Doors at Kewaskum Middle School for the first day of school on Monday.

"We have been waiting for months to be able to go into the new school," said Kewaskum Middle School Principal Julie Skelton. "It couldn't have gone any better."

The new middle school was completed in

time for the beginning of the school year. With large windows and skylights, the new building allows lots of natural light to fill all the classrooms and hallways.

During lunch hour, the eighth-grade students enjoyed the new cafeteria, with comfortable "coffee shop" style seating.

"Even the food tastes better," said eighth-grader Cale Fedorski.

The students seemed to be finding their way around the building without too many problems.

"I haven't gotten lost yet," said Autumn Daniels, a new sixth-grader at the school.

The middle school is adjacent to the high school, and the two schools share some spaces.

Kewaskum FFA Alumni Donate \$100,000 For New Greenhouse

– New Greenhouse Added To Kewaskum High School

The Kewaskum FFA Alumni donated \$100,000 to the Kewaskum School District for a new greenhouse that is being built at Kewaskum High School.

The donation is in memory of Brent Allen Schultz, who lost his life in a car accident in 2014.

"Unfortunately, this

great event is the result of a tragedy," said Gene Hetebrueg, president of the Kewaskum FFA Alumni. "In June 2014, Brent Schultz and Travis Trapp were killed in a tragic auto accident. They were both students at Kewaskum High School and were FFA officers."

About a week or two before the end of the

2014 school year, at an FFA officers meeting, the FFA discussed the need for a greenhouse as a learning tool.

"Three weeks later, the accident happened, and then we started thinking, pretty foggy thoughts at that time," said Kevin Thull, Brent's stepfather.

Kewaskum Commemorates 9/11

Tuesday was the first time that Gordon Haberman stayed in Wisconsin on September 11 since 2001 when his daughter Andrea Haberman was killed in a terrorist attack on the World Trade Center.

Haberman spoke on Tuesday at a ceremony held in front of the Kewaskum Municipal Building Annex. He spoke of the events that happened that September morning 17 years ago.

He spoke of how his family's life has not been the same since that tragic day. He talked about how the world has never been the same.

Several hundred community members attended the event. There were students from area schools at the ceremony. There were community leaders. There were community members.

"It means so much to have all this support from the Kewaskum community. This is such a difficult day and our family could not make it through without the support of so many wonderful people," Haberman said.

Washington County Administrator Josh Schoemann and Village Administrator Matt Heiser also spoke at Tuesday's event. Kewaskum Police Chief Tom Bishop served as

the master of ceremonies, and the Rev. Jacob Strand, administrator of Holy Trinity parish, led the community in prayer.

The Kewaskum American Legion presented colors, and Kewaskum High School students performed music.

The event helped the entire community remember 9/11.

There are plans to build a permanent 9/11 memorial in front of the Annex building, in the spot where Tuesday's ceremony was held.

The Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial will be a space of reflection and education for visitors from Kewaskum, the state and beyond to remember all the lives that were lost as well as those who responded as a result of the events of September 11, 2001.



Kewaskum FFA Alumni Donate \$100,000 For New Greenhouse

To honor Brent's memory, his parents Kevin and Lynn Thull, along with the Kewaskum FFA Alumni, and Shelly Oelhafen, the KHS FFA advisor decided to raise money for a greenhouse. The goal was to raise \$100,000.

Fundraising efforts came in the form of Brent Schultz Memorial trap shoots, poker runs, and a tractor raffle that was sponsored by the FFA Alumni, as well as fundraising efforts by the Trapp family.

The Trapp family has honored Travis by sponsoring scholarships in his name each year.

At about the time that the FFA reached its goal

of \$100,000, the Kewaskum School District held a referendum to improve its high school and middle school facilities.

"The referendum, of course, passed. This was great news for all of us," Hetebrueg said. "It meant that the greenhouse could be built in conjunction with the school building project. It also meant that the agriculture education program would remain in Kewaskum for the foreseeable future."

Hetebrueg said that the project could not have happened without help.

"It came in the form of countless volunteers to help run fundraisers, help in the form of the people who supported the fundraisers, and above all, Brent's and Travis' parents, the Thull, Schultz and Trapp families," he said.

Kevin Thull agreed. "It didn't take just a family, it took a community to do this. It is very

Washington County Clean Sweep Offered October 6

The Washington County Full Service Clean Sweep is an opportunity for county residents to properly dispose or recycle unwanted hazardous chemicals, electronic goods, pharmaceutical medication, and used tires. TVs and large household appliances will be accepted again this year.

