Over the past month, Harold Mueller has been walking from his Kewaskum home each day to work at Reigle Family Park.

The 87-year-old construction worker has been in the excavating

business since 1953. So it only seems natural to him to climb up onto a bulldozer every morning to clear the land.

Two generations have followed in his career footsteps.

Harold's son Nick Mueller now has owns

the company that Harold started, Mueller Excavating. Nick's brother Tom also works for the company. Nick's son Dusty works for the company as well.

And it looks like a third generation may be interested in carrying on the trade. Dusty's 1-

year-old son, Rory, is already fascinated with the equipment.

"He is really over the top about it. His favorite thing is the backhoe, but he loves anything with a motor," Dusty said.

Last winter, local resident Bret Richards received a call from someone who needed a home for a chocolate Labrador Retriever.

"We have a pit bull, and the two dogs are not getting along. We can't keep them both," the person said.

Richards told the person he would take the dog, but he was going to donate it to the Dogs2DogTags program.

Dogs2DogTags trains dogs and matches them with veterans, Richards explained. The program helps gives dogs a home and helps veterans cope with life after

serving in the military. "Perfect," the person responded.



One Arrested After Fleeing Police In Corn Field

One person was arrested after fleeing into a corn field on Tuesday, Sept. 18. He was found on County Highway W near County Highway BB trying to hitchhike out of the area.

According to Campbellsport Police Chief Tom Dornbrook, the suspect, John Wilson, 39, surrendered himself immediately to officers because he didn't know where he was and because he no longer wanted to be bitten by mosquitos. He had been hiding in the corn field and wanted to have friends pick him up, but he was not from the area and did not know where to tell them to find him.

"He put his hands up and said, 'I'm the driver of the vehicle,'" Dornbrook said.

This arrest was in con-

nection with a robbery at Klotz's Piggly Wiggly in Campbellsport. Wilson and a friend stole a case of Sky Vodka and other high-end alcohol, totalling just under \$500. According to Dornbrook, this was not the first time Wilson and his friend had stolen from Piggly Wiggly.

"He's done that three times for a total of about \$1,400," Dornbrook said.

Klotz's Piggly Wiggly manager Kevin Harvey called Dornbrook at about 5:56 p.m. on Tuesday, Sept. 18, to tell him the suspect was in the store. When Dornbrook arrived, the suspect was fleeing the store so the chief stopped his car behind their car, which was parked in a stall along the grass by Sheboygan Street.

According to Dornbrook, Wilson was driving the car and he drove over the grass and sidewalk and onto Sheboygan Street to flee. A high speed chase took them out of town and near Country Aire Drive where one of the suspects got out of the car and fled. Wilson continued a little further and then stopped the car and fled.

"Terry (Seely) was pulling up just as he (the first suspect) got out of the car," Dornbrook said.

While they were searching, the Fond du Lac and Dodge County Sheriff's Departments, and Lomira Police Department sent squad cars to help with the search. The Fond du Lac Police Department sent an officer with their drone to search the area from above.

During the search, 9-1-1 received a call about a hitchhiker on County Highway W near County Highway BB. This is where Fond du Lac County Sheriff's officers arrested Wilson. They were not able to find the other suspect.

On Friday, Sept. 21, Wilson was charged in Fond du Lac County Circuit Court with one felony and three misdemeanors. His charges included: felony - vehicle operator fleeing/eluding officer, misdemeanors - operating while revoked (revocation due to alcohol/controlled substances/refusal); retail theft - intentionally taking (less than \$500), party to a crime; and resisting or obstructing an officer. Wilson's preliminary hearing is scheduled for Friday, Sept. 28.





"This designation for the Washington Ozaukee Public Health Department paired with their recent designation as a Level III Health Department demonstrates our commitment to this service."

The designation recognizes Washington County and the bronze level for its work through Well Washington County to make our county the healthiest place to live, learn, work and play. To do this, we provide the structure in the county to:

- Eat and Move Well by focusing on healthy, seasonal, whole-foods eating and supporting active communities;
- Think Well by reducing stigma around mental illness, expanding resources, and identifying gaps in early intervention;
- Choose Well by supporting community actions to reduce at-risk behaviors and advocating for substance use prevention in legislation; and
- Work Well through expanding and develop-

ing workplace wellness programs and policies.

