youth Soccer Organization (KYSO).

The KYSO and the Kewaskum Athletic Association (KAA) are responsible for developing the new 31-acre village park, which is located on Edgewood Road just north of Highway H in Kewaskum. The two nonprofit organizations came together to

create needed athletic fields for youth in the Kewaskum area.

When completed, Reigle Family Park will provide needed athletic fields for the Kewaskum area, as well as recreational space for all of Washington County to enjoy. The conceptual plan for the park includes two softball/baseball diamonds, nine soccer fields, concession stands, restrooms and parking areas. Also included are nature trails, children's playground, fishing pond and picnic spaces.

The Mutual grant funds will be used toward the first phase of the project, which includes creating soccer fields, parking and walking trails.

School Board Discusses Community Baseball

— Board Debates Allowing Beer On School Grounds

Kewaskum High School's new baseball and softball fields should be ready for play next spring.

At Monday night's School Board meeting, the board discussed whether the Kewaskum

A's men's baseball team should be allowed to use the baseball field...and sell beer on school grounds during its games.

Jason Strobel, representing the A's, told the board that the team has been using the same field that the high school

team uses at Kiwanis Park and sells beer, without any problems.

"One of our big fundraisers throughout the year is that we make money on serving alcohol. In return, those monies can be given back to the school for improvements on the field or every day maintenance. If we do not serve alcohol, that monetary value that we provide will not be as great," Strobel told the board.

School Superintendent James Smasal said that board policy states that the school administrator can decide whether alcohol can be sold on school grounds.

"I'm not comfortable with that, I don't think that should be administration's decision to serve alcohol," School Board

Member Jim Leister said.


Beer and alcohol have not been sold on Kewaskum school grounds before.

School Board members Jim Leister and Tim Ramthun voiced opposition to the proposal and requested that the board vote on the issue.

"You don't have to approve it. Board policy has it that it is the district administrator's right to decide on an agreement with it, and I brought it forward for your input to see how everybody feels about it. It is not going to be voted on," Smasal said.

"How do you make that judgement? This is a pretty hot topic to be just an administrative decision," Leister replied.

Local Veteran Plays In Wounded Warrior Game

A Campbellsport native and his brother-in-law from Brownsville were two of 30 players competing in the Wounded Warriors Amputee softball game in Fond du Lac held on Saturday, Aug. 11.

Josh Wege is a Campbellsport native. He graduated from Waucousta Lutheran Grade School and Winnebago Lutheran Academy before going in the Marine Corps.

During his time with the Marine Corps, Wege went to Afghanistan. While serving in Afghanistan, Wege was injured when his vehicle hit a roadside bomb in October 2009. The injury caused the loss of both of Wege's feet.

Upon returning to the United States, Wege made a great recovery. He stays positive and active and doesn't let anything stand in his way. Wege's attitude and athletic ability landed him a spot on the Wounded Warrior Amputee Softball team. He has been playing with the team for more than seven years now.

On the team with Wege is his brother-in-law Saul Bosquez. He is married to Wege's sister Jess.

Bosquez is an Army veteran who served from 2006-2009. Bosquez was deployed to Baghdad in March 2007 and eventually lost his left leg in combat.

Bosquez then returned to his home in Northern Virginia where he got a phone call in 2011 from another veteran who was organizing a slow-pitch softball camp for amputees and other veterans.

"I figured it would be a good experience," Bosquez said. "I got used to it and after that week, the guys were wondering what we could do next. Once we got back home, we got an email from the guy who brought us down there and he told us some people did some fundraising and now we were going to have an event at George Mason University."

Since that inaugural game in 2011, the WWAST has traveled to 40 states, including Hawaii, and plays about 20-30 events every year.

"Most of the guys on the team played high school or college ball, so we're competitive," Bosquez said. "We have a pretty decent roster and play nearly 100 games a year, and we win about 80 percent every season. I think that shows how competitive we can be and what we can do."

The WWAST has competed in the McQuade softball tournament in North Dakota, which is the biggest softball tournament in the country. The team has taken third place the past two seasons in their bracket.

