Kewaskum Christmas Parade To Be Held Sunday

The Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce's annual Christmas Parade will make its way through the village this Sunday, Dec. 2, at 5 p.m.

The theme for this year's parade will be "All Creatures, Great and Small."

There will be plenty of entertainment in the parade, with groups like the River City Christmas Brass Band from West Bend and Downtown Harrison performing. New this year will be the Dancing Grannies out of Milwaukee.

Santa will make his grand appearance at the end of the parade.

To stay in the festive mood before the parade begins, everyone is invited to take part in the Chamber of Commerce's Cookie Hunt, which will be held in downtown Kewaskum on Sunday, from noon to

4 p.m.

The headquarters for the Cookie Hunt will be in the Annex Building, located at 1308 Fond du Lac Ave. in Kewaskum. Cookie Hunt participants can check in at the Annex and purchase one cookie box per family for \$2. Proceeds benefit the Kewaskum Community Pantry.

The Kewaskum Christmas Parade will start at Kewaskum High School, at Bilgo and Third Street. The route goes east on Third Street to Parkview. The parade will make its way south on Parkview before turning west on Main Street. Once it reaches Fond du Lac Avenue, the parade will turn north before turning right onto First Street, where it ends.

Spectators can participate in the season of giving by donating to the Kewaskum Community Pantry, which will collect food along the parade

route.

The detour route for traffic during the parade will consist of Knights Avenue, Western Avenue, Brooklane Drive and Clinton Street. There will be no parking on the detour route so traffic can flow more easily.

The annual parade is organized by the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce, which funds the parade through sponsorships, membership fees and event revenues.

All parade participants should line up by turning from Highway 45 onto Old Fond du Lac Avenue, and then right onto Wildlife Drive. Turn right onto Reigle Drive, and parade officials will direct participants from that point.

Lineup will begin on Third Street and then follow along Reigle Drive.

Franki Moscato knows what it is like to be teased.

She said she has been teased for being "boring" because she talks about God rather than about drugs and drinking.

The students and staff at Holy Trinity School in Kewaskum gathered to hear Franki's message

During the assembly, Franki sang songs and showed music videos she had created as she shared her message about kindness.

Keith Stephan Selected As New County Supervisor

The people of District 11 have a new supervisor to represent them on the Washington County Board.

Keith Stephan of the Town of Farmington was selected as the new supervisor during the County Board meeting on November 14. District 11 includes the Town of Farmington Wards 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5, and the Town of Trenton Ward 3.

Stephan currently is employed as plant manager for Erffmeyer and Sons Company in Milwaukee. According to his resume, Stephan has worked for the company since 1979. He has 25 years experience as a bench jeweler/goldsmith, 15 years as a department manager and five years as a plant manager.

He graduated from Marshall High School in Milwaukee and has an Associate of Applied Sci-

ence degree in fluid power from the Milwaukee School of Engineering and an Associate of Arts degree in diamonds from the Gemological Institute of America in Carlsbad, California.

Stephan succeeds William Blanchard in the position, who resigned on October 4. Blanchard claims he was forced to resign after two months in the position.

Continued From... Keith Stephan Selected As New County Supervisor

Blanchard was selected by the Washington County Board of Supervisors to replace Michael Parsons, who was re-elected to the position in April. Parsons resigned in July from the position because he moved out of the district.

On November 14, the Executive Committee prescreened three District 11 County Board Supervisor candidates, Christopher Elbe, Douglas Neumann and Keith Stephan, before recommending them to the County Board for nomination and appointment.

Neumann is director of Public Works for the City of West Bend, while Elbe is a dairy farmer and Farmington town

chairman.

It took a total of three rounds of voting before Stephan was chosen as the new supervisor.

The first round of voting eliminated Neumann, with Stephan getting 10 votes, Elbe acquiring eight votes and Neumann getting seven votes. The second round of voting resulted in a tie, with Elbe and Stephan each getting 12 votes.

On the third and final round, Stephan received 13 votes while Elbe had 11.

Stephan was declared District 11 County Board supervisor and was given the oath of office.

Stephan's term expires in April 2020.

Village Of Kewaskum Begins Winter Parking On December 1

The Village of Kewaskum's Winter Parking Restrictions and Snow Emergency Parking Restrictions go into effect at midnight (12 a.m.) on December 1, 2018, and remain in effect until midnight on April 1, 2019.