"Washington County is proud to be among the 31 Wisconsin communities that received designations this year. Well Washington County has gained momentum by building collaborative efforts to start addressing some of our major health concerns," said Interim Health Officer Amanda Wisth.

"Brett Favre has become our national spokesman. It is a real blessing for us. The program is a win-win between the dog and the veteran, and this helped bring awareness to it," said Torre Willadsen, who founded the Dogs2DogTags program.

Dogs2DogTags Program

In 2011, Torre Willadsen began working as a civilian contractor in North Carolina to train bomb-finding dogs and their handlers for the U.S. Marines. He got to know both the dogs and the handlers well.

Then, in 2012, he was deployed to Afghanistan. He traveled to areas of operation to check on the dogs and their handlers.

Torre was in Afghanistan when one of the dog handlers he had trained, Chris Van Etten, was wounded. On July 12, 2012, while Van Etten was on patrol, an explosive device went off, and he lost parts of

both of his legs.

Willadsen was devastated and worried about his friend. He knew that Van Etten needed his dog, Harley.

"He got a hold of me while he was in the hospital. My battle was to get a dog to him while he was recovering. It was very crucial to have a dog with him," Willadsen said.

Being reunited with Harley helped Van Etten recover both physically and mentally.

After witnessing the profound effect that Harley had on Van Etten, Willadsen suspected that other veterans would benefit from being reunited with dogs as well. It was then that the concept of Dogs2DogTags was formed.

"It kind of evolved while I was still in Afghanistan," Willadsen said.

Willadsen knew in his heart that dogs could help veterans deal with post-traumatic stress disorder. Before long, Willadsen began helping

other veterans get their service dogs when they returned home.

Some he couldn't help quickly enough. Some of the veterans committed suicide while Willadsen was trying to get service dogs to others.

Willadsen wanted to do more.

"So I came up with the idea of finding rescue dogs, donated dogs and humane society dogs, and training them to become skilled companions for the veterans," Willadsen said.

The result: dogs' lives are saved. And so are veterans' lives.

"Thank you so much; this has really changed my life. My wife is happy. My life is happy. You have saved my life," veterans tell Willadsen on a regular basis.

Blue Door Coffee Co. Contribution

For the past year, Blue Door Coffee Co. in Campbellsport has donated its profits to a different charity each month.

"There are so many charities that support this entire community. There are everyday helpers who are keeping the community alive. That is kind of how small towns work. We all have to participate," said Raina Jeffery, team leader at the cafe.

Blue Door has donated to organizations such as local fire departments, parent-teacher organizations, the Campbellsport Lions Club and the Campbellsport Food Pantry.

"Blue Door's mission is to spread happiness," Jeffery said. "We are trying to stay as local as we can."

But when Jeffery and the rest of the Blue Door staff heard about Dogs2DogTags, they quickly decided to go beyond local boundary lines and support the national charity.

"Their mission and our mission aligned really well," Jeffery said.

In July, the Blue Door cafe collected \$2,152.85 for Dogs2DogTags.

Donations

Based in Willadsen's home in Sheboygan Falls, the Dogs2DogTags program is currently a 100 percent volunteer program.

"Right now every donation goes to a veteran or a dog," said Jennifer Tisch, a program volunteer.

The program covers the long-term expenses of caring for dogs.

"We learned right away that veterans would say they wanted a dog, but they couldn't afford it. They weren't able to purchase food or medical care for the dogs," Willadsen said. "We had to remedy that."

Donations go to pay for travel expenses to transport a dog to its new owner, and continues to pay for food and

veterinary bills as long as needed.

"The veterans don't have to pay for anything if they can't afford it," Tisch said.

Willadsen is currently trying to raise money to build facilities to train the dogs.

"We are literally doing it out of my backyard. I had seven, eight dogs in my house," Willadsen said.