"We are the only amputee team like this in the world," Bosquez said. "The majority of the guys play in leagues back home so they get used to playing against able-bodied guys. Most of the guys who go back to those teams are normally one of the best guys on their team."

Bosquez added that these games are a great way to show the world that despite their injuries, they can still compete at a high level with other athletes.

"I always try to think of it from the other team's aspect," Bosquez said. "I don't know how I'd feel playing against guys missing body parts who are doing just as well or beating us. I'm on the other side, so it's nice to provide that [challenge]."

Bosquez said one of the biggest benefits of being on the team is what it can offer the players, both on and off the field.

"The benefits are the camaraderie and the physical therapy we get, but the biggest thing is the mental therapy it provides," he said. "You are around guys like yourself, so for me I get two to three weekends a month to hang out with other guys who are like me. There's not anything you're going through or have gone through that someone else on the team hasn't, so you can

always talk about it with them. It's better than therapy."

What started out as a fundraiser for the veterans has now turned into much more.

"This started out for us veterans, but now we're in the position to give back," Bosquez said. "People who donate to us, that money is not just going towards us playing softball. We've donated to other organization who needed equipment or organizations that deal with some of the health issues we deal with as amputees."

One way the team gives back is hosting its annual weekend camp for kids, which just finished in Missouri.

"Every year it gets bigger and better and this year was no exception," Bosquez said. "That's our favorite thing to do because we bring in 20 kids who are amputees themselves. I'm going to continue with this as long as I can."

"We are very proud of this project and proud to be a part of it," said Christopher Zwygart, vice president and chief legal officer of West Bend Mutual. "These types of projects don't come up that often. The Trust Board immediately took great interest in it and what it means for the community."

Zwygart said that West Bend Mutual's Trust Board took an interest in the park for a number of reasons.

"When the board reviewed it, we were very pleased to see such a great project where families can come together. It really promotes building families and building better citizens," Zwygart said.

"We were also impressed by how the community has already come together around it," he added.

The entire park's history has been based on community support. The

park started out with a donation of 31 acres of undeveloped land by the family of James D. Reigle, former president and CEO of his family's business, Regal Ware, Inc., headquartered in Kewaskum.

Since then, community members have rallied together. A committee of 12 people was formed to plan the park.

"We were impressed by their well organized proposal, but also by the number of people who came together in support of it. These are folks that are volunteers and they have done such a nice job of putting together a very comprehensive plan for the benefit of the community," Zwygart said.

Work began on the park in January, when logging occurred.

Kevin Parish, an engineer for Quam Engineering, donated his time for the park project

and created a concept plan and a grading plan for the park.

In June, millings from a village road project on Edgewood Road were donated to the park. Topsoil from the school district's building project also was donated.

Colin Duren, a local Boy Scout, is creating a walking trail around the park's two-acre pond as part of his Eagle Scout

project. A local electrician has come forward to donate the conduit, wire, lamps and labor to install lighting around the pond trail.

A group of Scouts will join Colin at the park this weekend to help clear brush from the trail. Colin is still looking for donations of stone and other materials for the project.

"Colin's trail project is

really complementing the park nicely. People are going to be able to come out to the park and walk around, go fishing, have a picnic and appreciate nature. This is such a great thing that the entire community will be able to enjoy," said Aaron Laatsch, a park committee volunteer who is overseeing the trail plans.

The Reigle Family Park Committee is currently reviewing bids to begin excavation. The hope is that the soccer fields can be created this fall so that youth can begin using them next year.

The West Bend Mutual grant is helping make that a possibility.

"I was unbelievably excited when I heard the news that we were being awarded a grant from West Bend Mutual. This donation has brought a new energy to the Reigle Park project. I'm very passionate about this park and the entire Kewaskum community. It's been so enjoyable to be a part of the park committee and to see people coming together to make this project a reality," said Amy Uhlig, a KYSO volunteer who serves on the park committee and who also is a West Bend Mutual em-

ployee.

