School Board Reprimands VP

– Jim Leister Calls Complaints “Retaliation”

An extra seat was on the stage for Attorney Shana Lewis, an attorney from the Strang, Patten, Renning, Lewis & Lacy firm in Madison, as the Kewaskum School Board met on Monday, Nov. 12.

Lewis advised the School Board throughout the meeting, beginning immediately after the Board President Troy Hanson read an introductory statement. Board Vice President Jim Leister questioned whether that was acceptable since it was not on the meeting agenda.

“Open meeting law does not require that you identify ever piece of language that is going to be expressed during a school board meeting,” Lewis said. “It is perfectly fine for the school board president to include an introductory statement to calling the meeting to order,” Lewis said.

Leister then asked about the meeting minutes from the October 29. The minutes state that a Board Member Timothy Ramthun requested a special meeting and it was scheduled for November 5. That was incorrect, Leister said.

Proposed Village Of Kewaskum Budget Has Nine Percent Increase

The Kewaskum Village Board has proposed a budget of \$2.3 million for 2019.

There is still some information from the county and state that will have an impact on the final village mill rate, but the current status of the budget equates to a 9.13 percent increase over the 2018 budget. That would add approximately \$132 to a tax bill on a property assessed at \$200,000.

The increase is not related to the school district’s building project. The Kewaskum School Board approved the district’s budget on October 29 that reflects a 5.14 percent decrease from the 2017-18 school budget.

The Village of Kewaskum will hold a public hearing on the village’s budget on Tuesday, Nov. 27, at 7 p.m. at Village Hall. The board is expected to approve the final 2019

budget after the public hearing.

The increase in the village’s budget is due to significant debt that the village incurred in 2017 and 2018 for road projects and the purchase of a rescue engine for the Kewaskum Fire Department.

The costs of the road projects and fire truck

were:

- Roseland Drive with water and sewer utilities, \$999,479.
- Habeck Street and Keller Street with water and sewer utilities, \$838,936
- Edgewood Drive repair base and repave, \$338,384
- Rescue engine: \$708,435.

“The feedback from taxpayers regarding the improved streets and new engine has been very positive,” Village Administrator Matt Heiser said.

Other areas of the Village budget were reduced to offset the impact of these projects and purchase, Heiser said.

Town Of Auburn Discusses ATV Use On Roadways

Members of the Town of Auburn board, during their Monday, Nov. 12, meeting, discussed the possibility of allowing ATVs and UTVs use on town roads.

Members of the Kettle Trails ATV/UTV Trail Planning Group approached the town board at their October meeting to see if the town would consider an ordinance allowing ATV/UTV use on town roadways. Kettle Trails came up with a proposal for the township which included a list of the roads they would like to use and a sample ordinance for the town to approve.

Members in attendance at the meeting explained that this is a growing trend in the

state. Some area municipalities, like the Village of Eden and Town of Osceola, have recently approved similar ordinances.

"The whole northern half of the state and the UP are open," said Tommy Thompson, chairman for Town of Osceola and proponent for the ATV ordinance.

Another ATV member explained that they are working to get this part of the state open for ATV trails.

"We're working on connecting this all around the area," said Tom Kempke. "The idea is to get access all around. It also allows your people (residents) to get to the forest."

Kempke explained that Kettle Trails is in the process right now of going to area municipalities in Fond du Lac,

Sheboygan, Washington and Ozaukee counties with the same proposal. They are working hard right now to open roadways to ATV/UTVs.

Thompson explained that he did a lot of research before the Town of Osceola approved their ordinance. He called area municipalities that had already approved similar ordinances to see how it was working in their communities.

"I called all the people around the area and asked if they had any problems and they said no," Thompson said.

Auburn board members stated that they had a few more questions about this idea and how to implement it. Some have already talked with area business owners who all stated that they are in favor of the ordi-

nance.

"The people I've talked to have been for it," said supervisor Jim "Woody" Woodworth. "I want it, but I still think there might be some question marks."

Supervisor John Janz stated, "I'm not saying let's jump head first into it. We should hash this out."

The board also wanted to get more information out to town residents before approving any ordinance. They wanted as many people to know about this and have a chance to comment on it as possible.

