## County Seeks Applications For District 11 Board Supervisor Position

Washington County is seeking a supervisor to represent the people of Farmington on the County Board.

The county is currently accepting applications to fill the unexpired board term that ends in April 2020. Interested candidates must reside in District 11, attend County Board meetings, including regular meetings held on the second Wednesday of the month at 6 p.m. and attend regular standing committee meetings.

The Washington County Board of Supervisors is vested with powers of local, legislative and administrative character to act upon matters of general government, public safety, transportation, health and human services, court services, land use, planning and the conservation of land resources as delegated to

the counties of Wisconsin by State Legislature.

“Our ideal candidate is someone that has a passion for serving the citizens of Washington County, can work collaboratively with a diverse group of people and bring a fresh point of view to add to the quality of life for the citizens they represent,” County Board Chair Don Kriefall said. “This is an exciting time to join the County Board of Supervisors as we are exploring a variety of new initiatives that will lead to a more effective government, which can better serve the citizens of Washington County.”

This is the second

time this year that the county has sought applications for the position.

Applications were taken in July after Michael Parsons resigned from the position because he had moved outside the district. William Blanchard, who was appointed to the position on August 8, resigned on October 4 after the Washington County Ethics Board determined there was a conflict of interest for Blanchard to remain on the board.

The County Board’s executive committee decided on October 16 to fill the position through an appointment.

# Area Teen Killed In Hunting Accident

Trent Schueffner of the Armstrong area was killed on Friday, Oct. 19, in a hunting accident.

He was a junior at St. Mary's Springs Academy and a graduate of Shepherd of the Hills Catholic School.

According to Jon King of the DNR, the fatal hunting incident occurred in Calumet County on the morning of Friday, Oct. 19. Three juveniles were duck hunting on the south branch of the Manitowoc River.

"The department extends its condolences to the families and friends affected by this tragic loss of life," King said. "No other information is

available as the case remains under investigation."

Schueffner was a member of the Ledgers football, basketball and track teams.

On Friday, the St. Mary's Springs Academy Facebook page had this message for students, families and friends.

"It is with a heavy heart and great sadness to learn of the passing of junior Trent Schueffner during a tragic hunting accident earlier today. St. Mary's Springs Academy wishes to send our prayers and deepest sympathies to his family as well as our students, staff and Ledger com-

munity, as we mourn his loss and pray for his eternal rest.

"At the request of the family and his teammates, tonight's football game at 7 p.m. in Lomira will be played as scheduled. At the request of the students of SMSA, all are asked to wear 'green' in his honor. - Mrs. Norton"

It was the first round of the playoffs with Springs playing Dominican in Lomira. The players honored Schueffner by bringing his jersey to the middle of the field for the coin toss, displaying the jersey during the game and having a moment of silence and prayer before the game in honor of Trent.

In the end, the Ledgers won their game with an appropriate score of 62-13. Trent's jersey number was 62.

A motorist driving by saw black smoke coming from the residence and when pulling into the driveway, saw flames coming out of the back of the residence. ## WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORT

### Shed Fire

On October 20 at 10:30 a.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office received a call from the homeowner at 6565 Arthur Road in the Town of Hartford reporting the shed attached to his barn was on fire. The Hartford Fire department was paged and the call was upgraded to a MABAS call. Fire Departments from St. Lawrence, Slinger, Allenton, Neosho, Woodland, Ashippun, Richfield and Germantown re-

sponded to assist, along with Lifestar Ambulance.

Upon arrival there were smoke and flames coming from the lower level of the shed at the southwest corner of the barn. The fire was able to be extinguished by 11:41 a.m. and it was contained to the shed. It was determined that the homeowner had a high intensity light on a tripod in the upper level of the shed which was possibly left on. The tripod fell over sometime that morning due to the high

wind and ignited the floor of the shed.

There were no reported injuries associated with the fire and there is no damage estimate available.

### Ninth Offense OWI Arrest

On October 15 at 6:41 p.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office took a 911 call regarding a northbound vehicle on Interstate 41 near State Highway 167 that was swerving across all three lanes of traffic and

did not have headlights on. Before deputies intercepted the vehicle, the operator sideswiped a tractor trailer and continued north.

The vehicle failed to immediately stop for deputies and crashed into a median cable barrier south of State Highway 145. The driver, identified as a 60-year-old Amberg man, appeared to be in the onset of overdosing and was removed from the vehicle by deputies. The man could not stand on

his own or speak. Jackson Rescue arrived on scene and administered Narcan. The man was transported to St. Joseph's Hospital and

arrested for ninth offense OWI. After medical clearance he was taken to jail for felony bail jumping, possession of heroin and OWI.