Giving back to its community is one of West Bend Mutual's core values.

"When we were formed as a company 125 years ago. At that time, a large fire swept through West Bend. Back then, insurance was not widely available, so the community came together and formed us. So we were formed out of a community need, so we are happy to share our success with local organizations that can help make our community even better," Zwygart said.

"West Bend Mutual has always been a very generous supporter of local nonprofit organizations. I feel very fortunate to work for such a great organization that believes in giving back to its surrounding communities," Uhlig added.

The park committee continues to seek both monetary and in-kind donations as the park develops.

"We are so excited about Reigle Family Park and what it means for the community. We really appreciate all of West Bend Mutual's support and are looking forward to begin the next phase developing the park," KAA President-Nathan Scheel said.

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New "Jorge Taco" Truck in Dundee

If you've been to Dundee this summer, you've probably noticed the brightly-colored taco truck that is parked across the street from Camp Dundee. Since opening in mid-June, Jorge Tacos has been a hit with area campers and locals alike.

The truck is owned and operated by two Milwaukee natives: Jim Peterson, who runs Camp Dundee across the street, and Jorge Cruz who runs the truck as a passion project. Peterson noticed the growing numbers of street vendors in Milwaukee, and figured that a taco truck would fit into the high vacation environment of the Dundee area. He teamed up with Cruz to start Jorge Taco. Cruz prepares, cooks, and serves the food at Jorge Taco, driving up from the

South Side of Milwaukee every day to do so.

Right now, the truck serves a variety of tacos, tamales, and rice sides. There are vegetarian taco options available as well. Quesadillas and fajitas will be joining the menu soon.

The truck is open Wednesday through Sunday, from 11 a.m. to 8 p.m. Though it is capable of moving, it primarily stays at its location across from Camp Dundee so that it is easy to find.

Jorge Taco will stay open through the fall season. Once the weather gets too rough, Cruz and his food will move into Camp Dundee for weekly specials.

Fred J. Schleif, 59, widely known Town of Auburn farmer, residing on Route 3, Campbellsport, was killed instantly at about 6 p.m. on Saturday, August 7, in a highway accident on County Trunk V, near his home about 2 1/2 miles north of Kewaskum. Schleif was riding on the bar between a tractor and threshing machine which it was pulling south on the county road. Threshing had just been completed at the Schleif farm and the machine was being towed to the farm of a neighbor, Al Prost. The tractor was driven by another neighbor, Walter Meyer of Route 3, Campbellsport, owner of the threshing outfit. As the tractor reached the top of the hill, known as Schleif's hill, Schleif jumped from the moving vehicle just as a north-bound truck came over the hill from the opposite direction. Meyer told the coroner that Schleif had jumped off the tractor to remove a red warning flag and stake which had been set at the side of the road to warn motorists that threshing wagons were coming out of the field. Schleif apparently saw the truck, but failed to see a big log trailer which was attached to the truck. As he dashed behind the truck to get the flag he was struck on the head by a crow bar on the empty log rack.

E, Fond du Lac, in July 1917, and was one of the first companies to go overseas last fall and take part in the big drives on the Western Front this summer.

- Board Debates Allowing Beer On School Grounds

Smasal pointed out that currently beer is sold at Kiwanis Park in the presence of minors.

"If you are concerned about this and kids, then let's look at Kiwanis Park," Smasal said. "The park has a lot more kids on a Sunday afternoon. It is pretty well controlled here versus at the park, where you've got kids swimming, playing soccer, playing softball, walking and playing on the playground. If we are worried about kids and alcohol, then we should get it out of Kiwanis Park."

The board has previously discussed the issue.

"We discussed it multiple times, but we didn't take a head count, we didn't have the board put a line in the sand and say we are going to do this or we are not going to do this," Leister said.

School Board member Mary Miller said she supports the idea of allowing the A's to sell beer on school grounds.

"I think there is a controlled situation here," she said. "There is a parental responsibility for that."

School Board President Troy Hanson said he also is in favor.