"The more meetings we have, the more people can get out here and voice their opinion," Janz said.

Chairman Ken Deperman added, "I think it's important to get it out to the citizens and see what they think."

The board decided they are going to form a committee with themselves, residents and members of Kettle Trails. This group will do a little more research to answer the questions the board has and get just a little more information on this subject.

"As a committee, we will give monthly updates," Janz said.

They did not give a timeline as to how long it will take to research, but hoped it would only take a few months. The subject will then come to the town board again in the future for a decision.

In other business, board members asked

residents to let them know if there are any trees near town roads that are uprooted, leaning or hanging. They are still cleaning up from the storms that hit the area at the end of August and are trying to continue to clear any trees dam-

aged by the tornadoes and strong winds.

"If anyone sees any spots where there are bad trees where they are leaning or hanging, please let us know," Woodworth said.

SHERIFF'S REPORT

Theft From Holy Hill

On November 7, Pierre A. Valodine of Hubertus was arrested for stealing money from the Holy Hill National Shrine of Mary Church in the Town of Erin, Washington County.

An investigation conducted by the Washington County Sheriff's Office began after Valodine was suspected of stealing money from the church while he was sorting and counting money with other volunteers.

Detectives were able

to conduct surveillance and successfully caught Valodine in the act of stealing money during the money counting process recently. Valodine admitted to stealing from the church. Valodine estimated that he had stolen about \$50,000; however, that number could be much higher.

Valodine made an appearance in Washington County court and has been charged with two counts of theft greater than \$10,000, which are Class G felonies.

Kewaskum Public Library Has New Director

Library patrons have been seeing a new face Kewaskum: Lori Kreis is the new director of the Kewaskum Public Library.

"Everybody has been so friendly and nice here," said Kreis, who is thrilled to be working in Kewaskum.

Kreis, who is married and has three children and one grandchild, is originally from the Milwaukee area. She has lived in West Bend for the past 20 years.

Although she has worked as a librarian for about 10 years, she did not always plan on becoming a librarian.

Kreis originally worked as a teacher after graduating from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee with a bachelor's degree in elementary education. However, she decided that was not the career for her, so she got a job at Bank One, then Chase.

"I worked in the banking industry in corporate compliance for about 20 years. It wasn't the thing I wanted to do, but I could support my family with it," Kreis said.

Once her youngest child graduated from high school, Kreis dis-

cussed changing careers with her family.

"You should be a librarian because you like to read and you like to help people find things," Kreis' daughter said.

"That's true," Kreis agreed.

So she made the simple decision to become a librarian.

After earning her master's degree in library science from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, Kreis was interviewed for a job at the library in Milwaukee. She was asked if she liked maps.

"I don't even know how to fold them," Kreis thought to herself.

But she said she was interested in the job, and she was hired as a map librarian.

"It was a lot different than I thought and it was a lot of fun. I was a travel librarian, so I would order all the new travelogues and maintain the maps. There were some great historical ones," Kreis said.

In that position, she worked in the humanities room and also served as a reference librarian. She researched house histories and gave library tours.

"It was a great first library job," Kreis said.

After about a year,

Kreis became the adult services librarian at the public library in Hales Corners. She worked there for about five years as an adult services librarian.

"I really liked doing the programs and ordering materials for the library, and just being involved with the community," she said.

However, she realized she needed to be a manager and there was not a spot for that in the small Hales Corners library. So she became a branch manager at the library branch at 74th and Capitol in Milwaukee. That is where she worked for the past year and a half.

But as soon as she saw that the position had opened up in Kewaskum, she was interested.

"It is only a 15 minute drive. I don't have to look at traffic reports any more," she said.

She is excited about the job as well.

"It is a small town, and I can get back to doing programming. I am really excited about getting back to doing that," Kreis said. "I am most excited about getting to learn the community and the patrons, and just being able to serve them."

Kreis enjoys doing craft programs, so she hopes to offer some of those for the community.

In addition, she is very interested in lifelong

learning.

"We have some really good resources through Monarch, such as the Gale courses and data bases. We are hopefully going to get some more ancestry resources for the library. I want to have classes to show people how to use all those resources," Kreis said.

Kreis is already familiar with different events in Kewaskum. She and her husband always attend the car show in Ke-

waskum and each year they watch the fireworks on July 3.