His dream is to one day be able to hire veterans to train the dogs.

"Our goal is to build a kennel and to bring people in full time to train the dogs. It would be great to be able to have veterans working there," Willadsen said.

Starting The Excavating Business

Harold grew up on a farm in the Town of Ashford. After serving in the Korean War in 1951 and 1952, he returned home, but decided he did not want to be a farmer.

Instead, he bought a Bantam Backhoe from a dealer in Milwaukee in 1953.

"It was brand new, right from Iowa," Harold said.

The backhoe was mounted on the back of a six-wheel drive Army truck.

"It was not hydraulically controlled either, it was controlled by a cable with winches. There were no hydraulic backhoes back then," Harold said.

Harold had never operated a backhoe before, but he soon learned the special art of balancing that first piece of equipment.

"I always got a kick out of it when these young guys told me later on that a machine was not balanced, a

backhoe on tracks," Harold said.

He knew they did not realize what it meant to have a "tippy" piece of equipment.

"You would fill up maybe only 3/8 of your bucket. If you picked it up, the whole thing would tip because it had no front tires. And you would swing to the other side, it would tip that way. It would tip back once more when I dumped it, and it would rock like this all the way til I got back," Harold recalled.

"Machines now are really something else compared to that," he added.

Harold started his business by digging a lot of basements and doing a lot of work for farmers. He also removed a lot of stone fences. He is responsible for digging most of the ponds in the area.

"There were a lot of people in the country that did a lot of trenching. They didn't have water from the barn back to the house, so

there were a lot of farm houses that never had running water. I did a lot of that," Harold said.

He purchased his next piece of equipment, a brand new loader, for \$16,000.

"It was a pretty good size tractor for those days," Harold said.

In comparison, much of the excavating equipment today costs anywhere from \$200,000 to \$600,000.

Raising Excavators

Because excavation is seasonal work, Harold worked different jobs during the winter.

Each year, he seemed to go to a different factory. He worked at the West Bend Company, Gehl and Regal Ware.

"When the weather turns, he still needed to have some income, so he worked at a factory during the winter and then when the weather got good, then he started his digging again," Nick explained.

Each year, he seemed to go to a different factory. He worked at the West Bend Company, Gehl and Regal Ware. Harold then drove the snow plow for the Town of Auburn for over 30 years.

Harold's wife, Kathryn, helped do the bookwork for the excavation company. The couple have five children, and they all spent time around the business, starting when they were very young.

Nick has always been intrigued with excavation. He liked to go along with Harold to work each day, even as a young child.

Nick's mother still remembers the day that Harold did not bring Nick to work. They had a new home at the time, and they had just planted the lawn. Since Nick did not get to tag along that day, he found a rake and a shovel, and mad his own roads in the new planting.

"I had the lawn all messed up when Dad came home from work that day," Nick said.

Modern Business
When Nick graduated from high school in 1975, he started working full time for his father. They dug a lot of base-

ments at that time. Over the years, Mueller Excavation bough larger equipment. The company has grown, and has done

work across the area. It is the company that dug many of the streets in the Village of Kewaskum.

In 2007, the company purchased technology that used a GPS that

could read a satellite. "We were one of the earliest contractors that had that in the area. That is a big key to being successful in this type of work. If you are not up to date on having

good equipment and the latest technology, you lose your competitive edge," Dusty said. With about 30 employees, the company continues to grow today.

The boys apparently failed to realize the danger of derailing the trains, but merely obstructed the tracks with the idea of watching the debris fly.

Visitors to the open house will be able to meet local Extension educators and get a glimpse into what they work on within Extension.

"We are pleased that we are able to build upon the legacy of so many talented educators," said Cindy Sarkady, area Extension director for Fond du Lac, Ozaukee, Sheboygan, and Washington Counties. "In an age of misinformation, Washington county residents can trust their local extension educators to deliver research-based, unbiased information based on scientific fact, and help them apply it to

their specific local needs. Extension has some benefit for every person in our community."