"If you are looking for a separation of alcohol and school, there is a separation between when they are having games and when we have school. That is the responsible thing to do. We have to look at it from a global perspective," Hanson said.

The Kewaskum A's play games on weekends, with most games

on Sundays at 1 or 1:30 p.m., according to Strobel.

With high school baseball being switched from a summer sport to spring, there will be about one month overlap between high school baseball and the A's season. The A's begin their season in early May, and high school spring baseball is done June 15.

The A's have been playing on the high school field at Kiwanis Park for 18 years and there have never been any problems, Strobel said.

Strobel said the A's play at community parks except in Slinger, where they play on the high school field, and beer is sold there.

"I don't care if Slinger does it. We are sending the wrong message to kids. It's like saying don't drink, unless it's Sunday night on my premises," Leister said.

School Board Member Sue Miller said she thought it was acceptable as long as IDs were checked.

"My concern is if there is underage drinking. I think it should be re-evaluated if something like that should occur," she said.

Ramthun suggested the topic be placed on next month's agenda so the board can vote on it.

Other School Matters

Also at Monday night's meeting, community member Neal Weare addressed the board and said he did not appreciate not getting a return phone call from School

Board members Jay Fischer, Mark Sette or Sue Miller.

"I think that is part of your responsibilities and duties," Weare said.

Smasal said both he and Hanson told Weare had both returned Weare's calls, and at the meeting that School Board policy is that only the president and superintendent can speak to the public about School Board matters.

"Why don't we take their phone numbers off the site, if they are going to take phone calls and only leave the board president and the superintendent on there," Ware suggested.

Also at the meeting, Ramthun requested that the previous month's minutes reflect that he requested that the board's agendas that are published include more detailed information.

"I had questions about the cellphone clarification, as well as qualifications on the loan. We need more specificity in our agenda posting so more people are aware what we talk about before we talk about it," Ramthun said.

When the board voted on the payroll, Ramthun voted against approving the payroll because he felt it was a conflict of interest that board member Jay Fisher's wife, was hired to provide marketing for the district.

Smasal said that the board had unanimously voted to approve hiring Kathleen Fisher two months ago to provide marketing services for the district.

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

The football classes of 2019, '20 and '21 will get the honor of playing the first game on the new, artificial surface at the Doc Mitchell Athletic Complex this Friday night, squaring off with Milwaukee Lutheran of the Woodland-East Conference.

Crews worked into the night on August 11 and 12 in an effort to finish the \$1.4 million project, and Piittmann said Sunday he was hoping his team will get to practice on the new surface this week.

The Indians participated in a four-team scrimmage on August 10, and Piittmann said the experience was good for the Indians.

"We definitely showed we are young and inexperienced," he said, but, "Everything we saw is fixable."

Of the three opponents, New Berlin Eisenhower seemed to be the best, according to the coach, who said, "They graduated a lot, but they are still good."

In all three parts of the scrimmage, "The (Kewaskum's) defense was good. They played pretty solid."

The offense, on the other hand, is a work in progress. "It's coming along, but we lost a lot of excellent players," Piittmann said.

Piittmann has determined the following starters for the first game against non-conference foe, Milwaukee Lutheran. On offense, he said it will be Jonathan Steger (220 pounds), Colton Miller (225), all-conference tackle Jon Leister (280) and Hunter Grady (200) or Ben Leister (240) in the line.

Several are slated to see action at end or wide receiver where "We have a lot of tall guys to put out there, including Dylan Maechle (6-3, 175), Joe (6-6, 190) and Josh Bocher, (6-4, 175) Jed Ermer (5-11, 160), Sam Schultz (6-6, 200) and Sam Lemler (5-11, 215). Joe Bocher is the tallest at 6-foot 6 inches, but several of the others are

between 6-2 and 6-4.