"We have been involved in the community that way, and now I found out the library will be part of the Cookie Hunt, so that is really exciting," Kreis said.

"I'm just really happy to be here and start the new chapter of my life. I am excited to get to know the community and hopefully make a difference."

Kewaskum Exceeds Expectations On District Report Card

The Wisconsin Department of Instruction has released the 2017-18 District Report Cards, and the Kewaskum School District achieved the Exceeds Expectations category, improving the district report card score by 3.1 points over last year. This score is the highest the district has had in the past six years.

"We are excited to see the continued improvement in student learning. Our teachers and administrators are working hard to make sure that all of our students are college and career ready when they graduate from our district," said Superintendent Jim Smasal.

The Department of Public Instruction (DPI) generates a School Report Card and District Report Card for every publicly funded school and district in the state.

The Report Cards are intended to help schools and districts utilize performance data to target their improvement efforts so that students are ready for their next educational step.

"As a learning community, we are continually looking to improve the teaching and learning that happens in our schools. We use the district and school report cards to reflect on our strengths and areas for improvement," said Curriculum Director Mark Bazata.

The report cards have four priority areas including student achievement and student growth in English language arts and mathematics. These reports also score districts and schools in how well they are closing achievement gaps in specific student groups and the postsecondary readiness pre-

dictors of how many students are on-track to graduate.

As a district, the Kewaskum School District performed above the state average in all areas, scoring between 7.5 to 15.3 points above the state average in the priority areas.

The priority area scores are aggregated into an overall accountability score, from 0 to 100. This score is displayed in the top left corner of the School or District Report Cards. Based on its score, a school or district receives one of five rating categories, from Significantly Exceeds Expectations to Fails to Meet Expectations, as well as corresponding one to five stars.

Preserving And Protecting Cedar Community's Natural Campus For Generations To Come

As Cedar Community continues to work on plans to develop new independent living homes on its Cedar Lake Campus, an important part of that plan includes the creation of a nature conservancy on its property on Big Cedar Lake.

"Cedar Community has been a strong steward of our Cedar Lake Campus on County Road Z in the Town of West Bend for more than six decades, and we are dedicated to preserving this unmatched natural setting," said Lynn Olson, chief executive officer.

"Cedar Community is committed to protecting approximately 100 acres of shoreline, prairie and forest lands through a legal conservation entity, and we are currently exploring all options by which to do so," said Olson.

Much of the 245 acres on the Cedar Community campus was originally bare farmland. Over the years there has been an ongoing and robust effort to plant trees throughout the campus, preserve

and protect the largest undeveloped area of shoreline on Big Cedar Lake and maintain natural Wisconsin prairies as part of an ongoing conservation process.

"Cedar Community has done an amazing job of maintaining this beautiful piece of property on Big Cedar Lake. Their current prairie restoration areas are healthy and pristine and provide a natural watershed buffer to Big Cedar Lake. They are planning to further this buffer with additional native grasslands along the shoreline," said Kristi Sherfinski, a landscape architect and botanist working with Cedar Community.

Sherfinski's locally based landscape architectural firm, Helianthus, specializes in wetlands and environmentally sensitive areas. It is working with Cedar Community to conduct a thorough site inventory and analysis, including wetland and invasive species assessments, as well as wildlife and tree surveys on the Cedar Lake Campus.

Protecting the lakefront and surrounding prairie and forest lands is also very important to Cedar Community's residents.

"Our residents and their families have a great love of the beauty of the forest and the undeveloped shoreline, and of our many woodland 'residents' that Cedar Community cherishes as part of our natural campus," said Julie Gabelmann, vice president of resident experience.

Cedar Community hopes to have a comprehensive plan ready for review by the Town of West Bend before the end of 2018.

"As stewards of this amazing campus for generations, we feel our plan will offer opportunity for growth, along with a conservancy plan that will protect this campus and the shoreline of Big Cedar Lake in order to ensure a beautiful, natural setting for residents and their families to enjoy for generations to come," said Olson.

Boltonville firefighters worked through the wreckage at the Gary and Doris Schladweiler farm on Wescott Road in Farmington Sunday after a strong storm with downburst winds toppled a silo on their cattle barn killing 12 animals.