This is the ninth consecutive year for the Full Service Clean Sweep Program coordinated by the Planning and Parks Department, while partnering with the County's Health Department, Sheriff's Department and the Highway Department. The drive-through collection makes this program simple and efficient for participants.

A \$30 pre-registration fee is required for the hazardous waste and electronic goods. The pharmaceutical collection does not require anyone to pre-register. At the used tire collection a maximum of 20 tires will be accepted per participant and disposal fees apply at the time of collection. Registration is limited.

The 2018 Full Service Clean Sweep event will be held on Saturday, Oct. 6. Collection will be

from 8 a.m. to noon at the Washington County Highway Facility, 900 Lang St. in West Bend.

The following materials will NOT be accepted during the Clean Sweeps: latex paint, motor oil, needles/sharps, radioactive items, smoke detectors, propane tanks and cylinders.

John M. Schmitt Memorial Drive Named In West Bend

– New Road Name Gives Tribute To Kewaskum Native Killed In Line Of Duty

When the Schmitt family saw a fire truck displaying the large American flag in front of the Washington County Sheriff's Office and about 100 people gathered for a ceremony on Friday, Sept. 7, they knew it was something John M. Schmitt "Spike" would have wanted.

"This is John," they agreed, as they gave a nod to all the fanfare.

"John was very gregarious...he was bigger than life, and he loved pomp and circumstance. He would have loved this," his widow, Carla Schmitt, explained.

The ceremony was for the naming of John M.

Schmitt Memorial Drive. The Sheriff's Office is located on the road, which was formerly known as "Schmidt Road."

The road is now named after John M. "Spike" Schmitt, a Washington County sheriff's deputy who died in the line of duty on September 7, 1998. He was 31.

The son of Roger "Butch" and Kathy Schmitt, John had been training an officer that evening. The two were headed north on U.S. Highway 45 when they received a call to assist a Kewaskum police officer who was dealing with an alleged drunk driver who had become belligerent.

The officer whom John was training was driving the squad car, with the lights and siren activated. The vehicle in front of them would not pull over, so the officer pulled out to pass and hit an oncoming vehicle.

The crash occurred on U.S. Highway 45 near Sandy Ridge Road. A total of seven others were injured, and John's rookie partner was admitted to a local hospital for observation.

On Friday, those gathered remembered Schmitt's sacrifice. Many in the crowd were members of area fire or law enforcement departments. They knew that Schmitt had been a sheriff's deputy and a

member of the Kewaskum Fire Department.

State representatives and local officials also attended the event.

Three years ago, a memorial bench bearing Schmitt's name was installed along the Eisenbahn State Trail near the accident site. Schmitt's name, along with the words "never forgotten," are engraved on the bench. Abbreviations document the date of Schmitt's "End of Watch" with the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

"It really means a lot that so many people still remember him. He was such a great guy," Carla said.

Lane Closures Planned For U.S. Highway 45 This Week

The Washington County Highway Department will be doing maintenance work (deck sealing) on overpasses along U.S. Highway 45 during the week of September 10.

Work on the County Trunk Highway D overpass was planned for Monday, Sept. 10.

Ensnuing work throughout the week was planned at the Beaver Dam Road overpass on Tuesday (Sept. 11), State Highway 33 overpass on Wednesday (Sept. 12), and 18th Avenue and Paradise Drive overpasses on Thursday (Sept. 13). Work at these locations

will require traffic in both the northbound and southbound directions to be restricted to one lane during portions of the day. Traffic will remain open with single lane closures in place and altered as work progresses.

This work is dependent on weather condi-

tions. Expect delays and proceed with caution through work zones.

In addition, the memorial will honor the military and emergency personnel who responded to the events of September 11.

After the Ground Zero cleanup efforts, only 1,200 pieces of steel from the towers remained to be curated for museums and memorials around the country.

One of those pieces, a steel I beam procured from the North Tower of the World Trade Center, will serve as a center-

piece for Kewaskum's memorial.

Plans are for the steel artifact to sit on a pentagon-shaped piece of limestone in the center of the memorial whose circular shape symbolizes life. The steel support beam will face east, connecting Kewaskum with New York City.

Five learning centers will complete the memorial, educating visitors about 9/11 and the different facets of it, including the victims, military,

first responders, volunteers, flight crews, passengers and the Ground Zero aftermath.

