Kewaskum School District Holds Grand Opening

– Community Members Tour New Middle School And High School

Students greeted community members at the front door of Kewaskum Middle School for a Grand Opening celebration on Monday, Oct. 29.

The new Kewaskum Middle School and renovated Kewaskum High School were open to the public. Approximately 600 community members showed up for the event.

“This was an opportunity for people who wouldn’t normally come to the buildings for a parent-teacher conference or an open house to come see the facilities. We are very appreciative of them taking the time and coming,” Superintendent James Smasal said. “It was a glorious event. We are very blessed to have this community support and now first-class edu-

cational institutions for all our kids, kindergarten through 12th grade.”

Students led tours of the facilities so visitors could see the classrooms, outdoor courtyard, skylights, cafeterias and new gymnasium. Visitors got a firsthand look at the vibrant colors and modern furniture located throughout both schools.

“This makes me wish I was back in school,” Dr. Dennis Connor said as he looked around the new middle school library.

A ribbon cutting ceremony was held in the new middle school gymnasium, and Washington County Board Chairman Don Kriefall proclaimed the day Kewaskum Indians Day throughout the county.

Fish Find Home At Reigle Family Park

Park goers will be able to do some fishing when they visit Reigle Family Park in the future.

Last Friday, Oct. 26, the public pond was stocked with about 1,000 pounds of fish. The pond, which will be a catch and release operation, is now home to fat-head minnows, regular bluegills, black crappies and yellow perch.

The fish have some growing to do before they will be prize fish. Right now the minnows are about 2 to 3 inches long, while the other fish measure 3 to 5 inches in length.

The two-acre pond is situated on the eastern side of Reigle Family Park. The village’s newest park is located on Edgewood Road, just north of Highway H.

Drexel Building Supply stepped forward a couple months ago to stock and care for the pond.

“At Drexel, our mission is to supply happiness. It means to our customers, first and foremost, but also to our team members and to the commu-

nity around us. Kewaskum is right in the middle of Drexel territory. We are trying to change the world a little bit at a time, supplying happiness to families and kids who like to fish,” said Andy Rettler, whose title is defensive coordinator, and now fish guy, for Drexel.

Drexel plans to stock more fish into the pond in the spring. The company also plans to do some treatment in the pond to control weeds there.

Rettler has never stocked a pond before, but he is excited about the new job.

“I love fishing. My grandpa taught me to fish, and my dad taught me to fish. Now I’m teaching my kids to fish. My youngest could bait her own hook and take her own fish off the hook when she was 7, which I’m super proud of,” Rettler said.

Drexel plans to continue to care for the pond

indefinitely.

“We will continue as long as it is providing some fun for families and kids around the Kewaskum area,” Rettler said.

Drexel is not the only company that has stepped forward to help develop the pond area.

Peter Herriges, owner of H&H Electric, is donating installation and lighting for a walking path that goes around the pond.

“My wife and I have young kids in Kewaskum, and I definitely think this is something that their generation and future generations are really going to get a lot of use out of. It is a pretty great thing for the entire community,” Herriges said.

“We are excited about the growth in Kewaskum and everything the park system provides for the community,” he added.

A Local Piece Of History Destroyed By Fire

A local piece of history was destroyed by fire in the early morning hours on Wednesday, Oct. 24. The chapel at Camp Vista, near Dundee, was fully engulfed in flames when members of the Campbellsport Fire Department arrived shortly after 5 a.m.

According to the Fond du Lac Sheriff's Department, the fire was called in by someone who saw flames coming from a wooded area. Initial reports were that the chapel was fully engulfed in flames with the fire spreading into the nearby wooded area.

Due to the severity of the fire and the potential of it spreading, several area fire departments responded to help Campbellsport. Assisting on scene were departments from Mt. Calvary, St. Cloud, Kewaskum, Lomira, Brownsville, Beechwood, Calumet, Cascade, and RIT Team 3 and RIT Team 4. Crews were on scene for about five hours.

The main chapel, an approximately 50-foot by 80-foot building, is considered to be a total loss. No animals were lost in the fire and no injuries were reported to civilians or fire personnel.