Background

Agriculture Program

The UW-Extension Agriculture and Natural Resources Program provides support for commercial agriculture, small scale agriculture, consumer agriculture and home horticulture.

As part of the Tri-County Ag Specialization Group, the Agriculture Educators located in Washington, Sheboygan and Ozaukee Counties have developed areas of expertise to allow each to provide up-to-date information in their area of specialization. Educators in The Tri-County Ag Specialization Group support the following topics: farm business management, dairy and livestock production, crop production and agronomy, farm facility design and modernization, commercial horticulture, home gardening and consumer horticulture, and farm safety.

The Agriculture Educator also supports and facilitates the Youth Livestock Program and the local Master Gar-

dener Volunteer Program.

FoodWise Program

FoodWise/SNAP-Ed makes educational outreach through 20 local partner agencies; the program also depends upon the continued support of Washington County Board of Supervisors.

Through FoodWise sessions, county residents with limited financial resources learn how to choose and prepare healthful diets; balance food intake and physical activity; handle food safely; and become more food secure by spending dollars wisely. Over 10,000 direct educational contacts have been made to Washington County adults and youth since the inception of this FoodWise Project. Newsletters provide indirect education.

FoodWise also supports communities by participating in coalitions and local projects to help "make the healthy choice the easy choice" where people live, work, learn, play, and shop.

Family Living Program

Family well-being is at the heart of the Family

Living programs developed...no matter where a family is at. Today, the role of a Family Living Educator incorporates various levels of community engagement. While the Family Living Educator no longer visits families in their homes, programs are offered in the communities where families live and work, and online information and resources are provided for easy accessibility. Family Living programs are designed to address the needs identified by families.

Relationships developed with community agencies and organizations are crucial for Family Living to make its outreach. For example, Family Living provides Money Smart in Head Start monthly financial newsletters, workshops and financial coaching to families. In addition, the Family Living Educator facilitates training programs for agencies to build their capacity as they work with their clients on financial goals. Client families also rely on quality child care. Family Living responds by constructing relevant professional development programs with agencies to meet their



requirements, and to build the knowledge and skills of child care professionals.

4-H Youth Development Program

The mission of 4-H Youth Development is to "provide experiences where young people learn by doing." In 4-H Youth Development, youth complete hands-on projects in a positive environment. Youth receive guidance from adult mentors and are encouraged to take on proactive leadership roles.

Washington County 4-H is open to any youth in grades K5 through one year after high school graduation. Youth can choose from over 80 different projects, which are a series of learning experiences in which youth acquire knowledge about

the subject matter and gain life skills. Among the projects offered by 4-H are photography, archery, robotics, cake decorating, woodworking, rabbits, rocketry and dog training.

Community Development Program

Backed by University of Wisconsin research, the Community Development Educator works with local government, civic organizations, non-profit organizations, businesses, and community leaders to enhance local decision-making, and to help communities respond to new challenges and opportunities. As facilitators, Community Development Educators work in partnership with local people and organizations to meet identified local needs.

– University of Wisconsin-Stout

On a recent, mild summer day, one of the most talked-about new golf facilities in the U.S. was a busy place.

At rural Sand Valley Golf Resort in Adams County, south of Wisconsin Rapids, the large parking lot was nearly full and foursomes disappeared over broad sand dunes - who would have guessed in central Wisconsin? - with their caddies at the two 18-hole courses.

Attesting to the attention garnered by the new courses, among those on the links were a former U.S. Open champion and a group of 50 players from a Boston company.

Helping make sure the day went smoothly for golfers was another group of people - 12 students and four alumni from University of Wisconsin-Stout working as interns, most from Career Services' Cooperative Education Program, and full-time employees.

The interns and alumni, many from UW-Stout's golf enterprise management program, were in a symbiotic relationship with the course: They were helping each other get started.

Sand Valley's first course, named Sand Valley, opened in 2017 and was named the best new course in the country by Golf Digest magazine. A second course, Mammoth Dunes, opened this spring. There's also a 17-hole - yes, 17 - par three course, the Sandbox, and a fourth course in the works. The courses feature sandy waste areas exposed from deep deposits of glacial sand.