The goal is for the memorial to provide an amphitheater that will be used for memorial services and educational purposes. When completed, planners would like a timeline of 9/11 events to be etched in stone behind the amphitheater. Plans are for pear trees, oak trees, roses and evergreens to be planted around the

memorial.

The Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial has been designed by architect Dustin Melzark, a Kewaskum High School graduate, in cooperation with Peter Kudlata of Flagstone Landscaping.

Farm Bureau Asks Farmers And Motorists To Work Together To Stay Safe

The unofficial start of the fall harvest season is in September. Tractors and other implements of husbandry (IOH) are allowed to operate on Wisconsin roadways but are often large and slow-moving which can cause confusion for drivers sharing the roads.

"Farmers and motorists alike should work together to keep the roadways safe, so everyone can return home safely at the end of the day," said Wisconsin Farm Bureau President Jim Holte. "Safety must be a top priority for everyone on the road."

According to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, 18 people have been killed and 607 injured from 2011-2017 in crashes involving agricultural equipment in Wisconsin.

Three scenarios drivers and farmers should

know how to handle are passing an IOH, left-hand turns and braking distance needed at controlled intersections.

Passing

In 2014, it became illegal to pass an IOH which include farm tractors and farm machinery, or an Ag-Commercial Motor Vehicle, trucks that are specially designed for agricultural work, in a no-passing zone. Motorists should wait until they enter a passing zone when considering going around a slow-moving vehicle.

Farmers should not pull over in a no-passing zone to let vehicles pass, unless the road shoulder condition and width can allow for the farm machinery to completely move onto the shoulder.

Farmers should also not wave a driver for-

ward to pass them. While these actions seem courteous, it sends mixed signals and isn't encouraged. In a passing zone, or if shoulder width permits, farmers are obligated to yield the roadway to the overtaking vehicle so they do not impede the normal movement of traffic.

Left-Hand Turn

It can turn into a dangerous situation when a farmer is attempting to make a left-hand turn. Farm equipment, especially the tractor, will likely have two flashing amber or yellow lights on the cab or tire fenders of the tractor when in operation on the roadway.

When a farmer signals to turn, the light will continue to flash in the direction the farmer is turning. The other light

will go solid. For motorists, this is a very important distinction to recognize. For farm tractors or farm machinery without turn signals, hand signals should be used to indicate the operator's intention to turn.

A Controlled Intersection

When a motorist legally passes large farm equipment within a very short distance of a controlled intersection (stop sign or stop lights), this action can dramatically impact the reaction time and braking distance for the farm equipment operator.

Farm equipment is much heavier than a normal passenger vehicle which makes having adequate braking distance critical for the operator.

The Wisconsin De-

partment of Transportation recommends drivers should slow down immediately whenever they see a slow-moving vehicle emblem (orange and red triangle) on the rear of a tractor or other piece of equipment. This emblem indicates that the farm machine usually travels slower than 25 mph. Stay alert, focused and patient when passing a slow-moving agricultural vehicle in an area where passing is legal.

Farmers are asked to comply with the proper lighting and marking requirements to draw attention to the size, shape and speed of agricultural vehicles and to alert drivers that caution is required. There are specific requirements for different types of equipment.

Farmers should also know their local weight

restrictions. Generally, agricultural weight limits are 23,000 pounds per axle or 92,000 pounds gross vehicle weight, dependent on number of axles and axle spacing, and subject to seasonal or special postings. Farmers can find more information about weight limits from the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection and Wisconsin Department of Transportation.

"We can enjoy a safe harvest season by working together on the roadways," Holte added.

The Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation is the state's largest general farm organization. Made up of 61 county Farm Bureaus, it represents agriculturists and farms of every size, commodity and management style.



Veterans' Charities That Mislead: BBB Wise Giving Alliance Joins Federal, State Regulators To Announce Enforcement Actions

BBB Wise Giving Alliance (Give.org), the charity monitoring organization affiliated with the Better Business Bureau, joined with the Federal Trade Commission, state attorneys general, and state charity regulators to help the donating public avoid misleading charity appeals and find trustworthy veterans' organizations to support. The event was held at the FTC's headquarters in Washington, DC, to announce the latest enforcement actions against veterans' charities.

"Americans have a strong interest in supporting charitable organizations helping veterans or active duty service members," said H. Art Taylor, president and CEO, BBB Wise Giving Alliance, "which is why it is particularly disheartening that we hear about recent government actions that identified misleading appeals from charities that claimed to help our service members. As with any charity appeal, we urge donors to exercise caution and check out organizations before making a giving decision."