Municipal Code Section 90-96(c) Night Parking Restrictions, reads as follows:

"...no person...shall park or stop any vehicle on any public street or highway within the village between the hours

of 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. from December 1 to April 1 of each year. Notwithstanding such restrictions, vehicles may be parked for a period of time not longer than three minutes for loading or unloading of passengers, provided no other regulation restricting parking as to place, time or manner is violated thereby."

The fine for violating the ordinance is:

-\$20 if paid within five days of the issuance of the parking citation.

-\$30.00 if paid between six days and before 28 days.

After 28 days, the amount is \$40 and a notice will be sent to the Motor Vehicle Department to suspend any and all vehicle registrations held by the owner and refuse renewals of the same until the citation is satisfied.

The owner of the vehicle is responsible for the payment of the citation regardless of who was the operator of the vehicle.

Kewaskum School District Office To Relocate

The Kewaskum School District Administrative offices are in transition of relocating to 1455 School St. as well as utilizing office space at Kewaskum Elementary School. The remodel of the high school has allowed the Kewaskum Career Academy (KCA) to relocate into the high school. The

move of all affected individuals is expected to be complete by December 21.

Those departments that will be located at 1455 School Street include: Business, Curriculum and District Administrator. The phone number remains the same 262-626-8427.

The Pupil Services

Department will be located within the Kewaskum Elementary School and can be reached at 262-626-8427.



Continued From... A Kind Message

– Holy Trinity Students Have Assembly On Kindness

“Her message really shines through. It is what the Christian faith is all about, treating each other equally and not putting other people down,” said Brooke Wildt, a student at Holy Trinity School.

It was a message that all of the students in 5K through eighth grade heard at the school last week.

“Typically she does assemblies for just middle school students. But at Holy Trinity, we have 154 kids, and we are pretty tight. We intermix frequently, so she thought it would be great to have everybody here,” said Jennifer Crombie, principal of Holy Trinity School.

Crombie contacted Franki online after one of the school parents had told her about the young musician.

“Like any other school, we have this kind of issues. I reached out to Franki after some things happened in our middle school to pick her brain, more or less,” Crombie said.

She was hoping that Franki might be able to get through to the students.

“You can hear from your teachers and your parents and your principal about the importance of being respectful and being kind and all of that, but I wanted somebody closer to their age to kind of weigh in,” Crombie said.

Franki taught the students three main lessons:

1. Be kind to those who need it the most.

2. Be kind to parents and teachers.

3. Be an upstander (not a bystander) and stand up for others.

“We have to stop judging people. That is not cool,” Franki told the students.

The young students listened attentively.

“I think that this made a real impact on my life,” said Victoria Quisek, a student at Holy Trinity.

Gaining Fame

Franki has brought her message around the country. She has recorded music in Nashville and recently performed on the television show “American Idol,” which will be broadcast in March.

When she was 11, Franki sang the National Anthem before a Green Bay Packers game. She sang for Gov. Scott Walker, and was twice invited to open Miss Wisconsin Pageants.

She won a charity talent contest, Bright Stars Face Off. According to her website, Franki has been cast in a number of films, including an educational human trafficking collection that will soon be shared with students in schools across the country.

Franki starred in a music film that centers on a song she composed and sings about her own experience of being bullied. In July 2017, the film won Best Music Video at both the London and Hollywood

Independent Film Awards.

She also performs regularly at private and public gatherings around the state.

Bringing The Message To Kewaskum

The Holy Trinity students were the first people to hear Franki perform her latest song, “Tightrope.”

They also heard her explain that they should not judge others.

“Maybe somebody has bad hygiene or bad breath. We’ve got to stop judging because you don’t know what is really happening at home,” Franki told the students.

Then she told the story of how students had given a lady janitor a hard time because she wore orange every day.

“That is so weird,” the kids would tell the lady.

“Come to find out that the reason she did that was because her husband had passed away, and orange was his favorite color,” Franki explained. “We don’t know what is going on in someone else’s life.”

The assembly was sponsored by Sharyl Zillmer, Megan Sargent and Kathie Ramthun of Catholic Financial Life.

“She was a real inspiration,” said Holy Trinity student Bella Schoofs.

With announcing it on one of her FB Lives, she ended up receiving many cash donations for meals from outside the area, including from out of state.

"People want to help, you just need to give them an outlet to do so. It absolutely fills my heart to witness such kindness," said Lenzendorf, who is a 1995 Kewaskum High School graduate and whose triplets attend Kewaskum Middle School.

