Honoring Those Who Served – Five Beechwood Fire Department Volunteers Go On Honor Flight

The five men have all volunteered for the Beechwood Fire Department. And they are all veterans who served during the Vietnam War era.

On Saturday, Oct. 13, the group went together on the Stars and Stripes Honor Flight to Washington, D.C. It was an experience none of them will forget.

Bob Hartmann, John W. Klahn, Frank A. Poos, Jr. and Donald K. Ruplinger all were amazed by the reception they received on the Honor Flight.

“When you get off the plane and walk down that runway, there are military personnel on both sides. There are little girls, grandmas and parents...they all want to shake your hands and hug you. It is just awesome,” Klahn said.

Klahn especially re-

members the group of about 10 cheerleaders that greeted him at the Milwaukee airport.

“One in the middle came running over by me and gave me a hug and was crying,” Klahn said. “You have to go on the flight to believe it. People treat you so well and it is so organized.”

While all the veterans on the Honor Flight were treated like royalty throughout the trip and experienced a zealous welcome when they returned to Wisconsin, the Beechwood group’s experience did not end when they left the airport.

The unsuspecting Beechwood veterans climbed onto a bus, thinking their experience was finished. But as they neared home, the bus unexpectedly stopped in front of Weasler Engineering. Members of the Kewaskum Fire Department greeted the veterans there, and a

Kewaskum fire truck escorted the bus all the way to St. Michael Catholic Church.

From there, a Boltonville fire truck led the caravan, escorting the honored group farther north until they were greeted by fire trucks from the Beechwood Fire Department.

The Beechwood fire trucks escorted the bus back to the Beechwood fire station, where the veterans and their families enjoyed a midnight luncheon and cake.

“It was the welcome we never got 50 years ago,” Hartmann said.

When Bob Hartmann graduated from Random Lake High School in 1962, he did not know that three years later he would be witnessing the horrors of the Vietnam War.

After Hanson and Ramthun set the agenda last week, the meeting was posted on the school district website, at the schools and at local banks.

WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORT

Drug Arrest

Deangelo Lee Wallace of Milwaukee was charged with multiple drug offenses in Washington County Circuit Court on October 31. The Washington County Drug Unit completed an investigation involving multiple sales of heroin, fentanyl, and crack cocaine between September 14 and October 16, 2018. Officers from Milwaukee Police Department District 4 assisted in taking Wallace into custody on October 30. After the arrest he was found to be in possession of additional heroin and crack cocaine.

Total drugs seized during the investigation:

- 13.2 grams fentanyl
- 3.88 grams heroin
- 16.35 grams crack cocaine

Charges consist specifically of:

- Three counts of delivery of schedule one or two narcotic as a repeater
- One count delivery of heroin greater than three grams as a repeater
- Four counts delivery of cocaine as a repeater
- One count possession with intent to deliver heroin as a repeater
- One count possession with intent to deliver cocaine as a repeater

Wallace received \$100,000 cash bond from the Honorable Judge James Muehlbauer.

The Washington County Multijurisdictional Drug Enforcement Group (Drug Unit) is a task force supported by the Washington County Sheriff's Office and all fulltime Police Departments in Washington County consisting of West Bend, Germantown, Kewaskum, Jackson, Hartford and Slinger police departments. These agencies, along with District Attorney Mark Benson, comprise the law enforcement board advising on task force operations.

Fatal Motorcycle Accident

A 53-year-old Town of Fredonia man who was critically injured in a single vehicle motorcycle accident that occurred on County Highway H east of County Highway M in the Town of Farmington at 8:10 p.m. on November 2 died as a result of his injuries at Froedtert Hospital in Wauwatosa. He was pronounced dead at 10:57 p.m.

His name is being withheld at this point pending notification of

family.

On November 2 at approximately 8:10 p.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified by a passerby that a man was located lying in the roadway next to a motorcycle and was unconscious and bleeding from the head.

The Fillmore Fire Department, Newburg Rescue and Washington County Sheriff's Office deputies were dispatched to the scene. Flight for Life and West Bend Fire Department Paramedics were requested a short time later to assist due to the seriousness of the injuries. The driver was transported by Flight for Life to Froedtert Hospital in Wauwatosa with life-threatening injuries.

