KHS Student Awarded Super Bowl Tickets

– Courtney Zarda Receives Super Bowl Tickets Through Fuel Up To Play 60 Program

When Courtney Zarda attended the all-school assembly at Kewaskum High School on Friday, Dec. 21, she thought a student was going to be surprised.

It was the last day of school before Christmas break, so she thought that maybe someone returning home from the military was going to surprise a student during the assembly.

She was correct that the assembly was being held to surprise a student.

But it turned out that Courtney, who is a junior at KHS, was the student who was surprised.

The assembly was held to inform Courtney that she had won two tickets to the Super Bowl.

"I am really excited...I am overwhelmed. I don't know how to describe it. It is an honor...I am so grateful for it," Courtney said shortly after finding

out she will be going to Super Bowl LIII in 2019.

The Surprise

The school assembly started with an announcement that a special guest would appear remotely to the students through an online program.

When Travis Frederick, an NFL player, appeared on a large screen in the school's field house, Courtney began wondering what was going on.

Courtney was familiar with Frederick. A graduate of Big Foot High School in Walworth, Frederick had played for the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He is currently a center for Courtney's favorite team, the Dallas Cowboys.

When Frederick greeted the students gathered at the assembly, he knew that the vast majority of them were Green Bay Packers fans. He asked if

there was at least one Dallas Cowboys fan in the crowd.

All of the students started calling out Courtney's name.

They knew Courtney was a diehard Dallas Cowboys fan.

Then, with the entire student body — and news crews from two television stations and two newspapers — watching, Courtney was called forward to speak one-on-one with Frederick.

"You have been doing great things down there with your school for the Fuel Up To Play 60 program," Frederick said to Courtney.

He then told Courtney she was receiving Dallas Cowboys apparel. But that wasn't all.

"Due to your leadership in the Fuel Up To Play 60 (FUPTP60) program, the FUPTP60 program is giving you two tickets to the Super Bowl," Frederick said.

Boltonville Volunteer Fire Department Gets New Chief

Mueller joined the Boltonville Volunteer Fire Department on August 5, 1984. He was promoted to lieutenant in 2000. He held that rank until 2012, when he was promoted to assistant chief. He has held that position until last month when he was voted in as the new fire chief.

Mueller has held various positions on the fire department's Board of Directors, including president. Mueller has been in charge of coordinating training to improve the skills of the department's firefighters. He has been a first responder since 2002 and has donated countless hours volunteering on special projects and

committees to improve the department and the township the department serves.

Retired Fire Chief Ken Ramthun Recognized For 50 Years Of Service

Newly Retired Fire Chief Ken Ramthun was recently recognized for 50 years of service with the Boltonville Volunteer Fire Department.

Ramthun joined the department in December 1968. He was nominated to second assistant chief in 1972 and held that position for 20 years. In 1992 he was promoted to first assistant chief. He held that position until 2012, when Joe Enright retired as chief. At that time, Ramthun took over the reigns and served as chief for the past six years.

Ramthun announced in December that he would be retiring as chief so he could spend more time with his wife

and family running the family farm.

Ramthun has been very active with the department over the past 50 years. At the department's Christmas party, Ramthun was cited for making the department one that the firefighters are proud of, through his dedication and long hours, and Joe Enright's help. Ramthun said that it helps when you have a great group of people who work so well together...it makes his job look easy.

38 Communities, Groups Receive Urban Forestry Grants

Thirty-eight Wisconsin communities, nonprofit groups, and counties will share over \$532,000 in 2019 state grant dollars to promote and sustain urban forest resources in Wisconsin.

In the area, grants were awarded to:

- Village of Kewaskum, \$5,000 for Emerald Ash Borer Management Plan

- Riveredge Nature Center, \$23,600 for a Scientist in Residence initiative

- City of West Bend, \$25,000 for the City of West Bend's 2019 EAB Response & Free Street Tree Program

The Department of Natural Resources Urban Forestry Grant program funds projects that are consistent with state and national goals for increasing the urban forest canopy and the benefits it provides. The urban forest encompasses trees on both public and private property.

Priorities for the 2019

grant cycle include, but were not limited to, projects that increase the ability of local municipal partners to expand their urban forestry program; increase the ability of all local partners to provide ongoing urban forestry funding, services and/or markets; benefit multiple communities; and put existing inventories of urban trees to use.

"Wisconsin's urban forests provide a wide range of ecological, economic and social benefits for the 70 percent of Wisconsin's population that lives in an urban area and visitors to these communities," said Sarah Zimmerman, DNR urban forestry grant manager. "Beyond aesthetics, urban forests reduce air pollution, mitigate storm water runoff, conserve energy, and increase property values. The 2019 urban forest grants help communities maximize these benefits."

DNR forestry officials

encouraged communities to apply for grants to develop emerald ash borer management plans and raise public awareness regarding its impact on ash trees in their community. Increasing species diversity is the best way to reduce the impact of future tree diseases or insect infestations.

The grants range from \$1,000 to \$25,000, and grant recipients must match each grant dollar for dollar. A startup grant of up to \$5,000 is available for communities that want to start or restart a community forestry program. Out of the 38 2019 Urban Forestry grants awarded, 12 are for startup grants.