"We're opening a new course and helping set the foundation for how Sand Valley runs the next 20 years," said Ryan Glodowski, a senior from Stevens Point with a double major, GEM along with hotel, restaurant and tourism management. "It's on-the-job experience. You can't beat it."

Glodowski's internship began in April and goes through November; he also interned at Sand Valley in 2017. His expanded duties this year include working with special events and implementing a pace-of-play system.

Like Glodowski, sen-

ior Drew Ringelstetter, of Portage, has his second internship at Sand Valley. He's helping manage other interns in the outside operations area after working in the golf shop and helping run events in 2017.

Glodowski, Ringelstetter and other interns have been working eight- to 10-hour days, six days a week.

"It's an amazing experience opening a new course," Ringelstetter said. "We make sure everything is running smoothly and up to par and that anything golfers need we'll deliver for them. The first impression people have is key."

Experience And Opportunities

Glodowski and Ringelstetter say they've seen aspects of what they've learned in GEM classes at UW-Stout come together with practical knowledge during their internships, such as operations budgeting, turf management, marketing classes and customer service.

"We see the whole gamut of golf operations here," Ringelstetter said. "We don't just want to learn the golf side but the whole business."

Because of its reputation, Sand Valley has drawn high-level golf pros, club managers and business executives. The opportunity for students to work alongside those people while showing their skills is another benefit of being at the course, they said.

"People expect the best, and we want to perform the best," Glodowski said.

Sand Valley is owned by the Keiser family, which built a similar links-style, acclaimed golf operation called Bandon Dunes on Oregon's coast.

Casey Sabinash, a senior from Milwaukee, interned at Bandon Dunes in 2017 and at Sand Valley this summer. He also worked last year with a vendor at Erin Hills during the U.S. Open in Wisconsin, which has become one of the world's top golf destinations.

Originally a track and cross country recruit at UW-Stout who also loves golf, Sabinash plans to begin his career in the retail merchandising aspect of the golf industry. He is a double major in GEM and business administration.

"I found my niche in merchandise. The internships have driven my business acumen. It's a side of the business a lot of people don't think about - retail sales," he said.

At Sand Valley, he has worked in merchandise

receiving and the golf shop, which sells a variety of products along with clothing.

"The GEM program prepares all of us to do wonders in the industry and represent Stout with pride," Sabinash said.

Other UW-Stout students at Sand Valley this summer were: Corey Bunt, of Wooster, Ohio, intern, hotel, restaurant and tourism management major; Jill Daavettila, of Pleasant Prairie, intern, business administration major; Justin Doriott, of Hillsdale, intern, GEM major; Michael Elsen, of Coon Rapids, Minn., intern, GEM major; Dong Young Jang, of Ansan, South Korea, GEM major; Katherine Kiraly, of Stanley, intern, GEM major; Andrew Marshall, of Knapp, intern, GEM major; Mason Taylor, of St. Paul, intern, GEM major; and Laura Tews, of Campbellsport, merchandising intern, retail merchandising management major.

Four UW-Stout alumni working at Sand Valley are: Logan Block, of Wausau, May graduate in business administration, food and beverage manager; Brett Gerzmehle, of Nekoosa, May graduate, caddie manager; Logan Hamack, of Luck, May graduate, assistant pro and merchandise assistant; and Adam Robson, of Burnsville, 2016 graduate, assistant caddie manager.

Block, Gerzmehle and Hamack interned at Sand Valley in 2017, leading to jobs this year. In addition to 12 co-ops and internships this year, 11 UW-Stout students worked at Sand Valley in summer and fall 2017.

Howie Samb, assistant professor in the School of Hospitality Leadership, helps UW-Stout students find co-op experiences around the Midwest and country.

"All of our interns have a great opportunity to learn the golf industry firsthand and put to work what they learned in the classroom. The response from employers from all parts of the country that have hired our students is 99.9 percent positive, which is really rewarding to hear," he said.