## SHEBOYGAN COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORT

### Single Vehicle Crash

On Friday, Oct. 19, at 6:16 p.m. the Sheboygan County Emergency Dispatch Center received a 911 call in regards to a single vehicle crash on State Highway 23 near Bridgewood Road in Town of Sheboygan Falls.

The caller reported that the vehicle had been westbound on State Highway 23 and swerving prior to the crash. The vehicle entered the north ditch, rolled several times and struck a deer fence. The 24-year-old male passenger from rural Adell

was ejected and the 23-year-old female from Kewaskum was trapped. Both people had severe injuries and were transported via Flight for Life to Froedtert Hospital. The accident remains under investigation and names will not be released until contact is

made with family.

Assisting the Sheboygan County Sheriff's Office were: Orange Cross Ambulance Service, Town of Sheboygan Falls Fire Department and First Responders, Johnsonville Fire Department and Flight for Life.



# Horror On North Avenue

– Kewaskum Home Decorated For Halloween

A possessed doll sits on the front porch. A girl crawls out of a television that sits on the lawn. A demented killer clown greets his next victim.

These are just some of the terrifying scenes that have taken over Lori Bersch's front yard at 336 North Ave. in Kewaskum.

"We decided we had enough mannequins that we could get a little bit of all the horror movies out there," Bersch said.

Those who like scary movies will recognize the characters. Familiar slasher film stars such as Edward Scissorhands, Freddy Krueger and Jason are all prominently displayed.

Stephen King's Carrie is at center stage, covered in what looks like red blood. She appears to be coming from Bersch's picture window, which has been decorated to recreate the infamous prom scene. At night, a special light gives the effect that the building is on fire.

This is the second year in a row that Bersch

has gone all out to create a Halloween spectacle for her neighbors.

She started working on this year's display about two months ago. She and her 17-year-old daughter, Jordyn Bersch, began by making a list of their favorite horror films and shows.

Then they started creating. There are a couple masks that Bersch purchased at Goodwill, but the vast majority of the decorations are made by hand.

There was a lot to do, so Bersch took this week off from work to add the finishing touches.

Bersch, who is a licensed massage therapist, has a degree in commercial art. She hasn't worked in that field for over 20 years, but her display is putting that skill to use.

"We tried to enhance and hand craft as much as we could. That is the fun part of it," Bersch said.

Bersch's spooktacular hobby has turned into a family affair.

Her mother, Sandy Brzozowski, handmade most of the mannequin's costumes. Bersch's fa-

ther, Duane Brzozowski, who created much of the scenery from wood, was responsible for cutting, drilling and assembling the props.

Some of the characters' lifelike faces started out as a styrofoam head. For example, Jordyn put liquid latex over the styrofoam head before Bersch painted it to create Edward Scissorhands. To complete his look, they attached the head to a mannequin's body and dressed him in an old shirt. They painted stripes on the shirt and tore slits in the shirt to create the authentic look.

For some of the scary characters, such as the Chucky and Annabelle dolls, Bersch covered the styrofoam with clay to create facial features. Then, she covered the clay with Elmer's glue before painting it. The three-dimensional models are more than a creepy outdoor museum. They appear to be in action so onlookers can better sense the terrifying stories.

"I like to do scenes from the movies. I think it brings out more emotions than just having the characters," Bersch explained.

Attached to the house is a scene from the foreign movie "The Babadook." Bersch tried to make it appear as if pages are opening in a giant book.

Many of the mannequins scattered throughout the yard were used in Bersch's

display last year.

For instance, Bersch reused a mannequin to create her prized possession, Annabelle. Last year, the same mannequin was a ventriloquist's doll.

To create the new identity, Bersch scraped the ventriloquist features off the doll's face. Then she took clay and molded it to look like Annabelle. Then she covered the clay with school glue. Once that dried, Bersch painted the face.

Bersch's mother made Annabelle's outfit from a child's nurse costume and added a bow.

Jordyn added a spare wig to complete the look. "She looks pretty close," Bersch said.

Beside the Annabelle doll is a Raggedy Ann doll, visible through a

window in a box. The Raggedy Ann doll gives tribute to the true story that the Annabelle movie is based on.

"The real Annabelle doll is a Raggedy Ann doll. When they made the movie, they made her look scarier. I have two versions of Annabelle here. The real life one and the movie version. That is why she is in a box because she is possessed," Bersch said.

Finding a Raggedy Ann doll was one of Bersch's biggest challenges.

"I searched eBay and Craig's list. I searched everywhere. The one I found is an antique doll, so I am hoping she is not actually possessed," Bersch said, quickly adding, "She is in a box, so she is good."