In addition to the loss of the building, the archives of Camp Vista were located in the chapel.

At this time, the cause of the fire is unknown and is being investigated by the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office.

Waking To The News

Many area residents learned of the fire in the morning hours on Wednesday. Most were shocked to hear of the fire.

Posts on Facebook were frequent throughout the day as people heard the news, with many talking about the wonderful memories they have of the chapel and Camp Vista.

Neighbors of the camp stated that they will miss the sweet melody of the carillon bells from the

chapel. Archbishop Timothy Dolan had visited Camp Vista in 2004 to bless the new carillon system after it was installed.

History Of Camp Vista

Camp Vista was founded in 1961 by Father Joseph A. Fischer. He purchased 123 acres of farm land on Crooked Lake for \$17,500 from William Koch.

Father Fischer named the camp Vista Wee Yon Wa Untka, which means Our Lady of Hope in Sioux. The camp was incorporated on July 24, 1961.

The camp did not stay at the Crooked Lake location for long. The Wisconsin State Conservation Commission condemned the land in 1962. This was done with the intention of incorporating it into a state park.

Father Fischer tried to fight for the land, but fighting against the state was not easy. After a short fight, a new home for the camp was offered. This site was on Cedar Lake, Camp Vista's present home, near Dundee. A total of 98.5 acres was offered to Father Fischer for the camp.

Vista Wee Yon Wa Untka was blessed and dedicated to Our Lady of Hope by Archbishop William E. Cousins on July 17, 1964.

In 1967, an adjoining 122 acre farm was purchased for Camp Vista at a cost of \$21,500. During this same year, Father Fischer was transferred from Our Lady of Good Hope Parish in Milwaukee to Our Lady of Angels Parish in Armstrong.

The Chapel

One of the most exciting parts of the 50 year history of Camp Vista came in the early 1970s. Our Lady of the Vista Chapel was constructed in 1972 and 1973.

The chapel was built on a hill and was considered a constant reminder to the campers that the Lord is present in all they do. On August 15, 1973, Our Lady of the Vista Chapel was blessed by Archbishop William E. Cousins, the

same one who originally blessed the camp.

The base of the main altar in the chapel was provided by Our Lady of Angels Parish member John Schwind, Sr. He also provided the altar in the Blessed Sacrament Chapel. The materials came out of his woods.

Recent History

In 1977, an addition to the dining room was constructed. This included showers, a meeting room and a small apartment in the lower level. Father Fischer was transferred to St. Andrew's in LeRoy in 1980. He suffered a stroke in 1984 and retired from diocesan work.

In 1984, 80 acres of land across Cedar Lake was purchased for \$120,000 from Drs. Kou and Soo of Milwaukee. An additional six acres was purchased from the Dundee Gun Club for \$5,000.

Repairs have continued every year to make sure the camp is always in great condition for the many campers who visit. On October 8, 2006, Camp Vista celebrated its 45th anniversary with a special Mass with Bishop Richard Skiba. The dedication of the Vista Archives was done at the end of this Mass.

A new and exciting chapter in Camp Vista history came on May 13, 2008. This is when Andrew and Anna Fidziukiewicz, who lived in Chicago at the time, signed a three-year lease to direct and maintain the Vista. They continue to run Camp Vista today, 10 years later.

Though this was a sad event for the camp, everyone was remembering all of the great memories they have of the camp and the chapel. There is no doubt that Camp Vista and the Fidziukiewicz family will rebound from this fire the way adversity has been faced in the past.

Schickert was convicted of two counts of Second Degree Sexual Assault of a Child in Washington County on March 16, 2011, one count of Sex with a Child Age 16 or Older in Washington County on January 27, 2010, and one count of Fourth Degree Sexual Assault in Washington County on April 20, 2009.

Victims of Schickert knew him through social media. Schickert will be on probation until October 22, 2028, and will be monitored closely by WI-DOC Division of Community. Schickert will have numerous rules and restrictions to follow, including wearing a live tracking GPS unit.