The investigation revealed that the driver was travelling east-bound on County Highway H when his motorcycle struck a deer. The collision caused the driver to lose control of his motorcycle, which resulted in him being ejected. Speed and alcohol do not appear to be a factor in the accident. The driver was not wearing a helmet at the time of the accident.

This is the ninth traffic fatality in Washington

County in 2018.

Structure Fire

On November 2 at approximately 10:55 a.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office received a report of a structure fire at Voss Trenching, located at 3036 Willow Creek Road in the Village of Richfield. Deputies from the Washington County Sheriff's Office responded, and upon arrival of the first deputy, heavy smoke was coming out of the structure

with workers removing equipment from the pole barn.

The structure fire was quickly upgraded to the working still level by the Richfield Fire Department. The following fire departments responded to assist in fighting the fire; Germantown, Jackson, Slinger, Hartford and Lifestar Rescue. Upon arrival of fire personnel it was determined that the fire had entered into the insulated walls and ceiling of the pole barn. There

were no reported injuries to fire personnel as a result of the fire.

The pole barn suffered significant interior damage as a result of the fire, smoke and water. The damage estimate is in excess of \$30,000. The fire started in an area containing hay bales and is not considered to be suspicious in nature.

Willow Creek Road was closed for approximately two hours to assist in firefighting efforts.





**15 Years Ago
November 6, 2003**

The Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Department, along with the Campbellsport Rescue Squad and Fire Department and the Campbellsport Police responded to a head-on, two-vehicle crash on Saturday, Nov. 1, 2003, at 2:42 a.m. in the Town of Auburn. The crash occurred on CTH DD, 120 feet north of Lovers Lane. Patrice Seefeldt, 38, Campbellsport, was taken by Flight For Life helicopter to Froedtert Memorial Hospital in Wauwatosa for life threatening injuries she received. Her condition was not available at press time. The crash occurred when James Cesarec, 27, Kewaskum allegedly crossed the centerline while traveling his truck southbound and struck Seefeldt's car head-on while she was traveling northbound.

Kewaskum Fire Department was dispatched to a house fire at N637 CTH G in the

Kewaskum School Board Approves 2018-19 Budget – Tax Rate To Go Down 5 Percent

Property taxes for the Kewaskum School District are going down 5.14 percent for the 2018-19 school year from what they were in 2017-18 under a budget the Kewaskum School Board approved last Monday, Oct. 29.

The 2018-19 budget calls for a mill rate of \$8.53, down 46 cents from last year's rate of \$8.99.

"At 8.53, that is one of the lowest tax rates this school district has ever had," Kewaskum Superintendent James Smasal said. "More people are here to spread the burden out, and that is a win-win for everybody. It's a win for the kids, it's a win for the community."

The Kewaskum School District is asking

for \$41,928 less in property taxes for the 2018-19 school year than it did last year. The School Board voted 5-2 last week to approve a total tax levy for 2018-19 of \$11,537,057.

The School Board also voted 5-2 to approve the 2018-19 budget of \$38,729,716 for the 2018-19 school year.

Board members Jim Leister and Timothy Ramthun voted against the proposed budget and tax levy. Neither said during the meeting why they were voting no.

The district's membership count for the third week in September this year was 1,809, down 25 from last year's count of 1,834.

Last week's board meeting started with Board President Troy Hanson reading a state-

ment that the parliamentary procedure governing the Board, for the orderly conduct of meetings, shall be *Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised*. School board members shall act in a professional manner, confine remarks to the topic of agenda items and only participate in discussion after being recognized by the board president to do so, Hanson stated.

"The School Board and its members have an obligation to maintain decorum and conduct themselves as role models for the students of the district. Always bear in mind the first and greatest concern must be for the education and welfare of the students of the district," Hanson said.

Snowmobile Safety Course Offered

over who are interested in snowmobile driving are encouraged to attend. There is no maximum age and parents are encouraged to enroll and participate.

A parent must sign the application for a student to participate. The cost of the course is \$10 and covers all necessary materials.

If your birthday is after January 1, 1985, and are at least 12 years old, you must have certification from a safety course in order to drive on public trails. Failure to do so will result in a citation by the DNR. All students must also obtain a Wis-

consin DNR Customer ID number as part of the application. That number may be obtained by calling the DNR from 7 a.m. until 10 p.m. at 1-888-936-7463, or by visiting a DNR service center or the DNR website at <https://dnr.wi.gov/goWild>.