Buy Local: Buy A Real Christmas Tree

– Real Christmas Trees Benefit
Wisconsin's Economy And Environment

Thanksgiving signals the unofficial start of the Christmas season. Many families choose a real tree to celebrate the holiday which not only makes for great memories, but also benefits Wisconsin's economy and environment.

"Choosing a real Christmas tree supports local farmers and is an environmentally-friendly option," said Sarah Hetke, Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation's Director of Communications. "With many consumers showing a preference for local products, the tradition of celebrating Christmas with a real tree is a great option."

Christmas trees absorb carbon dioxide and other gases, and in turn emit oxygen. For every real Christmas tree harvested, two to three seedlings are planted. Tree farms also serve as great habitat for wildlife to live.

After Christmas, trees can be recycled into mulch to be used on trails or gardens. Growers use the mulch around seedlings to preserve moisture and reduce weed competition. Some recycled cut trees are used as soil erosion barriers or wildlife habitats.

Meeting consumer demands for real Christmas trees this year won't be a problem due to ideal weather conditions.

There are plenty of trees available, according to Cheryl Nicholson, executive secretary of the Wisconsin Christmas Tree Producers Association.

"Now is the perfect time for families to venture out to get a real Christmas tree," Nicholson said. "With the good growing season this past summer the trees are very healthy and look great."

Wisconsin has more than 365 licensed Christmas tree farms. According to the most recent agricultural census, Wisconsin is fifth in

the nation in the number of trees cut and acres (more than 23,000) in production. More than 600,000 evergreens are harvested each fall.

"The sale of Christmas trees and wreaths generates more than 16 million dollars for Wisconsin's economy and thousands of residents are employed in the industry, because it is a labor-intensive agriculture crop," added Nicholson. "Many tree farms offer gift shops, farm animals, reindeer, bonfires, hot chocolate, wagon rides and other activities, which makes for a fun winter-time ag-tourism trip for families."

BBB Warning: Avoid These Holiday Scams

Santa isn't the only one keeping track of who is naughty and who is nice! Better Business Bureau is warning consumers to beware of these common holiday scams:

Be cautious shopping online. Because many retailers now have chip card readers, fraud at bricks-and-mortar stores is down, so scammers have shifted their efforts online. Use a credit (not debit) card online and only shop on secure websites. Look for https in the address (the extra "s" is for "secure") and for a lock symbol.

Look-alike websites: When shopping online, make sure to use only legitimate websites. Watch out for URLs that use the names of well-known brands along with extra words.

Fake shipping notifications: These can

have attachments or links to sites that will download malware on your computer to steal your identity and your passwords. Don't be fooled by a holiday phishing scam.

E-cards: Electronic cards can be great fun, but be careful. Two red flags to watch out for are: the sender's name is not apparent; you are required to share additional information to get the card.

Letters from Santa: Several trusted companies offer charming and personalized letters from Santa, but scammers mimic them to get personal information from unsuspecting parents. Check with BBB.org to find out which ones are legitimate.

Emergency scam: Be cautious if you get a call from a family member or friend claiming to be

in an accident, arrested, or hospitalized while traveling in another country. Never send money unless you confirm with another family member that it's true.

Phony charities: Everyone is in a generous mood at the holidays, so scammers take advantage of that with fake charity solicitations in email, on social media sites, and even by text. Check out charities at Give.org before donating.

Temporary holiday jobs: Retailers and delivery services need extra help at the holidays, but beware of solicitations that require you to share personal information online or pay for a job lead. Apply in person or go to retailers' main websites to find out who is hiring.

Unusual forms of payment: Be wary of anyone who asks you to

pay for holiday purchases using prepaid debit cards, gift cards, wire transfers, third parties, etc. These payments cannot be traced and cannot be undone.

Free gift cards: Pop-up ads or email offering free gift cards are often just a ploy to get your personal information that can later be used for identity theft.

Social media gift exchange: It sounds like a great deal; buy one gift and get 36 in return. But it's just a variation on a pyramid scheme and it's illegal.

Piittmann Stepping Down As KHS Football Coach

Kewaskum High School's highly successful football coach Jason Piittmann has resigned.

While there has been no official announcement on the resignation, Piittmann indicated in a phone conversation November 26 that he has stepped down from the post and that the district would be coming out with a press release on November 28.

When asked how long he had been with the program, Piittmann said "Ever since I came here in '99."