Farmington is the latest municipality to join a group of area townships that will allow rifle hunting after a DNR rule change that took effect November 1. Gun deer hunting season opens this weekend and all the townships around Kewaskum will allow rifles during the hunt.

In the process of turning, the automobile failed to yield the right of way to a northbound pickup truck, operated by a 38-year-old City of West Bend man, and was struck.

A West Bend man is facing charges of Operating While Intoxicated after an early morning head-on crash on Sun-

day, Nov. 17. Injuries were minor, however deputies found a loaded weapon inside the man's truck. The crash occurred on Bolton Dr. at the intersection of State Highway 144 in the Town of Farmington. Washington County Sheriff's deputies, Boltonville Fire Department and Kewaskum Ambulance were dispatched to the scene at 2:13 a.m. Upon their arrival it was discovered a northbound vehicle, driven by a 21-year-old City of West Bend man allegedly drifted into the southbound lane and collided with a vehicle driven by a 38-year-old Town of Kewaskum man. The 21-year-old man complained of minor injuries and was transported to St. Joseph's Community Hospital in the Town of Polk. The 38-year-old man who was reported as being trapped had minor injuries and refused transport. Inside the 21-year-old man's truck was a loaded Smith & Wesson .40 caliber inside the center console. The man did not carry a Concealed Carry Weapon permit. In addition to the OWI offence he also faces charges for carrying a concealed weapon.

Wesley Kuehl, husband of Ade-lyne Kuehl. Although we have not yet learned of his whereabouts, it is believed he is also in England because he is in the same infantry group and sailed at the same time with the others. All of these men were stationed at Camp Pickett, Virginia, before being sent overseas and have been together since entering the service.

**100 Years Ago
November 16, 1918**

The greatest war in history ended at six o'clock Washington time Monday morning, November 11, 1918 after 1,567 days of horror. Our boys have proven themselves the best fighters the world has ever seen. Their sacrifices and achievements have brought about the unconditional surrender of the enemy. The first news of peace reached Kewaskum around 6:30 a.m. and soon had spread all over the village. Preparations were immediately made for a parade and celebration in the evening. The parade started at 8 o'clock from the village hall led by the Kewaskum 30th Company, State Guards Reserve. They were followed by Red Cross workers, Hindenburg effigy in a cage, drawn by several high school boys, high school and parochial school children and Modern Woodmen. After marching through the streets, the parade came to a halt between the Catholic church and village hall on Main Street. Yells were given by the guards followed by patriotic songs by all the people, directed by Professor Lund. While the Star Spangled Banner was sung, the Hindenburg was sent up in flames. The streets were crowded with people from town and country. Later in the evening, a free dance followed at the Opera House.

The high school physics class, by means of a barometer, determined the height of Belger's hill and found it to be approximately 86 feet high.

All the high school girls interested in basketball met in the assembly room after school. They elected as Manager, Florence Groeschel; Captain, Camilla Driessel; and Treasurer, Agnes Stofel.





Continued From... School Board Reprimands VP – Jim Leister Calls Complaints “Retaliation”

“I was at that meeting. No date was set that night,” Leister said, adding that the *Kewaskum Statesman* has a recording of the meeting.

“The paper certainly has a right [to record meetings],” Superintendent James Smasal said. “That doesn’t make it official. It makes it her record of what she heard or recorded and not necessarily official record, and therefore it is up to the board to decide if they heard that being said or not.”

Three School Board Members, Mark Sette, Sue Miller and Troy Hanson, said they heard the meeting minutes as written, so the minutes were approved. School Board Member Timothy Ramthun had an excused absence from Monday night’s meeting.

Leister also said that he had not received a

any mail notifying him that the special meeting had been scheduled for November 5.

Ramthun also notified the *Statesman*, saying he had not attended the meeting because he had not heard received a phone call from Hanson regarding the special meeting and that he had not received any mail about the meeting date and time.

He quoted State Statute 120.11(2), “The notice shall be delivered to each school board member personally or shall be left at the usual place of abode of the school board member or shall be mailed by first class mail to the usual place of abode of the school board member so as to arrive at least 24 hours before the special school board meeting.”