All will be good targets for junior quarterback Ty Cook (6-0, 160), who will start at the position but is being pushed by 5-10, 190-pound sophomore Michael Daniel, who is a good runner. "Daniel will get a lot of reps," according to Piittmann, who said his fullbacks will be Eli Bartelt (5-10, 165) and Lucas Christenson (6-0, 195). At tailback, expect to see J.J. Thull (5-9, 160) and Kyle Bath (5-8, 170), who hasn't played football since his freshman year but is making a strong bid to get a lot of playing time.

Defensively, Jon Leister, Miller and Grady will be up front, with the line-backing crew to include Bartelt, Christenson, Kannon Muckerheide (5-9, 195) and Trenton Riekkoff (6-1, 260), who moved into the district last winter, as lineback-

ers. In the secondary, the starters look to be "a mix of guys, including Ermer, Sam Melzer, Bath and sophomore Trevor Degnitz (5-10, 150), who is out for the sport for the first time.

With the departure of Cade Peterson, there were some big shoes to fill in the kicker spot, but senior Kyle Loehr switched over from soccer and will be the place kicker and kickoff man, while Maechle will handle the punting chores, according to the coach.

The coach staff scouted Milwaukee Lutheran on August 11, and Piittmann said the Red Knights do not have the size his team has but he was impressed with the starting quarterback (Danny Perdzock) and one of the running backs. "It will be an interesting matchup," he said.

Game time is 7 p.m.

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

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Schlafer, Schmidt, Sorce, Hoepfner, Peterson Claim PDTR A-Main Triumphs

A photo finish and two first-time winners highlighted A-main racing action in Plymouth Dirt Track Racing at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds in Plymouth on Saturday, Aug. 11.

Despite a brief rain shower which hit the track in the late afternoon hours, racing went on as scheduled with a fast and wide surface greeting all competitors and providing for some hotly contested racing action throughout the evening.

In the 25-lap Richard's of Dunbar 360 Sprint Car headliner, two-time PDTR champion Danny Schlafer of Sussex held off a late charge from 2017 PDTR champ Brandon McMullen of Oshkosh by a just a few feet to claim a photo-finish victory.

Cleveland's Justin Schmidt rolled to his fourth 25-lap Gasroots Project Late Model A-main triumph of the 2018 campaign. Dan Sorce of West Allis claimed his first Klips & Tips Grand Na-

tional A-main victory of the season. Marcus Hoepfner of Hartford earned his first career Cellcom B Mod A-main triumph and Matt Peterson made the long trip from Escanaba, MI, pay off with his first career 15-lap Kristine Hartmann Pleasant View Realty Micro Sprint A-main win.

Schlafer started the Sprint Car A-main event from the pole flanked by West Bend's Paul Pokorski on the outside of the front row. Shortly after the initial drop of the green flag, Ben Schmidt of Howards Grove jumped the cushion and flipped his machine in turn one. He emerged uninjured.

Following a complete restart, Schlafer bolted out to the lead along the inside line while Pokorski settled into second along the high groove. On lap two, the caution flag was displayed for a spin in turn four that involved Dick Kaiser of Milwaukee and Shane Wenninger of Kewaskum.

When the race resumed, third starter Justin Miller of Plymouth ducked low to power past Pokorski into the runner-up spot on lap five before McMullen, who started ninth, worked past eighth starter and 2010 PDTR Sprint Car champion and point leader Kurt Davis of South Milwaukee to gain the fourth spot on lap eight.

Schlafer encountered slow traffic on lap 11, which allowed Miller to cut the gap significantly. On lap 12, the low-riding Miller pulled ahead of Schlafer briefly. However, the hard-charging Schlafer battled back to regain the top spot on the following lap along the outside groove.

Meanwhile, McMullen was continuing his march to the front of the pack as he worked under Pokorski to seize third place with a low move on lap 12. By lap 18, Schlafer had built up a half-straightaway cushion over Miller. The third caution flag of the race then appeared on lap 19 for a spin in turn four involving Al Schlafer of Sussex and Shane Wenninger.

Following the restart, McMullen powered in to pass Miller for second on lap 20 and quickly set his sights on Schlafer as the laps wound down. McMullen utilized the extreme low line to gain on Schlafer, who held tight to the cushion over the final six circuits, to move into position to challenge for the lead.