On Saturday, Oct. 13, known as "Super Saturday," there were a total of 14 honor flights from across the country with a total of 773 veterans that went to Washington D.C. In our area, there were three flights I was aware of on that day. Two from Milwaukee and one from Madison.

Our staff was notified before the flight that there were at least six veterans from the Kewaskum area going on one of the Milwaukee flights that day. The Madison flight had two veterans from our other paper's coverage area.

We can only cover veterans who contact us otherwise privacy rules don't allow us to do stories. We did not have anyone from Campbellsport, that we know of, this time.

I was invited to go as a media person on the flight out of Madison on the same day. It is our hope that the stories about our veterans on honor flights inspire other veterans from WW II, Korea, and Vietnam to sign-up for the trips before it is too late.

The waiting list can be as long as a year or more. However, there are some special exceptions to get ahead of the line.

The Honor Flights are an excellent way to honor our veterans.

One notable experience I had on the trip was when a group of Marines were cheering on the veterans I was with as they posed for a photo by the Maine Memorial. After taking the photo of our group, I

turned around and took a photo of about 100 Marines dressed in underwear (really shorts). They had just finished a run to raise funds for PTSD/suicide prevention. They were having a great time and it was a light and special moment for all.

When I was boarding the Honor Flight in Washington D.C. to come home, a veteran handed me a business sized card that says: "What is a Veteran? A Veteran... whether active duty, discharged, retired, or re-served... is someone who at some point in his or her life...wrote a blank check payable to, the United States of America for the amount of up to and including his or her life."

911 Memorial And Raise The Beam Awareness Promotion

It was wonderful to see the plans develop over the past year for the Wisconsin 911 Memorial Kewaskum Remembers. Gordon Haberman, who lost his daughter Andrea in the North Tower on September 11, 2001, has been leading the effort to get a memorial built for many years.

It is a place where an annual service could take place on September 11th and a place to educate the public on what 911 meant and what it means going forward. The memorial is in need of getting four major sponsors for each one of the "Learning Centers" in the design. Gordy and I became instant friends a couple of years ago. Because of my work on the Gold Star Memorial Trail and since I had a military connection he asked me to participate on the committee.

Over the past few weeks, the project has received special media attention from WTMJ 620 AM, the largest radio station in the state. The station brought attention to the project by adopting it as its fall Cares project to raise funds.

The initiative was named "Raise the Beam." The station brought attention to the







Honoring Those Who Served

– Five Beechwood Fire Department Volunteers Go On Honor Flight

Hartmann was drafted into the U.S. Army in May 1965. After completing basic training in Fort Knox, Kentucky, he went to Fort Jackson in South Carolina. He then went to Honolulu, Hawaii, for a few months before being sent to Vietnam to serve with the 65th Combat Engineers.

Hartmann was stationed in a combat zone

in Vietnam from December 1965 until February 1967. While there, he cleared the roads and built bridges for the infantry.

Hartmann and the other soldiers used dump trucks, military vehicles and whatever they could to knock down jungle and woods.

They entered the jungle areas ahead of the infantry, so they had

plenty of artillery, anything from 45s to shotguns to M-16s.

"We had it all," Hartmann said.

While there, Hartmann had plenty of close calls.

"We would go on missions. We had flame throwers, and search and destroy missions," he said. "We had to clear the roads of mines for the infantry when they had their missions going."

There is one part of the job he will never forget.

"We had to throw dead bodies on dump trucks. That was the worst part," Hartmann said.

He saw the bodies from the enemy troops as well.

"We would dig a big trench, throw them in and cover them up," Hartmann said.

After finishing up 14 months in Vietnam, Hartmann returned to the United States as a Spec 4. He and the other soldiers arrived in Los Angeles from their tour of duty.

People at the L.A. airport called Hartmann and the other soldiers baby killers and spit at them.

"It was not good,"

Hartmann said. "The thing about the girl that spit on me, she got more on her chin than she did on me."

Hartmann remembers that he and the other soldiers changed from their uniforms into civilian clothes as quickly as they could.

After returning home, Hartmann married his wife, Jan, on October 25, 1967. The Hartmanns live in the Town of Scott and have two children: Paul of Silver Creek and Jill Mueller of the Town of Scott. They have five grandchildren.

Hartmann worked 34 years as a truck driver for West Bend Transit.

He recalls his experience in Vietnam with great sadness.


"It was a war we never won. We lost a lot of lives for nothing," Hartmann said.