The entire thing has become the talk of the neighborhood.

"The traffic is starting to slow down and accumulate. Plus all the kids that ride their bikes in the neighborhood are stopping by," Bersch said.

Some children have called out to Bersch, "That is so scary! I'm not going there for trick or treating!"

But those who dare to stop have a special treat.

"We make popcorn and cotton candy to give to everyone who stops," Bersch said.

Plus there will be a special interactive display so visitors can take pictures as one of the twins from "The Shining."

"It is so much fun," Jordyn said.

# Village Board Approves Increase In Library Budget

The Kewaskum Village Board last Monday, Oct. 15, approved a library budget of \$233,305.72 for 2019, an increase of about \$30,000 over last year. Of that increase, about \$18,000 comes from the village, while

the remainder will be drawn from designated funds, according to Village Administrator Matt Heiser. The approved library budget equates to an increase of less than 1 percent of the village's total tax levy, according to Heiser. Village Trustee Dave Spenner presented the

proposed library budget to the Village Board at last week's meeting.

"You know that I am a fiscal conservative, but I would recommend this budget," Spenner told the other trustees. "There is a substantial increase in the proposed library budget this year, but there are some reasons for that."

The increase is due mainly to a rise in wages and benefits.

"This is not because we have increased the size of the staff, this is the cost of the existing staff has gone up," Spenner explained.

Over the last several years, the library has come under budget, but that has mainly been because of staffing shortages, Spenner explained. Also contributing to the increased

budget is the increase in funding insurance benefits at the family level compared to the individual level, he said.

The village recently hired a new library director. Lori Kreis started in the position last Monday.

The budget increase is also due to a loss of about \$4,000 in shared revenue from other libraries, according to Spenner.

The Kewaskum Library's program cost is staying basically the same next year, according to Spenner.

In 2018, the library added programs that it intends to continue to do next year. For example, the summer reading program has been expanded so that it is not just for children; it now offers programming for teens and adults as well.

Circulation among village residents has gone up 10 percent, Spenner said. Many people, especially older adults, prefer reading old-fashioned style books that they can hold in their hands and with actual pages they can turn, he said.

"Some people would think circulation was down because people have access to the internet, but the fact is that everyone doesn't have access to the internet. In fact, some people come in and use the computers that are in the library because that is the only means they have to gain access to the internet," Spenner said.

The library budget also includes a variety of materials. There are books, music CDs, video games and DVDs

for all ages. Patrons can also check out Wi-Fi hotspots, electronic tablets and swim passes for Kiwanis Park.

"Families do extensive borrowing from our library because they see they are age appropriate and they can take those at no cost to the families," Spenner said. "Our library provides a very enriching experience for many, many families."

At last Monday's meeting, the Village Board passed a resolution requesting exemption from the countywide library system tax levy.

"This is what we do every year because we maintain our own library," Village Board President Kevin Scheunemann said.

# Village Board Discusses 2019 Budget

Village residents could see a tax levy increase of 8.25 percent in 2019

under a proposed budget that the Kewaskum Village Board discussed during a regular board meeting held last Monday, Oct. 15. That equates to a \$116 increase in taxes on a \$200,000 home.

The proposed increase was down from a 10.8 percent increase that the board considered on October 1.

The revised preliminary budget that Village Administrator Matt Heiser presented included a \$50,000 cut in street outlay and a \$25,000 reduction in storm sewer outlay.

To help keep spending down in 2019, the board discussed the possibility of borrowing in order to repair Third Street.

Village Board President Kevin Scheunemann said he was concerned about losing expenditure restraint funding from the state. The expenditure restraint program provides aid to qualifying municipalities that limit growth

in spending.

"That is my overriding concern, because if it does, that blows a hole in the budget," Scheunemann said about debt affecting expenditure restraint.

Heiser agreed to find out by the next meeting whether expenditure restraint would be affected.

The 2019 budget reflects an increase in debt for street projects that were completed in 2017 and 2018, as well as a new rescue engine. In addition, there is a TIF shortfall once again, although it is expected to be less than in 2018.

Final numbers for the budget will not be known until the village receives information from the county, school district and technical school.

The village's wish list

for the 2019 budget includes things such as: new inflatables and shade structure for the swim pond, new trees for village parks, new computers, improvements to the board room and street projects.

The proposed budget also included the increased library budget that the board approved that same evening.

The board is expected to discuss the budget again before it goes for final approval at the end of November.



It didn't take long to figure out which of the Kewaskum High volleyball players on the court was Hailey Hasenberg.