This sex offender has served the prison sentence imposed on him by the courts. He is NOT wanted by law enforce-

ment at this time. This notification is not intended to increase fear, but rather it is our belief that an informed public is a safer public.

Since Meyer's release in February, he has not had any probation violations resulting in a revocation of his probation.

DAYS GONE BY

5 Years Ago

November 7, 2013

Beginning in the fall of 2015, half of the schools currently in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference (EWC), including Kewaskum, could be leaving and replaced by new members. If everything goes according to plan, the WIAA will shuffle the deck and apply the shift on four of the eight schools, moving them from the Green Bay area to another region.

The Village Board in Kewaskum has one less Trustee after the resignation of one of the board's newest members. The board on Monday voted to accept letters from the public to fill the vacant seat. Steam Fest 2018

The engine operator yells, "Let's go," and is answered by voice saying "Are you ready?" from the saw mill shed. The engine replies with a deafening shot of rising steam before the whine of the blade can be heard. A log hits the blade and sawdust begins to fly.

The chug and hiss signaled that Steam Fest 2018 and a meeting of the Wisconsin Historical Steam Engine Association was underway at the Matt and Eva Harvey farm near Campbellsport on Saturday, Oct. 27.

Together was with his dad, John — a Case steam engine.

"I lived in town and would have liked to have a big steam engine. This was the next best thing," the retired toolmaker said.

While Markus fashioned his own engines, others haunted steam shows and farms for aging equipment.

Bob Duescher owns a shingle mill, a rare find that he discovered on a farm about 20 miles from his home.

"There was a guy who had one in his backyard. He said it needed

Some were drawn to the hobby by the tales told at shows and gatherings.

"As a kid, I listened to my dad talk about working at a saw mill in Price County when he was in high school," Dan Jorgensen said.

The grounds were populated by steam fans and their toys — traction engines, shinglers, threshers and portable saw mills.

Ron Markus, Kewaskum brought 30-plus pieces of equipment — from traction engines to stone crushers, fire engines, threshers and horse drawn-equipment — all scaled-down replicas.

Markus, 81, has been working on the collection since the 1950's and the first piece he put to-

work but when I got it, it was all parts and pieces," Boettcher said.

Willie Boettcher, Chilton brought his 1919 Frick portable steam engine, one of three that had been stored at his father's farm for a quarter-century.

"I grew up around them," Boettcher said.

She didn't mind her husband's hobby, but admitted can become rather expensive. In addition to the Case, the couple arrived in another expensive hobby — a 1939 Chevy.

"We're old, we're going to enjoy it," Connor said.

Hannah Schladweiler, Beechwood stoked the fire in her dad Matt Harvey's 1906 Case steam tractor.

"I grew up around this," said Schladweiler as she checked a gauge on the Case. "This was a day in the life on this

farm."

She said her dad has never been what some might call, "into mainstream."

"When I was little we farmed with horses — that was before steam engines — so I guess we are slowly advancing to modern technology," Schladweiler said.

Those advances include Harvey's business.

A tool and die maker for nearly three decades, he started Harvey Diversified Trades a few years ago, and performs custom machining and welding for agriculture, industry and steam engines.

Boettcher's Frick was restored by Harvey and nephew Nate Harvey knows who to turn to when things fall apart.

"When I got in trouble, I had to come out here and help my uncle. I tried to get in trouble a lot," Nate Harvey said. "I still come out where when I'm in trouble. If I break something, he's the guy that can fix it."

– Community Members Tour New Middle School And High School

The event was complete with speeches, and middle school students made the first baskets in the new gym as the crowd cheered them on.

"I wish I had a nickel for every time I came down that 200 hallway and was giving someone a tour, and watching their jaw drop when they saw that skylight for the first time, especially on a sunny day. It has been really fantastic," High School Principal Scott Stier told the crowd.

He said one moment that stands out is when a student told him that walking through the new facilities reminded him of walking through a college.

"It was at that point that I just went yep, welcome to Kewaskum High School. So thank you to a board, our community, our students and our staff," Stier said to those assembled in the gymnasium. "We are all very fortunate to be working with such great people and be surrounded by such great people in the community. So thank you."