Frank A. Poos, Jr.

Frank A. Poos, Jr. graduated from Kewaskum High School in 1965 and enlisted in the U.S. Navy the following year. He served from 1966 until 1970, when he finished as a Radio Man 3rd Class.

His first assignment was at the Naval Communications Station in the Philippines, where he served for a year and a half.

Poos was at the Communications Station when the USS Forrester

caught on fire on July 29, 1967. A total of 134 people were killed and 161 were wounded on the carrier.

Poos remembers sending radio messages home for all the ship's survivors.

"They were short messages," Poos said. "I am fine. Letter to follow."

He then served aboard the USS Princeton, a helicopter carrier. He was aboard the Princeton when it served as the prime recovery ship for the Apollo 10 spacecraft when it landed in the Pacific Ocean on May 26, 1969. Poos spent a couple

years near New Zealand as the ship was fitted for service in Vietnam, but it was decommissioned in 1970.

Poos then spent three months working in communications aboard the USS Higbee. The ship provided gun support for troops in Vietnam.

"Troops would call in gun support from us, and then we would each of us fire the coordinations of their targets. We could fire a couple miles at least," Poos said, recalling how the shots would rock the ship.

When the ship returned to the Philippines to reload with ammunition, Poos was discharged.

None of the ships Poos served on took any enemy fire while he was serving. However, a rocket later hit the Higbee.

"That was two years after I got off the ship, but that was close enough," Poos said.

Poos said he enjoyed his time serving in the military.

"It was definitely an experience, that's for sure," he said.

Before serving overseas, Poos came home on leave to marry his wife, Elaine, on May 27, 1967.

After his service, Poos worked as a welder and then ran the Dew Drop Inn bar in Beechwood for five and a half years before working as a robotics technician. He and his wife live in

Beechwood.

John W. Klahn

John W. Klahn, who was born on January 18, 1939, attended a one-room school, North Beechwood. He then attended Kewaskum High School and graduated in 1956.

He was drafted into the U.S. Army on May 7, 1962 until April 30, 1968. When he was drafted, he was working in plumbing and was on his fourth year as a journeyman, just shy of finishing his term.

"I didn't think my number was coming up, but it came up and I was sent," Klahn recalled.

Klahn started out his military career by training at Fort Knox in Kentucky. He then went to Fort Benning in Georgia, where he worked in supply for headquarters, doing things such as cleaning weapons for officers.

One day in January 1963, while at Fort Benning, Klahn was walking outside when someone said to him, "You lucky guy, you're getting out of here. You're going to Thailand."

"Thailand, where's that?" Klahn asked.

In February 1963, Klahn arrived in Thailand, where he was stationed with the 809th Engineering Battalion at Camp Charm in central Thailand. He was stationed there for 13 months.

Klahn found himself continuing work in the plumbing field while in Thailand. He worked as a water point specialist, and was responsible for purifying water for the camp.

In addition to making sure the water was suitable to drink, Klahn made sure there was hot water at the camp.

"You didn't want all those guys coming after you; you made sure you had those tanks full of water for showering," Klahn said.

It was a job that required a lot of work.

"To me, this was a good tour of duty because you were busier than heck most every day," Klahn said. "It was a good job."

When Klahn was discharged from the Army in 1968, he returned to his job as a plumber. That April he received his journeyman's license.

The following year, he was called up to serve a couple weeks at Fort Jackson in South Carolina. He was called up once again to serve a couple weeks one year later at Fort Rucker in Alabama.

Klahn married his wife, Marlene, on September 5, 1964. Their children, Michelle, Annette and Kevin, all live

in the Beechwood area. They have five grandchildren.

Klahn worked as a journeyman plumber his entire career.

He and his wife are both members of the Beechwood Fire Department Auxiliary.

James Buechel

James Buechel grew up in the Town of Farmington and attended Fillmore Grade School before graduating from Kewaskum High School in 1968.

He was drafted into the U.S. Army in 1969 and went through basic training at Fort Campbell, Kentucky. From

there, he went through advanced artillery training at Fort Sill in Oklahoma.

He was a sole surviving son, so he was sent to Fliegerhorst, Germany, rather than to Vietnam. He worked there as a gunner for an 8-inch self-propelled howitzer.

Buechel shot many practice rounds with the howitzer, each round weighing over 200 pounds.