As potential donors respond to appeals from such organizations, the BBB Wise Giving Alliance offers the following advisory tips:

- Mistaken Identity: Watch out for name confusion. Many veterans' charities include virtually the same words in different order or slightly different form.
- Check Outside Sources Before Giving: Visit Give.org to check out a charity's trustworthiness by verifying that it meets the 20 BBB Standards for Charity Accountability.

These standards address more than just finances; they also cover charity governance, results reporting, appeal accuracy, and donor privacy. Also, check with your state government's charity registration agency, usually a division of either the attorney general's office or secretary of state's office.

•Avoid On-the-Spot Donation Decisions: Be wary of excessive pressure in fundraising. Don't be pressured to make an immediate on-the-spot donation.

•Find Out What They Do: Don't assume that the veterans organization does based on their name alone. Review the appeal carefully and see if it matches program and financial information appearing on the organization's website.

•Recognize Telemarketing Cautions: Telemarketing can be a costly method of fundraising unless carefully managed. If interested in a call on behalf of a veterans' charity, always check out the organization online before donating.

•Be Wary of Unusual Donation Transaction Options: Watch out if a charity solicitor asks for donors to send contributions using an unusual transaction method such as wire transfer, gift cards, or pre-paid debit cards. This could be a ruse to enable questionable solicitors to get funds quickly.

•Learn How Donated Items Will Be Used. If a veterans' charity is soliciting for used clothing, cars, furniture and other in-kind gifts, find out how they benefit. Sometimes the charity receives only a small portion of the resale

price of the item or may have a contractual arrangement to get a flat fee for every household pick-up, no matter what the contents.

•Seek Out Financial Information. Verify the accuracy of financial information in veterans' organizations appeals. Check out the charity's report on BBB's Give.org or review the charity's website for its latest financial information. The BBB Standards for Charity Accountability call for a charity to spend at least 65 percent of its total expenses on program service activities, as opposed to fundraising and administrative costs.



Two More Tornadoes Confirmed In Area

After publication time on Tuesday, Sept. 4, the National Weather Service confirmed two more tornadoes in the area.

One was confirmed in the Armstrong area and one in the Cascade area.

According to the National Weather Service (NWS) map, the Armstrong tornado started east of Mullet Lake near Mushroom Road, near the Loehr farm. It then traveled southeast from there for 4.05 miles. The NWS has the tornado crossing Mulletview Road and Sheehan Lake Road before crossing County Highway B near Armstrong. It crossed Log Cabin Road and ended just past Highway 67. They classified this

tornado as an EF1. It had winds of 100 mph.

The second tornado recorded by the NWS happened near Cascade. According to the NWS, this one traveled 5.38 miles. It started west of County Road U near Woodside Road, which is in the Kettle Moraine Forest just northwest of the Parnell Tower. The tornado traveled southeast, crossing County Road U in two spots since it curves in that area and then crossing County Road A. It traveled across County Road N near North Valley Road and County Road S. It con-

tinued to travel southeast, crossing Highview Road and Cedar Lane and ending just east of the intersection of County Roads V and NN, which is just north of the Village of Cascade.

This tornado was classified as an EF1 with 100 mph winds. The least severe tornadoes are classified as EF0 with the most severe classified as EF5.

The NWS continues to investigate the areas affected by the storm one week ago on Tuesday, Aug. 28. Clean-up also continues in this area.



Wisconsin DFI Reminds People To Watch For Warning Signs Of Elder Abuse

The Department of Fi-

ancial Institutions (DFI) reminds financial professionals and the public throughout Wisconsin to be on the lookout for the red flags of suspected financial abuse, including guardians assigned to oversee the financial matters of seniors no longer able to do so for themselves.

"A trusted guardian can be a wonderful resource. But sometimes guardians may take advantage of the trust placed in them to look after the people or assets in their care," said Leslie Van Buskirk, Administrator of DFI's Division of Securities.

A guardian is a person or entity appointed by a court to exercise some or all authority over a person and/or estate. A guardian has power to make decisions related to the health and safety of the incapacitated person. Financial abuse by guardians occurs when the guardian improperly uses the protected individual's financial assets.

"Fraudsters often target seniors for financial exploitation because they may be isolated from family, caregivers, and other support networks. That's why it is important to know the red flags that could signal a senior's savings may be in danger," Van

Buskirk said.