On the final lap, McMullen pulled even with Schlafer in turn two. However, Schlafer got a big run in turns three and four to maintain the top spot heading to the finish line where he nipped McMullen by a few feet to notch his second PDTR A-main victory of the 2018 season, 21st PDTR Sprint Car A-main win of his career to tie Donny Goeden for the all-time lead in the 360 Sprint Car division at Plymouth and 50th career Midwest Sprint Car Association A-main triumph.

McMullen had to settle for second, Pokorski gained two spots over the final six laps to finish third, Miller was fourth and 10th starter Kevin Karnitz of West Bend placed fifth.

The Late Model A-main featured plenty of action as four different drivers exchange the top spot during the action-packed race. Milwaukee's Turk Letizia jumped out to the early lead before a two-car spin in turn four slowed the pace on the opening lap.

On lap two, 2016 PDTR Late Model champ Tim Buhler of Greenbush used the high groove to pressure Letizia for the lead. One lap later, sixth starter Jim Schmidt of

Cleveland joined in to duel three wide with Letizia and Buhler for the lead in turn four with Buhler emerging on top and Jim Schmidt slipping into second.

After the second caution flag of the race was displayed for debris in turn one on lap three, Buhler built up a half-straightaway cushion over Jim Schmidt and Justin Schmidt, who started third.

As Buhler encountered lapped traffic on lap 18, Jim and Justin Schmidt cut the gap substantially before disaster struck for Buhler when he spun in turn two while attempting to move past a slower car to bring out the third caution of the race.

Jim Schmidt inherited the lead with his son Justin Schmidt in tow in second on the restart. Justin Schmidt dove low in turn one on lap 18 to assume the top spot while four-time PDTR Late Model champ and current point leader Brad Mueller of Random Lake charged in to make it a three-way battle along the high groove.

On lap 21, Mueller gained second in turn three while Justin Schmidt held strong at the front of the field en route to his fourth PDTR Late Model A-main triumph of 2018 and his ninth career main event victory at Plymouth.

Mueller was second, Jim Schmidt placed third, Buhler battled back from his spin to finish fourth and Letizia placed fifth.

On the drop of the green flag of the Grand National A-main, 78-year-old Dick Hed of Plymouth bolted up from his inside second row starting spot to lead the opening circuit.

On lap two, fourth starter Dan Sorce moved into second before a caution for a spin in turn four slowed the pace on lap three. Polesitter Jess Muehlbauer worked past Sorce for second on the ensuing restart and the two drivers dueled for several laps before Sorce secured the position.

The second of four caution flags appeared on lap 12 when Derek Kaat of

Plymouth spun in turn four. On the restart, Sorce used the high groove to challenge Hed for the top spot and on lap 14, Sorce surged into the lead in turn two before another caution appeared on lap 15 for the stalled machine of Plymouth's Justin Erickson in turn three.

Sorce, who captured the 2006 PDTR Late Model championship, then proceeded to pull away over the next five laps before the fourth and final caution was displayed for Kaat's stalled car in turn two on lap 20. On the final restart, eighth starter Tyler Kulow of Plymouth moved in to pressure Hed for second along the high groove, but the cagey veteran held strong to retain the spot.

Sorce went to post his eighth career PDTR Grand National A-main victory. Hed was second, Kulow placed third, Donny Kulow of Elkhart Lake finished fourth after starting second and Kurt Davis placed fifth after starting sixth.

Polesitter Jess Jakubowski and Marcus Hoepfner led the field to the green flag in the B Mod main event. Jakubowski and Hoepfner dueled side by side over the first four circuits before Hoepfner surged ahead in turn one on lap five while third starter Gary Glander of Sheboygan Falls and fourth starter and current point leader Tim Sheppard of Beaver Dam followed in second and third respectively.