Julie Skelton, the principal of Kewaskum Middle School, added that the new facilities offer an

environment that provides flexibility and a collaborative work area.

The journey to constructing the new facilities began in 2013 when a Visionary Committee identified facility and athletic needs. A Long Range Planning Committee was created in 2015, and the community voted in 2016 to upgrade the middle school and high school facilities.

The tax impact of the 2016 referendum was 8 cents per \$1,000 of property value, 28 cents lower than the amount estimated in 2016.

The design of the new school was based on studies that show that students learn more when they collaborate than when they work individually. In addition, designs were based on research that shows that natural light leads to higher productivity and improved performance.

Students seem to appreciate the new facility.

Guests at Monday night's grand opening received handwritten notes from students. Each note was unique, but they delivered the same message that rang clear throughout the event.




Several teachers attended training this past summer to learn how to better enhance student learning by using the interactive features of the projector. Those teachers developed resources to teach their peers how to effectively

Kewaskum Improves ACT Scores

Kewaskum School District students are more prepared for college and careers compared to previous years.

As stated in the ACT's College Readiness Letter, the Class of 2018 was the first class in the past 10 years to perform above the state average.

The ACT test measures how likely high school students will be successful in first-year college coursework in the areas of reading, math, science, and English. Each student also receives a composite score that combines all

four areas into one overall score.

The Kewaskum Class of 2017 average composite score was 20.5, which matched the state average. Last year's graduating class averaged 20.7, 0.2 point above the state average.

"Ten years ago, even our college-bound students struggled with the ACT test. Now, all of our students take the ACT, and we can see the progress that we have made preparing our students for college and careers," said Superintendent James

Smasal.

The Class of 2016 was the first graduating class where all students were required by the state to take the ACT for accountability purposes. Before that time, only students who elected to take the ACT were reported to school districts.

"We are seeing a distinct upward trend with our ACT scores. It is very rewarding to see the hard work of our staff and students paying off," said Kewaskum High School Principal Scott Stier.

NOTICE OF REFERENDUM ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 2018

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at an election to be held in the County of Washington, State of Wisconsin, on Tuesday, November 6, 2018, the following proposed resolution will be submitted to a vote of the people pursuant to law:

2018 RESOLUTION 25 Advisory Referendum – Property Tax "Dark Store Loopholes"

WHEREAS, home owners in Wisconsin pay over 70% of the total statewide property tax levy; and

WHEREAS, the disproportionate burden of property taxes on home owners will worsen unless legislators take action to close loopholes in property tax law that some national chains and big box retail establishments use to gain dramatic reductions in property taxes; and

WHEREAS, lawsuits in Wisconsin have forced assessors to reduce the market value of thriving national retail stores, shifting the tax burden to local businesses and home owners; and

WHEREAS, some national chain stores in Wisconsin have argued in communities across the state that the assessed value of their property for property tax purposes should only be half of its actual value on the open market; and

WHEREAS, some big box chain stores are using what is known as the "Dark Store Theory" to argue that the assessed value of a new, thriving store should be based on comparing their buildings to nearby vacant or abandoned stores from a different market segment and in many cases, courts have sided with the national chain stores, requiring communities to refund tax revenue back to the chain stores; and

WHEREAS, the Indiana State Legislature has on two occasions in the last three years, overwhelmingly passed bipartisan legislation prohibiting assessors from valuing new big box stores the same as nearby abandoned stores from a different market segment; and

WHEREAS, Michigan State House overwhelmingly passed similar legislation in May of 2016;

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin State Legislature has yet to pass legislation closing the Dark Store loophole; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin State Statute §59.52(25) authorizes the County Board of Supervisors to conduct a county-wide advisory referendum; and

WHEREAS, a county-wide referendum on the issue of Dark Stores would provide guidance to the Wisconsin State Legislature as to the will of the Washington County electorate;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Washington County Board of Supervisors that the County Clerk is authorized to make arrangements to conduct a

county-wide advisory referendum to be held in conjunction with the November 2018 general election.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the question on the ballot shall read as follows:

Question: Should the state legislature enact proposed legislation that closes the Dark Store loopholes, which currently allow commercial retail properties to significantly reduce the assessed valuation and property tax of such properties, resulting in a substantial shift in taxes levied against other tax paying entities, such as residential home owners, and/or cuts in essential services provided by an affected municipality?