As the team's libero — a libero is a defensive specialist who normally is diving to dig up opposing teams kill attempts — Hasenberg wears a different colored jersey, and she was the energetic player who spent a lot of time flying through the air or on her knees, preventing opponents from scoring.

Many people have the idea volleyball is a sport strictly for tall girls. Hasenberg, listed in the program at 5 feet 5 inches, is proof that is just a myth. Defensive

play is very important in the sport. Her jumping abilities are good, though, as evidenced by the fact she usually plays middle for her club team.

She said, "I was recruited to play at outside hitter" by Marian University in Fond du Lac, where she plans to study Exercise Sports Science next fall.

When asked if she thought this season — the Indians finished third in the East Central Conference and won one regional match before losing to University School of Milwaukee — was a success, Hasenberg said emphatically, "I do. We finished 23-15 and for being as young as we were, we did very well."

Concerning the 1,125 digs being a record, Hasenberg said she recently checked statistics from previous years and the most she could find was 935 by Ellie Landerville. Record or not, that's a whole lot of digs for two seasons and will probably be a benchmark in the KHS program for years to come.

Hasenberg not only relished her role as libero but as team leader as she was the only senior KHS had this season.

"I enjoyed being the leader of the team," she said. "I tried to have everybody look out for each other," which resulted in team unity.

Hasenberg is looking forward to tryouts for club volleyball, which are coming up November 13, for competing with the KHS track team this spring and then moving on to Marian.

"I'm excited," she said.

"We had too many unforced, unfocused errors and as the tournament moves on those cannot make their way back into the matches," he said.



# KHS Cross Country Runners Don't Make The Cut

Teams from Grafton and Winneconne had a monopoly on the Division 2 cross country sectional field competing on October 19 on the Mayville Golf Course.

A steady stream of magenta-clad Winneconne runners dominated the front of the pack, allowing the Lady Wolves to take first place with an impressive 38 points, eight ahead of the runner-up Grafton squad, which came in with 46.

The Grafton boys, behind a 2-9-10-21-25 finish, captured the title and earned a trip to the state meet with 67 points, while Winneconne also advances by virtue of its second place (84 points).

The top two teams from each sectional earn trips to state, along with the top five individual finishers not from the two top teams.

Kewaskum still doesn't have enough depth to be among the team leaders, but it was hoped junior Andrew Carlton and sophomore Alyssa Butz might finish high enough in the field to qualify for their second trips to state as individuals.

Unfortunately that did not happen. Carlton

looked in good shape after the first mile, sitting in the eighth spot but he dropped back several spots the rest of the way to finish 12th overall and seventh as an individual (not counting the runners from the top two teams), two spots and 23 seconds from a trip to Wisconsin Rapids. His time was 18:09.96.

Butz, who won the Waupun Invitational earlier this season, struggled a bit and had to settle for 35th overall with a time of 22:29.83 and 23rd in the battle for an individual sport.

Senior home schooler, Maela Olla led the Indians, finishing 21st overall and 11th in the individual competition. She crossed the finish line in 21:56.25.

The KHS boys wound up 10th in the 16-team field with 232 points, while the girls finished 14th with 297 points.

"They came out today and did the best they could," KHS coach Kris Evans said after the races concluded with darkness starting to set in.

"Andrew surprised me," Evans went on, reporting Carlton came in with the 30th best time and placed 12th. He had a great race," the coach said.

"I had a setback in the

middle of the season," Carlton said about his bout with tendinitis, which sidelined him for a couple weeks and prevented him from turning in as good a time as he had last year.

Carlton was philosophical about not making it to state as a junior after getting there as a sophomore, commenting, "That's more motivation for my senior year."

"I wish it could have been faster, but I'll take it," Butz said, indicating there was no guarantee she would be able to repeat, especially since she felt, "Last year was a surprise."

Was Olla happy with her final race?

"Sure," she said. "It was kind of windy but I think I was able to pull it out (a good race)."

Evans was very happy with the effort turned in by Kyle Toth, the only senior on the boys' team.

"He's the first kid to go through my program (four years)," Evans said. "He had just a great last race," finishing 35th in 18:42.75.

The other KHS counters were: Gannon Kreuser, 41st, 18:57.49; Isaac Schmidt, 68th,

19:40.53; and Adam Walls, 19:53.99.

"Walls had a P.R. (personal record)," Evans said. "He's our guy to watch. He started as the number eight runner on the JV team and went to fifth on the varsity."

For the girls, Faith Mertzig, in her first year out for the sport, placed 58th (22:57.03), while Emma Penfield wound up 85th (24:00.89) and Rhea Dricken 108th (25:59.22).