He was the defensive coordinator for several seasons, then took over as the head coach over a dozen years ago.

After being asked another question, Piittmann said, "That's all I can say right now."

Piittmann's teams qualified for the Wisconsin Interscholastic Ath-

letic Association's football playoffs 13 straight years. That string was broken this fall when the Indians ended up 2-5 in the East Central Conference and 4-5 over. Before that, he led the Indians to three EC championships in a row, including 2016 when Kewaskum, Plymouth and Berlin tied for the title.

In 2017, after going a perfect 7-0 in conference action, KHS won its first playoff game before losing to Green Bay Notre Dame 12-7 in a very close Division 3 Level 2 game.

Piittmann has suffered with some health issues in recent years, causing him to miss one game last year and the Plymouth and Campbell sport games this fall.

Piittmann is also the school's athletic director and teaches several physical education classes.

KHS Boys Come Up Short At The End

They were down by 10 points with two minutes to go, they had cut the deficit to three with just 0:24 remaining, and then the Kewaskum Indians had a couple defensive lapses which prevented them from overtaking Winnebago Lutheran Academy. The host Vikings prevailed 68-63 in the season opener for both teams.

"I was pleasantly surprised at how well we played," KHS coach Don Gruber said.

Gruber has four new starters and for the most part, he liked what he saw from them. Obviously there is room for improvement, especially in the area of defending.

"We gave up too many fast breaks," Gruber said, and a couple of them were responsible for killing the comeback try at the end.

Brad Buechel, the lone returning starter

from a year ago, led a balanced attack with 14 points, including five for 11 shooting with one three-point goal in four tries. Buechel also had a team-high seven rebounds and two turnovers.

Next came 6 foot-4 inch junior John Mark Bocher with 12 points on four of nine shooting and four free throws in five attempts. Bocher, one of the Bocher triplets on the team, also hauled down five rebounds.

Good outside shooting was provided by Jacob Schlosser, who was making his first start. Schlosser, more known for his golfing prowess, popped in three baskets from long range toward an 11-point effort.

"Jacob scored eight of his points in the second half," Gruber said, reporting senior Carson Dogs also got on track after intermission, scoring seven of his eight

points. The other starter, junior Toree Ralph, chipped in with nine points on three for five shooting and four of his six free throws.

"They (WLA) had nine three-balls," Gruber said. Bo Miller, a 5 foot-8 inch guard, swished four of them en route to an 18-points effort. The Indians also had problems handling the Vikings' 5 foot-10 inch junior guard, Donovan Schwartz, who scored a game-high 18 points.

WLA's two big men, Gabe Pruss and Benji Cole, didn't score all that well — they combined for 15 points — but Gruber said they started several break outs for the Vikings.

"We didn't have a lot of turnovers, but the ones we did have, they capitalized on," Gruber said, admitting he thought the juniors would get "baptized" a little in the opener, but, "I

thought they handled it pretty well."

The Indians were at Kiel on November 7. then host powerful Waupun in the Conference opener on Friday, Nov. 30.

With just nine seniors on the team and a raft of season-ending injuries, it wasn't the finish the Kewaskum High football players hoped it would be.

Despite not making the playoffs for the first time in 14 years and finishing in seventh place in the East Central Conference, there were individuals that deserved recognition, and they took center stage at the second Awards Night held at the school on November 11.

Senior two-way tackle Jon Leister headed the list. The 6-foot 3-inch, 280-pounder who was named to the All-East Central Football Team on offense and defense and received mention on the WFC (Wisconsin Football Coaches Association)

All-Region Team, was honored as this year's MVP on defense.

Kyle Bath, Eric Bauer and Dawson Bastian also were honored by the WFC, making the Academic All-State team, which is based on grade point and participation.

Senior Lucas Christenson, who started just five games as a running back, won the honor of MVP on offense. He wound up with 578 yards rushing, 11 pass receptions for 37 yards and scored seven touchdowns in the Indians' 4-5 season.

Ryan Prochnow hadn't played football since the sixth grade but came out this year and wound up as the team's punter and place kicker, started in the defensive secondary and even

played a few games at wide receiver. He was the MVP of special teams.

Prochnow punted 25 times for a 36.2 yard per kick average, was successful on 12 of 13 extra points and made the only field goal he attempted. He also returned four punts for 29 yards (7.2 average) and six kickoffs for 87 yards (14.5 average).