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County Attorney is directed to prepare a Notice of Referendum, including the date of the referendum, the entire text of the question, as well as an explanatory statement of the effect of either a yes or no vote.

Should the state legislature enact proposed legislation that closes the Dark Store Loopholes, which currently allow commercial retail properties to significantly reduce the assessed valuation and property tax of such properties, resulting in a substantial shift in taxes levied against other tax paying entities, such as residential home owners, and/or cuts in essential services provided by an affected municipality?

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT AND EFFECT OF VOTE

The referendum election ballot will ask electors to vote "yes" or "no" on the referendum election question as set forth above.

A "yes" vote on the question means that you support legislation to close property tax loopholes granted to big box retailers commonly referred to as "Dark Store Loopholes" and therefore, approve the County Board's adoption of 2018 Resolution 25.

A "no" vote on the question means that you oppose legislation to close property tax loopholes granted to big box retailers commonly referred to as "Dark Store Loopholes" and therefore, disapprove the County Board's adoption of 2018 Resolution 25.

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using an electronic ballot marking device ("ImageCast Evolution-ICE") to mark an optical scan ballot, the voter shall touch the screen at the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen at "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen at "no" if opposed to the question.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

Note: A voter must vote for Governor and Lieutenant Governor jointly on one ticket. A vote for Governor is also a vote for Lieutenant Governor. To vote for persons whose names do not appear on the ballot, write the names of individuals for both offices on the lines provided.

If a voter spoils an optical scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initiated by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve so the marks do not show. The voter shall then insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. If a central count system is used, the voter shall insert the ballot in the ballot box and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. Steer Clear Of Invasive Holiday Plants And Seek Native Alternatives

A 'bittersweet' Message About Colorful Autumn Arrangements

Homeowners and decorators creating their autumn displays should avoid two invasive plants that have been used historically in Thanksgiving and other floral arrangements but are increasingly recognized as harmful to forests, wetlands, prairies, and other wild areas.

Oriental bittersweet and multiflora rose offer attractive red accents but their use in holiday decorations and their disposal in compost piles increases the risk that these invasive plants will spread to new sites, says Matt Wallrath, Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources outreach coordinator working with the plant nursery, aquarium, pet,

and bait industries to prevent the sale and distribution of invasive species.

"Our wild lands and conservation areas are threatened by these non-native plant species, which can outcompete native plants and displace native wildlife," Wallrath says. "Vendors and consumers should seek native plant alternatives instead and avoid these invasive plants, which are illegal to sell or distribute in Wisconsin."

Oriental bittersweet (*Celastrus orbiculatus*) is a vine that spreads in forest understories and is known to kill mature trees by strangling their trunks. Multiflora rose (*Rosa multiflora*) is a

shrub that can form impenetrable bramble thickets that impede hunters and other recreationalists, while shading out native plant species.

The colorful fruits of these species are often eaten by birds and dispersed to areas far from their origin. Once established, these species are difficult to control. Even when these plants are cut down close to the soil, they re-sprout from roots remaining below-ground.

Kelly Kearns, an invasive plant specialist for the DNR Natural Heritage Conservation Program, suggests that vendors, decorators, and others looking for bright accents should consider using Wisconsin native

species including American bittersweet (*Celastrus scandens*), winterberry (*Ilex verticillata*), and native roses like smooth rose (*Rosa blanda*). "Native alternatives can add vivid color without posing a threat to our Wisconsin plants and animals," Kearns says.