"They could travel 27 miles if you put full charge in them. But then you better stand back because everything is flying with all that gun powder," Buechel said.

The shots made a very loud noise, so Buechel did what he could to try to protect his hearing.


"I used to take cigarette butts and put them in my ears," he recalled.

Fortunately, the shots were all just for practice.

"There was no conflict there at that time," Buechel explained. "Our job was to protect the border if the Russians came across."

While serving, Buechel moved up the ranks while serving, going from private to corporal to sergeant.

One of the highlights during his time overseas was attending a USO show featuring Bob Hope.

Buechel returned home in 1971. A year later, he married his wife, Sue. The couple have two children, Doug Buechel and Jeff Buechel, both of Kewaskum, and two grandchildren.

Buechel worked as a telephone company lineman, first with GTE, then Verizon and later Frontier. He currently works as a driver at Eric von Schledorn Ford in Random Lake.

Donald K. Ruplinger

A 1966 graduate of Campbellsport High School, Donald K. Ruplinger was drafted into the U.S. Army, serving from December 1967 to December 1969.

Ruplinger's twin brother, Ronald, also was drafted. However, Donald Ruplinger found out he had a hernia, so he started serving about four weeks after his brother.

Donald Ruplinger went to Fort Campbell in Kentucky for basic training, and then went to Fort Polk in Louisiana for advanced infantry training.

He arrived in Vietnam in May 1968 and served in the 2nd Battalion 39th Infantry Brigade, 9th Infantry Division.

He originally was supposed to be stationed farther north, but he requested to be near his brother. By the time he arrived, his brother was already wounded. Ru-

plinger's brother survived the injury, but was sent back home to the United States.

Donald Ruplinger, however, remained in Vietnam for 12 months.

"They put us right into the combat," Ruplinger said. "When I got there, we were in extreme fighting, most of the time out in the field."

Ruplinger made friends while in Vietnam, and a group of six of them became close buddies. Two of the group were killed in action, fighting beside Ruplinger.

The remaining four are still good friends today. They are scat-

tered across the United States, living in Wisconsin, California, Georgia and Ohio. The group gets together every other year.

It wasn't always like that, though.

"For 35 years we didn't do anything. Nobody talked about [the war]," Ruplinger said.

Ruplinger's final rank was sergeant when he was honorably discharged in December 1969. He married his wife, Barbara, on April 22, 1972. They have two children, Tracy Coulter of Colgate and Julie Ruplinger of Milwaukee, and five grandchildren.

Ruplinger worked in Germantown in shipping and receiving and as a truck driver before retiring. A retired assistant chief, he has been a member of the Beechwood Fire Department since 1977.



Leister Is Indians' Lone First Team Selection

With champion Winneconne and Plymouth dominating the first and second teams, it was difficult for the other schools in the East Central Conference, including Kewaskum, to receive much acclaim on the all-conference team.

The coaches from the eight EC teams selected four Winneconne Wolves to the first team offense and another player to the first team defense, with four others receiving second team medals.

The Plymouth Panthers did even better, getting five on the first team and three on the second offense, with six more earning honors on the second team, three on offense and three on defense.

Kewaskum, which finished with just two wins in the conference this fall after going unbeaten in 2017, was represented by just one player on the first unit. Jon Leister, a 6 foot 3 inch, 280-pound tackle, was one of eight unanimous players on the offense, and he also made the first team defense as an interior lineman.

"I was very happy that Jon got first team both ways and was unanimous on offense," veteran KHS coach Jason Piittmann said about the jumbo Leister. "He has definitely earned the respect of the coaches in the league over the years. We gained most of our yardage behind him, and we would move him around the defensive

line to where we needed him to stuff the opponents."

In his seven conference game, Leister was credited with 26 tackles, including 11 solos. He had three tackles for losses, one quarterback sack and one forced fumble.

Making the second team for the Indians were senior kicker Ryan Prochnow, sophomore linebacker Kannon Muckerheide and senior running back Lucas Christenson.

Prochnow's story is quite interesting in the fact he hadn't played football since he was in the sixth grade but decided to go out for the sport this fall and wound up as the kicker and started in the defensive backfield. Prochnow wound up making 12 of 13 PATs (points after touchdown) tries and also successfully converted on the one field goal he tried.