The North American Securities Administrators Association (NASAA), of which the DFI is a member, recently developed a resource to help call attention to the red flags of suspected guardian financial abuse. The "Guarding the Guardians" publication also provides examples of exploitation and information on how to report suspected abuse.

Suspected signs of guardian financial abuse include:

- Using guardianship authority to transfer property for the guardian's benefit.
- Receiving personal payments from a protected individual without court permission.
- Authorizing frequent cash withdrawals from the protected individual's accounts without explanation.
- Using or borrowing property for personal benefit without court authorization.
- Making unexplained decisions that are not in the protected individual's best interest.

Pet-Friendly Indoor Gardening

MELINDA MYERS

Houseplants make a wonderful addition to our home's décor and improve the indoor air quality. Those with pets however may struggle with keeping plants safe from curious pets and the pets safe from indoor greenery.

The good news is you can grow an indoor garden even when you own pets. Yes, some do love to dig in the soil or even eat our favorite houseplants, but with proper plant selection and planning you can keep your pets safe while enjoying an indoor garden.

Start by selecting plants that are safe for your pets. Consult the

American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals website for a list of pet-safe plants to grow and toxic plants you should avoid. This will reduce your anxiety by helping you create an indoor green space safe for your pets.

Incorporate a few easy-care plants like blunt leaf peperomia, cast iron plant, spider plant, and Swedish ivy that are not toxic to cats and dogs. Add some color to your indoor garden with dog and cat safe African violets and Phalaenopsis orchid.

Next, adjust your gardening style to keep your plants safe from curious pets. Mulch the soil in large planters with

chunky woodchips or decorative stones to prevent cats from using the planters as a spare litter box. Just make sure the mulch is not attractive to or poses a danger to dogs or other pets that might be tempted to eat the mulch or get it lodged in their mouth.

Or invest in a commercial mat designed to prevent digging. Most are made of plastic or rubber with upward facing nubs that humanely discourage digging. Just cut the mat to size and set it on the soil surface.

Consider elevating your garden by growing plants in hanging baskets or in pots placed on high shelves out of the reach of curious ani-

mals. Be sure to keep up with pruning as those long-dangling stems can provide tempting entertainment.

Break out the homemade or commercial repellents for those persistent pets. Use products labeled for this purpose or make sure your homemade concoction is safe for pets, plants and furnishings.

Enlisting scare tactics may be the next step to keeping your plants safe from grazing pets. Squirt bottles, noisemakers, and commercial devices may help deter pets from digging and munching on plants.

Using a variety of strategies often yields the best results. Once

you find the best method for keeping your plants safe and pets healthy and happy, you'll be able to enjoy the beauty and benefits indoor plants provide.



Tigers Go To The Air To Upset Kewaskum 14-7

Four games into the 2018 season, and it appears safe to say the Kewaskum football team is still searching for its offensive identity.

The Indians struggled to move the football and reached the end zone just once against Ripon in their September 7 East Central Conference game, resulting in a 14-7 loss to the Tigers, who reportedly have just 30 young men, freshmen through seniors, out for the sport this year.

"Disappointing... we didn't execute, struggled in that department," KHS coach Jason Piittmann said. "Our inexperience showed tonight."

With the loss, the Indians fell to 0-2 in EC play and 2-2 overall, with the offense managing to gain 182 yards, including just 34 on the ground.

Ripon filled the air with passes, with junior quarterback Max Huseboe going 22x36 for 327 yards and two touchdowns. In the first half, the Tigers threw the ball 25 times and rushed just nine, and this wasn't what Kewaskum was expecting, not from scouting a couple Ripon games.

When asked if the Tigers passed as much in other games, Piittmann said, "No, no. I would say it was 45 percent to 55 percent (run to pass)."

Ripon scored on its second possession, going 46 yards in six plays

with Huseboe hooking up with Joshua Moran for a 19-yard touchdown. Grant Schneider was off target on his PAT (point after touchdown) try, meaning the Indians were only down 6-0, but their next three possessions ended with an interception of a Michael Daniel pass, a three-and-out and an eight-play drive that stalled at the Ripon 47.

The Tigers had a couple more chances to score, moving the ball to the KHS 17 before running out of downs and missing a field goal on the first play of the second quarter. KHS was unable to capitalize, however. After two incompletions and a run by Jermaine "J.J." Thull for a three-yard loss, it was punting time.