Kewaskum firefighters tended to victims of a two-vehicle crash on Tuesday Jan. 7. Kewaskum Police Chief Tom Bishop said the crash happened at 11:51 a.m. on Fond du Lac Avenue at Timblin Drive in the village. Lt. Martin Schulteis, of the Washington County Sheriff's Office said in that crash, a 59-year-old Eden woman was driving south bound on Highway 45, crossing over the Eisenbahn Trail. The Trailblazer's tires lost traction on the slippery overpass, causing the vehicle to spin into the concrete bridge sides and guard rail. A 39-year-old Eden woman was a passenger.

A Kewaskum man is facing charges for his ninth OWI offense after nearly hitting a Kewaskum police car on his way home after a day of drinking. His passenger faces charges of resisting and obstructing an officer.

Streets and highways were very slippery and hazardous following the freezing rain and sleet late last weekend and five to eight inch snow over the weekend. Approximately four more inches of snow fell on Monday, covering the ice surface underneath. Both snowstorms were accompanied by 15 to 20 mile an hour winds piling the snow into huge drifts and blocking roads and driveways. Many power and telephone lines were downed by the coating of ice over the weekend, disrupting service in many areas.

**75 Years Ago
January 7, 1944**

An accident took place at 11:30 a.m. Tuesday, Jan. 4, on Highway 55 on a curve at Kuhberg when a truck driven south by Ervin Butzclaff of Route 2, Kewaskum, collided with a car driven north by Charles E. Hunter of Pearson. Hunter and his wife were taken to a Milwaukee hospital for treatment of injuries, the extent of which were not learned.

Snow, the first fall in more than a month in this vicinity, blanketed this section Wednesday morning when about 2 1/2 inches fell. Another light snowfall Thursday morning added about a half inch more on the ground. The ground had been bare practically all season up to this time. The snow was needed as the ground was exceptionally dry and farmers were beginning to worry about next year's crops. In the Town of Osceola, it is reported, some farmers' wells ran dry and they were forced to haul water from neighbors. The only harm caused by the snow was the resulting slippery highways and it spoiled the kids' ice skating, which has been perfect up to this time. Uncle's History In The Sport Led Bauer To Become A Wrestler

Anyone who follows local high school wrestling knows the sport is often "a family affair." Sons whose fathers once wrestled follow in the tradition, and in some cases, there are three generations who have wrestled for Kewaskum High School.

In the case of senior Eric Bauer, however, it wasn't his dad who got him interested in the sport but rather his mother.

"It was actually because her brother wrestled," Bauer said recently after surpassing Brett Scoles as the school's all-time win leader with his 141st win.

Bauer was referring to Rob Richtmyre, who wrestled for West Bend East and later attended West Point. Bauer was 5 years old when he first got involved in the sport, and noted, "I liked it ... It was an individual sport."

Concerning where he started, Bauer said, "I think it would have been KIWC (Kewaskum Indian Wrestling Club)," and he didn't compete in many tournament the first couple of years.

"I think I did a couple local ones, like West Bend and Campbell-sport," Bauer went on, indicating by third grade he was pretty well hooked on the sport, and began going to the Ringers Club in Germantown a couple nights of the week for extra training.

The push to be successful was aided by

these extra sessions, mainly because of "the different partners (I had)," Bauer said. "My partners were pretty good. You make each other pretty good when you have better partners."

Bauer got better and better and by middle school was starting to travel to out-of-state competitions. He said his best finish in a national event came when he was in sixth or seventh grade when he placed fourth in the competition held in Missouri.

Bauer was a seasoned veteran when he hit the high school mats for the first time, but he admitted he never thought he would reach 141 wins.

"I never really thought about it," he said. Then when asked which was more important to him, the record or winning state, Bauer added, "Winning state is more important," and he still has one more chance to reach the top step of the podium after finishing second as a freshman and fourth the past two years.

Concerning a favorite win in his career, Bauer said, "It would have to be freshman year in the state semis ... Just to make it to finals."

The win, an 8-0 decision came over Marshall senior Jensen Langer. In the finals, Bauer lost to Two Rivers' Paul Bianchi by a score of 11-2, ending his season with a 49-2 record.

Concerning goals for his senior season, the 160-pounder said, "Just

finish strong and see where it takes me ... Hopefully a gold [medal]."

While Bauer is especially good on his feet and getting takedowns, he is quick to point out, "I usually score quite a few back points."

Bauer appreciates the support his dad and mom, Mark and Rhonda, and his sister Lizzie, have given him, but also notes his grandparents, Gary and Mary Richtmyre, are right there too. The elder Richtmyres moved to Florida last spring but are able to watch his matches via Track-Wrestling, and they did see him break the KHS record.

"I think they called me Saturday night," he said.

Bauer broke the record at the Fond du Lac Cardinal Invitational, and it is ironic he also got his 100th victory there a year ago in the first round of the tournament. Later that day he injured his elbow and was unable to continue wrestling that day.

Not only did Bauer reach a milestone on December 15, he reported senior teammate, 113-pound Nathaniel Droese, got his 100th win at Fond du Lac on the same day.

As far as future plans, Bauer, an honor roll student at KHS, said, "I plan to go on to college but not sure where yet."

For now he will be happy to keep piling on the victories and getting prepared for the state series, which starts in mid-February.



Fuel Up To Play 60

The FUPTP60 program is a national partnership between the NFL and the National Dairy Council. On the state level, the program is funded by dairy farmers.

“Dairy farmers have been so supportive of this program,” Losee said.

Courtney has been involved with the FUPTP60 program since she was in sixth grade.

The FUPTP60 program promotes healthy living. The program is held at schools throughout the country, with a