However, Lewis said that email is permiss-

able and under that statute, and since all board members had been sent an email with a notice of the meeting, the district had done nothing wrong.

During the meeting, the board heard complaints that members of the community had filed against Leister.

“There were several complaints about his behavior at a sporting event or multiple sporting events,” Lewis said.

Lewis then read the complaints that had been filed, reading rude remarks that Leister had called out during football games.

The fourth complaint filed on Oct. 29 said Leister made “degrading and bullying comments to the team.”

Leister said he did not swear during any of the comments that thinks it is retaliation because he had voted against sell-

ing beer at baseball games on school grounds.

Sette made a motion to pass to censure, which can also include publicly disavowing his behavior to show that the board doesn’t stand with his behaviors and that they apologize, and they can also suspend him as a parent from participating and attending school events and report him to WIAA and allow them to take action.

Leister said he would apologize himself if he could continue attending football games because his sons have two years of high school football left and he will do whatever he has to because he wants to watch his boy’s games.

Miller made a motion to censure Leister and issue a letter of reprimand, publicly disavowing his behavior,

acknowledging that the board doesn’t approve of it, and adding the ability for the board to remove him from future games if another com-

plaint is made. All members voted in favor.



A life-long resident of


West Bend, Kieckhafer spent 38 years at the West Bend Aluminum Company working in sales management.

"We have prototypes out there the market hasn't even seen yet and they allow us to try it

out, and we give them our feedback," Tom Boden, shop superintendent, said.

"We always work efficiently together to come up with a solution. Being on the cutting edge with these types of things is exciting," Scott Schmidt, the county highway commissioner, said.

According to workers at the Highway Department, J.W. Speaker's innovative approach to the design and engineering of their lights has produced more effective outcomes and made their jobs much easier.

"One of the lead engineers on the projects physically came here and did a ride along with us in our plow trucks to see what our needs were. They design products to put the light exactly where we requested it, working directly with us," Boden said. "They were fantas-

tic to come here and see what they were trying to achieve. I've never heard that done with any other company."

The lights work in a unique way that provide drivers with a safer experience out on the roads, due to the advanced technology from J.W. Speaker's engineers.

"We're an industry leader delivering best in class optics. J.W. Speaker designs with application in mind, such is the case with a specific light pattern for the snow plow lights. We have an embedded thermal grid in the lens of our lights, that keeps lenses de-iced even at high speeds. driver needs to get done," Meyers said.

"We definitely feel safer with these lights. Not only for the drivers' sake, but also for the public as it's easier to see oncoming vehicles coming our way," Pehowski said.

The partnership between the private and public sector on these snow plow lights makes the winter season more

manageable and the Highway Department's plow drivers feel more prepared than ever to take on severe weather.

"We're neighbors and J.W. Speaker believes the drivers of the snow plows are doing a noble duty allowing people to get home safely. It's a valuable public service that Washington County is providing. Allowing the community and the infrastructure to keep running during inclement weather means a lot to J.W. Speaker. I think there's great alignment between our organizations," Meyers said.

– Luke Pallo Named Mr. Badger Natural Physique Champion

For the North American Natural Bodybuilding Federation contest held in Menomonie, all competitors went through drug screenings as well as a lie detector test to make sure they had not used any performance-enhancing drugs.

“Essentially it is fair all the way around, across the board. That is what I liked so much about it being a young man that has never taken anything. And I just like how thorough this league was to make sure that everybody was going to be on the same starting line,” Pallo said.

The Road To Strength

Pallo does not have a long background in exercise.

“I grew up here in Kewaskum and was homeschooled, so I didn't have a gym class or any nutrition classes per se. So the idea of working out seemed really foreign,” Pallo said.

But after Pallo started college, he wanted to get fit.

“I started out wanting to exercise because I was that very underweight kid growing up. When I got into college, I thought I had to kind of gain weight and get a lit-

tle bit stronger so I could kind of fit in with the college kids,” he said.

So Pallo started working out on January 1, 2015.

“I needed to start a healthier lifestyle, so it was a New Year's resolution of mine,” Pallo said.

Pallo joined Planet Fitness in West Bend. He started going to different websites to learn about nutrition and how to properly exercise.