Ripon's next possession included a 36-yard pass from Huseboe to Moran for a first down at the KHS 15, but after a four-yard gain, freshman running back Cameron Hahn was tackled for a six-yard loss and then Huseboe threw two incomplete passes, and the Tigers came up empty again.

The Indians got the ball first in the second half, and their fans were hopeful they would start moving the ball and scoring. The first possession ended with a quick punt, but the Indians got the ball back two plays later when Eric Bauer intercepted a Huseboe pass and raced down the right sideline to the Ripon 30 before being stopped.

One first down, Thull darted around the left

side of the line for a 25-yard gain, and two plays later, Daniel ran a quarterback sneak for a touchdown with 8:34 remaining in the third period. KHS was whistled for motion on the first PAT try, but it didn't matter, Ryan Prochnow booted it through the uprights from five yards back, giving KHS the lead 7-6.

Kewaskum's defense forced a Ripon punt, and the Indians used a 23-yard pass from Cook to Grady for 23 yards to the Ripon 26, but after a three-yard loss, Cook was intercepted by Moran at the nine.

The Tigers wouldn't pass from their own nine, would they? Yes, they would and BINGO, Huseboe hit Niko Heinz for a 91-yard touchdown pass after the KHS defender fell trying to make a play on the ball. This time, the Tigers went for the two-point conversion and got it when Huseboe passed to Moran.

KHS came right back, using a Cook to Grady pass for 48 yards to reach Ripon's 23-yard line, but the drive stalled after a one-yard gain, a six-yard loss and two incomplete passes. On the first incompleteness, Cook was injured while being tackled, and he did not return to the game.

In the closing minutes, it looked like the Indians would get one more offensive series when Ripon was facing a fourth and 14 when Huseboe hit Carter Hahn for a 17-yard completion and a first down at the 18. From there,

the Tigers ran out the clock.

"We made some good decisions, made some adjustments in the second half, but then we would go backward or shoot ourselves in the foot," Piittmann said. KHS has never been 0-2 in conference play in Piittmann's tenure and even a year before he started. "You know what, life is full of disappointments," he said. "It's how you respond to it," fully expecting his players to bounce back and keep improving.

Piittmann said Grady "had a nice game as a receiver," but beyond that declined to cite any other players. "We just couldn't get the running game going."

Defensively, Triston Rayburn and Lucas Christenson each had 10 tackles, including four and five solos, respectively, while Sam Lemler was in one of eight tackles.

Kewaskum is at Plymouth tomorrow night (September 14).

KHS alum Cade Peterson and fellow punter, Warren Taylor, got plenty of opportunity to show their skills, combining for 11 punts in the game. Peterson punted five times for a 35.8 yard average with his best punt a 49-yarder.

With the win, the Indians are 1-1 against East Central opponents and 6-5 overall.

"What a great team performance from these young ladies tonight," Leitzke said. "We changed the lineup and had some bumps here and there, but a strong night all around."

Kew-Cats Are Closing In On Third Place In North Shore Golf

With just one North Shore meet to go, the Kewaskum-Campbellsport co-op girls golf team is sitting in third place.

A good effort at the Fire Ridge Golf Course near Cedarburg on September 12, and the Kew-Cats can secure that spot, which would be the highest finish they have had playing in the NS, which is made up of mostly Division 1 schools.

The Indians finished third at the wet but playable Washington County course on September 6, firing a 198 using the best four of six scores. The Kew-Cats were led by junior Alyssa Dreher and senior Grace Kober, who came in with 42 and 47, respectively. Dreher captured the medal with her 7-over-par round, which included six 4s, one 5, one 6 and one 7.

Cedarburg won for the seventh straight time, carding a 177, while

Hartford had a 193.

"Can't say enough about the efforts of Alyssa and Grace. Having them both in the 40s helped us immensely," coach Amy Uhlig said. "They were both very focused and avoided the fescue, which is huge there."

Next came Karissa Lange with a 52, followed by Tina Bolek's 57. "It's really great to see others stepping up when some of the girls are having off nights," Uhlig said. "It's been a true team effort this season."

Alyssa Dreher led the Kew-Cats with a 47, which was sixth place overall, while Grace Kober and Ashley Trapp carded 56s and Karissa Lange shot a 57.

"The wet conditions were tough, and when you combine that with the general tough characteristics of WBCC, it can be very trying for the girls. I'm proud of the way we battled," Kew-Cats coach Amy Uhlig said, reporting, "While this was our highest team score this year, it was much better than we've done in the past several years at WBCC."