Todd Gilley, one of the PGA golf pros at Sand Valley, complimented the UW-Stout interns.

"They must have a pretty good program. They all have been a pleasure to work with. They have great demeanors, are go-getters and intelligent. We rely on them a lot, and they all do a great job," Gilley said.



Physician Opens Practice In Mayville

Osteopathic physician Charles Sammis is a new breed of family physician bringing to Mayville old fashioned values in his practice of medicine, while staying up-to-date on modern medicinal technology and care.

"If you give personalized care with old fashioned values – to treat people like people, not a number, it's what it's all about," Sammis said about his philosophy.

He comes to Mayville via West Bend where he spent 14 years working in a medical clinic. Sammis relocated to Wisconsin from his home town, a small town in southern Illinois, near St. Louis, Mo., leaving his private practice of 20 years.

Sammis said the business part of medicine had become overwhelming with changing insurance, so when he received a call from the West Bend clinic inviting him to interview, he considered it.

He told them of his concern about having to work around ever changing insurance plans and was told he wouldn't have to worry about that side of the business – that he would be able to concentrate on caring for pa-

tients. However, that did not last long, Sammis said.

Changes in health insurance and an increasing corporate presence took the fun out of medicine and so Sammis began to think about going into private practice again – to practice medicine the way he wanted to practice it.

He said family medicine is best. When he gets to know a patient and their family, it's a better way to diagnose problems. "Spending more time makes a big difference," Sammis pointed out.

Physicians with solo practices have dwindled to 17 percent in the United States, Sammis said. It is a surprising statistic because solo practices are known to have the lowest cost of care, lower hospital and emergency room visits and patient satisfaction is at its highest.

When searching for a location, Sammis looked around and Mayville stood out to him. He and his wife of 40 years, Phyllis, had visited the city several times and saw how pretty it is, experienced how warm the people are and sensed its vibrant personality. It reminds Sammis of the town he grew up in.

He opened his practice at 130 South Main Street on June 20 where he treats infants to geriatrics. He accepts the majority of insurance plans, except for Dean Health. He also accepts self-pay.

Most medical procedures can be done in Sammis' office, including blood tests and results, ECGs and other diagnostic tests, minor surgeries, biopsies, skin lesions and stitching up lacerations. Also therapeutic ultrasound and osteopathic manipulation can be performed in his office.

Sammis is a partner of the Independent Practice Network, enabling him to utilize all healthcare ordinations, not just one. The affiliation gives the patient flexibility to choose where they want to go and enables Sammis to refer patients to the best subspecialist, if that is required.

An exciting development springing up across the country is direct care medicine, said Sammis. Direct care medicine eliminates the middle man resulting in lower costs, with patients paying from \$40-\$80 per regular visit.

"It makes sense," said Sammis, who said he may incorporate the practice in the near future.

Office hours are from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, except for Wednesday. His office staff consists of Robyn Weitz, MA, who works as a biller and office manager; Katie Feucht, LPN who is a nurse and phlebotomist; and Lacy Sterr, LPN who manages incoming calls and appointments.

Sammis gained his interest in medicine from his father who was a World War II veteran serving as a doctor in the U.S. Army Medical Corps, and was present at the D-Day Normandy invasion. Sammis' father passed away when Sammis was six years old.

"Walking in his shoes gave me a way to feel a connection to him," Sam-

mis said.

His mother passed away a short time after his father and Sammis' older brother became guardian to him and their two sisters.

Sammis enjoys sports, primarily football he admits, having played the sport in high school and college. He attended Millikin University where he set the state record at the time for the longest field goal (55 yards.)

Several National Football League teams courted Sammis to play for them and he entered into the draft. It was when he was invited to go to Atlanta for tryouts, he decided he would prefer to be a physician.

Millikin is where he met

Phyllis, his wife, who is a registered nurse, and who supported Sammis through medical school at Chicago College of Osteopathic Medicine.

"The reason why I wanted to become an osteopathic physician was based on its strong philosophy of primary care and treating the individual holistically," Sammis explained.