After a couple years of working out, Pallo decided to make a goal for himself. Some friends recommended that he try competing. They thought he had the right genetics for bodybuilding.

“So I figured why not, and I went for it,” Pallo explained.

Competition

To train for his first competition in Chicago, Pallo started a 14-week preparation plan.

Throughout the 14 weeks, Pallo worked out in the gym for about an hour and a half each day, splitting time strengthening different muscle groups and performing cardiovascular exercises. And he followed a regimented diet.

“It is a 14-week diet essentially consisting of a whole lot of chicken and

rice,” Pallo said.

The plan started out eating about 4,000 calories a day, dropping all the way down to about 1,200 calories a day during the week before the show to enhance muscle performance and growth, but also to lose body fat and overall weight.

“The main staples were chicken, white rice, oats and broccoli. I had those every day, usually multiple times a day,” said Pallo, who did not get sick of the diet. “I still love those foods.”

People could not help reacting when they witnessed Pallo's large meals when he first started training.

“Most people would roll their eyes when they would see what I ate. Some thought it was very boring, others were holy cow, that's a lot of food,” Pallo said.

But the regiment worked. He lost about 12 pounds, so his 5 foot-10 1/2 inch frame weighed in at 162 for the competition rather than his normal 175 pounds.

The other thing that helped Pallo was having supportive friends.

“It really does help to have people who are interested in the same thing as you are because then you can motivate one another and also hold each other accountable,” Pallo said.

Pallo's parents also were helpful throughout the process. His father, Randy, has a background in wrestling, so he understood the training process. And his mother, Kathy, helped by preparing lots of organic chicken.

“I have been blessed with a lot of people, whether it is family or friends that have been really motivating to me, and pushing me, to be the best person I can be in and out of the gym.”


Pallo, who has a degree in public relations and communications and a minor in theater, relied upon his background in theater as well.

“You are in a very vulnerable position up there because a lot of people try to go through life not being judged by their cover. And with this, you are putting yourself into a position, where you are going to be judged by people based solely on your cover, without them knowing anything about you. So it is very nerve wracking,” Pallo said.

But as soon as he got on the stage, Pallo felt comfortable. He put a smile on his face and went for the title.





Veteran KHS Coach Beams About His All-Conference Honorees

The fact that Plymouth and Kettle Moraine Lutheran advanced to the WIAA State Soccer Tournament should be a bit of an indicator just how strong the East Central Conference was in the sport this year.

"Think about it. One quarter of our teams went to state," Kewaskum High coach John Kenworthy said in conjunction with the announcement of the all-conference teams and the fact three KHS players, Will Jens, Isaiah Cochran and Matt Krautkramer, earned second team honors while Hunter Kuehl and Brenden Rice were given honorable mention.

"We were real pleased," the veteran coach said. "Our players were not only recognized by our community but also by our peers. That's a good feeling!"

Having five get recognition was "the most

we've had in a year," Kenworthy went on, praising their efforts both on and off the field.

Jens and Cochran were honored as attackers. Jens, a junior was the Indians' leading scorer with 11 goals and led the team in assists with 12.

"He's got phenomenal skills. He can score and pass the ball pretty well," Kenworthy said of Jens, who was the object of attention of the Indians' opponents.

"There were times when he had four defenders on him," the coach said.

Switching to Cochran, Kenworthy said, "He's one of those kids you love to have [on your team]."

Cochran injured an ankle in an early match against Living Word and it wasn't until several weeks later, and with the help of a brace, that he was able to show his skills.

"He never stops working and he had a couple real long shots (for goals)," Kenworthy said, adding, "He'll continue to grow and get better."

Cochran finished the year with 30 points on 13 goals and four assists.

The senior Krautkramer, a second team defender, was the rock of the defense, according to Kenworthy,

who said it is hard for a defensive midfielder to end up high in team statistics, but Krautkramer did, finishing in the top five in scoring and the top five in "positive touches."

"He (Matt) was an all-around great player and an absolute destroyer on defense," the coach said.

Kuehl, another senior, wound up with five goals and eight assists for 18 total points.

"He didn't get the statistics he wanted this year, but it didn't change his effort," Kenworthy said. "I'm super proud of the way he handled himself," especially for the game against Campbell sport and was asked to change roles, which he did so the team could win.