Other award winners included: Scout Team MVP — Sam Lemler and Most Improved Player — Trenton Riekkoff. Lemler is a junior wide receiver/defensive back, while Riekkoff is a sophomore lineman.

There was one more award, the Indian Award, and it went to Dawson Bastian, who was listed in the program as a 5-foot 2-inch, 155-pound running back/linebacker. He played football all four years and loved the game. Bastian got to carry the ball twice in the win over Waupun.

Veteran head coach Jason Piittmann said,

"[This award goes to] the kid who has the intangibles. A great teammate. Maybe doesn't get the most playing time but knocks himself out for the team ... Does everything the coaches ask of him without questioning."

Dr. Charles And Donna Ogi Selected As Parade Marshals

Dr. Charles Ogi, 93, and his wife, Donna Ogi, 91, have been selected as parade marshals for this year's Christmas Parade in Kewaskum.

Often referred to by locals simply as "Doc Ogi," Dr. Charles Ogi is a retired veterinarian. He worked as a veterinarian in Kewaskum for decades, and Donna helped run the business.

When he started his veterinary practice in Kewaskum, Doc Ogi specialized in large animals, but he treated small animals as well.

That makes it quite appropriate for the couple to be named parade marshals with this year's parade theme, "All Creatures Great and Small."

Both Doc Ogi and Donna grew up in Wayne County, Ohio. After Doc Ogi graduated from Ohio State, he was offered a position at a veterinary clinic in West Bend, so the couple moved to Wisconsin in 1954.

"We liked it so well we stayed," Donna said.

Doc Ogi, who is a World War II veteran, opened his own veterinary clinic in Kewaskum around 1958. From the beginning, Donna helped run the business.

In 1961, the couple moved to their home on Edgewood Road in Kewaskum. Shortly after that, they moved their veterinary practice to the house as well.

Doc Ogi, who also served on the Kewaskum School Board for years, would go out to farms and treat large animals. Smaller animals were brought to the house for treatment.

"You really got to know everybody. The farmers were so friendly and very good people," Doc Ogi explained.

Clients were often impressed with Ogi's touch with animals.

There was one time that stands out in particular, when Doc Ogi played a small joke on a farmer.

The farmer had called Doc Ogi to come out to his farm to treat a sick cow. When Doc got there, the farmer was distraught.

"Doc, I waited too long to call you. She's gone already. I don't think there is anything you can do," the farmer told Doc Ogi.

Doc Ogi looked out onto the pasture and saw the cow was lying down in the grass, which was a good sign. He could see she was breathing.

So Ogi went out to the cow and started an IV. Then he decided he would really impress the

farmer.

"I played television preacher," Doc Ogi recalled.

Doc Ogi dramatically placed his hands on the cow and proclaimed, "Heal."

Then he gave the cow a little kick in the fanny, and the cow stood up.

"Sometimes miracles happen," Doc Ogi told the farmer.

The farmer was amazed.

"I don't think I ever told him what I did," Ogi laughed.

While Ogi was out treating large animals, different salespeople would stop at the house.

Donna Ogi would talk with them, and often would fix them lunch while they waited.

"I couldn't just let them sit there when it was time to eat," Donna said.

So the practice became a favorite for salesmen to visit.

The couple currently have no pets, but they always had a dog and often had cats while they ran the veterinary practice.

But their favorite pet was a skunk, Stinky.

They acquired Stinky when a customer brought in five skunks. Ogi removed the scent glands from the animals and got to keep one skunk for himself.

Stinky stayed in the house with the family.

"Skunks make wonderful pets. They are so smart and very clean," Doc Ogi said.

Unfortunately, with all the animals, occasionally there were tragedies. Ogi recalls the sad day he backed his car up along his long driveway, and accidentally ran over the family pet cat.

Two of their children were especially heartbroken. Lizbeth and Greg both cried when they saw the cat.

The two children immediately carried children carried the cat to a special spot in the yard. They dug a grave and said a prayer before placing the cat into the grave.

"It was a regular funeral they had out there," Donna said.

Charles and Donna Ogi have four children. Gregory runs the veterinary clinic in Kewaskum, Kenneth is a retired school administrator, Mitchell is a retired insurance agent and Lizbeth is a nurse.

The couple also have 14 grandchildren and 23 great-grandchildren, with three more on the way.

"We have been blessed with such a wonderful family," Doc Ogi said. "We are so very proud of each one of them."