"Ryan was a nice surprise for us this season, having not played in recent years. He learned quickly and did a great job using his athleticism. The other coaches did take notice," Piittmann said. "I wish we could have had him for all four years to see what kind of player he may have developed into."

Defensively, Prochnow led the team in interceptions with three and had 35 tackles, including 12 solos. He received honorable mention for his work in the secondary.

Muckerheide was the team's leading tackler,

with 68 tackles, including 28 solos, give tackles for losses, two sacks and one interception. Piittmann will certainly be happy to have Muckerheide back for two more seasons.

"Kannon has a really nice season. We moved him around a bit, due to the injury bug that bit us too often," the coach said. "He is going to be a really good player if he keeps working at it."

Christenson's selection may have been a bit of surprise, even to Piittmann, who said, "I wasn't sure if Lucas would get the votes since we tried a few different things in the backfield before he became our main back. I didn't know if some of the coaches would give him the votes. They did give him the votes to show that they respected the work he did."

Christenson started the season as a second string back, gaining just 28 yards rushing in the first five games, but when Jermaine "J.J." Thull went down with a knee injury in the Plymouth game, he got his chance to be a starter.

In his first game, against Kettle Moraine Lutheran, he scored three touchdowns and gained 156 yards in 22 carries. Then he said 106 yards against third-place Berlin before going on a spree vs. winless Waupun, scoring four time and gaining 268 yards in 31 carries, but against Campbellsport in the season finale, Christenson was held to 21

yards in 14 carries.

Sophomore lineman Trenton Riekkoff received honorable mention on offense.

South Dakota University

How evenly matched were the South Dakota and Indians State football teams? Well, it took three overtimes to determine a winner, and unfortunately it wasn't Brandon Thull and the Coyotes getting the victory. They lost the game 51-47 as the Sycamores scored a touchdown after South Dakota had kicked a field goal with its possession in the third OT.

Thull, who holds the record for most yards rushing and most touchdowns at KHS, carried the ball eight times, gaining 43 yards for a 4.8 yard per carry average. His longest run was a 14-yarder. Thull also caught two passes for 15 yards.

With the loss, the Coyotes dropped to 3-6 overall. They play Western Illinois this Saturday, November 10 in Vermillion.

Note: Thull suffered an injury to his knee and was unable to finish the game. He is scheduled to have an MRI on November 9 to determine the extent of the injury.

Madison Area Technical College

Southpaw Andrew Neu, who helped the Kewaskum Indians win the final North Shore Conference summer baseball title in July, just competed the fall season at Madison Area Technical College.

While stats are not kept, Neu said recently the Wolfpack finished above .500 playing games against schools from the Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (WIAC) like UW-La Crosse and UW-Oshkosh.

"We had a pretty good fall," Neu said. "We played some good teams."

Neu said he got to see action in each series the Wolfpack played, pitching "usually three or four innings" The emphasis was not on wins and losses but more just working on pitching mechanics. He said he learned how to throw a two-seam fastball, the bread-and-butter pitch used by the Wolfpack.

The spring season

starts with a week and a half trip to Arizona in March. "I'm looking forward to it," Neu said.

Milwaukee School of Engineering

When is a win really a loss? When a team inadvertently uses an ineligible player, and that's what happened to the MSOE women's soccer team, which had won a 2-1 decision over host Illinois Tech in a first-round NACC tournament game played in Chicago on October 30 only to have to forfeit it.

Kewaskum's Jeray Riffel assisted on the Raider's winning goal in the 70th minute, nailing a corner kick past the far post where Nikki Ratts sent the ball into the net.

After the match, it was determined an ineligible student athlete was used in the game. For this reason, the Raiders forfeited the match, and their season came to an end with a 13-9-1 record. Illinois Tech (14-5-1), which had beaten MSOE earlier in the season, moves on to the title round of the tournament.

Northern Michigan University

Kewaskum's Brady Hanson and teammate Isaac Darkangelo each had 10 tackles, helping Northern Michigan to a thrilling 34-24 victory over Wayne State in a game played in Detroit on November 3.

Hanson was credited with seven solos and three assists while Darkangelo had eight solos and two assists, including 1.5 sack for the Wildcat defense.

Northern Michigan, currently 1-6 in the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference and 3-7 overall, scored three touchdowns in the final quarter to wipe out Wayne State's 17-13 lead. The Wildcats scored twice in the final 1:28, including a 97-yard interception return by Anthony Ladd with 10 seconds remaining.