The first of three caution flags flew on lap 12 when Jakubowski and Justin Bauer of Sheboygan Falls collided in turn four. On the restart, Hoepfner retained the top spot while Glander and Sheppard battled for second for multiple laps. On lap 15, Glander gained second along the low line before the second caution appeared for a two-car incident involving Phil Campanella of Sheboygan Falls and Andy Singer in turn two.

On the restart, Sheppard seized second and began to close on Hoepfner by lap 18. After the third caution of the race

slowed the field on lap 20, Hoepfner again pulled away while Sheppard and Glander resumed their duel for second.

On lap 21, Sheppard finally gained second for good with a high move in turn four. Hoepfner held strong over the final four laps to seal his first career PDTR B Mod A-main triumph.

Sheppard placed second, Glander was third, fifth starter Cody Eickberg of Plymouth placed fourth and 11th starter Travis Schmidt of Plymouth charged up to place fifth.

Matt Peterson placed opening lap of the Micro Sprint A main from the pole. Peterson's strong run was slowed on three occasions for caution flags on lap four, five and 10.

On lap seven, seventh starter Dave Collins of Madison wrestled second away from Jack Vanderboom of Dousman, who started sixth. However, Peterson proved to be too much for the field as he claimed his first career PDTR Micro Sprint A-main victory.

Collins placed second, Vanderboom was third and point leader Preston Ruh of Elkhart Lake recovered from a spin on lap four to finish fourth.

The PDTR program, which was sponsored by the city of Sheboygan Falls Fire Department, featured 80 cars, including 21 Sprint Cars, 20 B Mods, 19 Grand Nationals, 12 Late Models and eight Micro Sprints.



Back To School Tips For Families Of Children Coping With Special Needs

—Episcopal Center For Children, A Nonprofit Organization Serving Children & Families, Offers Advice

Heading back to the classroom this fall is exciting, but it can also be a challenging time for families of children with special needs. The Episcopal Center for Children (ECC), a nonprofit organization serving children coping with special needs ages five-14 in the Washington DC area since 1895, offers tips to help:

Tip 1 — Review your child's Individual Education Plan (IEP). Carefully look over the IEP. Do you have any new medical or psychological reports that the school should know about? Some parents find using a binder or folder for paperwork can be a big help.

Tip 2 — Keep everyone informed. Talk with the school to make sure their plans for your child match the intentions in the IEP. Ensure the school staff are up to speed on where your child is presently. Make sure you know where your child's classroom is, any transportation plans, and what he or she will need to bring each day. Talk with your child too. Build up "going back to school" and be positive!

Tip 3 — Calm any stress or first day jitters your child may have. Whether it's a new classroom or familiar surroundings, children may be nervous about starting back to school. Talk with your child about their feelings. Assure your child that going back to school will be a good thing.

Tip 4 — Delay getting new school clothes. A new outfit may not calm first day nerves. For some children coping with sensitivities, new clothes may aggravate nervousness or be uncomfortable. For children with sensory challenges, new clothes

may feel itchy, stiff and uncomfortable. If your child needs it, let him or her wear clothes that are comfortable and familiar for the first few days of school.

Tip 5 — Help your child "picture" going back to school. Some children visually process information and benefit from visual assurances. Create a visual countdown chart at home, so your child can help move the numbers as you count down to the start of the school year. If your child is returning to a familiar school and you have photos showing him or her at school or with friends or a teacher, show the photos to your child. If you visit the school before school starts, take a picture of your child in his or her classroom, and show the photo to your child later at home.

Tip 6 — Begin introducing new routines before school starts. Morning and afternoon routines can help your child transition into and out of school each day. You may need to establish an earlier bedtime routine to make sure your child is up on time and ready to go. Start thinking about how you want to approach homework. Talk with your child about when and how homework will be completed.

Tip 7 — Talk to the school staff about any of your concerns. Open communication helps children coping with special needs. Speak with school staff if you have noticed something new about your child that may impact their education. Open communication with school staff will benefit your child. Some parents find it helpful to keep a communication log or to set reminders on their calendar for regular check-

ins with school staff.