To control the spread

of invasive species, Wisconsin regulates the importation and sale of more than 140 plants, as well as some animals, that have been identified as invasive in Wisconsin. Oriental bittersweet and multiflora rose are on the list of restricted species on the Wisconsin invasive species rule (Wis. Adm. Code ch. NR

40), making it illegal to transport, introduce, gift, buy, sell, or trade these plants unless you are trying to control or safely dispose of them. Search the DNR website, dnr.wi.gov, for "invasive species rule" to find an interactive list of invasive species, with factsheets, photos, identification tips, and more.

Promise Program At Moraine Park Expands Eligibility

Moraine Park Technical College will be expanding their 2019-20 Promise program eligibility guidelines to benefit more students at one time.

The Promise program offers the opportunity for five consecutive semesters of debt-free college tuition, as well as additional services to individuals who otherwise may not be considering college. The inaugural Promise class began in the fall of 2018 with a total of 30 students, with a goal to continue to grow the program.

"Building a program like this takes time," Kim Schwamn student development manager at Moraine Park said. "We have learned from this first year and will be implementing some changes that will allow us to serve more students."

Applications are currently being accepted for

the fall 2019 school year. To be eligible, students must reside within the Moraine Park Technical College district, be current high school seniors, and graduate on time from an accredited or home high school. They will need to earn a cumulative high school GPA of 2.25 or higher by the end of their junior year, a minimum composite score of 15 on the ACT, and be Pell Grant eligible.

To qualify for the program, students will apply for admissions to Moraine Park and submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) no later than April 15, 2019. The opportunity to benefit from the Promise program will be available to students who meet the outlined qualifications.

If the GPA or ACT requirements are not met, the college will accept a letter of recommenda-

tion from a high school counselor or faculty member.

"The biggest change in our eligibility is that we are accepting letters of recommendation as substitutions," Schwamn said. "No one knows these students better than the high school counselors and faculty. It's important to us that the schools know that their opinions matter to us and that we have made this change to help more of their students benefit from this wonderful program."



Packed Up For New England

The Green Bay Packers, (3-3-1) will travel to Gillette Stadium in Foxboro, Massachusetts, to take on the (6-2-0) New England Patriots on Sunday, Nov. 4, for a Sunday Night match-up. Kickoff is at 7:20 p.m. on NBC.

The Packers, coming off a disturbing loss against the Rams scored first. The Packers were up 10-0 when a Rams punt was downed late in the second quarter within one foot line of the goal. Instead of passing the ball out of the end zone, coach Mike McCarthy called a run play that resulted in a safety. That questionable call may have changed the momentum of the entire game, as from then on the Rams momentum took over, scoring 29 points.

Late in the fourth quarter with 2:05 minutes left, the Packers got the ball back after a Rams touchdown. With no timeouts left and the two-minute warning remaining, it was Aaron Rodgers' turn to do what he does best under pressure: win games.

However, running back Ty Montgomery, against being told to kneel down, chose to run the ball out of the end zone. As he was tackled early in the run by Rams linebacker Ramik Wilson, he fumbled the

ball, and the Rams recovered, sealing the win with the Packers down only two points.

Even though the Packers ended up losing 29-27, as disappointing the loss was, the Packers may have played their best game of season.

The Patriots are coming off their win over the Buffalo Bills on Monday Night Football with a score of 25-6.

This Sunday it'll be Rodgers against. Brady, the big reason everyone will be watching, but the Packers and Patriots are two of the most popular NFL teams and they only get together once every four years. Since 1993, the Packers have been to the playoffs 19 times, won the division title 12 times, been to the NFC Championship game seven times and have been to the Super Bowl three times, winning two of them. Since 2001, the Patriots have been to the playoffs 15 times, won 15 division titles, been to the AFC Championship game 12 times and have reached the Super Bowl eight times, winning five of them. Probably the most recognized game was Super Bowl XXXI between Brett Favre and Drew Bledsoe, with the Packers winning.

Combined, Rodgers and Brady have six Super Bowl victories, five Super

Bowl MVP awards, five MVP awards and 19 Pro Bowl selections. The Packers and the Patriots first met on November 18, 1973, with the Patriots winning 33-24. They last played on November 30, 2014, with the Packers winning 26-14. The Packers lead the series at 6-5-0.