Sammis and his wife have three children (two daughters and a son) and three grandsons. His faith is a major part of his life.

Outside of work, Sammis enjoys cabinet making (his skill can be seen in much of the cabinetry and trim in his office), canoeing and fishing.

Gridders' First Conference Win Features Tough "D," New Tailback

Putting its recent loss to Plymouth behind them, the Kewaskum High football team scored three touchdowns in the second quarter and added another two after intermission en route to a 35-0 shutout victory over Kettle Moraine Lutheran in an East Central game played on September 21.

"It felt good," KHS coach Jason Piittmann said about the win. "The defense played lights out pretty well the whole night," and once the offense got going, it piled up 370 yards, including an even 200 on the ground.

The win was Kewaskum's first in the EC after going 0-3. The Indians are now 3-3 on the year.

After losing Jermaine "J.J." Thull to a knee injury a week ago, Piittmann was in search of a new tailback, and he found one in 190-pound Lucas Christenson, who rushed for 156 yards in 22 carries and three touchdowns.

"Lucas is a very hard runner," Piittmann said. "He's got that fullback mentality," but also "was a little shifty at times," looking for openings made by his offensive line instead of trying to create holes by himself.

Piittmann credited senior Colten Miller with being a major reason the Indians were successful on the ground.

"Colten Miller played fullback. He did a super job of opening holes for the running backs," he said.

The Indians' first drive ended with quarterback Michael Daniel turning the ball over to the Chargers on a fumble, but the second possession was a textbook drive, with Christenson finishing it off with five-yard touchdown. Ryan Prochnow was successful on the PAT (point after touchdown) kick for a 7-0 lead.

KML turned the ball over on its next possession, and the Indians weren't about to waste the opportunity, moving quickly into scoring position. The touchdown came on a Daniel to Prochnow pass covering 23 yards, seconds after Prochnow had caught a pass in the end zone, only to have it negated

because he was whistled for offensive pass interference.

Prochnow, who starts at cornerback and also punts for the Indians, got some time at wide receiver for this game since "Josh Bocher has been ill lately," according to Piittmann.

After the touchdown, Piittmann decided to go for the two-point conversion so the lead would be 15-0, but "They blitzed right into our play. It went nowhere."

Kewaskum got the ball back one more time in the first half and successfully moved down the field until Christenson's number was called again, and he darted into the end zone for his second score of the night. On the PAT try, Daniel ran the bootleg for the two points.

KHS scored one touchdown in the third quarter on a short run by Christenson, and the Indians finished off the night with a 23-yard touchdown pass from Daniel to Hunter Grady.

"Hunter Grady did a great job," Piittmann said, referring to the fact Grady's kickoffs were consistently inside the 10-yard line, he caught a touchdown pass and came up with an interception.

Dylan Maechtle led the receiver corps with five catches for 45 yards, while Prochnow had three catches for 70 yards.

Concerning standouts on defense, Piittmann said, "The defensive line did a good job ... Both Leisters (Jon and Ben) along with Miller."

He also cited linebackers Kyle Bath and Kannon Muckerheide, safeties Sam Lemler and Trevor Degnitz, and Eric Bauer and Prochnow at the corners.

KML managed just 90 yards in total offense.

The Indians are at Berlin (2-2) on Friday, Sept. 28, and Piittmann said, "Berlin is a good team. They're physical," adding, "We need to match their level."

Indians' injury report

Wide receiver/defensive back Jed Ermer had surgery on his knee during the past week. Piittmann said Ermer was injured in the Winneconne game, tearing his MCL (Medial Collateral Ligament), ACL (Anterior Cruciate Ligament) and meniscus.

"It was just a freak thing," Piittmann said, reporting Ermer was running a pass route and there was limited contact when "his knee just gave out."

First-string quarterback Ty Cook and J.J. Thull are also out for the season, according to Piittmann, who said his junior quarterback has "a torn labrum." Both may require surgery.

In other EC games, Winneconne swamped Waupun, 55-0; Plymouth defeated Ripon, 42-7; and Berlin romped over Campbellsport, 40-12.