Tip 8 — Get clarity on transitions. Because transitions during the school day can be challenging, clarify with school staff how transitions are handled. Who greets children as they get off the bus? Who talks to them when they walk into the building? How are transitions between classes or activities handled? Make sure your child understands what to expect.

Tip 9 — Mark your calendar for school events. If the school has an open house, parent-teacher night, or back to school program, try to attend. Talk with the staff about your child's progress. If you are not able to go, make a point

of calling the teacher or staff at another time and getting caught up on the information.

Tip 10 — Review your child's school's Parent-Student Handbook. Carefully review the school's parent-student handbook to make sure that you are aware of school policies and requirements. Discuss the discipline policy with your child prior to the first day of school.

DNR Conservation Wardens' Message To ATV And UTV Riders: "Wear It, Wisconsin!"

A crash involving a utility-terrain vehicle on August 4 in Oneida County resulted in a death. This brings the total number of fatalities for all-terrain and utility-terrain vehicles in Wisconsin to 14 this year and is prompting wardens to remind all riders of safety steps.

Gary Eddy, the off-highway administrative warden for the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, says wardens statewide are encouraging all operators and riders to "Wear it Wisconsin!"

"That means wearing helmets for ATVs and UTVs, and your seat belts on an UTV," Eddy said.

Anyone under the age of 18 must wear a helmet, and that helmet must meet U.S. Department of Transportation standards.

Eddy says in all 14 fa-

talities — seven on ATVS and seven on UTVs — no one was wearing a helmet and only one individual on a UTV was wearing a seatbelt.

Versatile Vehicles Best Used With Safety In Mind

"These machines are popular for work and for play, and their use continues to grow in Wisconsin," Eddy said. "Since you can't predict when an incident will occur, it is best to protect yourself and your passengers for that possibility. Simply put on the helmet, fasten the safety straps and click the seatbelt."

Eddy says 13 of the 14 fatalities have happened either on public roads or on private property.

"It is always important to remember safety while

operating these vehicles for work or recreational purposes," Eddy said. "These machines are often operated on paved surfaces and across rough terrain. These conditions bring their own set of hazards. That's why the use of safety equipment is so important. Many of these tragedies may have been prevented had seat belts and helmets been used."

Eddy urges all ATV and UTV owners to spread the "Wear it Wisconsin" message by setting a personal rule that helmets and seat belts are always used on their machines. Also, educate others you know on the importance of using helmets and seat belts. "A little positive peer pressure on your family and friends can help," Eddy said. "We want everyone

to stay safe and have fun while using these versatile vehicles."

Here are more of Warden Eddy's safety tips for all ATV-UTV riders:

- Never drink and ride. ATVs and UTVs are challenging enough to operate sober; adding alcohol endangers everyone around you. Practice "Zero Alcohol" and wait until you're done operating all vehicles before consuming alcohol.

- "Seize the keys:" Control who and when your machine is being operated.

- Complete an ATV safety course. All ATV riders at least age 12 (and UTV operators at least age 16) and born after January 1, 1988 must complete a course prior to operating an ATV or UTV. This course may be com-

pleted either in a classroom or over the internet. Search the DNR website, dnr.wi.gov, for "ATV Safety" to learn more.

- Use extreme caution while operating on paved surfaces. ATVs and UTVs are highly unstable on paved surfaces and cannot be operated in the same manner as a car. All maneuvers must be made in a slow, controlled manner. Corners cannot be taken at the same speed as other motor vehicles.

- Never ride alone. If a mishap happens, you may need immediate help.

- Slow down, be responsible and expect to meet other people while on trails.

- Stay on the right side of the trail. Rough terrain and puddles are part of the experience; don't en-

danger others by riding on the wrong side of the trail. Cross obstacles in a controlled and safe manner.

- Don't operate your machine outside the limits or capabilities of you, the machine or the environment (trail condition, terrain, hours of darkness, etc.)

- Headlights and tail lights are required at all times while on public roads. All turns must be indicated by use of turn signals or hand signals.

- ATV/UTV is among our state's favorite recreational activities in the summer months. Stay safe and stay responsible.