Rice, a two-year starter, will be missed next year, according to Kenworthy, who pointed out in addition to being a good soccer player, he is an Eagle Scout and a very well rounded person.

In the loss to KML, Rice made some great diving saves, according to Kenworthy. The senior goalie had 190 saves while allowing 46 goals in the Indians' 24 games, which was the lowest total for opponents since 2010.

"He's going to make a good coach sometime," Kenworthy concluded.

KHS finished the year with an 11-10-3 mark. It was the first winning season in program history.

Hasenberg, Scoles Are Second Team Volleyball Picks

Two members of the Kewaskum High volleyball team, Hailey Hasenberg and Brelynn Scoles, were named to the second unit of the 2018 All-East Central Conference team.

Hasenberg, a five-foot, five-inch senior libero (defensive specialist), was the only senior on the KHS team this year, so she had to carry much of the leadership role for the Indians.

(She was) "One of the top 14 kids in conference, and as a libero, that is a tremendous feat," KHS coach Laine Leitzke said about Hasenberg, praising her hustle and energy and the improvement she made from sophomore to senior year.

"She was such a force night in and night out for us. She was asked to

shift to the outside, when (Brelynn) Scoles went down. She posted 6.7 digs per set and finished the season with 709 digs and 1,168 career digs. But the most important part that she provided was the non-statistical plays," Leitzke went on. "Running down an errant first ball and keeping it in play, being at the net to cover a block and get the ball up and then immediately get back into position to play a dig off of an attack."

"She just had a knack for getting into the path of the ball and it is something that Kewaskum volleyball will miss," the coach said. "She has come a long way since her sophomore debut on varsity, and it was her hard work that got her there."

Scoles, a five-foot, eight-inch outside hitter, "had to step in and fill the

shoes of our two kill leaders from the previous season. She isn't the tallest outside in the conference, and we relied on her maybe more than we should have," Leitzke said. Despite this, she was still able to increase her kills per set, kill percentage and hitting percentage.

"Not every ball that she took a swing on was a perfect set, and she was still able to raise her efficiency across the board," the coach said, reporting, "Defensively, she was third in both digs and serve receptions, behind Hasenberg and Holly Henk, who also played a key role in the Indians' success this season."

Leitzke said Scoles was looked to as a leader and was voted as the team MVP in a close race with Hasenberg.

EPA Provides Land Revitalization Assistance To Washington County And Germantown

Washington County will receive direct technical assistance from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Land Revitalization Program to help design a draft Connectivity Plan for the Village of Germantown.

The Connectivity Plan will center on Saxony Village, a multifamily development currently under construction on a remediated brownfield site that utilized the County Site Redevelopment Program for site assessment. Located just west of Germantown's historic Main Street District and at the south terminus of Park Avenue, the development will be a highly-visible project with important impacts on the community's mobility systems.

The design effort will create a bike and pedestrian Connectivity Plan with a general study area defined along the following corridors:

- ♦ Park Avenue, running from Freistadt Road on the north to the Saxony Village site on the south

- ♦ Main Street, from Division Road on the west to Fond du Lac Avenue on the east

- ♦ Squire Drive, from Main Street on the north to Mequon Road on the south

- ♦ Pilgrim Road, from Main Street on the north to Mequon Road on the south

Secondary street and

primary trail connections from Saxony Village to adjacent residential neighborhoods and open spaces will also be included at a more general level than the study area corridors. The study area corridors connect a number of important community sites, including Haupt Strasse Park, the Main Street District, Fireman's Park, the Gehl Foods Performing Arts Pavilion, Kennedy Middle School, the Senior Activity Center and the Mequon Road commercial area, to Saxony Village.

Enhancing streetscapes, providing pedestrian and bike facilities, and including green infrastructure features along the study area corridors is intended to be a catalyst for future development in downtown Germantown and adjacent neighborhoods, and leverage existing and planned amenities throughout the Village. The Connectivity Plan will also help inform the design features and character of future street improvement construction projects throughout Germantown.

The Connectivity Plan design will be led by a team of professionals contracted by the U.S. EPA. More information on the county's Site Redevelopment Program can be found on the County's website at www.co.washington.wi.us/SRP.
